The Vietnam Veterans Against the War (VVAW) is a national organization composed primarily of veterans of the war in Vietnam that has organized and participated in numerous demonstrations against the war in Vietnam during 1970-72, including the seizure of the Statue of Liberty, New York City, and the occupation of the Betsy Ross House, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, in December, 1971. Six members of the VVAW were indicted by a Federal Grand Jury, Tallahassee, Florida, July, 1972 on charges of conspiracy to violate the Federal Antiriot Law.



# II. ACTIVITIES

On February 22, 1972, subject's name and address were obtained from a Vietnam Veterans Against the War (VVAW) list prepared for the purpose of distributing its newspaper, "Hoa Binh" and lists members and supporters of VVAW in the regional areas of Colorado, Wyoming and Utah. The above information was furnished by source number 5.

The VVAW was founded in the spring of 1967 by six young Vietnam veterans in New York City. At the beginning of 1968, with 600 members, VVAW opened a national office, founded the first GI newspaper, "Vietnam GI," and sent close to 500 veterans into the McCarthy campaign to beat down the red baiters. After getting gassed at the Democratic Convention in Chicago and caught in the general "down" of the peace movement, VVAW was nearly inactive until the moratoriums in the Fall of 1969. Members of VVAW led student strikes on major campuses across the country and battled Veterans Administration Hospital authorities over threats to throw amputee Vietnam veterans out for signing anti-war petitions. At present, membership of the VVAW, nationally, consists of 8,500 members.





# PROTESTS DURING PRESIDENTIAL INAUGURAL CEREMONIES, 1973

On January 26, 1973, a confidential source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised as follows:

On Friday, January 19, 1973, Vietnam Veterans Against the War (VVAW) groups began arriving in Washington, - D. C. to gather for participation in the demonstration to be held during the Presidential Inaugural on January 20, 1973.

The Vietnam Veterans Against the War (VVAW) is a national veterans organization with a national office located at 25 West 26th Street, New York City. Its first published objective is "to demand an immediate cessation of fighting and a withdrawal of all American troops from Indochina."

During the day of Friday, January 19, 1973, discussions were held between VVAW members and groups pertaining to the actions to be recommended by the VVAW for the demonstration. Generally agreed upon was that if a small group of VVAW members and supporters showed up for the separate VVAW demonstration at Arlington Cemetery, Arlington, Virginia on the morning of January 20, 1973, the action would be just to sign the nine-point peace treaty and to then go along with the actions of any other groups who would be participating in the demonstration. If a large number of Veterans showed up, the proposal was to obtain 15 pints of blood and dump this blood on the steps of the White House.

# PROTESTS DURING PRESIDENTIAL INAUGURAL CEREMONIES, 1973

On the morning of January 20, 1973, VVAW members and sympathizers from all over the nation met at Arlington Cemetery, Arlington, Virginia, to take part in their demonstration prior to the Inaugural Parade. Approximately 4,000 persons were present at Arlington Cemetery. TIM BUTZ, VVAW leader in Washington, D. C., addressed the group about Vietnam and the nine-point peace treaty to be signed later in the afternoon. BARRY ROMO, anti-war activist, spoke next and told about his stay in Vietnam and the terrible things he had witnessed there. He then introduced an unknown Vietnamese woman who talked about the struggle of the Vietnamese people in their fight for freedom and to unite into one nation and drive imperialism out. said the VVAW and their demonstrations in the United States gave the Vietnamese the strength and courage to fight harder since it lifted their spirits. Those in attendance gave her a standing ovation.

After the speeches, the group then marched from Arlington Cemetery, across Memorial Bridge, to a point on the mall somewhere between the Lincoln Memorial and the Washington Monument. There the nine-point peace treaty was signed by all present, and BUTZ announced that since the number of persons present exceeded those expected, no other actions were planned by the VVAW and those members of the VVAW who wished to continue demonstrating should join with other anti-war groups who would be demonstrating at the Inaugural Parade. Members of the VVAW were upset that nothing further was planned in the name of the VVAW and that the use of the 15 pints of blood was never brought up. By this time, the Inaugural Parade was in progress on Pennsylvania Avenue and due to the great crowds alroady assembled in that area, many of the VVAW members and supporters dispersed and went their own ways instead of joining demonstrators from other groups.

It was learned that the Yippies had planned to burn flags in the vicinity of the Washington Monument and to have a large paper rat float which would ultimately be burned during the Inaugural Parade in an effort to disrupt the Parade. The flags were observed being burned during the day and many were turned upside down on flag staffs

around the Washington Monument; however, the paper rat was never burned because information was received that it was confiscated by Washington, D. C. police.

The Youth International Party, also known as Yippies, is a loosely knit, antiestablishment, revolutionary youth organization formed in New York City in January, 1968.

After the demonstration, many VVAW members went to VVAW headquarters at 1207 East Capital Street, where it was learned that no Veterans had been arrested during the day and no Veterans-had participated in violence.



### DEFENDANTS! MOTION TO DISMISS

Now come the Defendants, James A. Fyke, et al., and move that this Court dismiss the complaint of Plaintiffs, as against all or any of the defendants herein, pursuant to either Rule 12(b)(2) or 12(b)(6) for the reasons that the Court lacks jurisdiction over the persons named herein, or alternatively, that the claim is not one upon which relief can be granted.

### MEMORANDUM IN SUPPORT OF MOTION

- THIS COURT LACKS JURISDICTION OVER THE PERSONS OF THIS CLAIM AS PER RULE 12(b) (2).
  - A. Plaintiffs' claim is against Defendants in their capacity as officers and instrumentalities of the State of Ohio and is therefore barred by the Eleventh Amendment to the United States Constitution.

This suit, although nominally against officers and instrumentalities of the State, in substance and effect is brought against the State of Ohio. It directly and vitally affects the rights and interests of the State in the performance of its highest function; namely, to react swiftly and decisively to insure the

protection of the public security. This position with that of executive immunity has recently been upheld by the United States Court of Appeals for the Sixth Circuit. Krause, Admr., et al. v. Rhodes, et al., No. 711623 (November 17, 1972). That ruling affirmed the earlier decision rendered by this honorable Court.

"We hold that the actions against the Governor, the officers of the National Guard, and the Prasident of Kent State University, are in substance and effect actions against the State of Ohio. Suits against the State are prohibited by the Eleventh Amendment. The Governor, the officers of the Guard, and the President of Kent State University all have executive immunity." Krause at p. 20.

The Eleventh Amendment to the United States Constitution provides that a state may be sued by citizens of another state only upon the consent of the state sued. By judicial interpretation this amendment has been expanded to exclude suits by citizens against their own state, whether brought in state or federal courts, when the state has not consented to the suit. Dugan v. Rank, 372 U.S. 609 (1963); Duhne v. New Jersey, 251 U.S. 311, 40 S.Ct. 154 (1920); Palmer v. State, 247 U.S. 32, 39 S.Ct. 16 (1918), dismissing error 96 Ohio St. 513, 118 N.E. 102; Hans v. Louisiana, 134 U.S. 1, 10 S.Ct. 504 (1890). The fact that a plaintiff's alleged cause of action arises under the Constitution or laws of the United States does not, in itself, preclude the operation of sovereign immunity under the Eleventh Amendment. Palmer v. State, supra; Hans v. Louisiana, supra.

The consent by a state to be sued must be given in clear and unambiguous terms. This waiver must be clearly established in order to be effective. Cooper S.S. Co. v. State of Michigan, 194 F.2d 465, 467 (6th Cir. 1952). Whether Ohio has, in this case, given the required consent is to be determined by local state law. Elmendorf v. Taylor, 10 Wheat. 152, 159 (1825); Old Colony Trust Co. v. Omaha, 230 U.S. 100, 116 (1913). The law of Ohio is clear in this regard.

Article 1, Section 16, of the Ohio Constitution, provides:

"Suits may be brought against the state, in such courts and in such manner, as may be provided by law."

Under the language of this section, suits may be brought against the State of Ohio only in the manner authorized by the General Assembly. In the absence of an enabling statute, the State may not be sued.

"The provision of the Ohio Constitution Article I, Section 16 . . . is not self-executing; and statutory authority is required as a prerequisite to the bringing of suit against the state." Paragraph two of the syllabus of Raudabaugh v. State of Ohio, 96 Ohio St. 513 (1917).

This case has consistently been followed in subsequent Ohio cases.

Krause v. State, 31 Ohio St. 2d 133 (1972), appeal dismissed by
United States Supreme Court, No. 72-589 (December 11, 1972); Wolf

v. Ohio State University Hospital, 170 Ohio St. 49 (1959); State

ex rel. Williams v. Glander, 148 Ohio St. 188 (1947).

In <u>Palmer</u> v. <u>State</u>, 248 U.S. 32 (1918), which grew out of Palmer v. State, 96 Ohio St. 513 (1917), the Supreme Court held:

"The right of individuals to sue a State, in either a federal or state court, cannot be derived from the Constitution or laws of the United States. It can come only from the consent of the State."

The State of Ohio has not consented to be sued in either the state or federal courts under the circumstances alleged in the complaint.

Kent State University is a state institution. Ohio Revised Code, Section 3341.01. Its Board of Trustees is appointed by the governor with the advice and consent of the senate. Ohio Revised

Code, Section 3341.02(B). Likewise, the Board elects the President of the University and such officers as are deemed necessary. Ohio Revised Code, Section 3341.04. Ohio courts have long held that State universities, their officers and instrumantalities, are not amenable to suit. Carolyne v. Youngstown State University, unreported, 7th District Court of Appeals dismissed by Supreme Court of the United States, 404 U.S. 1007 (1972); Schaffer v. Bd. of Trustees, 171 Ohio St. 228 (1960); Thacker v. Bd. of Trustees, 29 Ohio Misc. 33, following Wolf v. Ohio State University Hospital, 170 Ohio St. 49 (1959); State ex rel. Williams v. Glander, 148 Ohio St. 188 (1947).

Accordingly, since all Defendants are being sued for the performance of their official duties as they understand them, they are not amenable to suit in this action and hence are not subject to the jurisdiction of this Court.

B. Plaintiffs' complaint neither presents a distinguishable or definable class sufficient to uphold an action under Rules 23(a), 23(b) (1)(A), 23(b)(2), and 23(b)(3) of the Federal Rules of Civil Procedure, nor establishes that its members are so numerous as to make it impracticable to bring them before the Court.

Prerequisite to bringing a class action is the presence of a clear definition of those represented in the class. Chaffee v.

Johnson, 229 F.Supp. 445 (S.D. Miss. 1964); D & A Motors v.

General Motors Corp., 19 FRD 365, 22 FR Serv. 23a. 11 (S.D. N.Y.

1956). Where there is no clear evidence that the class exists a suit will not be entertained. Carroll v. Associated Musicians,

206 F.Supp. 462 (S.D. N.Y. 1962); Giordano v. Radio Corp. of America,

183 F.2d 558 (C.A. 3d 1950). In 3b Moore's Federal Practice, Section

23.04 at 23-254 (2d Ed. 1969) it is stated:

"These principles apply under the revised rule, perhaps even more forcefully, because under

[Federal Rule 23] (c) (l) 'As soon as practicable after the commencement of an action brought as a class action, the court shall determine by order whether it is to be so maintained.'; under (c) (2) the court must direct a notice to members of the (b) (3) type of class suit that any member may opt out; and under (c) (3) the court's judgment must find who are members of the class. In addition, an appropriate delineation of the class is desirable to determine whether it is to be maintained only with respect to particular issues, or divided into subclasses; in making orders in conduct of the action, particularly in giving the discretionary notice; and in dismissing or compromising the action."

To quote from the complaint: "The class represented by plaintiffs consists of all members of the Kent State University community whom defendants have subjected, or threatened to subject, to the acts set forth below, in deprivation of their First, Fourth, Ninth and Fourteenth Amendment rights including, but not limited to, all members of Kent State Veterans Against The War and other political action groups in the Kent State University community." Complaint, p. 3. Clearly, it would be impossible for any court to determine those persons whom defendants allegedly "subjected, or threatened to subject," not only within "political action groups" but "all members of the Kent State University community."

Therefore, the class action should be dismissed since the members referred to by plaintiffs are not only indeterminable but may very well not even exist. Furthermore, plaintiffs' failure to establish that the members of their class are so numerous as to make it impracticable to bring them before this Court (see F.R. 23(a)), indicates plaintiffs' own uncertainty about their existence, and is additional reason for dismissal of this action. Demarco v. Edens, 390 F.2d 836 (C.A. 2d 1968); Giordano v. Radio Corp. of America, 183 F.2d 558 (C.A. 3d 1950); Atwood v. National Bank of Lima, 115 F.2d 861 (C.A. 6th 1940).

- II. THE COMPLAINT DOES NOT SET FORTH FACTS SUFFICIENT TO CONSTITUTE A CAUSE OF ACTION AGAINST DEFENDANTS.
  - A. The complaint does not set forth a claim that plaintiffs' constitutional rights were violated or that immunities were denied.

Without setting forth a factual claim, plaintiffs allege that their rights under the First, Fourth, Fifth, Ninth, and Fourteenth Amendments to the United States Constitution have been violated. The allegations will be dealt with specifically:

1) Fifth and Fourteenth Amendment Allegations. Here, the complaint alleges that the purported "efforts" and attempts of defendants to entrap, arrest, criminally charge, and damage the reputations of the plaintiffs violated the due process provisions of these amendments. No allegation is made, of course, that any of the above things occurred. Only that defendants made an "effort" to bring about those results.

Apparently plaintiffs would urge that there need be no actual deprivation of liberty.or property to spell out a violation of these rights; rather just an effort to do so. For this, they seek damages and injunctive relief.

There being no allegation whatsoever that plaintiffs were deprived of anything, no cause of action has been spelled out.

2) First and Fourteenth Amendments. Plaintiffs nakedly assert that the defendants have somehow violated their rights to freedom of expression, assembly, and the ability to engage in lawful political activity. This, apparently through "intimidation" and interference which "inhibits" them. No allegation is made that any specific act was committed by any of the defendants in this action which in any way has prevented plaintiffs from exercising any of these rights of expression, assembly, or political action. No allegation is made that plaintiffs' expressions or associations have been suppressed or prevented.

Plaintiffs' sole allegation relates to some "inhibition" they feel in exercising their first amendment rights. "Allegations of a subjective 'chill' are not an adequate substitute for a claim of specific present objective harm or a threat of specific future harm; 'the federal courts established pursuant to Article III of the Constitution do not render advisory opinions'." Laird v. Tatum, 408 U.S. 1, 14 (1972). While it is true that a line of cases found constitutional violations in the "chilling" effect government action had on the exercise of first amendment rights, "In none of these cases, however, did the chilling effect arise merely from the individual's knowledge that a government agency was engaged in certain activities or from the individual's concomitant fear that, armed with the fruits of those activities, the agency might in the future take some other and additional action detrimental to that individual. Rather, in each of these cases, the challenged exercise of governmental power was regulatory, proscriptive, or compulsory in nature, and the complainant was either presently or prospectively subject to the regulations, proscriptions, or compulsions that he was challenging. Laird v. Tatum, supra at 11 (emphasis added).

And the Congression of Springers and Springers and the State of the

Plaintiffs would apparently seek a recovery from this Court because they have developed a paranoia and are plagued with fears that have never been realized. Actions under the Federal Civil Rights Act must be based on real, and not "imagined or speculative" violations of one's constitutional rights. See Younger v. Harris, 401 U.S. 37, 42 (1971); Laird v. Tatum, supra at 12; and Fowler v. United States, 258 F. Supp. 638 (C.D. Cal. 1966), which states at page 645 that:

". . . it has always been the rule that to state a claim against a public official for deprivation of civil rights highly specific facts must be alleged. General conclusionary allegations unsupported by facts have onsistently been rejected as insufficient to constitute a claim under the Civil Rights Acts . . . See also Progress Development Corp. v. Mitchell, 182 F.Supp. 681, 713

(N.P. III. 1960), where the court pointed out that '[t]he mere intention to take some action at some time in the future, which might or might not occur, and which if it does occur might present a situation coming under the Civil Rights Act, does not present any justiciable question under the Civil Rights Act'."

assert that their "right to privacy" was infringed upon by the activities of defendant Mohr, allegedly in "conspiracy" with the other defendants. It should be noted that nowhere is defendant. Mohr alleged to have acted in violation of the law. Nowhere is it alleged that defendant Mohr physicially intruded upon premises under the control of plaintiffs without their permission. It is only alleged that he shared with others information from discussions with plaintiffs that they did not know he intended to share. For this breach of confidence, plaintiffs demand relief from this Court in a Federal Civil Rights Action.

The right to privacy under the Fourth Amendment, in particular, guarantees that persons shall be free from unauthorized and unlawful searches of their persons and premises under their control. Nothing in the complaint even suggests that defendant Mohr, or anyone else, ever entered plaintiffs' premises or participated in their discussions without their express permission. There is no allegation that information or testimony was taken from plaintiffs without a warrant for purposes of criminal prosecution. No criminal prosecution has ever been brought against plaintiffs from such information and none has been alleged.

The constitution does <u>not</u> quarantee that government officials disclose their identity as such to any person; except, perhaps, in instances of arrest. That defendant Mohr is alleged to have breached confidences with those who did not know he was a state employee is <u>not</u>, in of itself, <u>any</u> grounds upon which the relief sought here can be granted. The mere fact that state officials

conduct an investigation does not give rise to an actionable right under the Pederal Civil Rights Act. See <u>Jenkins v. McKeithen</u>, 413 F.2d 660 (5th Cir. 1969).

It is well established that police agents may conduct "undercover" surveillance and not violate the Fourth Amendment in so doing. See Lewis v. United States, 385 U.S. 206 (1966); Hoffa v. United States, 385 U.S. 293 (1966); Lopez v. United States, 373 U.S. 427 (1963); Brown v. Brierley, 438 F.2d 854 (1971), cert. den. 402 U.S. 997. Misplaced confidence that a conversation directed at or carried on in the known presence of an agent will not be repeated does not violate the Fourth Amendment when that agent was present on otherwise private premises by invitation. "The risk of being \* \* \* betrayed by an informer or deceived as to the identity of one with whom one deals is probably inherent in the conditions of human society. It is the kind of risk we necessarily assume whenever we speak." Hoffa, supra at 303, citing the dissenting opinion in Lopez, supra.

B. The complaint does not set forth any cause of action against defendants Olds, Williams, Huffman, and the Board of Trustees in particular.

These defendants are identified in the complaint as either having authority over the operations and/or security activities at the Kent State University, or as being "engaged in security activities with Defendant Fyke." Thereinafter, defendants Huffman and Williams are never again mentioned in the complaints

Defendants Olds and the Board of Trustees of the Kent State University are mentioned only in the clearly spurious allegations of paragraph 7 which recite the almost paranoic complaint that some insidious "agreement and conspiracy" existed to deprive them of their constitutional rights. Thereafter, no specific allegation is made that any of these defendants authorized, directed, knew about or should have known about the activities which plaintiffs accuse

the remaining defendants of. The allegations enumerated under paragraph 8 charge only that defendant Mohr acted in a particular fashion "with the knowledge and at the direction of defendants Fyke and Winkler \* \* \*." It is clear that where damages are sought in a Federal Civil Rights Action, highly specific facts must be alleged.

Danner v. Moore, 306 F.Supp. 433 (D.C. Pa. 1969).

With respect to defendants Huffman and Williams then, this Court only has before it the allegation that they were "engaged in security activities" with defendant Fyke, and that they "entered into an agreement and conspiracy" to deprive plaintiffs of certain purported rights. Allegations concerning any activities in furtherance of such purported conspiracy specifically omit these two defendants.

With respect to defendants Olds and the Board of Trustees, it is only further alleged that they intended a course of action purportedly designed to deprive plaintiffs of some rights. Again, further specific allegations that plaintiffs charge constitute some wrong against them are silent as to any involvement by these defendants.

Defendants would respectfully urge that no claim has been made against these defendants upon which the relief prayed for could be granted.

The law is very clear that a complaint made against a public official must set forth specific allegations of a déprivation of constitutional rights in order to state a cause of action under the Federal Civil Rights Act. See <a href="Friedman v. Younger">Friedman v. Younger</a>, 46 F.R.D. 444 (C.D. Cal. 1969). Blanket conclusory allegations are not sufficient to defeat a motion to dismiss. <a href="Guedry v. Ford">Guedry v. Ford</a>, 431 F.2d 660 (5th Cir. 1970); <a href="Fletcher v. Hood">Fletcher v. Hood</a>, 446 F.2d 14 (3rd Cir. 1971); <a href="Gettlemacher v. Prasse">Gettlemacher v. Prasse</a>, 428 F.2d 1 (3rd Cir. 1970); and <a href="Friedman">Friedman</a>, supra.

C. If plaintiffs' claim for money damages is against defendants personally, it should be dismissed for failure to state a claim upon which relief can be granted under Rule 12(b)(6) since defendants are immune as public officials from 1983 damage actions for acts done in good faith in the performance of their duties as they understand them.

THE STANDARD WINDS AND AND ARREST A

Plaintiffs claim jurisdiction through Title 42, United States
Code, Section 1983. 42 U.S.C. 1983, by its terms, can be the basis
for declaratory, injunctive, or damage actions against state officials for acts depriving a person of constitutional rights, committed
either within or without the scope of their authority under state
law. Monroe v. Pope, 365 U.S. 167, 81 S.Ct. 473 (1961). The Supreme
Court and lower Federal Courts have, however, realized the danger
inherent in permitting Section 1983 damage actions against state
or other public officials without any regard to their need for independence from retribution for their actions, or the injustice inherent
in requiring such an official to be personally liable for damage
caused by an act he performed in good faith as part of his duties
under state laws. They have, therefore, carved certain absolute and
qualified immunities for public officials from the apparently blanket
liability of 42 U.S.C. 1983.

In <u>Pierson</u> v. <u>Ray</u>, 386 U.S. 547, 87 S.Ct. 1213 (1967), the Supreme Court held that a judge had an unqualified or absolute immunity from a damage action under 1983 for sentencing plaintiff under an unconstitutional statute. In the same case, the court held that the police were immune if they acted in good faith and had probable cause to arrest. In effect the court held that the police officers had a qualified immunity from 1983 damage actions.

Lower federal court cases hold that state officials have a qualified immunity from 1983 damage actions for acts done by them in good faith within the scope of their official duties as they understand them.

"Hence I take it as a roughly accurate generalization that members of a city council and other public officers not in the exceptional category of officers having complete immunity, would have a qualified privilege, giving them a defense against civil liability, for harms caused by acts done by them in good faith in performance of their official duty as they understand it." Cobb v. City of Malden, 202 F.2d 701 (1 Cir. 1958) at 707.

Other cases holding that state officials have a qualified immunity from 1983 damage actions are: Kirstein v. Rector and Visitors of the University of Virginia, 309 F.S. 184 (D.C., E.D. Va. 1970) (officers and trustees of state university); Silver v. Dickson, 403 F.2d 642 (9 Cir. 1968) (parole board members); Fanale v. Sheehy, 385 F.2d 866 (2 Cir. 1967) (prosecuting attorney); Rhodes v. Meyer, 334 F.2d 709 (8 Cir. 1964) cert. den'd 379 U.S. 915 (prosecuting attorneys, attorneys, sheriffs, prison officials); Hoffman v. Holden, 268 F.2d 280 (9 Cir. 1959) (prison officials); Kenny v. Fox, 232 F.2d 288 (6 Cir. 1956) cert. den'd 352 U.S. 855 (prosecuting attorney, judge); Dunn v. Gaffola, 216 F.2d 709 (1 Cir. 1954) (reformatory superintendent, commissioner of corrections); Gregoire v. Biddle, 177 F.2d 529 (C.A. 2d 1949).

In <u>Francis</u> v. <u>Lyman</u>, 216 F.2d 583 (1 Cir. 1954) plaintiff was a voluntary juvenile inmate of a school for the feeble-minded who was, allegedly without notice or hearing, committed to a state farm, where he was later assigned to a state reformatory. The plaintiff sued numerous parties for damages under 42 U.S.C. 1983 for his alleged unconstitutional confinement, including the superintendents of the state farm and reformatory. The court affirmed the dismissal of plaintiff's complaint as to these parties for failure to state a claim upon which relief could be granted, stating that the superintendents acted in the good faith performance of what they believed to be their official duty.

In Nelson v. Knox, 256 F. 2d 312 (1958), the Sixth Circuit
Court of Appeals adopted the "qualified immunity" position, set out
above by Judge Magruder in Cobb v. City of Malden, supra, in holding
that the Mayor and Commissioners of Huntington Woods, Michigan,
were immune from a 1983 damage action for the alleged intentional
destruction of plaintiff's garage business by passing an arbitrary
and discriminatory ordinance. The court affirmed the dismissal of
the district court.

In Judge Allen's concurring opinion in <u>Nelson</u>, <u>supra</u>, he argues that, in the absence of federal certainty in developing 1933 immunity the federal courts should take recourse to state court decisions on this point. In fact, Chief Judge Magruder's test of "good faith in performance of their official duty as they understand it" is virtually the same as that stated in <u>Gregory v. Small</u>, 39 Ohio St. 346 (1883) - "they acted in their official capacity, in good faith, and in the honest discharge of official duty."

Chapter 3345 of the Ohio Revised Code specifies the general powers of state universities. Section 3345.21 vests in the Boards of Trustees the responsibility for maintaining law and order on the campuses. Section 3345.04 further provides that:

"The board of trustees of . . . Kent State University . . . may designate one or more employees of the institution, as special policemen . . .

"Such policemen shall protect the property of such institution, suppress nuisances and disturbances and breaches of the peace, and enforce laws for the preservation of good order."

In the instant case there can be no doubt but that, in establishing and operating the Kent State University Security Office, defendants acted in good faith in performance of their official duties as they understood them. The complaint does not contest this point and therefore should be dismissed for failing to state a claim upon which relief can be granted.

D. The allegations of plaintiffs' complaint involve non-justiciable political questions

The basis for the non-justiciability of political questions is founded both on the established doctrine of separation of powers, and, pragmatically, upon the inability of the judiciary to conduct hearings and investigations necessary to the resolution of political issues. The entire complaint at bar surrounds the surveillance of "political action groups" by the Kent State University Security Force (Complaint, p. 3). The question of seeking judicial relief in order to sharply curtail domestic intelligence activity has been ruled upon by the United States Supreme Court within the last year. The case of Laird v. Tatum, 408 U.S. 1 (1972) dismissed a similar complaint on the ground that the plaintiffs had not presented a justiciable controversy, because the questions involved were political and not suitable for determination by the judicial branch of government.

The critical tests for determining whether a political question is presented were spelled out in the case of <u>Baker v. Carr</u>, 369 U.S. 186, 217 (1962):

- A constitutional commitment of the issue to a coordinate political department;
- A lack of judicially discoverable and manageable standards for resolving the issue;
- The impossibility of deciding the issue without an initial policy determination of a kind clearly for non-judicial discretion;
- The impossibility of the court's undertaking an independent resolution of the issue without expressing lack of respect due coordinate branches of government;
- An unusual need for unquestioning adherence to a political decision already made;
- The potentiality of embarrassment from multifarious pronouncements by various departments on the issue.

The matters under consideration in the instant case fall clearly within the tests mentioned above. Clearly, what plaintiffs appear

to be seeking is a broad scale investigation, conducted by themselves as private parties armed with the subpoena power of a federal district court and the power of cross examination to probe into the university's security and intelligence gathering activities, with the district court determining at the conclusion of that investigation the extent to which those activities may or may not be appropriate to the University's mission. This was precisely the point that lead the Supreme Court to affirm the dismissal of the Tatum case (see Laird v. Tatum, 408 U.S. at 14).

As the Supreme Court has repeatedly emphasized, courts should not venture into a realm foreign to the judiciary, one in which manageable standards may not yet have been developed, to resolve the competing claims as to the appropriateness of technical details of the security system.

#### CONCLUSION

It is clear that plaintiffs have not stated a cause of action and further that this Court lacks jurisdiction over the persons named in this suit.

The Vietnam Veterans Against the War (VVAW) is a national organization composed primarily of veterans of the war in Vietnam, that has organized and participated in numerous demonstrations against the war in Vietnam during 1970-72, including the seizure of the Statue of Liberty, New York City, and the occupation of the Betsy Ross House, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, in December, 1971. Six members of the VVAW were indicted by a Federal Grand Jury, Tallahassee, Florida, July, 1972, on charge of conspiracy to violate the Federal Antiriot Law. (Unclassified)

On December 11, 1972 a first confidential source who has furnished reliable information in the past advised that a conference of the New York Region of the VVAW was held at Oneonta, New York on December 9-10, 1972. (Gentle intial)

The initial session began on December 9, 1972 at the Student Union, State University of New York (SUNY), Oneonta. About twenty persons attended. Among those in attendance were the following:



Vietnam Veterans Against the War (VVAW)

The initial session on December 9, 1972 consisted mainly of Chapter reports. The Buffalo Chapter, having over twenty active members, noted great activity. Buffalo representatives stated the Buffalo Chapter had been using television to present VVAW problems, had organized a complete speakers bureau and has a mailing list of 200 to 300 individuals. (Confidential)

The Oneonta Chapter reported it had eight active members. (Genfidential)

The Rochester Chapter reported that it had been inactive, but was attempting to organize. (Gonfidential)

Brian Matarese and Joe Hirsch presented the New York City Chapter report. The New York City Chapter has a membership of 30 to 40 active members and a mailing list of about 2000. (Confidential)

Ed Damato presented the regional report. He announced that he will possibly withdraw from his position as New York regional coordinator and will accept a position with the National VVAW Office in Chicago, Illinois, if elected. Damato suggested that due to lack of activity in the New York City Chapter, the Regional Office be transferred to Buffalo. (Confidential)

Following the Chapter reports, a report was given on the National Steering Committee held in Palo Alto, California, during September, 1972. This report was followed with general discussions on the national structure of the VVAW and the need for a variety of workshops. (Confidential)

Following the first session most of the delegates attended a party in Oneonta given by Youth Against War and Facism (YAWF). (Confidential)

Youth Against War and Fascism (YAWF) is the youth group of the Workers World Party (WWP). (Unclassified)

Vietnam Veterans Against the War (VVAW)

The WWP was founded in 1959 by individuals who disagreed with policies of the Socialist Workers Party (SWP). The WWP dissidents advocated unconditional support of the Soviet Union and the building of a revolutionary party geared to the overthrow of capitalism. More recently the WWP has called for peaceful solutions to Sino-Soviet disputes, however, the WWP generally supports the People's Republic of China in its ideological differences with the Soviet Union. (Unclassified)

The SWP has been designated pursuant to Executive Order 10450. (Unclassified)

The final session of the conference was held at the residence of Chuck Smith, Reservoir Road, Oneonta, on December 10, 1972. At this session a resolution was passed that the VVAW do anything and everything to assist the three peoples of Indochina defeat genocidal aggression, United States imperialism, and to develop an anti-imperialist consciousness among American people by relevant programs of mass indoctrination. (Confidential)

stated that the VVAW Third Wolrd Caucus group might demonstrate in Washington D.C. on Inaugration Day, January 20, 1973. (Confidential)

The final discussion centered around the National VVAW Conference to be held in Chicago, during January 5-11, 1973. It was decided that the New York Region would probably be represented by Ed Damato and three unidentified individuals. (Confidential)

During June, 1971, a second confidential source who has furnished reliable information in the past, identified as a member of the Communist Party, United States of America. (Unclassified)

The VVAW is a national organization, composed primarily of veterans of the Vietnam War, which has conducted demonstrations against the war during 1970-1972. Its first published objective is to demand all immediate of fighting and withdrawal of all American troops from Indochina. U

On January 2, 1973, a representative of the United States Park Police (USPP), Washington, D.C. (WDC), advised that a notice of demonstration had been received from the WVAW for a demonstration to occur on January 20, 1973. notice advised that at 11:00 am, January 20, 1973, members of the VVAW would form at the Tidal Basin area, near the Jefferson Monument, WDC, or at Iwo Jima Memorial, Arlington, Virginia. At 11:20 am the group would march from either location to Arlington Cemetery, Arlington, Virginia, for a short service commencing at 12:00 noon. At 12:20 pm the group would depart Arlington Cemetery and return to the Tidal Basin area, pick up signs, and disperse to WDC traffic circle for a silent vigil. At approximately 4:00 pm the VVAW members would leave the traffic circle and return to the Tidal Basin. U

This notice of demonstration further stated that the VVAW may hold a counter inaugural ball at a church (not further identified) during the evening of January 20, 1973. was signed by Tim Butz.

On January 9, 1973, a source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised that at the VVAW National Steering Committee Meeting held January 4-8, 1973, at 2440 North Lincoln Avenue, Chicago, Illinois, the following scenario for the presidential inauguration at WDC on January 20, 1973, was set forth.

VVAW members would assemble at 9:30 am, January 20, 1973, at Arlington Cemetery parking lot. At 10:00 am a non-religious ceremony with Barry Romo and a Vietnamese woman as speakers would be held. At 10:30 am the VVAW march would begin leaving Arlington Cemetery via access bridge, around Lincoln Monument Circle to Independence Avenue. The march would continue down Independence Avenue turning North onto 4th or 5th Street, Northwest, to Mall Ground. The march will halt at the former VVAW Campsite for Operation Dewey Canyon III.

At the Mall Grounds, Indochinese music will be played and several tables will be set up to serve hot tea and collect signatures on the Nine Point Peace Treaty. Several established guerrilla theatre groups will perform skits related to the Vietnamese struggle and American imperialism. The rally will disperse as soon as people feel the need to leave.

The march will be led by a large banner reading "VIETNAM FOR THE VIETNAMESE, STOP THE BOMBING, SIGN THE TREATY". Each organization will be allowed one organizational banner, and an unlimited number of signs designating support for the Nine Point Peace Plan. No flags of the nations will be carried on this march.

Each region will be responsible for providing for the identity and discipline within its group. The march will be four to six abreast to maintain security from infiltrators/provacatures. The working committee will print a leaflet for distribution with the political reasoning for the tone and nature of self-discipline/security as per national hearing committee decision.

This march will be open to any organization that has consistently supported the Vietnamese Plan for Peace and who agrees to the basics of the scenario.

Each participating region shall pledge \$25 plus \$1 per person participating. Any surplus of finances will be used to pay the existing debt of the National Office.

The Working Committee shall consist of people from Washington, Philadelphia, and Boston Regional Offices, with a National Coordinator from Chicago. Other regions wishing to send advance party personnel should contact the Washington, D.C. Office in advance. The Washington, D.C. address to be contacted was given as 1322 18th Street, Washington, D.C. Telephone number (202) 785-3111.

This march will be a disciplined march in support of the Nine Point Peace Plan. It will be a one day public manifestation of our day to day support of this peace plan in the Vietnamese struggle.

On January 12, 1973, a representative of the United States Park Police, Washington, D.C., advised that he had been in contact with Tim Butz who wished to make a few minor changes to the previously submitted VVAW Notice of Demonstration. Butz stated that instead of beginning the VVAW march at the Tidal Basin area he was now asking permission to begin the march at Arlington Cemetery, Arlington, Yirginia, and then proceed across Memorial Bridge, around Lincoln Monument, and down Independence Avenue, to the site of the former VVAW Campsite, Dewey Canyon, III. Tim Butz was advised that these changes will be noted on his Notice of Demonstration. 7/

On Monday, January 15, 1973, a third source who has provided reliable information in the past advised that a press conference was held at All Souls Unitarian Church, 16th and Harvard Street, Northwest, WDC, at 9:30 am. The press conference was sponsored by VVAW and the purpose was to explain to newsmen the scenario for their demonstration on January 20. The scenario for their demonstration of January 20. spokesman was Ed Damato. A

Damato stated at this press conference that the VVAW demonstration would have a clear political message that could not be ignored and that was support of the Nine Point Peace Plan of October 26, 1972. He went on to explain the route of the march the VVAW would take and stated that the ceremony on the Mall would consist of a guerrilla theatre and Vietnamese music while the participants signed the Nine Point Peace Plan Treaty. He stated that Barry Romo, VVAW Coordinator, would give a short speech before the group left Arlington Cemetery.

On January 11, 1973, a fourth source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised that

This source further advised that during this meeting it was mentioned that absolutely no violence would be tolerated during the WDC demonstration. To inforce this limitation each chapter will send a Sergeant at Arms to preserve peace and order.

On January 11, 1973, a fifth source, who has provided reliable information in the past, advised that to date 35 to 40 Philadelphia area VVAW members have indicated their intention to travel to WDC to participate in the demonstration at the inauguration. This source advised that Scott Reihmer, a Florida VVAW member is in Philadelphia. He is in charge of organizing medical teams composed of VVAW members who will participate in the demonstration at the presidential inauguration.

On January 15, 1973, this same source advised that also known as VVAW activist, is currently in WDC for the purpose of participation in the demonstration at the presidential inauguration on January 20, 1973. This source further advised that the VVAW contingent will be joined in WDC by the November 4th Coalition from New York City, New York.

The November 4th Coalition has been publicly described as an ad hoc committee composed of representatives of several anti war groups in New York City.

On January 18, 1973, this same source advised that, to date, 30 to 35 Philadelphia VVAW members have indicated intention to travel to WDC for the demonstration on January 20. They will not use buses or rent trucks. They will travel individually by any means available to them. This source advised that Gary Thomas, VVAW Philadelphia, and Scott Reihmer have been in WDC since January 17. Roy Leeds, Philadelphia VVAW, will leave on January 19 for WDC.

This source stated that a VVAW working committee has been set up in WDC for the demonstration and consists of Tim Butz, Gary Thomas,

Bart Savage, Ed Damato. A second committee, the VVAW Staff Committee, has also been established and to date consists of and Scott Reihmer. In addition, telephone number OL2-1556 will have a prerecorded message for last minute instructions for VVAW participants. Numbers to be called regarding VVAW housing are 293-7738 and 293-7798.

This source advised that as of January 18, 1973, plans call for all VVAW members to assemble during morning of January 20 at Arlington Cemetery and from there cross Memorial Bridge. Members are not planning on carrying any flags or placards and will have their own external and internal security. This source reported that there have been rumors that Trotsky groups will attempt to join the VVAW line of march and VVAW members have commented that should this occur, they will beat up the Trotskies.

On January 15, 1973, a sixth source who has furnished reliable information in the past advised that, to date, nine members of the New Haven, Connecticut VVAW Chapter are scheduled to leave New Haven on January 18, 1973 for the inaugural demonstration in WDC on January 20, 1973. This source advised that all members are being instructed that the entire VVAW demonstration at the inauguration is to be non-violent with the purpose showing solidarity with Hanoi in regard to the bombing. This source advised that

The Tampa group will travel in convoy leaving Tampa, Florida at approximately 10:00 am January 18, 1973 and going through Gainsville, Florida to hook up with a convoy from there.

This source advised that those traveling to Washington, D.C. are being told that the VVAW is not planning any civil disobedience at the inaugural demonstration; however, the VVAW would have no control over individual members who would be free to do what they wanted.

On January 16, 1973 an eighth source who has provided reliable information in the past, advised that the New York City (NYC) Chapter, VVAW, plans to participate in a demonstration march in Washington, D.C. on January 20, 1973. This source reported that the NYC, VVAW group will participate in this activity with the Attica Brigade (AB), NYC. It was further reported that the NYC, VVAW would also plan to conduct demonstrations, and pick line, and possibly engage in guerrilla theatres, at location of four inaugural balls.

This same source advised that with NYC, VVAW Chapter Member was in contact with Tim Butz, Washington, D.C., 7C VVAW leader at VVAW Press Conference, Washington, D.C., held January 15, 1973. It was learned that Butz and other leaders oppose any attempts to infiltrate the inaugural parade.

This same source advised that the NYC, VVAW contingent will depart New York City at 5:00 am on January 20, 1973 for Washington, D.C. There will be approximately 75 persons in the contingent including about 40 members of the NYC, VVAW Chapter. Definitely expected to participate are Edward Damato, newly appointed National Field Secretary; Joseph Hirsch, Acting Regional Coordinator, New York Region; Brian Matzrese, Assistant Regional Coordinator, New York Region; Skip Delano, New York City Chapter Coordinator; Alahubbard, former member VVAW National Executive Committee; Staff member of NYC Chapter;

of the NYC VVAW Chapter.

The Attica Brigade (AB) was initially formed to support prison inmates of correctional institutions by organizing demonstrations and exposing the United States imperialist system. AB views itself as an anti-imperialist action

organization. 7

On Friday, January 19, 1973, the second source advised that between 6:00 and 7:00 pm a group of VVAW members would attempt to gain entrance to the Army-Navy Club, Farragut Square and I Street, Northwest, Washington, D.C. This source advised that the VVAW had received information that several South Vietnamese dignitaries would be at the Army-Navy Club and the VVAW hoped to gain entrance to the club in order to talk with these dignitaries.

At approximately 6:30 pm on January 19, 1973, representatives of the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) observed six members of the VVAW gather outside the Army-Navy Club, Washington, D.C. The group attempted to gain entrance to the club, but were refused entry. The group then passed out leaflets calling for support for the demonstration to be held January 20, 1973. This group dispersed at approximately 6:50 pm without incident.

On January 20, 1973, at approximately 7:00 am, representatives of the FBI observed small groups of demonstrators affiliated with the VVAW begin to arrive at Arlington National Cemetary, Arlington, Virginia.

While the groups number was increasing, a few of the VVAW members entered the cemetary to watch the changing of the guard at the tomb of the unknown soldier, which proceeded without incident. By 9:30 am the number of VVAW members present had reached several hundred. The group stood peacefully awaiting the speeches to begin.

At approximately 10:45 am, Tim Butz, WDC VVAW, called for the group to assemble at the main gate of Arlington Cemetary. By this time the number of VVAW members present had swelled to approximately 2,000.

At 10:50 am, Butz, using the sound system which had been set up by members of the group, began telling the group about the general plans of the proposed march, stating its purpose was to support the democratic government of Vietnam and to support the signing of the Nine Point Peace Treaty. He also spoke of the rules of the march, which included no flags to be carried and only organizational signs to be allowed.

Butz then read a telegram which he stated he had received this morning from members of the 82nd Airborne Division, Fort Bragg, North Carolina, expressing their support of VVAW's activities, protesting what they called the prostitution of their sentiments, and stating the desire of the international working class to end all imperialistic ventures of the United States.

Butz then closed his remarks by reiterating that the march should be peaceful, stating that the only thing the government will fear is a well discipline left.

At 11:00 am, Butz introduced Barry Romo, who spoke to the group for about eight minutes, stating he had recently returned from a 13 day trip to Hanoi, where he carried letters to prisoners of war (POW) and had visited several small towns. His main point was to announce the United States military assertions that bombs falling on non-military targets are errors. He stated he had seen where bombs had fallen in the exact same craters left by bombs the previous day, and he had seen areas bombed that were obviously non-military in makeup, consisting mainly of homes and small shops.

Following Romo, Butz introduced a Vietnamese girl currently residing in WDC. She spoke for a few minutes, during which time the public address system malfunctioned therefore making it difficult for the group to hear her. Basically, she stated she had lived with war most of her life, and wondered why innocent people were being killed. She stated also that the group has a right to demand the signing of the treaty, and added that because of what the VVAW is trying to do, her poeple have a feeling of solidarity once again. She closed by stating that the Vietnamese "people people" not the "political people" support the VVAW's action in seeking peace in Vietnam.

Butz then made a call for money, asking each person in attendance to donate \$1. Members of the group then passed among them with buckets for the collection. At this point, one attendee began calling for the march to begin stating that this was no place to collect money. Butz replied the march was to be peaceful, that officials were stating the VVAW are only trouble makers anyway and that they should prove them wrong. At this point a few VVAW members hollared "right on" at Butz's trouble maker statement, but the majority of the group applauded loudly at Butz's statement about proving the establishment wrong. At that point about five demonstrators with Viet Cong flags put them away.

At 11:20 am the group began joining for the march across the Memorial Bridge. The march began at approximately 11:45 am with between 2,600 and 3,000 demonstrators.

The group was mostly young, both boys and girls, and there were several priests in attendance. Signs and placards were noted, which included "Impeach Nixon,""U.S. Out Now", "Stop the War", and "Stop the War, We Want Peace Now". Small numbers in the group chanted, the chants being mostly "One, Two, Three, Four, Sign the Treaty Against the War".

By about noon, the group had gone on to the Memorial Bridge toward WDC and the march proceeded without incident.

After proceeding across Memorial Bridge, representatives of the FBI observed that the VVAW march circled around the Lincoln Memorial and proceeded down Ohio Drive to Independence Avenue, Northwest. The group proceeded down Independence Avenue to a staging area located approximately at 17th and Independence Avenue, Northwest. At this location a table had been set up by the VVAW for participants to sign the Nine Point Peace Treaty. It was at this area that the 2,600 to 3,000 participants of the VVAW march gathered around and listened to various VVAW speakers. main portion of this march reached this location at approximately 12:40 pm. Due to the severe cold weather in WDC on this date the majority of VVAW members began to disperse from this location at 17th and Independence Avenue, Northwest, and join with the National Peace Action Coalition (NPAC)/ Peoples Coalition For Peace and Justice (PCPJ) group which was assembling at the Lincoln Memorial at about 1:20 pm for their march along Constitution Avenue to a rallying point at the Washington Monument.

Representatives of the FBI observed that the entire VVAW march was peaceful and that during the whole time the march was under the direction of VVAW. There were no incidents.

The National Peace Action Coalition (NPAC) was founded in 1970 by members of the Socialist Workers Party (SWP). Its basic objective is to unite masses of people including labor unions, GIs, and the black community in the struggle to end United States intervention in Southeast Asia through orderly and peaceful tactics. The SWP has been designated pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

Peoples Coalition For Peace and Justice (PCPJ) is based in New York City, New York and is a self described coalition of over 100 organizations dedicated to elimination of war, racism, imperialism, and poverty.

The second source advised on January 25, 1973, that several observations were made by him during VVAW presidential inauguration activities in WDC:

Throughout the period of VVAW planning to the actual VVAW march in WDC on January 20, 1973, those VVAW individuals responsible for the major decisions, namely, Tim Butz, Ed Damato, and Bart Savage, were insistent that the VVAW march would be peaceful, well disciplined and that no unlawful incidents would be tolerated.

This source advised that the only threat of any break away action came on the morning of the actual march, Saturday, January 20, 1973. As the march was about to begin a leaflet headlined, "Line the Route", began to be distributed throughout the VVAW staging area. Tim Butz and Bart Savage openly accused Al Hubbard and other members of the New York VVAW Chapter as the individuals behind this leaflet. It was noted by Butz and Savage that both the distribution of the leaflet and the appearance of Hubbard and the New York VVAW contingent appeared at the staging area at the same time. Source stated that Tim Butz completely disavowed this leaflet and speaking through a bullhorn emphasized to the assemble marchers that the march would be peaceful and no break away tactics would be tolerated. A copy of the leaflet is attached herewith.

Source advised that at the conclusion of the march the emphasis was on getting as many signatures as possible on the VVAW sponsored Nine Point Peace Treaty. This ceremony took place on the Mall, off Independence Avenue, and was the same location as the former VVAW Campsite for Operation Dewey Canyon III. Hot tea was served at this location but no guerrilla theatre groups performed. The weather was very bitter and no sooner had the march reached its destination on the Mall when members began leaving in droves. Those leaving either stated that they were returning home or were going to join the NPAC demonstration march which was assembling at the Lincoln Memorial. Shortly after 1:00 pm approximately 25 individuals were still milling around the tables set up for the signing of the peace treaty.

The source stated that throughout the week that VVAW members gathered in WDC to organize the march on January 20, 1973, a great deal of talk was devoted to the NPAC/PCPJ coalition set up for counter inaugural demonstrations. Tim Butz and Ed Damato both stated that VVAW could not align with NPAC during the demonstration because of NPAC's "Out Now" philosophy. According to Butz and Damato this "Out Now" theme was not consistent with VVAW's theme of support of the Vietnamese people. when VVAW learned that PCPJ had joined with NPAC it placed VVAW in an embarrassing situation. VVAW leadership was upset with PCPJ for joining with NPAC as it ignored VVAW's position of support for Vietnamese people. The question rose now should VVAW go to NPAC/PCPJ staff meetings regarding details of inaugural demonstrations or should they go their separate ways. Butz and Damato stated that VVAW had decided to accept money from NPAC/PCPJ to help support the costs of VVAW demonstration but they would not attend any staff meetings. Source advised that the National Student Association based in WDC had agreed to provide office space for NPAC/PCPJ during the period prior to the presidential inauguration on January 20, 1973. Because of this agreement with National Students Association with NPAC/PCPJ, VVAW was also offered the use of phones, office space and some money to support their demonstration. Source advised that most VVAW staff meetings regarding the January 20, 1973 VVAW march were held in the National Student Association Building and was considered the "Command Post" of the VVAW.

This same source furnished background information on several VVAW members who were present in WDC to help with organizing the VVAW march on January 20, 1973:

is commonly referred to by other VVAW members as was in WDC prior to January 20

Source advised that it was evident from behavior that no one took him seriously and that his presence was tolerated but not sought after.

Tim Butz, source stated that Tim Butz was obviously "organizer" of the VVAW march. It was Butz who did most of the planning, organizing and work in WDC for this march. Butz resides in WDC and is actually associated with Project Airwar which is located at 1322 18th Street, Northwest, WDC. According to source, Butz is completely opposed to violence and that he spent considerable time with other members emphasizing that the VVAW march should be peaceful. advised that Butz worked very hard but lacks true leadership qualities. He is the type of individual that feels if a good Job is to be done it has to be done by himself and he cannot delegate authority. Tim Butz is completely trusted by other VVAW members and was privy to all major decisions made by the VVAW leadership regarding the march. Source advised he understands that Tim Butz is not an actual member of any VVAW Chapter but if any VVAW activity is planned in the WDC area he assumes a position of leadership. Source stated that other VVAW members have mentioned that when any action in the WDC area is planned, Tim Butz is the individual who is He currently resided at contacted.

Gary Thomas is a VVAW member from the Philadelphia area. His job during his stay in WDC was Press Liaison. He worked with Bart Savage writing press notices. Source advised that Thomas has the type of personality that once he is engaged in a project he tries to take over which at times is a source of irritation to other members. Source advised

that Gary Thomas was one of the six individuals who attempted to gain entrance to the Army-Navy Club, WDC on the night of January 19, 1973 Cource advised that Gary Thomas is completely trusted by other members of the VVAW and was considered to be one of the VVAW leaders in WDC for the inaugural march. 7

Bart Savage is from the National Office, Chicago, Illinois. Savage is well respected by other members of the VVAW and according to source is very well observed on new left political groups and structure. During his stay in WDC he was in charge of security and he and Ed Damato, New York VVAW, were considered the "heavies" who made the decisions.

Ed Damato, VVAW New York, was, according to this same source, actually the individual in charge of the preparation for the VVAW march on January 20, 1973. Source advised that Tim Butz did most of the leg work regarding organizing the march, that Bart Savage was consulted on all decisions regarding the march but that Ed Damato actually was the individual looked upon as leading the VVAW affair. Source stated that Damato was well respected and trusted by all VVAW individuals in WDC. stated Damato, during his stay in WDC, resided at 1500 Farragut Sq. re, Northwest. This location had been set up by Tim Butz as an answering service for all VVAW members coming to WDC. Source stated that Damato spent much of his time, when he was not at National Student Association Building making VVAW decisions, at this address talking with visiting VVAW members and telling them where to meet and what the VVAW plans were. Source stated that like Tim Butz, Ed Damato was insistent that the VVAW march be peaceful and that he would not tolerate any act of civil disobedience. Source stated that Damato is a very serious individual and gives the impression that he believes 100. percent in what VVAW stands for and what VVAW is doing.

Unless stated otherwise all confidential sources used in this memorandum have furnished reliable information in the past.

On January 19, 1973, a first confidential source furnished an undated two-page document issued by the New York Regional Office of the Vietnam Veterans Against the War (VVAW) in which is set forth a list of New York State and Chapter Coordinators and a summary of recent activities of various chapters of the New York Region:

The VVAW is a national organization composed primarily of veterans of the war in Vietnam, that has organized and participated in numerous demonstrations against the war in Vietnam during 1970-72, including the seizure of the Statue of Liberty, New York City, and the occupation of the Betsy Ross House, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, in December, 1971. Six members of the VVAW were indicted by a Federal Grand Jury, Tallahassee, Florida, July, 1972, on charge of conspiracy to violate the Federal Antiriot Law.

Vietnam Veterans Against the War

The Vietnam Veterans Against the War (VVAW) is a national organization composed primarily of veterans of the war in Vietnam, that has organized and participated in numerous demonstrations against the war in Vietnam during 1970-72, including the seizure of the Statue of Liberty, New York City, and the occupation of the Betsy Ross House, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, in December, 1971. Six members of the VVAW were indicted by a Federal Grand Jury, Tallahassee, Florida, July, 1972, on charge of conspiracy to violate the Federal Antiriot Law.

On February 6, 1973, a confidential source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, furnished a copy of the minutes of the National Steering Committee Meeting of the VVAW at Chicago, Illinois, January 4-8, 1973, under the letterhead of the VVAW New York State Regional Office, 857 Broadway, New York, New York, dated January 12, 1973. The minutes take the form of six pages of notes compiled by the New York State delegation to the meeting, twelve pages of workshop reports, and two pages of objectives of the VVAW.

The following criticisms were raised furing this workshop. They are presented here only as a bases for dicussion and not meant to be a complete criticism of this organizational change.

Propaganda Agains Nuclear Neapons-Assack Plan Realizing that the U.S. government and big business will to willing relinguish its struggle to gain economic control of South East Asia, we feel that the milatary struggle will continue in some formeven if a treaty is signed. Historically, the American public has been coverely prepare by the intelligence community of impending inhumane policies of the U.C. government using the mass media. This insidious propaganda effort has been implemented through 'planned' leaks of military contingency plans, which are presented in a way to de-sinsitize the American public to government policies that would normally be rejected.

We believe that one of the options that Mixon has for escalation of the war in Indochina is the use of Tactical Nuclear Meapons. Many of us have seen a growing campaign in the media to prepare the Public for the use of these weapons by "speculation" on the subject. #### HOMANS CAUCUS

In this portion of the workshops, the women seemed anxious to talk about themselves for a twofold reason. One, that they wished to know each other better in order to find a common base from : which to work, and two; to help sensitize the men to our gut feelings and the directions from which our problems as women within the organization stem.

In order to do this, we passed around a set of questions which seemed basic to those needs. As we went around the group each woman answered all the questions at once, so as to lend continuity to the situation.

This was followed by sort of an interview situation, in order to allow the man present to direct questions dealing with more specific problems. Even though there are still many questions to be asked, and problems solved, a

base was laid. There is communication between the women (and any interested men) that will deal with projects and continue to encourage each other. The questionaire will also be sent to each person on the communications list.

There is a problem that we will consider and attempt to deal with in our communications. It is one that seems to be a primary example of all our problems a both man and women within VVA!.

It appears to us that smoot the veterans there is an amplification of a common condit oning men experience from birth. When a man comes in from the lush, he finds it less painful to deal with that experience if he has no close personal contacts to deal with.

This is carried over into civilian life. If he comes under severe stress, he tends to withdraw completely from the people he cares about the most, which often includes a woman.

The problem this created for a woman is duel in nature. Because of her primary conditioning, she feels incorrectly that she is merely a back-up force. So, when the cuts her off, she finds herself with the inabil ty to assert herself.

We have only begun to cont out the problems involved. They will continue to face all of : And gradually reduced, we hope. #### G.I. Workshop

Historical Notes on Civilian (not active-duty) GI Projects.

In general, civilian run projects, mostly coffee houses, have died out over the past year. What follows is a general analysis of some of the problems that helped reduce the effectiveness of the civilian run projects, although we did not discuss the whole area of active-duty run projects, this area does need to be discussed in depth.

- 1. Missionary attitude: Civilian organizers tried to move in and dictate to Gis that the GIs should want.
- Laying down trips, civilians tried to impose their politics on GIs. Armchair revolutionary syndrome.
- Jational perspective civilians tried to organize GIs around national issues without understanding the need to organize around local issues.
- Racism: Projects were run by whites with little understanding of the struggles of minority peoples, especially black GIs.
  - 5. No money.
- 5. Lack of support from the local community, in some cases meeting open repression.
  - , 7. Spathy and fear of GIs.
- 8. Women and the question of semism was handled poorly, which has led to very little female participation in projects, servicewomen and civilians.
  - 9. Transients of GIs negated possibility of mass work.

What is the goal of doing GI organizing:

The two major goals of organizing active-duty service people back a specific and a general content. The two goals are not exclusive and in fact must go together in forming a complete strategy.

Point one is to stop Imperialism; that is, to negate or reduce the strength of a war machine engaged in aggression and genocide.

Foint Two is to provide services or actions around service peoples' immediate needs, such as housing, relief from harassment, etc.

In viewing these goals, the workshop decided to focus on the specific problems of working with GIs and then on what specific and general programs VVAN can undertake to achieve these goals.

The primary contradiction in the military today is racism. The struggles of minority GIs provides the focus for currnet work around the GI movement. It is our opinion that VVA! should see its work on racism is primary in regards to the GI movement. However, the work on racism must also go hand in hand with specific service work for individual GIs, ie, military counseling, legal help, etc. We must not lose sight of the human element.

## Vietnam Veterans Against the War

The American Servicemen's Union (ASU) was founded in 1968, by the Workers World Party (WWP). Its objective is to cause discontent among military enlisted personnel and call for the establishment of a servicemen's union. Its main propaganda weapon is the publication "The Bond - The Servicemen's Newspaper."

The "Guardian" is self-described as an "independent radical newsweekly" which takes a strong left position, but is not identified with any organized group. It is considered to be the largest radical weekly in America.

National Peace Action Coalition (NPAC) was founded in 1970 by members of the Socialist Workers Party (SWP). Its objective is the immediate, total and unconditional withdrawal of all United States forces and material in Southeast Asia.

The SWP has been designated pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

The Progressive Labor Party (PLP) founded in 1965 by former members of the CPUSA, who assertedly followed a Chinese Communist line, is a revolutionary Marxist-Leninist organization dedicated to a dictatorship of the working class.

Students For A Democratic Society (SDS) was founded during June, 1962, at Port Huron, Michigan, and in the 1960's functioned as the leading New Left campus-based student organization in the United States. From a stance of "participatory democracy", the SDS moved to a radical-revolutionary position. It maintained a national office at 1608 West Madison Street, Chicago, Illinois, until February, 1970. Internal factionalism during 1969 produced three main factions: Weatherman, Revolutionary Youth Movement (RYM), and Worker Student Alliance (WSA). The Weatherman and RYM no longer consider themselves associated with the SDS. The WSA faction continues to use the name SDS.

## Vietnam Veterans Against the War

The Student Mobilization Committee (SMC) is controlled by the Socialist Workers Party (SWP) and its youth affiliate, Young Socialist Alliance (YSA). SMC initiates and supports public demonstrations against the war in Southeast Asia.

The SWP has been designated pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

The Workers World Party (WWP) was founded in 1959 by individuals who disagreed with policies of the Socialist Workers Party (SWP). The WWP dissidents advocated unconditional support of the Soviet Union and the building of a revolutionary party geared to the overthrow of Capitalism. More recently, the WWP has called for peaceful solutions to Sino-Soviet disputes, however, the WWP generally supports the Peoples Republic of China in its ideological differences with the Soviet Union.

As the youth organization of the SWP, the YSA serves as the main source of recruitment into that organization. The YSA is described in the masthead of its official publication, "The Young Socialist Organizer", as "a Multi-National Revolutionary Socialist Youth Organization".

Youth Against War and Fascism (YAWF) is the youth group of the Workers World Party (WWP).

Source, a local agency which collects security information in the Chicago area, furnished the following information on November 14, 1972, in regard to

In late October, 1972 arrived in Los Angeles from Japan, via Japan Airlines, and subsequently, on\_either November 4 or 5, 1972, he arrived in Chicago via Japan Airlines.

While in Chicago he held several closed door meetings with Victnam Veterans Against the War (VVAW) co-ordinators Barry Romo and Bart Savage, and possibly one or two other persons.

This source, who did not attend these meetings, speculated through hearsay and conversations overheard subsequent to the meetings, that the purpose of travels concerned possible Peoples Coalition for Peace and Justice (PCPJ) and VVAW demonstrations in Washington, D. C. at the time of the Presidential Inauguration on January 20, 1973.

Also, this source speculated that the invitation to to come to the U.S. originated at a PCPJ conference held in Tokyo in August, 1972: Apparently at this conference it was decided that the PCPJ would be the umbrella sponsor for the January 20, 1973 demonstrations in Washington, D.C. This source further speculated that the possibility existed that older and more conservative PCPJ leaders feared that possible VVAW

PCPJ is self-described as a broad coalition of local and national organizations including the Communist Party, U.S.A, committed to conducting demonstrations aimed at ending the war in Indochina, and poverty, racism and injustice at home. Its National Office is located at 156 Fifth Avenue, New York City.

VVAW is a national organization, comprised primarily of veterans of the Vietnam War, which has conducted demonstrations against the war during the period 1970 - 1972.

This source understands that is a world traveler with worldwide contacts, who in the past has attended Stockholm peace conferences and is to attend one there within the next month or so.

The source stated that supposedly is a member of the Japanese Communist Party and has or anized many demonstrations in Japan in recent years which have resulted in disruption and violence.

This source further stated that in order for to obtain a visa from American Consular officials for his current visit, it was necessary for him to sign a statement in Tokyo that he would not participate in any demonstrations or related activities while in the U.S.

The source stated that traveled in the U.S. previously, dates and details not known to the source.

The source advised that departed Chicago on November 9, 1972 for Akron, Ohio, where he was to meet with VVAW member Gary Steiger. From Akron, he was to travel to Pittsburgh, Boston, and Washington, D.C., exact dates or details not known. On November 22, 1972 he was to be in New York City and fly from there to Paris, airline or time not known.

The second source, another governmental agency which conducts intelligence investigations, advised an November 10, 1972 that on November 9, 1972, was to have mailed a registered letter to the Japanese Council Against Atomic and Hydrogen Bombs, 23-196, Chome Shimbashi, Minao-Ku, Tokyo, Japan. The conjecture was that the letter concerned results of contacts in the U.S. up to that date, regarding plans for disruption of the January 20, 1973 Presidential Inauguration.

The second source also advised on November 10, 1972, that who was in Los Angeles, California on October 28, 1972, and planned to travel to Chicago, Illinois via Dayton, Ohio, was in telephonic contact with an unidentified individual from Denver, Colorado, who has taken part in demonstrations at various Army and Navy bases in Japan.

On December 14, 1971, a Fourth Confidential Source advised that the Northeast Region of the VVAW would sponsor a number of demonstrations. Included was a demonstration to be held in the Philadelphia, Pennsylvania area, on December 27, 1971.

A Fifth Confidential Source on December 27, 1971, advised that on that date, approximately 25 individuals occupied the Betsy Ross House, Philadephia, Pennsylvania. Doors were locked and an individual removed the 13 star United States Flag from the outside pole and placed it upside down on the pole. Four Philadelphia Police Officers broke the lock on the door and entered the house. All 25 individuals were arrested and transported to Police Headquarters without incident. The only damage to the house, was a broken lock on the front door. The flag was restored to his original position.



Five individuals pleaded no defense to the charges of Disorderly Conduct stemming from the take over of the Betsy Ross House and were each fined \$10.00 plus \$2.50 court cost. 



The VVAW National Office debt was announced to be \$10,000 and no solution was offered other than the possibility of obtaining the services of a professional fund rulser.

## Observations By The Source

From numerous discussions it would appear that the VVAW has approximately 15 hard core persons who also attempting to carry out the VVAW program.

It appears that the VVAW, as a group, feels indebted to the Vietnamese people because of past United States actions in Vietnam.

The NSC meeting and the organization itself were taken very seriously by those in attendance at the meeting. Also, there appeared to be a general feeling that the VVAW has the technical knowledge and training to carry out any revolutionary program proposed.





On May 24, 1972, a source advised that an active member in the Bucks County Chapter of the Vietnam Veterans Against the War (VVAW). Source advised that although the national headquarters of the VVAW has granted a charter to this chapter, it exists in name only and receives its direction from the Philadelphia Chapter of the VVAW.

The VVAW is an anti-war organization organized in 1967 with headquarters in New York City. Its first published objective is "to demand an immediate cessation of fighting and the withdrawal of all American troops from Indochina."

A second source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised a representative of the Bucks County, Pa., VVAW, attended a meeting of a seminar sponsored by Vietnamese Patriots in Canada from May 19-21, 1972. The seminar dealt with the history of the Vietnamese people and past and current military struggles in Indochina. There was also a general discussion regarding the plans for future anti-war activities in the United States. According to the source, this discussion was extremely general and was quite unproductive. During a critique of the seminar, the VVAW representatives stated that they would never "fight" for any cause again and would not follow any "political line" since they were anarchists.







In reply to your February 9, 1973, letter, captioned as above, the files and records of this Bureau do not indicate any electronic surveillance coverage directed at telephone numbers 212 725, 5680, 5681, 5682, and 5683 (National Headquarters, Vietnam Veterans Against the War (VVAW), New York, New York); 512 451-2841 (VVAW Office, Austin, Texas); 904 378-07/4 (VVAW Office, Gainesville, Florida); 305 681-7982 (VVAW Office, Hialeah, Florida); and 501 521-7384 (VVAW Office, Fayetteville, Arkansas).

While, as set forth above, we are able to state that we have not directed any electronic surveillance at those VVAW Offices, it is not possible to determine from our records whether there has been any motitoring of calls from or to the above-listed telephones. The reason is that our electronic surveillance indices list only the name of the person who was overheard or against whom an electronic surveillance was directed. For example, if an individual placed a call from one of the above telephone numbers to a monitored telephone, we would not have any way of determining the origin of such call. If the person making the call is identified, his name would be placed in our electronic surveillance indices but the number from which the call emanated would not and could not be verified even if its source was suspected.

You asked that we furnish information on consensual monitoring involving the VVAW telephones. Again, we are unable to provide this information. When there has been monitoring with the consensual of one of the parties thereto, this fact is recorded only in the investigative file of that case. Since the consensual monitoring of telephone calls has been ruled to be a permissible investigative technique, we have mover fall that it was recessary to maintain any central record containing this information.
