
More than two thousand veterans of the war in Vietnam are sponsoring an investigation into war ... nes committed as the inexorable result of national policy.

More than one hundred Vietnam veterans will testify at the hearings to be held in Detroit on January 31, February 1 and 2. Across the Detroit River, in Windsor, Canada, a number of Vietnamese victims, from both the South and the North, will offer supplementary testimony. The Administration will not issue visas to the Vietnamese to enter this country but the two hearings will be connected by closed circuit television.

The witnesses will testify about war crimes that their units have committed. Former enlisted men and officers from various Marine Divisions and virtually all of the Army Divisions that have served in Vietnam will testify about ground tactics including free fire zones, search and destroy missions and harressing and interdictory fire. Former Special Forces officers and enlisted men will testify about the mistreatment of the civilian population. Former prisoner-of-war interrogators will testify about the torture of prisoners and of suspects. Navy and Air Force veterans will testify about the use of high explosives and napalm against populated areas. Marine artillery officers and Army artillery officers will testify regarding massive technological escalation and the indiscriminate use of artillery against farmers, women and children.

Testimony of massacres, torture of prisoners, murder of prisoners will be offered and will, in some instances be corroborated by the testimony of other witnesses who observed the same or similar actions.

Testimony will be offered regarding the use of chemical and biological warfare and the use of other weapons specifically outlewed by international treaty.

Among the many witnesses testifying will be veterans who have served with the 101st Airborne, The First Cavalry, the 39th Infantry, the 68th Assault Helicopter, the First Marine Air Wing, the Third Marine Division, the Twenty-fifth Division, the First of the Twenty-seventh Artillery, the First of the Twelfth and many other units.

The Program

The first session will be held on Sunday, January 31, at 10:00 A.M. The sessions are planned to extend until 5:30 each evening but will continue until each witness has testified and has answered all questions put to him regardless of the hour.

All of the sessions in the United St. will take place in the Ballroom South and Ballroom North of the Howard Johnson's New Center Motor Lodge at West Grand Boulevard and Third Avenue in Detroit, Michigan. The Michigan Room will be made available to the representatives of the media.


We are also calling on churches throughout the country to declare Sunday, January 31, a day of mourning for all those, Vietnamese and Americans and others, who have died in the war in southeast Asia, and a day of prayer that the war may now end. Veterans of the war will also speak in churches throughout the country on Sunday morning.

The second session will be held in the same facilities on Monday, February 1st.

The third session will be held on February 2 at the Cleary Auditorium in Windsor, Canada. The Vietnamese witnesses will be heard and seen in the Ballroom South at Howard Johnson's in Detroit via closed circuit television.

The afternoon session on February 2 will be held in both ballrooms at Howard Johnson's in Detroit. At the conclusion of the afternoon session the veterans will meet with the Vietnamese in Windsor for tea and for dinner.


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The Winter Soluier Offensive

The Detroit-Windsor hearings will constitute actions that are perhaps unprecedented in our country's history. Yet three-day investigation will signal the start of a major offensive by veterans until the war ends. Transcripts of the statements of each of the witnesses will be made available to the public and to the media. Present plans call for a film to be made of the three-day action as well as a phonograph record. Veterans will be encouraged to arrange for similar hearings at major cities throughout the country. Veterans will tour college campuses, fraternal organizations, and women's organizations.

We have been there and we know that the crimes occur regularly and that the basic responsibility rests with the national leaders. We are resolved to employ all necessary means to acquaint the American people with the facts. We encourage cross-examination, including hostile examination of those of us who testify. We have carried out the policy of this nation during our time in Vietnam. We have come home to acquaint America with its policy. My Lai was not an "isolated incident" and those responsible for it are not a few aberrant individuals. Those responsible do not live in the hootches of the Makong Delta; they reside in Washington, D.C. where the policies that comprise attempted genocide are originated.

BLACK PANTHER PARTY Also Known As Black Panther Party for Self-Defense

According to the official newspaper of the Black Panther Party (BPP), the BPP was started during December, 1966, in Oakland, California, to organize black people so they can take control of the life, politics, and the destiny of the black community. It was or lized by BOBBY G. SEALE, BPP Chairman, and HUEY P. NEWTON, Minister of Defense, BPP.

The official newspaper, called "The Black Panther," regularly states that the BPP advocates the use of guns and guerrilla tactics in its revolutionary program to end oppression of the black people. Residents of the black community are urged to arm themselves against the police who are consistently referred to as "pigs" who should be killed.

The newspaper, in its issue of September 7, 1968, had an article by the then Minister of Education, GEORGE MURRAY. This article ended with the following:

"Black men. Black people, colored persons of America, revolt everywhere! Arm yourselves. The only culture worth keeping is revolutionary culture. Change. Freedom everywhere. Dynamite! Black power. Use the gun. Kill the pigs everywhere."

The BPP newspaper, issue of October 5, 1968, had an article introduced with the following statement: "We will not dissent from American government. We will overthrow it."

DAVID HILLIARD, Chief of Staff, BPP, in a speech at the San Francisco Polo Field on November 15, 1969, said "We will kill Richard Nixon."

DAVID HILLIARD, in the "New York Times," issue of December 13, 1969, was quoted as follows: "We advocate the very direct overthrow of the government by way of force and violence."



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

A source, who has furnished reliable information in the past advised on January 31, 1971 that the Winter Söldier Investigation (WSI), sponsored by the Vietnam Veterans Against the War held their first session beginning at 10:00 a.m. in the Ballroom of the Howard Johnson's New Center Motor Lodge, Detroit, Michigan. Approximately five or six hundred people were at the conference, with people coming and going all during the day, making it prohibitive to get a true count. Most of these attending were in the 18 to 23 age group. There was no charge made at the door. Throughout the day there were approximately 35 speakers, most of whom were allegedly former sericemen and Vietnam veterans. There were also four civilians who spoke, who said they had been to Vietnam.

One civilian, a Dr. E.W. Pfeifer, from the University of Montana spoke during the Weapons Panel and spoke on the use and effect of defoliants in both Vietnam and Cambodia. He also showed pictures of a hospital in Cambodia that had been bombed by American planes thinking the hospital was a North Vietnamese military installation. Dr. Pfeifer said he had been in Cambodia at that government's invitation to do research for a book on chemical defoliants.

For several hours during the WSI a local right wing group in Detroit called Breakthrough held a demonstration and picketed outside the Howard Johnson Motor Lodge. The signs they carried were aimed at Mark Lane and Jane Fonda, sponsors

of the WSI. Some of the signs read: "Tokyo Rose - 1941; Hanoi Jane - 1971", "Benedict Arnold Slept Here", "Howard Johnson Harbors Reds". No incidents were observed.



The following summaries are samples of the types of testimony that will be presented during the three days of the Winter Soldier Investigation:

This is not a complete list of testimeny, but rather a summary of some of the points that will be discussed. These incidents, when explained by the veterans, will show both the true nature of our national military policy, and the results of that policy.

This packet alone does not contain the total message of the Winter Soldier Investigation. That message will be found in the actual testimony of the veterans.

RECTIFIEN CHAIG, 23, PFC, 2/5 M. hes, lot Morine Division, [left], Philadelphia, Pa. resident to files to VC suspects being lindfolded by a staff NCO and GIA ssing them in the sire and latting them fall on the steel bed of a truck causing serious injuries to them [An Hoa, south of DaNang, June 1967]. He tells about a company commander running over a Vietnamese woman with a vehicle because she would not move to the side of the road. The rest of the convoy passed over her, crushing her beyond human recognition. He also has testimony relating to shooting up friendly villages (March 1967, south of DaNang on Highway 1).

JON SPIRSON, 23, Sgt. E-5, combet engineer, 9th Eng., lst Marine Division, (1967-68), Syracuse, New York resident, testifies to a major ordering unit "to kill everything in sight" on search and destroy mission in Quang Ngai province (April-June 1967) resulting in several killed villagers and the burning of the village of Ouc Pho. He further testifies to H S I fire, all night and day, in areas where civilians were known to be (Quang Ngai), resulting in wounded civilians.

KENNETH J. CAMPBELL, 21, Cpl. E-4, ield artillery observer, 1/11th, 1st Marine Division, scout, 1/1st, 1st Marine Division, [1968-69], Philadelphia, Pa. resident, testifies to artillery fire called on undefended villages, including one incident of the shelling of villagers fleeing back into the village of Phu Loc 9, northeast of An Hoa, [Jan. 1969]. Several villagers were observed to be hit by initial artillery barrage. He further testifies to the mistreatment of prisoners, blowing up of bodies with explosives, wounding and killing unarmed civilians, and other "incidents" resulting from U.S.M.C. training - "we were to shoot first and ask questions later," and that "we weren't to 'sweat it' too much if we shot someone without a weapon because they were only 'gooks' anyway."

WITT McCUSKER; 29, Sgt. E-5, let Marines, infantryman-reporter, Portland, Oregon resident will testify in detail about the systematic killing of residents of two villages 5 miles west of Tam Ky (approximately 50 deaths) by members of 1/5th Marine Regiment, let Marine Division. Three U.S. Majors present made no ettempt to restrain the troops. McCUSKER also witnessed interrogation of Vietnamese by U.S. forces in which field telephones and jeep batteries were used to induce shocks; police dogs were also set upon some suspects biting them. He also witnessed open tranches that had been dug next to the prison compound near Binh Son. He later saw them after they had been filled in like graves. A U.S. advisor at the site told him that the tranches were filled with prisoners, most of whom were shot "because if released, they'd become Vict Cong again." On many occasions, McCUSKER saw villages which were occupied by civilians levelled by high-explosives, napalm, and mortar fire whenever a few sniper shots were received.

KEVIN PAUL DELAY, 20, Cpl., H & S Co., 3rd Bn., 1st Marines, 1st Marine Division, (Oct. 1969-Mar 1970), student, Takoma Park, Maryland resident testifies on Dec. 24, 1969, just before midnight, a squad of Marines from I Co., 3rd Bn., 1st Marine Reg., 1st Marine Division ambushed a group of Vietnamese killing 25. One weapon, a 9mm pistol, was found (area between Hill 37 and Charlis Ridge, near DaNang). DELAY states that the next day a Major, Battalion XO, collected a souvenir weapon from an individual Marine, had it smeared with mud and sent to Regiment with "body count" to make it seem like a heavily armed force.

Ourney Nam province being burned and caches being found. Live is a destroyed to Facilitate the earch of a burker. While "grunt" unit he took part in an accompany size incursion to North Vietnem for recon. The earth in several KB and usually stayed 48 hours. It was sur to recon by fire. LEFFLER also states a battalion policy of levelling any village where one shot was taken. OS granades (M-79) were used to flush bunkers and harross civilians. While a LAMP, LEFFLER was under orders never to take more than 2 prisoners, and to kill all the rest. Medical treatment was to keep the suspect alive for questioning, not to enable him to recover.

DAVID BLACK, 21, Cpl. E-4, tank crewman, 1st Armor 1st Mar. AMTKS (Sept 1968-June 69), 3rd AMTKS (June 69-Aug 69), I Corps, student, Detroit, Michigan resident testifies he saw several villagers killed through accidents of sighting on AMTHACK. He states in July 1969 on Gan Noi Island, 12 miles SE of DaNang the 1-1 or 1-2 Marines, after losing S KIAs by boobytraps, forcibly removed at least 30 villagers (men, women and children) and made them walk point to set off booby traps. Also, on that operation BLACK saw a Marine Interrogator beating an NVA prisoner and holding his head under water to make him talk.

CHRISTOPHER R. SIMPSON, 21, Cpl., 2/5th Let Marine Division, (1967-68), Minneola, N.Y. resident testifies to his unit not taking prisoners and rejecting Chieu Hoi passes. He testifies to seeing a prisoner having both legs broken, then stabbed and left in a rice paddy to die. He also states that GIs in his unit beat old men and women.

LEWIS N. DEFELICE, 21, LCpl., 3rd 8n., 11th Marines, 1st Marine Division, (1968-69), Ardmore, Pa. resident testifies that on hill 65, 15 miles west of Quang Nam, OPs were ordered to shoot any person who approached the perimeter. When asked if this meant children also, the reply was yes. He states another instance which happened in May 1968 in Quang Nam province when "G" Battery 3/11 fired 90 rounds of V.T. fused H.E. into a village suspected of harboring NVA soldiers. The civilians were not forewarned.

DAVIO BISHOP, 21, LCpl., 2nd En., 5th Marines, let Morine Division, Detroit, Michigan resident testifies to numerous killings of VC suspects and VC prisoners. He witnessed turning over to ROKs of four VC nurses who were tortured and killed by them.

PAUL DLIMPIERI, 23,-Cpl.E-4, let Battalion, 5th Marines, let Marine Division, a Fairfield, Conn. resident, testifies to the burning of a village, destruction of crops and animals, and the killing of a villager who was 70 years old. CLIMPIERI testifies to seeing 3 prisoners shot after one of them began to run. His unit worked generally in the Que Son Valley area.

OYD, 24, 1Lt., VKA 803, (Mar Attack), MAG-12, 1st Air Wing, Squadron Pilot, (1968) Arlington, Toxas resident has testimony relating to faul body counts, secondary explosions, and free-fire cones.

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GEORGE C. CARROLL, JR., 22, Cpl. E-4, MARG-16/MAG-16, 1st Marine Air Wing, [1968-69], Philadelphia, Pa. resident testifies to unnecessary harrassment of VC suspects by ARVN officer alledgedly to impress American GIs," (near OsNang, in 1969).

JDE BANCERT, 22, Sgt. E-5, helicopter gunner, VMO-6, PMAG-39, lst Marine Air Wing, [1968-69], Philadelphia, Pa. resident testifies: to the disembowlment and skinning of Vietnamese women in Quang Tri (Trieu Phong District, Ba Ben village) by an American, after she was killed by ARVNs. Body was hung on a tree as a "warning" to other "gooks". He further testifies to killing villagers - 20 or more women, children, old men in helicopter assaults near Cam Lo, and of civilians shot without provocation along Highway 1 near Dong Ha in Oct. 1969. He qualified as a helicopter gunner by shooting elephants in Laos in April 1969. In Quang Tri province, he observed 20 deformed babies from "agent orar" defoliant spray.

TED ECKERT, 21, Sgt. E-5, flight engineer, MAS-16, 1st Marine Air Wing, (1969-70), Annandale, Virginia resident testifies to shooting of an old Vietnamese woman by Marine security guards in Quang Tri province in Feb. 1970. He further testifies to "recon by fire" throughout I Corps, on orders of commanding general 1st MAW, and of a prisoner thrown from a helicopter.

III MAF CONTINUED - MISCELLANEOUS

NDAMAN KIGER, 22, Cpl., 7th Comm Bn., III MAF, (1969-69), Mt. Ranier, Maryland resident testifies to a SSgt in charge test firing claymore mines into the village of Tuy Loan for "cheap thrills" at observation post BEAR. At OP Panther in Tuy Loan they were ordered to throw grenades outside parimeter to "scare off" possible sappers. This was an inhabited area (Quang Nam province).

JOHN ADRIAN KILBY, 20, LCpl., E-3, lst Battalion, 26th Marines, 5th Marine Division, Gainesville, Florida resident, testifies to the destruction of an entire village and livestock in March 1969 near Hill 190, "I" Corps area. Also in March 1969 he crossed into North Vietnam on recon with the 26th Marines three times. KILBY will also testify that the mistreatment of POWs was expected and condoned by the officers of his unit.

MORGAN, 23, SP/5 (E-5), Co., "C", 228th AVN Battalion, ls Air av., and 1/9 Air Cav., lst A Cav., [1985-87], Philadelphia, Pa. resident, testifies to thing a Viet Cong prisoner in Tam Ky tied to a stake and wramped in barbed wire, then harrassed by men with bayonets and urinated on by others. He also testifies to the death of a Vietnamese truck driver due indirectly to harrassment by helicopter crew members.

DON SPACEHNLE, 22, SP/4, medic, lat Air Cav., (1967-68), Philadelphia, Pa. resident, testifies to the water torture of a "VC suspect" in Feb. 1968 on the beach of the South China Sea in I Corps. The tortura was conducted by AVN national police.

MIKE BRENT, 23, SP/5, armored recon specialist, 7th Sqdr., 1st Air Cav., (1968-69), Madison, Wisconsin resident, testifies to the killing of 50 Cambodian villagers in June 1968 on operation in Cambodia, which the unit denied carrying out. He further testifies to the U.S. military paying mercenaries [Nungs] for heads, ears and livers of VC.

JERRY KLEIN, 27, Sgt. (E-5), infantryman, 2/8 Cav., 1st Air Cav., (1967-68), Long Island, N.Y. sident testifies to a village on Bong Son plain, north of LZ Twobits, destroyed by artillery fire called in response to sniper, in Feb. 1968. He further testifies to rice destruction in Bong Son plain during search and destroy operations.

MICHAEL R. CAPUTO, 22, SP/4 (E-4), infantryman, 2/8 1st Air Cav. and 2/16 1st Inf. Div., (1969-70), Levittown, Ps. resident testifies to the killing of civilians -"supposed VC sympathizers without weapons shot outside Ben Cat village (Binh Owong Province) during condor"- in July-August 1969. He further testifies to search mission in Cambodia in March 1970 ordered by a Colone).

JAMES DUFFY, 23, SP/5 (E-5), 228th AVN Battalion, let Air Cav., (1967-68), helicopter gunner, Bronx, N.Y. resident testifies to the use of defoliants dropped along An Lo Valley by CH-47's. The says it was common to drop gas into villages for "kicks". DUFFY states that helicopters played games with civilians by blowing them over using the prop wash, (in one case killing a small boy), blowing away their rice crops and houses. He testifies to the mistreatment of POMs by kicking, hitting them with rifles, and pistol whipping. DUFFY testifies to giving hydrolic fluid to village kids with the logic that "the only good gook is a dead gook."

GAIL GRAHAM, 23, SP/4 (E-4), door-gunner(helicopter), 229th Eviation Unit, 1st Air Cav., Jamestown, N.Y. resident testifies to witnessing 6 helicopters attack a hamlet after flight leader (Captain) said over radio: "Screw it, blow them all away!" Between 15 and 20 thatched huts were destroyed. No reason was given. This occurred north of Camp Evans (I Corps) in June 1968. GRAHAM witnessed door-gunners on medevac helicopters harrass and alap wounded enemy soldiers as they were flown to medical station. He testifies to regularly flying on "snatch missions", persons were rounded up, threatened and hit with rifle butts while their papers were checked. Many Vietnamese were flown back to U.S. HQ for further questioning. In Dec. 1968 GRAHAM saw a "Hot Pit" at Lending Zone Rite - a 3 foot hole covered with a poncho. Prisoners were placed in the hole and left in the sun until they talked. On 3 separate trips, GRAHAM flew with unit into Laos, the first time in May 1968 from Phu Bai. On these flights, as many as 12 Green Berets were ferried in Laos where they were left for reconnaissance work. Before each trip. all insignia and markings were removed from craft and men. Fe also testifies to helicopter assaults in which extensive CS gas was dropped in area before GIs entered.

BCS CONNELY, 22, SP/4 (E-4), 2/3, let Air bay., Intercrymen, From borg, N.Y. resident testifies to Timessing the killing of NVA soldiers who were wounded ind/or surrendering by U.S. troops (May 1989, LZ Conolym, III pres) & CONNELY states that the regulary mutilated enemy pubes. Let Air Cay. patch was carved into bodies or a patch was applied with sticks jabbed into the body. Officers were often present and no attempt was made to restrain the men. When in Spec camp, the PX would issue men extra patches for just this purpose. One accession he heard on the radio that Psywor helicopter had spotted 15 Viet Cong who were surrendering. The helicopter couldn't land, so a gun-ship was called in and all were killed. (Aug 1969). In March 1970, CONNELY read the same account in the division's HQ Journal. In Aug. 1969 CONNELY testifies, two platoons were sent into Cambodia for a 10-14 day period. Nightly artillery support was provided from LZ Becky (Fish Hook area). Later, he saw that map coordinates had been changed at HQ to conceal the fact that troops were in Cambodia.

JAMES MACKAY, 20, Sgt. [E-5], Teletype-Radio Chief, HHQ 3rd Bde., 9th Div., (Oct. 1968-Aug. 1969), and A Trp., 1/9 Cav., lst Air Cav., (Aug 1970-Dec. 1970), student, New Hudson, Michigan, testifies that in Long An provice (near Can Giono) **aro**und the second week in Feb. 1968 he ob. ved the burning of a village (from a copter). He states that H and I fires were complete every day into free fire zones which were known to include civilians. As commo chief, MACKAY correlated reports from field. Sqdn SOP was to recon by fire every hootch or stack of crops with rockets, miniguns, and grenade cannons, also anyone who ran with or without military equipment. Men women and children were included in body count. "A" troop 1/9 Cav was not getting confirmed body counts so major (CO) let it be known that next KIAs would be dropped at Bds TOC. They were dropped from a helicopter hovering at 100 feet above the TOC. There were no repercuseions toward this officer. Also, MACKAY states that many times explosives were deliberately thrown into the landfill (garbage dump) where fires burned continuously in hopes of blowing away some of the kids who dug around in it. A good friend was burned in such an incident.

ROBERT WITORSKI, 22, SP/4, rifleman, C Co., 2/12 1st Air Cav., (1968-69), Detroit, Michigan resident testifies to receiving an order (June 1968) from company commander which had been passed down by Bn. commander that said "no prisoners taken, kill all wounded". WITORSKI states that at Cu Chi base camp at a chow line in Jan. 1969, the CO came along and told men to spread out. When they didn't the CO fragged the line hitting one man. He testifies to seeing NVA being pushed from a chopper at LZ Grant near Nui 8s Den in III Corps in April.

*insert in testimony of BOB CONNELY - CONNELY testifies that at least 50% of wounded POWs were killed by GIs.

DAMSON, 24, Pvt., Tonk Cro., n, 3rd Tank Bn., 3rd Marine exvision, [1966-37], Springlaks, Arkt. resident testifies to killing of five civilians by tank fire January and February 1967 on "Operation Newcostle" and "Dixie". On "Operation Hickory" in May 1967 DAMSON participated in a search and destroy mission in the DMZ, ordered by his On. commander. Further, he testifies to destruction of entire village in Nov. 1866 by tanks running over huts; of PO's being transported on tanks in such a way as to harm or kill them (heads placed in gun barrel so that if tank hit bump, it might break PO's neck, heads placed at exit of exhaust on tracks), and of river craft being fired upon by tanks near Kill 67, Dai Loc.

JONATHAN SIECH, 24, Cpl. (E-4), "B" Co., 3rd Shore Party Sn., 4th Marine Regiment, 3rd Marine Division, [1965-66], Philadelphia, Pa. resident testifies to the relocation of Vietnamese fishermen by Americans in Chu Lai on the northern edge of the shore on Dang Guat Say to unfertile land, forcing them into ferming and giving them no choice as to where they were going, (May-Aug. 1965) by Seg. CD orders.

STEVE ROSE, 26, E-5, Corpsman, I in., 4th Marine Reg., 3rd Marine Division, (1966-67), Queens M.Y., resident testifies to seing throwing of wounded civilian out of airborne ABVN helicopter in July 1967. He further testifies to witnessing enemy ears being prepared in Phu Cai (Thua Thien province) for shipment to the United States.

BILL HATTON, 23, Cpl. (E-4), security guard, 3rd Marine Div., (1968-69), Sagley, Minn. resident testifies to stoning to death of Vietnemese child by 20 Marines near Dong Ha Samp in Dec. 1968. He witnessed the owing of Coretion cases at Vietnamese from roway throcks [45 mph] in March 1969, and of "cookies" filled with heat tabs thrown to Vietnamese children as "candy". He further testifies to "mad minute" firing in evenings at LZ Stud, all summer of 1989(in Quang Tri Province).

JOHN A. TRUITT, 21, Cpl. (E-4), combat engineer, 3rd Engineers, 1st Battalion, 3rd Marine Division, (1967-58), Levittown, Pa. resident testifies to the skinning of a dead NVA soldier near Cua Viet (Quang Tri Province) by a Marine tank crew. On "Operation Lancaster II" r nonth later, he witnessed the killing of up to 30 enemy soldiers, some trying to surrender, others unarmed and "just sitting in their huts...very harmless". TRUITT contends that "we had been told not to take any prisoners." He further testifies to an operation in North Vietnam ordered by his Battalion commander for the purpose of destroying and blocking roads.

VAUGHN E. AESCHLEMAN, 23, LCpl. (E-3), Field 8TO, 3rd Battalion, 3rd Marine Reg., 3rd Marine Div., (1967-68), Hays, Kansas testifies to VC suspects being beaten to death with bamboo in March 1967 at Calu in the province of Quang Tri by an ARVN sergeant. He testifies to throwing C-rations at civilians from passing trucks and the burning of villages on Operations Prairie II, III, IV in 1967-1958.

DAVIO J. FORTIN, 20, [E-4], H & S 3rd Med. Batt., 3rd Marine Division, Detroit, Michigan resident, testifies to the treatment of POMs in American medical hospitals in Vietnam. He testifies to an operation performed on a prisoner by an unqualified naval corpsman rather than a doctor. The operation was performed under unsterile conditions. FORTIN will also testify to the general harrassment of prisoners.

CMC1876 FIGH D. JOACES, CD., LOST. (J-3), W Up., P On., Sth Fringeg., 3nd Marine Dirision, (Y 19-60), New York, N.Y. City s to crossing into Laps on 3, Ach and destroy missions during Operation Dewey Conyon in Februar 1969. 39ANES testifies to the hormozoment of PCM at Maire point on April 21, 1888 near Mothers Ridge 2 Ks south of SHZ, in Quang Tri province.

GORDON P. STEMART, 23, Sgt (5-5), Nortan F.O., 2 8m., 9th Mar. Reg., 3rd Marine Division, (Sept 1968-Aug 69), student, Rayolk, Michigan testifies that on or about March to April 1969 he took part in search and destroy operations. In one village, 6 or 7 hooches and a field were burned. In two other cases he personally called ".P. on villages of approximately 20 huts; total destruction. The reason given was to deny VC shelter. STEMART also testifies to the nature of Operation Dewey Canyon in January 1969. He states that the operation took place in Laos about 10K over the border and that almost entire 9th Marine Mag. was involved. Herey casualties were taken but no "copters" were used because of the clandestine nature of the operation so the KIAs and wounded were carried back. (about 6 days in Laos).

ROWERT D. CLARK, 22, [2-3], H & C f. and "G" Co., 2 Bn., 9th Marine Reg., 3rd Marine Division, (May 1969-May 1970), Philadelphia, Pa. resident testifies he was on search and destroy mission in Laos (by accident) on July 5, 1959. Also he states that on FSB Tiseman, June 31, 1969, following an all night firefight (at approximately 0530 hours) 3 wounded prisoners were denied medical aid and tortured until they died. All this happened in full view of all company officers.

PAUL C. HASSLER, J3., 20, E-2, rifleman, K Co., 3rd Bn., Sth Marines, 3rd Marine Division, (March 1969-Aug 1969), student, New Castle, Delaware, testifies on approximately Feb. 25, 1969 his platoon entered Laos, on a search and destroy operation, as part of Operation Dewey Canyon. Also HASSLER witnessed the mutilation of NVA dead around Khe Sanh. Officers ordered the bodies blown up. He states that he and his squad were ordered to chop down grass in a marked mine field, saw Marines wound themselves to escape the brutality, and also had one of his commanding officers killed by Marines for his neglect of his troops and his brutal and bloodthirsty attitude toward combat.

DALE SHANER, 23, 3gt (E-5), 2/3, 1/9, 3/3, 3rd Marine Div., (1968-1988), Great Bend, Kansas resident testifies to the burning of approximately 20 villages in the I Corps area, stated reason for burning - "to deny VC shelter." He testifies members of the lst AmTracks, 3rd Marine Division tied bodies to the rear of the AmTracks and riding bodies back to rear. On Operation Prairie II, eight people were captured. An ARVN Sgt. shot 3 women before he was stopped. SHANER was reprimended by his platoon officer for interfering with the ARVN Sgt. He also testifies to the beating of civilians and brutalizing of bodies by cutting off heads and ears.

DAVID HARPER, 21, E-3, D Co., 1 Dn., 4Reg., 3rd Marine Division, machine gunner, (March 1969-Oct. 1969), testifies to his unit crossing into beautiful first tube (enemy) after a fire fight on Firebase Argon.

A. H. ALCOTT, 24, Cpl. [3-4], N Co. 3 On., Sth Merine Reg., 3 One Div., [Aug 1986-Sept 1997] Cranford, N.J., testifies that N witnessed search and destroy vissions in the Gio Linh, Con Thien area. The same area was almost ninhabitable due to constant H G I fires. He states that his unit used M-79 and canisters of cs to move civilians (Sio Linh - April 1967). ALCOTT further states that he saw in the Narble Mountain area, prisoners (2 or 3 at a time) taken up in Army chappers under direction of ARVN officers to approximately 300 feet and forcably ejected from chappers presumably to intimidate the remaining prisoners. (ALCOTT was T.A.J. to 1st Track Co., 1st Marine Div. when this incident took place.)

JOHN GEYMANN, 23, Cpl. (E-4), "M" Co., 3/3 Marines, 3rd Marine Div., (1965), St. Clair Michigan resident testifies to the general harrassment of civilians by GIs, "hile on the U.S.S. Repose GEYMANN states that the ship's crew had great hatred for the Vietnamese. Many Vietnamese kids were on board for treatment and when there were movies shown the kids talked because they could not understand english. He witnessed many instances of the men hitting the children on their wounds and other places. He states that Marines made C-4 (plastic explosive) cookies and gave them _ - shildren. The kids got extremely sick. He mentions throwing C-rations into a rice paddy and when the civilians ran to them, dropping a granada in their midst. He testifies to 3 GTs raping a 16 year old girl outside of Cam Lo on Highway 9 in July 1969, GEYMANN saw the mutilated bodies of Vietnamese hanging from the barbed wire at the main gate at Quang Tri. They were left there for one day as a warning.

PAUL MILLIAMS, 24, ECpl. (E-3), A Dattery, 1st Mattalion, 12th Marine Degiment, 3rd Marine Div., Fayetteville, Ark, resident testifies to the destination of crops and animals, especially the shooting of water buffaln for sport. States that in Quang Nam province in April 1967 while moving down the side of a mountain the headquarters pletoon came upon an unarmed civilian near a hay stack. The CO of "D" Co. 1/3 Marines ordered him shot. "ILLIAMS testifies to ARVNs beating a prisoner with rifle butts near Bon Son, south of Chu Lai in July or August 1966. American officers present made no objection. He states the attitude toward civilians was openly hostile ofter times resulting in GIs throwing rocks and bottles at them.

LANCE S. MACNAIR, 22, Sgt. (E~5), Gravo Company, 1/9, 3rd Marine Division, (1968-69), Lans Downe, Pa. resident testifies to the killing of approximately 20 NVA prisoners after his company had taken heavy casualties. Four choppers came in on emergency extraction. There was a believed NVA company coming up the hill so all the prisoners were ordered killed and they were pulled out. He also testifies to having gone into Cambodia on a patrol in Nov. 1968.

-Persons of various political and religious forces and tendencies standing for peace, independence, neutrality and democracy including those who, for political reasons, have to live abroad.

The provisional coalition government will implement the agreements reached by the parties.

The provisional coalition government will carry out a policy of national concord, ensure the democratic freedoms of the people, prohibit all acts of terror, reprisal and discrimination against those who have collaborated with either of side, stabilize and improve the living conditions of the people and organize general elections to form a coalition government.

The provisional coalition government will pursus a foreign policy of peace and neutrality, practice a policy of good neighborhood with the Kingdom of Laos and the Kingdom of Cambodia, respect the sovereignty, independence, neutrality and territorial integrity of these two countries; it will establish diplomatic relations with all countries regardless of their political regime, including the United States, in accordance with the five principles of peaceful coexistence.

- 6. Vietnam is one, the Vietnamese people are one, the reunification of Vietnam will be achieved step by step, by peaceful means, on the besis of discussions and agreements between the two zones, without opercion or annexation from either side, without foreign interference. The time for reunification as well as all questions relating to the reunification will be discussed and agreed upon by both zones. Pending the peaceful reunification of the country, the two zones will reestablish normal relations in all fields on the basis of equality and mutual respect, and will respect each other's political regime, internal and external policies.
- 7. The parties will decide together measures aimed at ensuring the respect and the correct implementation of the provisions agreed upon.
- B. After the agreement on and signing of accords aimed at putting an end to the war and restoring peace in Vietnam, the parties will implement the methods that will have been laid down for a cease-fire in South Vietnam.

To attain a peaceful settlement of the Vietnam problem, the Provisional Revolutionary Government of the Republic of South Vietnam declares its readiness to get in touch with the forces or persons of various political tendencies and religions in the country and abroad, including members of the present Saigon Administration, except Thieu, Ky, and Khiem.

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of U.S. atrocities in View

A three-day mock trial of U.S. leaders accused of ordering war crimes against Victnamese civilians opened in Detroit yesterday with 35 young men testilying about atrocities they claim to have committed and witnessed in Vietnam.

The men, who said they served with the 1st and 3rd Marine Divisions and the 1st Air. Cavalry, told shocking stories of murder and torture of prisoners of war and innocent civilians.

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Included in the testimony were grisly charges of women and children tortured about the genitals, deformed babies resulting from indiscriminate use of chemical defoliants, and prisoners being dumped from helicopters to their deaths.

THE HEARING, dubbed the "Winter Soldier Investigation." is being held at the Howard Johnson New Center Motor Lodge under the auspices of "Vietnam Veterans Against the War," a peace group claiming 2,000 members throughout the country.

The group is supported by a number of New Left celebrities, including author-lawyer Mark Lane, actress Jane Fonda and comedian Dick Greenry

Gregory.

Although many of those testifying have not been confirmed as veterans by the Defense Department, all of yesterday's witnesses offered copies of what they said were their separation

papers for examination by newsmen.
"Winter Soldier" is an allusion to the writings of Revolutionary War pamphleteer Thomas Paine, who wrote disparagingly of "the summer soldier and sunshine patriot who in this crisis shrinks from the service of his country."

Leaders of the group contend that the My Lai massacre of March, 1968, was only one of many such crimes against civilians ordered as the result of national policy.

JAN CRUMB, president of Veterans Against the War, asserted that 1st Lt. William Calley Jr., who is on trial for his life on charges that he murdered 102 civilians at My Lai, is merely a "scapegoat."

"We intend to prove that war crimes in Vietnam did not start or end with My Lai." said of Crumb, a member of the West Point class of

Crumb charged that "war crimes" were responsible for the deaths of one million South Vietnamese and that "it is America now, not Hiller's Germany that stands bloody-handed before the world in Vietnam."

One of the first to testify yesterday was Kevin P. Delay, 20, of Takoma Park, Md, identified as a former corporal in the 1st Brigade, 1st Marine Division.

Delay said that on Christmas Eve, 1969, when an allied truce was in effect, one of the

A DETROITER, David Bishop, 21, identified as a member of the 5th Marines, 1st Division, testilied he saw numerous killings of persons suspected of being Viet Cong.

Bishop said he witnessed U.S. troops turn four Vist Cong nurses over to Korean troops, who later tortured and killed them.

Kenneth J. Campbell. 21, identified as a former corporal from Philadelphia, charged that Marine boot camp training taught "all Vietnamese are gooks, interior to us."

namese are gooks, interior to us."

Campbell said he witnessed artillery fire called on several undefended villages while he was in Vietnam from 1968 to 1989.

Scott Camil, identified as a former Marine sergeant, told of men in his unit cutting the hands off slafe enemy soldiers.

He said they had orders to stop such practices when newsmen were present.

Joe Bangert, 22, who said he was a former helicopter gunner from Philadelphia, testified he witnessed an American soldier disembowel and skin a Vietnamese woman near Quang Tri in 1969.

"The men were alraid to complain about such atrocities because those who complained were subject to harsh discipline by company commanders," Bangert said.

OTHERS TESTIFYING told of seeing pris-


orliers Testifying told of seeing prisoners murdered and tortured, rapes and other sexual abuse of women and the shooting of viet Cong who were attempting to surrender under the South Vietnamese government's amnesty program.

One said he witnessed several occasions on which U.S. intelligence personnel interrogated Viet Cong suspects by attaching electric wires from field telephones and jeto batteries to their genitals to induce shock.

He said officers ordered marines in shoot all suspects because "if we release them, they if just become Viet Cong again."

Several of the men said some regiments were under orders to kill civilians according to a daily quota that was used to initiate body counts.

"If a corpse had no weapon it was a VC suspect, if a weapon could be planted on it it was a VC and if it had a weapon to begin with

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

A source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised that the WSI held their second day's conference on February 1, 1971, at he Howard Johnson New Center Motor Inn, Detroit, Michigan. The testimony continued with former veterans of the Vietnam war testifying to the atrocities and war crimes committed by U. S. servicemen in Indo-China.

Source advised that the ballroom where the conference was held holds approximately 800 people and throughout the day averaged from one-half to two-thirds filled. The crowd was a young crowd, averaging in the high school and college age group. One thing that was quite evident was that very few Negroes were in attendance. Also one thing that was evident was the very few black former servicemen that testified during the conference.

Source stated that Jane Fonda, one of the sponsors of the WSI, was overheard to remark that a film was being made of this conference by an independent film producer and will be available later on to all who would want it at a cost of \$300 per film. The film can be used for any purpose as it will be the property of the buyer.

This source stated that the session ended around 10:30 PM. At the end of the conference an unnamed person came to the microphone to make an announcement. This person said that the Vietnam Veterans Against the War (VVAW) had just finished holding a conference and had a proclamation

to make. He said that if the Vietnam troops that are massing to make a strike into Land no into Laos with U. S. aid, the VVAW will attempt to the things down in the U. S. GI's fortured Reds, tnesses tell war trial

By STEPHEN DOBYNS News Staff Writer

Sensational accounts of U.S. treatment of Victnamese prisoners were offered yesterday during a 21/2-hour panel discussion as part of the three-day Winter Soldier Investigation.

In contrast, two Americans said they were treated humane by their North Vietnamese captors.

The investigation was sponsored by anti-war veterans who charge the United States with committing wholesale atrocities in Vietnam. Those who testified said they could back up

everything they described.
"I didn't see any humane treatment of enemy prisoners," said Steve Noctzel, 30, of Long Island, "and whenever I saw prisoners

they were being mistreated or tortured."
Noetzel said he was in Vietnam from June. 1963, to May, 1954, serving on a psychological warfare team with the 5th Special Forces.

HE DESCRIBED one incident, in which he said 12 prisoners were thrown to their death from helicopters taking them to Saigon.

"I asked a door gunner what had happened to the prisoners," he said. "He told me the South Victnamese soldiers had pushed them out over the Moleon Doles." out over the Mekong Delta."

Noetzel and others said they had seen enemy soldiers and civilians tortured into answering questions by having electric wires attached to

their genitals.
"They were told it was a lie detector," Noetzel said, "and everytime they 'lied' they were given a severe shock."

"We used a 12-volt jeep battery for electric torture," said Jon Drolshagen. "The prisoners were brought to us by the South Victnamese. If

person died under torture he was listed as a Viet Cong on the body count."

DROLSHAGEN SAID he had been a first lieutenant with the 1st Brigade we 25th Division in Tay Nin Province. He shad spent seven months as a platoon liver and five months as an interrogator between November, 1966, and November, 1967.

He said prisoners were often mutilated with a knile to make them talk. "We had to kill them afterwards because we couldn't turn them into medical aid in that condition," he

A major and the Military Police were present at the interrogations, Drolshagen said. He said no one made any attempt to stop the torture, although the MP's were there under the pretense of making sure the rules of the Geneva Convention were not violated.

Donald Dzagalones, a military intelligence interrogator attached to the 11th Brigade of the Americal Division, described torturing woman and children, threatening women with rape, setting one woman on fire, and witnessing five old women beaten by a sergeant.

"But the electric torture was the most popular," he said, "and the MP's instead of intervening were the most sadistic and often conducted the torture themselves.

"The Vietnamese were thought of as less than human, so we were told that whatever we did was all right."

IN CONTRAST to this were statements of two ex-GI's captured by the North Vietnamese.

George Smith, of Cumberland, W Va., said he was captured Nov. 23, 1903, when his Special Forces camp was overrun 30 miles from Saigon.

"I was sure I was going to be shot because we'd been told at Fort Bracg that they didn't take prisoners;" he said. "But they patted us and reassured us that everything would be all right

right.
"I was never physically abused during the two years I was a prisoner and usually there was more food than I could eat."

He said he was never interrogated, although the North Vietnamese tried to persuade him to accept their point of view.

He said the only harassment he received was after he was released. For more than five months he was kept on Okinawa under guard.

"I was told never to tell anyone I had received Red Cross parcels in the jungle. I-received them, plus mail, so did the others," he

He said the North Vietnamese released him in November. 1965, "because of the new peace movement in the United States."

DR. MARJORIE NELSON, a master's degree candidate in public health at Yale University, said she was captured in Hue during the Tet offensive in January, 1968.

Dr. Nelson said, "They (North Victnamese) made sure our privacy was protected and took special precautions that we wouldn't be mistreeted.

treated.
"I talked to 25 American soldiers there. All said they hadn't been mistreated, although they said they'd been handled roughly when taken in the heat of battle,"

When Dr. Nelson came down with dysentery, a doctor was brought in to cure her. She was released as a noncombatant six weeks after her capture.



Among those testifying were:

• Ernest Shearin, 24, of Crested Butte, Colo., identified as a member of the 5th Special Forces, who testified to shooting prisoners de-

scribed as "extra baggage."

Shearin, who said he was a staff sergeant in Victnam in 1938-69, also said he saw prisoners thrown to their deaths from helicopters and members of a 1st Air Cavalry unit impaling the heads of dead Victnamese on stakes as a warning to others.

6 Donald C. Donner, 24, of Fayetteville, Ark., identified as a combat engineer in Vietnam in 1967-68, who testified that his unit shot livestock including prized water buffalo as sport.

o Dennis Caldwell, 24, of Ypsilanti, identified as a chief warrant officer with the 1st Aviation Brigade, who said it was "standard operating procedure" to gun down all Victnamese who ran from belicopters.

But former Staff Sgt. George Smith, 32, a postal worker from New Cumberland, W. Va., and Dr. Marjorie Nelson of New Haven, Conn., said they received ahundant-if not a I ways palatable-food and prompt medical attention during the time they spent as prisoners of the Victoong.

Smith and Dr. Nelson were also joined in a special panel of prisoners of war by Mrs. Virginia Warner of Ypsilanti, the mother of James H. Warner, 30, a Marine pilot shot down over North Vietnam in Oct., 1967, and now a POW,

Mrs. Warner said she had heard recently from her son, was certain he was well, and declared that the only way he would come home safely would he to end the war immediately.


The Free Press confirmed with the Pentagon that both Smith and Dr. Nelson were prisoners of war.

About 40 witnesses testified

during Monday's hearings, which attracted a crowd of about 500 ers. Among them were minimizationney Mark Lane and actress Jane Fonda, sponsors of the hearings, and actor Donald Suther-Jand.

In addition to the testimony offered on POWs, including a

vivid and often gruesome accounting of torture techniques used by U.S. soldiers on enemy prisoners, a group of former Army and Marine soldiers testified about alleged U.S. activities ranging from secret missions into Cambodia



to the killing of Vietnamese civiljans.

The re was no immediate corroboration of any that testimony or a respective from the Pentagon.

In the POW panel, Smith described how his Special Forces base camp came under mortar attack in November, 1963, and he was captured by soldiers of the National Liberation Front (NLF), the political arm of the Vietcong.

Smith said he was released by the Victoring in November 1965. He said they told him they were releasing him and another prisoner in response to two American youths who immolated themselves to protest U.S. war policy.

SMITH'S records are officially classified by the Pentagon, which would only confirm that he was a POW and that he had been released in 1965.

He said during his time as a prisoner that his captors "never laid a hand on me, never abused me in any way." He said, however, that another prisoner in the compound with him was executed in retaliation for similar executions in Saigon of Victoring prisoners.

SMITH SAID when he returned to a U.S. Army base, he was surprised to learn that he had been charged with aiding and abetting the enemy. The Pentagon would not confirm whether Smith was charged.

He said he accepted a general discharge — which is below an honorable discharge — in lieu of a lengthy court martial proceeding.

Smith said he was angered by the charge against him because he had aided another prisoner in escaping the compound where they were held. Smith said he remained behind specifically to cover for the other man, so he could get a head start on the guards.

Smith said that man, Issae Camacho, was later personally decorated by President Johnson as the first American soldier to escape a Victong prisoner compound. The Pentagon confirmed this and added that Camacho also received a direct commission from sergeant to captain and is now stationed in Fort Bragg, N.C.

The Pentagon refused to say whether Smith had aided Camacho In his escape. CONTONIAL

Dr. Nelson said she was working with the American Friends Service Committee in Hue when she was ca, red during the communist tet offensive in February, 1968.

She said she was held a prisoner for six weeks and was not abused or beaten like prisoners in American and South Vietnamese run camps where she worked later.

She said she is now studying public health at Yale University

Stephen Noctzel, 30, a former Green Beret who worked in the Mekong Delta, said he witnessed prisoners tortured by electrical shocks and snakes. The Free Press confirmed that Noctzel was a veteran and in Victnam between 1963 and 1964.

HE SAID that U.S. troops kept an eight-foot python at their compound near Can Tho South of Saigon, and prisoners reluctant to talk were placed overnight in a room with the snake.

He said the snake was not large enough to kill the prisoners, but "you could hear them screaming all night. In one instance, we had to gag the prisoners so their screams wouldn't keep everyone awake."

Other testimony offered Monday involved the burning of civilian villages by marines the indiscriminant killing of animals and livestock, and a nighttime bunship attack near Tan Am village on Feb., 1969, where many civilians reportedly were killed.

Horrors of War Reconted By 40 Veterans of Vietnam

More than 40 Victnam veterans recalled war stories Tuesday — ranging from unprovoked artillery attacks on Vietnamese villages to the censorship of military news — as a three-day panel of alleged American war crimes drew to a close.

More than 100 veterans have testified at the Winter Soldier Hearing since Sunday, and though they didn't describe any incidents on a scale of the alleged massacre at My Lai, much of their testimony was as gruesome.

THE HEARINGS already have resulted in a request from U. S. Rep. John Convers of Detroit and Sen. George McGovern of South Dakota that Congress make a formal inquiry into the alleged American war crimes.

Late Tuesday, the group sponsoring the

hearings also called for a nationwide strike of schools, industry and military facilities if South Vietnamese troops move into Laos. Recent reports indicate a massive buildup of troops on the border of Laos.

DURING Tuesday's testimony, former members of the Army's Americal, First, Fourth, and Ninth Infantry divisions testified along with five veterans who were public information officers or specialists in Vietnam.

There was no immediate corroboration of any of their testimony from other witnesses or from the Pentagon.

More than 600 persons jammed the secondfloor ballroom of the Howard Johnson New Center Motor Lodge—inluding one middleaged woman who showed up late Tuesday with an American flag.

SHE CLIMBED on the podium and accused the audience of being "communists." She was escorted from the speaker's stage.

Lames Weber, of Verona, Pa., a former member of the Americal Division, told Tuesday about an artillery attack he witnessed in late April or May, 1968, on a village near. Chu Lai, South Vietnam. Weber said an officer ordered the strike as a precautionary measure in case there were Vietcong in the village.

Weber said white phosphorous artillery rounds landed in the village. When several civilians began to run toward a tree line on the other side of a rice paddy, the artillery fire shifted toward them, Weber

HE SAID NAVY jets were called in and they puppered the area with bombs and rockets

When the Free Press interviewed Ron Palosaari of Detroit, who was in Weher's company, Palosaari said the attack troops uncovered a large arms cache in the village, which was apparently a Vietcong stronghold.

Palesaari showed photographs of the arms cache to the Free Press. He said some of the artillery rounds and air strikes did hit the village "because we could see people running around and trying to drag away bodies."

THE FREE PRESS also talked by phone to John R. Wilson of American Fork, Utah, who was a member of the unit with Palosaari and Weber.

Wilson, who said he had not heard of the Winter Soldier Hearing, said he recalled the incident, but said the artillery was called in because his unit had detected an enemy ambush just outside the village.

Wilson said the village itself was damaged very little. "When we went in, there were still eggs in baskets that had not even been broken." said Wilson:

Palosagri, however, said Wilson may have been referring to a similar incident a few days corffer in the same vicinity when artillery and air strikes were called in on an ambush site. IN OTHER testimony, Larry Rottmann, a former public information officer for the 25th Infantry, told of news distributed by the military being censored or distorted.

He said GIs handling military information are forbidden to discuss certain non-classified subjects, including M-16 rifle defects, the use of shotguns or flamethrowers or gas by U.S. troops and mistakes made by South Vietnamese troops.

Larry Craig, 29, of Chicago, who also served with the 25th Infantry Divison, described an incident in the spring of 1987. He said an officer reported 18 enemy killed and in reality only one enemy soldier was killed.

Craig said the officer ordered some men to dig up old graves discovered near the site of the incident and count them as enemy troops.

The Free Press confirmed with the Pentagon that Weber, Palosaari, Rottman and Craig were all Vietnam veterans.

Young Vets Oppose Viet War

Participate In Hearings

BY LEE WINFREY

Dissident veterans who participated in the Winter Soldier Investigation are seeking ways to extend their anti-war work beyond the hearings they held here this week.

One possibility is to try to expand a small organization called Vietnam Veterans against the War (VVAW) into a major group rivaling the American Legion and the Veterans of Foreign Wars.

THE VVAW, which presently claims 44 chapters nationwide and a mailing list of 5,000, was the organizing force behind the Winter Soldier hearings, on alleged American atrocities in Victnam. VVAW members believe that such existing veterans organizations as the Legion and the VFW ere too bawkish.

In their clothes and style—mostly long hair and jeans—and in their attitudes, the dissident vets seem closer to Peter Fonda than to John Wayne. But they believe that they should be listened to, nevertheless. As one of them. Tim Butz, 23, of Monroe Falls, O., said:

"I think we have the foundation here for a group that can stop the war. America has always identified with Johnnycomes-marching-home. Well, this time he's coming home with the peace sign and love beads and he's probably had dope experience over the e. We're not hippie freaks, "re vets. We're America."

The anti-war vets got a boost here this week; after more than 100 of them testified about alleged American war atrocities, when U. S. Rep. John Conyers of Detroit and Sen. George McGovern of South Dakota, both Democrats, called for a congressional investigation of their charges.

VVAW Executive Comander Jan B. Crumb, 28, of Brooklyn, said as the Winter Soldier hearings closed that his group was sending eight witnesses to Washington promptly to be ready for any eventuality, and that the VVAW would furnish as many witnesses as Congress wanted.

The anti-war vets took two main steps here to try to make themselves more believable and acceptable to the general public.

• They worked hard to convince skeptics that they are really veterans, and not just a bunch of footloose liars. They carried discharge papers or Vietnam travel orders with them and showed them on request. Most reporters who covered the hearings were convinced.

The y <u>attempted</u> to put some distance between themselves and two of the Winter Soldier sponsors, lawyer Mark Lane and actress Jane Fonda. Lane, who believes that the Central Intelligence Agency engineered the assassination of President John F. Kennedy, and Miss Fonda are both subjects of wide public disbelief.

Crumb conceded that his group was not comfortable in particular with Lane, but had little choice after other national figures such as ex-generals Telford Taylor and Matthew Ridgway declined to sponsor the hearings. The VVAW felt like it needed a nationally known name up front and Lane qualified.

MIDWAY through the hearings, the vets voted to allow no one but a Vietnam war veteran to make any statements on their behalf. Crumb would say only that this was done "to separate us from ecrtain people," but clearly he meant Lane, whose prominence steadily faded as the hearings advanced.

The future of the VVAW may well lie in Washington. If the dissident vets can get before Congress, and prove a sizable percentage of the charges they aired here, the older established veterans' organizations may have a brash new rivat.

Re: Winter Soldier Investigation (WSI)

A source, who has furnished reliable information in the past; advised on February 3, 1971, that the final session of the WSI was held on Feb 1ry 2, 1971, at the Howard Johnson New Center Motor Inn, Detroit, Michigan. The session began at approximately 10:00 AM and lasted until 7:30 PM. The crowd at the WSI varied during the day from 200 people to over 600 people, mainly students.

During the afternoon session, an elderly woman with white hair stood up and started walking toward the speaker's stand. She was waving a small U. S. flag and made a comment that everyone on the speaker's stand was a "Communist" for talking the way they were. She said, "My son is in Vietnam. You should speak with him if you want the truth." The speaker at the time answered by stating, "We will speak to him when he comes back." She was taken back to her seat, told she could wave the flag but not to cause a disturbance.

Source advised a reporter asked one of the speakers how much he was paid to come to Detroit and testify. He replied, "We are all volunteers and come to Detroit at our own expense."

Source said that it was again evident that very few blacks appeared at the WSI and during the third day's session he did not observe a black testifying while he was in the ballroom.

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At approximately 6:10 PM, a member of the Vietnam Veterans Against the War (VVAW) made an announcement that certain members of their group were leaving soon to have a meeting with their Vietnamese brothers in Windsor, Canada, which is just across the border from Detroit. He said all of those who are leaving should be there by 7:30 PM and the meeting is to be held in the United Auto Workers Local 444 meeting hall, which is located on Turner Road in Windsor. He said Jane Fonda has already left for the meeting.

A second source, who has rnished reliable information in the past, advised on February 4, 1971, that the meeting between the VVAW and the Vietnamese at UAW Local 444, Windsor, Canada, lasted from 7:30 PM to 9:30 PM with about 50 people in attendance. There were people there from Montreal, Quebec, and Windsor, Canada, as well as the U. S. participants. There were five Vietnamese at the conference but were all students from universities in Canada and were not those who had been denied visas by the Canadian government.

Reference is made to Detroit letterhead memorandum dated February 3, 1971, in which it was stated that the VVAW made a proclamation concerning troops going into Lacs.

The second source, referred to above, made available the proclamation in its entirety and is set out as follows:

"Several news organizations in the U. S. and Canada have announced the troops are massing on the Laotian border for an outright invasion of that country. Most of these news services have said that the troops are South Vietnamese, not American; however, we know the hypocrisy of letting Vietnamese die instead of Americans. We are certain that if the troops are massing on the border, the U. S. administration is responsible and we know that U. S. air power will cover the invasion with troops carrying helicopters and jet bombers.

"The countries in Southeast Asia that are involved have announced the validity of these reports. The Nixon administration maintains an ominous silence which in the words of one U. S. senator is tighter than any news blackout since World War II.


"We, as veterans of the war in Vietnam, give notice that if Laos is attacked, we will respond at once. We call for mass civil disobedience to take place all over this country. We call for industry to shut down. We call upon the students to close the schools. We all upon our brothers who are still in uniform to close the military bases throughout America and the world. We call upon the anti-war movement to shut down the major cities of America. We call for all Americans to close down America until the Nixon administration responds to the will of the people. Now, not March 1 or April 1 or May 1, is the time to act. If this be a threat, let us make the most of it. We will stand for no more deaths whether the victims be white or yellow or black. We are sick of murder. We are sick of war. We are sick of aggression. We are sick of lies. We are sick of genocide. We will no longer be pawns in these actions and we will no longer permit the rulers of this country to use us as we have been so badly used nor to use our brothers and sisters for these reprehensible adventures. We have been trained to fight. If need be we will use the knowledge we have gained against those who are seeking to extend this war.


"We especially call upon our black brothers and sisters, our Chicano, Asian and Indian brothers and sisters who have for so long been exploited in our country by the same system that sends their sons off to fight and die in foreign wars. We call upon them to support this action. Racism at home and racism against the peoples of the third world must end.

"We call upon our fellow Americans, those who have joined the anti-war movement and those who must now join to save our nation and our honor, to heal the risk that threatens



Mass protest urged if U.S. attacks Laos

By JOHN E. PETERSON News Staff Writer

A three-day "war crimes" hearing in Detroit has ended with nearly 100 Vietnam veterans urging A meric ans to engage in massive civil disobedience if Laos is invaded.

The veterans, who had given accounts of U.S. atrocities at the Winter Soldier Investigation, held a caucus late yesterday afternoon and issued a statement which read in part:

"If Laos is invaded... we call on industry to shut down, students to close schools, brothers in uniform to close military bases, citizens to shut down all major cities.

"If this be a threat, make the most of it. We are sick of war and aggression. We have been trained to kill and, if need be, we will use this knowledge against those secking to extend the war."

The statement was issued amid reports that South Vietnamese troops were invading Laos under cover of U.S. air power.

THE HEARING was sponsored by "Vietnam Voterans Against the War," a peace group claiming 2,900 members, and supported by such celebrities as author-lawyer Mark Lane, actress Jane Fonda and come diam Dick Gregory.

The veterans' allegations already have led 5 c n n tor George McGovern, South

Dakota Democrat, and Rep. John Conyers, Detroit Democrat, to call for a congressional investigation.

The McGovern-Convers demand was issued in Washington Monday in response to testimony by five ex-marines that U.S. troops had been committed to ground action in 1 aos as long ago as February, 1969

Yesterday, a former Green B-ret sergeam said U.S. incursions into Laos and Cambodia had taken place as early as August, 1968.

Ronald Podlaski, a patrol leader with the 5th Special Forces, said six-man patrols consisting of two Americans and four Chinese mercenaries regularly operated in Laos between August, 1968, and August, 1969.

Podlaski, 24, of Albertson, N.Y., said the missions were designed to gain intelligence about enemy troop movements down the Ho Chi Minh Trail.

PATROL MEMBERS were no dog tags or uniforms, carried foreign-made we a p o us and were warned they would be labeled deserters if they were captured, Podlaski said.

On one occasion, he said, his pairel ambushed a companysize North Vietnam-Pathet Loe unit under orders from American officers in Vietnam. He said a man believed to be a Lactian prince was killed in the ambush.

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On January 8, 1971, a confidential source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised he received the January, 1970, issue of the "VAW New World Newsletter," self-described as "an occasional publication of Veterans Against the War," which announced that veteran peace groups from Cleveland, Cincinnati, Dayton, and other Ohio cities are expected in Columbus Saturday, January 23, to organize a. Jhio Veterans Peace Coalition.

The issue also contained an announcement as follows: "Supreme Allied Potentate - BAL, PFC William Crandell has announced formation of the 1776 Brigade of the Buckeye Army of Liberation."

A second confidential source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, on January 25, 1971, advised that VAW sponsored a meeting January 23, 1971, at St. Stephen's Episcopal Church, 30 West Woodruff Avenue, Columbus, Ohio. The meeting began 1:00 pm and ended 5:00 pm. Thirty-seven persons were present, including representatives from Cleveland, Cincinnati, Dayton and Bowling Green, Ohio.

The second source said Terry Webber, Secretary, VAW, moderated the meeting and introduced William F. Crandell, described by source as a representative of the Winter Soldier Investigation, Detroit, Michigan.

Source said reports were made and plans for the future were announced. Gary Stieger, who is stationed at Wright-Patterson Air Force Base, complained of having problems in distributing leaflets at that base. Stieger also said the VAW group at Wright-Patterson Air Force Base would make an attempt to prevent the opening of the Air Force Museum, scheduled sometime this spring, date not announced. He added the group there has become inactive, because seven members had been sent to Vietnam.

Announcements made by Crandell and literature furnished at the meeting indicated the Winter Soldier Investigation would take place at Detroit, Michigan, January 31, February 1 and 2, 1971, to hear testimony

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by Vietnam veterans concerning "war crimes committed as the inexorable result of national policy. " According to the literature, the investigation was being conducted by honorably discharged veterans who had served in Vietnam, some who have earned medals, some who were wounded, and all who have earned their right to have their say. It was expected testimony would be heard concerning massacres, torture of prisoners and rurder of prisoners. The sessions in the United States ware to take place in two ballrooms of the Howard Johnson's New Center Motor Lodge, located West Grand Boulevard and Third Avenue, Detroit. The February 2 sessions were to have been held at the Cleary Auditorium, Windsor, Canada. Among those identified as representatives of the Winter Soldier Investigation are Timothy C. Butz, William F. Crandell, and Arthur L. Flesch.

At the meeting held January 23, 1971, at St. Stephen's Church, Columbus, Ohio, it was announced Tim Holder, President of the VAW, would arrange transportation to Detroit. Committees of the following were arranged for the following designated locations:



The second source made available a press release dated January 22, 1971, prepared by VAW, Room 324, Ohio Union, Box 3056, University Station, Columbus, Ohio. It identified the president as Timothy D. Holder, telephone 294-8020, and chairman of the Ohio Veterans Peace Coalition as Terry K. Webber, telephone 294-1562. The press release announced a convention to be held sponsored by the Obio Veterass Peace Coalition, January 23, 1971, at St. Stephen's Church, 30 West Woodruff Avenue, Columbus, Ohio. According to the press release, the following appears under the caption "Ohio Veterans Peace Coalition":

"VAW, a local Columbus anti-war organization of veterans, is sponsoring the state convention. Veterans

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from Dayton, Cincinnati, Kent State, Cleveland, and other Ohio cities and campuses will come together in Columbus to form the organization and to plan for the Ohio Veterans Peace Offensive for the spring. . . the Ohio delegates will adopt a policy statement, discuss a constitution, and elect a provision. Steering Committee for the New Ohio Veterans Peace Coalition. With the formation of the Ohio Veterans organization, Ohio will be the first state in the country with a statewide Veterans Peace organization."

The second source provided the following VAW policy statement, which was issued January 23, 1971, at Columbus, Ohio:

"We are veterans of our nation's Armed Services. We support the ideals upon which this nation was founded as expressed in the Declaration of Independence. We feel that the American involvement in the Civil War in Vietnam is symptomatic of our nation's straying from the ideals.

"We oppose not only this war but also the system of national priorities in our society that has helped place our nation in such a dehumanizing and illegal war.

"As veterans, and as war veterans, we are convinced that there must be a reordering of national priorities, away from the militarism of Vietnams, away from the interventionist policies that have our Armed Forces stationed on the four corners of the globe, away from the corporate-military dominance of our policy making structure, and towards the American-Revolutionary beliefs in a free and open, non-militarist government.

"The war is not in the best interest of either our country and its people, or of Vietnam and her people. We must serve our nation by supporting human rights, and working for peace.

"We call upon our fellow citizens, and especially our fellow veterans, to join with us in achieving that peace."

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The third confidential source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, on January 27, 1971, advised of the plans announced by VAW for future demonstrations and said the tone of the meeting was to keep the peace movement alive, even fter the termination of the Vietnam War. Specifically, we could furnish no schedule of activities planned and, to his knowledge, plans were not formulated for activities beyond May, 1971.

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A fourth confidential source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, on February 17, 1971, advised that during the VAW meeting held St. Stephen's Episcopal Church, Columbus, Phio, Bills Payer was designated statewide coordinator of VAW.

The fourth source stated the Ohio Veterans
Peace Coalition, the name given the gathering, is a
paper organization for the purpose of setting up a strong
coalition and to enable VAW to advertise and to use the
backing of a statewide organization for its future
activities.

In connection with the Winter Soldier Investigation, the fourth source noted that, although numerous Vietnam servicemen testified at Detroit, Michigan, January 30, February 1 and 2, 1971, the purpose of the gathering really failed. Some internal friction developed. It did not have the effect originally intended. Among others in Detroit, source said, were william Crandell, and

The fourth source evaluated the strength of VAW by stating its activity has decreased and the organization lacks dynamic leadership. Timothy Holder is to relinquish his position as president but his successor has not been named. Elections will probably be held to replace Holder.

The current activity of VAW, according to the fourth source, is raising money through donations to assist the earthquake victims in California.

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On December 15, 1970, a fifth confidential source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, was given the following name of a person to be contacted by veterans interested in peace: Bill Crandell, 4375 LeMarie Place, Apartment B2, Columbus, Ohio, Buckeye Army of Liberation.

The fourth confidential source on January 20, 1971, advised the organization known as Buckeye Army of Liberation is a paper organization set up by the VAW to "take the rap" for the results of any public demonstrations participated in by VAW. VAW would occasionally use the name "Buckeye Army of Liberation."

The February 19, 1971, edition of the "Ohio State Lantern," an OSU campus newspaper, contains an article on the front page announcing that VAW had set up contribution booths on the OSU campus to collect money to help the families of those killed in the Los Angeles earthquake tragedy. It is stated funds are to be distributed by the American Friends Service Committee of Pasadena, California. A photograph shows Phillip Ingrey, a sophomore from Margate, England, collecting funds from a contribution booth.

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
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

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
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According to the NISO report, the five individuals, during the demonstration, handed out leaflets bearing the title "Objectives of Vietnam Veterans Against The War, Inc."

The Virginian-Pilot, a Norfolk, Virginia, newspaper of general circulation dated October 23, 1970, reported that five anti-war demonstrators were "seized" outside the main gate of the Norfolk Naval Base on the previous Thursday afternoon, October 22, 1970, and held by the Base Security Police for 40 minutes and then released. The newspaper article indicated that the five were members of a local group known as the VVAW. According to the article, one of the five was a well-decorated former paratrooper severely injured in Vietnam and listed as 100 percent disabled. The newspaper article continued in identifying this exparatrooper as "Fitzhugh MacCrae." The others were identified as Bob Dietz, Bruce Gross, M. Guild Harrell, and Janet MacCrae, wife of "Fitzhugh MacCrae."

The newspaper article quoted Gross as stating "We were distributing leaflets outside the gate and all of a sudden all these security people converged on us."

MacCrae reportedly told the newspaper that the group was passing out literature listing the ten-point anti-war objectives of the VVAW, which claimed 50 members locally and 3,000 nationally.

OBJECTIVES OF VIETNAM VETERANS AGAINST THE WAR, INC.

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1. To demand an immediate conscition of fighting and the withdrawal of all American troops from Indochina; we cannot allow one more human being to die senselessly in Indochina.

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- 2. To demonstrate that our military tactics dehumanize solers and civilians, and to make clear the underlying governmental policies of the U.S. military and the Nixon administration in prosecuting an unjust and immoral war in Indochina.
- 3. To bring together a national coalition of veterans, National Guard and reservists, and active-duty scrvicemen and woman for peace, so that the men and women having first-hand knowledge of the military and the Indochina War can effectively voice their opinions.
- 4. To show that opposition to the war does not stem from cowardice or disloyalty; that the best way to keep faith with our fighting man is to BRING THEM BACK ALIVE-NOW!
- 5. To show that Americans allow their society to be pervaded by a racism which lets us view Asians and our own minorities as less-than-human. This racism pushes our minorities through inferior schools and into the combat arms. Thus, we send our minorities off to die in disproportionately high numbers while we kill Asians indiscriminately. We demand that the military recognize its complicity in America's domestic and international racism.
- 6. To demand immediate increase in Veterans Administration funds to correct the deplorably inhumane conditions that prevail in V.A. hospitals, and to facilitate the initiation of rehabilitative programs responsive to the needs of all veterans.
- 7. To make clerr that the U. S. has never undertaken an extensive, open investigation of American war crimes in Indochina. We demand that the U. S. Government, in its war in Indochina, affirm the principles of Nuremberg. While we, as former GI's, recognize the responsibility of the individual soldier to refrain from committing war crimes, we also recognize that the ultimate and primary responsibility and guilt of American war crimes lies with our policy-makers at all levels. We support the continuing efforts of the Citizens Commission of Inquiry in its attempt to fix responsibility for these policies and actions. We support and co-spensor the International Winter Soldier Investigation which will take place this fall.
- 8. To demand that all active-duty servicemen and women be afforded the same rights that are guaranteed by the United States Constitution and Bill of Rights that are presently denied by the Uniform Code of Military Justice. We are appalled that servicemen and women are treated at less-than-first-class citizens. We call for an immediate reform of the UCMJ. We endorse the efforts of the American Serviceman's Union to win a Bill of Rights for servicemen.
- 9. To support active-duty GI's refusing orders to fight in S. E. Asia. We support all Americans refusing to be drafted.
- 10. To deplore inhumane treatment of all persons imprisoned as a result of the Indochina conflict.

We have seen what the war is doing to our buddies and their femilies. Over 42,000 have already been killed and another 277,000 wounded--many of us maimed for the rest of our lives.And more are being killed and wounded everyday. And we don't think that that's worth it.

We believe that the basic problem of Vietnam are not military but social, economic, and political. We believe that there is no military solution to the war. We believe that, in any case, we cannot win a land war in Asia. And we believe that in this nuclear age our national security does not require us to win it.

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
The September 10, 1970, issue of the Ledger Star, a Norfolk newspaper of general circulation, reported that Marshall G. Harrell, a former Corporal in the U. S. Marine Corps, had joined with 600 others in a march at Valley Forge, Pennsylvania, sponsored by the VVAW. According to the article, Harrell arrived in Norfolk the day before (Septe r 9, 1970), wearing jungle fatigues which he reportedly wore while marching from Morristown, New Jersey, to Valley Forge, Pennsylvania, the line of march taken by the Continental Army in the Winter of 1777. Harrell indicated that at Valley Forge, Miss Jane Fonda and several other celebrities made speeches. The newspaper also indicated that Harrell was attempting to organize the VVAW in the Norfolk area with the intention of arousing interest in the Norfolk, Virginia, area in the Veterans' seven-point anti-war plan. Harrell was quoted as stating "Myself and my staff support projects and orderly demonstrations that show the public what actually takes place. We also endorse honest, sincere candidates for all levels of government." The newspaper, at that time, indicated Harrell was the only member of his "staff."



Please call the group which contacted you-express interest--and ask, in a low key--how they got your name. If they tell you, then call us--collect--at 212-691-9450. We will se the information in our lawsuit.

ITEM: Please send us the names and addresses of your buddles who served in Indochina. We will send them a VVAW information kit and questionnaire for membership.

ITEM: Call to the Winter Soldier Investigation:

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STUDENTS FOR A DEMOCRATIC SOCIETY

A source has advised that the Students for a Democratic Society (SDS), as presently regarded, came into being at a founding convention held June, 1962, at Port Huron, Michigan. From an initial posture of "participatory democracy" the line of the national leadership has revealed a growing Marxist-Leninist adherence which currently calls for the building of a revolutionary youth movement. Currently, the program of SDS has evolved from civil rights struggles to an anti-Vietnam war stance to an advocacy of a militant anti-imperialist position. China, Vietnam and Cuba are regarded as the leaders of the worldwide struggles against United States imperialism whereas the Soviet Union is held to be revisionist and also imperialist.

At the June, 1969, SDS National Convention, Progressive Labor Party (PLP) forces in the organization were expelled. As a result, the National Office (NO) group maintained its National Headquarters at 1608 West Madison Street, Chicago, and the PLP faction set up headquarters in Cambridge, Massachusetts. This headquarters subsequently moved to Boston. Each group elected its own national officers, which include three national secretaries and a National Interim Committee of eight. Both the NO forces and the PLP forces claim to be the true SDS. Both groups also print their versions of "New Left Notes" which sets forth the line and the program of the particular faction. The NO version of "New Left Notes" was recently printed under the title "The Fire Next Time" to achieve a broader mass appeal.

Two major factions have developed internally within the NO group, namely, the Weatherman or Revolutionary Youth Movement (RYM) I faction, and the RYM II faction. Weatherman is action-oriented upholding Castro's position that the duty of revolutionaries is to make revolution. Weatherman is regarded by RYM II as an adventuristic, elitist faction which denies the historical role of the working class as the base for revolution. RYM II maintains that revolution, although desired, is not possible under present conditions, hence emphasizes organizing and raising the political consciousness of the working class upon whom they feel successful revolution depends. Although disclaiming control and domination by the Communist Party, USA, leaders in these two factions have in the past proclaimed themselves to be communists and to follow the precepts of a Marxist-Leninist philosophy, along pro-Chinese communist lines.

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A second source has advised that the PLP faction which is more commonly known as the Worker Student Alliance is dominated and controlled by members of the PLP, who are required to identify themselves with the pro-Chinese Marxist-Leninist philosophy of the PLP. They advocate that an alliance between workers and students is vital to the bringing about of a revolution in the United States.

SDS and university and college chapters, although operating under the outlines of the SDS National Constitution, are autonomous in nature and free to carry out independent policy reflective of local conditions. Becaute of this autonomy internal struggles reflecting the major factional interests of the SDS have occurred at the chapter level since the beginning of the 1969-70 school year.

A characterization of the PLP is attached.

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APPENDIX

PROGRESSIVE LABOR PARTY (PLP)

"The New York Times" city edition, Tuesday, April 20, 1965, page 27, reported that a new party of "revolutionary socialism" was formally founded on April 18, 1965, under the name of the PLP, which had been known as the Progressive Labor Movement.

According to the article, "The Progressive Labor Movement was founded in 1962 by Milton Rosen and Mortimer Scheer after they were expelled from the Communist Party of the United States for assertedly following the Chinese Communist line."

A source advised on June 3. 1968, that the PLP held its Second National Convention in New Yor. City May 31 to June 2, 1968, at which time the PLP reasserted its objective of the establishment of a militant working class movement based on Marxism-Leninism. This is to be accomplished through the Party's over-all revolutionary strategy of raising the consciousness of the people and helping to provide ideological leadership in the working class struggle for state power.

The source also advised that at the Second National Convention Milton Rosen was unanimously re-elected National Chairman of the PLP, and Levi Laub, Fred Jerome, Jared Israel, William Epton, Jacob Rosen, Jeffrey Gordon, and Walter Linder were elected as the National Committee to lead the PLP until the next convention.

The PLP publishes "Progressive Labor", a bimonthly magazine; "World Revolution", a quarterly periodical; and "Challenge-Desafio", a monthly newspaper.

The April, 1969, issue of "Challenge-Desafio" sets forth that "Challenge is dedicated to the people's fight for a new way of life--where the working men and women control their own homes and factories; where they themselves make up the entire government on every level and control the schools, courts, police and all institutions which are now used to control them."

Source advised on May 8, 1969, that the PLP utilizes an address of General Post Office Box 808, Brooklyn, New York, and also utilizes an office in Room 617, 1 Union Square West, New York, New York.

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BLACK PANTHER PARTY (BPP), Also Known As Black Panther Party for Self Defense

According to the official newspaper of the BPP, the BPP was started during December, 1966, in Oakland, California, to organize black people so they can take control of the life, politics, and the destiny of the black community. It was organized by BOBBY G. SEALE, BPP Chairman, and HUEY P. NEWTON, Minister of Defense, BPP.

The official newspaper, called "The Black Panther," regularly states that the BPP advocates the use of guns and guerrillatactics in its revolutionary program to end oppression of the black people. Residents of the black community are urged to arm themselves against the police who are consistently referred to as "pigs" who should be killed.

The newspaper, in its issue of September 7, 1968, had an article by the then Minister of Education, CEORGE MURRAY. This article ended with the following:

"Black men. Black people, colored persons of America, revolt everywhere! Arm yourselves. The only culture worth keeping is revolutionary culture. Change. Freedom everywhere. Dynamite! Black power. Use the gun. Kill the pigs everywhere."

The BPP newspaper, issue of October 5, 1968, had an article introduced with the following statement: "We will not dissent from American government. We will overthrow it."

DAVID HILLIARD, Chief of Staff, BPP, in a speech at the San Francisco Polo Field on November 15, 1969, said "We will kill Richard Nixon."

DAVID HILLIARD, in the "New York Times," issue of December 13, 1969, was quoted as follows: "We advocate the very direct overthrow of the government by way of force and violence."

In the issue of April 25, 1970, the BPP newspaper had an article by Minister of Culture EMORY DOUGLAS as follows:

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




"The only way to make this racist US government administer justice to the people it is oppressing, is... by taking up arms against this government, killing the officials, until the reactionary forces...are dead, and those that are left turn their weapons on their superiors, thereby passing revolutionary judgment against the number one enemy of all mankind, the racist U. S. government."

The BPP Headquarters is located at 1046 Peralta Street, Oakland, California. Branches of the BPP, and Committees to Combat Fascism, under control of the BPP, have been established in various locations in the USA.


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
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

VIETNAM VETERANS AGAINST THE WAR (VVAW)

"The September 23, 1967, issue of the National Guardian" reported that the VVAW was formed by the Linear Veterans of the Vietnam War, with ranks from private to captain being represented in the organization whose men have served with almost every United States military unit in Southeast Asia.

A characterization of the "National Guardian" is attached."

On March 20, 1971, a confidential source who has provided reliable information in the past obtained literature sponsored by the VVAW and distributed in the Washington, D. C., (WDC) area, indicating that the VVAW with its National Office at 156 5th Avenue, New York, New York, maintains offices at 2331 Cathedral Avenue, apartment 307, N.W., WDC, and at 815 17th Street, number 504, N.W., WDC. The following are listed as objectives of the VVAW:

To demand an immediate cessation of the fighting and the withdrawal of all American troops from Indochina.

To demonstrate that our military tactics dehumanize soldiers and civilians and to make clear the underlying governmental policy of the United States military and the Nixon administration in prosecuting an unjust and immoral war in Indochina.

To bring together a national coalition of veterans, Mational Guardsmen, and reservists, and active duty personnel for peace.

To show that opposition to the war does not stem from cowardice or disloyalty.

To show that Americans allow their society to be pervaded by a racism which lets us view Asians and our minorities as less than human.





A third source, with whom contact has been insufficient to determine the reliability of his information, identified the following individuals as members of the VVAW in WDC:

A fourth source, who has provided reliable information in the past, advised that the VVAW and other antiwar groups are currently utilizing suite 900 at 1029 Vermont Avanue, N. W., WDC.

On March 2, 1971, a fifth source who has provided reliable information in the past advised that the VVAW is not a lessee at 1029 Vermont Avenue, N. W., WDC, however, the Peoples Coalition for Peace and Justice (PCPJ) presently leases and occupies the ninth floor at 1029 Vermont Avenue, N. W., WDC.

The PCPJ was self-described in a press release of March 1, 1971, as headquartered at 1029 Vermont Avenue, N. W., WDC, and consisting of over 100 organizations which are using massive, non-violent, civil disobedience to combat racism, poverty, repression, and war.

On April 19, 1971, participants are to proceed to Arlington National Cemetery, Arlington, Virginia, where a short orial ceremony is to be held. Following this ceremony and terminating on April 23, 1971, demonstrations, calling for an immediate withdrawal of all United States forces in Indochina will be held at the Capitol Building, the Supreme Court, the White House, and the Pentagon. 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

OPEN LETTER TO CONGRESS OF THE UNITED STATES:

DEMAND FOR PUBLIC HEARINGS ON REDRESS OF GRIEVANCES OF VETERANS OF THE INDOCHINA WAR

VIETNAM VETERANS AGAINST THE WAR, on behalf of its members and all other people who have worked toward peace, place before the Congress of the United States the following demands:

- 1. The Congress enact legislation to necessitate the immediate, unilateral, unconditional withdrawal of all United State. Armed Forces and Central Intelligence Agency personnel from the countries of Vietnam, Cambodia, Laos and Thailand.
- 2. The Congress enact legislation to terminate all funds appropriated for the continued presence of the United States Military, its Allies and the Central Intelligence Agency in the countries of Vietnam, Cambodia, Laos and Thailand.
- 2, The Congress enact legislation for the termination of all funds being futilized by the Central Intelligence Agency to support its illegal operations in Latin America, Africa, China, Europe, and the countries of Vietnam, Cambodia, Laos, and Thailand.
- 4. The Congress refuse to grant the 200 million dollars requested by the Administration for the continued United States support of the corrupt military machinery of the illegal government of Cambodia.
- 5. The Congress enact legislation fot the immediate repatriation with full amnesty to those men and women who are in proson or in self-exile by reason of their refusal to serve in the military.
- 6. The Congress convene immediate full public hearings into the charges of War crimes committed against the people of Indochina as a result of Official and De Facto United States Military policy in the conducting of the illegal war of aggression in the countries of Vietnam, Cambodia, Laos, and Thailand.
- 7. The Congress allow the Vietnam Veterans who brought these charges at the recently concluded Winter Soldier Investigation to testify with full Congressional immunity at these public hearings.
- 8. The Congress without regard for domestic political consideration issue a statement to the American people that the only means of securing the release of American prisoners of War is through the immediate cessation of all acts of aggression against the countries of Vietnam, Cambodia, and Laos, the immediate withdrawal of United States support in any form to the illegal, corrupt, government of Theiu, Ky, and Kheim, and the immediate withdrawal of all United States and Allied Porces from the countries of Vietnam, Cambodia, Laos, and Thailand.
- 9. The Congress enact immediate legislation to provide proper care and services for all patients in Veterans Administration Hospitals.

Carried Section 1

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- 10. The Congress enact immediate legislation to make available job training and placement in both the public and private sectors for for every returning Veteran.
- 11. The Congress enact immediate legislation providing the necessary funding for the strucuring and implementation of drug rehabilitation and psychotherapy programs fro returning veterans of the Indochina War.
- 12. The Congress enact immediate legislation providing the funds and means necessary for the Veterans Administration to provide materials, services and subsistance required by veterans in the course of their educational and vocational endeavors.
- 13. The Congress address itself immediately to the reordering of national priorities to serve the dire domestic, soi 1, economic and educational needs of all the people.
- 14. The Congress convene a joint session to be addressed by a member of our orginization.
- 15: The Congress of the United States cease immediately acting in tandem with the executive branch and meet its responsibility under the Constitution of the United States of America to protect the interests of and safeguard the rights of all the people of the United States of America.
- 16. We demand these things as citizens of the United States of America and as the vehicles by which this illegal, immoral, criminal war against the people of Vietnam, Cambodia, and Laos has been carried out.





An article in the March 31, A971 issue of the Record American, a Boston, Massachusetts, daily newspaper entitled "Sargent Backs Anti-War Vets" reflects that on March 29, 1971 Governor Sargent of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts told a group from the VVAW he supports their effort to organize other veterans to demand immediate United States withdrawal from Indo China. The VVAW group had formed in front of the State House in Boston for a morning-long demonstration. Spokesmen for the group said a VVAW information trailer will tour New England and New York City to raise support for the Washington demonstration agains he war April 19-23, 1971 and that they hope to mass more than 5000 veterans for this action. The VVAW is seeking a court order to the Massachusetts state treasurer to provide them with names and addresses of veterans who have received the state's Vietnam Bonus in order that they may be contacted for their support.

OBJECTIVES OF VIETNAM VETERANS AGAINST THE WAR, INC.

- To demand an immediate cessation of fighting and the withdrawal of all American troops from Indochina. We cannot allow one more human being to be killed in Indochina.
- To demand Congress enect legislation for the immediate termination of all funds being utilized by the United States government, its allies and the Central Intelligence Agency to support their illegal operations in Latin America, Africa, China, Europe, and the countries of Vietnam, Cambodia, Laos, and That land.
- To demonstrate that our military tactics dehumanize soldiers and civiliens, and to make clear the United States government is prosecuting an illegal, unjust and immoral war in Indochina.
- To show Americans that their society is structured by a racism which lets us view all non-whites as less than human. This racism pushes our minorities through inferior schools and into the combat arms. Thus, we send our minorities off to die in disproportionately high numbers while we kill Asians indiscriminately. We demand that the military recognize its complicity in America's domestic and international racism,
- To make clear that the United States has never undertaken an extensive, open investigation of American war crimes in Indochina. We demand that the United States government, in its war in Indochina, affirm the principles of Muremberg. As former GI's, we recognize the responsibility of the individual soldier to refrain from committing war crimes. We also recognize that the responsibility and guilt for war crimes committed in the name of America lies with our policy makers at all levels.
- To demand that all active-duty servicemen and women be afforded the rights as citizens that are guaranteed by the United States Constitution and Bill of Rights that are presently denied them by the Uniform Code of Military Justice. We are appalled that servicemen and women are treated as less-thanfirst-class citizens. We endorse the efforts of our active-duty sisters and brothers in their struggle to democratize the military.
- To support all military personnel refusing to serve in wars of aggression at home and abroad. We decend Congress enect legislation for the inne diate repatriation with full agreety to those brothers and sisters who are in prison or in self-exile by reason of their refusal to Merve in the military. We support all persons refusing to be drafted.
- 8. To demand immediate legislation to provide proper care and services for all veterons in V.A. hospitals; to make available job training and placement for every returning voteran; and to provide the funds and means necessary for the V.A. to provide the services and subsistence required by veterans during their educational and vocational endeavors. 100-448092-64

THE WINTER SOLDIER PESTICATION ATE /11/92 BY 9/23

These are the times that try men's souls; The summer soldier and the summin patriot will, in this crisis, shrink from the service of his country; but he that stands it NOW, deserves the love and thanks of man and woman.

Thomas Paine. December 23, 1775

As at Valley Force, a few stood firm while the many shrank from the winter service at Betroit. On the third anniversary of Tot '60, and during the month of the tenth anniversary of the official start of the war -- while the United States Covernment prepared under press blackout yet another invasion of yet another Southeast Asia country -- the Winter Soldier Investigation into U.S. military policy and war crimes in Indochina opened on Sunday, January 31, at the Howard Johnson's New Center Motor Lodge in downtown Detroit, Michigan.

A dozen at a time, combat division after combat division, each group spanning the six years American combat forces have been in Vietnam, over 100 honorably and often highly decorated Vietnam veterans walked into the small, public stage hour after hour for three full days (January 31 - February 2) and presented their eye-witness accounts of American war atrocities before an overflow audience of several hundred, curiously hushed citizens. Yet outside Detroit and the 5 mediate Midwest, the American press acted almost as though under an effici. Insorship blackout. The New York Times carried one stary, a week later (although it had a reporter there all three days); national CBS Television carried three minutes, mostly irrelevant to the subject, the first night and then left its crew stranded without a followup. The wire servicessent out stories that never appeared in papers whose editors had promised hemetown Vietnam veterans special attention.

And yet, the Winter Soldier Investigation provided startling news almost from the start. Just on Sunday, the first session, the panels on the let and 3d Narina Divisions provided evidence, later substantiated by other veterans thrush the country contacted by the <u>Detroit Free Press</u>, that (1) an entire U.S. Marine Regiment had conducted combat operations in Laos, code-named "Operation Deway Canyon", in early 1959, and that (2) an American ambush of unarmed Viet-namese during the Christmas truce, 1959, had killed 25-31 villagers, who were then "armed" by the military command collecting the souvenir weapons of GI's and adding then both to the official weapons and body counts. Though fully reported in Detroit, neither story left the Midwest. The same strange pattern followed the next day when, as a result of the testimony presented on Sunday, Sanator George McG-wern publicly called for a full Congressional investigation into the charges raised at Uinter Soldier, and that the Vietnam veterans there be brought to Washington to testify.

Nor did the press report that among the other supporters and public figures respending to the Winter Soldier Investigation were: Emil Mazey, Secretary-Treasurer of the United Auto Workers; Michigan Secretary of State Richard Austin; the Business Executives Move for Peace; Congressmen Conyers, (D-Mich), Dellums, (D-Calif), Abzug, (D-NY), Harrington (D-Conn), Drinan, (D-Mass), Rangel, (D-NY), Ryan, (D-NY), Helstaski, (D-NY), Seiberling, (D-Ohio), and Chisholm, (D-NY). Other supporters of Winter Soldier were Crosby, Stills, and Nash; Phil Ochs; Barbara Dane; Jana Fonda; Mark Lane; Donald Sutherland; Dick Gregory; and the Reverand Ralph Abernathy.

In the evenings and in-between the panels on the Original Units, scheduled and unscheduled special panels were held on "What we combat units, scheduled and unscheduled special panels were held on "What we Are Doing to Victnam," "Mhat We are Doing to Ourselves," "Meapons Banned by International Lau," "POW's, "Racism," and "Press Censorship." In addition, anothe 400-500 Victnam veterans not testifying, met in continuous organizing meetings in the hallways and nearby rooms. To plan future action and to compare notes on past successes and failures. In all, something like 700 Victnam veterans from all over the continental U.S. and Canada, came to Detroit, and perhaps four times that number of local citizens came to betroit, and perhaps four times that number of local citizens came to be and hear them.

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





On March 16, 1971 a first confidential source, who has provided reliable information in the past, advised that during the VVAW press conference, described above, Jack Mallory introduced the following persons, in addition to Lieutenant Kerry, and General Shoup, who support the VVAW:

action. The source also advised that Mike Phelan, WDC, VVAW
Coordinator, and Al Hubbard, VVAW Executive Secretary, New
York, New York, were also present.

On March 16, 1971 a second confidential source who has provided reliable information in the past advised that a conference sponsored by the University of Kentucky (UK) chapter of the Student Mobilization Committee (SMC) was held at the UK Student Center, February 26 -28, 1971. 

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

The source advised the VVAW boasts of having 500 members in WDC, however, due to a lack of funds, it became necessary for the VVAW to cancel its private telephone number at its WDC, office. The source advised the VVAW National Office, New York, New York, is not contributing financially to the WDC, office, but plans to participate in the April demonstration. According to the source, the VVAW in WDC, has adopted a flag which the source described as having a yellow background with three red stripes. Superimposed is a blue snake and the slogan, "Don't tread on me." In addition, the cast from the stage production "Hair" has indicated sympathy with the VVAW and will, prior to the planned activities, present a benefit performance; date and time to be determined.

The fifth source, advised that directly the above VVAW meeting, in order to obtain food and money for the April demonstration, a program of operating "Information Stands" in front of WDC. Super Markets was announced. People passing these stands would be asked to donate either money or a can of food; should a store manager or complain about the presence of the Information Stands, picketting of the store may result. Also, in order to stimulate interest in the April activities, a camouflage color jeep, and a mini bus, used as a sourced truck, will circulate through WDC, campuses. Further, as a means of arousing the attention of the news media, it was proposed that a group of amputees from Walter Reed Army Hospital chain themselves to the iron fence outside the White House; date and time yet to be announced.

who has provided reliable information in the past, advised that although the VVAW has publicly announced an intention to utilize the Georgetwon University Athletic Field for encampment during the April demonstration, the VVAW has been specifically notified that no space at Georgetown University is available.

The March 26, 1971 issue of "The Evening Star" contained an article relating to the VVAW April demonstration and reported "The dissenting veterans are pledged to nonviolence during their peaceful incursion'." The article described John Kerry as a Vietnam veteran who, in five months as a Navy Lieutenant, won the Silver Star, the Bronze Star and three Purple Hearts all of which he intends to hand back to Congress on April 23. The article stated that Kerry is the son of a former State Department official and a graduate of Saint Paul's School and Yale, where he was class orator in 1966. The article also reported that Kerry was granted release from the Navy to run for Congress in his home district in Massachusetts, but withdrew in favor of Father Robert Drinan.

On March 29, 1971 a seventh confidential source, who has provided reliable information in the past, advised that the VVAW has filed a "Notice of Proposed Demonstration" with the National Park Service, United States Department of the Interior, WDC. The individual sponsors of the VVAW were listed as Michael Phelan, Jack Mallory, and John Kerry, and the nature of the VVAW was given as an incorporated, non-profit, organization at 156 5th Avenue, New York, New York.

The principal national officer of the VVAW was listed as Al Hubbard, Executive Secretary.

In its notice, the VVAW listed the date of the' proposed demonstration as April 19 through April 23, 1971, with demonstrations to take place at the Capitol, the Mall, the Ellipse, the Supreme Court, the Veterans Administration, the Pentagon, the White House, Dung t Circle, Lafayette Square, and P Street Beach. The stated purpose of the demonstration is to call for annimmediate withdrawal from Indochina, improved veterans benefits, and a war crimes investigation; the estimated number of participants being placed by the VVAW at 5,000. The notice stated that all participants will be identifiable by reason of a uniform or other distinguishing dress and 500 marshals will be provided by the VVAW, however, the person to be responsible for the supervision of marshals is to be determined at a later date. was indicated that no additional organizations would participate. Al Hubbard and John Kerry were listed as the persons in charge of the demonstration, and they provided an address of 156 Fifth Avenue, New York City.

The following proposed schedule was filed with the "Notice of Proposed Demonstration":

One April 19, 1971 at 9:00 a.m. participants are to proceed from an undetermined campsite and arrive 11:00 a.m. at Arlington National Cemetary, where a half hour memorial ceremony will be held. At 11:30 a.m. participants are to proceed across the 14th Street Bridge, east on Constitution Avenue, north on 16th Street to Pennsylvania Avenue, and east to the Capitol. At 2:00 p.m. participants will group on the steps and lawn of the Capitol where according to the schedule, they will be met by Congressmen and Senators. While present on the Capitol grounds, speechs will be made for an hour, afterwhich lobbying at Congressional offices will begin. Also 500 veterans who will be rotated on a four hour basis, will begin a 24 hour vigil in the vicinity of the Capitol. According to the schedule, a similar vigil may take place at the White House, and persons

not taking part in either lobbying or the vigil will return to the campsite.

On April 20, 1971 the lobbying and vigil will continue. A guerilla theatre, consisting of ten to twenty veterans and professional actors demonstrating search and destroy, interrogation and other connect at the Capitol, the Mall, the Pentagon, the Veterans Administration, Dupont Circle, and Lafayette Square.

Participants will wear jungle fatigues and carry toy M-16 rifles. At 5:00 p.m. the veterans, except for vigil participants, will return to their campsite.

On April 21, 1971 at 9:00 a.m. the guerilla theatre will continue at the above sites. From 11:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. 2,000 participants will gather at the Supreme Court building to demand that the Court rule on the constitutionality of the Vietnam War. At 1:00 p.m. approximately 100 veterans will gather at the Pentagon and attempt to symbolically turn themselves over to military authorities as war criminals. At 5:00 p.m. veterans except vigil participants, will return to the campsite.

On April 22, 1971 at 9:00 a.m. the guerilla theatre will continue. At 10:00 a.m. 200 veterans will march to the National Press Building, WDC, and lobby until 12:00 noon. From 1:00 p.m. until 5:00 p.m. 1,000 veterans will picket the Veterans Administration building in WDC. At 5:00 veterans, except for vigil participants, will return to the campsite.

On April 23, 1971 at 10:00 a.m. all participants will proceed from the campsite and arrive at the Capitol at 11:00 a.m. While gathered on the Capitol steps, veterans will return their medals symbolically to the American people. The medals will be gathered into a "body bag" carried west on Pennsylvania to the White House, and returned to the President. At approximately 3:00 p.m. the demonstration will terminate and participants will depart WDC.

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The "Notice of Proposed Demonstration" was signed by Michael Phelan as local VVAW Coordinator and was witnessed by John K. Mallory, 1029 Vermont Avenue, WDC.

The notice states there is no reason to believe that any individual, group, or organization will seek to disrupt the demonstration.

The YSA is the youth organization of the Socialist Workers Party (SWP) and serves as the main source of recruitment into the SWP.

According to the mastheat of the "YSO" dated April 29, 1970, the YSA is described as "A multi-national revolutionary socialist youth organization."

The SWP has been designated pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

A source advised on May 16. 969, that the Student Mobilization Committee (SMC) original grew out of the National Student Strike for Peace Conference held in Chicago, Illinois, on December 28-29, 1966, which resulted in a call for massive antiwar demonstrations in New York City and San Francisco, California, on April 15, 1967. The National Student Strike for Peace Conference was originally called by the Communist Party (CP) and the Socialist Workers Party (SWP), culminating in a takeover by the SWP element in the Summer of 1968 and the CP element withdrawing. Source further advised that the SMC locally and nationally is controlled by the SWP and its youth arm, the Young Socialist Alliance (YSA), as evidenced by the YSA leadership and participation in SMC activities.

The SWP has been designated by the Attorney General of the United States pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

A report of the Committee on Un-American Activities, House of Representatives, Ninetieth Congress, First Session, dated March 31, 1967, entitled "Communist Origin and Manipulation of Vietnam Week (April 8-15, 1967)," on page 53, states in part, "Communists are playing dominant roles in both the Student Mobilization Committee and the Spring Mobilization Committee."

A second source advised on November 16, 1970, that the New York Regional Office of the SMC was located at 15 East 17th Street, Second Floor, New York, New York, where "The Student Mobilizer" is published. "The Student Mobilizer" is self-described as being published by the National Office of the Student Mobilization Committee to End the War in Vietnam. Source stated that the program of the SMC continues as follows: immediate and unconditional withdrawal of all United States troops from Vietnam, an end to the draft, an end to all forms of campus complicity with the war in Vietnam, self-determination for Vietnam and black America, and Constitutional rights for GIs and high school students.

SUBJECT: VIETNAM VETERANS AGAINST THE WAR (VWAW) MARCH AND DEMONSTRATIONS, APRIL 18 - 23, 1971

> This group, composed of armed lorces veterans, primarily/ Vietnam veterans, is sponsoring demonstrations in Washington during the period 4/18-23/71.

A memorial ceremony at Arlington Cemetery is scheduled for 11:00 a.m., Monday, 4/19/71. This meeting is to be followed by a march across the 14th Street Bridge and along Constitution Avenue to the Capitol where marchers are scheduled to meet with Congressmen and Senators at 2:00 p.m. Vigils are planned for various Washington areas from the end of the march through 4/23/71. The Justice Building has not been included in the stated vigil or demonstration sites.

March organizers have stated that their goal is to have 5,000 persons participate. Information obtained by the Washington Field office indicates that far fewer persons will actually participate. The Washington Metropolitan Police Department has not issued any special orders covering this event.

It is to be expected that some congestion will occur in the Constitution Avenue and Mall areas during the actual march, with necessary traffic controls put into effect on an 'at need' basis.

From the foregoing it appears that the Justice Building can be entered or left at any time on 4/19/71 by using streets north of Constitution Avenue. Normal traffic is expected on Constitution Avenue on that date except when the actual march is in progress. / 65
