Enclosed are five copies for the Bureau and two copies for New York of a LHM captioned as above.

As the Bureau is aware, JOHN KNIFFEN, who resides in Austin, Texas, is the Regional Coordinator for the VVAW in Texas. Sources at Houston advise attempts to organize a chapter here have resulted in very loose knit association of individuals with no definite membership, no scheduled meetings, no dues, and no officers. CLAUDE KERAN ROWLAND is described as the person attempting to organize a Houston chapter of the VVAW and other persons connected with the Progressive Labor Party (PLP) and the Venceremos Brigade (VB) have occasionally associated themselves with VVAW activities.

[REDACTED] when application was made for campus recognition, was interviewed and states he was a member at Houston from [REDACTED] to [REDACTED] and left VVAW due to its ineffectiveness. [REDACTED] was also interviewed and states he attended demonstrations at Miami, Florida, in connection with the Republican Party National Convention "to demonstrate to the government that its action in indicting CAMIL (SCOTT CAMIL) and others would not stop the activities of the VVAW." He did not attend National Steering Committee at Houston in the spring of 1972 nor did he participate in the demonstration at the LBJ Library, Austin, Texas, during the latter part of 1971, since he considered these activities as "headline-seeking affairs." [REDACTED] advised VVAW has not held any formal meetings in Houston for at least two months.

VIETNAM VETERANS AGAINST THE WAR (VVAW)

The Vietnam Veterans Against the War (VVAW) is a national veterans organization with a National Clearinghouse located at 25 West 26th Street, New York City (NYC). Its first published objective is "to demand an immediate cessation of fighting and a withdrawal of all American troops from Indochina."

BACKGROUND

A source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised on May 16, 1972 that there is a VVAW group in Houston, Texas, which was originally formed by concerned veterans "who had no left wing programs at all." According to this source, Claude Keran Rowland, also known as Pete Rowland, formerly of the Students for a Democratic Society (SDS) and the John Brown Revolutionary League (JBRL), influenced it "toward the left." The group has also "been exposed to [redacted] a member of the Venceremos Brigade (VB), through [redacted]. This source advised that Pete Rowland and [redacted] are the only two known members of the VVAW."

On May 31, 1972, this source advised that Pete Rowland announced he would "no longer head the VVAW in Houston" due to illness and that a VVAW meeting had turned into a Progressive Labor Party (PLP) dominated meeting due to the fact that the PLP had a "large contingent in VVAW."

Students for a Democratic Society (SDS) was founded during June, 1962, at Port Huron, Michigan, and in the 1960s functioned as the leading New Left campus-based student organization in the United States. From an initial posture of "participatory democracy", SDS moved to a radical-revolutionary position, with debate centering on how best to create a revolutionary youth movement. Internal factionalism produced a split during the SDS National Convention in June, 1969, which resulted in the following three factions: Weatherman; Worker Student Alliance (WSA); and Revolutionary Youth Movement (RYM). The Weatherman and RYM are no longer affiliated with SDS. The WSA continues to use the name SDS and maintains its national headquarters in Chicago, Illinois.

Weatherman, formerly a faction of SDS, controlled the SDS National Office from June, 1969, until its closing in February, 1970. Weatherman then entered an underground status and adopted a tactic of "strategic sabotage", with police and military installations designated as primary targets.

Worker Student Alliance (WSA), a faction of SDS, was expelled from SDS in June, 1969, by the then dominant Weatherman faction but continued to use the name SDS and opened an office in Boston, Massachusetts. WSA aligned ideologically with the Progressive Labor Party (PLP) and in February, 1971, moved to Chicago, Illinois. SDS/WSA currently shares office space with the PLP in Chicago.

The John Brown Revolutionary League (JBRL) was a small group of white radicals made up almost entirely of former members of SDS. This organization is now defunct.

The Venceremos Brigade (VB) was formed in June, 1969, by a coalition of New Left organizations to encourage American youth to travel to Cuba in defiance of a ban on travel to that country by the United States Department of State. The ostensible purpose of the travel was to assist the Castro regime in the harvesting of sugar cane and other agricultural products and to give young Americans the experience of living in a revolutionary communist country.

The Progressive Labor Party (PLP) was founded in 1962 by individuals expelled from the Communist Party, USA, for following the Chinese communist line. Its objective is the establishment of a militant working-class movement based on Marxism-Leninism and MAO Tse-tung thought.

A second source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised on June 9, 1972 that Pete Rowland was the VVAW Chapter Coordinator at Houston, Texas.

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On July 26, 1972, a third source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised that [redacted] claimed that the PLP has "a comrade" in the VVAW, "however, there is nothing much going on here."

[redacted] an admitted member of the VVAW, advised upon interview on November 28, 1972 that he had attended a meeting of local coordinators in July, 1971 at Arlington, Texas, in place of the Houston VVAW coordinator.

He stated he is "only casually" acquainted with John Kniffen, ^{TEX} the regional coordinator, and did not attend the VVAW National Steering Committee meeting held at Houston in April, 1972, nor the demonstration held in Killeen, Texas, and at the LBJ Library in Austin, Texas, during the latter part of 1971, as he considered "these were simply headline-seeking affairs." [REDACTED] further stated that the Houston chapter of the VVAW has not held any formal meetings in a period of "at least" two months.

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[REDACTED] admitted former member of VVAW, advised upon interview on October 31, 1972 that he had attended the VVAW demonstrations at Fort Hood, Killeen, Texas, and at the LBJ Library in Austin, Texas, both in December, 1971. He also attended the VVAW National Steering Committee meeting at Houston, Texas, in April, 1972.

A fourth source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised on August 3, 1972 and again on November 20, 1972 that [REDACTED] a member of the PLP, "keeps in touch" with the VVAW. This source advised that [REDACTED]

ACTIVITIES

On February 5, 1972, the first source mentioned above stated that a VVAW demonstration was held at the Federal Building, Houston, Texas, in which approximately 12 persons participated including [REDACTED] and other members of the PLP.

On May 22, 1972, first source mentioned above advised that the Houston "contingent" of the VVAW conducted a demonstration at the site of the mooring of the Battleship TEXAS, San Jacinto Battleground State Park, using boats to symbolically mine the battleship area. Among those present were persons associated with the VB, Workers World (WW), PLP and the Angela Davis Defense Committee.

The Workers World Party (WWP) was founded in 1959 by individuals who disagreed with policies of the Socialist Workers Party (SWP). The WWP dissidents advocated unconditional support of the Soviet Union and the building of a revolutionary party geared to the overthrow of capitalism. More recently, the WWP has called for peaceful solutions to Sino-Soviet border disputes; however, the WWP generally supports the People's Republic of China in its ideological differences with the Soviet Union.

The SWP has been designated pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

The Angela Davis Defense Committee was the Houston affiliate of the National United Committee to Free Angela Davis, also known as the United Committee to Free Angela Davis.

The National United Committee to Free Angela Davis (NUCFAD) was founded by the Communist Party, USA (CPUSA), to free Angela Davis, a self-admitted member of the Southern California District, CPUSA (SCDCP), who faced murder-kidnaping charges in California. The SCDCP controls NUCFAD by use of CPUSA members in key positions. Headquarters are located at San Francisco, California.

MEMBERSHIP

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On May 16, 1972, the first source mentioned above advised that Pete Rowland and [REDACTED] are the only two known members of the VVAW in Houston. [REDACTED] upon interview on November 28, 1972, stated he is a member of

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the VVAW. The fourth source mentioned above advised on November 20, 1972 that [REDACTED] a member of the PLP, is associated with members of the VVAW and attends their meetings when held.

On December 3, 1972, [redacted] who has furnished reliable information in the past and who is acquainted with Vietnam Veterans Against the War (VVAW) activities, advised that a Regional Conference was held at Lake Pamona in Ottawa, Kansas from December 2 - 3, 1972. VVAW leaders at the Conference endeavored to ascertain the number of persons who would be willing to travel to Washington, D.C. to represent VVAW interests at the proposed protests during the Presidential Inaugural ceremonies. Although no firm commitments were received from those participating in the Conference, [redacted] feels that some representatives of the VVAW would definitely travel to Washington to represent this region's chapters. John Musgrave, a VVAW leader, indicated that more definite plans regarding VVAW participation in the proposed protests would be finalized at the National Steering Committee Meeting planned to be held in Chicago, Illinois, commencing January 4, 1973. Musgrave indicated that he has been asked to change his residence to Chicago, Illinois, and become a member of the National Steering Committee.

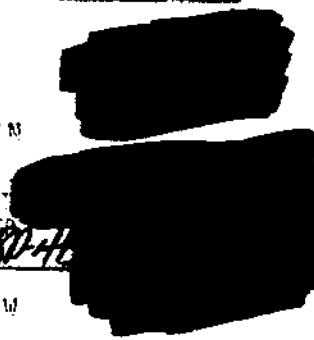

OUR OBJECTIVES

1. To demand an immediate cessation of fighting and the withdrawal of American troops, planes, military, and economic aid from Southeast Asia. We cannot allow one more human being to be killed in Southeast Asia. In support as a basis for the cessation of these hostilities the various peace proposals of the peoples of Southeast Asia, such as the 7 point program of the Provincial Revolutionary Government of South Vietnam or any future plans as they develop based upon their right of self-determination and actual control of their own destinies.
- (4) 2. To demand the immediate termination of all other operations by the government, its agencies, and American business interests that are designed to suppress the rightful struggles for liberation and self-determination of the Peoples of Africa, Asia, and Latin America. This includes the maintenance of dictatorial governments, economic domination, and the theft of the natural resources of other countries. The U.S. should make reparations in a program acceptable to the Indochinese for all the damage done by the U.S.
3. To demand that all active-duty servicemen and women, Reservists and National Guardsmen be afforded the same rights that are guaranteed by the U.S. Constitution and Bill of Rights that are presently denied by the Uniform Code of Military Justice. We are appalled that our active-duty GIs are treated as less than first class citizens. We endorse the efforts of our active-duty sisters and brothers in their struggle to democratize the military.
4. To support all military personnel refusing to serve against their consciences in wars at home and abroad. We demand that Congress enact legislation for the immediate repatriation to those brothers and sisters who are in prison or in self-exile by reason of their refusal to serve in the military. It must also involve an end to all repression and a freeing of all political prisoners.
5. To demand that there be no distinctions as to types of discharges and that a single type of discharge be issued, and that this be retroactive. We also demand that all veterans receive all rights and benefits under VA; and that compensation for disabilities be based solely upon the degree of disability for veterans and their families, without regard to sex, rank or length of service.

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6. To make clear that the U.S. has never undertaken an extensive open investigation of American war crimes in Indochina. In its war in Indochina, the principles of Neuremberg have been violated. As active-duty and former GIs, we recognize the responsibility and guilt of the individual soldier to refrain from committing war crimes. We also recognize that the responsibility and guilt of war crimes committed in the name of America lies with our policy makers at all levels.

7. Resolved to fight racism, to show Americans that our society is permeated by racism, which manipulates whites into viewing non-whites as inferior or less than human. This racism pushes Third World People through inferior schools to inferior jobs and into combat arms. Thus Third World People are sent off to die in disproportionately high numbers as we kill Asians indiscriminately. We also demand the U.S. military recognize its complicity in America's domestic and international racism

(u) 8. Resolved to fight sexism, to show that sexism plays a major role in promoting war. We must show Americans our society is permeated by sexism, which forces an inferior status upon women, reducing them to subservient sexual objects, and which robs both men and women of their natural growth. This institutionalized sexism channels women into un-fulfilling, lower paying jobs which are servile in nature and purpose; it exploits their bodies for sex and profit; and it degrades and dehumanizes them by a double standard of morality wholly dependent on the myth of male supremacy. This sexism is exploited by the military, officially defining service-women as subordinate and thoroughly subjugating them to servile work and the role of a sexual object. We resolve to fight sexism within our society within our own organization, and within ourselves.

9. To dedicate ourselves to these principles and objectives which directly relate to the imperialist suppression of the People of the World by the U.S. government. We understand this war is imperialist in origin and affirm that the membership of VVAW is not only concerned with ending this war, but with changing the domestic, social, political and economic institutions that have caused and perpetuated its continuance.

10. To support the democratic right of Americans to unionize and strike to protect their income and safeguard their employment. We consider all legislation designed to suppress these rights, including mandatory arbitration to be illegal, and not in the interests of American working people. We also demand full employment for all Americans, including free educational and vocational training for all who need or want it. We refuse to participate in the efforts being made to separate us from other working people, making veterans enemies by giving us the charade of employment priority. We condemn this as a method of encouraging military enlistment by the false promise of employment after service. We also condemn the use of active-duty GIs, Reservists, and National Guardsmen as strikebreakers.

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C. Scope

D. Structure

1. National Executive Committee

An undated document entitled "History" under the letterhead of the VVAW which was concerned with the history of the organization and which was furnished during August, 1971 disclosed that VVAW is run on a daily basis by a six man National Executive Committee (NEC).

2. National Clearing House

[redacted] advised that at the VVAW NSC meeting held at Denver, Colorado during February, 1972 it was voted to abolish the NEC and to establish a National Clearing House (NCH) whose main function would be communication. The NCH would publish monthly editions of the VVAW newspaper, "The First Casualty" and a bi-monthly newsletter for the Regional Coordinators. The NCH would present to the members of the Steering Committee a quarterly financial report and a monthly statement of account. X u

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The NCH staff would consist of an editor of "The First Casualty", elected for a one year term, two distributors for "The First Casualty" elected for six months terms, one permanent secretary, preferably a veteran hired by the NCH staff, a treasurer elected for a one year term and a national liaison officer elected for a one year term. 3. National Coordinators

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At the VVAW NSC meeting, Houston, Texas, April, 1972 it was voted to abolish the NCH and to establish at the National Office six officers to be known as National Coordinators. The officers created were a liaison officer to be in charge of inter-communications in the VVAW; a treasurer; a communications officer who would be in charge of films, publications and press releases; a projects director; a membership director; and a legislative officer. 4. Steering Committee

At the VVAW NSC meeting, Denver, Colorado, February, 1972 it was voted that policy decisions on national activities and financial decisions will be made by the Steering Committee (SC) composed of the Regional Coordinators and members of the National Staff. The SC will meet quarterly during April, June, September and January with provisions for emergency meetings which would supercede the regular meeting. (U)

5. Regional Coordinators

At the VVAW NSC meeting, Houston, Texas, April, 1972 it was discussed and voted that the 28 regional coordinators should constitute the governing body of the VVAW. They will meet quarterly as the SC for the purpose of conducting national business and to discuss regional affairs. It will be the duty of the regional coordinators to define policy, activities and the philosophy of the national organization. (U)

The duties of a Regional Coordinator (RC) were further defined as follows:

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1. RC is the official VVAW member in charge of the affairs of a geographic area.
2. RC has the responsibility and full authority to make policy and plans in his area as determined by his constituency as long as it is consistent with national policy and philosophy.
3. RC shall be supported by the national body and Steering Committee, however, all decisions made at the national level shall be binding on all chapters.
4. RC is responsible for establishing media and political contacts in his area.
5. RC is expected to support all national events, actions, and fund raising drives initiated by the Steering Committee.
6. RC is responsible for distributing press releases to the media at the request of the National Office.
7. RC must establish and insure the delivery of all communications within his region.
8. RC must be available to attend all regional, national, and emergency meetings, or delegate such responsibility to a proxy with written authorization.
9. RC must call regional meetings at least quarterly in order to disseminate all information received at national meetings and to elect a delegate to the next national assembly or establish in writing his proxy from another region with the consent of regional membership.

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- 10. RC will assign a representative to fulfill his duties in case of absence or shall issue his written proxy in case of national business.
- 11. Each regional chapter shall be chartered according to the national certificate of incorporation and may not otherwise use the name VVAW.
- 12. RC will serve a fixed geographic region for a period of one year, unless removed by a two-thirds vote of the regional Steering Committee membership.

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II. ACTIVITIES

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A. National and Regional

1. Valley Forge II, December 24-31, 1971

The National Office of the VVAW announced on December 21, 1971, that the northeast regions of the organization would hold anti-Vietnam War demonstrations at Valley Forge and Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, NYC, and Washington, D. C., during period of December 24-31, 1971. The demonstrations were to be known as Valley Forge II. The schedule of demonstrations were as follows:

December 24-25. At Valley Forge, Pennsylvania, at 10:00 P.M., on December 24, a Christmas tree and war toys would be burned. Churches in Valley Forge area would be leafletted on December 24-25, with anti-Vietnam literature.

December 26. Day would be known as GI Solidarity Day. VVAW encampment would move to Fort Dix, New Jersey, where demonstrations would be held. Tentative plans were made to conduct an action at a Philadelphia Naval installation.

December 27. Day would be known as Military-Industrial Day. At 10:00 A. M., local VVAW groups would conduct demonstrations against unspecified military-industrial corporations.

December 28. At 12:00 noon, a demonstration aimed at Congress would be held at the United States Capitol, Washington, D. C., to protest the war in Vietnam. Following this demonstration, the demonstrators would march to the White House and would also possibly demonstrate at the Justice Department.

December 29. At 10:00 A. M., a march would be held from Independence Hall, Philadelphia, to an unspecified location where a Winter Soldier Investigation concerning alleged atrocities conducted by United States military forces in Vietnam would be held.

December 31. A VVAW rally would be held at Times Square, NYC, during the New Year's Eve festivities at that location.

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2. Ad Hoc Military Build Up Committee (ADMBC)

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During April 1972, the ADMBC was located at 67 Winthrop Street, Cambridge, Massachusetts. This committee claimed to collect intelligence concerning the United States military force build up for the War in Indochina. The ADMBC was composed of GI organizers, peace activists and members of the VVAW.

At a VVAW meeting held on April 26, 1972, at the Arlington Street Church, Boston, Massachusetts, [redacted] VVAW Leader from Cambridge, Massachusetts, announced that the ADMBC was defunct and not soliciting any more information as it had served its purpose. *u*

3. Demonstrations at Washington, D.C. known as Rolling Thunder III, April 19 - May 4, 1972.

The VVAW was sponsoring demonstrations at Washington, D.C. known as Rolling Thunder III during April 19 - May 4, 1972. The demonstrations were under the direction of JOE BANGERT of the Philadelphia VVAW and were being operated out of the VVAW Office in Washington, D.C. known as "Landing Zone America". Purpose of the demonstrations were to show VVAW opposition to the escalation of the war in Indochina. The National Office of the VVAW had called VVAW regions in the East in an attempt to swell the number of VVAW demonstrators in Washington, D.C. to 1,000. The National Office of the VVAW was highly critical of VVAW members in Washington, D.C. over the pacifist nature of the lobbying actions during the demonstrations. E.B. DEL ROSARIO, recently elected VVAW National Officer from Seattle, Washington, had departed New York City for Washington, D.C. on April 19, 1972, with a tentative scenario of activities in Washington, D.C. which would include a march on the National Cemetery at Arlington, Virginia, on April 22, 1972, the "seizure" of the mall at the Capitol and demonstrations at the United States Information Agency and the Government Science and Space Museums. *u*

There will be two marked convoy lead and two marked convoy
rear vehicles which will act as coordinators and organizers for
the operation of the Last Patrol. These vehicles will be
equipped with radio equipment to keep in touch with all
elements of the convoy. There will also be two mechanical
parts vans with a basic supply of parts. Mechanics will be avail-
able if on-the-spot repairs can be made. As part of our
facilities, there will also be medical centers with doctors
and medics. Attorneys will also be travelling with the convoy
as observers or in case of any problems along the route.
There will be 20-to-30 convoy inspection vehicles to deal with
any problems or crises that arise. These vehicles will be
throughout the length of the convoy and will also be equipped
with radio gear.

Each separate organizational or regional contingent must have
a marked lead and rear vehicle. VVAW chapters will provide
these vehicles in those areas where we have chapters. This
will enable vehicles to find and re-enter the convoy with the
greatest ease. This will also aid in preparing the educational
programs which will be organized.

We would like to have educational programs during our stops
for lunch and at night. It would really be good if we could
have local community participation and attendance if the
arrangements could be made thru local and regional contacts.
We would also like different organizations to plan internal
education programs and theatre for our own use on our travel.

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All vehicles should be identified with signs, slogans, political thought, cartoons, and people's art.

Pick up all trash after stops and in the morning.

No violence among the people will be tolerated. ~~SECRET~~

While in the convey travel with your lights on at all times.

If you must stop for repairs or for medical aid or whatever, pull out of line and onto the shoulder. A convey inspection vehicle will stop and arrange for any assistance needed. Do not block freeway access ramps when you stop. If you're stopping for gas or the bathroom, the entrance back into the convey will be made as follows; enter at the rear of the convey before the rear convey control vehicles. This procedure should also be followed if you have stopped for emergency aid. The line of the convey should not be slowed by vehicles breaking into the line. Resume your position with your contingent at the noon stop or in the evening.

Only convey inspection vehicles and emergency aid vehicles should be passing along the line of the convey. All other vehicles must maintain their position in line unless leaving the convey line. Convey inspection and emergency vehicles should resume their designated positions as soon as possible after stopping.

For those contingents which will be entering the Last Patrol at points other than designated stops, a convey inspection vehicle will be at your position approximately one (1) hour before the body of the convey. The vehicle will be in radio contact with the main body and will coordinate your entrance into the line. You will be entering at the end of the line before the rear convey control vehicles. The convey coordinator who will be working this entrance will be available to aid in any last minute problems that arise.

All entering contingents should coordinate their entrance with both the national and regional coordinators of VVAW. (see enclosed coordinators list) This information will be needed to effectively operate the convey and avoid as much confusion as possible. We will also need the approximate number of vehicles which will be entering at each point.

SUPPLIES TO BE CARRIED IN EACH VEHICLE: THESE ARE REQUIRED

1 gallon water; 2 gallons of gas; 2 quarts of oil; 1 good spare tire; 1 flashlight; 1 extra set of batteries for flashlight; ~~SECRET~~
1 basic first aid kit (see attached instructions); salt tablets; sleeping bags; 1 good jack; food, gas mask or alternative (see attached instructions); TUNE-UP BEFORE LEAVING.

(u) THE FOLLOWING ITEMS ARE HIGHLY RECOMMENDED: flares; extra water if traveling thru the desert; leather gloves; suntan lotion; and the following spare parts for your car: gasket set, fan belt, spark plugs, points, condensor, rotor, and PCP valve.

RECOMMENDED HANDLING OF LOCAL PRESS RELATIONS:

Notify all local media of your group's participation in Operation Last Patrol. Have your local media mobilized to cover your entrance into the convoy. Towns which will not have entering contingents, but are along the convoy route should be notified of Operation Last Patrol. This could best be coordinated at a regional level.

The reasons for your groups participation in the Last Patrol should be stressed as much as possible. Why are we going to Miami? Why is our major focus the republican party? Why is VietNam still an issue with all the troop withdrawals? Why are unemployment, welfare rights, the wage freeze, racism, political repression, political prisoners, and sexism, also major points to focus on in Miami as we confront the imperialists? These conditions exist in all our communities. Local problems can clarify our educational programs to point out the inhuman conditions under which we are forced to live.

This is the basic outline for all major convoy routes for Oper. Last Patrol. All regional coordinators should coordinate all secondary link-up points, actual sites for stopping for lunch and for the night stops with other coordinators along the routes and with other organizations. As all secondary link-up points and stops are confirmed, please notify the national office.

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RECOMMENDED FIRST AID EQUIPMENT TO BE CARRIED IN EACH VEHICLE

Gauze, 4x4 dressings, adhesive tape, dressings sets, ammonia packed, boric acid ophthalmic solution (see instr. below for use), isopropyl alcohol, plastic air way (adult size) swabs for eyes.

EMERGENCY MEDICAL ADVICE FOR DEMONSTRATIONS

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To Prevent Injuries:

Wear long pants and two shirts (the outer shirt should have long sleeves to protect from gas burns. Wear hard shoes, not sandals. Wear a helmet if you have one.

Do not wear earrings or neck chains, or anything around your neck.

Do not wear contact lenses (if gas or mace gets trapped behind lenses eye burns or even blindness could result). Do not wear false teeth (if they are knocked out they can choke you). If you need to wear glasses secure them with a rubber band or strap.

FIRST AID REVIEW FOR TEAR GAS AND MACE VICTIMS

REMOVE CONTACT LENSES IMMEDIATELY

(W) You shouldn't be wearing them in the first place. If you are treating someone wearing lenses and they can't remove them for some reason you can get them out by holding the eye open with one hand and touching the lens gently with a Q-tip or finger.

FLUSH EYES AND ALL AFFECTED SKIN WITH WATER

THIS WILL STING SO BE WARNED.

WASH ALL AFFECTED SKIN WITH MINERAL OIL FOLLOWED IMMEDIATELY BY ALCOHOL. Caution mineral oil will dissolve the gas but the gas will remain active and continue to burn the skin until removed by the alcohol or by soap and water. Vaseline should not be used. Alcohol should never be put into eyes.

FLUSH EYES WITH BORIC ACID SOLUTION AND/OR COMMERCIAL EYE DROPS

This will relieve some of the pain. Be sure that your eye drops are labeled "isotonic" as these are the safest, avoid drops containing pilocarpine or epinephrine as they may be dangerous to some people.

PREVENTION OF BURNING

There is a mixture that will inactivate the gas, it is very useful for anyone with sensitive skin or in general and is safe. Mix 8 to 10 eggs, 1 cup water, and 1 tablespoon of baking soda. Beat well and slather all over exposed skin. This can be stored in tightly closed plastic bottles for several days.

OTHER REMINDERS

Remove outer clothing as soon as you are going indoors to prevent contamination of indoor air by gas clinging to clothing. Gas and Mace will wash out of hair and clothing with soap and water. Hair should be washed as soon as possible if it has been exposed. There are several rare complications that can come of gas and for these it is best to have a trained medic or see one of the medics at the demonstration.

Comrades,

Welcome! In this here packet is the basic information on the Last Patrol and the Miami actions.

Our route will take 5 days and travel over 1600 miles. We will be traveling on Interstate #95 all the way (except the first day from Boston to New York City).

Wednesday

August 16th, ~~Tuesday~~: leave Boston, camp at Ferry Point park in the Bronx, New York (under the Whitestone Bridge). For the evening some folks there leading us and some good ole singing songs.

August 17th, Thursday: Assemble in Ferry Point park at 9 AM. leave New York at 10 AM. Cross George Washington Bridge and onto New Jersey Turnpike, cross Delaware Memorial Bridge and STOP at first service area on Delaware Turnpike (8.3 miles off bridge, middle of road, left turn) to meet Philadelphia folks and gas up cars. Leave: proceed on past Baltimore through Harbor tunnel to I495 (Washington Beltway east) Exit at 36S, down Rt. 5 (Branch Ave.) to Allenton Rd., take right turn, go to Temple Hill Rd, campsite (Davies Memorial Unitarian Church, 7400 Temple Hill Rd, Camp Springs Md., phone 301 449-4308). If any problems, call the church or 301 449-4308 or 301 439-2639. Folks from Baltimore and Washington areas will join us at camp and provide peanut butter sandwiches.

Actions for the night will be discussed at campsite. In the area is Andrews AFB, Ft. Meade, and Ft. Belvoir, the Pentagon, the White House.

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Congress, the Dept. of Labor, the Supreme Court etc. Folks should think creatively of potential actions. The whole group could do an action or small groups could do several actions. We cannot get busted so keep that in mind. Please talk about this in your car and be prepared to discuss once we arrive in the campsite.

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August 18, Friday: Leave, proceed to Fayetteville and Ft. Bragg.

There are 50,000 GI's at Ft. Bragg, the largest unit being the 82nd airborne division. The brothers in the 82nd are being ordered to Miami for "riot control duty" (they will be staying at Homestead AFB in Miami, so keep that in mind when we're in Miami).

The GI Union, the active duty organization at Ft. Bragg, will have tasks for us once we arrive and will also have the campsite. Please try to follow their directions - they'll know best what we should do and how we should do it.

The GI Union has asked us to do guerilla theatre in their bookstore, the GI Center (919) 497-8062. We haven't been able to prepare it for the packet so if you can, think up ideas of what to do - please do. Write down the script, practice it in your car. We can discuss it at the Washington campsite.

We have been in contact with the active duty marines organization at Camp Lejune. (They publish a newspaper called RAGE) About 4 hour drive from Ft. Bragg and they welcome a visit from us. If you want to visit their bookstore, United to Stand, (919) 346-9534, let your group's leader know and it'll be arranged. Camp Lejune has about 50,000 marines stationed there and the bookstore (where you'd go to visit) is on "the Strip" (at night about 1,000 marines are usually there trying to relax, etc.

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August 19, Saturday: Leave, make time. In S.C., at a roadside rest area we'll meet with a group of GI's from Charleston Naval Base and Ft. Jackson (some will join us to go to Miami). We'll also have lunch there. Plans are to just rap about why we're going to Miami, and to hear about the struggle in the GI movement from the brothers and sisters.

We'll drive past Jacksonville and the campsite will be near Daytona Beach. We'll meet the other two routes (one coming from the West Coast, one coming from Champaign #11). The night will probably be discussion of what's coming down in Miami and our relationship to the actions.

August 20, Sunday, Drive to Miami. We'll park outside Miami Beach itself. There is a possibility that we'll march from the parking lots into Miami Beach and Flamingo Park. We don't know how far the parking lot is from the park, so if it is too far, we'll take public transportation. Each morning, we'll distribute an information leaflet with new developments relevant to us. We'll also have a short meeting to discuss anything necessary before we leave.

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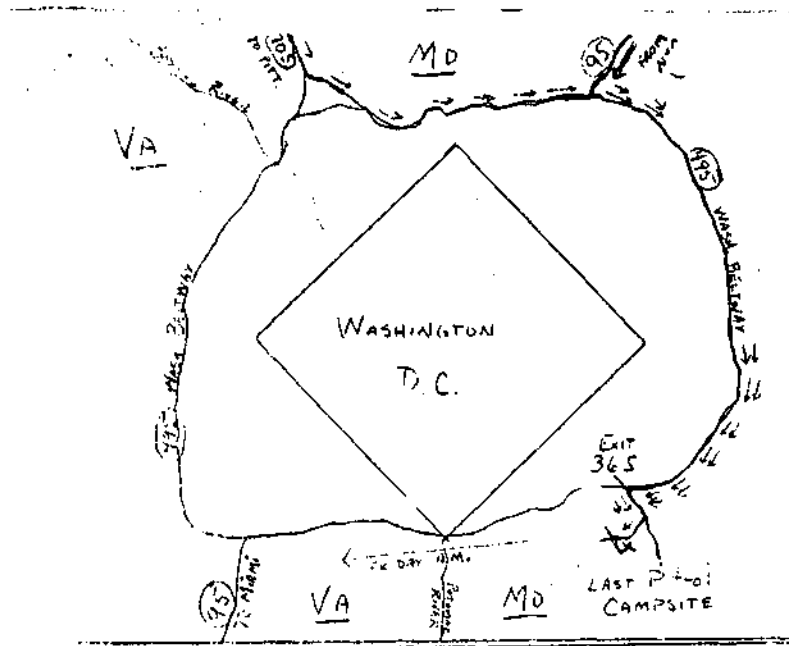
VWAW GUIDELINES FOR THE LAST PATROL

1. Please no drugs. If you have prescription drugs, have the prescription. The medical team will have all the necessary medicine.
2. The lead vehicle will maintain the legal speed limit or if not able to do so, will adjust their speed to a maintainable one for all vehicles.
3. Vehicles should maintain 1 car length between vehicles for every 10 miles per hour we're traveling (for example, 60 mph, 6 car lengths).
4. Vehicle lights should be on when driving at all times.
5. If the lead vehicle (light blue VW, NY1) motions us to stop for emergency instructions, pull over.
6. Stay in right lane at all times (unless rear, lead or headquarters directs otherwise).
7. If you need a medical vehicle, pull off road, hang blue pennant out drivers window, they'll stop; for maintenance, hang out red pennant, they'll stop.
8. When re-entering the convoy, pull in before the last vehicle, and then at the next stop, rejoin your regular position.
9. If the convoy stops unexpectedly, please stay in line. The lead or rear vehicle will come by and tell you what the problem is.
10. Obey traffic laws.
11. Pick up all trash after stops, no littering from the cars.
12. Gas up: There will be scheduled gas stops. If you need emergency gas, pull off road and wave blue flag.

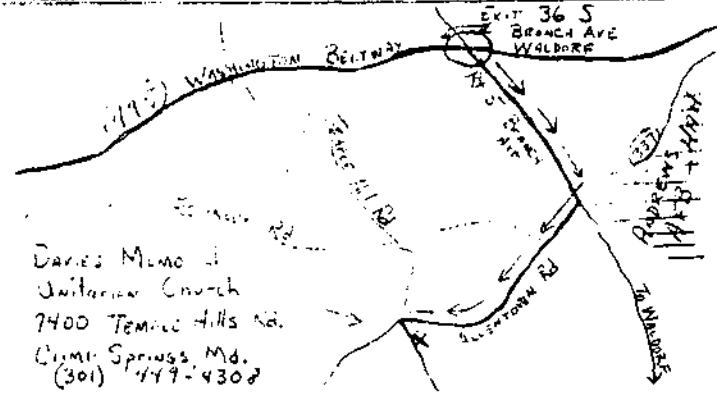

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The Eastern segment of the VVAW Operation Last Patrol, the VVAW caravans that traveled to the Republican National Convention, Miami Beach, Florida, originated in Boston, Massachusetts on August 16, 1972, and met with the New York Contingent at Ferry Point Park, Bronx, New York, on that date. About twelve automobiles arrived from Boston. On August 17, 1972, about twenty five automobiles departed the Bronx, New York at 12:30 P.M. and arrived at the Davies Memorial Unitarian Church, 7400 Temple Hill Road, Camp Springs, Maryland, on that date. Contingents from Baltimore, Maryland and Washington, D.C. joined the caravan at that location. The caravan at this point consisting of about thirty five automobiles and 140 people departed Camp Springs, Maryland, at 6:30 A.M. on August 18, 1972, and arrived at Fayetteville, North Carolina on that same afternoon. Some members of the caravan visited the GI Center outside of Fort Bragg, North Carolina. The caravan arrived at Jacksonville, Florida on the evening of August 19, 1972 and at Flamingo Park, Miami Beach, Florida, at about 12:00 on August 20, 1972. No unusual incidents or trouble occurred during the journey. U

B. Activities in the New York City Area

1. Seizure of Statue of Liberty, New York, December 26-28, 1971

It was learned on December 5, 1971, that the VVAW was planning an "Action" at the Statue of Liberty, New York, during December 1971. The "Action" might consist of seizing the Statue of Liberty for a period of time. Source had no further information in this matter. Jru

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During December 26-28, 1971, [REDACTED] National Park Service, Statue of Liberty, Liberty Island, New York, advised as follows:

(u) At 7:30 P.M., December 26, 1971, it was determined that a number of persons had barricaded themselves inside the Statue of Liberty monument on Liberty Island, New York. They claimed to be members of the VVAW. Information released to the press by the VVAW indicated that the demonstration at the Statue of Liberty was being conducted by sixteen members of the VVAW protesting the war in Indochina. The release indicated that the demonstration would be peaceful and no damage or harm to the monument was intended. The doors to the Statue had been locked by the demonstrators from the inside. The demonstrators had access to all parts of the Statue but the upraised arm. At a conference between an Assistant United States Attorney (AUSA) Southern District of New York (SDNY) and attorneys for the VVAW held early on the morning of December 27, 1971 the VVAW members barricaded in the monument agreed to leave the monument if the following three conditions were met:

1. That the Defense Department broadcast a statement of the position of the VVAW over the Armed Forces Network.
2. That the military newspaper, "Stars and Stripes" carry the position of the VVAW in its next issue.
3. That press conference be held on Liberty Island with at least 100 members of the VVAW in attendance.

On December 28, 1971, United States District Judge, LAWRENCE W. PIERCE, SDNY, issued a Restraining Order, ordering the immediate removal of the sixteen members of the VVAW barricaded in the Statue. (U)

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A Special Agent (SA) of the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) observed on December 28, 1971, at 11:35 A.M. that the demonstrators exited the Statue of Liberty in compliance with the restraining order. They held a five minute press conference at which the spokesman for the group disclaimed receipt of the restraining order and issued a so-called "permanent restraining order from the Court of Liberty, Liberty Island", signed by the group charging President NIXON and the United States Government with violation of the Declaration of Independence, the Constitution of the United States and the Geneva Accords for Waging an illegal and immoral War in Southeast Asia. They demanded an immediate withdrawal of United States troops from Southeast Asia. (U)

(u) The group departed Liberty Island at 12:00 noon on a National Park Service boat bound for Lower Manhattan. No arrests were made and the departure was peaceful and without incident. (U)

Representatives of the National Park Service conducted a search of the Statue and its environs for damages to the Statue and for any hidden explosives. The results of the search indicated that physical damage had been kept to a minimum and was limited to forced entry through a grating door given access to the arm of the Statue where an American Flag had been flown in a distressed position during the occupation of the monument. (U)

The Statue was reopened to the general public for viewing at 2:20 P.M., December 28, 1971. (U)

b7c On January 3, 1972, [REDACTED] furnished a copy of a statement issued by the National Office of the VVAW, New York in the form of a permanent restraining order issued by the VVAW members who had barricaded themselves in the Statue of Liberty during December 26-28, 1971. PERMANENT RESTRAINING ORDER

Upon the complaint of the plaintiff, the People of the World, that the United States Government is waging an illegal and immoral war in Southeast Asia, the Court having heard the arguments of counsel for the plaintiff and the defendant, having found the President and the Government of the United States of America in flagrant violation of the principles of the Declaration of Independence, the Constitution of the United States, the law of nations, the Geneva Convention, and the transcendent moral principles reaffirmed by the tribunal at Nuremberg, the defendants are ordered forthwith:

(u)

- 1) to cease and desist from any and all military activities in Southeast Asia.
- 2) to bring an immediate halt to all bombing in Southeast Asia, which this court finds has been recently escalated to an unprecedented level.
- 3) to immediately withdraw all troops from Southeast Asia as mandated by the Mansfield Amendment recently enacted by the Congress of the United States.
- 4) to, in the future, undertake no action inconsistent with the above stated principles and actions.

COURT OF LIBERTY JUDGES

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2. Petition to United Nations, New York City, December 30,

A group of approximately 30 members of the VVAW from Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, departed Philadelphia on the morning of December 30, 1971 enroute to New York City. Part of the group planned to contact the Soviet Delegation to the United Nations (UN) at the UN Building, New York City to secure their support on a VVAW demand ~~that~~ an emergency session of the UN Security Council be called to resolve the war in Vietnam.

At 12:00 noon on December 30, 1971, three unidentified individuals representing the VVAW attempted to gain admission to the UN Building by alleging to UN Guards that they had an appointment and wished to meet with the Soviet Delegation to the UN to present them with a petition concerning VVAW demands regarding the ending of the war in Vietnam. The three individuals were denied admission to the UN Building by the UN Security Force. They departed the area immediately after presenting to an officer of the New York City Police Department Station outside the UN grounds a copy of the VVAW petition. (U)

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At 2:10 P.M. on December 30, 1971, four representatives of the VVAW appeared at the visitors entrance to the UN and were again denied admittance by the UN Security Guards. The group alleged that they had an appointment and wanted to meet with the Security General of the UN. Upon being denied admittance, the four departed the area without incident. (U)

At 3:05 P.M. on December 30, 1971, a VVAW delegation lead by AL HUBBARD attempted to negotiate with UN Security Guards at the main entrance to the UN Building for admission into the building to present a petition to the Security Council. The VVAW delegation was again denied admission into the UN Building. (U)

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A few minutes thereafter the President of the UN Security Council, Ambassador ISMAEL BYNE TAYLOR-KAMARA of Sierra Leone, came out of the UN Building and conferred under cordial conditions for about five minutes with the VVAW Delegation. The Ambassador denied the request of the VVAW Delegation for admission to the UN to present its petition to the Security Council. A copy of the petition was handed to the Ambassador who received it and returned into the UN Building. The VVAW contingent then dispersed at about 3:12 P. M. (U)

Source furnished a copy of the VVAW petition to the UN. The petition states as follows:

(u) "Vietnam Veterans Against the War petition the Secretary General of the United Nations to convene immediately an emergency meeting of the United Nations Security Council; And that the Secretary General on behalf of Vietnam Veterans Against the War (a portion of whose membership is presently exposed to serious and imminent danger by virtue of their enforced presence in Indochina) put before the Security Council the following:

"1. That the Security Council instruct the United States Government to cease and desist forthwith all bombings, reconnaissance, strafing, support and other flights (with the exception of medical evaluation flights and transport flights of existing personnel and equipment) over the countries of Vietnam, Cambodia and Laos.

"2. That the Security Council instruct the United States Government and its allies to cease immediately all hostile acts against the peoples of the countries of Vietnam, Cambodia and Laos.

"3. That the Security Council instruct the United States Government to set a date certain in the immediate future for the withdrawal of the totality of the United States Forces and their allies from the countries of Vietnam, Cambodia and Laos.

"4. That the Security Council instruct the United States Government to commence immediate negotiations in earnest

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at the Paris Peace talks with the delegations of the ~~SECRET~~ Democratic Republic and the Provisional Revolutionary Governments of Vietnam for the immediate adoption of the Provisional Revolutionary Government's 7 Point Peace Proposal of June 1, 1971

"5. That the Security Council instruct the Democratic Republic and the Provisional Revolutionary Governments of Vietnam and their allies to, upon adoption of the Provisional Revolutionary Government's 7 Point Peace Proposal, commence the immediate release of all Prisoners of War by their respective Governments.

(A) "6. That the Security Council instruct the United States Government, the Saigon Regime and their allies to immediately, upon adoption of the Provisional Revolutionary Government's 7 Point Peace Proposal, commence the release of all Political Prisoners held by the Saigon Regime and all Prisoners of War held by the United States Forces and their allies.

"7. That the Security Council instruct the International Control Commission to begin immediately the supervision of all flights over the countries of Vietnam, Cambodia and Laos and the adherence by all parties to the instructions of the Security Council.

"8. That the Secretary General, in the event of the exercise of vetoes in the Security Council, be required to convene immediately an emergency session of the General Assembly of the United Nations for the purpose of resolving the dispute.

"9. That the Secretary General and the presiding officers of the Security Council and the General Assembly to permit representatives of Vietnam Veterans Against the War to be in attendance at all deliberations of their respective bodies on those questions.

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"10. That the Secretary General permit Vietnam Veterans Against the War representatives access to United Nations' grounds for the purpose of lobbying delegates of member nations.

"11. That the Secretary General permit Vietnam Veterans Against the War representatives to conduct a non-disruptive vigil on the United Nations' grounds in an area agreed upon by the Secretary General and the National Coordinators of Vietnam Veterans Against the War.

"12. That the Secretary General within reason assist the National Coordinators of Vietnam Veterans Against the War and their staff in obtaining audiences with the ambassadors of the countries whose names appear on the attached list.

3. Demonstration Times Square, New York City
(NYC), December 31, 1971

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The VVAW planned to conduct guerrilla theater-type demonstrations in the Times Square area of NYC on New Year's Eve, December 31, 1971. (U)

About 100 demonstrators marched into Times Square, NYC, from Seventh Avenue, at 11:15 PM, December 31, 1971, where thousands of New Year's Eve celebrators had gathered. Most wore Army fatigue jackets with VVAW emblem attached. Signs carried by demonstrators carried the names of VVAW, American Serviceman's Union (ASU) and National Peace Action Coalition (NPAC). The demonstrators carried black balloons and located themselves on 43rd Street, between Seventh Avenue and Broadway. Demonstrators carried signs calling for the end of the war in Vietnam and an end to the escalation of the bombing. At 12:00 midnight, the demonstrators released a large number of black balloons into the air. At 12:10 AM, on January 1, 1972, the demonstrators disappeared into the milling throng of celebrators. No incidents or arrests were noted. (U)

4. Meeting on Drugs at Columbia University,
NYC, February 19, 1972

A meeting on drugs, sponsored by the VVAW and the Committee of Concerned Asian Scholars (CCAS) was held at the Foreign Students Center, Columbia University, NYC, on February 19, 1972, between 11:00 AM and 2:30 PM. About 45 persons attended, some from the VVAW, others from CCAS. There were nine speakers. The first two were males from an organization called Drug Mending Zone (DMZ). These two stuck to the subject of the drug problem. The speakers from the VVAW and the CCAS attempted to indict the United States (US) Government, particularly the Central Intelligence Agency (CIA) and the Military of trafficking in drugs. (U)

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5. Demonstration at Office of Congressman
JAMES GROVER, Babylon, New York (NY),

A demonstration protesting the continuation of the war in Vietnam, was held at the office of Congressman JAMES GROVER, 1801 Argyle Square, Babylon, NY, on February 28, 1972, between 11:15 AM and 2:30 PM. The demonstration was sponsored by the VVAW and Women's Strike for Peace (WSP). 20 persons participated in the demonstration which consisted of marching in the immediate area of Congressman GROVER's office. The demonstration was peaceful and no incidents or arrests were noted.

6. Demonstration at Statue of Liberty,

The demonstrators appeared to have poor leadership and the group appeared to be disorganized. The demonstrators departed Liberty Island at 3:00 PM on April 8, 1972. No incidents or arrests were noted. (U)

It was learned that the VVAW would sponsor an anti-Vietnam war demonstration at the JJCCJ, 360 Park Avenue South, NYC, on April 20, 1972, starting at 12:00 noon. *JK*

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Demonstrators gathered on the sidewalk adjacent to 360 Park Avenue South, NYC, which is partially occupied by the JJCCJ at 11:50 AM, on April 20, 1972. The demonstrators carried anti-war signs along with signs and emblems of the VVAW. No incidents or arrests were noted. (U) *JK*

An organization called the Veteran's Action Task Force (VATF), operating out of the National Office of the VVAW, NYC, planned a march from the DMZ, 1027 East 167th Street, Bronx, NY, at 9:00 AM, April 21, 1972 to the VA Hospital, First Avenue and East 24th Street, NYC, to protest the lack of treatment afforded addicted Veterans by VA Hospital. The VATF is made up of addicted and formerly addicted Veterans. (U)

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It was observed that there was no activity at the location of the DMZ, 1027 East 167th Street, Bronx, NY, on April 21, 1972, between 9:00 AM and 11:00 AM. (U)

The demonstrators, numbering about 200, marched in a picket line at the entrance to the VA Hospital at East 24th Street, until 2:45 PM, when the demonstration ended. Leaflets distributed by the demonstrators indicated the sponsorship of the demonstration to be the VATF, 25 West 26th Street, NYC, location of the VVAW. Representatives of the DMZ and the VVAW met with the Director of the VA Hospital and presented the objectives of the demonstration as to raise funds for the DMZ and VVAW, to make the VA aware of the existence of these organizations and to obtain VA aid for addicted Veterans. No incidents or arrests were noted. (U)

9. Seizure of Office of Director of VA,
NYC, April 21, 1972

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On April 21, 1972, [REDACTED] VA, 252 Seventh Avenue, NYC, advised that 18 young "hippie" appearing males seized the Office of the Director of the VA, 252 Seventh Avenue, NYC, 16th Floor, at 12:45 PM, on April 21, 1972, by entering the office and locking its doors. An Assistant Director of the VA, NYC, conferred with the group which claimed to be associated with the VVAW and the DMZ. The group expressed a desire to enter into negotiation with the VA over the VA treatment and aid for drug addicted Veterans. (U)

On April 21, 1972, [REDACTED] VA, NYC, advised that the VA officials conferred at length with the VVAW group, which declined to depart the seized office. At 7:50 PM, officers of the New York City Police Department (NYCPD) broke down the doors to the seized office and arrested the 18 on charges of trespass. (U)

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At 4:00 PM on April 21, 1972, about 30 VVAW members were demonstrating at the VA Office, 252 Seventh Avenue, NYC, in support of the group that had seized the Office of the VA Director. More demonstrators were expected from other anti-war demonstrations occurring in NYC on that day. *JK*

Statement of the Veterans

During the past three weeks President Nixon has escalated the war in Southeast Asia to unprecedented heights as witnessed by the bombing of Hanoi and Haiphong. Nixon claims to be winding down the war and to be protecting the lives of American servicemen and women. This is an out and out lie. During the past week the Third Marine Division has moved from Okinawa and now sits off the coast of Quang Tri ready for an assault. This is not withdrawal nor is it a secret plan to end the war. It is a definite attempt to finally slaughter the peoples of Indochina. President Nixon has shown once again that his major interest is not for peace, but for military conquest.

Today in New York addicted veterans of Vietnam are protesting the fact that the Veterans Administration treats only 417 addicted veterans in the three VA hospitals in New York City when there are an estimated 10,000 addicted veterans in this city.

We have taken this symbolic action to dramatize the fact that the Nixon Administration cares neither for the peoples of Indochina, nor for the people of America; neither for the withdrawal of the troops from Southeast Asia, nor for the veterans who want to withdraw from heroin addiction.

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10. Demonstration at UN, NYC, May 9, 1972

The VVAW National Office, NYC, called for "total disruption" as a result of President NIXON's speech on the night of May 8, 1972, concerning the escalation of the war in Southeast Asia. The VVAW National Office, planned to travel to the UN Headquarters, NYC on May 9, 1972, where representatives of the VVAW planned to address UN members. (U)

Demonstrators began to gather at Hammarskjold Plaza and UN Plaza, NYC, at 10:00 AM on May 9, 1972. At 10:30 AM, AL HUBBARD of the VVAW, speaking through a bull horn, told the demonstrators, numbering about 100, that the demonstration was in protest to the speech of President NIXON on May 8, 1972, in which it was announced that North Vietnamese ports would be mined. HUBBARD stated the demonstration was sponsored by VVAW and People's Coalition for Peace and Justice (PCPJ). HUBBARD announced the VVAW would give the UN 48 hours to hold an emergency meeting to censure the US for its new policy of mining the North Vietnamese ports and that if no action was taken by the UN, efforts would be made to occupy the UN. HUBBARD stated that the VVAW would give the US Congress 72 hours to initiate impeachment proceedings against President NIXON and if this were not done, efforts would be made to conduct a "sit in" in Congress. HUBBARD also announced that at 2:00 PM on that date, the demonstrators would meet with UN representatives of the People's Republic of China (PRC) and the Soviet Union. At 11:05 AM, the demonstrators at that time numbering about 130, moved to the 45th Street entrance to the UN on the east side of UN Plaza. At 12:45 PM, the demonstrators dispersed. (U)

11. Demonstration NYC, May 10, 1972

VVAW members participated in an anti-Vietnam war demonstration at the Headquarters of the International Telephone and Telegraph (ITT) Corporation, Park Avenue and 51st Street, NYC, on the evening of May 10, 1972. VVAW members participated in guerrilla theater with members of the Enraged Ones (EO) at that location. At 6:20 PM the VVAW group and others marched to Times Square, NYC, and sat down on West 42nd Street, between Seventh and Eighth Avenues. The VVAW planned a demonstration at the UN, NYC, on May 11, 1972, starting at 9:00 AM, in protest to the escalation of the war in Vietnam. [During the demonstration, an attempt would be made to "take over" the UN.] X-U

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At 10:00 AM on May 11, 1972, about 25 demonstrators gathered at the 47th Street entrance to the UN on UN Plaza, NYC. Among the demonstrators was AL HUBBARD of the VVAW. At 10:30 AM, five demonstrators jumped the fence surrounding the UN building near the 47th Street entrance onto the UN grounds. They were immediately seized by UN security guards and removed from the UN grounds. Shortly thereafter, three other demonstrators, including AL HUBBARD, jumped over the fence onto the grounds of the UN. They were also immediately seized and evicted by UN security guards. At 11:15 AM, the number of demonstrators had increased to about 150. The crowd was moved by the NYCI from the East Side of UN Plaza to its West Side at the corner of Hammarckjold Plaza, behind police barricades. At 1:00 PM, the number of demonstrators had increased to about 300. Speeches were given, including one by AL HUBBARD who announced that the VVAW in Boston had seized the Captain's cabin of the "U. S. S. Constitution," and that 18 persons had chained themselves to chairs in the UN Security Council. It was announced that in one hour's time, members of the VVAW would chain themselves to the fence outside the UN building. Demonstrators remained in the area until 4:30 PM when they dispersed. No VVAW members were observed to chain themselves to the UN fence. (U)

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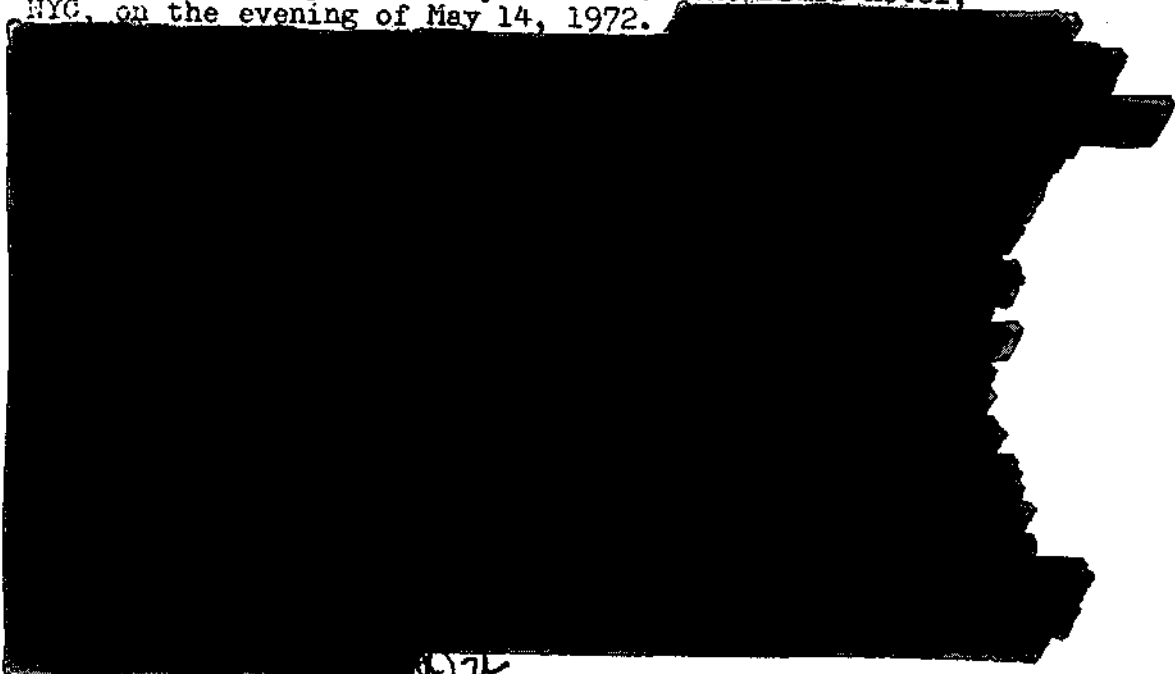

AGNEW at a fund-raising dinner for the Republican Party at that location. About 100 persons participated in the demonstration between 7:30 PM and 9:00 PM. 15. Winter Soldier Investigation (WSI)
NYC, August 2, 3, 1972

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A VVAW-sponsored WSI was held at the auditorium of Baruch College, East 23rd Street and Lexington Avenue, NYC, on August 2-3, 1972. About 100 persons attended the evening session on August 2, 1972. The WSI consisted of a panel of representatives of the CCAS, White Lightning, a drug addiction rehabilitation program, and the VVAW. The main topics discussed by the panel members were drugs and their experience with drugs in Southeast Asia. Some members of the panel gave testimony relating to the alleged involvement of the US Government in drug traffic.

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About 125 persons attended the evening session of the WSI on August 3, 1972. ARTHUR EGENDORF and AL HUBBARD of the VVAW, acted as moderators. The panel consisted of representatives of the Lincoln Hospital, NYC, Detoxification Program, White Lightning, and another drug rehabilitation group in NYC. The discussion centered mainly on existing drug and detoxification programs, including the methadone maintenance programs in NYC. U

CREWS, Deputy Sheriff, Jefferson Parish, Louisiana, testified before the Committee on Internal Security of the United States House of Representatives at Miami, Florida, concerning his participation in an undercover capacity in the Fifth Contingent of the Venceremos Brigade (VB), which worked at constructing residences in Cuba during March 7-May 4, 1972. In a statement, CREWS related that three persons affiliated with the VVAW, including BRIAN ADAMS, VVAW Regional Coordinator for Colorado, journeyed to Cuba with the Fifth Contingent of the VB. A statement and analysis of the VVAW prepared by ADAMS was presented to the Cubans. (U)

3. Japan Gensuikyo

Editions of several Tokyo, Japan newspapers for March 1, 1972, reported that ALFRED HUBBARD would speak at the Bikini rally, Tokyo, on March 1, 1972, concerning the transmission of nuclear weapons from 1960 to 1963 into Japan and Okinawa. The rally was sponsored by Japan Gensuikyo (the Association for Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons) (JG). (U)

One result of the trip was that a request had been made that members of the VVAW accompany any delegation from the United States which visits Hanoi in the future. HUBBARD also reported that the VVAW can send tapes and literature to Hanoi for use on Liberation Radio. HUBBARD had brought back from Hanoi tape recordings and films of conversations with several American Prisoners of War. (u)

CARROUTH, Tallahassee, Florida, advised that subpoenas had been issued by the United States District Court (USDC), Northern District of Florida, Tallahassee, for the appearance of approximately 25 individuals associated with the VVAW before a Federal Grand Jury (FGJ), on July 10, 1972, at Tallahassee. All but one of those subpoenaed appeared before the FGJ during the week of July 10, 1972, and on July 13, 1972, the FGJ handed down indictments against the following individuals:

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On October 18, 1972, AUSA CARROUTH advised that additional testimony concerning the matter of the July 13, 1972 indictments was presented to the FGJ, Tallahassee, Florida, on October 17, 1972 and October 18, 1972. The FGJ returned a superseding indictment adding the name of JOHN K. BRIGGS and STANLEY K. MICHELSEN JR. on October 18, 1972. The indictment is set out in part as follows: (U)

"THE GRAND JURY CHARGES:

"That on or about April 1, 1972, continuing to and including the date of the return of this indictment, in the Northern District of Florida and elsewhere,

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"destructive devices, which had not been registered in the National Firearms Registration and Transfer Record, in violation of Title 26, United States Code, Section 5861(d); and to possess firearms, that is, destructive devices, which were made without the payment of the making tax, in violation of Title 26, United States Code, Section 5861

(u) "It was the part of the said conspiracy that the defendants and the unindicted co-conspirators would organize numerous 'fire teams' to attack with automatic weapons fire and incendiary devices police stations, police cars, and stores in Miami Beach, Florida, on various dates between August 21 and 24, 1972; that the defendants and the unindicted co-conspirators would fire lead weights, 'fried' marbles, ball bearings, 'cherry' bombs, and smoke bombs at police in Miami Beach, Florida, on various dates between August 21 and 24, 1972, by means of wrist rocket slingshots and cross bows; that the defendants and the unindicted co-conspirators would disrupt communications systems in Miami Beach, Florida, on various dates between August 21 and 24, 1972.

"COUNT TWO

"THE GRAND JURY CHARGES FURTHER.

"That on or about May 27, 1972, at Gainesville, in the Northern District of Florida,

"SCOTT CAMIL

did teach and demonstrate to William Patterson, Peter Mahoney, Robert Wayne Beverly and others the use, application, and making of incendiary devices and the use and application of techniques capable of causing injury or death to persons, knowing, having reason to know, and intending that such incendiary devices and techniques capable of causing injury or death to persons would be unlawfully employed for use in, and in furtherance of, a civil disorder which may obstruct, delay, and adversely affect commerce, the movement of articles and commodities in commerce, and the conduct and performance of a federally protected function, in violation of Title 18, United States Code, Section 238(a)(1).

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"COUNT THREE"

"THE GRAND JURY CHARGES FURTHER:

"That on or about May 27, 1972, at Gainesville, Florida, in the Northern District of Florida,

"SCOTT CAMIL

knowingly possessed a firearm, that is, a destructive device consisting of potassium permanganate placed in glycerin, which had not been registered to him in the National Firearms Registration and Transfer Record, as required by Chapter 53, Title 26, United States Code, in violation of Sections 5861(d) and 5871, Title 26, United States Code.

"COUNT FOUR"

"THE GRAND JURY CHARGES FURTHER:

"That on or about July 26, 1972, at Gainesville, Florida in the Northern District of Florida,

"STANLEY K. MICHELSON, JR.

knowing that Scott Camil taught and demonstrated the use, application and making of incendiary devices and the use and application of techniques capable of causing injury or death to persons having reason to know and intending that such incendiary devices and techniques would be unlawfully employed for use in and in furtherance of a civil disorder; and knowing that John K. Briggs, Scott Camil, John W. Kniffin, William J. Patterson, Peter P. Mahoney, Alton C. Foss and Donald P. Perdue and others knowing] and unlawfully conspired, combined, confederated and agreed together to travel in interstate commerce from outside the State of Florida to Miami Beach, Florida, on or about August 21, 1972, to organize, promote, encourage and participate in a riot, to maliciously damage and destroy by means of explosives buildings, vehicles and other

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"personal and real property used in interstate commerce, to use explosives to commit felonies prosecutable in courts of the United States, to possess firearms, that is, destructive devices which had not been registered in the National Firearms Registration and Transfer Records, and to possess firearms, that is, destructive devices, which were made without the payment of the making tax, the said Stanley K. Michelson, Jr., did give assistance and comfort to the said Scott Camil, John W. Kniffin, William J. Patterson, Peter P. Mahoney, Alton C. Foss and Donald P. Perdue, with intent thereby to hinder and prevent their trial and punishment, in violation of Title 18, United States Code, Section 3.

"THE GRAND JURY CHARGES FURTHER:

The ASU was founded in 1968, by the Workers World Party (WWP). Its objective is to cause discontent among military enlisted personnel and call for the establishment of a servicemen's union. Its main propaganda weapon is the publication "The Bond - The Servicemen's Newspaper". (U)

Attica Brigade

Attica Brigade is self-described as an NYC based student-based, anti-imperialist democratic organization that views imperialism as the main enemy of the people of the world. (U)

Committee of Concerned Asian Scholars (CCAS)

Newsletter Number 3 of the CCAS defined the CCAS as an organization of Asian Scholars at Columbia University, NYC, seeking to change American policy in Asia. (U)

Emma Goldman Brigade

The Emma Goldman Brigade (EGB) is an NYC based organization formed during March, 1972, for purpose of demonstrating at 51st Anniversary of the Women's Republican Club Luncheon, held NYC, March 11, 1972. The purpose of the organization is to expose the imperialist system within the United States and to dramatize the United States involvement in the War in Southeast Asia. (U)

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The Enraged Ones

The Enraged Ones is an organization formed in March, 1972, to coordinate radical election year strategy in the Northeastern part of the United States. Its office is located at 135 West 4th Street, NYC. (U)

Indochina Peace Campaign

Indochina Peace Campaign was formed during September, 1972, with the aim of keeping the war in Vietnam in the forefront of the 1972 national election. It operates out of the National Office of the Peoples Coalition for Peace and Justice (PCPJ), NYC. (U)

Liberation News Service

Liberation News Service is self-described as an underground news wire service, with headquarters in New York City, which publishes news packets weekly that are sold to radical New Left underground newspapers. It was founded in 1967, and reportedly has a paid circulation over 600. (U)

National Peace Action Coalition

The National Peace Action Coalition was founded in 1970 by members of the Socialist Workers Party (SWP). Its basic objective is to unite masses of people including labor unions, GIs, and the black community in the struggle to end United States intervention in Southeast Asia through orderly and peaceful tactics. (U)

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Peoples Coalition for Peace and Justice (PCPJ)

PCPJ is self-described as a broad coalition of local and national organizations including the CPUSA, committed to conducting demonstrations aimed at ending the war in Indochina, and poverty, racism and injustice at home. Its National Office is located at 156 Fifth Avenue, NYC. (U)

Socialist Workers Party (SWP)

The SWP has been designated pursuant to Executive Order 10450. (U)

Venceremos Brigade (VB)

The VB was formed in June, 1969, by a coalition of "New Left" organizations to encourage American youth to travel to Cuba in defiance of a ban on travel to that country by the United States Department of State. The ostensible purpose of the travel was to assist the CASTRO Regime in the harvesting of sugar cane and other agricultural products and to give young Americans the experience of living in a revolutionary communist country. (U)

Vietnam Peace Parade Committee (VPPC)

VPPC is a local NYC anti-Vietnam War coordinating committee. (U)

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Womens Strike for Peace

Womens Strike for Peace is a national womens organization that has in the past, demonstrated against the draft, nuclear testing and the war in Vietnam. (U)

Workers World Party (WWP)

The WWP was founded in 1959 by individuals who disagreed with policies of the Socialist Workers Party (SWP). The WWP dissidents advocated unconditional support of the Soviet Union and the building of a revolutionary party geared to the overthrow of capitalism. More recently the WWP has called for peaceful solutions to Sino-Soviet disputes, however, the WWP generally supports the People's Republic of China in its ideological differences with the Soviet Union. (U)

World Assembly for Peace

"The New York Times", a daily newspaper published in NYC, issue of February 12, 1972, in a news story on the World Assembly for Peace (WAP) entitled, "800 At Rally Near Paris Say U.S. Sabotaged Talks", described WAP as one of the largest international assemblies ever held on Indochina. The organizers were identified as 48 French organizations, including the Communist Party, the Socialist Party, and interested labor, civic and religious groups. (U)

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Young Socialist Alliance (YSA)

As the youth organization of the Socialist Workers Party (SWP), the YSA serves as the main source of recruitment into that organization. The YSA is described in the masthead of its official publication, "The Young Socialist Organizer", as "A multinational revolutionary socialist youth organization". (U)

Young Workers Liberation League (YWLL)

The YWLL is a front organization of the Communist Party, USA. It was formed as a Marxist-Leninist Youth Group in February, 1970. (U)

According to Atlanta area persons who claim to be knowledgeable in VVAW matters, the current location of VVAW National Headquarters is not known. Headquarters had been located in New York; however, it was anticipated that headquarters would be moved or have been moved to the Mid-West or West Coast.

B. GEORGIA VVAW

In the summer of 1971, a chapter of the National VVAW was formed at Atlanta, Georgia. The Georgia Chapter at Atlanta existed for approximately 10 months, after which time Georgia VVAW shifted to Athens, Georgia, where Georgia VVAW ceased to exist by summer of 1972. It was intended that VVAW be temporary in nature and exist only for the purpose of building a Veterans contingent for the November 18, 1972, National Peace Action Coalition (NPAC) regional anti-war demonstration at Atlanta; however, it was felt that if VVAW were successful in attracting a sizeable Veterans contingent, methods of keeping it alive would be explored.

The National Peace Action Coalition was founded in 1970 by members of the Socialist Workers Party (SWP). Its basic objective is to unite masses of people including labor unions, GIs, and the black community in the struggle to end United States intervention in South-east Asia through orderly and peaceful tactics.

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The NPAC sponsored regional demonstration at Atlanta, on November 18, 1972, attracted 150 to 200 demonstrators and was considered a failure due to peace negotiations underway to resolve the conflict in Vietnam. The Veterans contingent numbered approximately five persons.

A confidential source who has furnished reliable information in the past, stated on the night of December 6, 1972, a meeting sponsored by Vietnam Veterans Against the War (VVAW) met in the Student Union Building on campus at State University College at Oneonta, (SUCO). The meeting lasted for approximately two hours and was open to the public.

Vietnam Veterans Against the War (VVAW) is an anti-war organization organized in 1967, with headquarters in New York City. Its first published objective is "to demand an immediate cessation of fighting and the withdrawal of all American troops from Indo-China".

There were approximately 25 students in attendance and about 60 per cent of the students were Negro or Puerto Rican. The speakers were LARRY HOLMES of the American Servicemen's Union and CHARLES SMITH, an alleged local member of the VVAW organization.

MEMBER OF SUSPECT ORGANIZATION

The American Servicemen's Union (ASU) was founded in 1968, by the Workers World Party (WWP). Its objectives are to cause discontent among military enlisted personnel and call for the establishment of a servicemen's union. Its main propaganda weapon is the publication, "The Bond - The Servicemen's Newspaper".

The Workers World Party (WWP) was founded in 1959 by individuals who disagreed with policies of the Socialist Workers Party (SWP). The WWP dissidents advocated unconditional support of the Soviet Union and the building of a revolutionary party geared to the overthrow of capitalism. More recently, the WWP has called for peaceful solutions to Sino-Soviet border disputes; however, the WWP generally supports the People's Republic of China in its ideological differences with the Soviet Union.

The SWP has been designated pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

This source stated both speakers related the fact that there was a lot of dissension in the armed forces for many reasons, including racism, rising political and moral consciousness among the rank and file G.I.'s, and the oppressiveness of the brass. The speakers stated these situations have led to numerous frame-ups and political trials and they referred to the trial of BILLY DEAN SMITH, black G.I., who was recently charged with the "fragging" deaths of two officers.

This source further stated that they also cited another example, "Camp Mc Coy 3", three anti-war G.I.'s who were organizing against army repression and the war, which led to their being charged with "conspiracy" to blow up Camp Mc Coy.

This source stated at this meeting, SMITH related to the audience the plight of the "Gainesville 8", eight VVAW members charged with conspiracy to disrupt the Republican Convention by using automatic weapons, fire works, and bombs.

On December 11, 1972, a second confidential source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, stated constituents of the VVAW held a meeting for several hours in a room of the Student Union Building on campus at SUCO on December 9, 1972. He estimated there were approximately 50 individuals that attended this meeting and most were from out of town, and he did not know the identity of these persons.

Source furnished the following license registrations of cars parked in the vicinity where the meeting was held and assumed these individuals attended the meeting. The license numbers he furnished are as follows:

He could not furnish any detailed information concerning the purpose of the VVAW meeting.

This source stated CHARLES SMITH, a sophomore student at SUCO seems to be the leader of the VVAW on campus. He stated he hears very little of the organization and does not know of any meetings held by this organization, other than the two meetings held on December 6 and December 9, 1972.

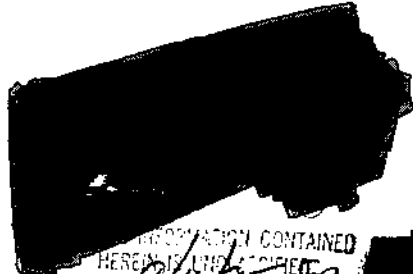

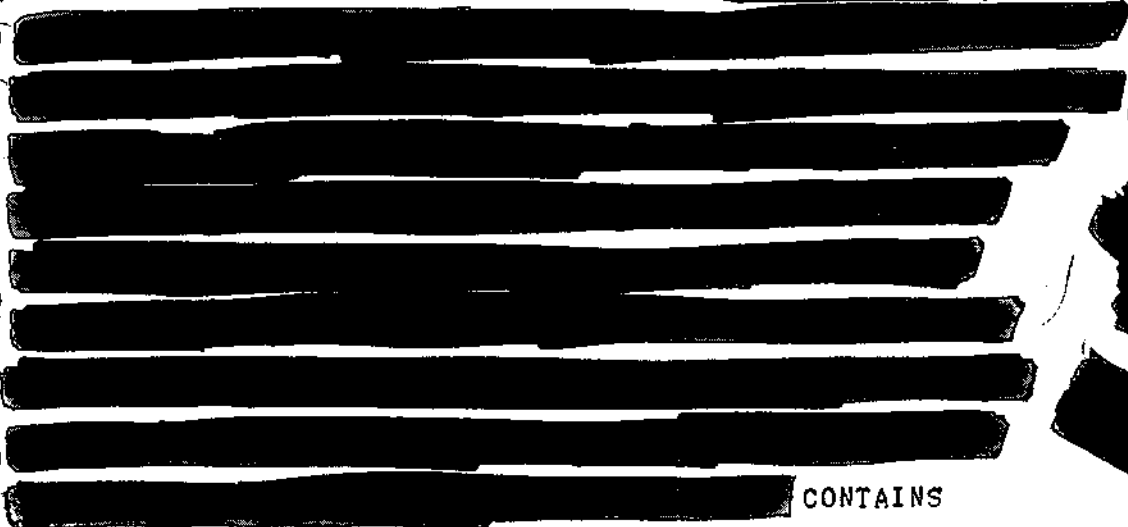

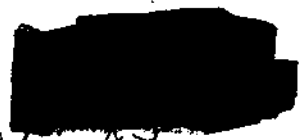

VIETNAM VETERANS AGAINST THE WAR (VVAW)

The VVAW is an antiwar organization organized in 1967, with headquarters in New York City. Its first published objective is "to demand an immediate secession of fighting and the withdrawal of all American troops from Indo-China."

On December 7, 1972, a source who has furnished reliable information in the past advised that the VVAW held a state-wide convention in Sacramento from November 24-26, 1972. Approximately 150 persons attended from various areas of the State of California. The meetings were not formal and were held in different buildings at California State University at Sacramento (CSUS).

The first order of business was for the various chapters to report on the conditions of their chapters, which is as follows:

that this chapter is endeavoring to help returning veterans with what is called "post-Vietnam syndrome" (PVS). Along these lines they are attempting to recruit medical doctors and other professional people to alleviate this problem.

East San Francisco Bay Area

This chapter's report was for all intents and purposes the same as that of Redwood City.

South Bay (Actually one of the Los Angeles Chapters)

This chapter reported the loss of members and felt the reason for this is the fact that no specific goals have been established and the people have lost perspective.

San Jose

This chapter expressed a belief in the right of the Third World people to separate as a nation from the United States by any means necessary.

Monterey

The people from this area expressed elation over the fact that Billy Smith is free. They stated they are organizing military counseling at Fort Ord, California, concerning discharges and also have put on some films and have organized study groups in the community.

Sacramento

This chapter is having funding problems but have as goals organizing within the community and among the students.

Santa Rosa

This chapter seemed mainly to be involved in showing films which were made available through Jane Fonda's group, "The Indo-China Peace Action Campaign".

San Francisco

This chapter reported that it had 300 members out that only 20 are presently active. The feeling is that the effort has "gone to the dogs". The chapter is reported as being \$2,000 in debt.

Long Beach

This chapter is in the process of re-evaluation with emphasis on (a) community action, (b) Third World groups, and (c) community issues as opposed to national issues.

Orange County

This chapter has established a resources committee and they claim they are working with the assistance of the Veterans Administration (VA). Additionally, they are joining with Jane Fonda to assist with the struggle in the Gary Lawton murder case.

San Fernando Valley

This chapter reported apathy among their ranks due to the paranoia regarding the security of the chapter.

San Francisco State College

This chapter is conducting a survey of GIs on the campus to see what they say they need most. The chapter plans to either (a) run for election so they can control the

student government or (b) influence the present leaders of the student government. Whichever plan they adopt, the chapter feels they then will be able to use the money available to the Student Association to help fund the VVAW chapter and its programs.

University of California-Davis (UCD)

This is a brand-new chapter which only has two members.

The next matter taken up at the convention was the regional report given by Sam Schorr from Los Angeles. He started off by stating that the VVAW regional successes are at a "zero level". He complained that there is a lack of support for the regional office, and there is a problem of crowding since the regional office and all seven Los Angeles chapters operate out of the same office. He mentioned that there is a great deficiency in communication among chapters. He stated that the regional conference of the VVAW at Palo Alto was totally unproductive and that the regional office is presently in debt to the tune of \$10,000.

Schorr mentioned that Scott Camille (phonetic) and five others from the Gainesville, Florida area are going on tour to talk about what happened during the Republican and Democratic Conventions. People interested in having this group speak may call the regional office for details.

Schorr informed the delegates that there are U. S. military records available at St. Louis, Missouri, and that a person can obtain a copy of any record for a fee of \$5. He suggested that if any person needed his background checked, this could be done by sending that amount of money to the "people" in San Francisco.

AN INTRODUCTION TO THE VIETNAM VETERANS AGAINST THE WAR

With the membership approaching 20,000, Vietnam Veterans Against the War has experienced one of the fastest growths any movement organization has ever had. In the fifty states of the Union, in Puerto Rico, Canada, Vietnam, Okinawa, Thailand, and Europe, VVAW members and chapters have been active in the fight against US aggression, and for peace and justice. Here in California, VVAW has 30 chapters, 7 in the LA area alone.

In the spring of 1967, during one of the many and now almost forgotten demonstrations against the war in Indochina, six veterans of the Vietnam war marched together, holding a banner proclaiming, "Vietnam Veterans Against the War". Few people, including the six veterans themselves, could have realized that VVAW would continue to grow in numbers, despite every effort of the administration and public apathy, that this organization would be recognized by governments of the world as one of the most effective forces in the anti-war movement, that whenever a member of this organization said something, the world would listen.

First the veterans established chapters and, although they were located in some of the farthest reaches of the United States, they kept a steady stream of communication between them, exchanging ideas and experiences, helping others hundreds of miles away to tell the people of this country about the real truths of this war. They talked to the people on the streets. At first they were a curiosity, attired in faded military fatigues and hair not cut to military regulations. Some veterans were invited to speak on the radio and television. But still they were a curiosity. They took money out of their own pockets, or sold newspapers, or gave up smoking cigarettes to support this fledgeling organization. And between heart flutters, it continued to grow.

By the beginning of 1968, VVAW had established dozens of chapters. With a base of 500-600 members, they opened a national office in New York, started publishing a serviceman's newspaper from Chicago called the "Vietnam GI", and took every opportunity to speak about their experiences in the war whenever clubs, radio stations, television programs, newspapers, or people on street corners would listen.

By the summer of 1968, through the fall-off of public support for the peace movement after President Johnson's April 1 abdication speech and the draining of energies by the political campaigns, VVAW was financially broke and had to close down its New York office. Because of their determination to carry on the struggle to the end of the war in Vietnam, regardless of financial resources, 50 veterans, one from each state, flew, drove, or hitched-hiked to the Democratic National Convention to lobby with the delegates in support of an anti-war platform. Instead of being listened to, they were teargassed.

With the renewed activity of the peace movement and the popular response to the great anti-war Moral Marches, VVAW again became more than just a paper organization. As it had done before, the revived organization concentrated on speaking and debating engagements, newspaper advertisements and radio and television talk show appearances. By the beginning of 1970 the national membership was approaching 1500 members. However, with the slump in peace activities and public apathy in the winter, VVAW was at a low ebb.

A new direction had to be found to ensure continued survival of the organization. Following the press expose of the My Lai massacre in November 1969, and the Administration's contentions that the shootings at Song My had been an "isolated incident", a number of Vietnam veterans who knew otherwise from their own experience, held a series of war crimes hearings that brought forth Vietnam veterans to testify to American atrocities they had participated in or witnessed. These series of testimonies became known as "Winter Soldier Investigations". The first of these hearings was held in Annapolis, Maryland in February 1970; the second, six weeks later in Springfield, Massachusetts.

Then in May came the invasion of Cambodia, the shootings at Jackson and Kent State, and the national student strikes. Once again VVAW was revived by fresh energies and new applications for membership came in. VVAW members led student strike

on major campuses throughout the country, and for the first time, Vietnam veteran patients in VA hospitals got involved in the peace movement. VVAW national office found itself in a new role of pressuring and lobbying for veterans' rights.

Over the summer of 1970 VVAW gradually grew in membership to over 2,000. The over Labor Day weekend the organization staged an action that catapulted it toward national recognition. The action was "Operation Rapid American Withdrawal (RAW)", a four day, 86 mile simulated search and destroy mission from Morristown, New Jersey to Valley Forge, Pennsylvania. Conducted by actual combat veterans wearing their old jungle fatigues and battle gear and carrying plastic toy M-16 rifles, "Operation RAW" was a mixture of peace march, mobile speak-out and guerrilla theater. Sweeping through the rural back counties of New Jersey and Eastern Pennsylvania, the 150 veterans on the march (who held 110 Purple Heart Medals received between them) distributed leaflets, "cordoned" villages and small towns, "interrogated" and "shot" local civilians (pre-arranged groups of actors), and, in general, tried to recreate the brutal realities of the war.

At the rally at Valley Forge on Labor Day, 1,500 local supporters watched the veterans sweep "on line" down long, grassy slope--the last three hundred yards chanting "Peace... Now"--and carrying five body bags with numbers of US and Vietnamese dead and wounded in them. Then the vets massed in company formation and, on command, broke their plastic weapons to symbolize their determination for peace.

Through the fall, the growing veterans group planned one of its most ambitious efforts. After having held hearings into war crimes in a dozen cities on the East Coast and the Midwest, VVAW decided to hold national hearings involving over 100 Vietnam veterans. These hearings came to be known as "Winter Soldier Investigations."

In the words of Lt. William Crandell, a Vietnam veteran who served with the Americal Division, "'Over the border they send us to kill and to fight for a cause they've forgotten long ago.' These lines of Paul Simon recall to the Vietnam Veterans the causes for which we went to fight in Vietnam and the outrages we were part of because the men who sent us had long ago forgotten the meaning of the words... In the bleak winter of 1776, when the men who had enlisted in the summer were going home because the way was hard and their enlistments were over, Tom Paine wrote, 'These are the times that try men's souls. The summer soldier and the sunshine patriot will in this crisis shrink from the service of his country; but he that stands it now deserves the love and thanks of man and woman.' Like the winter soldiers of 1776 who stayed after they had served their time, we veterans of Vietnam know that America is in grave danger. What threatens our country is not Redcoats or even Reds; it is our crimes that destroy our national unity by separating those of our countrymen who deplore these acts from those of our countrymen who refuse to examine what is being done in America's name."

The "Winter Soldier Investigation" was held in Detroit, Michigan, on January 31, 1971 through February 2nd. This, coupled with a free, full-page advertisement published in the February issue of Playboy magazine, increased the membership considerably.

Because of the depth of feeling brought on by the "Winter Soldier Investigation", another action was planned by VVAW, called "Operation Dewey Canyon III"; a five day operation in Washington, D. C., from April 19 to 23, 1971. Veterans of all wars were invited to join us to protest not only US involvement in Southeast Asia, but also the domestic, social, and political and economic conditions that have caused and permitted the continuance of the war, the deplorable conditions in VA and military hospitals, the inadequacy of GI benefits, and the extraordinary rate of unemployment among Vietnam veterans. Some 2,000 veterans participated in what was regarded by most of the press and public as the most important event to have occurred in the peace movement in a long while. The frustrations, however, were many.

During the week prior to VVAW's arrival in Washington, government attorneys appeared before a federal judge to whom they requested, and were granted, an injunction to forbid the veterans from camping on the Capitol Mall. The injunction was rescinded three days later by the US Court of Appeals. The next day the government took

its case to the Supreme Court and got an order restraining the original injunction. Knowing this fact, the veterans debated through the night about whether they should sleep on the mall and risk arrest, or to obey the injunction. By a vote of 480 to 400, the veterans chose to sleep on the Mall. They remained, and the police did not attempt to enforce the ruling prohibiting their camping. Earlier in that week the gates of Arlington National Cemetery had been slammed shut in the face of veterans and Gold Star Mothers when they attempted to lay two wreaths.

The following day, the gates were opened. When active-duty soldiers and Marines from the 82nd Airborne Div. and the 2nd Marine Div. were ordered to displace the veterans from their campground, they refused. The response of the Washington community and the nation to America's veterans was overwhelmingly sympathetic. Food, clothing, legal help and money for bail were freely given. They carried on lobbying campaigns, gave testimonies before congressional committees, and performed guerrilla theater. It was before the Senate Foreign Relations Committee on April 22, 1971, that Navy Lt. John Kerry gave one of the most eloquent speeches ever heard in recent years.

"I would like to talk to you a little bit about what the result is of the feelings these men (the veterans) carry with them after coming back from Vietnam," Kerry said. "The country doesn't know it yet but it has created a monster in the form of millions of men who have been taught to deal and to trade in violence, and who are given the chance to die for the biggest nothing in history; men who have returned with a sense of anger and a sense of betrayal which no one has yet grasped."

On the afternoon of the last day of "Dewey Canyon III", a father of a soldier who had died in Vietnam, wearing his son's fatigue jacket, brought an old bugle to his lips and played taps as none had ever heard played before. Then, one by one, veterans came forth and threw the medals they had won in combat in Vietnam into a huge bin marked, "Trash".

Since "Dewey Canyon III", VVAW has expanded its programs to help veterans on a national scale. A Veterans Action Group to study and find solutions to problems plaguing the Vietnam-era veteran was formed. This group was the first to realize that the combat experience in Vietnam of the returned veterans can also create casualties; the kind that does not leave scars or are listed in any official Defense Department casualty list. This psychological "wound" became known as "Post-Vietnam Syndrome". Many veterans, unable to adjust from combat situations to peaceful civilian life, return to live in the twilight of society and the law. They became outlaws in the very real sense, committing crimes of violence, engaging in drug trafficking, or themselves becoming victim to drug addiction. VVAW is continuing its effort to seek solutions for PVS.

A legislative liaison office was established a few blocks from the nation's capitol to give the veterans of Vietnam fair representation in affairs pertaining to their welfare. In almost every committee of Congress and the Senate, the voice of a VVAW member has been heard.

Because addicted veterans cannot wait for the enactment and implementation of legislation, VVAW has undertaken the task of providing help in this area. Rehabilitation farms have been established in New Mexico and Virginia, halfway houses in Colorado, and Wisconsin, psychotherapy programs in New York, California and Pennsylvania. Testimonies have been given by dozens of vets about the drug usage and trafficking in Asia by US soldiers and officials. The reality of this shameful episode in American history has not yet been grasped by the American people.

From Cairo, Illinois, a call for help was sent out by the Black Community. VVAW answered that call by providing a "Lifeline to Cairo", a convoy of cars and trucks loaded with food and clothing for the besieged people of Black Cairo. The white community, behind the guns of racist police and hired gunmen, had attempted to starve or destroy the Black people into submission. As long as VVAW continues to exist, the veterans have pledged whatever they can give to the people in their struggle against oppression.

During the Christmas-New Year holiday of 1971, 15 members of VVAW occupied the Statue of Liberty in New York for three days. They planted the flag of the United States upside-down on her crown and protested the continuation of the Indochina War despite public opinion against the war. Messages of support from every state and every country

in the world came to the veterans.

The reputation VVAW has achieved as one of the foremost anti-war organizations in the United States extends throughout the world. Delegations of VVAW have been sent to North Vietnam, Sweden, Japan, and Cuba. Recently, 15 members met with representatives of the Indochinese governments, including the Provisional Revolutionary Government of South Vietnam, in Paris, France.

From six members to 20,000, VVAW has grown because there are veterans who care enough about the future of this country to stay on, even after they have finished their obligatory military duties.

PROJECTS OF THE CALIFORNIA VVAW AND SUPPORTERS

The War in Indochina:

At the time that this is being written, the heaviest bombardment in history is falling on the people of Indochina. We do not believe that Richard Nixon will end the war unless he is forced by public pressure to sign the already agreed upon peace treaty. For those of us that served in Vietnam, it is still a harsh reality. Many brothers still cannot sleep well, still others are in hospitals; not with war wounds of the body, but wounds of the mind. We will struggle until the last vestige of an American war machine is gone from Indochina.

Nuyen Van Troi Children's Hospital:

The Vietnam Veterans Against the War and many other youth organizations around the world have joined together to raise \$500,000 to build a hospital for the children of North Vietnam. As veterans, we realize the first victims of our personal role in the war were the children. They were never our enemies, yet the military as we know all too well is using weapons that strike the innocent as well as combatants. A 1,000 pound bomb dropped from 30,000 feet does not discriminate on what is hit when it explodes. Many of us shot children in the belief that we were defending America. We had been trained well and that training goes on today. So, we have dedicated VVAW's membership to the building of a hospital as a symbol of our resolve to see the wrongs we inflicted on the people and children of Indochina rectified.

Political Prisoners:

VVAW originally did not align itself with the struggle to free political prisoners because we did not see the connection between aggression abroad and repression at home. However, as VVAW began to fight for an end to the war, the membership began to see how many of the people in jail or being jailed were there not because of crimes against other people, but because they were fighting against injustice. The war had taught us that to oppose the wishes of power hungry men like Nixon meant unprecedented armed attack, as is the case in Vietnam. At home, our civil liberties have been eroded to an extent not yet fathomed. Therefore, VVAW is dedicated to the support of political prisoners in their fight for freedom.

We are now engaged in the struggle of Gary Lawton, a black community organizer that the Riverside police are trying to railroad to jail. The evidence against Gary has been shown to be entirely racist in nature. None of the witnesses have tied Gary to the murders of two white policemen other than that a black man was seen running from the murder scene. Gary is a member of VVAW, an ex-Marine sergeant.

VVAW has also just helped to free another black man from injustice, Billy Dean Smith. Billy was just acquitted of murder charges stemming from a grenade murder of two white officers in Vietnam. Because VVAW and other people waged a struggle to get the public aware of the facts behind the fragging charges, the military was forced to have a public trial. Before this public interest, the Army had tried to have Billy courtmartialed in Vietnam. His acquittal was truly a Peoples victory.

Operation County Fair:

While in Miami Beach for the Republican convention members of VVAW's Operation Last Patrol were approached by leaders of the black community and invited to pass through and visit the Peoples Farm in Selma, Alabama. The Farm is an off-shoot of Re surrection City. . . . the black occupation of Washington D. C. in 1968. Upon our arrival at the Farm we saw many of the needs of the black people in that community. We discussed those needs with the people, and we discussed among ourselves the areas where we might be able to offer some assistance on a combined personal and organizational level. The greatest contribution that the Veterans could make, it was found, was to utilize our military experience and training in bringing some badly needed medical assistance to the area. As you know many Veterans were medical personnel in the field in Vietnam. We are going to use many of these personnel, as well as the talents of many other members and supporters in bringing a medical clinic to the people of the black community in and around People's Farm at Selma. Much of the groundwork has already been done; we have arranged for some anti-biotic drugs, we are having the plans drawn up by an architect, we have mobilized sufficient people to make the mechanical aspects of the operation a success, we are presently involved in the fund raising end of the project. . . . it is anticipated that we will need \$5,000 to make the clinic a reality and to staff it and operate it for the first three months. We are also soliciting donations of medical equipment, drugs, sanitation and dietary information. In addition to all of this we are compiling information on draft counseling, education, and employment, as well as political education centered on U. S. Imperialism, racism and sexism.

The name of this operation will be Operation County Fair. The name Operation County Fair is derived from military terminology for operations that were created in Vietnam in the Mid-sixties. These operations were Marine Corps activities based on the then prevalent "Pacification" program. The concept was that a supported rifle company of Marines would move to a village and set up medical aid stations for the villagers. At the same time the Marine intelligence teams would show cartoons and political movies to the villagers, as well as have political indoctrination sessions. In some cases help was given for the rice harvest. It was intended that these operations would win over the support of the people. . . . it proved to be a gross failure. What followed was a mass relocation program that went far in alienating even more of the civilian populace. Our Operation County Fair is within the mechanical framework of the Marine Corps. The difference is that the people we are going to help have asked us to come. We will not indoctrinate, but educate. We are not out to pacify, but to relate and identify. Whereas the goal of the Marine Corps was to neutralize, ours is to create solidarity. Where the Marine Corps blitzed and left, we will establish and follow-up.

VVAW Defense Committee:

This national committee was formed in response to the government's attack on VVAW by trying to indict 8 members of VVAW with outrageous "conspiracy" charges. The best way to explain what is happening in the "Gainesville Conspiracy" is in the words of the defendants themselves:

"What's it all about? Why are they picking on us? What are they trying to prove? These are some of the questions that we have mulled over in our minds since the indictments came down. Here are some of the answers we've come up with.

"The first and most obvious conclusion is that this is not an attack on us as individuals, but rather an attack on the ideas and issues we represent. This is another in a series of attempts on the part of the government to intimidate and discredit the anti-war movement and those who choose to dissent in this country. It is a direct attempt to destroy the Vietnam Veterans Against the War as an organization by destroying its credibility and undermining the base of support it has been building among the people.

"What the government is trying to do is create a dilemma for VVAW by forcing us to waste valuable time, resources, and energy fighting the government's injustice

at a time when protest against the war would be most effective. They are trying to destroy the credibility of VVAW by associating our name with criminal acts cited in the indictment. They don't even need a conviction; all they need do is link the name of VVAW with violence, and they think they can stop people from listening to us. Ultimately, it is an attempt to intimidate the entire movement. The government was totally arbitrary in its choice of defendants. None of us, by any means, a "movement super-star" or even well known among our contemporaries. This is a government warning that anyone who protests too loudly or too effectively could meet the same fate.

"The Nixon Administration has shown a paranoid fear of anyone who disagrees with it, and has gone to outrageous lengths to suppress dissenters. The most blatant example of this is their use of the grand jury. The grand jury system was originally set up to protect the individual citizen from harassment by the government in the form of unsupportable indictments. Supposedly, the government must present evidence before the grand jury and show that it is substantial enough to warrant an indictment. What the government does now, however, is subpoena the people it wants to harass, ask them self-incriminating questions, and throw them in jail for refusing to answer. If they do answer, they are either charged with the "crime" they were forced to confess to, or charged with perjury if they don't give the answers the government wants. So a person has two choices - talk and go to jail or don't talk and go to jail.

"The invasion of protesting citizen's privacy is done primarily through the use of wire tapping and informers. The government has consistently shown that it has no intention of following the guidelines set up for the use of wire taps. Anyone who protests government policies is subject to having their phone conversations made the property of the FBI. The use of informers is the most pathetic means of invading privacy. Informers generally fall into two categories. There are professional agents who do it as a job, and, if you are not radical enough to fit their needs, they are then happy to provoke you into violent acts or commit the acts themselves and attribute them to you. Then there are the people who are forced to inform or face prosecution themselves. This is the vilest form of blackmail, because the government gives such a person the choice of destroying his friends or going to jail. Many times, these people feel it necessary to lie in order to save their own skins.

"Probably the biggest question in everyone's mind is whether we are, in fact guilty of the crimes we have been accused of. WE ARE NOT GUILTY! The whole existence of VVAW is based on the fact that we who were once the pawns in the systematic destruction of the people and lands of Indochina feel a much greater value for human life than our own government does. Now the government is trying to charge us with the very crime of which we have been accusing them for five years - the total disregard of human lives to achieve their own ends. Since we once participated in their deadly games, the government thinks it will be easy to convince people that we are willing to do it again. If we had not protested - if we were not resisting their criminal war policy - we would be considered heroes on the basis of our war records. Look at the VVAW record and judge for yourself. The only thing we are guilty of is telling the truth. The only danger is our presence to the government because we expose their hypocracies, lies, and criminality better than anyone else."

The Vietnam Veterans Against the War Defense Committee is working to free the brothers in Gainesville. Their case smells of past "conspiracy" cases the government has tried to use, such as the Berrigan brothers and the Chicago 8. VVAW sees this case as another that Nixon is using to stifle us and the anti-war movement with. Help us to defend these brothers and VVAW as a whole against this blatant government attack.

FREE THE GAINESVILLE 8 !

The following are the NATIONAL OBJECTIVES OF VVAW:

1. To demand an immediate cessation of fighting and the withdrawal of all American troops, planes, military, and economic aid from Southeast Asia. We support, as a basis for the cessation of these hostilities, the various peace proposals of the peoples of Southeast Asia, such as the Nine Point Program of the Democratic Republic of Vietnam and the Provisional Revolutionary Government of South Vietnam or such future plans as they develop based upon their right of self-determination and actual control of their own destinies.

2. To demand the immediate termination of all other operations by the United States Government, its agencies and American business interests that are designed to suppress the rightful struggles for liberation and self-determination of the peoples of Africa, Asia, and Latin America. This includes the maintenance of dictatorial governments, economic domination, and the theft of natural resources of other countries. The United States should make reparations in a program acceptable to the Indo-Chinese for all of the damage done by the United States.

3. To Demand that all active-duty servicemen, servicewomen, reservists and National Guard, be afforded the same rights that are guaranteed by the United States Constitution and Bill of Rights that are presently denied by the Uniform Code of Military Justice. We are appalled that our active-duty GI's are treated as less than first class citizens. We endorse the efforts of our active-duty sisters and brothers in their struggle to democratize the military.

4. To support all military personnel refusing to serve against their consciences in wars at home and abroad. We demand that Congress enact legislation FOR THE IMMEDIATE REPATRIATION OF "THOSE BROTHERS AND SISTERS WHO ARE IN PRISON OR IN SELF-EXILE BY REASON OF THEIR REFUSAL TO SERVE IN THE MILITARY. It must also involve an end to all repression and a freeing of all political prisoners.

5. To demand that there be no distinctions as to type of discharges and that a single type of discharge be issued, and that this be retroactive. We also demand that all veterans receive all rights and benefits under the VA; and that compensation for disabilities be based solely upon the degree of disability for veterans and their families, without regard to sex, race, rank, or length of service.

6. To make clear that the United States has never undertaken an extensive, open investigation of American war crimes in Indochina. In Indochina the principles of Neuremburg have been violated. As active-duty and former GI's, we recognize the responsibility and guilt of the individual soldier to refrain from committing war crimes. We also recognize that the responsibility and guilt of war crimes committed in the name of America lies with our policy makers at all levels.

7. Resolved to fight racism, to show Americans that our society is permeated by racism, which manipulates whites into viewing non-whites as inferior or less than human. This racism pushes Third World People through inferior schools to inferior jobs and into combat arms. Thus Third World People are sent off to die in disproportionately high numbers as we kill Asians indiscriminately. We also demand that the United States Military recognize its complicity in America's domestic and international racism.

8. Resolved to fight sexism, to show that sexism plays a major part in promoting war. We must show Americans that our society is permeated by sexism, which forces an inferior status upon women; reducing them to subservient sexual objects, and which robs both men and women of their natural growth. This institutionalized sexism channels women into unfulfilling, lower paying jobs which are servile in nature and purpose; it exploits their bodies for sex and profit; and it degrades and dehumanizes them by a double standard of morality wholly dependent on the myth of male supremacy. This sexism is exploited by the military, officially defining servicewomen as subordinate and thoroughly subjugating them to servile work and the role of a sexual object. We resolve to fight sexism within our society, within our own organization, and within our selves.

9. To support the democratic rights of Americans to unionize and strike to protect their income and safeguard their employment. We consider all legislation designed to suppress these rights, including mandatory arbitration to be illegal, and not in the interests of the American working people. We also demand full employment for all Americans, including free educational and vocational training for all who need or want it. We refuse to participate in the efforts being made to separate us from other working people, making veterans enemies by giving us the charade of employment priority. We condemn this as a method of encouraging military enlistment by the false promise of employment after service. We also condemn the use of GI's, National Guardsmen and Reservists as strikebreakers.

10. To dedicate ourselves to these principles and objectives which directly relate to the imperialist suppression of the People of the World by the United States Government. We understand that this war is imperialist in origin and affirm that the membership of V. V. A. W. is not only concerned with ending this war, but with changing the domestic, social, political, and economic institutions that have caused and perpetuated its continuance.
