In meneral, divilian mun projects, mostly coffee houses, have died out over the mast year. What follows is a memeral analysis of some of the problems that helped reduce the effectiveness of the civilian run projects. What is the goal of doing GI organizing:

The two major goals of organizing active-duty service people back a specific and a general content. The two goals are not exclusive and in fact must go together in forming a complete strategy.

Point one is to stop Imperialism; that is, to negate or reduce the strength of a var machine engaged in aggression and genocide.

Point two is to provide services or actions around service peoples' immediate needs, such as housing, relief from harassment, etc.

In viewing these roots, the workshop decided to focus on the specific problems of working with GIs and then on what specific and general programs VVAN can undertake to achieve these goals.

The primary contradiction in the military today is racism. The struggles of minority GIs provides the focus for current work around the GI movement. It is our opinion that VVAW should see its work on racism has princey in regards to the GI movement. However, the work on racism must also go hand in hand with specific service work for individual GIs, ie military counseling, legal help, etc. We must not loose sight of the human element.

within VVAW. It appears to us that among the veteraus there is an amplification of a common conditioning men experience from birth. Then a men comes in from the bush, he finds it less painful to a to deal with that experience if he has no close personal contacts in Community deal with.

This is carried over into civilian life. If he comes under severe stress, he tends to withdraw completely from the peops people he cares about the most, which often includes a woman.

The problem this created for a women is duel in nature. Because of her primary condition ing, she feels incorrectly that she is merely a back-up force. So, when the man cuts her off, she finds herself with the inability to assert herself.

We have only begun to confront the problems involved. They will continue to face all of us- gradually reduced, we hope. Therefore, we must continue the dialogue webseam last night and so urge that workshops on the position of women within and around VVAW be held- on their own that all future NCMS; Eventually action programs will evolve out of these, giving us greater opportunities to come to grips with these problems.

The PCS is a group of men and women, including ex-GI's, draft resisters, and clergy, who concentrate on building maximum support for the maximum number of anti-war GI's. The first office opened in Monterey, California, and the need for counseling has forced an expansion into six strategic locations which have helped secure conscientious objector and other kinds of discharges for over 500 GI's, and have furnished educational materials, on-base work, and leafleting for thousands more. 

KSU students spying for police: probers

By LYNNE WARNER

Some Kent State University students have been asked by Campus Security Department to be informants or undercover agents since President Glenn A. Olds issued his directive last spring that no students be used for surveillance work, according to a report of four members of the disbanded Campus Security Advisory Committee (CSAC).

The members submitted the report to Olds as a result of "dissatisfaction with the original committee report of June 12, 1972," which they say was an incomplete exchange of information between Olds and the CSAC.

"Evidence has been gathered that certain administrators furnished some students (and not responsible 'leaders from Students Government') with walkie-taikies so that they could keep the administration and police aware of the whereabouts of 'student activists.' We find this appalling and disgraceful, not unlike the neighborhood spy systems of Nazi Germany and Orwell's 1984," the report says.

The report reveals that Campus Security keeps files on political activity of students and faculty and that local clergy are included in intelligence files. It states that consolidation of intelligence files of Kent City Police and KSU Police occurred shortly after May, 1971, much earlier than CSAC

and Kent City Council were led to believe.

The history of undercover agents and covert surveillance is revealed in the report, which calls former undercover agent Reinhold Mohr whose exposure led to a huge controversy at KSU and the filing of a lawsuit against Director of Security James L. Fyke, Olds and others for illegal surveillance, "the tip of an iceberg in terms of the extensive network of paid police."

The report charges that a policy of undercover infiltration has been incorporated since at least 1968 to "discredit and destroy the views and activities of certain political groups and persons."

The history begins with Margaret

Inn Murvay who revealed herself as in RSU police agent in hearings before the Committee on Internal Security of the House of Representatives on June 24 and 25, 1969. "Murvay was working for the police as early as the Oakland sit-in of November of 1968.

"Holding the position of news director for the campus radio station WKSU, Miss Murvay associated with many SDS students at Kent and talked to them, interviewed them in her capacity as a member of the radio station personnel. She would make tapes for the radio station in interviews with activists and others, and then turn copies of the tapes over to the police."

In the police department budget, Miss Murvay was listed as dispatchier, receiving \$5,634 for her regular salary for 1969-1970.

The report also claims that in spring, 1969, several hundred students were led by undercover agents from Kent Hall to Music and Speech Building. The students had gathered at Kent Hall to witness conduct hearings for students involved in a sit-in protesting recruitment on campus by the Oakland Police Department.

The student undercover agents, "who had infiltrated their group and associated with them," informed the group the hearings were moved to Music and Speech and led them there. "Thereafter, the doors were locked and SDS and supporters were not permitted to leave. About five hours later, the Ohio State Patrol arrived and the arrests were made." Charges against all but a few of the 59 arrested were later dropped.

The report cites activities of several other persons believed to be undercover agents, including Charles J. Frankhouser, who was listed as an administrative specialist in the fiscal performance unit of the campus police for the 1971-1972 school year.

"He was in the possession of an expired Cleveland Press pass. Operating under the guise of a newspaper reporter and photographer, Frankhouser would supply university police and administrators with photographs of students participating in peaceful demonstrations."

"Interviews that members of this task force have had with persons attending the memorial services on the Commons contradict Fyke's assertions that Maxwell was not present and that photographic surveillance was not conducted." the report states.

The four CSAC members contend that the policy using undercover agents of both former Director of Security

Donald Schwartzmiller (replaced by Fyke in January, 1971) and Fyke, is dangerous.

"The danger which this policy poses to us all is quite evident. Activists may fear for their very lives, or suspect traps are being prepared so that they might be jailed. The press ought to fear for the unethical abuse our local news services have suffered. There is great concern over the apparent manipulation of news stories broadcast or published by these services.

"With such infiltration of the news services by police agents we are fearful that not only the truth is distorted or withheld from us, but that the most basic facts, necessary to make any assessment of what the truth actually is, are being distorted and withheld."

The four CSAC members deal with their findings concerning the Mohr incident and another student informer allegedly instrumental in a late 1971 drug arrest in a separate report to Olds.

y files at KSU police: probers find

Four members of Kent State University's Campus Security Advisory Committee (CSAC) have reported to President Glenn A. Olds that "campus police do in fact keep files on political activities.

The four members prefaced their report with the comment that "several members of this committee have displayed dissatisfaction with the original committee report of June 12, 1972," which stated that the committee did not find it to be true that campus police keep files on political activities.

The report claims that there is a "discrepancy between what Olds says and claims ought to be done and will be done, and between what (KSU Director of Security James L) Fyke says and claims has been done and what he continues to do."

The report quotes Fyke as saying that "President Olds can't be privy to criminal matters; should not be included in operational details of surveillance activity."

The report states that also in the KSU files are the names of local ministers, "filed by name and not according to the organization or church to which they belong or to which they serve as adviser.

"Mr. Fyke attempted to explain this by saying this is simply an information file (much like the master file with the dispatcher) used for phone, address, etc. information. The point is, if Mr. Fyke needs to contact a local minister for one reason or another, why does he not list them under a professional or organizational category rather than the minister's name? ... Statements to the CSAC would indicate the possibility that clergy are included in this file because of their activities in the community."

At a later meeting of CSAC, Fyke said that clergy names are fisieu ac

cording to their profession, not must be asked regarding the procedure for inclusion of clergy in intelligence files. What other citizens are included in these files?" the report reads.

The report also deals with the committee's efforts to investigate and advise on what it believed to be the 'proposed" consolidation of records between Kent city and KSU police.

In April, the committee planned to study plans for the proposed con-solidation. At that time, according to the report, Fyke told a subcommittee of CSAC that "none of the file folders were exchanged and consolidated with

other police agencies."

The file folders kept by the security department contain "raw data" and Fyke keeps an index card which corresponds with each intelligence file, The cards contain the name, a code which identifies the nature of the offense and other data.

A memo dated Aug. 3 from Com-mittee Chairman Earle Roberts to Olds "The committee is very concerned over the proposed consolidation of records as it pertains to campus security intelligence files. The committee strongly recommends that intelligence files not be physically moved or consolidated with the Kent police files for a minimum of two weeks to allow the committee to study the impace of such a move."

However, at a meeting of the CSAC Aug. 18, "Fyke said that the index card file began about May, 1971, and consolidation of such index cards with the Ohio State Patrol and Kent City Police occurred shortly thereafter.'

The report states that at the Aug. 13 meeting "Fyke totally reversed his previous statements. First, he said that folders too were sometimes consolidated.

"Then, later he said that at least 90 per cent of his intelligence data had been consolidated. The first records that were consolidated between city and campus police were the intelligence files (including data, not just index cards). They were of first priority,' said Fyke."


With regard to the cooperation of the two Kent police departments in drug investigations and campus disruptions most cases are joint cases, the report states.

Information had been exchanged on a weekly or bi-weekly basis at joint meetings of local police departments.

The report concluded that "Mr. Fyke

misled the subcommittee and the CSAC (and apparently the Kent City Council) to believe that intelligence files and the information contained therein had not been consolidated. However, we find that this consolidation has already occurred — that it is not a plan for the future, but is instead a fact of the past.

A subcommittee of CSAC was charged with the task of reviewing the records and record systems of the campus police "Because of the sensitive nature and the raw data in the files," the subcommittee agreed to

view only the index cards.
"In doing this, the subcommittee became incapable of adequately fulfilling its charge of determining what information is gathered. As a matter of fact, viewing only the index cards and thus learning the names of some who are included in this datagathering and data-filing system, was contrary to the directives given the committee," the report says.

The subcommittee found that the intelligence files plus index cards system has been in operation for slightly less than a year and has 3,000 cards, some dating back five years. "The range of campus folk included, both student and faculty, appeared to be rather broad and the maintenance of the system appeared rather poor, etg., many of the records were without offense identifying codes."

Criterion for inclusion in the files afe: an arrestee or suspect with possible arrest imminent for the following offenses: narcotics, violent activity (revolutionary), gambling, prostitution; names submitted by other departments; person who is a con-tinuing source of information; victim; sex-related crimes; pornography.

'In view of some of the names included, criterion is not closely adhered to," the subcommittee report states.
The files appeared to the sub-

committee to consist of principally raw data including newspaper clippings, pictures and data from surveillance at railies. Any law enforcement agency has access to this "largely unverified" information. "The chief was not clear as to whether or not he had power to periodically purge these files.

The subcommittee also reported that the Ravenna chief of police "is concerned about the close relationship between the City of Kent and the campus security. He opposes movement towards a countywide communications system and any other joint effort because of concern about losing his autonomy. The chief suggested that campus security get out of the police business and permit the City of Kent to assume this function."

Portage County Sheriff Joseph Hegedus, the report states, recommended that campus security retain its police functions because to change would place other agencies under a great deal of pressure, plus "the culture of the university is such that it needs to police its own. The sheriff has felt the need to increase its campus surveillance since the reduction of

campus security's efforts in this area."

Several federal agencies operate du KSU's campus from time to time, "often without knowledge of campus security. They range from the Secret Service, when threatening language has been used toward the president, to Internal Revenue when bogus money is circulated. The most active are the FBI and the Treasury Dept. (drug traffic). Army Intelligence investigates when there is an ROTC problem."

The subcommittee recommended that campus security's policy of transmittal, both formal and informal, to other agencies, be reviewed, and that the department initiate steps to purge files of those who have not committed a crime nor are likely to commit one. Only 15 of the 3,000 files

are active.

Names and groups included in the index cards are reported to be Prof. Jerry Lewis, adviser of SDS and Vietnam Veterans Against the War; Ken Johnson, former president of VVAW; Kent Gay Liberation Front and Black United Students.

The report also revealed that campus police conduct all background investigations for the university civil service employment. "What is the relationship between the personnel and the police departments, especially in terms of file-keeping and file-sharing?"

The report was submitted to Olds by four student members — Thomas Anderson, Tobie Fixler, Alan Morris and Michael White - after the com-

mittee disbanded last week.

Dissension torn SU spy probers disband

Kent State University's Campus Scirity Advisory Committee has difbanded following internal charges and countercharges of "conflict of interests."

The five student members of the committee, none of whom voted to disband, told KSU President Glenn A. Olds that they favor continuance of the committee, but feel that the committee did not fulfill the charges given to it by the president when he created it 10 months ago - to investigate and advise him on policies of the Campus Security Department.

We see this failure as a result of lack of direction given to the committee by its chairperson and members of the committee. Most importantly, the lack of direction was obstructed by the Director of Security, James Fyke. By contradicting himself a number of times before the committee and refusing to give the committee much needed information, he made it impossible to set up any type of trusting or helpful relationship with the se-curity force," the students told Olds in p letter.

The students charged that Fylde "was able to obstruct the committee's action when he gave a false impression that the reason he would not appear on the Campus Security Advisory Committee was that Alan Morris, a plaintiff in a suit against members of the security force, was a student member of the committee."

Morris offered to leave the com-mittee meeting or resign from the committee, but when Fyke was contagted to see if he would appear before the committee in Morris' absence, "the director changed his story and said he would never appear before our committee as long as this lawsuit was

ending. Although it was apparent that Alan Morris' membership on the committee was not responsible for Fyke's non-communication with the committee, several members chose to dwell on this issue," the students said. Fyke said in a letter: "any

discussion of matters which would or could prejudice my defense in the lawsuit brought against me by a member of the committee cannot be discussed, thus my comments with the committee necessarily must be restricted to subjects of a more mundane nature."

Morris was charged with conflict of interest and he countercharged that centain faculty members on the committee may also have conflicting interests. The student members con-tend that the charges led to lack of trust of student members' motives and feelings that some faculty members may have interests that conflicted with PANDAR SEENT, ONE an objective analysis of the security Date: 11-28-72 force and its director. ACLU sues Kent over surveillance

The American Civil Liberties Union filed a \$280,000 lawsuit in Federal Court liere today against Kent State University officials, inscluding meturity chief James A. Tyke and campus undercover agent Reinhold Mohr.

The suit was filed on behalf of members of the Kent State Vietnam Veterans Against War.

At a news conference here the ACLU said the acfion was aimed at halting at flattern and practice of unlawful surveillance by university of ficials, by inflitrate and monitoring lawabiling groups in the campus area... Interfering with rights of privacy and trying to provoke unlawful acts.

The suit accuses Fyke and Mohr of setting up a scheme to discredit the plaintiffs and expose them to criminal prosecution by planting untawful weapons in their postuseion.

The alleged plot felt hrough last spring and Mohr was fired by the university on charges that he tried to provoke students into blowing up Rockwell-Hall on Apr. 12. The State Personnel Board of Review or dered him reinstated, however.

Besides the \$2 80,000 confensatory damages, the sullso asks for an unspecified mount in punitive damages.

Firing for political spying at KSU: Olds

Kent State University President Glenn A. Olds promised students Wednesday that if he finds his directive forbidding political surveillance is not being carried out he will fire those responsible for the surveillance.

Asked by a student during the first of his monthly open forums what ac-tion would be taken should he find that files and photographs are kept by the KSU Security Department for purposes of political surveillance, Olds answered "I would take direct action and fire the persons involved.

Olds said that his directives of fall. 1971, and the more comprehensive regulations he established in the spring after a study by his Campus Security Advisory Committee, clearly state that no political surveillance is to table place on the campus. "The university has no business being involved in this. It was not until the Mohr gase emerged that I was mindful that this Was not so.

"Since then I've taken steps to ensure that my directives are carried out." He added that he has met several, times with Director of Security James L. Fyke and is convinced that there are no records kept "that could be remotely described as political surveillance of individuals or groups.

"I personally checked the files yesterday. There are no files kept on rallies. I've taken steps to ensure that Mr. Fyke and all his officers understand my policy and to make sure. no gap exists between my directives and anyone involved in campus security.

The president said that the security department does have photographic equipment in case violence occurs on campus so that proper identification.

can be made of those who violate the law.

Olds said that business files of the security department are public and available in the office of the vice president for business, but certain files on criminal activity, which are the only files kept by the department, must be kept secret for security reasons.

Students suggested that the budget of the security department should be cut rather than other parts of the budget. Olds replied that for many years the department has been organized so that certain personnel "respond to immediate security problems. There are also those who back them up to avert and detect those who break the law. Detection is not simple or easy. This has been part of the budget for a long time. Whether as much as is now being spent is warranted is part of the reason I appointed the committee.'

Other than campus surveillance. most of the discussion centered around the budget crisis that would result from repeal of the state income tax. Olds said that he would not reduce enrollment if the tax is retained but that he does "favor selective admission to improve the quality of programs and students."

A student questioned the logic of eliminating faculty rather than administrators and staff during a university budget crunch. Olds said that seven per cent of the instructional budget goes for academic administrators, including deans and assistant deans.

Surveillance at KSU is protested

The issue of alleged campus surveillance is coming to a head at Kent State University following the rein-statement of former KSD undercover agent Reinhold Mohr, by the State Personnel Board of Review.

That is the consensus of about 90 students who discussed the Mohr case Thursday night sponsored by KSU

Student Senate.

Atty. Howard Allison, who was a member of a panel discussing the issue with students, said, "This issue should bother people, not because Reinhold Mohr was running around with a grenade launcher and machine

gin and telling people to blow up Rockwell Hall. What should upset people is that he was hired to do it. He was getting \$900 a month plus free tuition and books.

"Mohr was a soldier following orders. He was acting within the authority given to him by superiors. So he's not the one that should be fired. It's the ones who told him to do what he did that should have been fired.

"This thing is organized. What upsets me most is that they call this organization a division to investigate organized crime campus. on prostitution, gambling and subversive activities. I've never seen a case of any of these. So they must have wiped thum out.

"Or else they can't justify a \$1 million budget by saying it's going for a bunch of cops handing out parking tickets. They can justify the budget by saying there's thievery and prostitution and destructive groups on campus that need watching," Allison said. He said that at one time the security

department had a \$1 million budget, but it is now cut to about \$600,000.

Alan Morris, vice-president Vietnam Veterans Against the War who was involved in the exposure of Mehr, said "Reinhold Mohr is not what

this thing is all about. It goes to the tip of the security department. Chief James L. Fyke (KSU director of security) and Robert Winkler (conmander of special investigations division) said they authorized Mohr to calry those weapons to enhance his im-

age.
"Policemen in the security department tipped us off about Mohr. What's going on when men within the department find the need to tip off campus groups?"

"It's significant that President Olds didn't know what his chief of police was doing," said Student Body Vicepresident Karen Czujko.

Allison called the KSU Security "autonomous Department an organization," saying that it "takes orders from nobody." He said that he believes KSU President Glenn A. Olds' claim that he was not aware of surveillance activities at the time Mohr was exposed as a KSU undercover agent in the spring.

Allison said that the KSU Security Department has electronic equipment for surveillance. Rev. Michael White, a member of the Campus Security Advisory Board, said that the KSU Security Department has access to files and photographs of students, faculty and organizations including Black United Students and Gay Liberation.

Miss Czujko said "It is a consensus of those present that the real issue is undercover campus surveillance. The Reinhold Mohr case has raised questions about this type of activity at an educational institution. It is repressive in nature and stifles dissent and involvement in affairs that students are interested in.

"What we must do is help bring the issue to a head. We must take action to remove persons involved in this type of activity from the campus.

Court action will be taken, Allison said. An injunction will be requested by American Civil Liberties Union to stop heads of the security department from organizing "illegal surveillance activities."

Students at the meeting also planned dorn rap sessions and other activities to inform students of surveillange activities. They also plan to meet with Ohls to discuss the issue with him and urge him to take action on the issue.

Fyke explains role in KSU cop firing

James L. Fyke, director of security at Kent State University, Tuesday afternoon issued a statement concerning his role in the dismissal of Elmer K. Leeper J. from KSU security force on July 24.

Leeper was reinstated to the force last Friday by the state Personnel Board of Review. The board criticized Fyke who forwarded his recommendations for Leeper's dismissal to the KSU Director for non-academic personnel, for investigation of Leeper's conduct.

Fyke's statement:

"Certain statements appearing in the Record-Courier on Oct. 16, 1972, were incorrect and misleading. statement was made that James L. Fyke was the appointing authority and the official who issued the order of removal. Both are in error in that the appointing authority, under provisions of the Ohio Revised Code, is the director of non-academic personnel. Only the appointing authority may remove, suspend or demote a civil service employe. It therefore becomes apparent that the comments made about the "appointing authority" by the board did not refer to this department and its members. Departmental officials throughout the campus may recommend action, but have no direct authority to implement any civil service action.

"We are, however, confused by the decision in light of one statement made by the board concerning the allegations of the removal order: "turning now to the evidence presented before this board in support of these most serious charges, the board must first commend the counsel for the appointing authority for his efforts to illicit admissions from the appellant upon cross examination. By following this good

trial tactic, counsel was able to illicit from the appelant an admission of literally every pertinent allegation of the removal order." Nonetheless, the department recognizes the good faith of the board and has promptly moved to execute the order of preinstatement."

KSU prexy 'shocked' over Mohr hearing

Kent State University President Glenn A. Olds has made this statement about Thursday's reinstatement of former KSU undercover agent Reinhold Mohr by the State Personnel & O O-Board of Review:

"The order to reinstate Mr. Reinhold Mohr by the State Personnel Board of Review will of course be honored by the university. The Appeal Board was designed as an objective third party review for just such occasions as this, when charges and countercharges, under sworn testimony conflict, and the rights of those involved questioned are in jeopardy.

"You will understand the shock, therefore, of the university at the editorial manner in which the Board dealt with this request. To compare a situation in which charges of intent to incite, to destroy property and life with a "grade B movie"; the counsel of the Attorney General of Ohio on whose advice the university acted, as "buck passing" and-or "appeasement," to assess credibility of testimony on "demeanor" and "tone of voice"; and to take 51/2 months rather than the 30 days generally prescribed for such hearings, with the attendant problems for Mr. Mohr for whose rights they have expressed such concern, strikes the university as placing the shoe on the wrong foot. Nor has the university been able to determine, why all six students whose sworn testimony provoked the suspension were not projerly subpoensed to appear hefore the Board.

'It is common practice, when conflict in rights, interest or testimony is present, in matters described by the Appeal Board as "so serious they would well justify instant dismissas," 32744 and where testimony is provided under oath and thereby subject to charges of perjury, to move adjudication out of the emotionally charged arena of action for dispassionate review. The action of the University was justified. It was not designed to appease anyone. Nor does it seem necessary to apologize for action designed to avert violence, protect the rights of patrolman Mohr, and insure a legal base for testimony of the accusors. As indicated then and now, the university is not designed to be a legal judge, jury arid sentencer in the area of civil service employes. Appeal Boards are for that purpose. One would hope for the future, its appropriate function would be to weigh the evidence and testimony impartially; and not publicly chastise persons or institutions for doing what they are enjoined to do by law, and the civil service which supports them both."

KSU officials hit for 'appeasement'

State board upholds Mohr

COLUMBUS — The State Personnel Board of Review Thursday reinstated former Kent State University Undercover agent Rheinhold Mohr 5, to the university's police force and exonerated him of charges by KSU officials that he advocated "killing pigs" and destroying Rockwell Hall.

The university can now appeal the board's decision to the Portage County Common Pleas Court. Mohr can recover lost wages, which amount to about \$3,200 through the courts.

In an ten - page written decision, board members Earl W. Allison and Frank E. Avren found that Mohr's dismissal was "an attempt to appease certain elements of the campus community and lower their vociferous protestations."

Gircumstances surrounding Mchr's case, they wrote, involved "enough plots and counter-plots, espionage and counter - espionage and 'good guys being the bad guys' and 'bad guys being the good guys' to make several Grade B movies or television series, or at least a paperback novel."

The board severly criticized the university officials for not expediting a hearing for Mohr. "Probably the most disturbing aspect of this case is the fact that a police officer... must wait for a hearing before this board in order to clear himself of accusations which had no merit whatsoever, and ... had togundergo a removal from his position, public embarrassment, and financial

The board commended Security Director James L. Fyke for not recommending Mohr's dismissal.

The board also stated that although the university attempted to appease campus groups, "appeasement only leads the way to more excessive demands and greater confrontation.

"When such appeasement results in a clear - cut violation of the Civil Service laws and the rights of an sindividual, this board must bring it to a quick halt." Mohr was detained by Kent city police on April 24 for possession of illigal weapons — one a Russiad — mide AK-47 automatic rifle — list Miy. Although charges were later dropped after Fyke identified Mohr as a university policeman and federal officials termed the weapons "inoperable" and legal, Mohr was dismissed.

Board members pointed out that the charges "are so serious that they would justify instant dismissal from his position." But, they continued, the evidence rebutting the charges "is such that many persons must surely wonder why these charges were ever filed in the first place."

The review board summarily dismissed testimony by three witnesses who testified that Mohr offered to sell weapons and advocated violence.

During the hearing on Mohr's appeal this month, Thomas Grace and Greg Hawthorne—who were roommates while students at Kent State—and Jeffrey Beutler offered testimony that on March 7 Mohr advocated "killing pigs (policemen)."

However, Allison and Avren wrote that because the three witnesses found out that Mohr had them under surveillance, "there is no doubt that at least the basis for bias and prejudice in their testimony was present."

The board also discounted testimony by Grace, Hawthorne and Beutler because "it was the manner of speaking and the tone of voice rather than the content of the answer which detracted from the credibility of the witnesses."

Furthermore, the witnesses were discredited by the board because "it was obvious from the overall testimony that the three accusers were opposed to police surveillance.

"One of the direct results of their accusations against (Mohr) and his removal was to completely end the undercover surveillance at Kent State University."

The haard's decision also pointed out that Mohr was given "a great deal of discretion" in his activities by his superiors. Mohr was hired by KSU as a member of the "mod squad" students who checked university building security in the evenings. Later he was hired by former Police Chief Donald L. Schwartzmiller as an undercover agent assigned to report on campus "activists."

"In this assignment," the decision states, "Mohr had the full confidence of superiors and was given wide latitude as to his working hours, his activities in associating with students and student groups, and the techniques which be could use to gain the confidence of students under surveillance.

"Mohr's activities," it was pointed out, "were known by Schwartzmiller, Security Director Fyke and Special Investigation Commander Robert Winkler."

The board found that "there is no evidence that he either committed or participated in the commission of any act of violence against either persons or property which would have been outside the scope of that authority."

According to the board, Mohr never offered weapons for sale as Reutler had testified. "We need not test the credibility of Beutler because his testimony related only to the sale of the weapons, which we have already struck down as being an invalid charge."

On another point, the board found that Mohr had been "set up" when detained by Kent City Police. "We imagine the unwitting Kent City Police officers were somewhat chagrined when Security Director Fyke was called and had to save his officer from false arrest charges by exposing his true identity as an undercover agent."

true identity as an undercover agent."
That "chagrin" the board wrote,
"was probably mild compared to that
of the accusers and plotters of the
arrest when they learned all criminal
charges against 'fink' had been
dropped."

Apparently, the decision stated, this led to Grace, Hawthorne and Beutler filing affidavits concerning Mohr's dismissal.

Board members questioned why the three did not go to university or police officials at the time of the incident. It was two months after the March 7 incident, when Mohr allegedly offered weapons for sale and advocated "killing pigs," that "they told their version to the proper authorities," according to the board.

The board also was "shocked" to hear evidence that one of the uses of undercover officers was to check on prostitution on the campus, which admittedly exists:

Investigator Winkler had earlier confirmed this at the October hearing.

ACLU: Will Sue In KSU Mohr Case

RENT — The Ohio Americal Civil Liberties Union said Friday it will file suit in Federal court against Kent State University officials in the wake of the State Board of Personnel Review ruling to reinstate former campus undercover agent Reinhold "Ron" Mohr.

Leonard Schwartz, ACLU staff counsel, said the suit will be filed within the next two weeks charging KSU Police Chief James L. Fyke and others with "illegal surveillance and attempted entrapment."

MOHR, 25, was fired by the university May 6 after six students presented affidavits charging he tried to provoke students to violence last March 7, and tried to get students to blow up Rockwell Hall April 12.

The Board exonerated Mohr of all charges and ordered he reinstated with back pay to-

taling \$3,600.

The Board's ruling was highly critical of KSU President Glenn A. Olds and discounted the credibility of three students who appeared to testify at Mohr's hearing Oct. 4.

The three were Thomas Grace, a former student and one of nine wounded by National Guard gunfire May 4, 1970; Greg Hawthorne and Jeffery Beutler, student activists associated with the KSU Vietnam Veterans Against the War, which was primarily responsible for Mohr's arrest.

IN DISCOUNTING the students' testimony the Board

"The first thing to be remembered is that each of these young men was one of the persons the appellant had under surveillance."

"Secondly, the sitting members of the Board were not favorably impressed by the demeanor of these three witnesses on the stand. In several instances, it was the manner of speaking and the tone of voice rather than the content of the answer which detracted from their credibility."

"Thirdly, it was obvious from the overall testimony that the three accusers were opposed to police surveillance. The Board concludes that they had a very direct interest in the outcome of the matter."

Olds has yet to comment on the Board ruling which accused him of "an attempt to appease certain elements of the campus community and lower their vociferous protestations."

MORR was arrested by Kent City Police (unaware of his undercover role) for possession of illegal weapons, which included a Russian AK-47 automatic rifle and a Chinese rocket launcher.

The veterans group admitted setting up Mohr for the arrest because they believed he was dangerous.

Charges were dropped against Mohr the next day, after Federal agents ruled the weapons inoperable.

Olds fired Mohr, taying:
"The university is not equipped to provide a dispassional atmosphere in which a formal hearing may be held to protect the substantive and procedural rights of both Mr. Mohr and his accusers."

ASSISTANT Atty. Gen. Eric Gilbertson, who represented Kent State at the hearing, said "the imiversity and Dr. Olds welle unjustly criticized in the report."

"I don't believe the Board expected us to hold a kangaroo court trial on the campus for Mr. Mohr. The University isn't equipped to handle a hearing of this type. I believe Dr. Olds did the right thing at the time.

"THERE were some serious charges made by the six students and I don't think he (Olds) could ignore them—saying in effect the students were lying. It was necessary for Mohr to be fired so the Board could hear the case. Dr. Olds' position was to get Mr. Mohr a fair and impartial hearing," Gilbertson said.

He added that the university is not likely to appeal the decision.

Fyke said he was pleased with the ruling. He said Mohr would not be reinstated as an undercover agent, but would work in some other capacity for the KSU police.

KEN JOHNSON, former student and president of the veterans group last April, said he was irritated that no one tried to reach him to testify.

Johnson was one of three students subpensed who falled to appear at the hearing.

Johnson said he was "absolutely amazed they could reinstate this character."

"The Vietnam Vets Against the War are not going to let the thing settle down," he added.

fact that a police office, hired and paid by the University to enforce the law and who was apparently performing his duties properly must wait for a hearing before this Board in order to clear himself of accusations which had no merit whatsoever ... and had to undergo removal from his position, public embarrassment and financial loss.

"It is to the credit of Mr. Fyke that he did not recommend this removal."

The decision was signed by members Earl W. Allison and Frank E. Avren, both Republicans. Board Chairman James E. Hughel, a Deniocrat, was absent.

Undercover Agent: Didn't Encourage Violence

COLUMBUS - Three former Kent State University students sought to portray one-time university undercover agent Reinhøld Mohr Wednesday as a man who encouraged violence at Kent.

But Mohr, 25, who is seeking reinstatement to his job on the university police force denied the charges.

Moreover, Mohr's superiors on the force praised his performance and said he always provided "reliable" information.

KSU Police Chief James L. Fyke even acknowledged he had not recommended Mohr be dismissed.

THE modish Mohr listened intently as his behavior was discussed during a four-hour hearing before the State Pelsound Board of Review.

The board's decision is expected within two weeks.

KSU officials were attempting to justify their firing of Mohr last May 6 on charges of malfeasance. Mohr was dismissed after six students submitted affidavits against him alleging improper behav-

Three of the students detailed their charges at the hearing. Two others were subpensed but did not appear, while the third declined to appear because a warrant for his arrest is outstanding.

Failing to answer subpenas were Kenneth Johnson, Norman Caulfield and Michael Brick. Brock faces misdemeanor charges in connection with an alleged flag desecration aincident, if he returns, to Ohio from his home in Eufíalo.

TWO of the witnesses fold essentially the same stories. They were Thomas M. Grace, an unemployed June KSU graduate now living in Syra-



Reinhold Mohr cuse, and Gregory Hawthorn, now a coal miner. They shared an apartment in

They testified that in early March, Mohr brought a Chinese "machine gun" to their apartment. Grace said Mohr "made the statement he thought this would be a good weapon to kill pigs with."

On April 12, they said Mohr visited the apartment again and suggested during a discussion that, as Hawthorne said, "to raise the consciousness of the campus as to why ROTC is a bad thing to have, it might be helpful to blow up the ROTC building."

Hawthorne also said Mohr suggested explosives could be obtained from coal fields and he pointed out Hawthorne would know where to get them.

THE THIRD former student. Jeffrey W. Beutley, said several times between January and April, Mohr offered to sell him unregistered weapons.

On another occasion at Beutler's house. Beutler recalled Mohr saying that the only way "we could stop the harassment and repression was to off a pig or two."

"Off a pig" means to kill a policeman.

UNDER ouestioning by his lawyer, Perry Dickinson of Ravenna, Mohr denied all the charges.

He said he took the Chinese gun to Grace's apartment to try to "strike up a conversation to get useful iliformation" labout illegal weapons on campus. The wearon was not offered to anyone to kill "pigs," he added.

Mohr insisted the gun was inoperable, was only a souvenir and he had received permission from his superiors to use it in his work "to enhance my image."

Mohr was fired after his arrest April 24 by Kent Police for possessing illegal weapons - including the Chinese machine gun. No charges were filed after Federal agents said the weapon was inoperable. ·

Kent Police acted on a tip from students Kenneth Johnson and Allen Morris. They charged Mohr had infiltrated their group - Vietnam Velerans figainst the War — and was trying to set them up for arrest

Mohr denies weapons sale attempt in Kent

COLUMBUS - The State Personnel Board of Review Wednesday heard ex-Kent State University undercover agent Reinhold Mohr deny that he offered to sell university activists illegal weapons or that he suggested "killing pigs."

Mohr is appealing his removal from the Kent State University police force, where he was discharged May 8 after Kent City Police arrested him for possession of illegal firearms. He was released, however, after federal officials termed the weapons - one a Russian-made AK-47 automatic rifle — "inoperable."

The decision, which could cost the university more than \$3,200 in back pay to Mohr, is expected from the board in about two weeks.

Two of the three board members heard Mohr categorically deny charges by three witnesses that he had ever offered the weapon for sale or that he ever suggested radical campus groups "off pigs (kill police)."

Mohr further denied that he had ever suggested destroying Rockwell Hall (ROTC building) with explusives. He said the witnesses, who associated with Mohr during the period "were lying."

Mohr, however, did admit that he used a weapon to obtain information from radical leaders while an undercover agent. He added that his superiors "instructed me to use them to enhance my position."

This was confirmed by Mohr's immediate superiors, University Security Director James L. Fyke and Investigation Section Head Robert F. Winkler.

Winkler said, "We knew he had the weapon." He explained that he then told Fyke, who agreed that "we

weren't going to worry about it."
Winkler added that "we advised him that he could use them to enhance his position with his contacts."

But at least one witness said Mohr did offer to sell him a weapon.

Jeffrey W. Beutler, a former KSU student activist, said Mohr attempted to sell him a German made 9 mm Walthus pistol. Beutler also testified that when he visited Mohr's apartment, the undercover agent showed him the AK-47 rifle and RPG rocket launcher.

Beutler quoted Mohr as saying "now I'm ready for the revolution.

Beutler further contended that Mohr asked him "where he could get a gun fixed." He said, "I referred him to the best I know."

witness. Hawthorne, also a former Kent State student activist, testified that when Mohr first showed him the automatic rifle, Mohr said, "It's nice to kill pigs with."

Hawthorne also contended that Mohr, on April 12, said to "raise the consciousness of the people about the Vietnam war, it would be nice to blow up the ROTC building."

Hawthorne's testimony reiterated by Thomas M. Grace, another KSU graduate. Grace testified that Mohr suggested "killing pigs" and "dynamiting the ROTC building."

According to the university's former security director, Donald Schwartzmiller, Mohr began working for the police department in May, 1970. Mohr, however, was assigned to KSU's "mod squad," a group of students charged with securing buildings in evenings.

Later Mohr "was assigned to keep me informed of the movement of people termed a threat to the security of KSU," Schwartzmiller said.

"His job was to attend demonstrations and meetings," he said.

Schwartzmiller, however, testified that he did not authorize Mohr to sell weapons or "advocate violence."

Eric R. Gilbertson, assistant Ohio Attorney General assigned to represent Ohio's state universities, argued that Mohr "came to them (the witnesses) with weapons to use for illegal purposes. He contended KSU authorities acted correctly in discharging Mohr.

But Mohr's attorney Perry Dickin-son, stated that his client "did what he was paid for. He got set up and was arrested."

Mohr hearing slated to begin Thursday

A hearing has been set for 9 a.m. Thursday on the appeal filed in Common Pleas June 28 by Reinhold Mohr, the 25-year-old undercover agent suspended from the KSU Police Department on a malfeasance charge this spring.

Portage County Common Pleas Judge Albert L. Caris will hear the case.

Mohr is seeking reinstatement to his post with the Kent State University Police Department.

The ex-agent was suspended May 8 after a probe into charges that he encouraged Vietnam Veterans against the War to use violence.

Mohr was arrested by Kent Police April 24 on a possession of firearms charge. KSU students called him an "agent provocateur."

He was cleared of the charge but suspended from the security force in May.

Mohr appealed the suspension May 15 to the Ohio Personnel Board. The board, however, failed to set a hearing on the matter until July 12, after the 30-day time limit set by state statutues.

Mohr is now asking Judge Caris to order his reinstatement on the grounds that state officials failed to comply with state statutes in not setting the hearing within the prescribed time.

Also set for Common Pleas Tuesday is a hearing on a request for a temporary injunction which would force operators of a Kent golf course to do away with a driving range.

The suit was filed June 27 by Franklin Twp. Zoning Inspector David R. Wilson who charges that owners of the Oak Knolls Golf Course, 6700 S.R. 43, Kent, is in violation of township zoning codes.

Wilson contends that the golf course

set up a driving range and installed flood lights, both of which are prohibited by a Nov. 25, 1969 zoning amendment.

He wants the court to issue a mandatory injunction ordering course owners to remove the lights and discontinue operation of the driving range.

That case has been set for 9 a.m. tomorrow.

A court trial involving a Kent woman and car dealer Don Joseph, Inc., is scheduled to begin at 9 a.m. Wednesday in Judge Caris' courtroom.

The woman, Linda D. Holmes of 166 W. Main St., charges that she purchased a 1967 Plymouth from the car dealey in October, 1968, and learned when she ran into car problems that she had no warranty on the vehicle.

Russ prof, ex-KSU officer sue to get reinstated in jobs

Reinhold Mohr, the 25-year-old former Kent State University undercover agent who was suspended from the force on May 8 for "malfeasance in office" has asked the Portage County Common Pleas Court to reinstate him because he was "denied the required hearing" before the State Personnel Board of Review.

In another action filed by former KSU employe Wednesday, Arthur E. Janke, 331 Starr Line Drive, Tallmadge, is asking the court to reappoint him as a Russian instructor.

The Mohr appeal was filed by Ravenna Atty. Perry Dickinson with the Ohio Dept. of State Personnel named as appellee. Representing Janke, who taught Russian at Kent from 1967 until his contract was not renewed for the 1972-73 school year last November is represented by another Ravenna lawyer, J. Phillip Jones. Janke names the KSU board of Trustees and President Glenn Olds as defendants.

Dickinson charged the state review board failed to comply with Ohio law which says an employe has 10 days to file an appeal following his dismissal or suspension and that the board of review has to set a hearing within 30 days of receiving the appeal notice.

Dickinson said he received a notice from the review board Wednesday saying a hearing has been set for 1:30 p.m. July 12 in Columbus. The brief also contained a copy of the Mohr's appeal filed within the 10 day period and nearly two months before the proposed hearing date.

Mohr's remvoal order, signed by Paul W. Mosher, director of non-academic personnel at KSU, charged Mohr "provoked" several students into violence on March 7, 1972 "by offering them unlawful weapons" and again on April 12 he is charged with provoking some of those same students "to destroy with explosives" Rockwell Hall.

The suit asks the court to reinstate Mohr effective May 8.

POLICE SAID Mohr had a Russian made AK-47 machine gun and a Chinese made RPG — a rocket propelled grenade launcher, in h is possession as he was leaving his apartment.

The KSU administration s a i d in a statement that Mohr told police the guns were "inoperative."

"Mohr said he bought the weapons locally within the last two months and they are inoperative," the statement said. Police said they arrested Mohr on a tip he would be carrying the gunsa

"MOHR HAS BEEN a member of the campus security force for two years and is a former member of the Mod Squad' (a section of the undercover force)," said the statement. "For the past year he has been working for the special investigation division, working on narcotics and illegal organized activities....

"The federal authorities will determine if the weapons are illegal and in violation of federal statutes," the statement said. "Mohr will remain in jail pending the outcome of the investigation."

Mohr was charged with is legal possession of firearms.

Plaintiffs, by their attorneys, allege as follows:

JURISDICTION

The jurisdiction of this Court is based upon Title 28, United States Code, sections 1331 and 1343; Title 42, United States Code, section 1983; and the First, Fourth, Fifth, Ninth and Fourteenth Amendments to the Constitution. This Court has jurisdiction over the claims arising under state law pursuant to the doctrine of pendent jurisdiction.

Plaintiffs seek damages from defendants in their individual capacities for deprivation of their constitutional rights, a declaratory P202, and a preliminary and permanent injunction restraining the defendants from engaging in the future in the acts complained of in this Complaint. The amount in controversy exceeds \$10,000, exclusive of interest and costs.

PARTIES

2. Plaintiffs are as follows:

Michael White, a Kent State University student during the period in question who was active in peace-oriented Plaintiffs, in respect of all claims for damages, each Democratic Society: 4. In respect of the claim for declaratory and injunctive relief, plaintiffs sue on behalf of themselves and all others similarly bolitical action groups. situated, pursuant to Rules 23(a), 23(b)(1)(A), 23(b)(2), and 23(b)(3) of the Federal Rules of Civil Procedure. - (b) Defendant Reinhold Mohr, a member of the Kent State University Security Force, assigned to act in an undercover capacity and monitor and infiltrate certain groups in the area of the Kent State University Main campus;
- of Trustees of Kent State University: defendants Baumgardner,
 Clement, Johns, Porthouse, Stopher, Taylor, Tschantz and Williams
 are all members of the Board of Trustees of Kent State University.
 Under the laws of Ohio, the Board of Trustees has general supervisory and rule-making power over Kent State University and is in
 fact the body which has ultimate responsibility for the operations and
 policies of the University and the conduct of its employees.
- (d) Defendant Glenn Olds is, and was during the period here in issue, the President of Kent State University. By virtue of that office, he is and was chief operating officer of the University, with primary responsibility for carrying out the policies of the Board of Trustees and for supervising the conduct of all employees of Kent State University.
- (e) Defendants Williams, Huffman, and Winkler were all employees of Kent State University during the period herein issue and were engaged in security activities in conjunction with defendant Pyke.
 - (f) Each of the defendants is sued in his individual

FIRST CAUSE OF ACTION

- 7. In or about the month of January, 1972, the defendants, together with others whose names are not now known to plaintiffs, acting under color of the State authority conferred by their offices and positions, entered into an agreement and conspiracy to authorize and engage in a course of conduct to subject plaintiffs to deprivations of rights, privileges and immunities secured by the United States Constitution and especially the First, Fourth, Ninth and Fourteenth Amendments thereto. Pursuant to that agreement and to the directives of the defendant Members of the Board of Trustees and defendant Olds, defendants Fyke, Winkler and Mohr, acting in concert with other defendants and their agents, entered into a course of action which did in fact deprive plaintiffs of rights secured by the First, Fourth, Fifth, Ninth and Fourteenth Amendments to the Constitution.
- 8. The overt conduct in which the defendants engaged and which they authorized pursuant to the conspiracy alleged in paragraph 6, supra, was as follows:
- (a) In or about January, 1972, defendant Mohr, acting with the knowledge and at the direction of defendants Fyke and Winkler, "infiltrated" the Kent V.V.A.W. He did so by disguising his identity as a police officer and posing as merely a university student and a Vietnam War veteran who was sympathetic to the purposes of the Kent V.V.A.W. As a result of his imposturing, defendant Mohr joined the Kent V.V.A.W., was invited into the homes and apartments of each of the plaintiffs and taken into their confidence, and was permitted to participate in their meetings and discussions and to share in their privacy. Throughout this period

In addition, as a result of his "infiltration", Defendant Mohr conducted searches of plaintiffs premises, viewed and removed documents and property and, upon information and belief, made copies of same, communicating the information to the other defendants. Such search was never authorized by a search warrant.

- On information and belief, sometime in February, (b) 1972, defendants Fyke, Winkler, Mohr and others embarked upon a scheme to discredit plaintiffs, entrap them and ruin their reputations and expose them to baseless criminal prosecutions by planting weapons on their persons. Defendant Mohr, with the aid of the other defendants or their agents, came into possession of certain weapons, including two weapons which he showed to the plaintiffs and represented to them as a Chinese-made AK-47 machine gun and a Vietnamese rocket-propelled grenade launcher, and tried to induce plaintiffs to accept and use such weapons, urging them to use them to kill police officers, whom he referred to as "pigs". Defendant Mohr further attempted to induce the plaintiffs to purchase weapons from or through him, and he told them he could obtain explosives from sources in Southern Ohio and West Virginia. He also urged the plaintiffs to procure ammunition for his own weapons.
 - (c) In addition, defendant Mohr urged plaintiffs to use explosive devices to blow up campus buildings, including Rockwell Hall, an R.O.T.C. Building.
 - (d) In each instance when defendant Mohr, at the freetion of the other defendants, urged and promoted the foregoing unlawful activities in the presence of the plaintiffs, the

plaintiffs rejected his ungings and caregorically refused to parcula pate in any of his proposed unlawful acts. As a result of defendant ants' illegal and outlandish schemes, as expressed by defendant. Mohr, plaintiffs discovered and exposed defendant Mohr's deceptions and reported his activities to municipal law enforcement authorities who placed him under arrest for unlawful possession of unregistered weapons.

(e) Each of the individual plaintiffs have been subjected by defendants to either a search of his premises or to infiltration at private meetings and conversations in which he was a discussant or to the defendants' efforts to entrap plaintiffs into committing illegal acts or to more than one of the above.

- 9. By the foregoing conduct and conspiracy, the defendants under color of their authority as State officials subjected the plaintiffs to deprivation of rights secured by the Constitution in the following manner:
- (a) Plaintiffs' rights of privacy under the First,

 Fourth, Ninth and Fourteenth Amendments were invaded by the
 unlawful conduct of defendants:
- (b) The illegal entry of defendant Mohr, a police officer, into plaintiffs' private living premises, for the purpose of creating and gathering evidence and information against the plaintiffs, constituted a warrantless, unreasonable search and seizure in violation of the proscriptions of the Fourth and Fourteenth Amendments:
- (c) The defendants' conduct, in invading private meetings of a lawful political organization engaged in no illegal activity and collecting and respecting information about such meetings as a consequence of false identity, inhibited and interfered with, and will continue to inhibit and interfere with, plaintiffs'

 $e_{\rm XC}$ reise of the freedoms of speech, association and assembly $e_{\rm XC}$ and by the First and Fourteenth Amendments.

(d) Defendants' efforts to entrap plaintiffs into committing criminal acts, and to subject them to arrest, criminal trial and damage to their reputations as a consequence, constituted a deprivation of liberty and property without due process at law in violation of the Fifth and Fourteenth Amendments to the constitution, and a threat to so deprive plaintiffs. In addition, such efforts at entrapment, coming as a result of the exercise of First Amendment rights through lawful political activity, have intimidated plaintiffs and interfered with plaintiffs' future exercise of such rights, in violation of the First Amendment to the constitution.

SECOND CAUSE OF ACTION

- 10. Plaintiffs repeat and reallege every allegation con-
- 11. Defendants, by engaging in the foregoing conduct as plaintiffs, deprived them of their rights secured by the laws of Ohio in the following respects:
- (a) Defendants invaded the privacy of plaintiffs by i ruding into premises, living space, meetings and discussions which plaintiffs had a legally protected interest in, and expectation of, privacy. They further invaded plaintiffs' right of privacy when defendant Mohr disclosed to the other defendants, and others, information which had come to his knowledge as a result of intrusion on plaintiffs' privacy and which was not within public twicdge.
- (b) Defendants intentionally attempted to cause to plaintiffs' reputation, and to discredit them, by entraphos them and subjecting them to arrest and trial, which would

- (c) Defendants illegally conspired to achieve the results forth in subparagraph (b) of this paragraph;
- (d) Defendants intentionally attempted to, and succeeded in, causing emotional harm to plaintiffs by harassing them in the inner set forth above so as to intimidate them in their fully lawful privities:

- (e) Defendants, by unconscionable and obtrusive means, contionally interfered with plaintiffs in their conduct of their normal, which activities;
- 12. Upon information and belief defendants committed the acts at forth above in both claims, maliciously and with the full intention that the injuries to plaintiffs should in fact occur.
- 13. Upon information and belief, defendants continue to engage in the unlawful activities set forth above as to the named plaintiffs and as to members of the plaintiffs' class and will continue to subject plaintiffs and other members of their class to deprivations of the rights set forth in the foregoing paragraphs unless the relief sought in this action is granted.
- 14. Plaintiffs believe that, although the granting of compensatory damages and punitive damages will substantially redress the past injuries to the named plaintiffs, and deter further injuries to other mbors of plaintiffs' class, the remedy at law is not fully adequate and should be supplemented with declaratory and injunctive relief much precludes further activities of the kind in which defendants engaged.

WHEREFORE, plaintiffs request that the Court find the defendants to be jointly and severally liable for the injuries suffered

by plaintiffs and grant the following relief:

A. On the First Cause of Action, compensatory damages in the amount of \$20,000 as to each plaintiff and punitive damages in an amount which the Court finds to be just and proper, assessing the relative amounts to be paid by each defendant according to his personal knowledge and degree of complicity in the events set forth above.

- B. On the Second Cause of Action, compensatory and punitive damages in the same amount as the First Cause of Action.
- C. An injunction, enjoining defendants, their agents and successors from authorizing, permitting or engaging in any of the activities set forth above as to any of the plaintiffs and a declaratory judgment declaring the same to be unlawful and limiting the authority of defendants to engage in undercover work to actual crimes which are, in good faith, believed to have occurred or be in the process of occurring prior to the commencement of any such investigations.
 - D. The reasonable costs and attorney fees of plaintiffs.
- E. Such other relief as the Court shall deem just and proper.







On December 24, 1972 at 10:50 PM a Special Agent (SA) of the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) observed 300 individuals conducting a vigil demonstration outside St. Patrick's Cathe**d**ral. The demonstrators stood across the street from the cathedral holding lighted candels and displaying signs which read as follows: "Stop the War", "Stop the Bombing", "We mourn the deaths in Vietnam".

The above mentioned demonstrations was jointly sponsored by the Vietnam Veterans Against the War (VVAW), and the Women's Strike for Peace (WSP).

> The VVAW is a national organization composed primarily of veterans of the war in Vietnam, that has organized and participated in numerous demonstrations against the war in Vietnam during 1970-72, including the seizure of the Statue of Liberty, New York City, and the occupation of the Betsy Ross House, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, in December, 1971. Six members of the VVAW were indicted by a Federal Grand Jury, Tallahassee, Florida, July, 1972, on charge of conspiracy to violate the Federal Antiriot Law.

The VVAW was founded in the spring of 1967 by six young Vietnam veterans in New York City. At the beginning of 1968, with 600 members, VVAW opened a national office, founded the first GI newspaper, "VIETNAM GI", and sent close to 500 veterans into the McCarthy campaign to beat down the red baiters. After getting gassed at the Democratic convention at Chicago and caught in the general "down" of the peace movement. VVAW was nearly inactive until the moratoriums in the fall of 1969. Members of VVAW led student strikes on major campuses across the country and battled Veterans Administration Hospital authorities over threats to throw amputee Vietnam veterans out for signing anti-war petitions. At present, membership of the VVAW nationally consists of 8,500 members.

While assembled at the cemetery, VVAW members were addressed by the head of the Chicago Chapter of the VVAW known to source as Savage, and Savage criticized the Nixon administration for "ravaging the country" and called the President a "war monger". 



VIETNAM VETERANS AGAINST THE WAR REGIONAL CONFERENCE FREDONIA, WISCONSIN DECEMBER 29-31, 1972

VIETNAM VETERANS AGAINST THE WAR

The Vietnam Veterans Against the War (VVAW) has been publicly identified as an organization formed in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, during May, 1971, from the Vietnam veterans who returned from participating in Washington, D. C., demonstrations held during April, 1971. This organization consists of various Vietnam veteran returnees and their main purpose is protesting the war and racism.

A Regional Conference meeting of the VVAW was held at Fredonia, Wisconsin, during the period December 29-31, 1972. Details of this meeting, which were obtained by a confidential source who has provided reliable information in the past, are as follows:

On December 29, 1972, approximately 25 to 30 individuals gathered at 2532 North Holton Avenue in Milwaukee, which is the local chapter headquarters for the VVAW. At approximately 5 p.m., these individuals departed, traveling to the Jewish Community Center Lodge in Fredonia. They were to attend the VVAW Regional Conference scheduled to be held from December 29th through December 31st. This Conference was organized by John/Lindquist, current Regional Coordinator; Ann Bailey, Regional Secretary; and Paul Ruez, Peace Education Director, all of whom are from Milwaukee.

Buzz Noyes, former Regional Coordinator, was noted at the local headquarters for VVAW; however, due to recent factionalism and loss of his position, he did not travel with the group to attend the Conference.

These individuals arrived at the Jewish Community Center Lodge at approximately 7 p.m. As other individuals arrived for the Conference, films and slides on the Vietnam War were shown. The remainder of the evening consisted of socializing and smoking "pot."

Source advised that the majority of individuals present were from the States of Wisconsin and Minnesota, which comprises the Region; however, there were also several individuals from the State of Illinois present.

On December 30, 1972, individuals present registered. Those attending paid a \$5 fee. Approximately 45 people registered, after which slides on the Vietnam War were again shown.

Thereafter, a discussion on objectives of the National VVAW was held. It was noted, during this discussion, that the objectives were formulated at a National Steering Committee meeting held in Palo Alto, California, during September, 1972.

Following a lengthy discussion of the first three objectives, during which each objective was discussed on almost a word-by-word basis, it was decided to change the word "Indochinese" in Objective Number 2 to "Southeast Asia." Following this change, it was decided, by those present, to hold further discussion on the remaining seven objectives at later regional meetings.

The next order of business was the National Budget Report, which was furnished by of Chicago, Illinois. Indicated that although there are currently two to three thousand active VVAW members nationally, the organization as such is without funds. It is stated that the next National Steering Committee meeting will be held in Chicago during the period January 4-8, 1973.

Following report, John Lindquist and Ann Bailey furnished the Regional Report. After this report, discussion ensued regarding various demonstrations which had taken place in Milwaukee during the past four months.

Lindquist then discussed the matter of ANOL soldiers and indicated that in the Milwaukee area individuals who are ANOL could contact for assistance.

Following Lindquist's remarks, those present adjourned for lunch.

After the luncheon recess, Lindquist spoke at length regarding the Post Vietnam Syndrome (PVS), which he compared to the old Army phrase of being "shell shocked." He also described it as a uniquely intense sort of post trauma syndrome.

Along this line, Lindquist described a case history of an individual, whom he claimed was a personal friend, who had served in Vietnam during 1965. Lindquist

indicated this individual had been discharged from the Army for psychiatric reasons and found, upon his return to the United States, that he had to turn to alcohol and drugs to "ease nightmares." During one of these nightmares, his wife awakened him, whereupon he shot and killed her with a gun which he kept nearby. He was subsequently tried and convicted of murder. Lindquist indicated that this individual attempted to seek help from the Veterans Administration but that help was "refused."

Following Lindquist's remarks on PVS, and another individual spoke regarding their attempts to develop new VVAW chapters at Waukesha and Oshkosh, Wisconsin; however, they are having little success in their recruiting attempts.


In this regard, Lindquist mentioned that discussions have been held regarding contacting prisoners at the Wisconsin State Prison at Waupun in an effort to form a VVAW Chapter among the prisoners.

Following the discussion on recruiting and developing new chapters, those present discussed the possibility of individuals from the Region traveling to Washington, D. C., to participate in demonstrations during the Presidential Inauguration in January, 1973. Discussions were also brought forth that six VVAW members would be on trial in Gainesville, Florida, at approximately the same time; and several individuals present felt that instead of traveling to Washington, D. C., the Region should send representatives to Florida to participate in demonstrations being called in support of those members on trial.

Following this voting, the below-listed individuals were elected to attend the National Steering Committee meeting to be held in Chicago from January 4th through January 8th:



PROTESTS DURING PRESIDENTIAL INAUGURAL CEREMONIES, 1973

On January 20, 1973, a confidential source advised that an estimated 2,000 members of the Vietnam Veterans Against the War (VVAW) gathered at Arlington National Cemetery. The gathering began around 9:00 AM, Saturday morning, January 20, 1973, and it was not until around 12:30 PM, that the VVAW gathering began its march in columns of six across the Arlington Memorial Bridge. There were approximately 15 to 20 persons present from the Tampa and St. Petersburg, Florida, area.

The Vietnam Veterans Against the War (VVAW) is a national veterans organization with a national office located at 25 West 26th Street, New York City. Its first published objective is "to demand an immediate cessation of fighting and a withdrawal of all American troops from Indochina."

The VVAW marchers encountered a large group from the National Peace Action Coalition after crossing the bridge and any former organization to the VVAW march was lost at this time as the VVAW members mingled with the National Peace Action Coalition group.

The National Peace Action Coalition was founded in 1970 by members of the Socialist Workers Party (SWP). Its basic objective is to unite masses of people including labor unions, GIs, and the black community in the struggle to end U. S. intervention in Southeast Asia through orderly and peaceful tactics.

The SWP has been designated pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

Members of the VVAW were then requested to sign a Treaty of Peace concerning the war in Vietnam. Source advised that there were apparently only two lines for signing the treaty and that most persons waiting to sign the treaty became restless and tired, and split off in numerous small groups in all directions.

The confidential source advised from this time on the VVAW never again assembled as one group and that various individuals had apparently joined other groups who were milling around the Reflecting Pool and Washington Monument with no apparent plan of demonstration.

Most members and associates of the VVAW began wandering back to their cars at the Arlington National Gemetery and apparently left the Washington, D. C. area in the mid and late afternoon of January 20, 1973.





It is not recommended that the be interviewed at the present time since it is felt that said interview would be counterproductive in terms of current information. Based on subject's activities and background, he is not recommended for the ADEX at the present time. Based on the demise of the VVAW as a viable campus organization in July, 1972, and of the relative lack of activities of both the veterans and the subject since that time, Springfield is going to discontinue active investigation of this case. However, subject's activities will continue to be monitored insofar as possible and should information become available to indicate that the subject is active again in VVAW activities and as a result has become a threat, active investigation will be reinstituted.
