WINTER SOLDIER INVESTIGATION AND POSSIBLE
ANTI-WAR MARCH ON STATE CAPITOL SPONSORED
BY VIETNAM VETERANS AGAINST THE WAR AND
SUPPORTED BY STUDENT MOBILIZATION COMMITTEE
(SMC), TALLAHASSEE, FLORIDA, MAY 15, 1971

Sources One and Two advised on May 13, 1971 that tentative plans have been made by the Vietnam Veterans Against the War (VVAW), supported by the Student Mobilization Committee (SMC) at Florida State University (FSU), Tallahassee, Florida for a possible anti-war march to the State Capitol and Winter Soldier Investigation on May 15, 1971 at Tallahassee, Florida. Sources stated that about thirty members of VVAW from Tampa, Gainesville and possibly other areas in Florida were being invited to participate in the events with members of FSU VVAW and SMC and anyone else interested.

A characterization of SMC is attached to the Appendix Section of this memorandum.

The sources stated that if sufficient support develops, the group plans to march in Tallahassee to the front of the State Capitol Building about 2:00 PM, May 15, 1971 and put on an anti-war skit there. Definite plans had been made to have a Winter Soldier Investigation at the Bellamy Building, FSU, from 7:00 to 11:00 PM, May 15, 1971. This will consist of a showing of anti-war films and speeches by veterans about alleged atrocities in Vietnam. Sources stated all activity is planned to be peaceful and a parade permit was being requested from the City of Tallahassee for the march.

On May 15, 1971, Sources One and Three advised that at 2:15 PM, May 15, 1971, eighteen students connected with the VVAW in Florida marched from the J. Byron Department Store to the State Capitol Building in Tallahassee where they arrived at 3:00 PM. Members of the group were dressed in khaki uniforms and carried toy guns and anti-war signs asking that the United States participation in the war in Vietnam be ended now.

WINTER SOLDIER INVESTIGATION AND POSSIBLE ANTI-WAR MARCH ON STATE CAPITOL SPONSORED BY VIETNAM VETERANS AGAINST THE WAR AND SUPPORTED BY STUDENT MOBILIZATION COMMITTEE (SMC), TALLAHASSEE, FLORIDA, MAY 15, 1971

Sources One and Three stated that the group were joined at the Capitol Building by ten other students some of whom were believed to be connected with the SMC group at FSU. The group put on a brief anti-war skit before a sparse crowd at the Capitol and then dispersed without incident. The sources stated that a simultaneous march from FSU planned by SMC did not materialize because of the inclement weather or lack of support.

On May 15, 1971, Sources Two and Four advised that members of VVAW conducted a Winter Soldier Investigation at the Bellamy Building, FSU, from 7:30 to 11:30 PM, May 15, 1971. The affair was publicized by leaflets before hand, was opened to the public and a total of about 75 persons attended. Anti-war films were shown, including one about a Winter Soldier Investigation previously held at Detroit, Michigan. The main event of the evening was a panel discussion led by Scott Camil, identified as Regional Coordinator for VVAW. Other members of the panel were believed to be from Gainesville and veterans of the war in Vietnam. Camil and other individuals spoke of their experiences in Vietnam and regarding alleged atrocities committed there. The group indicated the Florida Legislature was being requested to sponsor a resolution asking that the war in Vietnam be ended now.

Sources Two and Four estimated there were about 20 to 25 members of VVAW at the above affair with most coming from Gainesville, Florida. They advised that SMC members were at the affair but took no known part in the proceedings. Sources stated there is a small group of VVAW at FSU who are known to be strongly against the war in Vietnam but stated they did not know this group to have condoned the use of violence or disruptive tactics to express their opposition to the war. They stated there were no incidents in connection with the above affair.

**STUDENT MOBILIZATION COMMITTEE,
Also Known As

to End the War in Vietnam;
National Student Mobilization Committee**

A source advised on May 16, 1969, that the Student Mobilization Committee (SMC) originally grew out of the National Student Strike for Peace Conference held in Chicago, Illinois, on December 28-29, 1966, which resulted in a call for massive antiwar demonstrations in New York City and San Francisco, California, on April 15, 1967. The National Student Strike for Peace Conference was originally called by the Communist Party (CP) and the Socialist Workers Party (SWP), culminating in a takeover by the SWP element in the Summer of 1968 and the CP element withdrawing. Source further advised that the SMC locally and nationally is controlled by the SWP and its youth arm, the Young Socialist Alliance (YSA), as evidenced by the YSA leadership and participation in SMC activities.

The SWP has been designated by the Attorney General of the United States pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

A report of the Committee on Un-American Activities, House of Representatives, Ninetieth Congress, First Session, dated March 31, 1967, entitled "Communist Origin and Manipulation of Vietnam Week (April 8-15, 1967)," on page 53, states in part, "Communists are playing dominant roles in both the Student Mobilization Committee and the Spring Mobilization Committee."

A second source advised on November 16, 1970, that the New York Regional Office of the SMC was located at 15 East 17th Street, Second Floor, New York, New York, where "The Student Mobilizer" is published. "The Student Mobilizer" is self-described as being published by the National Office of the Student Mobilization Committee to End the War in Vietnam. Source stated that the program of the SMC continues as follows: immediate and unconditional withdrawal of all United States troops from Vietnam, an end to the draft, an end to all forms of campus complicity with the war in Vietnam, self-determination for Vietnam and black America, and Constitutional rights for GIs and high school students.

A source advised on May 14, 1970, that the Young Socialist Alliance (YSA) maintains its national headquarters at 41 Union Square West, New York, New York, and has as its official publication "The Young Socialist Organizer" (YSO). The YSA is the youth organization of the Socialist Workers Party (SWP) and serves as the main source of recruitment into the SWP.

According to the masthead of the "YSO" dated April 29, 1970, the YSA is described as "A multi-national revolutionary socialist youth organization."

The SWP has been designated pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

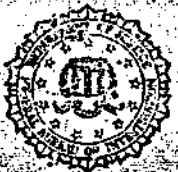

On [REDACTED] went to the VVAW Office which is described as being approximately ten stories in height and apparently completely occupied by radical movements. The VVAW Office is on the tenth floor and the Peoples' Coalition for Peace and Justice (PCPJ) occupies the ninth floor. ~~(u)~~

PCPJ is self described as headquartered in Washington, D.C. and consisting of one hundred organizations using massive, non-violent civil disobedience to combat racism, poverty, repression and war. ~~(u)~~

It was noted that two guards check identity at the entrance. ~~(u)~~

VVAW began organizing in West Potomac Park and approximately one hundred people had already assembled there. Several trucks were observed at this location and radio communications were maintained by them. ~~(u)~~

The [REDACTED] contingent of VVAW was located and recognized were: [REDACTED]

[REDACTED] left the "camp" in combat gear for the Mall by the Washington Monument. ~~(u)~~

These demonstrators with some young people, who had already had a party going, and with several "tag-a-longs," went marching to the Lincoln Memorial. They entered, chanted "Power to the People" and left for the "camp" when the police looked nervous. ~~(u)~~

In "camp" that evening, a rock band entertained the group and some individuals slept with local acquaintances in forty degree weather. *u u*

On April 19, 1971, the group of veterans had grown to nearly one thousand people and a "command van" had arrived from Massachusetts. The group left "camp", dressed in combat regalia and some carried plastic M-16 rifles. They crossed the Potomac Bridge, proceeded into the area directly in front of the main gates of the Arlington National Cemetery, where a religious service was held by an ex-Chaplain, and Gold Star mothers were introduced (they lost their sons in Vietnam). A delegation of five veterans were going to lay two wreaths in the cemetery at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier, one wreath for Vietnamese dead and one wreath for the American dead. However, the gates of the cemetery were locked and guarded. Tempers flared among the crowd and toy rifles were smashed on the gates and a steel helmet was also thrown on the gates. Some members of the crowd urged rushing the gates, but the moderates held and the march moved back across the bridge. One veteran was observed crying because his father was buried in the cemetery. *u u*

The march, following the sidewalks, moved down Constitution Avenue, then moved down a side street to Pennsylvania Avenue to the White House. The crowd, at this time, occupied the right half of the street and was chanting "bring 'em home, bring our brothers home," and a few obscene versions. They passed in front of the Justice Department and chanted "Sieg Heil" with a fascist salute, until some young man on the fourth floor of the Justice Building came out and gave the "peace sign." The march ended on the Capitol steps, there was some internecine haggling; heard where Senator McClosky and Senator Bella Abzug. After a discussion, the crowd marched to the Mall, next to the Capitol, and voted to begin lobbying. *u u*

Most of the veterans went to various offices of Senators and Representatives appealing for a December 31 withdrawal date. *ea*

from Vietnam. Four veterans from California went to see California Senator John Tunney, California Senator Allen Cranston, and California Congressman Alphonso Bell, and as could be predicted, all showed the greatest support for VVAW. *X X U*

The veterans' gear was sent to the Mall and the group slept there. As always, there were scores of "street people" and drugs. Runaway girls were there (some of them incredibly young) and even a contingent of winos stayed in the area wanting free food. *X X U*

On April 20, 1971, approximately one hundred veterans went to the hearings of the Senate Armed Services Committee and another one hundred veterans went to the Senate Foreign Relations hearings. The rest of the veterans were involved in "Guerilla Theatre" in various areas of Washington. No trouble occurred, but the veterans at the Senate hearings had to be admonished occasionally for extensive noise. *X X U*

At approximately 12 p.m., about three hundred veterans, with mounted police leading the way, marched to Arlington National Cemetery again. This time, after a short delay, they were admitted within the gates. They were silent and as they knelt on the asphalt, shots were heard in the distance and the taps were played. The march back was scattered, strung out, and quiet. *X X U* *67c 67d*

On April 21, 1971, the veterans split up into various working groups, lobbying committees, and visiting committees. One committee visited the Armed Services Subcommittee where General Chapman, Commandant of the Marine Corps, was requesting additional four star generals for the Marine Corps. The veterans

were mostly ex-Marines and they remained quiet until the proceedings were over and then demanded time to debate the war, but were rejected. *K & U*

"Guerilla Theatre", that is, acted out skits representing atrocities committed in Vietnam, with local students playing the Vietnamese, were enacted all over town, particularly around the parks, schools and tourists centers. Occasionally it got very realistic and the "Vietnamese" had bruises to show for their efforts. *K & U*

A caucus was held to decide what action would be taken on a Supreme Court injunction against camping on the Mall. Former Attorney General Ramsey Clark, advised the veterans that if they did not pitch tents, cook food, or engage in "sleeping activities" then they could not be arrested for violating the court injunction. Al Hubbard, local VVAW leader, said that staying awake for the remaining 36 hours would be the best approach, but Sam Shore of California, said he would sleep anyway. After a vote of 480 for sleeping and 400 for staying up, it was decided that if they were arrested, they would go peacefully, with their hands on top of their heads prisoner of war style. Various Senators, including Senator Edward Kennedy, California Congressman Dellums, pledged to spend the night with the veterans. I.F. Stone spoke briefly. Despite the anxiety, there were no arrests. Rennie Davis was observed in the camp site. *K & U*

On April 22, 1971, approximately 150 veterans went to the Supreme Court building and defended a ruling on the constitutionality of the Vietnam war. However, when they tried to enter, they were arrested on charges of obstructing justice. 110 in all were arrested. Bail raising campaigns were begun and two more veterans were arrested while trying to raise bail for the others. The charges were reduced and those arrested were released during the early afternoon. *K & U*

Several people offered their homes to the veterans if the court injunction was enforced. Father Wendt, St. Stephen and the Incarnation Church, 16th and Newton, offered his Church *K & U*

as did "The Friends" Meeting House, Florida and 22nd Street, Washington, D.C. Several Senators, including Senator Ted Kennedy, offered their offices to sleep in. *X Q U*

The camp grounds had become a "happening." Kindergarten classes had field trips there; art classes drew and sketched the veterans; visiting liberals joined them; and tourists were everywhere. The "street people" had to be forcibly kicked out, but repeatedly returned to the camp. *X Q U*

On the evening of April 22, 1971, a candlelight march was held by the veterans and they marched down Constitution Avenue to the White House. A cold strong wind blew out the candles and dampened enthusiasm to a great degree. Once again the veterans camped on the Mall and no arrests resulted. *X Q U*

Relations with the Washington, D.C. Police were in general cordial with no hostile action planned because of the control the police exhibited. At one point, when arrests were rumored eminent, bricks and pieces of conduit, as well as rocks were distributed. Gas masks and motorcycle helmets were also in evidence. *X Q U*

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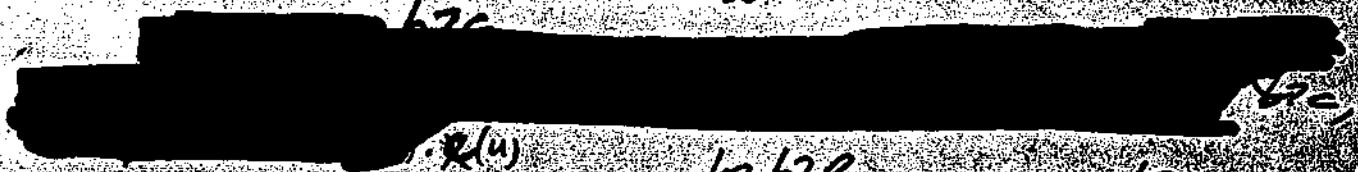

During the VVAW activities, ~~Al Hubbard~~, Jan Crumb, Tim Butz, and others were overshadowed by a more popular and eloquent figure, John Kerry. Kerry was featured on the television show "Meet the Press" and he also appeared in the Senate Foreign Relations Committee room. Kerry was glib, cool, and displayed what the moderate elements wanted to reflect. It appears that Al Hubbard revealed his own ambitions of becoming the VVAW National leader by lying about his former military rank. He claimed to be a Captain, but in reality, was a sergeant. (u)

On April 23, 1971, the last action of the VVAW was a march, single file, to the retaining fence in front of the Capitol. One by one each veteran would say a few words and then throw his metals over the fence. Several veterans actually threw their metals, including one man with a Navy Cross, but most just threw various battle ribbons, discharge papers, draft reclassification cards, Veterans of Foreign War identification cards, helmets and plastic rifles. (u)

a great deal of confusion, however, at approximately 11:30am the march began down Pennsylvania Avenue. The speakers were protected by a string of young parade marchers linked in a circle. The speakers were also protected by unidentified Teamster's Union members. Among the speakers noted were ~~Harold Gibbons, President of the Teamster's Union; Dave Livingston, International Electrical Workers Union; Abe Fineglass, Meat Cutters Union; Mitch Miller, Song Leader; and his girlfriend "Buttons", and Mrs. Warner, the mother of a Marine prisoner of war.~~ The marchers left the fence around the Capitol and the speakers were checked for their appropriate passes (a pink card with "Platform" written on it).

The "Guide to Subversive Organizations and Publications," revised and published as of December 1, 1961, prepared and released by the Committee on Un-American Activities, United States House of Representatives, Washington, D.C., contains the following concerning the "National Guardian": U

"1....'established by the American Labor Party in 1947 as a "progressive" weekly...it has manifested itself from the beginning as a virtual official propaganda arm of Soviet Russia.'" U

Beginning with the February 10, 1968, issue, the "National Guardian" became the "Guardian." U

The May 9, 1970 issue of the "Guardian" is self-described as an "independent radical newsweekly." U

The December 1968, issue of "The New York Times" carried an interview with the editors of the "Guardian." One of the editors stated: "Our job is to build a radical movement. To quote the Cuban Revolutionaries, we are not only to write about it, but also to move along with it... we are movement people acting as journalists." U

"The 'Guardian' takes a strong left position, but it is not identified with any organized group because it believes that an American left ideology is still in the making. One of its purposes is to break away from the cliches of the left ideology of the past." U

A source advised in May 1970, that the "Guardian" is located at 32 West 22nd Street, New York, New York. U

NATIONAL PEACE ACTION COALITION

On October 7, 1970, a source made available a copy of "An Open Letter To All College Students" from the National Peace Action Coalition (NPAC) dated October 6, 1970, which self-described the NPAC as an umbrella organization formed at the Student Mobilization Committee National Emergency Conference Against Cambodia-Laos-Viet Nam War held at Cleveland, Ohio, on June 19-21, 1970, to unite all antiwar forces in the struggle to immediately end United States involvement in Southeast Asia. One aim of the NPAC is to gain the support of labor forces. U

NPAC Headquarters is located at 2102 Euclid Avenue, Cleveland, Ohio, with branch offices located in major United States cities. U

A second source, on October 11, 1970, made available a copy of a paper entitled "Organizing Local Peace Action Coalitions," published by the NPAC, 2102 Euclid Avenue, Cleveland. The paper states that the basic objective of the NPAC is to involve masses of people, including labor unions, GIs, and the black community, in the struggle to end United States intervention in Indochina through orderly and peaceful tactics. These tactics include building mass demonstrations and national conferences, distributing leaflets, selling literature, organizing forums and fund-raising activities, and testifying at state legislature hearings. U

A third source, on September 1, 1970, advised the NPAC was formed and made operational by members of the Socialist Workers Party (SWP). The NPAC is heavily influenced by SWP leadership nationally and is a recruiting ground for this organization. U

The SWP has been designated by the Attorney General of the United States pursuant to Executive Order 10450. U

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The "People's World", a weekly west coast communist newspaper, in its issue of November 5, 1966, in an article on Page 3, describes the Peace Action Council (PAC) as "a coordinating agency for peace activists" which conducts emergency mobilizations and demonstrative actions against the war in Vietnam. u

On July 22, 1966, a source reported that the PAC, which has also been known as the Greater Los Angeles Peace Action Council (GLAPAC), was formed during the early summer of 1966, for the express purpose of protesting the war in Vietnam during the National Governors Conference held in Los Angeles, California, from July 4-8, 1966. Following the conclusion of that conference, the PAC members decided to continue as a coordinating group to sponsor similar protest demonstrations at later dates. u

A second source was contacted on April 24, 1970, and reported that the PAC continues to operate under the same basic concept, noting that in 1968 and 1969, PAC had sponsored demonstrations against Presidents JOHNSON and NIXON, protesting the policies of their respective administrations governing American military commitments in Vietnam. PAC presently maintains its headquarters at 555 North Western Avenue, Los Angeles, California, 90004, telephone number 462-8180. u

A source advised that the Revolutionary Youth Movement II (RYMII) faction of Students for a Democratic Society (SDS) held a national conference at Atlanta, Georgia, from November 26 to 30, 1969. At this conference it was decided to form a new organization to be known as Revolutionary Youth Movement (RYM), characterized as a mass anti-imperialist youth organization, said organization being proposed as separate and distinct in form and content from SDS. The "Principles of Unity" adopted by the conference included a struggle against white supremacy and male supremacy; fights against imperialism, anticommunism, fascism and oppression of youth; and support of the right of self-determination of all "oppressed nations," also support of the right of all "oppressed and exploited" peoples "to armed self-defense." It was agreed that RYM would not be a Marxist-Leninist organization; however, source said this was decided in order to indicate an organization broad enough in form to be acceptable to everyone. A temporary National Steering Committee (NSC) made up of eight females and two males was elected to govern RYM until national officers could be elected during the Spring of 1970. U

RYM publications have listed the RYM National Office (NO) at Post Office-Box 5421 and Post Office Box 77012 C, both Atlanta, Georgia, and a second source has advised that the NO has no office space but would probably be considered as located at Apartment 27, 1067 Alta Avenue, Northeast, Atlanta. U

Second source advised that women dominated the founding conference and have continued to dominate NSC meetings to the point that "women's liberation" has apparently become the RYM's principal issue - also that RYM's poor financial condition has resulted in its failure to publish a paper. During early 1970, RYM has decided to cater to the working class rather than youth, since the potential for for social revolution lies in workers. U

A third source has stated that it was decided at the March 1970, NSC meeting that RYM women had decided the organization will be molded into a "working class, Marxist-Leninist, revolutionary, anti-imperialist, problack nationalist, people's women's liberation organization." U

STUDENTS FOR A DEMOCRATIC SOCIETY (SDS)~~CONFIDENTIAL~~

Students for a Democratic Society, commonly known as SDS, came into existence at a founding convention held during June 1962, at Port Huron, Michigan. From an initial posture of "participatory democracy," Marxist-Leninist ideology of various shadings became predominant during 1968-1969 with debate centering on how best to create a revolutionary youth movement. SDS moved from involvement in the civil rights struggle to an anti-Vietnam war position to advocacy of a militant anti-imperialist line linking up the oppressed peoples of Asia, Africa and Latin America with the black liberation movement in the United States. All major factions within SDS embrace Marxism-Leninism and identify internationally with China, Cuba and North Vietnam as countries leading the worldwide struggles against the United States. However, the Soviet Union was regarded as imperialist and with the Communist Party, United States of America, "revisionist" in nature. u

SDS operated under a national constitution which called for an annual National Convention (NC) and quarterly National Council meetings wherein programs were initiated and debated. Three national officers were elected annually with a National Interim Committee to run the organization. Regional offices and college chapters elected delegates to the national meetings but each functioned independently on local matters. Its official publication "Fire" (formerly "New Left Notes") last appeared in December 1969. u

Internal factionalism of serious proportions developed during 1968 - 1969 and the following three factions evolved as a result of a split at the June 1969, NC: Weatherman, Worker Student Alliance (WSA), and Revolutionary Youth Movement (RYM). The effect of the split on SDS chapters throughout the country was divisive. Some aligned with one or the other of the three major factions. Others, unable to identify with any faction, disassociated with SDS completely and changed names. u

The SDS national office in recent years was located at 1608 West Madison Street, Chicago, Illinois. It was closed in February 1970. u

The Weatherman and RYM groups no longer consider themselves associated with SDS, and the WSA group refers to itself as the true SDS. u

A source advised on May 16, 1969, that the Student Mobilization Committee (SMC) originally grew out of the National Student Strike for Peace Conference held in Chicago, Illinois, on December 28-29, 1966, which resulted in a call for massive antiwar demonstrations in New York City and San Francisco, California, on April 15, 1967. The National Student Strike for Peace Conference was originally called by the Communist Party (CP) and the Socialist Workers Party (SWP), culminating in a takeover by the SWP element in the Summer of 1968 and the CP element withdrawing. Source further advised that the SMC locally and nationally is controlled by the SWP and its youth arm, the Young Socialist Alliance (YSA), as evidenced by the YSA leadership and participation in SMC activities. u

The SWP has been designated by the Attorney General of the United States pursuant to Executive Order 10450. u

A report of the Committee on Un-American Activities, House of Representatives, Ninetieth Congress, First Session, dated March 31, 1967, entitled "Communist Origin and Manipulation of Vietnam Week (April 8-15, 1967)," on page 53, states in part, "Communists are playing dominant roles in both the Student Mobilization Committee and the Spring Mobilization Committee." u

A second source advised on November 16, 1970, that the New York Regional Office of the SMC was located at 15 East 17th Street, Second Floor, New York, New York, where "The Student Mobilizer" is self-described as being published by the National Office of the Student Mobilization Committee to End the War in Vietnam. Source stated that the program of the SMC continues as follows: immediate and unconditional withdrawal of all United States troops from Vietnam, an end to the draft, an end to all forms of campus complicity with the war in Vietnam, self-determination for Vietnam and black America, and Constitutional rights for GIs and high school students. u

WEATHERMAN

1
Initially called the "Action Faction," Weatherman came into being immediately before the June 1969, Students for a Democratic Society (SDS) National Convention (NC). At this NC Weatherman won all three national officer positions and a majority of the National Interim Committee as well. Subsequently, they took over the SDS National Office (NO) in Chicago, and controlled its funds, paper and national records. Although internal struggle existed until late 1969, Weatherman for all major purposes controlled SDS nationally from June 1969, until its NO closed in February 1970. At this time it no longer considered itself part of SDS. U

The term Weatherman emerged from an ideological paper prepared by its leaders entitled "You Don't Need a Weatherman to Know Which Way the Wind Blows" ("New Left Notes" June 18, 1969). This statement outlined the basic stance of Weatherman: Marxist-Leninist in content but with strong advocacy that action not theory would bring about revolution in the United States. This posture was complemented with an international identification to the Cuban revolution and Castro's statement that the duty of a revolutionary is to make revolution. U

During October 1969, Weatherman riots in Chicago resulted in more than 260 arrests for mob action and related charges. A program of armed struggle was finalized during a December 1969, "War Council" wherein terrorist tactics and political assassination were contemplated. The basic strength of Weatherman was then revealed to be some 300 - 350 nationally and geographically apportioned to the Midwest, New York, and some Northwest. U

As its rhetoric of violence escalated, Weatherman leaders increasingly discussed the necessity of an underground operation wherein more than 90 percent of the organization would be submerged; "affinity groups" of three - five members would function independently. In February 1970, Weatherman leaders announced a program of "strategic sabotage" with police and military installations as primary targets. U

In February 1970, Weatherman abandoned the SDS NO, 1608 West Madison Street, Chicago, Illinois, and throughout the country entered an underground status. U

WORKERS LEAGUE,

On September 9, 1970, a source advised as follows:

TIM WOHLFORTH, when a member of the Socialist Workers Party (SWP) National Committee, led a minority group of ten accusing the majority of losing revolutionary perspective. The WOHLFORTH group adhered to the views of British Trotskyists, with whom it secretly consorted, and with certain cothinkers in the International Committee of the Fourth International (FI), a world Trotskyist organization. It accused the leadership of adopting views of those within the FI who favored "bureaucratic" revolution over the genuine "revolutionary working class outlook" of LEON TROTSKY. Domestically, the WOHLFORTH faction opposed SWP orientation toward student activity, feeling the Party should place major emphasis on trade unions and participation in the civil rights struggle. u

Although tolerated for some time, the WOHLFORTH group was expelled from the SWP in July 1964. u

Following expulsion, the WOHLFORTH group formed the American Committee for the Fourth International and planned to work with other radical and militant organizations, concentrating on the civil rights movement which to them is a basic "class" struggle. More recently, the group has devoted time and effort to its call for an American labor party which in its view will enable the working class to exert its latent political power. It plans to build a political party around a publication and classes of instruction in Marxism. u

During November 1966, the organization's name was changed to Workers League. Headquarters are located at 135 West 14th Street, New York, New York. Its publication is the "Bulletin." u

The SWP has been designated pursuant to Executive Order 10450. u

A source advised during August 1969, that at the National Convention (NC) of Students for a Democratic Society (SDS) held in Chicago, Illinois, during June 1969, a split arose between the Progressive Labor Party (PLP) and the National Office (NO), the NO becoming known as the Weatherman faction. The PLP faction drew the largest support among those in attendance at the NC. U

Source further advised that during late Summer, 1969, the PLP faction of SDS established its National Headquarters (NH) on the second floor of a loft-type building at 173A Massachusetts Avenue, Boston, Massachusetts. The campaign on which the PLP faction centered was to build a worker student alliance or a campus worker student alliance. Thus, they adopted the names of Worker Student Alliance (WSA) or Campus Worker Student Alliance. U

Source stated that the "New Left Notes," printed in New York City, is the official publication of the WSA faction. U

A second source advised during January 1970, that within the SDS, the WSA is a caucus of which the PLP constitutes the leadership. U

A third source advised during July 1970, that during demonstrations staged in the Boston area during the Spring and Summer of 1970 by the NH, the main theme of previous demonstrations staged by the NH shifted from protestations of the Vietnam War and other United States foreign policy matters to attacking domestic issues such as racism and unemployment and demonstrating support of the "workers' struggle." U

YOUNG SOCIALIST ALLIANCE

A source advised on May 14, 1970, that the Young Socialist Alliance (YSA) maintains its national headquarters at 41 Union Square West, New York, New York, and has as its official publication "The Young Socialist Organizer" (YSO). The YSA is the youth organization of the Socialist Workers Party (SWP) and serves as the main source of recruitment into the SWP. u

According to the masthead of the "YSO" dated April 29, 1970, the YSA is described as "A multi-national revolutionary socialist youth organization." u

The SWP has been designated pursuant to Executive Order 10450. u

The March 1, 1954 issue of the "Young Socialist Challenge", published as Page 3 of "Labor Action", contained an article concerning the creation of the YSL which pointed out that at a unity convention occurring February 12-14, 1954, at Labor Action Hall, New York City, a merger occurred between the Young People's Socialist League (YPSL) and the Socialist Youth League (SYL). The new organization was named the YSL. u

A source on June 15, 1954, made available the minutes of the YSL's National Action Committee meeting of April 13, 1954, which reflect that one S. SITEMAN, "Chairman of SP (Socialist Party) Youth Committee", had objected to a statement appearing in "Commerce", a New York University Journal, which indicated that the YPSL merged with the SYL to form the YSL. He explained that the YPSL did not merge with anyone, that it continued to exist as the youth section of the Socialist Party. He explained that a small group of the YPSL was dropped, expelled, or suspended from that organization and joined the SYL, which he characterized as the youth group of the "Trotskyite ISL" (Independent Socialist League). He explained that after these few former members of the YPSL joined the SYL, the SYL then proceeded to change its name for its own purposes. u

On April 9, 1956, another source advised as follows:

"The YSL has frequently worked in close sympathetic cooperation with the ISL towards similar objectives, although each major issue given mutual consideration is decided upon by these organizations individually. The YSL serves as an apprenticeship for the ISL, but ISL selection of members from YSL ranks is made on an individual and personal basis. In many instances YSL members are also members of the ISL. The YSL and the ISL utilize the same printing house in New York City and the YSL publication is printed as an insert in 'Labor Action'. Frequently, lectures before the YSL are ISL members." u

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YOUNG SOCIALIST LEAGUE (YSL)

The September 22, 1958, issue to "Young Socialist Challenge", which appeared as Page 5 of "Labor Action", contained an undated statement from the National Action Committee of the YSL which indicated that the YSL had been dissolved. The statement appeared under the caption "Join the Young Peoples Socialist League". U

The YPSL is publicly known as the Youth Affiliate of the Socialist Party - Social Democratic Federation. U

On November 18, 1958, a source advised as follows:

The YSL's announced purpose was to transform the present society into one in which the working class would control production and distribution. Its actual primary function was that of recruiting and training students and young workers for the ISL. U

The national YSL had a branch organization in Los Angeles (LAB-YSL) which was formed in February, 1954, and is now dissolved. The LAB-YSL was in frequent communication with the national YSL headquarters by mail, by visits of national YSL officials to Los Angeles, and occasionally by visits of LAB-YSL members to national YSL headquarters. U

The LAB-YSL heard visiting speakers from national YSL headquarters, received and disseminated its literature, submitted reports from time to time on LAB-YSL activities, sent representatives to national YSL conventions and/or plenums and was represented on the national level by some of its own members. Its activities consistently followed a pattern laid out by national YSL policies and practices and were designed to accomplish the national YSL objectives. U

The LAB-YSL dissolved in October 1958 and became a part of the YPSL. U

The word "Mup" followed by what seems to be a small letter "b", handwritten in the lower righthand margin of the map is apparently a word written in the Russian Language. [REDACTED] who is fluent in reading, writing and speaking Russian, advised that this is the Russian word for peace or world. In the upper right hand corner of the map is handwritten "Aus dem Gewehr entsteht politische Macht!". [REDACTED] advised this is apparently a phrase written in the German Language and one of his officers advised him that literally translated this would mean "part of weapon or rifle grows political power". [REDACTED] stated that the notations made of the locations of the Military Intelligence Regional IV Headquarters in the Columbus, Ohio Field Office of Military Intelligence are apparently correct on the map, however, both of these locations are in the telephone directory and the location would be readily determined by anyone. 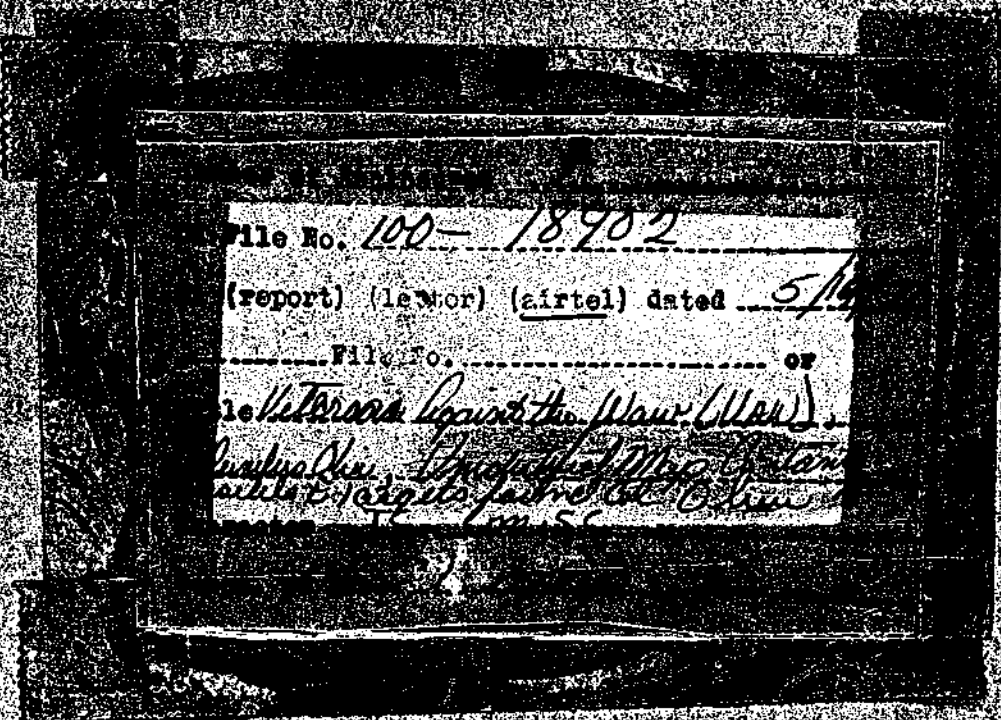

Vietnam Vets Against War To Hold LI March, Hearing

Vietnam Veterans Against the War intend to bring a protest to Long Island, including a march through Queens and Nassau on May 22 and a hearing in Garden City on May 23.

The hearing, dubbed the Winter Soldier Investigation, is to be a full-day inquiry into the nature of military field policies, official and de facto, of all combatants.

"In order to make the average American understand why an organization such as Vietnam Veterans Against the War can exist, he's got to have his face rubbed into the reality of our genocidal prosecution of this war.

"This is why we are grieved to announce our Winter Soldier Investigation," Steve Noetzel of Floral Park, a group spokesman, said.

Included in the investigation, to be held in the Garden City Hotel, will be some 25 Vietnam vets from Long Island who are to give eyewitness testimony of "American-initiated war crimes against the populations of Southeast Asia."

A panel of educators, military experts, psychiatrists, clergy and international law experts is to discuss the testimony.

The march, to heighten public awareness of the investigation, will be a simulated "search and destroy" mission to

show the public how American units sweep through Vietnamese villages.

A company size group of the vets are to participate in the 18-mile march which is to begin in flushing, proceed along Main Street to Union Turnpike, continue east to Jericho Turnpike, then south on New Hyde Park road, east onto Stewart Avenue and into Garden City.

A final planning session for the activities open to all interested citizens, will be held tomorrow at 8:30 p.m. at the Unitarian Church on Plandome Road, Manhasset.

A second confidential source, who was in a position to furnish reliable information, advised that the second day of hearings of the National Veterans Inquiry into United States War Crimes Policy sponsored by the National Committee for a Citizens Commission of Inquiry on United States War Crimes in Vietnam (CCI) was held in the Embassy Room, Dupont Plaza Hotel, Washington, D.C., on December 2, 1970. At this hearing, Steve Noetzel of Floral Park, NY, stated he had served in a Special Forces Detachment in Vietnam from April, 1963 to 1964, and was involved in psychological warfare. Noetzel mentioned that his headquarters were funded by the Central Intelligence Agency (CIA). Noetzel testified to certain observations he had made of the interrogation of prisoners in Vietnam.

The CCI has been characterized as an anti-war group with a New Left political orientation seeking a national inquest into the war crimes question.

On May 12, 1971, a representative of the NYCPD, Security and Investigations Section (SIS), advised that the VVAW will march on May 22, 1971, between 8:00 and 9:00 a.m., from the Quaker Meeting Hall, Flushing to Adelphi College, Garden City, NY. 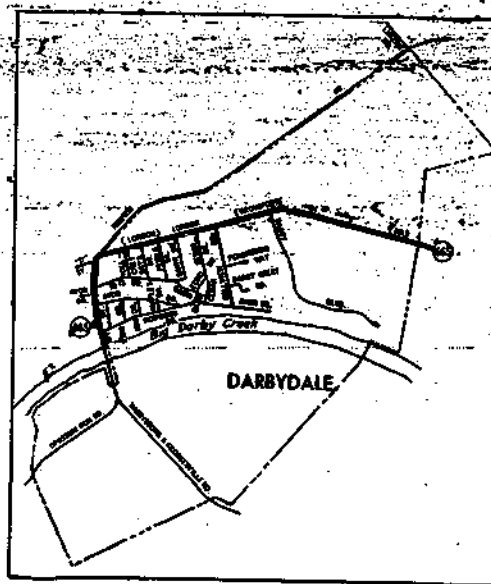
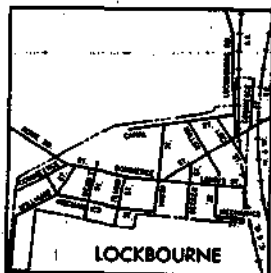
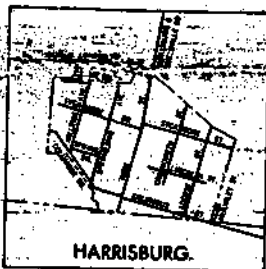
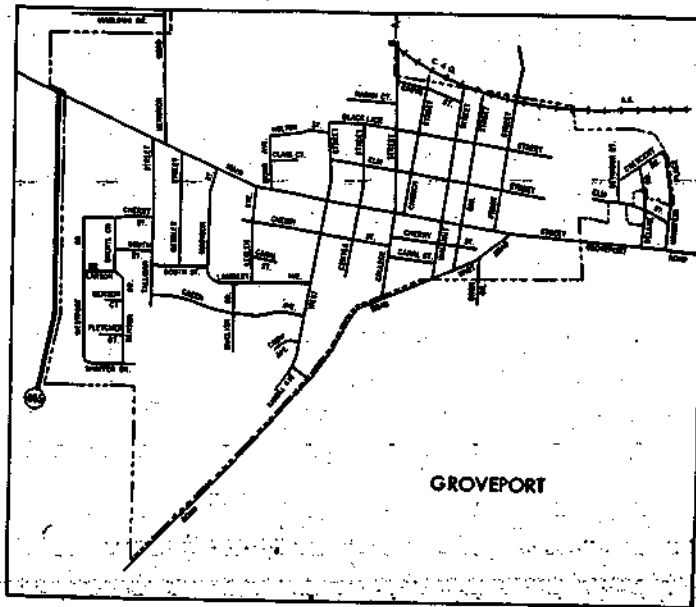
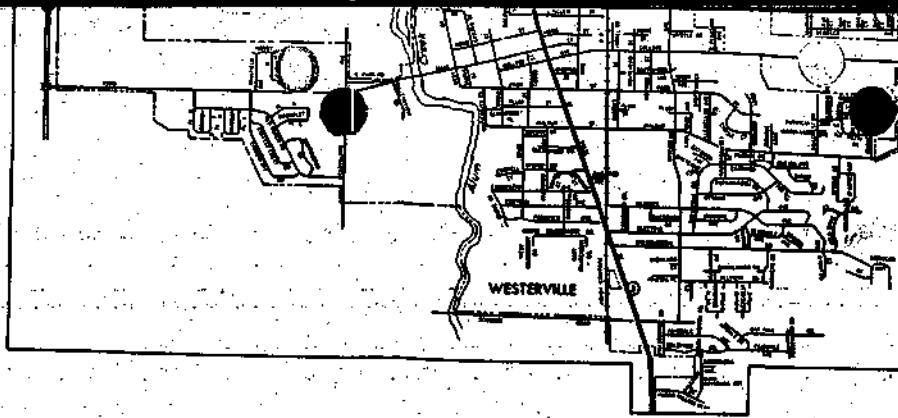
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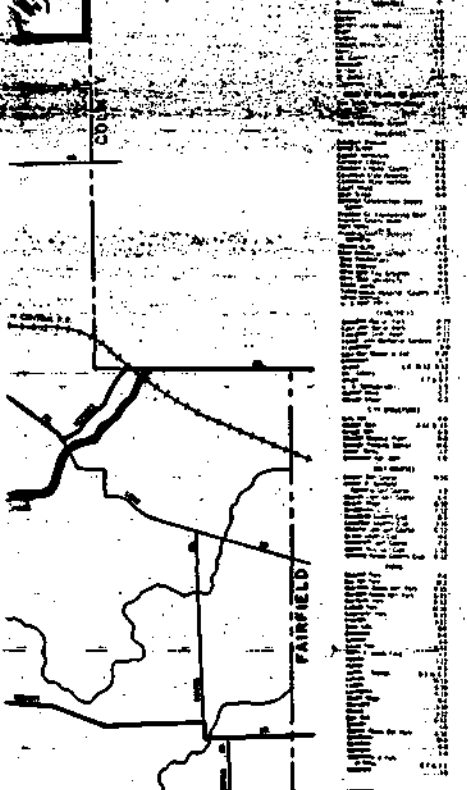
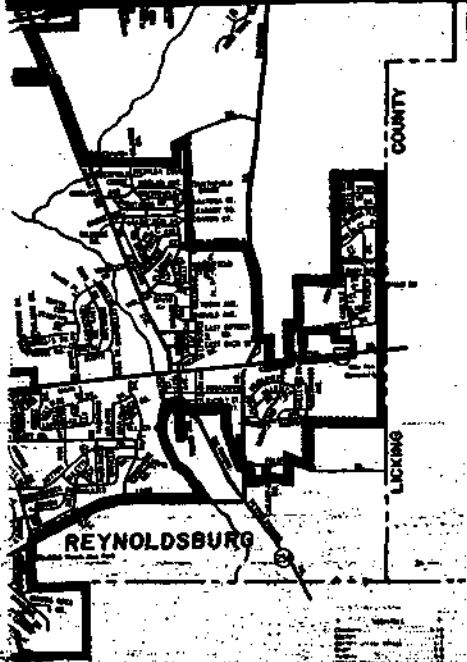


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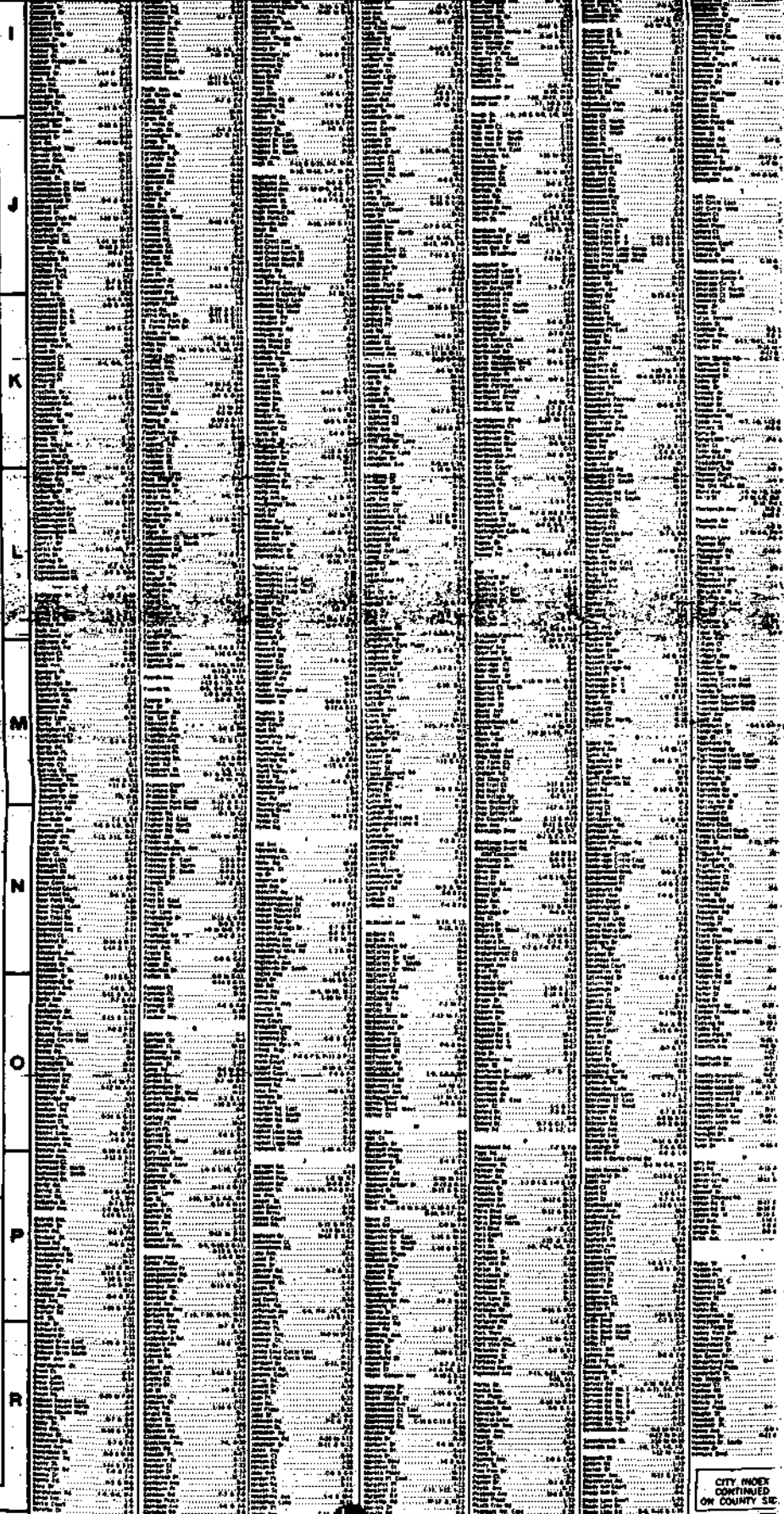


MAP SHOWING

The May 20, 1971, issue of "Thursday," an independent community newspaper published at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT), Cambridge, Massachusetts, carried a front page story entitled "Viet Vets Plan Mem. Day Actions." The following information was gleaned from this article: u

Vietnam Veterans Against the War (VVAW), the national organization of veterans, is now organizing Operation P.O.W., a patrol maneuver from Concord Bridge to Bunker Hill and the Boston Common over Memorial Day Weekend, May 28-31, 1971. u

Operation P.O.W. will commence Friday, May 28, with a signal of "one if by land, two if by sea, three if by air" from the Old North Church, Boston, Massachusetts. The signal will be received by a veteran in Charlestown who will make his way to Concord, Massachusetts, where a horserider will carry the message to the encampment at the Concord Bridge. Upon receiving the alarm, the VVAW will begin their march, retracing the route of Paul Revere's ride on April 18, 1775. VVAW will be focusing attention on the ideals and principles expressed by the colonists at the time of the American Revolution, indicating that this present time in history is again a time when the people are trying to secure the liberty and peace upon which this country was founded. u

During the march, guerrilla theater "search and destroy operations" will be conducted. The evenings will include military counseling and human liberation workshops. u

The marchers will include over 400 Vietnam veterans, a contingent of wounded Vietnam veterans from the Boston area Veterans Administration hospitals, a contingent of Gold Star mothers, and many active-duty GI's and veterans of all wars. u

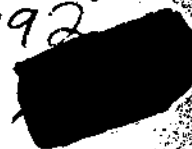
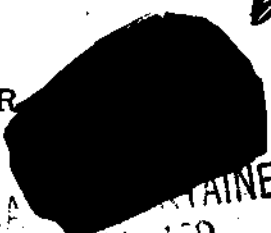

Veterans' Protest Viet War Get Cold Welcome At Capitol

(Special to THE DRIFTWOOD)
By REID CHAMPAGNE

Chanting "bring 'em home, bring our brothers home," the group of Vietnam veterans marched past the headquarters of the Daughters of the American Revolution on their way to the Capitol. A news reporter standing near one woman asked her, "What effect do you think this march will have?"

"Well, I think it will be bad for troop morale."

"But ma'am," the reporter replied, "these are the troops."

This is a story of one of the most important weeks in the history of the anti-war movement. The veterans who participated helped to raise the image of the peace movement to a level of legitimacy and respectability not achieved by any other group; they did it peacefully, and except for one instance, legally. Told by a participant and not a dispassionate observer, this story cannot be completely objective, nor is it intended to be.

Washington was sunny but chilly the day we arrived. There were six of us from New Orleans: Armand Ruhlman, Lemar Joichin, Billy, all of whom were Vietnam veterans; Alfred Churchill, a Korean vet, and Carey Dominique, who along with myself, was a non-veteran. After finding a place to crash, a good hot meal, and a bath, we drove to West Potomac Park, located in back of the Washington Monument.

Already, some 200 to 300 combat dressed vets from as far west as California were milling around

the park, some eating, others talking and chugging Boone's Farm apple wine. (By the end of the week I was convinced that this had become the official drink of the revolution). At first I felt alienated, but became more comfortable as I got acquainted with more of the participants. In walking through the crowd I was struck by the number of disabled veterans that were there. Double amputees were pushed around in wheelchairs, others were walking on crutches or artificial legs.

I introduced myself to Bill, a marine vet who told me he was gratified to know non-veterans were there supporting the cause. Bill was wearing his dress blues to which was attached a Bronze Star, a Purple Heart, and a Vietnam Service medal, all of which were given back to the government on Friday. Another badge for Vietnam ser-

vice, his wooden leg, he will to keep. Like the others I was with, I asked Bill if he there might be violence. Like all the others, respon "I just don't know."

At 8:30 a.m. Monday, vet assembled four abreast for the procession to Arlington. Led by wheelchair double amputee the marchers moved from behind the Lincoln Memorial and across the Lincoln Memorial Bridge.

Hundreds of motorists here for work passed us; some smiling and many flashed us peace sign. Tourists were snapping pictures of us faster than FBI. The size of the march impressive with the vets count about 1200 and the press reporting upwards to 2000. At one point I asked a policeman what the official police estimate was. "About 450," he said matter-of-factly.

The delegation to the wreaths then moved toward the gates of the cemetery. As expected, the gates were immediately shut. Following a short exchange, we soon realized there was little more to be done there. The Gold Star Mothers, visibly shaken, were comforted by two veterans while one angry protestor shattered his toy rifle against the gates.

Although some shouted that we should stay and open the cemetery ourselves, most agreed to continue as planned to the Capitol steps and there ask the Congressmen present why war veterans and mothers of sons buried in Arlington were kept from entering.

Along the route back to the Capitol, a car pulled up alongside of us, and a tall blond man dressed

in a dark brown business suit jumped out and said he wanted to march with us. He was in town attending a convention of electrical workers, but had decided to join our demonstration because he too had lost a number of buddies in the war. He stayed all week.

The Washington Daily News evening edition carried a front page photograph of the march and headlines which read "Arlington Gates Shut to Viet Vets." The administration had put itself in a

very poor light by its action that day. The news put everyone in a good mood; there was a powerful feeling of solidarity generating among us all. No one seemed concerned with confrontation and more importantly, the prospect of violence.

That night I decided to sleep at the campsite in case anything happened. Fortunately nothing did, and by morning the vets were awake and cleaning up the

area which, incidentally, was well kept all week. I walked around trying to discover what was on peoples' minds.

Feeling impotent with their present tactics, a few were still seriously talking about shutting the city down. At the very least, the vets wanted to go back to Arlington and try again to get in.

Be patient? They have every right to be anything but patient. The military life teaches the necessity of getting a job done and getting it done fast. These vets are in Washington to see this war terminated now, and they are expecting the government to move more rapidly in that direction.

Thursday's highlight was a candlelight procession around the White House. Veterans were joined by thousands who had arrived for

Saturday's massive demonstration.

When we returned to the campsite several vets were standing on the wooden platform holding a large American flag upside down (the international signal of distress) and cast themselves in the path of the World War II marines holding the flag at Iwo Jima.

Friday was the finale. All during the morning and afternoon hundreds of vets streamed past a wooden barricade erected around the Capitol grounds and hurled their combat medals and discharge papers onto the lawn.

A young woman held her gold star up for us to see and said: "They gave this gold star to me when my husband died. It's supposed to take his place. See how good it does," and she threw it into the heap of other awards collecting on the lawn.

With the slinging of the last medal, it was announced that this "limited incursion" of Washington was officially over.

While uncompromising in their objective of an immediate end to the Vietnam War, they were equally resolved to using peaceful, non-violent means to achieve their objective.

A poster published by the vets summed it all up. It depicted Abraham Lincoln dressed in full field gear with the inscription: "The world will little note nor long remember what we said here, but it cannot forget what we did here."

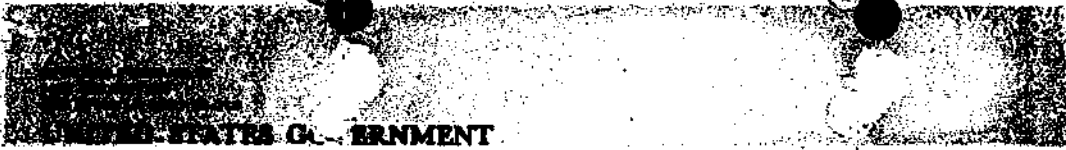

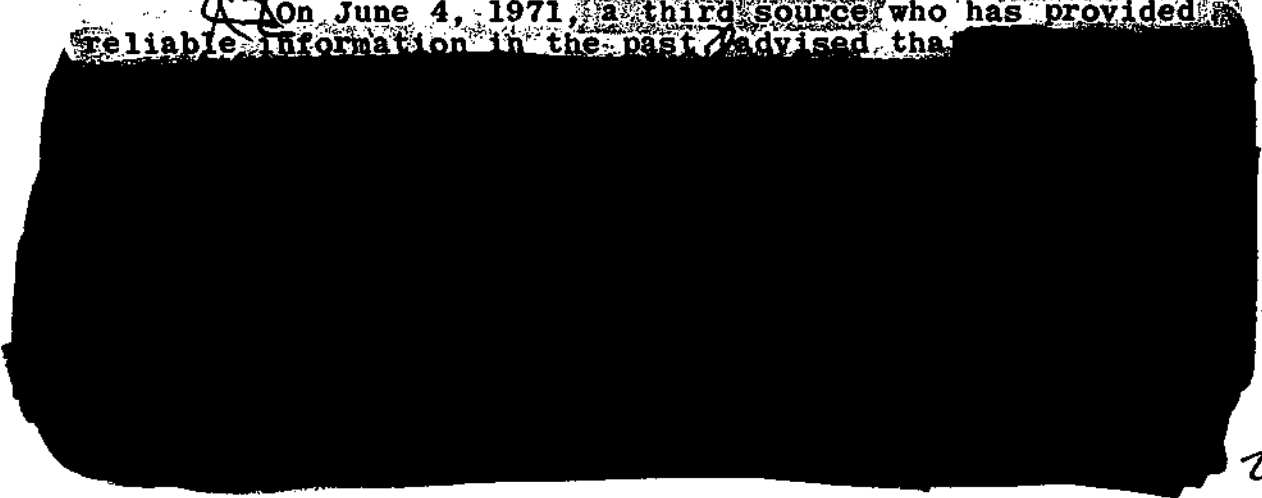

A spokesman for the Vietnam Veterans Against the War (VVAW) charged Sunday several of its members have been offered \$150 a month to act as informers for the federal government.

Larry Rottmann of Corrales, N.M., a member of the newly elected VVAW executive committee, said the organization plans to present more specific charges to Congress next week.

If efforts to appear before several House and Senate committees are unsuccessful, Rottmann said, "we have sponsors" who will conduct special committee hearings.

The steering committee of the VVAW, with an announced total of 75 local, regional and national officers in attendance, wound up a three-day meeting in St. Louis with a press conference Sunday.

VVAW members in Kansas City, New York, Houston, Philadelphia and Boston were offered money by persons identifying themselves as FBI agents, Rottmann charged.

IN EACH case, he said, the "bribe" was \$150 a month.

Rottmann also charged that investigations have been conducted on VVAW members by other federal agencies and in some cases the inquiries resulted in VVAW members losing their jobs.

By informative note 6/8/71 on New York teletype of same date, Director was advised that VVAW plans to hold press conference in Washington, D.C. (WDC), to report that FBI has offered \$150 per month to members of VVAW to recruit them as Government informers. Director inquired "What about this?"

This allegation made by Larry Rottmann of VVAW is completely false, and it is recommended Rottmann be immediately located, confronted with false statements and requested to furnish proof of his unfounded charges.

VVAW is loosely organized antiwar group headquartered in New York City and made up mostly of genuine Vietnam war veterans. No information has come to our attention indicating significant subversive influence in VVAW. We do not actively investigate VVAW nor do we have any informants targeted directly against VVAW. Field offices having considerable VVAW activity merely follow the organization and report public source and other information coming to their attention regarding VVAW plans to demonstrate or cause disruptions in U.S. cities. Such intelligence information has been furnished as developed to the President and other interested high level Government officials.

Regional coordinators of VVAW held meeting in St. Louis 6/5-6/71, attended by approximately 50 individuals, according to St. Louis Police Department. On 6/7/71, article (copy attached for reference) appeared in "St. Louis Globe Democrat," daily St. Louis newspaper, indicating that during VVAW meeting spokesman Larry Rottmann of Corrales, New Mexico, VVAW Executive Committee member, charged several VVAW members have been offered \$150 per month to act as Government informers. Rottmann further alleged that VVAW members were approached in Kansas City, New York City, Houston, Philadelphia and Boston by persons identifying themselves as FBI Agents. He went on to claim more specific charges would be presented to Congress this week (6/7-11/71).

All Agents who would be remotely connected with following VVAW activity in Kansas City, New York City, Houston, Philadelphia and Boston Offices have been canvassed and categorically deny any attempts to recruit as informant or offer any money to any VVAW member. These offices also confirmed that no active investigation of VVAW is being conducted and no informants are being targeted specifically against VVAW. Washington Field Office has developed no information regarding possible press conference by VVAW in WDC or plans to appear before Congressional committees.

At any rate, the matter has been publicized only by local St. Louis newspaper and "Daily World," East Coast communist newspaper. Contact with VVAW or Rottmann by FBI concerning these charges could easily result in much greater publicity for VVAW. Considering sympathy for VVAW as result of their peaceful demonstration in WDC, 4/71, and claims of ill treatment at hands of Justice Department which evicted them from the Mall, it is probable that considerable publicity would work in their favor and definitely against FBI. On the other hand, should group participate in Congressional hearings and further these allegations against FBI, confrontation and vehement denial by Bureau would probably be necessary in any event.

Veterans charge FBI offered jobs as spies

A spokesman for the Vietnam Veterans Against the War (VVAW) charged Sunday several of its members have been offered \$150 a month to act as informers for the federal government.

Larry Rottmann of Corrales, N.M., a member of the newly elected VVAW executive committee, said the organization plans to present more specific charges to Congress next week.

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IN EACH case, he said, the "bribe" was \$150 a month.

Rottmann also charged that investigations have been conducted on VVAW members by other federal agencies and in some cases the inquiries resulted in VVAW members losing their jobs.

for the following day at Walter Reed Hospital in Washington, D.C., to discuss future VVAW activities, and to discuss the upcoming VVAW meeting to be held the following weekend in St. Louis, Missouri.

The first topic of discussion was the memorial service to be held the following day at Walter Reed Hospital. It was announced that an individual from the United Farm Workers, the Chaplain at Walter Reed Hospital, and VVAW member Jack Day would address the service.

It was pointed out that individuals present at the memorial service were to recite the Lord's prayer and during the phrase, "Forgive us our trespasses", six VVAW members were to stand and present testimony regarding war atrocities committed in Vietnam. At this point, there was a short discussion as to how the above should be handled.

██████████ commented that the next phrase in the Lord's prayer "As we forgive those who trespass against us," made the matter "touchy." He noted that no one present at the service would forgive persons such as President Nixon. ██████████ suggested that the procedure be carried out in such a way to make this obvious to those observing the ceremony.

The next topic discussed at the meeting was the VVAW Co-ordinators Meeting to be held in St. Louis, Missouri, during the weekend of June 4 - 6, 1971. ██████████ explained that the above would take place, and he proposed that persons present nominate a Washington regional VVAW co-ordinator for the Washington VVAW Chapter had not done so.

██████████ proposal was not acted on and he then asked whether or not anyone would object to continuing as they had in the past with the individual doing the most work functioning as the "De facto Co-ordinator." No one objected and Mallory commented, "so be it."

[redacted] when suggested that individuals present discuss what they felt the future direction of VVAW should be. A short discussion lead by [redacted] followed.

[redacted] suggested that as an organization the VVAW could run food convoys into Cairo, Illinois. He indicated that some Veterans had done this in the past.

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b7D

[redacted] commented that the situation in Cairo was bad and that several individuals had already been shot. He stated that those from the VVAW who carried food into the area had armed themselves with guns and he suggested that any future convoys be armed.

Following the above, the group broke up with approximately one half of the individuals present remaining to work out final details for the next morning's memorial service at Walter Reed Hospital.

On Saturday, May 31, 1971, approximately 75 individuals filled the chapel at Walter Reed Hospital in Washington, D.C. Many members of the news media were present.

During a recitation of the Lord's prayer, Jack Day of the VVAW announced that there would be a "sharing of guilt" regarding the atrocities committed in Vietnam and he asked that those present repeat the chant, "And forgive us our trespasses." During the above chant a total of six or seven VVAW members stood and "confessed" war atrocities committed in Vietnam. Three VVAW members who participated in the above

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"confession", included Mallory, Czyzewski, and one Lenny (Last Name Unknown). Most of the "confessions" involved situations where the Veterans observed Vietnamese dying and not caring about the person. One unidentified Veteran, however, called for the end of Capitalist exploitation of "third world peoples." This individual was a white male, approximately six feet tall, 190 pounds, heavy build, blond hair, fair complexion. U

An unidentified individual who indicated he was from the United Farm Workers then addressed the congregation. He told an anecdote regarding an individual whom he referred to as Joe Hill, and explained that Hill had been executed some time ago in the State of Utah by a firing squad. He said that one of Hill's last words were for individuals not to mourn but rather to organize. He then asked the congregation to chant the phrase, "Don't mourn, organize." The speaker from the United Farm Workers was described as a white male, five feet ten inches, 210 pounds, heavy build, dark hair, 40 years of age. U

Following the above, Congressman Edwards addressed those present in the chapel. He spoke briefly and merely called for an end to the war in Vietnam. U

Following the Memorial Day service, a number of veterans gathered to hold a picnic at Rock Creek Park in Washington, D.C. Present at the gathering were two individuals who indicated they had just returned from the recent Venceremos Brigade in Cuba. U

VENCEREMOS BRIGADE

The Venceremos Brigade was formed in June, 1969, by a coalition of New Left organizations to encourage American youth to travel to Cuba in defiance of a ban on travel to that country by the United States Department of State. The ostensible purpose of the travel was to assist the Castro regime in the harvesting of sugar cane and other agricultural products and to

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give young Americans the experience of living in a revolutionary communish country.

Both of the above individuals were white. One was a male, age approximately 20, five feet ten inches, 160 pounds, build medium to slender, dark hair. The other, a female, had blue eyes, light complexion, and hair, was approximately 20 years of age, five feet four inches, 120 pounds, medium build.

The unidentified male made the following pertinent comments regarding the VB:

Individuals participating in the last VB cut sugar cane and toured the Island of Cuba. He indicated that the cane itself was cut by hand and that the Cubans were investigating the possibilities of utilizing different methods to harvest the crop. They explained that the Cuban government has sent observers to all parts of the world that grow sugar cane, with the exception of Louisiana, to develop information regarding more efficient methods to harvest the crop. In the case of Louisiana, the Cuban government has indicated it is obtaining the knowledge via second hand methods. This individual did not elaborate on the above.

This individual further stated that the Cuban government expects to have cane cutting almost completely automated within five years. Cutting machines are to be imported from Australia. This person further stated that at the present time Cuba is a one product economy but is attempting to diversify its economic structure. In the future, Cuba expects to mine large deposits of nickel which lay untouched. Scientific research is being done on a very practical level in the island. Cuban officials expect to greatly expand the fishing industry and they indicated that there are vast resources which have been unexploited to date.

The unidentified female then commented that the male must have been reading her notes. He admitted that he had. From the conversation, both inferred that VB participants had been given lectures on the Cuban economy.

The unidentified female was then overheard to comment that production in Cuban factories was dictated by a central committee. She indicated that the decision regarding the quantity of production was made on the basis of what had been done in the past, what new methods existed,

and what extent the central committee on production felt that production could be increased at the particular factory. She indicated that there existed a body of individuals who were elected by the workers on the basis of their dedication. The function of this body was to "raise the consciousness" of workers.

Individuals who excelled within this body, the unidentified female explained, could eventually be accepted as members of the Party.

"ST. LOUIS, June 7-National representatives of the Vietnam Veterans Against the War wound up a three-day conference here yesterday with an announcement of plans for the coming months.

"The veterans will step up their lobbying campaign in Washington in support of the McGovern-Hatfield bill to withdraw all U.S. forces from Indochina by the end of 1971. They have designated June 14 as the target date for a nation-wide effort by veterans to swing public opinion behind the McGovern-Hatfield bill.

"A decision was reached to hold a press conference in Washington this week to expose overtures by the FBI to regional coordinators of the veterans group to become paid informers. Offers of money up to the amount of \$150 a month were mentioned as the sale price by FBI agents who made contact with members of the group. Full details about the agents involved will be disclosed in the news conference.

"A task force was established to coordinate work on the drug problem among veterans. The task force will formulate a legislative program and seek an updated rehabilitation program through the Veterans Administration hospital system.

"Plans were announced for a 'limited incursion of Vietnam Veterans into middle America' for July 3-5 at Kansas City, Mo.

"Johnny Upton, 24, of Kansas City, said the rally was planned for 'the heart of America' because 'we feel the East and West Coasts have been barraged with anti-war sentiment and middle America is being neglected.'

"The action in Kansas City will include an encampment of veterans and various educational programs to dramatize the nature of the war and the problems of returned servicemen."

It was previously reported that during Vietnam Veterans Against the War (VVAW) meeting, St. Louis, 6/4-6/71, allegations were made that FBI Agents had offered VVAW members up to \$150 to become informers against VVAW. Our New York Office (NYO) vigorously pursued this matter with VVAW Headquarters, New York City, but VVAW resorted to delaying tactic stating no information would be forthcoming pending meeting of VVAW Executive Committee. This meeting was postponed repeatedly, and when it became obvious VVAW had no supporting facts whatsoever, we discontinued, with the Director's approval, further investigation in this matter. \

Attached relates VVAW Headquarters contacted NYO today (6/21/71) and stated Executive Committee meeting held and decision made not to release any information to FBI since VVAW certain alleged contacts were made by FBI Agents. This move is not surprising and is further indication VVAW allegations are unfounded. \

A confidential source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised on June 21, 1971 that a march and demonstrations sponsored by an organization called The Coalition to Take Brooklyn Out of the War and the Vietnam Veterans Against the War (VVAW) were held in Brooklyn, New York (NY) on June 19-20, 1971. U

On June 19, 1971, at about 11:15 a.m., demonstrators began gathering at the corner of Ocean Parkway and Kings Highway, Brooklyn, NY. The march started at about 1:30 p.m. and consisted of about 100 persons most of whom were dressed in army fatigue type clothing. Most of the marchers apparently were veterans. The march proceeded by way of Ocean Parkway, Campus Road and Flatbush Avenue into Prospect Park where it ended in the Long Meadow late in the afternoon. Some observers indicated hostility to the marchers but no incidents were noted. U

During the evening of June 19, 1971, rap sessions on the war were held by small groups. When darkness appeared the VVAW held a memorial service for the dead servicemen in Vietnam. U

Approximately 250 persons, about 100 of whom were veterans, remained in the park overnight.

On June 20, 1971 at about 12:00 noon, the VVAW conducted mock "search and destroy" missions in the park. At about 2:00 p.m., a rally was held in the Long Meadow. It consisted of rock music and speeches. The speakers were mostly political figures including Representative Bella Abzug of Manhattan, New York City (NYC). The speeches all advocated a quick end to the war in Vietnam.

Another speaker was Sister Elizabeth McAllister who also spoke in opposition to the war in Vietnam.

Sister Elizabeth McAllister is publicly known as a Roman Catholic nun who is a member of the "Harrisburg Six," a group of individuals who were indicted by a Federal Grand Jury during January, 1971, on charges of conspiracy to kidnap a high government official and to destroy government property.

A crowd of about 2,500-3,000 persons attended the rally. It ended about 4:00 p.m. No incidents or arrests were noted.

On June 21, 1971, a representative of the New York City Police Department, Security and Investigations Section, advised that the march and rally for peace in Prospect Park, Brooklyn, on June 19-20, 1971, took place without incident and that there were no arrests.

Copies of this document are being disseminated locally to the 108th Military Intelligence Group, the Investigative Service Office, the Office of Special Investigations of the United States Air Force, the Secret Service and the United States Attorney, Eastern District of New York.

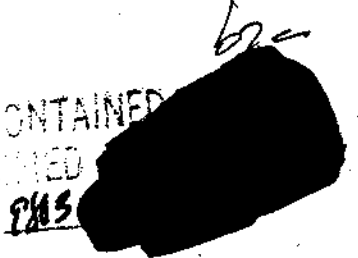

Only about 150 individuals arrived and were present at 5:00 p.m. when various persons spoke at the Liberty Memorial. There were no confrontations with the police. b2 b7D

On July 5, 1971, [redacted] b7c b7D advised that activities continued on July 4, 1971, and out-of-town visitors continued to arrive. Guerrilla theatres were conducted in the morning. The highlight of the day was a candlelight march at 8:30 p.m. by all participants. [redacted] advised that there were no confrontations between participants and police on July 4, 1971. b2 b7D

On July 5, 1971, [redacted] b7c b7D advised that on the morning of July 5, 1971, activity centered around the laying of a wreath in the vicinity of the Liberty Memorial. Activities broke up at 11:00 a.m. and all visitors left Kansas City.

WAR (VVAW) CONFERENCE

The VVAW was founded in the spring of 1967 by six young Vietnam veterans in New York City. At the beginning of 1968, with 600 members, VVAW opened a national office, founded the first GI newspaper, "Vietnam GI", and sent close to 500 veterans into the McCarthy campaign to beat down the red baiters. After getting gassed at the Democratic convention at Chicago and caught in the general "down" of the peace movement, VVAW was nearly inactive until the moratoriums in the fall of 1969. Members of VVAW led student strikes on major campuses across the country and battled Veterans Administration Hospital authorities over threats to throw amputee Vietnam veterans out for signing anti-war petitions. At present, membership of the VVAW, nationally, consists of 8,500 members.

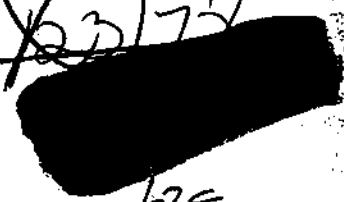

The confidential source advised that the Indiana delegation was holding a caucus concerning the activities of the Peoples Peace Treaty. A nine point program was being discussed by the group in an effort to accomplish the aims and objectives of the Peoples Peace Treaty. Approximately twenty delegates from the State of Indiana were present at this meeting. John Mc Auliff from Indianapolis mentioned that the Peoples Peace Treaty organization should obtain the endorsement of the individual who had stolen the Vietnam war papers and had furnished them to the New York Times. However, no direct resolutions were obtained from this meeting. At the conclusion of the conference on Friday, June 25, 1971, many of the members retired to the Friedman Church located nearby.

At approximately 8:30 AM on the morning of June 26, 1971, breakfast was held in the basement of St. Michael's Church. During breakfast it was mentioned that a demonstration was to be scheduled in support of the Welfare Rights organization of Milwaukee in the downtown Milwaukee area. Several members of the conference agreed to support this demonstration and proceeded to the downtown area.

At approximately 10:30 AM, the group reassembled in the gymnasium where numerous speakers were assembled who discussed topics concerning the Peoples Peace Treaty and the results of the May Day actions in Washington, D.C. Some of these speakers were:

Bill Weck spoke on May Day demonstrations in Washington, D.C. and the results of the demonstrations. Jack White stated that an armed revolution in the United States would not succeed and that the only way to take over this country was by an economic revolution. These speeches were concluded at approximately 12:00 PM.

At approximately 2:00 PM, a meeting was scheduled for the Vietnam Veterans Against the War. Leaflets were distributed setting forth nine objectives concerning the war in Vietnam. The following objectives were listed:

OBJECTIVES OF VIETNAM VETERANS AGAINST THE WAR, INCORPORATED

1. To demand an immediate cessation of fighting and the withdrawal of all American troops from Indochina. We cannot allow one more human being to be killed in Indochina.
2. To demand Congress enact legislation for the immediate termination of all funds being utilized by the United States government, its allies and the Central Intelligence Agency to support their illegal operations in Latin America, Africa, China, Europe and the countries of Vietnam, Cambodia, Laos, and Thailand.
3. To demonstrate that our military tactics dehumanize soldiers and civilians, and to make clear the United States government is prosecuting an illegal, unjust and immoral war in Indochina.

4. To show Americans that their society is structured by a racism which lets us view all non-whites as less than human. This racism pushes our minorities through inferior schools and into the combat arms. Thus, we send our minorities off to die in disproportionately high numbers while we kill Asians indiscriminately. We demand that the military recognize its complicity in America's domestic and international racism.
5. To make clear that the United States has never undertaken an extensive open investigation of American war crimes in Indochina. We demand that the United States government, in its war in Indochina, affirm the principles of Nuremberg. As former GI's, we recognize the responsibility of the individual soldier to refrain from committing war crimes. We also recognize that the responsibility and guilt of war crimes committed in the name of America lies with our policy makers at all levels.
6. To demand that all active-duty servicemen and women be afforded the rights as citizens that are guaranteed by the United States Constitution and Bill of Rights that are presently denied them by the Uniform Code of Military Justice. We are appalled that servicemen and women are treated as less-than-first-class citizens. We endorse the efforts of our active-duty sisters and brothers in their struggle to democratize the military.
7. To support all military personnel refusing to serve in wars of aggression at home and abroad. We demand Congress enact legislation for the immediate repatriation with full amnesty to those brothers and sisters who are in prison or in self-exile by reason of their refusal to serve in the military. We support all persons refusing to be drafted.
8. To demand immediate legislation to provide proper care and services for all veterans in V.A. hospitals; to make available job training and placement for every returning veteran; and to provide the funds and means necessary for their educational and vocational endeavors.
9. To affirm that the membership is not only concerned with ending this war, but changing the domestic social, political and economic institutions that have caused and permitted the continuance of war.

It was also mentioned at this meeting that the GI's should demonstrate against the Tyrrell Jewelry Stores throughout the United States. These stores steal from GI's while they are serving on military duty.

A general discussion was held by the group concerning the nine point objectives of the group and a proposal was established as follows:

THE PROPOSAL OF THE G.I. AND VETERANS

We feel it necessary to urge the PCPJ to establish Regional Offices and structures to implement programs around the G.I. Movement. We feel that the Peace Movement has failed to recognize the fact that the G.I. movement is an important, integral part of the immediate ending of the Indo-China War. Also, the G.I. movement with the support of P.C.P.J. can become an important force to defeat racism, repression and the imperialistic activities of this illegitimate government.

Therefore, we have enclosed several proposed guidelines for implementing a National or Regional program around the G.I. movement.

This meeting terminated at approximately 4:00 PM. A general meeting was scheduled at approximately 4:15 PM of the Midwest Regional Workshop consisting of the States of Michigan, Ohio and Indiana. Approximately one hundred people were gathered for this regional meeting and it was decided that the group should break up into State Units. The Indiana delegation met and discussed the possibility of setting up an Indiana Peoples Coalition for Peace and Justice. Janet Bayer and Marece Neagu were the main speakers for this organizational meeting. At approximately 5:00 PM, the group returned to a main unit where general discussion concerning Peoples Coalition for Peace and Justice was held. It was decided there that there is too much racism and that the group should prepare a statement concerning racism to be presented to the main caucus.

The following resolution was submitted:

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PEOPLES COALITION FOR PEACE AND JUSTICE NATIONAL CONFERENCE

Preamble to the Mid Midwest Resolution

The mid midwestern caucus recognizes that the PCPJ must eradicate all manifestations of racism which exist within the movement. The inherent racism was evident when, following the Cambodian invasion, the Kent State murders became a major issue throughout the movement while the tragedies at Jackson State and the Chicano Moratorium activities in Los Angeles were almost totally ignored.

We must recognize this inconsistency of which we are all a part, and struggle now to align ourselves as members of the peace movement with the corresponding peace movement in the Third World.

The mid midwest caucus would like to present this resolution and demand its adoption by this conference.

Be it resolved: that the PCPJ make itself aware of facts concerning the repression of the Chicano Moratorium in September, 1970 and January, 1971 and the murder of a Chicano brother.

We urge that the PCPJ demand a Grand Jury investigation into the repression of the Chicano peace movement. Be it further resolved that the PCPJ will take decisive action to support all further Chicano activities.

At approximately 7:00 PM, the Veterans for Peace group reassembled and a discussion was held again pertaining to the objectives and aims of the Veterans for Peace.

The Peoples Peace Treaty workshop proposal at this meeting consisted of the following five points:

Peoples Peace Treaty

Workshop Proposal

1. The Coalition urges its affiliate groups to develop summer ratification campaigns through their organizations and in their communities.

2. The Coalition reaffirms that the demonstrations which it organizes are seen as a means of implementation of the treaty-- and this will be reflected in Coalition organizing and propaganda.
3. In promoting the slogan of Set-the-Date, the Coalition will project it in the context of being Point 1 of the Treaty.
4. This conference expresses its solidarity and support of Huyn Tan Mam and the other Saigon students now under indictment for treason because of their courageous anti-war stand and their role in drafting the Treaty. The National Steering Committee and affiliate groups should express this solidarity especially through demonstrations and letters of protest to the United States and South Vietnamese governments at the time of the treason trial (probably late July or early August.)
5. National coordination of the Peace Treaty will continue to be done through the New York office (156 5th Avenue, Room 527, New York 10010; telephone 212-924-2469).

The following demonstrations were submitted for specific action by the PCPJ:

PROPOSALS FOR SPECIFIC ACTIONS

August 6 - (Hiroshima Day) - Regional actions, where possible, including civil disobedience, directed (where possible) at targets associated with the air war - ie., air force bases, war research labs, bomb and plane factories, air force recruiting stations, etc.

The political emphasis, obviously, would be on the technological war against the Vietnamese people and their revolution, stressing that Nixon's "withdrawal" plans merely cover the continuation of genocidal bombing.

During the week of October 9 through October 16, there should be a full week of coordinated local and regional actions against the war in Indochina and against injustices at home. It should include purely educational events (teach-ins, leafletting brigades, guerilla theatre), mass peaceful legal demonstrations, mass non-violent civil disobedience, and a call for student strikes and work actions and stoppages.

On Wednesday, October 13, there should be a mass peaceful legal demonstration in every city across the country, and if we do our work, these demonstrations should be much larger than the moratorium rallies of 1969. On the same day there should be student strikes and work actions and stoppages. There should be maximum cooperation between us and NPAC in building for this day.

On Thursday and Friday, October 14 and 15, there would be mass non-violent civil disobedience demonstrations in as many cities as possible, and would focus on war contractors, major corporations and federal government buildings and would be planned by local People's Coalitions.

Work actions and stoppages should be seen as an important aspect of our program. Therefore, a part of our energies should be going into doing our best to increase the chances of their occurrence. We should be working with the labor movement and workers at all levels-speaking at locals, speaking to labor leaders, leafletting plant gate giving support to community projects in working class communities, organizing teach-ins in working class high schools and communities. Further work around some issues should also be done with white collar workers and government employees. Staff should be found both at a national and local level who can work at this.

In order to follow up on the regional actions of October 13, we propose a series of demonstrations during the week of November 6-13. On Saturday, November 6, there should be a militant massive legal march through the streets of Washington ending with a brief rally. This format hopefully will counter the sluggish and static atmosphere of previous massive rallies and set the stage for the next few days' protests. Sunday, November 7, should be a day for regional meetings and a rally led by SCLC, NPRO, and other groups working on domestic issues, to continue the offensive against domestic injustice, inequality and repression. On Monday and Tuesday, November 8 and 9, acts of civil disobedience at selected federal targets should occur. These demonstrations should be disruptive, but involve non-mobile tactics and focus in part on the continued air war against the Vietnamese people. Militant torchlight marches through the streets of Washington on the nights following these days of civil disobedience will serve to sustain momentum and create the atmosphere necessary.

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At the New York conference, approximately 2,000 delegates from 100 cities in the United States from 40 states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, and the Virgin Islands were present. The sessions were complete, programmatic, and highly successful. The delegates were photographed and distributed to other delegates for their information. The Communist Party of the United States was selling numerous publications at the conference and also numerous articles pertaining to New Left activities in the United States were sold for sale during the conference.

After the Saturday conference, several members of the Indiana delegation decided nothing further could be accomplished by them and therefore departed for Indianapolis, Indiana.

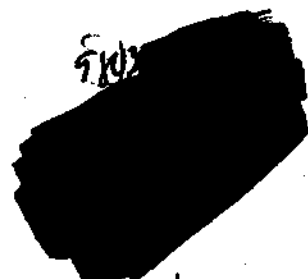
