On October 23, 1970, a first confidential source, who is in a position to furnish information of this type, advised a brief rally was held on the Oval, Ohio State University (OSU), Columbus, Ohio, on the same date to call for action by other colleges and to publicize student dissatisfaction with indictments returned against Kent State University students and faculty by the recently convened Portage County, Ohio, Grand Jury.

Source stated that representing the group known as Vietnam Veterans Against the War (VVAW), spoke to approximately six hundred (600) students. He called for a nationwide moratorium to support the twentyfive (25) indicted students and faculty members.

VIETNAM VETERANS AGAINST THE WAR

The Vietnam Veterans Against the War (VVAW) is a national organization whose membership opposes the war in Vietnam and the Selective Service System. The VVAW has sponsored demonstrations in protest against the war in Vietnam throughout the United States.

The October 26, 1970, edition of the "Ohio State Lantern," the official OSU campus newspaper, reported the October 23, 1970, activities by stating that the purpose of the moratorium was "to exonerate the Kent State 25," Timothy Holder, President of the VVAW said.

On February 17, 1971, the first confidential source described the Ohio Veterans Peace Coalition, the name given at the VVAW meeting of January 23, 1971, as a paper organization for the purpose of setting up a strong coalition and to enable the VVAW to advertise and to use the backing of a statewide organization for its future activities. In connection with the Winter Soldier Investigation, the source advised, although numerous Vietnam servicemen testified at Detroit, Michigan, the purpose of the gathering really failed.

On February 17, 1971, the first confidential source evaluated the strength of the VVAW by stating its activity has decreased and the organization lacks dynamic leadership

According to the second source, the current activity of the VVAW is centered around raising money through donations to assist the earthquake victims in California.

On May 5, 1972, a third confidential source, who has furnished reliable information in the past and who is in a position to furnish information of this type, advised has continued the rental of Post Office Box 3056, United States Postal Service, Columbus, Ohio, for the VVAW, Columbus, Ohio.

On August 2, 1972, a fourth confidential source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised the VVAW is inactive and no information has come to the attention of the source concerning or his involvement in any revolutionary activities.

The VVAW is a national organization, composed primarily of veterans of the Vietnam War, which has conducted demonstrations against the war during 1970-1972. Its first published objective is to demand an immediate end of fighting and withdrawal of all American troops from Indochina.

On February 15, 1973, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised that Barry Romo, National Coordinator of VVAW, was in Denver and was in Room 214, University of Colorado, Denver Center, at 12:00 noon that day. There were about 30 persons present for the event and all appeared to be in sympathy with Romo's position. Source saw the Regional Office of VVAW in Denver, Colorado at the talk. Romo's appearance lasted until approximately 1:10pm. He spoke for about 40 minutes concerning his trip to Vietnam with Joan Baez, folk singer, retired general Telsford Taylor and a member of Clergy and Laity Concerned, a religious anti-war group made up of church leaders and laymen. learned that Romo advocates help for the North Vietnamese and during his talk he stated that he was a Socialist and a Marxist and that he was not a pacifist.

The February 18, 1973 issue of the "Denver Post", daily Denver, Colorado newspaper, in reporting on Romo's appearance at the University of Colorado Denver Center, identified him as a former U. S. Army lieutenant, who visited Hanoi during the bombing in December, 1972. The article indicated that Romo and the others he accompanied took 500 letters to prisoners of war in North Vietnam and brought back 600 letters from these persons. The article also

indicated that Romo was in South Vietnam in 1967-1968 as an infantry platoon leader with the American Division. It stated that Romo, one of six VVAW National Coordinators, was in Denver seeking support for VVAW programs aimed at eradicating what the organization sees as racism, sexism and imperialism in the United States.

The February 20, 1973, issue of the Fourth Estate, official campus newspaper of the University of Colorado Denver Center, contained an article concerning Romo's appearance at that institution. The article indicates Romo's position concerning the recent peace treaty to be that peace has not been achieved and that the treaty has simply taken the situation to what it was in 1954. Romo claimed that the intensified bording by U. S. forces was a campaign to terrorize and demoralize the North Vietnamese people and not to destroy military targets.

uno has furnished reliable information in the past and an Agent of the FBI, attended Barry Romo's talk held in Room 157 of the University Memorial Center, University of Colorado, Boulder, Colorado, from 3:00-4:00pm' on February 16, 1973. Approximately 50 people attended the lecture with about ten leaving prior to its conclusion. Romo's comments concerning his trip to Hanoi were the same as those made by him on the previous day, and again he stated that he was a Socialist and not a pacifist. He recommended to those present the reading of "Two Years of Viet Cong" by George Smith and "The Hidden History of the Korean War" by I. F. Stone.

During his talk Romo indicated he served 11 months with the 11th brigade and one month with the 196th brigade while in Vietnam and also Battalion S2 (Intelligence Officer) during the first Tet offensive in 1968.



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

Minutes, Regional Meeting, 11-12 November

Chapters present: Dayton, Cincinnati, Columbus, Ft Wayne, Kent, Eastern Kentucky, Lexington, Athens, Indianapolis and Cleveland.

1. A request for support of the regional action in Cincinnati on November 18th was greeted with the counter-suggestion that VVAW participate as an organization (thus cancelling the earlier opposition) due to the changed nature of the originally N-PAC demonstration. There will be no official endorsement which might be misused, but members are encouraged to participate.

(Information--the action starts on November 13 at noon in Fountain Square with speeches to be followed by a march through the downtown area; for those coming south on I-75, exit at the 5th St exit which will take you to Fountain Square (at the corner

of 5th and vine)).

- 2. The next regional meeting should be called for a time when the participants can actually be there--and should then start when it is supposed to start.
- 3. Money--both the regional office and the regional coordinator need funds. Even the money previously pledged for the film Winter Soldier has not yet come in.
- 4. Lettuce Boycott--Once again a request for endorsement of the lettuce boycott. This was endorsed at the regional meeting in August, but will be mentioned again in the next region I newsletter.
- 5. Gamesville tour will begin on November 26 in Cincinnati. The regional office wants to get a precise and full schedule for the time the speakers will spend in a given area—to include information about the forum in which they will speak, time spent in travel, what kind of audience, what can be expected. A press conference should be scheduled on arrival, the schedule should be distributed to the press, and another press conference may be useful when they leave a local area. As complete a schedule as possible should be sent to the regional office—and be ready to mail from there—by November 20.

Taped interviews should be contemplated as a possibility if there is no way to schedule live programs.

- 6. There is as yet no information about the Nuyen Van Troi Hospital project.
- 7. Discussion of Objective 3, and the change in that objective was deferred until the next meeting. In the meantime, an analysis of the change, no doubt highly biased, will come from the Regional Coordinat
- 8. The monthly discussion on membership requirements was initiated by the Columbus Chapter. There was some small disagreement, basically normal, but perhaps a little more violent than usual.

- First Casualty will be out one of these days, maybe. At the moment the problem is money--chapters are urged to send in articles, pictures, poems, or whatever. Redwood City Chapter denies this although they do work with the Vencerchem Organization in community projects. The Redwood City Chapter is currently working on "Stop the Grand Jury" and the Chino Defense. The total membership of this chapter is not known.

Formed in December 1970, the Venceremos Organization (VO), also known as Venceremon, is a militant Harxist-Leninast-Maoist organization composed of Third World and white revolutionaries operating in the San Prenaised Peninsula area. However, all policy has to be voted upon by the region as a whole; thus, the purpose of regional conventions, which are held every three months. At these conventions, each chapter is allowed three votes.

The national steering committee also formulates policy; makes decisions, etc., which are voted upon by the regional steering committee at national conventions, each regional steering committee having five votes. Thus, the national steering committee formulates policies which the regional steering committee then takes back to its region where it is voted upon during the regional convention. The regional steering committee then turn takes it back to the national steering committee for a final vote.

advised as Tollows regarding the future

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A. At a currently unknown tige the name of the VVAW will be changed to the Winter Soldier Organization" (WSO), although "VVAW" will appear in the new title for a period of one year in order to facilitate public understanding of the new name. The California - Nevada region has approved the name change, but has not yet been voted upon nationally. This will be done at the national convention in April 1973.

B. The reacon for changing the name of the VVAV to WSO is because many members feel that the name VVAV is no longer relevant since a peace treaty has been signed and that prospective members will be thus turned off and the public will no longer relate to a dead insue. (The public has a short memory.) It is also hoped that by changing the name of VVAV a broader following will be schieved by enlisting non-Vietram veterans, ex-GI's, upmen, Third World Peoples, and general community support.

VIETAAM VETERAINS AGAINST THE WAR

The name WSO is being condidered in that it is a direct outgrowth of our American history and revolutionary culture. Its foundation lies on the writings of Thomas Paine when he metioned the Summer Soldier, the Sunshine Patriots and True Revolutionary, and the "Winter Soldier." Source advised the VVAM is not violent oriented or a conspiratorial organization.

FUTURE ACTIONS OF THE YVAM

advined as follows:

- 1. There will be a VVAW security conference in Portland, Oregon, (no date given) to discuss the establishment of greater security within the organization. It was mentioned that a short were system could possibly be established to help provide security as well-as decrease telephone expenses.
- 2. A regional action is being planned when Fresident Thiou of South Victnam visits the Western White House in San Clemente at an undisclosed date later this spring.
- 3. A national and regional anthon will take place once the "Gainesville d" trial date is set.
- 4. Nos Cam is a VVAW national clearing house operated by Gary Stieger in the Ohio Kentucky region. This clearing house is level to sending information regarding VVAW chapters in Japan and cast in Okinawa.
- 5. The name of the VVAW paper "First Casualty" will be changed to "The Winter Soldier."
- 6. There is a possibility that there might be VVAW work brigades going to Hanoi in the future, similar to Venceremos Brigades (VB). This is very distant and not completely formulated at this point.

VIETHAM VETUR NO AGAINST THE WAR

The VB was formed in June 1959 by a coalition of New world organizations to encourage American youth to travel to Cuba in defiance of a ban on travel to that country by the United States Department of State. The estensible purpose of the travel use to assist the Castro regime in the harvesting of sugar case and other agricultural products and to give young Americans the experience of living in a revolutionary communist country.

7. Prior and vague reference was made to the fact that a VVAN chapter, possibly in Japan, is initiating a "Winter Soldier Investigation" to inform the public about hydrogen and nuclear bomb storage sings and devices. Information reportedly may be compiled for proportation before the United States Senate, similar to the "Far Crosses Winter Soldier Investigation" conducted by the VVIN at an unknown date in the past.

It was also mentioned that there are people in high government postations and he the Pentagon who are willing to testify regarding this motion, and those people have already received legal commoding concerning their rights and possible resulting legal complications.

Discussion regarding this matter you cut short due to a fear of lack of security expressed by those present.

provided observations of the VVAW's future as follows:

The feneral combinsus appears to be that chapters hold political education classes so that mambers right become more informed and might be able to develop their own opinions. VV/N is striving to become none community oriental and wished to establish a basis of understanding and support in the various chapters' communities. At this time VVAN definitely does not see itself in the role of a revolutionary vanguard.

The majority of those members present could be considered Marxist-Leninist and Socialists in that they are people oriented along these lines, both in their social and economic philosophies. At one point during the conference, when the matter of Trotskyists was approached, it was suggested that Weatherman (hardly envoue becomed to know what they were) were a violent oriented, off-the-wall elkitist group to be avoided. A subject that wilk be voted upon at the national convention, and that has already been accepted as regional policy, is that all VVAW chapters avoid, and above all, form no allience with any Trotskyist, Programming Labor Farty (FLP) or Communist Party organization or from comp.

Monthsman, formerly a faction of Students for a Democratic Society (aDS), controlled the CDO National Office from June 1969 until its closing in Pebruary 1970. Weatherman then extered an underground status and adopter a tactic of "strategic substage" with police and military installations designated as primary targets.

SDS was founded during June 1962, at Port Huron, Michigan, and in the 1960s functioned as the leading New Left campus-based student organization in the United States. From an initial posture of "perticipatory democracy," SUS moved to a radicelerevolutionary position, with debate centering on how best to create a revolutionary youth nevement. Internal factionalism produced a split during the SDS Mational Convention in June 1969, which resulted in the following three factions: Westherman; Worker Student Alliance (WSA); and Revolutionar; Youth Movement (RYM). The Weatherman and RYM are

no longer affiliated with SDS. The WSA continues to use the name SDS, and maintains its national headquarters in Boston, Massachusetts.

The EYM, a pro-communist revolutionary youth organization, was organized in 1969, first as a faction within the SDS, then as a separate group with headquarters in Atlanta, Georgia. EYM was unsuccessful in astructing support and by mid-1970 it was practically defunct.

WSE, a faction of SDS, was expelled from SDS in June 1969, by the then dominate Weatherman faction but continued to use the tions SDE and opened an office in Boston, Macketongotts, where its current headquarters are located. WBA is aligned ideologically with the PLP. Its official publication is "Med Left Hotes."

The PLP was founded in 1962 by individuals expected from the Communist Party, USA (CPVMA) for following the Chinese communist lims. Its objective is the establishment of a militant working-class movement based on Markism-Leninism and Mao Tse-tung thought.

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what's propensity for violence:

At the present, the VVAW, regionally speaking, gives no indication of being violence oriented nor of forming any alliance with organizations that are so inclined. Mowever, the Redwood Siny Chapter has been connected with the VO on various community projects. The VVAW is currently undergoing a change, away from a reactionary organization to one oriented more to the people and community.



On October 8, 1971, the University Daily Kansan, a daily newspaper published by the students at the University of Kansas, Lawrence, Kansas, carried an open letter to Bob Hope from Jon Birdsall. In this letter, Birdsall identified himself as president of the Lawrence Vietnam Veterans Against the War and stated the Vietnam veterans disagreed with Hope's statements in support of President Nixon's policies in Southeast Asia. He also stated from personal experience, the veterans opposed this "unjust, illegal, and immoral war and called for an immediate unilateral ceasefire and subsequent withdrawal of American military forces from Southeast Asia".

The VVAW was founded in the spring of 1967 by six young Vietnam veterans in New York City. At the beginning of 1968, with 600 members, VVAW opened a national office, founded the first GI newspaper, "Vietnam GI", and sent close to 500 veterans into the McCarthy campaign to beat down the red baiters. After getting gassed at the Democratic convention at Chicago

and caught in the general "down" of the peace movement, VVAW was nearly inactive until the moratoriums in the fall of 1969. Members of VVAW led student strikes on major campuses across the country and battled Veterans Administration Hospital authorities over threats to throw amputee Vietnam veterans out for signing anti-war petitions. At present, membership of the VVAW, nationally, consists of 8,500 members.


> The Topeka State Journal, a/daily evening newspaper, published in Topeka, Kansas, of May 9, 1972, carried an article on page 1 wherein John Birdsall identified himself as Kansas Coordinator for Vietnam Veterans Against the War. Birdsall read a prepared statement on the State House grounds at Topeka, Kansas and called for impeachment of President Nixon over the announcement concerning the mining of the harbor at Hiphong. He further announced that an all-night vigil would be held on the State House grounds and urged citizens to write or phone their senators and Congressmen requesting immediate action to forestall Nixon's tactics in Southeast Asia, to begin the impeachment of Nixon, and to support all United Nations attempts to achieve a peaceful settlement in Southeast Asia. Birdsall was identified as being 24 years old, residing at 1316 Mulvane Street, Topeka, Kansas. He claimed that he served one year on the Vietnam post and 15 years on river patrol boats, but did not identify the units with which he served. Birdsall further advised

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
there are about twenty active members of the Vietnam Veterans Against the War in the Topeka area.

On May 20, 1972, the Topeka Daily Capital, a daily newspaper published in the mornings at Topeka, Kansas, carried an article on page 3, regarding a week-long vigil at the State House Building, Topeka, Kansas which was in protest of the United States' moves in the Vietnam war. The leader of this vigil was identified as John Birdsall of Topeka, the state coordinator for the Vietnam Veterans Against the War who claimed the Governor of the State of Kansas would not state a position on Vietnam. He claimed the vigil was leaving the capitol steps because he had found one more politician who was worrying more about upcoming campaigns and re-election than about the killing in Southeast Asia.

To Speak Tonight in Kiva

One of the six members of the Victnam Veterans Against the War indicted by a federal grand jury on charges on conspiring to cause riots during the 1972 Republican National Convention, John Kniffin, will speak at the Kiva on

Friday at 3:30 p.m.

Presently free on a cash bond of \$25,000, Kniffin is facing a possible 20 year prison sentence and \$30,000 fine. Part of the so-called Gainesville Conspiracy, Kniffin said the conspiracy trial is part of a government effort to intimidate and harass vigorous dissenters.

"None of the conspiracy trials

have achieved a real conviction," Kniffin said.

"For example, Guy Goodwin who headed the grand jury in Tallahassee has been involved in 17 grand juries and has delivered 117 indictments. He has gotten two convictions: Pather Philip Berrigan and Elizabeth McAllister for passing mail in fail.

"The whole idea of conspiracy is busically a thought crime.

"We're being charged with trying to incite a riot at the Republican National Convention but there was never a riot. We were subposured before the convention.

The date of Kniffin's trial was originally set for October but has been changed twice with a third date still pending. While he waits to get a new trial date, Kniffin has been tooring the United States speaking about how he feels the American government is using the conspiracy trial to suppress dissent.

Kniffin is a former Marine who served 32 months in Vietnam and received an honorable discharge, But he has some sharp words about the government atreatment of Vietnamese veterans and the treatment of prisoners of war (POW's).

"I think the government is trying to buy the silence of the POW's, R's kind of interesting that the same week Donald Johnson (the commissioner of the Veterans Administration) issued a directive calling for the outback of pensions and disabilities for Victnam vets, there was a story in the same paper about all the benefits the POW's are getting.

"The cutback for the Victnam vets will be as much as 40 per cent. in some cases.

"But the Ford Motor Company is going to give the POW's the uso of a new auto for a year. The ; POW's are supposed to be getting free color televisions and vacations in Florida

"All of this is going to people ! who've received cash payments from their back pay, as much as \$50,000 because ranny of the POW's were officers.

"Yet the government made sure to say that any of these men who made any unauthorized statement about the war would lose their benefits."

Kniffin's talk tomorrow will be on "The Government's Use of Conspiracy Trials and Federal Grand Juries to Suppress Dissent."







The meeting began on Friday morning with speakers from three major movement groups within the Chicago area: Chicago Area Military Project (CAMP), Medical Aid to Indochina (MAI), and Pising Up Angry. These organizations were represented for the purpose of further educating of the people of the steering committee as to other, yet related, areas of the struggle.

DELEGATE SEATING: The first major order of business was the question of the number of delegates allowed to attend the NSCM. Some of the regions came with alternate delegates which was contrary to the set limit of 5 delegates to all NSCM. The problem was handled by limiting the number of delegates which may be seated at the meeting tables and actively participate in the floor discussions.

POPOSAL: Alternate delegales may attend but only the five voting delegates will be seated at the tables. A rotation of delegates with regard to whom is seated at the tables may occur and this is to be binding on this and future meetings,

This proposal was passed with a vote of 60-yes; 25-no; and 15 abst.


PFCPUSAL: The number of alternate delegates be set at 3, and no more will be allowed to ottend as observers. These delegates will be seated as stated in the previous proposal. Friendly amendment: Logistical workers from the hoot region (security, food, etc.) are excluded from this proposal.

This proposal was passed with a vote of 63½-yes; 23½-no; and 11 abst.

This was the decision of the steering committee with regard to the number of people attending the NSCM. All regions are expected to be disciplined enough to observe these decisions to the letter. Each region may have no more than 5 delegates and 3 alternates attending NSCM.

ROUND FOBIN REPORTS: The Found Pobin reports were limited to 5 minutes per Found. This decision was made so that regions could discuss their problems rather than giving a run-down of all of the actions going on around the country. Many of the regions stressed that there was a lack of communication — both within the region and within the national organization. It was also stated that there has been a great lack

NOSCAM PEPORT: NOSCAM is the VVAW national G.I. liaison office which is located in Dayton, Chio. Peports on NOSCAM are being sent out by the Dayton regional office on a regular basis within their regional newsletter. People should be keeping up on what is happening through this means of communication.

The NOSCAM project was begun in July of 1972, and to this date the project has cost \$150 to be Dayton chapter. 400-500 letter have been mailed to G.I.'s since this project was begun. Most of the letters were returned because of the transience of active-duty service-people. However, 45-50 new members have been brought in to VVAVI because of the work of the NOSCAM project. Generally, the NOSCAM report stated an improvement in the G.I. situation. More and more active-duty service-people are resisting the oppression of the U.S. military as they now exist.

The purpose of NCSCAM is to establish a transition from the G.I. movement to VVAVA. The mechanics of the project are handled as following: membership forms are mailed to Dayton from active-duty personnel. At this point, the forms are forwarded to the regional office which the new member lives in. From here, the regions should contact these new members and get them actively involved with VVAW. There has been poor response from some of the regions with regard to getting in touch with these new members, and this situation must be corrected in order for VVAW to continue to grow and to keep up the contact which we already have within the activeduty G.I. movement.

NOSCAM has also functioned to increase the specific relations between VVAW and other organizations such as AFSC, SUS, War Tax Sesistance, USSF, CAMP, CCCO, and WRL. Through NOSC, M, contacts with American exile groups have also been made.

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
Active-duty G.I. chapters (especially those overseas) are asking for full support from VVAW. They have requested improved contact from all of the regions, as they are hearing from the above mentioned organizations. They would especially like to receive newsletters from the states and any sort of information which will keep them informed on what is happening around the country.

With regard to the future, NOSCAM is growing. Most of the members join as a result of someone else telling them about it. V hen a new member joins, he or she receives a packet of information focused around how to fight back. This packet deals with the legal means to resistance within the military. It explains Article 15's C.O. forms, discharges, the rights of distribution of newspapers, etc.

It is imperative that all regions cooperate with the NGSCAM project and contact the new members which are forwarded to them by Dayton. Only by doing this will VVAW be able to maintain their credibility within the current G.I. movement, and aid G.I.'s readjustment to the movement outside the military. This should be one of our major focuses because it will strengther VAW and further its growth.

Barry Romo (National Coordinator) spoke on his recent trip to Hanoi and the bombing damage which he witnessed there. On his trip to Hanoi, Barry was accompanied by Joan Baez, Michael Men (Asst, Dean at Yale) and Telford Taylor (author of Nuremburg and Vietnam). During the 13 days which Barry spent in Hanoi, he experienced over 60 bombing raids by the U.S.

The Vietnamese informed Barry of some specific points which should be emphasized by the anti-war/anti-imperialist movements in the U.S. People should focus their attention on the signing of the 9 Point Peace Treaty, the stopping of the bombing, and freedom for all political prisoners in the South.



A financial report is as given from the Gainesville Delise Committee. The bulk of expenses with regard to the case are the committee's travel and legal expenses. The common complaint within the defense committee was a lack of communication and a lack of politics. Some of the defendants have been on the road almost continually since July speaking 20 various groups around the country. The nature of their speaking centers around attacks on the grand jury system, the administration and the FBI.

The defense committee has information which may be obtained by the regions upon request. For example, there are photographs of the defendants, but because of the lack of resources and of time, these are only being sent to the regions which request them. Also, copies of all of the legal motions which have been filed in this case are available to those regions which request them.

The problems surrounding the defense committee are essentially that there is too much work to be done by the too few people in the defense collective.

Certain limitations have to be followed in this case, and these limitations must be followed by all of the regions doing work around the Gainesville case. The limitations are set because of the fact that the nature of conspiracy is very tricky. It cannot be admitted that there were any overt acts involved in Tallahassee or Gainesville. The government is trying to prove that the defendants utilized interstate transportation in a particular frame of mind, thus an admission of any overt acts would be harmful to the case. People should also be reminded that they are not to attack Bill Lemmer.

The political position of the case is that there was a conspiracy but that it is on the part of the government against the people of the U.S. Things said in public records can be used for chapters trying to get the word out on Gainesville (i.e. courtroom transcripts, newspaper and magazine articles, all media coverage). A pamphlet on the trial is being distributed by Washington, D.C. (compiled by Tim Butz and John Kniffin) and it should be finished soon.

Status of the case: Middlebrooks resigned on the grounds that he was biased and could not fairly judge the case. A man named Arno has replaced Middlebrooks. There is no guarantee as to a trial date. Arno has stated that his court will not be clear until sometime in April, but it may be speculated that the case is being put off because the government has no case. A motion for the dismissal of all charges was filed following the "misplacement" of one of the lawyer's briefcase (Larry Turner). This motion was filed because the briefcase was in the hands of the federal government for over 24 hours, which constitutes a violation of lawyer/client privilege. Also a motion has been filed to enable our lawyers to see the grand jury transcripts. We cannot know the prosecutors' slant on the case until these transcripts can be seen, but thus far, our demand to see them has not been responded to.

With regard to fund raising — any moncy which is raised in a specific region will require that a list of the donators be given to that region (unless the donators wish to remain anonymous). If it is okay with the regional coordinator/collective, the names of these donators may then be given to the national office for the purpose of further fund raising.

With regard to not -- if mail is sent to Galnesville -d there is no response to the mailing within a reasonable amount of time, people should check with Gainesville to make sure that the mailing was received. It seems that much correspondence has been "lost" on its way to Gainesville.

With regard to the FEI -- if the FEI approaches anyone within your region, notify Gainesville immediately. Apparently, the FEI has been threatening to put those people who refuse to cooperate before the Grand Jury, but people must learn not to be intimidated by such a line.

Any mail being sent to Gainesville, or elsewhere within VVAW, should be put in a hand-addressed envelope with an individual's home address as the return address (rather than the office). Mail logs should be used so that we can get a clue as to what mail has or has not arrived at its destination. Also, a record of when mail arrives should be kept so that we can know if mail is being detained for "subversive purposes."

NATIONAL OFFICE REPORT

The national collective situation seems to be functioning much better than the non-collective form of office procedure. The office organization is good — all mail and phone calls are being loged so that we can tell where we are being ripped-off. There is at feast one (often more) meeting of the national collective every week. Weekly criticism and self-criticism sessions are held. All decisions are made collectively. For example, the deadlines and priorities on projects are collectively set.

The financial situation of the national office is very serious. The total balance concludes that the office is approximately \$7,600 in debt. None of the national coordinators are receiving salaries, and have not done so for over 6 months.

With regard to problems that have arisen over the use of emergency collect phone calls to the national office which were refused because of the financial problems of the office, a proposal which should alleviate this problem was brought to the floor.

PROPOSAL: Any region may send \$5.00 to the National office which will be held in escrow for the purpose of paying for emergency collect phone calls.

This proposal was accepted. It is not mandatory, but up to the disgression of each region.

CBJECTIVE CHANGES

During the Palo Alto meeting, the F.I. workshop suggested a change in objective #3. This proposed objective change was to have been taken back to the regions for discussion before being voted on at the Chicago meeting. The proposed change reads as follows:

To join in the struggle of all active-duty servicepeople, National Guardsmen, and Feservists for those rights guaranteed under the

U.S. Constitution and Eill of Fights presently densed under the UCMJ. C., 's are exploited and their rights valued both in the U.S. and overseas to ensure the U.S.'s position in the economic world, to suppress wars of liberation, to break strikes and to carry out those policies that the ruling class deems necessary for its interests. G.I.'s control the means of destruction in the military; just as working people control the means of production in a civilian society. G.I.'s have a long and rich history of struggle against oppression; the accomplishments of that struggle cannot be ignored.

The vote on this proposed objective change was: 27-yes; 24-no; with 49 abstainsions. The proposed change was tabled and should be discussed more fully within the regions before the next NSCM.

Objective #2: There was some confusion as to the objective changes which were made in the Milwaukee NSCM, and the finalized objectives were never sent out. Because California did not know that this change had been made in Milwaukee, they proposed a change for objective #2. Listed below are the objective changes as they were voted on in Milwaukee, followed by the proposed changes which were made at the Chicago meeting.

2. To demand the immediate termination of all other operations by the United States government, its agencies, and American business interests that are designed to suppress the rightful struggles for liberation and self-determination of the peoples of the earth. This includes the maintenance of dictatorial governments, economic domination, and the theft of the natural resources of other countries. The United States should make reparations in a project acceptable to the Indochinese for all of the damage done by the United States.

The proposed change in objective #2 which was presented at the Chicago meeting would read as follows:

2. To demand the immediate termination of all other operations by the United States government, its agencies, and American business interests that are designed to suppress the rightful struggle for liberation and self-determination of peoples inside and outside of the United States. . . . (The remainder of the objective would remain the same as before.)

All regions should discuss these two objective changes. At the next NSCM, these two changes will be discussed and voted on for final approval.

Objective #7: A change in objective #7 was also passed in Milwaukee, but never sent out in finalized form by the national office. Because of this, the same proposed change was made in Chicago. The finalized form of objective #7 should read as follows:

- e. Political analysis responsible for gathering information on all seemingly unrelatissues and events, both domestic domestic domestic and foreign, to study and analyze, to connect these issues together and show how one affect the other and then disseminate the analyses to the chapters and regions and to other organizations, resource centers and alternate media for further dissemination.
- f. 1st Casualty responsible for collecting articles and pictures for the paper from both within and outside $VV_{\ell}W_{\ell}$, laying out the paper, and making sure the emphasis of the paper is political education.
- g. Membership responsible for updating the national membership list, adding and deleting names and changes of address, and to send out information packets to new members and to forward their names to their respective regional coordinator.
- h. Coordination of actions, projects, and programs National office is a central gathering point for information from regions, chapters, and other organizations, on actions, projects, and programs for dissemination to the regions, chapters and other interested organizations.

B. Regional level

- 1. Elections Regional coordinators will serve for a fixed period of one year and may be re-elected for a second term. Regional coordinators may be removed from office at any time by the membership of that region.
 - a. Requirements must be a Vietnam Veteran.
 - b. Divison of regions requires a 2/3 majority vote by the NSC.
 - 2. Functions and responsibilities
- a. Regional coordinators will be the official representatives of VVAW in their respective geographic areas.
- b. Regional Coordinators will be responsible for and have full authority to make all decisions relative to VVAW operations consistent with VVAW philosophy and policy as determined by the NSC;
- c. Fegional coordinators will be supported in all decisions consistent with VVAW philosophy and policy, by the National Office and NSC.
- d. Regional coordinators will be responsible for establishing media and political contacts within their respective areas.
- e. Regional coordinators will be expected to support all national fund raising drives initiated by the Steering Committee.
- f. Regional coordinators will be responsible for the calling of press conferences and the issuances of press releases and statements at the request of the NSC office.
- g. Regional coordinators will be responsible for the maintait once of communications between the national office and the chapters in their respective areas.
- h. Regional coordinators, and/or their representatives, with a written proxy, will be required to attend the regular scheduled meetings of the National Steering Committee and those non-scheduled or emergency meetings convened at the request of the National Steering or National Office Committees.
- i. Regional coordinators will convene regional meetings quarterly. Those meetings will be convened for the purpose of elections and/or advising the NSC and delegations of proxies at its regular scheduled meetings.



7. Resolved to fight racism, to show Americans that our society is permeated by sism, which manipulates whites in viewing non-whites as inferior or less than human. This racism pushes minority people through inferior schools to inferior jobs and into combat arms. Thus minority people are sent off to die in disproportionately high numbers as we kill Asians indiscriminately. We also demand the US military recognize its complicity in America's domestic and interactional racism.

STRUCTURE OF VVAW

The following is termed a "working paper" which was introduced by the National Office with regards to all of the decisions which have been made by the steering committee. This working paper is the basis of the structure of VVAW. The contents of this paper are to be taken back to the regions and discussed for ratification at the next NSCM.

I. Structure

A. National -- 6 coordinators (elected) and staff (appointed).

1. Election of coordinators - Nominations for openings will be taken at one NSCM to fill vacancies at the next NSCM. Nominees will return to their regions to make preparations for possible election to the national office. As nominees make decisions on whether or not they can accept the nomination, they will inform the national office of their decision with the national office relaying this to the regions and chapters. Decisions must be sent in one month prior to the next NSCM with elections taking place at that NSCM.

a. Pequirements for National officer.

1. Must be a Vietnam Veteran.

2. Must have worked on a local and/or regional level for at least one year prior to nomination.

3. National officers of VVAW cannot be an officer in any other organization.

2. Functions and Fesponsibilities:

a. Internal Liaison - responsible for keeping open lines of communication between the national office and the regions and chapters; this to be done by written correspondence, phone calls, and personal visits.

b. External Liaison - responsible for keeping in contact with other, foreign and domestic, anti-war, anti-imperialist, progressive, and revolutionary organizations. Also responsible for gathering literature and information from other organizations and resource centers for analysis and dissemination to the chapters and regions.

c. Finances - responsible for keeping straight all financial records, preparing documents such as balance sheets, statements, budgets, and expected income.

d. Political prisoners - responsible for collecting and disseminating information on as many political prisoners and defense committees as possible, to the regions and chapters.

j. Legional coordinators will be responsible for making recommendations to the National Office relative to the granting derminating of chapter charters in their respective areas.

k. Regional coordinators will be responsible for having a representative to cover his respective area when he is not a vailable.

NCTE: Election of regional coordinators will take place within their respective regions.

- C. National Defense Committee -- National Defense Fund.
- 1. To establish a National Committee to defend VVAW and all political prisoners. PURPUSE: To defend VVAW, its members engaged in VVAW activities and all political prisoners from any and all repressive political attacks by the government against VVAW as an organization and against all other political prisoners with the primary emphasis at this time being directed to the grand jury proceedings in Gainesville. FUNCTION: To coordinate all information and propaganda between local defense committees and the press and the regions of VVAW. To coordinate fund-raising and dissemination of those funds to the local committees under political attack and to raise money for continuing defense effort. STRUCTURE: To be directed by the VVAW NSC. To be comprised of one member from each local defense committee and one national coordinator. To be responsible for the collection and dispersal at the national level of necessary information and materials. This committee is to meet together, by phone or in person, to fulfill the needs of each local defense committee.
 - Membership of LDC or NDC will be decided by a vote of the NSC.
- 3. The NDC must secure the approval of the LDC's, by phone or in person, for the use of any funds ear-marked for the NDF for other than direct dispersal to the appropriate LDC. Each LDC and the national coordinator will have one vote.
- 4. If the LDC decides to remove its representative from the NDC, that representative is no longer on the NDC. A new representative to the NDC must be appointed immediately by the LDC;
- 5. Monthly financial reports must be sent from each LDC to the national office to be kept on file. Those reports are available to all NSC members and will be presented at the NSCM.
- 6. Monthly status reports from each LDC must be sent to the National office.
 - 7. A monthly newsletter must be sent to all regions by the NDC.
- 8. LDC should coordinate with regional offices so we can expand our contacts.
- 9. There are three local defense committees which have been recognized by the NSC, these are: 1. Gainesville Conspiracy Committee, 2. Billy Dean Smith Defense Committee, 3. Gary Lawton Defense Committee.

National Defense Fund

All money that is sent to the NDF will be dispersed by the NDC as determined by the necessity of meeting the political attacks on VVAW and other political prisoners.

All funds collected for (earmarked for) a specific case will be immediately forwarded to the LDC office concerned.

GUIDELINES FOR FUNDING

- a. Only direct defense expenses lawyers, bond, expenses for mailings,
 etc.
 - b. Priority for funding: cases affecting the continuing function of VVAW.
- c. All checks be made payable to the VVAW National Defense Fund. The VVAW NDF is the name of the bank account of the National Committee to Defend VVAW and all Political Prisoners. Unly funds or checks made out to the NDF can be deposited in the account. Funds earmarked for specific defense committees will be forwarded immediately for the appropriate committee.
 - d. The NDF bank account will be immediately moved to Chicago.

II. Communications

- A. Fegional Communications
 - 1. From the regional office
- a. \triangle bi-weekly newsletter to chapters to include regional and national news.
- b. Personal contact by phone at least once a month with chapters.
- c. Physical presence at chapter meetings at least once every six months.
 - 2. From Chapters (to be approved at regional meetings)
- a. Bi-weekly letter to regional office outlining problems, needs, etc.
 - b. Monthly phone call to regional office.
- c. Chapter representative present at regional office at least once every three months.
- d. Mailings sent to chapter membership and other chapters once a month.
- 3. Regional meetings at least once every three months to be held prior to the NSCM.
 - B. National Communications
 - 1. From the National office.
- a. Bi-weekly newsletter to regional offices and all local chapters
 - b. Personal contact by phone at least twice a month.
- c. National coordinators should attend as many regional meetings as possible.
- d. The First Casualty will be mailed to all members once a month or drop shipped to regions at their request.
 - 2. From the Regional Office
 - a. Bi-weekly newsletter to national office.
 - b. Phone calls to national office at least twice a month.
- c. Regional coord, to visit national office for one week each year.

d. Regions have access to national newsretter and national

e. __monthly newsletter to other regio ____

III. Finances

coordinators.

a. 50% of all monies raised by the national office on speaking gigs will go to the region that the speaking took place in.

b. Any region or VVAW program that receives a contribution of \$200 or more will be forwarded that name and address to the national office. If the contribution comes from a national program the name and address will be forwarded to the appropriate region for a personal thank you only.

c. The national office will prepare a projected budget for each NSCM...

IV. National Steering Committee Meeting - Functions and Procedures

The Regional Delegations will comprise the National Steering Committee of
VVAW, and, in fact, will be the governing body of this organization.

A. The function of the National Steering Committee will be to define the philosophy, establish the policy, formulate the programs and determine the activities of VVAW on the national level.

B. The National Steering Committee, at its discretion, may audit VVAW books without prior notice of its intentions to the National Executive Committee.

C. Emergency meetings of the NSC will be convened at the request of the National Executive Committee after canvassing by phone the members of the NSC with two-thirds of the members responding and a simple majority of that number concurring with the request.

D. The National Steering Committee may convene a non-scheduled meeting upon the request of any single member of that body if the request is concurred with by a simple majority of that body as determined by telephone canvass of all members with no less than two-thirds responding.

E. Concerning the use of proxy votes: The first matter to be resolved by the steering committee concerned the use of proxies at NSCM. A motion concerning proxies was made and seconded. The motion was: that proxy votes may only be used for motions which the region issuing a proxy has prior knowledge of. Motion was defeated 33-yes; 37-no. Proxy voting will continue on the basis laid down at Milwaukee. Any region may only have one proxy from an unattending region. This proxy may be used on all votes. A proxy may not be used for a quoram count.

F. Authorized Quorum for National Steering Committee Meetings - Each region will contact the national office prior to the scheduled steering committee meeting to confirm their attendance at the meeting. 2/3 of the regions planning to attend will constitute a quorum for the first session. Afterwards 2/3 of the regions present will constitute a quorum.

G. Each region can have no more than five working delegates to the NSCM. Each region has five votes on all issues so as to reflect all views of their delegation. The NSC will meet quarterly with provisions for emergency meetings which would supersede regular NSCM. The regional coordinator, in whose region the NSCM is to be held, will be responsible for the logistics of the meeting, preparing the agenda, soliciting and disseminating agenda items which he receives to all the regions.

PRGPOSAL: To split the New Mexico/Arizona region into two separate regions. (This proposal was made because of the size of the region and because of past difficulties in communications).

This proposal was defeated: 21-yes; 59-no; 15 abst.

MEDICAL AID FOR INDOCHINA

PROPOSAL:

1. That VVAW participate in local coalitions to promote and develop local and regional consciousness of the need for continuing aid and support to the people of Indochina from the people of the United States.

2. That VVAW participate in and organize fund-raising and educational pro-

grams for MAL.

3. That VVAW remove the Nguyen Van Troi Hospital as a National project. This should be done because the MAI program is now providing direct aid and support to the people of Indochina. The Hospital project is not scheduled to begin until after the ending of the war. We feel that direct aid and support for " upeople of Indochina are needed now.

Our committment to the Indochinese is one which is based on our continuing relationship and solidarity. Our programs should reflect that same com-

mittment.

MAI is essentially an educational and service program. It can be used very effectively to help end the war. We can focus on the conditions of the people as a result of the war and provide a direct link in helping to alleviate their oppression. Our prime concern is to choose those projects and programs which will help to end the war. A program designed to be implemented at the war's end is not one which meets our present goals.

Discussion of this proposal centered around the fact that parts of the country have alpleady begun working on raising funds to the Nguyen Van Troi Hospital. People felt that they could not vote on the changing of a national project without consulting their regions.

This proposal was tabled until the next meeting where it will be discussed as old business. Between now and the next meeting, the national office is to send out information on MAI as to why it should be a national project.

ELECTION OF NATIONAL COORDINATORS

Michael/McCain submitted his resignation from the position of national coordinator.

Nominations for elections which might have to be made at the next NSCM were called for, but no nominations were made at this time.

The new national coordinators which were elected at this time are: Ed Damato (former regional coordinator of New York); Sam Schorr (former regional coordinator of Calif); and Brian Acams (former regional coordinator of Colorado). All three of these candidates received unanimous acceptance by the body.

SUBJECT ORGANIZATION

Before these three men were voted into the national office, some detailed questions and discussion was under e. Some of the questions were: 'at are the priorities of the national office? What is liberalism? What are your personal politics? What happens if and when the peace treaty is signed? Basically, all three of the new coordinators agreed on their answers to these questions. They felt that the priorities of the national office should be communication (newsletters and newspaper), fundaraising, more sensitivity to the regions, more help in setting the direction of the organization. Political understanding is the necessary means to an end and national should aid in distributing PE information. They expressed the importance of Political Education as vital to the growth of the organization. They also expressed the need for more organizational materials to be sent out to the chapters. It was stressed that the national officeshould help build unity in the country between and within chapters and regions. Finally, all three agreed that previously the national office had been one composed of personality and individualism, and that the strength of the present office is that it is functioning as a collective.

Addition to the Minutes: There is a possibility that Steve Hawkins may have to resign at the next NSCM. Also, Barry Romo's term in office will expire in May and he wishes it to be known now that he is up for re-election.

NEXT NATIONAL STEERING COMMITTEE MEETING

PROPOSAL: The next NSCM will be held near Placitas, New Mexico.

This proposal passed: 72-yes; 3-no; 5 abst.

PFOPUSAL: The next NSCM will be held from April 19-23 (Easter weekend),

This proposal was passed: 81-yes; 1-no; 8 abst.

WORKSHOP REPORTS

Before the workshops were begun, there was a suggestion made that a discussion of gay people in the military be considered in one of the workshops (either the Women and Third World of the G.I. workshop). It was stated that there are over 114,600 gay men now in the military waiting to come out of their closets, and that this was a subject which should be dealt with by VVAW.

JANUARY 26 -- INAUGURATION

SCENARIO

Assemble at 9:36 in the Arlington National Cemetary parking lot.

Non-religious ceremony at 10:00, speakers limited to Barry Romo and one Vietnamese woman. March will begin at 10:30, leaving Arlington Cemetary via the acess bridge.

At the grounds, Indochines nusic will be played, and several les will be set up to serve hot tea and collect signatures on the 9 point Peace Traaty. Several established guerrilla theater groups will perform skits related to the Vietnamese struggle and American imperialism. The rally will disperse as people feel the need to leave. (This will begin at approximately noon).

Discipline/Security: Each region will be responsible for providing for the identity and discipline within its group. The march will be 4 to 6 abreast to maintain security from infiltrators/provacatures. The working committee will print a leaflet for distribution with the political reasoning for the tone and nature of self-discipline/security, as per NSC decision.

Banners and Signs: The march will be lead by a large Eanner reading "Vietnam for the Vietnamese, Stop the Bombing, Sign the Treaty." Each organization will be allowed one organizational banner, and an unlimited number of signs designating support for the 9 Point Peace Plan. No Flags of nations or organizations will be carried on this march.

Participation: This march will be open to any organization that has consistantly supported the Vietnamese plan for peace, and who agrees to the basics of the scenario.

Finances: Each participating region shall pledge \$25.00 plus \$1.00 per person participating. (The vote on this was: 71-2/3 yes; 5-no (wanted just \$1.00 per person; and 18-1/3 abst.). Any surplus of finances will be used to pay the existing debts of the national office. Money for this action should be sent to the Vashington, D.C. office as soon as possible.

Working Committee: The working committee shall consist of people from the Washington, D.C., New York, Philadelphia, and Boston regional offices, with a National coordinator from Chicago. I ther regions wishing to send advance party personnel should contact the D.C. office in advance.



Medical/Communication/Food: Every regional group should be prepared to feed its own people. VVAM medical people will act complimentary to existing medical structures. Miami Cutreach personnel will be contacted for possible communications support. With regard to food, every group coming should be prepared to maintain themselves for the time they wish to stay in D. C. Be self-sufficient.

Housing: Any people remaining over in D.C. should contact Dough Schocke at the office or his home: (202) 387-0229.

Disposition of the Treaty signatures: One set of treaty signatures will be sent to the Vietnamese in Paris or in Hanoi. The other set will be presented to Congress on the following Monday, January 22, 1973. Individuals are invited to stay in D.C. and informally deliver copies of the treaty signatures.

General tone: This march will be a disciplined march in support of the 9 Point Peace Plan. It will be a one day public manifestation of our day to day support of this peace plan and the Vietnamese struggle.



Contingency Plan: In the event that the 9 Point Peace Treaty is signed between now and the 20th, this demonstration will occur as planned with the central demand being that the U.S. implement the treaty. The ceremony on the mall will be a ceremony of Solidarity with the Vietnamese.

POLITICAL GUIDELINES OF THE INAUGURATION ACTION

In October, the administration announced that peace was at hand. The nine point proposal of the Vietnamese clearly outlined a correct political settlement for the war in Indochina and the signing of this agreement seemed immenent prior to the election for president. After election day, Nixon destroyed the chances for peace that the American and Indochinese peoples clearly wanted. During the Christmas holidays, he answered "peace is at hand" by ordering the most massive bombing in the history of the world.

On January 20th the Inauguration of Richard Nixon will represent the continuing degeneration of American principles and a triumph of the continuance of U.S. Imperialism.

It is vital that VVAW organize a national action on the 20th in Washington, D.C. and encourage similar actions in cities unable to come to Washington, to show the administration and the American people that we support the Indochinese peoples and that we demand that the peace treaty be signed immediately.

This action will represent the only demonstration in Washington that supports the Indochinese struggle and that it is our revolutionary duty to educate the American people to the lies of the administration and to the necessity of immediate signing of the treaty.

We further propose that this demonstration be opened to all people who support the Indochinese and to all organizations that have consistantly supported the struggle of the Indochinese people.

MINOPITY REPORT FROM THE WORKSHOP

It is the opinion of the minority that the 9 Point Peace proposal signing can have a greater impact by the symbolical use of theatrics. This would serve to draw a greater amount of media attention to the proposed action. We agree with the majority opinion that the focus of the proposed action be the signing of the 9 Poing Peace proposal and simply want to use theatrics to effectively augment the peace proposal signing. This would happen because: 1), it would drawing on an item that the media would pick up on, and 2), it is a simple, direct action that can be easily understood by any who see it.

Specifically, we would end the march with the signing of the treaty and then a seal of the presidency would be on the ground (maybe varied two feet or so) where people could drop some symbol of the government such as, 214's, tax forms or self-symbols like blood. (The blood of persons back from Vietnam less than 3 years is quarantined). We feel that the use of our blood would add to the personal sincerity of our committment to the Vietnamese people.

This scenario was accepted in total by the NSC. Other suggestions with regard to the action were made and accepted. It was mentioned that the reconstructions should bring signatures on the treaty to D.C. with them which had been previously collected in their local areas. It was also suggested that a leaflet be prepared for the purpose of informing VVAW members of the importance and type of discipline necessary to make this action a success.

PROPOSAL: Each region is to be responsible for their own security of their people from their region. A leaflet should be sent out to VVAW people explaining self-discipline, and this leaflet should include that the NSC approved of this form of security.

This proposal was unanimously accepted.

The D.C. office should be contacted as soon as possible as to the number of people coming in from your region. The same should be done with regard to those people planning to attend the January 20th action on the West Coast.

Any changes regarding this approved Scenario will be sent to the regions by the D.C. working committee or by the National Office as soon as the changes are known.

G.I. WORKSHOP

HISTORICAL NOTES ON CIVILIAN (NOT ACTIVE DUTY) G.I. PROJECTS

In general, civilians-run projects, mostly coffee houses, have died out over the past year. What follows is a general analysis of some of the problems that helped reduce the effectiveness of the civilian run projects. We did not discuss the whole area of active-duty run projects, although this area does need to be discussed in depth.

- 1. Missionary attitude: civilian organizers tried to move in and dictate to GI's what the GI's should want.
- 2. Laying down trips, civilians tried to impose their politics on GI's. Arm-chair revolutionary syndrome.
- 3. National prospective: civilians tried to organize GI's around national issues without understanding the need to organize around local issues.
- 4. Racism: Projects were run by whites with little understanding of the struggles of minority peoples, especially black GI's.
 - 5. No Money.

will ared

- 6. Lack of support from the local community, in some cases meeting open repression.
 - 7. Apathy and fear of GI's
- 8. Women and the question of sexism was handled poorly, which has led to very little female participation in projects, service-women and civilians.
 - 9. Transience of GI's negated possibility of mass work.

What is the goal of doing GI organizing:

The two major goals of organizing active-duty servicepeople back a specific and a general content. The two goals are not exclusive and in fact must go together in forming a complete strategy.

Point one is to stop imperialism: that is, to negate or reduce the strength of a war machine engaged in aggression and genocide.

Point two is to provide services or actions around service peoples immediate

needs, such as housing, relief from harassment, etc.

In viewing these goals, the workshop decided to focus on the specific problems of working with GI's and then on what specific and general programs VVAW can un-

dertake to achieve these goals.

The primary contradiction in the military today is racism. The struggles of mimority GI's provides the focus for current work around the GI movement. It is our opinion that VVAM should see its work on racism has primacy in regards to the GI movement. However, the work on racism must also go hand in hand with specific service work for individual GI's, ie military counseling, legal help, etc. We must not loose sight of the human element.

Whereas we see that the military is the major tool of imperialism and genocide abroad, and a major ool for suppression and repression. home,

"Whereas the history of the military is smeared with episodes of suppression

of organized working people,

Whereas the Victnam Veterans Against the War has paid lip service to the GI movement, especially in areas where there are no major military installations,

Whereas the Vietnam Veterans Against the V'ar has one of the highest potentials in this country of reaching active duty men and women, and as veterans of the military must use that experience as a major tool in combatting the military,

We of the GI workshop say it is absolutely imperative that all chapters of VVAW institute programs to support the GI movement wherever the chapters are thereby accomplishing their goals; recruiting new members to VVAW before discharge, providing services to service people and veterans, and finally, importantly, effectively reduce the war-making power of imperialism.

There was unanimous acceptance of the statement of this workshop. It was also mentioned that because counseling programs are limited, every member of VVAVI should (whenever possible) take a course in military counseling. It was noted that a WSI on racism in the military is being organized and is to be held in Seattle. It was suggested that there be a workshop and research done on MIA's and PCW's during the next meeting.

THIRD WORLD WORKSHOP

Position Paper

Up until this time Vietnam Veterans Against the War's preoccupation has been with the war in Vietnam and it's impact on us as veterans only. Our re-entry into society has been an immersion back into that same racist society which spawned imperialism and it's bastard child, the Vietnam War. Our time spent in the military was an experience in regimentized racism which pressed Third World brothers into the front lines to die or into military jails.

This war has also taught us the value of brotherhood by shared blood. In combat we learned that brotherhood meant survival. Now again we face a common

foe, and to survive again we must struggle together as brothers.

One of the biggest problems in VVAW is that, as yet, our organization has had little success in relation to Third World people in general and Third World veterans in particular. We feel that one of the principle reasons for this has been that most of our efforts have been directed at relating to Third World people through our eyes instead of theirs. We decided that it would be more fruitful if we tried to determine, in connection with Third World peoples the particular problems of their community and work with them on the solutions. By relating to Third World people in terms of their own oppressions, we can, first of all, create an atmosphere for a better understanding of our own racism and educate ourselves concerning it. It paves the way for a better understanding on the part of the Third World people of where we are coming from and why and how our struggle is related to theirs.

As the struggle on the home front intensifies, black, brown, Indian and other Third World people liave increasingly taken the leadership role and also the brunt

of this racist society's attacks.

We are presently tryim to reestablish those bonds we found successful in Vietnam. In light of this adization it is hoped that we can begin to struggle as one people against our common oppressor.

Recommended for adoption as national VVAW policy by the workshop:

r.e Objective #7

Whereas VVAW has adopted as one of its primary national objectives an end to racism in all forms,

and whereas VVAW recognizes the existance of institutionalized racism in the American school system,

VVAW supports the use of two-way busing, including across district lines, as one tool, admittedly imperfect, for achieving racial and educational equality.

r.e. Objective #5

Whicreas less than honorable discharges from active duty are given in a systematically discriminatory manner to racial minorities in substantially higher proportions than to whites,

 and such discharges permenantly effect the economic and social capabilities of these third world veterans,

VVAW proposes a national campaign on all levels to change all less than honorable discharges in compliance with VVAW national objective #5, which states that their be only one type of discharge without distinction, and that this policy be retroactive.

GUIDELINES FOR CONTACT BETWEEN VVAW AND THIFD WORLD OR OTHER SUPPRESSED GROUPS

1. Cutreach

A. Individual contact is to be made between local VVAW chapters and oppressed groups on a person-to-person basis. The person making initial contact is responsible for maintaining contact with the group and for reporting on it at chapter meetings and to regional coordinators and/or collectives. Person making initial contact should resent to the group contacted the results of each of their chapters at NSCM.


B. Fegional coordinators/collectives are to report on contacts and results in each of their chapters at national steering committee meetings during regional Round Robin.

2. The local chapter and the other group should exchange participation in political education sessions and exchange information in search of common goals and areas in which the two groups can work together. (i.e. breakfast programs, drug programs, joint support in each other's actions, exchange of speakers).

3. Be specific in your chapter's committments to the other group, and live up to it. Establish trust through personal, physical committment rather than offering blankets

and trinkets. Offer yourself and time.

4. Local chapters should clearly define the limits of their support to local groups - Do not overreach the resources of your chapter. No commitment is better than an unfilled commitment.



• 6. Suggested areas for local chapter activities are: Sponsor Third World speakers on campus or to VVAW activities, participate in local community programs, and in VA and draft counseling, support prison programs, (reform movements and prison unions), actively seek coalition with third world groups on campuses and/or in the community.

There was a lot of criticism on the section objective #7 about busing. Many felt that they could not endorse this section because it does not solve the problems of equal housing and opportunity, nor does it solve the problems of education. However, people did feel that they could endorse busing if it was a tactic requested by a particular community.

PROPOSAL: That the workshop recommendations be accepted with the deletion of the section regarding objective #7.

The vote on this was: 82-yes; U-no; 8 abst.

Also, it was proposed that another point be added to the section on outreach as point # 7 to read as follows:

Each region is to get input from Third World Communities by field study and research with regard to the issue of bussing and objective #7. This will be discussed in the Round Fobin reports of the next NSCM, and if a workshop is needed, one will be formed to draw up proposals around this issue.

WOMEN'S WORKSHOP

In this portion of the workshop, the women seemed anxious to talk about themselves for a twofold reason. One, that they wished to know each other better, in order to find a common base from which to work. And two, to help sensitize the men to our gut feelings and the directions from which our problems as women within the organization stem.

In order to do this, we passed around a set of questions, which seemed basic to those needs. As we went around the group, each woman answered <u>all</u> the questions at once, in order to lend continuity to the situation.

These are the questions.

- 1. How did you get into VVAW?
- 2. How would you describe your chapter, i.e. active or inactive ?
- 3. What is the number of women compared to men?
- 4. Are the women active?
- 5. What do the women do?
- 6. Are the women in any kind of group? If so, describe the group.
- 7. How do you think women should be involved in VVAW?
- 8. What is you perception of how men in VVAW do/would relate to a women's caucus?"
- Why do you stay in VVAW? What is your true motivation?

The answers to these questions gave us all a lot of insight into ourselves and each other. This was followed by sort of an interview situation, in order to allow

the men present to direct questions dealing with more specific problems. Even the there are still many questions to be asked, and problems to be solved, a base was laid.

There will be communication between the women (and any interested men) that will deal with projects and continue to encourage each other. The questionaire will also be sent to each person on the communications list.

There is a problem that we will consider and attempt to deal with in our communications. It is one that seems to be a primary example of all our problems as both women and men within VVAW.

It appears to us that among the veterans there is an amplification of a common conditioning men experience from birth. Then when a man comes in from the bush, he finds it less painful to deal with that experience if he has no close personal contacts to deal with.

This is carried over into civilian life. If he comes under severe stress, he tends to withdraw completely from the people he cares about the most, which often includes a woman.

The problem this created for a woman is duel in nature. Because of her primary conditioning, she feels incorrectly that she is merely a back-up force. So, when the man cuts her off, she finds herself with the inability to assert herself.

We have only begun to confront the problems involved. They will continue to face all of us -- gradually reduced, we hope. Therefore, we must continue the dialogue we began last night and so urge that workshops on the position of women within and around VVAVI be held - on their own - at all future NSCM. Eventually, action programs will evolve out of these, giving us greater opportunities to come to grips with these problems.

There were many suggestions made around the report from this workshop. It was suggested that the 9 questions be used within each of the regions so that women's problems can be dealt with on the local level. It was also suggested that there be future workshops on the problems of women and that these workshops go into more depth on the conditioning of men and women. It was also suggested that a men's workshop on sexism be held at the next NSCM.

The statement from this workshop received unanimous acceptance by the body.

OPERATION COUNTY FAIR

1. Operation County Fair has been adopted by the Alabama and California regions as an on-going program to provide medical aid for the people of Boca Chita (Brown) Alabama, and to establish a permanent clinic within the community.

II. It is proposed that VVAW adopt Operation County Fair as an on-going national

project and that all the remains be responsible for dissemination information to the chapters and general membership level and communities of those chapters concerning Operation County Fair.

It was felt that Operation County Fair will, as a national project, create new energies, unity and direction within the structure of VVAW and strengthen the bonds of solidarity externally with the black brothers and sisters of Boca Chita and Third World peoples nationally, rather than being deal t with in the manner of Special Interest groups.

III. California regional office: 35C3 W. Pico

Los Angeles, California 90019 (213) 734-2136

accepts the responsibility of compiling and disseminating information, donations, and all the immediate administrative affairs, as /labama is not prepared to handle the clerical load at this time.

IV. Alabama County Fair Operations provisional Headquarters: 1317 14th Ave.

Tuscaloosa, Alabama 35401

Alabama VVAW accepts the responsibility of drafting an organization proposal, incorporating the clinic within the state and also with the Internal Revenue Service as a non-profit volunteer organization, so that donations of money and equipment will be tax deductible and also establishing a provisional co-directorship with VVAW and the community, with a Board of Directors as trusteeship, and from the Black professional community (clergy, doctors, lawyers) until the community is prepared to staff and recommend policy of the clinic, and also create a means of continued fundings.

- V. The national regions responsibility will be to establish contacts on the regular chapter and general membership level to solicit active support from:
 - A. professional personnel-doctors, nurses, business people, etc.
 - B. para-professionals-medics and corpsmen
 - C. donations to VVAVI, Coeration County Fair, California region (these donations should be ear-marked for OCF)
 - D. supplies and medical equipment sent to VVAW Alabama, with duplicate packing slip utilizing the United Parcel Service. (Ups is cheaper and more efficient, and the danger of getting ripped off will be decreased). The duplicate packing slips are so that one copy will go to California, and one copy will go to Alabama.
 - E. any and all help in approaching local foundation and political organization in funding.
- VI. Immediate aid station will be established in the community, and it is estimated that the commitment of building a structure cannot be initiated until April (during Easter vacation) when the California region and supporters from other regions and chapters will convoy to Boca Chita to help with the clinic proper. Personnel should bear in mind that Boca Chita is a poor Black rural community and logistical support should be provided within your own areas: the encampment will be a bivouak arrangement.
 - A. primary emphasis on clinic proper
 - B. draft counseling -- application to Third World
 - C. G.I. Fights



- D. special problems of the community
- . F. VA counseling
 - F: legal aid and political education
 - G. PVS with veterans

VII. V hat is being done presently with Operation County Fair? The California region has released a mailing (pink sheet) and raised several hundred dollars to date. They are also contacting musical groups for concerts.

Los Angeles Free Clinic and Venceremos Peoples Medical clinic have been interviewed and received contacts to solicit supplies, funds, etc. and also were given organizational proposals from a historical perspective, including local struggles, by-laws, etc. Contacts are also being made with: A. HEW;

B. Federal programs for rural poor; C. Public Health Service;

VIII. John Musgrave has outlined in depth some of the problems that have occured while dealing with the Cairo project: A. lack of sensitivity of the desires of the community; B. COOP by liberals and Third World Peoples; C. lack of discipline D. lack of understanding; F. paranoia; F. unconscious racism

These problems were resolved through instituted programs of Survival Revival, fund-raising, local benefits with bands, donations of food and clothing, rap sessions prior to convoy, stressing political education of situation and people, clear definition of individual responsibilities.

WE NEED A STERILIZER FOR THE CLINIC

There was unanimous acceptance of this proposal, which means that Operation County Fair is now a national project of VVAW.

A mailer will be sent out from the Los Angeles Clearing House with a more definitive outline of programs. We are not asking for Operation County Fair to be a first priority over regional programs, but that those regions interested work on the operation as a major project. It would be helpful if all of the regions could send in the type of projects they are using for fund-raising to the L.A. Clearing House. With regard to what people can be doing now, check out contacts of any sort with people who work with free clinics. See what they have in their clinics and begin scrounging for the same types of equipment. This should be started immediately.

FUTURE ACTIONS WORKSHOP

This workshop met to discuss several proposed actions. They are:

1. A Bonuc March II on Washington

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- 2. Actions during the Gainesville Trial
- 3. A Kent State Anniversary action
- 4. Lobbying in Congress during the vote to cut off appropriations for the war
- 5. A War Dead Memorium at Eagles Nest Chapel in New Mexico

After discussion of these proposed actions, it was our concensus that we should give top priority to a national action at the time of the Gainesville Trial. The Trial is considered an attack on VVAW as a whole and it is suggested that actions take place in Gainesville and in all regions in protest against the Government's blatant harassment of our brothers there.

Keeping in mind that to do not want to have an action for tion's sake, all other proposals are not considered by us to be truly worthwhile. We decided against a Bonus March because we feel that any action that we do while the War is going on should not be focused on making military service more attractive.

We decided against an action at Kent State for fear of blatant repercussions. The action at Eagles Nest was also put aside for reasons of non-relevance to the serious problems in Indochina which are, right now, our main concern.

It was suggested to have a national day of actions in local communities centered around the struggle to stop war appropriations. The date we leave open, subject to the selection of an effective date by the National Staff. We feel that we should not adopt this action as a national action because we anticipate chapters participation in this struggle as a matter of course and that local areas will prepare actions without the need for national organization.

This proposal was unanimously accepted in total.

PVS WORKSHOP

Post Vietnam Syndrome is a definite problem confronting Vietnam Veterans and their community in general. The first problem we dealt with in the PVS workshop was a definition of Post Vietnam Syndrome. This is what we came up with:

What appears to be sociopathic behavior, is actually the symptoms of a man struggling to survive. His reasoning is distorted by physio-psychological disorders*—physical and emotional pains and stresses. Example: A man who carries four ounces of shrapnel in his body, and the memory of a burning baby in his mind. Intermediate results: nightmares, blackouts and withdrawal from reality. End results: GUILT, FEELING OF BEING A SCAPEGOAT, RAGE, ALCOHOLISM OR DRUG ADDICTION; ALIENATION, LACK OF MOTIVATION, FEELING INABILITY OF EVER LOVING AGAIN, AND SUICIDE.

In order to deal with PVS we have to get into our community with concrete programs. The PVS workshop recommends:

1. People interested in grassroot programs must do research to be able to bring together in their heads a working definition of Post Vietnam Syndrome. This can be done by obtaining a copy of the PVS library from the national clearing house.

2. Information obtained from the library should be disseminated to the community to raise support and aid to formulate PVS rap groups. This is a crucial importance because the VA at this time does not even acknowledge the existance of PVS.

- 3. Rap groups can then be established with the help of professionally trained Vietnam Veterans and any other help that can be Okayed by the group members unanimously. There also is an immediate need to include women and non-veterans in PVS rap groups that are at a point where they can accept such a move. One way to do this is to set up more than one PVS rap group.
 - 4. A WSI in front of Congress on PVS.
- 5. VVAW should also petition Congress to be recognized as an official veteran service organization. We realize that the VA is not going to deal with veteran problems, but we recognize the VA as a tool to contact veterans.
 - * There were people that felt there has to be a political definition involved with this problem.

There was a friendly amendment to the statement presented by the PVS workshop:

At the next NSCM, the F is workshop will in part be devoted in developing a political definition of PVS and that it is mandatory that a report on this be made at the next NSCM.

This amendment was made because there was some dissatisfaction with the workshop's failure to deal with the problems of PVS as they are seen in a political nature.

Also, it was decided that research on the WSI on PVS be done before the next NSCM and brought before the body in April for approval.

The statement of this workshop was unanimously accepted.

WSI WORKSHOP

We are planning two major WSI's at this point: one on A and H bombs, and one on the intelligence community. We feel that if the investigations do go as planned, they will generate interest and membership for YVAW and increase our viability as a significant force in U.S. and world politics.


NUCLEAR WEAPONS

Because of the new health hazards due to the radiation, people who were exposed to the effects of the bombs dropped after MANII in Japan were considered unclean by the Japanese society. There were and still are 2nd and 3rd generation birth defects due to genetic damage. After the bombing, there was a commission formed by the U. S. called the APBC which was supposed to treat the injured persons. Instead of treatint them, they used them for experimentation and kept all the records secret of the effects due to the bombing. These records are still kept secret from the rest of the world by the U.S. government.

It was decided that an ad hoc committee be set up to gather and disseminate information. The members chosen were Blade Underwood (Calif.), Brian Adams (National office) and Steve Hawkins (National office). These persons are responsible to the whole organization to publish a monthly status report, gather information and witnesses and compile suggested reading lists. Some of the other duties are legal investigation of the consequences for the persons involved, obtaining counseling from scholars in various field and writing a political analysis on the international effects. A question-naire would also be written to provide guide lines for people in the field that wish to help with this project. All information will be disseminated to all regional coordinators, appropriate other groups and the other participants in the werkshop.

At this time, we expect the bulk of information to come from the following categories of perole: G.I.'s, Vets, Correspondents, professionals and government officials, Depending on the content of the information we are able to obtain, the investigation could cover any of the following areas.

- 1. Environmental effects i.e. residual radiation in soil samples in Color., Arizona, Nevada, etc. and documenting accidents that have occured.
- 2. Health -- i.e. cows that eat radioactive grasses and children that drink this milk can develop bone and teeth problems due to the replacement of calcium with Strontium 90.
- 3. Military -- the use of nuke weapons or their presence as a vehical for intimidation i.e. Indochina.



5. Historical and political analysis of why these weapons were developed and used at the times they were and what we can expect in the future if the situation is allowed to proceed unchecked. Also the effect that a credible, united action could have to stop a nuclear tragedy before it occurs.

During the course of the discussion, many very interesting facts were brought to light and full reports were requested on them all. Everyone was asked to contact all their friends that might have pertinent information or any other researchers or press contacts that may be able to help. Please have them all contact the National Liffice.

INTELLIGENCE COMMUNITY

Several Congressmen have expressed tremendous interest and support of this investigation and already at least one CLA operation has been ceased due to the congressional pressure exerted when some people found out what was happening in this operation.

We decided that the preparation would take the following stages: information gathering - press clippings, books, etc.; questionnaires written and circulated; contacts made that have access to the information, i.e. ex-agents and personal friends of the present participants, and media contacts; interviews; WSI in special congressional hearings and perhaps public also; on-going political education and information gathering through video tapes, books, articles in both establishment and movement press, speaking and other congressional hearings related to the information released through the WSI.

Besides witnesses, we need any physical proof we can obtain such as uniforms, patches for uniforms, documents, etc. One item mentioned specifically is known as DICOM (defense intelligence collection manual) which lists the illegalities of intelligence collection as practices by the U.S. Any photos, or weapons or drugs used for intelligence collection would be very valuable.

On protection of witnesses we made several observations: 1. the government wants to avoid publicity at all costs and a political exposure is a sure way to gain maximum media coverage; 2. in the past, several ex-agents have testified and the government ignored or denied their actions and they were not harrassed; 3. We have congressional support and congressional immunity: 4. we can obtain lawyers for free and enter all the witnesses into client-lawyer relationships for further protection; because of the people we have already gotten committment from to testify, the more the government tries to do to intimidate or discredit our work, the credibility it will lend to us will increase; 6. even our government doesn't have enough staff to fight on many fronts at once and they are under unprecedented attack at this time. Every one who participates will have high enough visibility that the government will not be able to just "disappear" the witness. Also, since we are doing this as an organization if the government attacks just one of our people, they will have to fight not just one, but about 30,000 Vietnam Vet "crazies". The only time we are really vulnerable is before the investigation becomes public. In this light, we must realize that there is some risk, at least for the person coordinating all the information and arrangements. Because of this, all the names of the participants will be kept absolutely secret until the MSI and the dates, places and routes and means of transportation for the witnesses will be also a secret. The only things we feel could damage us at this time is if

timors get started or pach get questioned in the attempt to include them and they dont let the coordinate geommittee know. If anything does happen, people should contact Gary Thomas, Steve Huck, or Bart Csbor immediately. If a pig does try to question any one, don't admit anything and don't even deny anything. Just tell them to contact your lawyers or us and we'll arrange lawyers. Don't worry about the oaths or de-briefing we all had about never talking to anyone about anything.

We set up an ad hoc committee to coordinate this project and they will also try to send out one newsletter each month to the workshop participants and the regional coordinators. Everyone will be up-dated through newsletters from the ad hoc committees, national office, and hopefully through the 1st Casualty newspaper. WAR WORKSHOP

PANWAP (Propaganda Against Nuclear Weapons Attack Plan)

Historically, the American public has been covertly prepared by the intelligence community of impending inhumane policies of the U.S. government using the mass media. This incidious propaganda effect has been implemented dirough "planned" leaks of military contingency plans, which are presented in a way to de-sensitize the American people to government policies that would normally be rejected.

We believe that one of the options that Nixon has for escalation of the War in Indochina is the use of Tactical Nuclear Weapons. Many of us have seen a growing campaign in the media to prepare the public for the use of these weapons by "speculation" on the subject. We feel that VVAW must combat this propaganda and present the following plan of action.

The following plan was developed to be implemented at the regional and local level.

Headquarters (regional) [evel.

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Headquarters will develop and keep and up-to-date file of materials published on the use of Tactical Nukes and the effects of Nukes. Research Task Force Teams — several agents (members of VVAW) assigned to compile this info to be sent to local level. To do this, research in Libraries, news clippings, magazine articles, etc.

2. Company (chapter) level.

Develop a complete propaganda packet that contains enough info in Tactical Nukes that it can be read quickly and easily. Packets must be accessible to CNNAT's.

Counter Muclear Weapons Attack Teams (CNWAT) - 5 to 10 people who can be mobilized to act in 24 hours of notification of enemy propaganda, to strike collectively at the source of the propaganda. Units should act only on being provoked by bullshit in the media.

3. Implementation. Whenever the media (TV, radio, newspapers, etc) puts out

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articles or features which supposedly discuss the use of North in an "objective" manner, IPANWAP goes into effect. CNWAT's must immediately (within 24 hours) go to the source of the propaganda (radio station, news office, etc.) and demand to present counter information. Picket lines, counter news articles compiles by RTFT's, letter to the editor campaigns are PANWAPs tools. Use imagination.

Pealizing that the U.S. government and big business will not willingly relinguish its struggle to gain economic control of South East Asia, we feel that the military struggle will continue in some form even if a treaty is signed. The possibilities include clandestine military operations, the introduction of Tactical Nukes, the continuation of the Air war, and re-introduction of ground troops. In preparation for these possibilities we must press on in our education of the public. This education must take many forms, including speaking, leafleting, demonstrating, and all the various ways that have been used in the past.

We also realize that being Vietnam veterans does not automatically make us experts on the political struggles of the Indochinese people, and finding in the workshop that many of us felt that we are not knowledgable on many aspects of the struggle, we recommend that VVAW members continue or start to educate themselves. Resources for our education should come from all available sources including newspapers, research organizations (NARMIC, etc) overseas publications, and very importantly, the Vietnamese themselves.

We also recommend strong liaison with the local media be established and every effort be made by individuals and collectives make use of all available resources and study.

The proposal of this workshop was unanimously accepted.

FUTURE OF VVAW WORKSHOP

This workshop resulted from the assumption that VVAW requires a long range structural change if it is to survive as an organization and effectively deal with the objectives and programs established since its creation. The following recommendations should be studied and criticized by each region and chapter, keeping in mind that these recommendations are presented as a conceptual basis for change only, in order to assure our continued existance and effectiveness.

- I. The Survival of VVAW -- recommendations concerning immediate action by each chapter.
 - 1. Education on the organization: a. structure; b. functions; c. history
 - 2. Find out the members' interests: a. What should VVAW be concentrating on? b. What will they (members) themselves work on? c. What resources and skills do they possess?
 - On-going education around the 10 objectives.
 - 4. Education on the war and imperialism.
 - 5. Combination of friendship and a sense of common goals and purpose. (A balance between these should lead to the optimum of effective working).

II. Internal Pestructuring -- original stages.

1. Non-function regires should be incorporated into stronger regions. A defacto situation already exists with little or no activity going on in approximately 9 regions, yet these regions have equal representation within the steering committee. By adding non-functioning regions to stronger regions, the work load of the stronger regional office would not increase because it is, in fact, not coordinating any more activity. This change would go into effect immediately upon approval by the NSC.

2. Each region should examine their own area and determine the strategy which will be the most successful in order to more effectively organize that region under their individual circumstances. This strategy should be submitted to the

national office.

3. This committee suggests that collectivization would be the optimum of effective organization within VVAW on all levels.

PROPOSAL: That the above points be accepted by the NSC and be put into effect immediately.

Vote: $43\frac{1}{2}$ -yes; $37\frac{1}{2}$ -no; 14 abst. Because a 2/3 majority vote was not obtained, it was decided that this question be tabled and taken back to the regions for discussion and be voted on at the next NSCM under old business.

III. Transitionary Period -- suggestion for restructuring VVAW internally.

A. The main function of the regional coordinator is to make sure that chapters are actually strong, functioning chapters. This will prevent the problems of cooptation and the need to incorporate regions. A list of the functioning chapters should be sent to the national office with a synopsis of strengths and weaknesses of that chapter.

B. The national office will have direct contact with the chapters. All information now sent to the regional coordinator will, in the future, be sent to the

chapters.

C. The national office staff will be increased and expanded so that more time

can be devoted to specific areas.

D. As the flow of information between chapters and national increases, a list of potential traveling organizers will be developed. Training sessions will be implemented to educate these people.

Concept of the traveling organizer -- These-people will be chosen by the national office for the first year, and by the chapters for following years. The national office coordinators will be chosen by the chapters. These organizers would be operating within any specific area of the country. They will travel between all chapters within their area to see how they operate. They will make suggestions for improvement and contact people who have expressed interest in starting chapters. They will also go into non-chapter cities and try to organize chapters.

E. The position of the regional coordinator will be abolished when the traveling organizers are trained and ready to begin working. In conjunction, a new

resentative from each occredited chapter and the national office. This committee will meet once a year for the purpose of formulating policy and programs for the year. Every three months, the traveling organizers and national staff will meet in a central location and act as an interim committee to discuss how they've been working to implement programs established at the previous NSCM. If the programs are not working, information would go out to all chapters in a detailed report and if possible, the chapters would vote by mail to change the policies. If it is not possible to vote by mail, an emergency meeting would be called.

- F. What constitutes a chapter? There must be a high degree of discipline on the chapter level.
- 1. Member a member is one who works for and supports the objectives of the organization. If after a comprehensive PE program, a person still does not support the objectives, then that member might be subject to expulsion from the organization.
- 2. Chapter a chapter is a group of people who continually work on a day-to-day basis for the objectives, and in accordance with national policy and structure. The size of a chapter should be determined so that the chapter is capable of working in a viable way to be effective within the population of a given area.

A chapter must be accredited by the regional coordinator of the presentsystem or by the traveling organizer of the future structure. Regional or area meetings must be held so that chapters can get together.

Each chapter must have a P. C. Box so that the problem with transient address can be alleviated.

IV. The "Winter Soldier" concept


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- 1. Upon approval by the National Steering Committee and chapters and on a set date, each chapter would henceforth be called VVAW WINTER SOLDIER ORGAN-IZATION.
- 2. After a period of one year (not less than) and after the name has become synonymous with VVAW, the VVAW will be dropped entirely from the organizational name.

This workshop is to be taken on a conceptual basis only. This is not a firm proposal, only a basis for discussion and criticism of the presently inadequate structure. Each chapter and region is urged to examine and criticize the present structure and this proposed structure.

PROPUSAL: That the report from this workshop be accepted by by NSC as a concept and taken back to the regions for further discussion and a vote at the next NSCM.

This proposal was accepted.



"The VVAW vs. the Postal System agenda item was tabled unall the next meeting because the Ohio region, who put this item on the agenda, was absent. The same is true for the discussion of the 2nd Fevolution concept, which was also placed on the agenda by Ohio. It was suggested that the following be included in the minutes: "Staiger has a big mouth and a big stomach."

PROPOSAL FOR DEALING WITH TROTS

The following proposal is put forward in lieu that certain political organizations (specifically the Socialist Workers Party and their affiliates National Peace Action Coalition (NPAC), the Young Socialist Alliance (YSA), Student Mobilization Committee (SMC), and the Women's National Abortion Action Coalition (WNAAC); the Progressive Labor Party (PLP), and their affiliates Students for a Democratic Society (SDS), and Workers Action Movement (WAM); Workers World and their affiliates Youth Against War and Fascism (YAWF), and American Servicemen's Union (ASU) engage in attempts to split or co-opt other organizations in order to achieve their goals.

That in the past these attacks have been made upon VVAW as SWP attacks upon the regions of Illinois, New York, California, Chio, Texas, New England, Missouri, and Colorado, etc.

That in the past PLP has attacked California, Texas, New England, Florida, and New York,

That in the past Workers World through their affiliates YAWF and ASU have directed attacks against Illinois, New York, etc.

That none of these organizations support the Vietnamese people in their struggle for liberation and self-determination, the 7-point proposal of the PRG, or the 9-point agreement reached by the U.S., the DRV, and the PRG;

We resolve the following:

That VVAW chapters, be they local, regional, or national, shall not form any alliances with any of the above mentioned organizations and parties specifically, and any other parties and organizations which by nature use means of co-optation or splitting tactics on other organizations to obtain their objectives:

That VVAM cadre, be they local, regional, or national, shall not place the objectives of other political organizations to which they may belong before the objectives of VVAM;

That all members of VVAW, after sufficient time for education, must support the Victnamese people, the 7-point proposal of the PRG, and the 9-point accords of Gct, 72, and that failure to do so is grounds for expulsion from VVAW.

This proposal was tabled until it can be discussed in the regions and will be discussed under old business at the next NSCM. This is being done because some felt that a unilateral decision on all of these organizations should not be done because some of the chapters have been able to work effectively with some of these groups. It was suggested that such a decision should be made on a local level rather than on the national level. Also, there was some unfamiliarity with some of these organizations.

PROPOSAL

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1. Proposal that the Nat stal Office be allowed to raise mons without restriction in any region, as long as the National Office staff does all the work. Percentages of splitting up money when a region or chapter participates will be worked out on a case basis, negotiations to be between the national office and those who are doing the work only.

2. Proposal that the requirements for membership in this organization be altered to require a minimum of a \$2.00 monthly membership fee. One dollar to go to the national office and one to the regional office. Money to be handled by the regional office. Members would be provided with cards, numbered and issued by the national office and dispersed by the regional offices. Mon-payment of dues would be cause for dismissal, unless by the written intercession of the regional coordinator.

The reasons behind this are: The national and regional officers must often depend upon donations and func raising drives for their sustenance. Accurate prediction of incoming funds causes many problems with overspending. Many times funds for rent, telephone, etc. come out of the pockets of those who are working full time as VVAW officers, causing serious financial hardships. This amount of money, while small, would at least provide a regular pittance, based on amount of membership, on which such officers could depend.

Another good reason for this practice is that the time has come for everyone in our organization to take seriously their membership. VVAW is nationwide. It has often been able to effect popular opinion throughout the world. In many chapters concrete serve-the-people programs are functioning. We have the possibility of becoming a tremendous educational tool. \$2.00 a month is not too much to ask of people dedicated to achieving our goals, and enjoying the fruits of the organizations collective labor. People should pay as one means of showing concrete day--to-day support for the anti-imperialist movement. It is a way to reach everybody and make them commit themselves in more than just words.

In past months, we have had real problems with the anti-authority attitudes of people in this organization. Many times this attitude has manifested itself in direct attacks upon the elected officers in this organization. Sometimes there was ample reason for criticism of officials, but most of the times small things were blown all out of proportion because, coupled with the very real mistakes of the leadership, was the prejudice, in some peoples minds against any leadership at all. However, steps such as this one are being taken to increase membership participation of the organization. By contributing something to the support of officers, membership will grow to have more interest in VVAW politics and not be deceived into action only on personalities.

We feel that officers should not just be elected, left to fend for themselves, and then criticised for their mistakes by the membership. Officers are elected to serve the members and goals of this organization by the members. Therefore, they should be supported and encouraged by the members as well as criticized. Two dollars a month from each member is more than money. It shows the officers that people have faith in them and like what they are doing.

This proposal was overwhelmingly defeated.

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A source who has furnished reliable information in the past advised that on December 27, 1971, at 10:00 A.M., the subject, along with 24 other individuals, including two females, occupied the Betsy Ross House, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. The doors were locked and an individual removed the thirteen-star United States flag from the outside pole and placed it upside down on the pole.

At 10:40 A.M., Philadelphia police officers broke the lock on the door and entered the house. The 25 individuals were arrested and transported to the Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, Police Headquarters without incident. The only damage to the house was a broken lock on the front door. The flag was restored to its original position.

This demonstration was known as the Valley Forge II, sponsored by the Northeast Region Vietnam Veterans Against the War (VVAW), December 24-31, 1971, at Valley Forge and Philadelphia, Pennsylvania; New York City, New York; and Washington, D.C.

The VVAW is a veterans' organization with a national office at 25 West 26th Street, New York, New York. Its first published objective is "to demand an immediate cessation of fighting and the withdrawal of all American troops from Indochina". VVAW has participated in several demonstrations, including a massive demonstration in Washington, D.C., during the period April 19-23, 1971.

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The subject and all the others arrested were charged with disorderly conduct and breach of peace, together with using city facilities without permission. All were released on \$10.00 to \$25.00 bond the same day they were arrested.



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VVAW verified that subject had received literature from the VVAW, but had not participated in any activities by the group, and this was substantiated by sources in the Toledo area.

In view of the lack of activity by the subject, and the apparent lack of any propensity for violence he does not appear to meet the criteria for inclusion in Adex. Accordingly, no further investigation is being conducted and this case is being closed.
