Synopsis:

Kansas City Vietnam Veterans Against the War (VVAW) continues to be active and VVAW chapters with limited activity are located in Lawrence, Topeka and Emporia, Kansas. JOHN\MUSGRAVE continues to be Midwest Regional Coordinator and TOM/HALL is Kansas City chapter head. Official organ of Midwest VVAW Region is "Veterans Voice", published on irregular basis. Sources reveal Kansas City VVAW chapter continues to hold weekly meetings. Kansas City VVAW chapter has bank account at a local Kansas City bank. admitted Communist Party member, continues to attend VVAW meetings and participates in VVAW activities.

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OF SUBJECT GAGANIZATION

DETAILS:

The VVAW was founded in the spring of 1967 by six young Vietnam veterans in New York City.

A CONTRACTOR OF THE STATE OF TH

At the beginning of 1968, with 600 members, VVAW opened a national office, founded the first GI newspaper, "Vietnam GI," and sent close to 500 veterans into the McCarthy campaign to beat down the red baiters. After getting gassed at the Democratic convention at Chicago and caught in the general "down" of the peace movement, VVAW was nearly inactive until the moratoriums in the fall of 1969. Members of VVAW led student strikes on major campuses across the country and battled Veterans Administration Hospital authorities over threats to throw amputee Vietnam veterans out for signing anti-war petitions. At present, membership of the VVAW, nationally, consists of 8,500 members.

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I. ORIGIN AND SCOPE

The Kansas City Vietnam Veterans Against the.
War (VVAW)

TOM HALL continues to be Kansas City chapter head and JOHN MUSGRAVE the Midwest Regional Coordinator. VVAW chapters with limited activity exist at Lawrence, Topeka and Emporia, Kansas.

At a VVAW meeting on addresses and list of VVAW members and associates including addresses and telephone numbers was passed out to the members in attendance. This was a list of 110 individuals.

Lawrence, Kansas Chapter

and advised they had a VVAW meeting in Lawrence, kansas, recently and advised they would have regular meetings in the future and work as a chapter.

EMPLYED OF SUDMOTION CLASSIFICATION (1972)

The Lawrence VVAW chapter in August 1971 filed with the University of Kansas (KU), Lawrence, Kansas, as an organization. The chapter had very little activity during the 1971-1972 school year and went defunct. The only activity by the VVAW at KU during the 1972-1973 school year has been an occasional table set up in the Kansas Union. At a meeting of the University events committee October 25, 1972, the committee approved the VVAW permission to take donations at a table in the Union. At the meeting it was stated that the VVAW is a nonprofit organization and it supports itself solely by donations to cover the costs of postage, pamphlets and newsletters.

The Lawrence VVAW chapter has not been involved in any activity for the past several weeks.

January 22, 1973)

Topeka, Kansas Chapter

The VVAW is a recognized student organization on the Washburn University, Topeka, Kansas, campus for the fall 1972-1973 school year. THOMAS LEE WILLIAMS is listed as the coordinator of the organization. There are no other officers listed. Meetings are held at the Student Union building each Thursday evening and they are open meetings to the public. There are approximately 10 individuals listed as members and all are allegedly students of the University.

MENTER OF SUBJECT CAGEMIZATIONS November 20, 1972)

The Washburn-Topeka chapter of the VVAW lacks leadership and is "dying on the vine." TOM WILLIAMS, who has been the coordinator in the past, simply is not an active leader and has now left the Washburn chapter and is no longer in town. Presently, there is no successor to WILLIAMS and the chapter now is only a student organization which has very little influence outside the VVAW.

A VVAW regional caucus was held on at Topeka, Kansas, with JOHN MUSGRAVE leading the discussion. It was discussed at this meeting future activities of the VVAW mentioned in previous meetings. It was mentioned that self-admitted CP member, would participate

in VVAW activity to take place at the Kansas City International

At a meeting of the Kansas City VVAW at 306 W. 39th Street. Kansas City, Missouri

were planning to demonstrate at the Kansas City International airport in protest of Vice President AGNEW's visit to Kansas City. Members of the VVAW will participate in this demonstration; however, the main contingency of VVAW will be in Emporia demonstrating on Veterans Day.

TOM HALL announced that the VVAW will sponsor a convoy to Cairo, Illinois, leaving Kansas City November 18, 1972.

The VVAW is contemplating changing its name to the "Winter Soldier" as it is felt that the war in Vietnam is coming to an end but the organization desires to continue and expand its activities.

At this meeting TOM HALL announced that the National Steering Committee meeting would be held in January 1973, in Chicago.

A regular meeting of the Kansas City VVAW was

TOM HALL announced that the VVAW would sponsor a benefit show December 13-14, 1972, at the Vangard Theater to raise funds for Cairo. A film entitled "Investigation of Citizens Above Suspicion" will be shown and the VVAW will keep the proceeds from the film for VVAW Week.

A VVAW regional conference was held at Lake Pamona, Ottawa, Kansas, December 2-3, 1972, and approximately 28 persons attended the conference.

One of the more important discussions at this meeting was the possibility of the Midwest Region of the Kansas City VVAW breaking with the national VVAW headquarters located in New York City. The Midwest Region feels that they are not duly represented at the national level and felt that a more effective program could be developed if power were vested in a regional structure.

A regular weekly meeting of the Kansas City VVAW was held

who is a leader of the War Tax Resistance (WTR) group in Kansas City.

to take over the WTR functions in Kansas City, however, the VVAW refused but volunteered to assist in WTR activities.

The WTR was formed in New York City in 1969 to convince as many American taxpayers as possible to voluntarily withhold a small portion of their Federal income tax and the 10% surtax on their telephone bill as a protest against the United States participation in the Vietnam war and as a protest against military and defense spending by the United States Government. As of December 1972, the national head-quarters moved to 912 E. 31st Street, Kansas City, Missouri.

Another VVAW regular meeting was held at 306 W.

The discussion centered on the VVAW making telephone calls to retailers and wholesalers in the Kansas City area for donations for food and clothing to be carried to Cairo, Illinois. Part of the meeting was allocated to preparing the "Veterans Voice" for mailing;

On November 17, 1972, JOHN MUSGRAVE appeared on the University of Missouri at Kansas City campus and spoke to a group of five individuals for about an hour in Conference Room B in the Student Union. MUSGRAVE was very disappointed in the number of people who turned out for the meeting but explained to the individuals in attendance the purposes and goals of the VVAW.

HALL mentioned at this meeting that the VVAW attempted to open a checking account at the Westport Bank, but were refused by the bank president. HALL advised that due to this refusal, the VVAW would picket the bank on Friday, December 22, 1972, as well as write letters to various political figures.

A regular weekly VVAW meeting was held on

meeting only lasted approximately 15 minutes and the group dismissed to go to the All Souls Unitarian Church, 45th and Warwick, Kansas City, Missouri, to meet with other anti-war groups to plan anti-war demonstrations January 20, 1973.

It was decided at the second meeting that permission will be obtained from the city park department to dig a bomb crater in the park or a public place to illustrate the size and damage of U. S. bombs in North Vietnam. If permission was not granted, individuals would bring shovels anyway to appear ready to dig such a crater with no intention of doing so but to agitate authorities.

The regular weekly meeting of the Kansas City VVAW was held

She proposed that the Inauguration Day demonstrations in Kansas City be changed to Napalm Day. Individuals at this meeting also discussed the grand jury's method of harrassing revolutionary non-violent groups.

A peace vigil was conducted by the Sisters of Mercy, 9-11 a.m., January 20, 1973, with the Kansas City VVAW participating. Among those non-VVAW members participating were and and

January 20, 1973)

A regular Kansas City VVAW meeting was held at 306 W. 39th

in the discussion was the change the VVAW would undergo once the war ends. Members discussed the possibility of adding the name "Winter Soldier" to the VVAW or completely deleting VVAW from the organization's name. Members also discussed prospects of merging with the Peoples Coalition for Peace and Justice (PCPJ). It was felt by the members in attendance that such a move would be premature at this time since it is felt the war in Vietnam will be resumed within six months.

The PCPJ has described itself as being headquartered at 1029 Vermont Avenue, N.W., Washington, D.C., and as consisting of over 100 organizations which are using massive civil disobedience to combat racism, poverty, repression, and war.

A regional VVAW caucus was held January 4, 1973, at Emporia, Kansas. It was brought out at the meeting that on January 16, 1973, the Lawrence and Topeka chapters of the VVAW would pass out leaflets at Forbes Air Force Base, Topeka, beginning at approximately noon. This was to be a coalition type venture with several other unknown peace groups.

On Friday, January 19, 1973, another coalition of peace groups would hold some type of all-night vigil 6-7 p.m. at the south Capitol Building, Topeka, Kansas, with the demonstration being anti-war in nature.

At one point during the meeting JOHN MUSGRAVE, warned that the VVAW, is now logging all mail by number and date so that it would be possible to tell if the mail had been tampered with. MUSGRAVE further warned those in attendance against speaking with FBI Agents.

The Kansas City VVAW met at a regular meeting

meeting included the VVAW centering its efforts on veterans benefits after the war. They also decided that if a cease-fire held up in Vietnam they would work for a cease-fire throughout Indochina. TOM HALL advised they would also work for amnesty for all U. S. deserters. HALL advised that the CIA military operations in other areas of the world currently consist of acts of war. He said he felt the VVAW should expose this to the public.

A <u>regular Kansas City VVAW meeting was held at</u>

and plans were mentioned to hold the next VVAW regional caucus in Wichita, Kansas, over the weekend of February 17-18, 1973. Members discussed methods in which to keep the general public interested in VVAW activities and proposals were made to send out more literature and fliers which would present views of the VVAW as well as notify the public of forthcoming activities.

TOM HALL said JOHN MUSGRAVE has been asked to attend a conference in Paris and Rome from February 20-23, 1973, for a study of the Vietnam war in an effort to gain recognition of the Provisional Revolutionary Government as the authentic government of South Vietnam.

Preamble

We, the Vietnam Veterans Against the War, to promote an immediate and lasting peace both within the boundaries of the United States and on an international basis, demand:

An immediate cessation of fighting and the withdrawal of all American troops, planes, and military and economic aid from Southeast Asia;

The immediate termination of all operations by the United States government, its agencies, and American business interests that are designed to suppress the rightful struggles for liberation and self-determination of the peoples of Africa, Asia, and Latin America;

That all active-duty servicemen and women, Reservists and National Guardsmen be afforded the same rights that are guaranteed by the United States Constitution and Bill of Rights that are presently denied by the Uniform Code of Military Justice;

That there be no distinctions as to types of discharges, that a single type bed issued, and that this be retoractive;

Simultaneously, we pledge ourselves in conscience, spirit, and actuality, to support all military personnel refusing to serve against their consciences in wars at home and abroad;

To support the belief that the United States has never undertaken an extensive investigation of American war crimes in Indochina, and that the principles of Neurenburg have thus been violated;

To support the fight against racism, to show that our society is per-meated by racism, and the fight against sexism, to make clear that sexism plays a major part in promoting war;

To support the democratic right of Americans to unionize and strike to protect their income and safeguard their employment.

We promise to dedicate ourselves to these principles and objectives which directly relate to the imperialist suppression of the People of the World by the United States government.

I. GENERAL MEMBERSHIP

Samuel Commence of the Commenc

- 1.1 Any person who has previously served in any branch of the United States Armed Forces is eligible for membership.
 - 1.2 The purpose of the general membership shall be:
- 1.2.1 To promote an increased awareness in the University and the Tampa Bay Area regarding the domestic, social, political, and economic institutions that have caused and perpetuated the Vietnam War, and to promote an end to this imperialist war by non-violent means.

11. EXECUTIVE BODY

- 2.1 Any veteran of the Vietnam War is eligible to hold office.
- 2.2 The executive body shall consist of two parts, a general co-ordinator, and a steering council.
- 2.2.1 The Tampa Co-ordinator shall be appointed by the Regional Co-ordinator, who is popularly elected by the regional membership.
- 2.4.2 The Steering Council shall consist of Lour members, who shall be elected by a majority vote of at least fifteen (15) active members of the Tampa Bay Chapter.
 - 2.2.3 This election shall be held twice annually.

III. ACTIVE MEMBERSHIP

3.1 "Active members" shall be those student veterans who pay dues and attend meetings regularly.

IV. DUTIES OF OFFICERS

- 4.1 All executive power shall be vested in the area co-ordinator. He shall have power of approval of all executive action, unless otherwise stated in the constitution.
 - 4.2 . The duties of the Tampa Bay area co-ordinator shall be:
 - 4.2.1 To preside over and call the general meetings.
- 4.2.2 To appoint persons to fill vacancies (which may occur between elections) in the Steering Council.
- 4.2.3 To have the power of approval of all Tampa Bay, Chapter expenditures.
- 4.2.4.1 The area co-ordinator shall have the power of veto over any expenditure, action, or legislation.

- 4.2.4.2 The Steering Council shall not have the power to override the co-ordinator's veto.
 - 4.3 Duties of the Steering Council shall bet
 - 4.3.1 To promote publicity regarding actions.
- 4.3.2 Two members of the Steering Council shall perform the functions of secretary and treasurer.
- 4.3.3 In the absence of the general membership, the Steering Council shall have the power to conduct business.
 - 4.3.4 To propose expenditures.

W. AMENDMENT PROCEDURES

- 5.1 AMendments to the Tampa Bay Chapter constitution may originate at any general meeting.
- 5.2 The amendment shall be read and may be discussed at the masters at which it is introduced. Legal action may be taken only at a subsequent meeting.
- 5.3 The amendment shall be passed by a two-thirds vote of at least fifteen (15) active members.





MOORE talks about a peaceful revolution in the U.S. through the education of the people and the vote. He has been heard to say that he did not think that a shooting type revolution would take place in the U.S. because of the amosphere which prevails here.

November 29, 1972

A possible future leadership hierarchy for VVAW at USF, would be four coordinators, a secretary, a treasurer, and a news press man. The four coordinators would probably be WILLARD MOORE, JOHN HOGG, Student Government Vice President, CARL BROWN, and one black member. The other positions could then be appointed.

The current leaders of VVAW at USF are WILLARD T. MOORE, a student and CARL BROWN, disabled veteran who is not a student.

December 14, 1972

Source recently learned that there is a possibility that SCOTT CAMIL will be made Southern Regional Coordinator of National VVAW and that WILLARD MOORE would possibly be made Florida State Coordinator of VVAW, with the state headquarters being moved from Gainesville, Fla. to Tampa, Florida. SCOTT CAMIL is currently Florida State Coordinator.

December 29, 1972

The only current leaders of VVAW at USF are WILLARD MOORE and CARL BROWN.

January 14, 1973

V. MEMBERSHIP

On the late of the meeting was held at USF, Tampa, Florida. The meeting was chaired by TIM MOORE, leader of the Tampa chapter of VVAW

A VVAW movie called, "Only the Beginning", which was about 30 minutes long, was shown at the meeting. This movie displayed veterans throwing away their medals and showed war scenes and atrocities in Vietnam. The group was told that a movie would be shown at each meeting every two weeks.

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November 1, 1972

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On an antiwar meeting was held at USF, which meeting was chaired by TIM MOORE.

CARL BROWN, another VVAW, Tampa leader, recently told a group that VVAW was going to open its membership roles to non-veterans as well as veterans. He said that anyone who belonged to the VVAW and was arrested representing the VVAW, would be furnished lawyers and bond money from the VVAW.

BROWN said that the VVAW in Gainesville wants to get more VVAW members at USF and had recommended that possibly the people who belong to the United Front Against the War, (UFAW) would also want to be members of the VVAW. JOHN HOGG stated that all students who were interested in the UFAW would unite with the VVAW because of the national credibility which the VVAW enjoys. HOGG said he would back the VVAW 100 percent.

November 9, 1972

The United Front Against the War (UFAW), Univ. of S. Florida (UFAW-USF) was organized and operated as an umbrella group to coordinate and weld together all groups on the campus of USF who wanted to actively work against the Vietnam War. It was made up mainly of the Whole Earth Cult (WEC) and the VVAW at USF.


As of January, 1973, UFAW, USF was no longer an approved student organization on USF Campus, Tampa.


February 2, 1973.

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The Whole Earth Cult (WEC) is a campus approved student organization at the University of South Florida (USF), Tampa, Fla. The WEC is a front group on the USF campus for the Florida People's Coalition (FPC).

The Florida People's Coalition (FPC) is a statewide organization established as a pressure group to demonstrate at the Democratic and Republican National Conventions in Miami Beach, Florida, July and August, 1972. Its overall purpose is to seek an end to the Vietnam war and the adoption by national candidates of the People's Platform.





VII. ACTIVITIES

The July 27, 1972, issue of "The Oracle", official campus publication at USF, carried an article on page 16 entitled "Vets to March To Miami in Protest", which article read in part as follows:

Marie Company of the Company of the

"Some Florida veterans will march from Ft. Pierce to Miami for the Republican National Convention in a week-long 'March Against Murder' sponsored by a Tampa antiwar veterans group....."

"The march will be sponsored by the Tampa chapter of VVAW".....

"Veterans wishing to participate in the march should rally in the park across the intercoastal waterway from Ft. Pierce on Highway A-1-A on Aug. 12. The march will start the next morning...."

"They plan to march about 20 miles a day, reaching the Republican Nation Convention on the afternoon of Aug. 21".....

On July 28, 1972, several persons manned a table at the University of South Florida University Center (UC), from which table they were giving out various flyers and other information concerning the VVAW, including information of a proposed march from Ft. Pierce, Fla. to Miami. This march is to leave Ft. Pierce on August 12, or 13, 1972, and is to arrive in Miami on August 21, 1972, at the Republican National Convention.

July 28, 1972.

On July 29, 1972, WILLARD T. MOORE, Tampa VVAW leader, was overheard to remark that the persons from St. Petersburg - Tampa area to participate in the VVAW march from Ft. Pierce to Miami, would leave USF on August 12, 1972, for Ft. Pierce.

Starting July 31, 1972, VVAW was to have had a table at the UC of USF for several days in an effort to recruit members for VVAW and to enlist persons to take part in the march from Ft. Pierce to Miami.

August 1, 1972

Two women were to have been on the VVAW "March for Murder". One of the women is a member of the Women's Auxiliary Corp (WAC), and the other was a Vietnam war widow. Other interested persons may involve themselves by driving cars along the march route with supplies for the marchers.



On July 31, 1972, and August 1,2,3, and 4, 1972, the VVAW recruited members and distributed literature at a table set up in the UC at USF, Tampa. The appearance at USF by VVAW was sponsored by the Whole Earth Cult, a campus approved organization, since VVAW is not approved on campus and cannot conduct activities. The literature handed out was advertising the VVAW march from Ft. Pierce, Florida, to Miami, on August 12, 1972, and for recruiting persons to go on the march.

Flyers distributed on USF campus, August
4, 1972, reflected the address of the "March spokesman", WILLARD
T. MOORE, as Route 1, Box 400-E, Thonotosassa, Florida,
Tampa chapter of VVAW.

August 2, 3, 4, 1972.

The vehicle to be used as the command post for the VVAW "March Against Murder" from Ft. Pierce to Miami beginning August 12, 1972, will be a 1953 Ford house car bearing 1972 Florida license 3WW 3492. The vehicle consists of a 1953 cab over tractor, blue in color, with a white top, and a homemade mobile home attached, aluminum in color.

August 9, 1972

On August 7, 1972, the VVAW again maintained a table at USF, UC, Tampa, in order to recruit members into the planned Tampa chapter of the VVAW and also to obtain marchers for the VVAW "March Against Murder" from Ft. Pierce to Miami.

WILLARD MOORE has advised that the march will be peaceful since it will only include VVAW persons and can be controlled.

MOORE stated that if violence does break out in Miami, and the National Guard is called in the VVAW would defend themselves since they have a right to protect themselves from bodily harm.

August 10, 1972

On August 10, 1972, the VVAW table was manned in the UC at USF, from which table VVAW material was being distributed and donations accepted. One person at the table indicated that student reception had been very poor that day.

August 10, 1972

On August 10, and 11, 1972, the VVAW operated a table at the UC of USF to recruit members and to obtain marchers for the "March Against Murder".

August 10, and 11, 1972.

On August 19, and 11, 1972, the VVAW again had a table at USF, Tampa trying to recruit members for the VVAW and marchers for the VVAW "March Against Murder". The current plans for the VVAW "March Against Murder" called for the group from Toytown Dump, St. Petersburg, to leave the camp at about 12:00 noon, and meet with the group at USF near USF at about 1:00 or 1:30 PM, August 12, 1972, then proceed to Ft. Pierce. The march is to begin about 7:00 AM, August 13, 1972, with the plans to be about 10 miles in the morning, rest during the heat of the day, and then about 10 more miles after 4:00 PM.

August 11, 1972

On August 11, 1972, approximately 7 VVAW members who had been encamped in St. Petersburg, plus 30 persons identifying themselves as students of USF, Tampa, held a peaceful antiwar march and slide film showing on the side of the Federal Building, St. Petersburg, Florida.

RAY WAYMIRE, Director of Public Safety, St. Petersburg, Fla. August 11, 1972

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On August 13, 1972, about 2 PM, the VVAW contingent which was marching to Miami, was observed walking near Jensen Beach, Florida. About 30-35 persons were in the contingent, of which 20 were males.





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YIP-USF, a legitimate student organization at USF, was formed to bridge the gap between the University and the student community. There is no known affiliation with the national YIP organization in New York City.

The Youth International Party, also known as Yippies, is a loosely knit, antiestablishment, revolutionary youth organization formed in New York City in January, 1968.

The Student Mobilization Committee to End the War in Vietnam, University of South Florida (SMC-USF), Tampa, Florida, was recognized as an approved campus organization at USF by the Student Affairs Committee, May 15, 1970.

The Student Mobilization Committee to End the War in Vietnam (SMC) is controlled by the Socialist Workers Party (SWP) and its youth affiliate, Young Socialist Alliance. SMC initiates and supports public demonstrations against the war in southeast Asia.

As the youth organization of the Socialist Workers Party (SWP), the Young Socialist Alliance (YSA) serves as the main source of recruitment into that organization. The YSA is described in the masthead of its official publication, "The Young Socialist Organizer", as "A multinational revolutionary socialist youth organization".

The SWP has been designated pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

would make a speech on the demonstration that is to be planned for the dedication of the Veterans Administration (VA) Hospital near USF. Also sign making for the demonstration at the hospital was discussed. The possibility of violence and flag burning at the proposed demonstration was ruled out at the meeting because the hospital is being opened to help veterans who have been wounded.

September 18, 1972

that tentative plans called for a demonstration to be held at the new VA Hospital, Tampa, when the official dedication service was held.

On September 21, 1972, at an antiwar meeting at USF, WILLARD MOORE presented what he called "Plan X" which was the plans for the demonstration to be held by the group at the VA Hospital dedication to be held either October 7 or 11, 1972. Present plans call for the VVAW, or the UFAW, to also dedicate the hospital by the cutting of a ribbon at the same time that the official dedication takes place. Speeches will be given but no speakers have yet been picked. Placards displaying antiwar slogans will be shown and attempts will be made to get wounded vets from the hospital to come out and join the antiwar demonstration. Then after dark of the same day, the group will hold a candlelight vigil at the hospital to further display their antiwar feelings. MOORE said that the whole demonstratin will be cleared with the Sheriff's Office before the date.

During discussion of the demonstration several persons stressed that it should be peaceful, including WILLARD MOORE.

September 22, 1972

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plans were made for vocally demonstrating both inside and outside the hall where Vice President SPIRO AGNEW is to speak in Tampa, September 29, 1972, and intentions were to prevent or disrupt the speech, but it was agreed that it must be done by completely peaceful means. It was also learned that VVAW would provide marshals for the demonstrations at the VA Hospital and that these marshals would cut out of the demonstration anyone who appeared to want to make trouble.

September 26, 1972

The September 26, 1972, issued of "The Oracle", carried an article on page 12, entitled "Antiwar Students to Discuss Fall Offensive", which read in part as follows:

"Anti-war students at USF meet tomorrow night at 8 in the UC Ballroom to resume discussion of a fall offensive, beginning with a demonstration when the new Veteran's Administration (VA) Hospital officially opens Oct. 7"


"Last Thursday, about 80 students met in the ballroom and during the meeting....

"Tim Moore, who heads the local chapter of Vietnam Veterans Against the War, said,.....

"The Nixon Administration has only changed the color and increased the number of war's victims, we have to show Richard Nixon that he's not welcome", he concluded".

"Moore said their part in the affair would be a 'solemn dedication to the dead and injured of the Vietnam War".....

On September 27, 1972, flyers were passed out on the campus of USF, calling for demonstrators to meet at USF and proceed to the speaking area where Vice President AGNEW was scheduled to speak. The flyers were sponsored by VVAW and UFAW.



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On September 28, 1972, WILLARD MOORE, JOHN HOGG, and CARL BORWN were to speak at a meeting of the Malcolm X Liberation Front, Mc Comb Building, Tallahassee, Florida. This speaking engagement was set up by MIKE PLUNKETT and the topic is to be unity between the VVAW, Malcolm X Liberation Front and other groups in Florida colleges and around the state.

September 28, 1972

The Malcolm X United Liberation Front is a local black activist organization which was organized in the Fall of 1969, to unify the Negroes in Tallahassee, Florida. The organization adopted the motto "Liberation by any means necessary."

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At an open meeting of some 50-60 people at USF the night of September 27, 1972, plans were made for the demonstration at the dedication of the new VA Hospital, October 7, 1972. It was decided to hold a guerilla theatre during the demonstration and persons were invited to join in the theatre so that a practice could be held on Cotober 3, 1972, prior to the demonstration on October 7, 1972.

September 28, 1973

At approximately 9:30 AM on Friday, September 29, 1972, a group of 25-30 affiliates of the UFAW and VVAW-USF, met in the area of the UC at USF. These students departed the USF at approximately 9:50 AM.

At Curtis Hixon Hall the number of demonstrators swelled to 75-100, who entered the hall between 11:00 AM and 11:15 AM. Eventually these demonstrators were split into two groups, with 75 one one side and 25 on the other. Many of the demonstrators had obtained AGNEW posters and written antiwar slogans on the reverse side.

When Vice President AGNEW appeared on the podium, the demonstrators shouted "Sieg Heil" and gave the clenched fist. Thereafter, as the Vice President spoke, the demonstrators took advantage of every pause to shout "1-2-3-4, we don't want your racist war", "Mirderer", "Genocide", and other quaint phrases.

The Vice President spoke for about 25 minutes, and thereafter, the demonstrators left the building and stood in front, where they chanted "peace".

September 29, 1972

Concerning the demonstration against Vice President Agnew, September 29, 1972, it is felt that the demonstration was a great success as the demonstrators were able to continually make noise and partially drown out the speech by AGNEW. The demonstration was kept peaceful as promised, and there were no incidents.

October 3, 1972.

that there was not a large turnout for the rally of the Malcolm X Liberation Front (MXLF) in Tallahassee.

On October 4, 1972, at the 2 PM Free Speech Hour, UC, USF, Tampa, about six members of the VVAW dressed in fatigues and with painted faces, took part in a guerrilla theatre with the action representing the killing of Vietnamese civilians, by military of US. This same act will be presented at the ceremonies at the dedication of the VA Hospital, October 7, 1972.

October 4, 1972

The October 6, 1972, issue of "The Oracle" carried an article on page 5, entitled "Veterans March Against War", which read in part as follows:

"Anti-war activists led by Vietnam Veterans Against the War (VVAW) will put on their own ceremony at the new Veteran's Administration Hospital when it is officially dedicated tomorrow at 10 a.m....

"Calling the hospital a "corporate house of capitalist carnage", Moore said President Nixon is personally responsible for all the deaths occurring in Indochina since he took office...

"Saturday's scenario will include the "dedication of the hospital by VVAW members and a guerfillatheatre to emphasize the corporate aspects of U.S. involvement in Vietnam".....

Mat the meeting of UFAW at USF, it was tentatively agreed that the group headed by the VVAW would attempt to march in a parade that would be presented in downtown Tampa on Veterans Day, October 23, 1972. An attempt will be made to get permission from the city to enter a unit in the parade. If this attempt is thwarted the VVAW will demonstrate

October 13, 1972

It was learned that during the first part of October, 1972, SCOTT CAMIL, Regional Coordinator of VVAW, had indicated that Tampa VVAW was to begin collecting money to aid in furtherance of VVAW goals,

Further, Tampa VVAW should be represented at a VVAW sponsored demonstration in Birmingham, Alabama, during October 21-23, 1972.

October 13, 1972

during a UFAW meeting at USF, chaired by TIM MOORE of VVAW, it was decided that if the VVAW group could not obtain a permit to march in the Veterans Day parade in Tampa, October 23, 1972, that it would distribute leaflets along the parade route while the parade was in progress.

October 13, 1972

The Tampa VVAW is to put on a demonstration at McKay Auditorium, Thursday, October 19, 1972. A band concert is scheduled for that night, sponsored by local military recruiting offices and recruiters will be present to try to recruit persons into the military. The concert will be given by the U.S. Army Band. It was decided at the meeting that since tickets were free and obtainable at recruiter offices, members of the VVAW and other persons from USF would attempt to obtain 100 tickets so that the demonstrators would be able to have sufficient strength to make themselves known.

On October 16, 1972, it was learned that approximately 40 tickets had been obtained for the McKay Auditorium band concert and further attempts are being made to obtain another sixty tickets for the demonstration.

October 16, 1972

Market Commence

On October 18, 1972, the UFAW and VVAW at USF, sponsored a film showing in the UC at USF. The film was entitled "People's War", lasting one hour and portraying the North Vietnamese as the victims of agression by the United States and South Vietnamese. Following the film, TIM MOORE announced that the members of the VVAW from Tampa would be traveling to Birmingham, Alabama, to participate in an antiwar march there on Veterans Day, 1972.

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
October 19, 1972

The VVAW will not attempt to disrupt the concert by the U.S. Army Endbecause they would not receive enough press coverage mr do they feel that they could influence any of the persons attending the concert.

October 19, 1972

On October 18, 1972, there was an antiwar film shown at the UC, USF, by the VVAW and the UFAW, TIM MOORE of Tampa ran this film.

October 25, 1972

It has been learned that on October 29, 1970, several VVAW coordinators from Florida, including the areas of Miami, Jacksonville, Tallahassee, and Tampa, met at Galpesville to discuss future VVAW activities.

October 30, 1972

November 3, 1972

On November 8, 1972, at 7:30 PM, a meeting was held of the UFAW and VVAW at UC, USF. TIM MOORE chaired the meeting. A VVAW film entitled, "Only The Beginning", was shown to the group as the first order of business. After the film MOORE told the assembled group about the VVAW trip to Gainesville for the November 17, 1972, parade and demonstration and the November 18 and 19, 1972 VVAW meeting. He wanted to know the number of people that would consider going and told them to bring camping gear and enough food or money for food for three days in Gainesville. Approximately 25 persons at the meeting, including 10 VVAW members, advised they would be attending the meeting and transportation would have to be arranged.

Two more films furnished by the VVAW were presented to the group and they were entitled, "Testament", and "Winter Soldier".

About 75 persons, mostly students were present at the meeting.

At 8 PM on November 8, 1972, UFAW held an open meeting in room 201 of the UC at USF. This meeting was attended by 35-40 persons.

November 9, 1972

UFAW at USF, Tampa, are at odds since the leader of UFAW; and WILLARD HOORE, leader of VVAW, are both planning on funning for tresident of the Student Body at USF. Both feel they should be the candidate and that the candidacy of the other will hart their chances for election.

November 13, 1972

It was learned that the leader of the See Petersburg group was inactive because of a federal contempt of court charge in Tallahassee, Fla.

November 13, 1972

Discussed at the meeting was the homecoming parade at the University of Florida (UF) and VVAW demonstrations at the parade.

November 13, 1972

it was Tearned that no VVAW members from Tampa had indicated that they would be able to attend a demonstration in Atlanta, Georgia, November 18, 1972, sponsored by the National Peace Action Coalition.

November 16, 1972

The National Peace Action Coalition was founded in 1970 by members of the Socialist Workers Party (SWP). Its basic objective is to unite masses of people including labor unions, GIs, and the black community in the struggle to end United States intervention in Southeast Asia through orderly and peaceful tactics.

November 16, 1972

The meeting was called to discuss a possible demonstration to be held at USF pertaining to the killing of two black students in Louisiana.

After a lengthy discussion the following actions were approved by the group:

- 1. Leaflets will be distributed at a table set up in the UC, USF, all day on November 20, 1972. The leaflets will also be distributed at all the dorms at USF. The leaflets will contain information on the actions to be undertaken during the week of November 20-25, 1972.
- 2. Candlelight march will be held at 9 PM starting from the UC Mall, USF and marching by all the dorms on the campus. Black arm bands will be worn by all participants and participants in the march will be obtained through the use of leaflets and oral information. The black arm bands should be worn for three day period, Monday through Wednesday.
- 3. A massive moratorium demonstration on Wednesday, November 22, 1972, to begin at the UC Mall, USF. It is hoped that this demonstration could end at the office of the USF President to demand the removal of guns from the campus.

It was then decided that after the Thanksgiving holidays, a petition would be taken up and circulated for names to present to the President of USF demanding that weapons be removed from the campus and that security guards not be allowed to carry weapons. Also planned

November 20, 1972

November 20, 1972

During the morning and afternoon of November 20, 1972, members of the VVAW and UFAW, USF, manned a table at the UC, USF, to hand out a leaflet and furnish information on a candlelight march to be held at 9 PM, November 20, 1972, at USF. The leaflet was entitled, "Remember Your Murdered Brothers"

At 9 PM, November 20, 1972, a candlelight march was held at USF starting at the UC. In the beginning, there were about 75 persons joining the march, but by the end of the march which proceeded through the dorm areas of the campus, about 150 to 200 persons were in evidence. Included in the march were members of UFAW, VVAW and students recruited from the dorms to march. Each participant carried a lighted candle.

November 22, 1972

During the morning of November 22, 1972, a leaflet announcing a memorial demonstration in memory of two students killed at Southern University, Baton Rouge, La., was passed out on the campus of USF. The demonstration was called for 2 PM at the UC Mall.

At 2 PM, on November 22, 1972, approximately 40 persons met on the mall during the free speech hour to participate in the memorial demonstration. In view of the small number of persons in attendance, it was decided that no demonstration would be held and JOHN HOGG and TIM MOORE, who were in charge of the demonstration expressed disappointment in the small turnout.

November 24, 1972

A VVAW film pertaining to Vietnam Veterans throwing away their war medals was shown at the UFAW meeting at USF.



It was also learned that the VVAW in Tampa at USF is planning to secure a house for their headquarters and where meetings would be held in the future.

The VVAW in Tampa, led by TIM MOORE is apparently not planning any activities in the immediate future in view of final examinations and Christmas Holidays and it was learned that there will possibly not be any approaching activities in this organization until school reconvenes after the first of the year.

During the morning of November 20, 1972, a table was manned in the UC, at USF, Tampa, from which table, leaflets were given out concerning a candlelight march to be held that night at 9 PM.

The leaflets were entitled "Remember Your Murdered Brothers". It also called for a moratorium to be held at 2 PM November 22, 1972, at USF, concerning the death of two students at Southern University in Louisiana, who were shot by police, on campus, during a peaceful demonstration.

It was later learned that the march did take place with about 50-100 persons participating at any one time and the march was peaceful.

November 29, 1972

Very little action is anticipated for the VVAW or UFAW during December, 1972, and January, 1973, due to holidays and end of first quarter at University of South Florida.

November 29, 1972

A meeting of the UFAW was held at at the UC. USF. Tampa. WILLARD MOORE chaired the meeting.

A movie entitled "Winter Soldier" was shown to the group. This picture has been shown at a prior UFAW meeting.

A discussion was held involving an invitation to SCOTT CAMIL, Southeastern Regional VVAW Coordinator to come to USF in January, 1972, for a speaking engagement. The group was advised that USF would pay CAMIL for his speaking engagement.

MOORE advised that efforts will be made to get permission for the VVAW to march in the Gasparilla Day Parade in Tampa as a unit. He said if permission is not granted, the VVAW will demonstrate anyway along the parade route.

November 30, 1972

WILLARD MOORE and CARL BROWN reportedly attended a VVAW meeting at Gainesville, Fla. during the first week in December, 1972. Indications are that MOORE invited SCOTT CAMIL to speak at USF and that USF would pay \$200 for such a speech.





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The only plans announced for Washington, D.C. were that all interested demonstrators, including VVAW, Peoples Coalition for Peace and Justice (PCPJ), and National Peace Action Coalition (NPAC), will meet at Arlington, Va., at 10 AM, on January 20, 1973, with further activities to emanate from there.



January 11, 1973

SCOTT CAMIL of the VVAW is scheduled to speak on USF, Tampa campus on Monday, January 15, 1973, at 2 PM and 8 PM. A leaflet to this effect was distributed at the USF campus on January 12, 1973, and indicated he will speak on the National Action Against the War.

The VVAW and UFAW had a table set up in the UC, on January 12, 1973. It was manned by two unknown individuals, who were distributing literature and attempting to raise donations for the above group from USF, which will leave USF at 4 PM on Thursday, January 18, 1973, to participate in demonstrations in Washington, D.C. on Inaguration Day, January 20, 1973.

January 12, 1973

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During the morning, the group set up a table for the VVAW at FSU and talked with students at the school and signed up 8 members for the VVAW at FSU.

On the morning of January 13, 1973, the group left Tallahassee, and traveled to Gainesville, Fla., where they preportedly met with the VVAW leaders.

January 15, 1973

On the evening of the VVAW at Tampa, was held at the UC, USF, Tampa. WILLARD T. MOORE, VVAW leader, acted as chairman. Approximately 30-35 persons were in attendance at the meeting. Three local car owners advised they would drive to Washington, D.C. (WDC) for the inaugural demonstration, which makes a current total of 10 automobiles that are known to be going for the demonstration. Others will drive but these persons have not attended meetings and their names are not currently known. It is still expected that approximately 75 persons will travel to WDC from Tampa.

The group was advised that the VVAW was not planning any civil disobedience during the inaugural demonstration; however, the VVAW would have no control over individual members who would be free to do what they wanted, and to proceed on their own after the planned demonstrations were completed.

On January 17, 1973, SCOTT CAMIL was at USF, Tampa and spent approximately one hour from 1 to 2 PM at the VVAW table, which is set up at the UC, recruiting persons to travel to WDC for the inaugural demonstration. CAMIL spoke to approx imately 100 persons who assembled in front of the UC during the free speech hour from 2 - 3 PM. CAMIL spoke on the VVAW indictments handed down in Tallahassee and read the grand jury transcripts of the indictments and discussed the persecution of VVAW leaders by the government.

January 18, 1973

the VVAW-TP chapter held a meeting at USF, Tampa. The main speaker at the meeting was SCOTT CAMIL, Southeastern Regional Coordinator of the VVAW. A movie entitled "Winter Soldier", which was approximately 95 minutes long was shown at the beginning of the meeting. CAMIL then talked to the group repeating the talk he made at USF during the free speech hour on the afternoon of January 17, 1973, pertaining to the indictment of the VVAW leaders in Tallahassee, Florida. After speaking on the indictments CAMIL answered questions from the assembled VVAW members.

CAMIL spoke about the demonstration at WDC on Inauguration Day and advised those in attendance who would be going to the demonstration not to take either narcotics or weapons as they probably would be hassled by the police departments and would be arrested if anything was found on them or in their car.

In conjunction with the WDC trip, he said that if the attendees from Tampa had no place to stay in WDC, they should contact telephone number 293-7784 for help in obtaining housing. It is noted this number might also be 293-7884. He said if a bondsman was needed, telephone number 293-7976 should be called, for a lawyer, telephone number 293-7669, and if any VVAW member should get in trouble between 6 PM, January 19, 1973, and 12 noon, January 20, 1973, they should call telephone number 012-1556. He said VVAW Headquarters phone in WDC was 829-6436.

January 18, 1973 670

The January 18, 1973, issue of "The Oracle" carried an article on page 8, entitled "CAMIL Charges Government Trying to Discredit VVAW", which reflects that CAMIL spoke to about 50 persons on the UC mall at USF, Tampa, on January 17, 1973. The article further reflected that CAMIL"served in the Marines in Vietnam with TIM MOORE, head of the local VVAW chapter, and, following his speech, read poems written by GIs in Vietnam and answered questions."

"He emphasized the need for public support for antiwar actions this weekend in Washington during President NIXON's inauguration and for any legal efforts to end the war."

The January 23, 1973, issue of the "Oracle" carried an article on page 1, entitled "War Protesters Gather in D.C.", which read in part as follows:

"No more than two hours after RICHARD NIXON took his second oath of office Saturday, Congressmen and peace action leaders lambasted him for his first four years as President and his handling of the Vietnam war.

"Among the huge throngs of protesters were an estimated 20 USF Vietnam Veterans Against the War (VVAW) who joined 5,000 other veterans...."



highlighting illegal travel-to-Cuba campaigns. Its comparatively brief span of life was attributed to mounting anti-Castro American public opinion, the 1962 Congressional hearings which disclosed FPCC financing by Castro's United Nations Delegation, and ultimately, the bad publicity which the FPCC received from disclosure of activities on its behalf by suspected presidential assassin Lee H. Oswald.

On August 3, 1972, a first confidential source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised that the Columbus, Ohio chapter of the VAW is considered "dead" and there has been no activity on the part of its members.

On August 16, 1972, a second confidential source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised

Discussion also developed concerning the inability of the national organization, the Vietnam Veterans Against the War (VVAW) at a national level, to handle requests from servicemen on active duty. It was also decided that when Vice President Spiro T. Agnew arrived at Columbus, Ohio, VAW would support the demonstrations against him in the form of guerrilla theater and search and destroy missions. As a result of reports concerning activity surrounding VVAW's demonstration during the Republican National Concention at Miami, Florida, the following conclusions were determined:

- 1) Act as a group to protect our own interests:
- 2) Use whatever force is necessary to provide security;
- 3) Fight elitism and vanguardism within our ranks.

Suggestions were set forth for developing and conducting a local chapter of VAW which included avertising, passing out literature, working with people who show interest by repeatedly attending meetings, and keeping interest levels high by having members busy with projects.

· VIETNAM VETERANS AGAINST THE WAR

The Vietnam Veterans Against the War (VVAW) is a national organization whose membership opposes the war in Vietnam and the Selective Service System. The VVAW has sponsored demonstrations in protest against the war in Vietnam throughout the United States.

MEMBER OF SUBJECT ORGANIZATION

A Columbus representative, introduced a discussion concerning VAW's support for Senator George McGovern for Presidency of the United States. It was decided that VVAW as an organization could not support McGovern. The following points came from the McGovern discussion:

- The ending of the war is of overriding importance because a Vietnamese dies every five minutes from war related wounds.
- 2) Nixon's reelection may serve to keep the Left a functional, unified group, or make it stronger.
- 3) Nixon's reelection will mark an era of mass repression and a continuance of the war.

Third source said was nominated to assume the position of the for this region. It was stated had been active in VAW affairs both in Columbus and on a regional level.

On September 18, 1972, the first confidential source advised that members of the Columbus VAW planned to present "Guerrilla Theater" during a demonstration planned against Vice President Spiro T. Agnew, who was scheduled to appear at Columbus, Ohio, September 20, 1972.

A fourth confidential source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, on September 27, 1972, advised that VAW, as a group, has been inactive during the Summer, 1972. Some members, according to source, have been acting on their own behalf, but they are few in number. Source added that on September 20, 1972, four members of the VAW participated in the demonstration against the appearance of Spiro Agnew, Vice President of the United States, in front of the RKO Palace Theater, West Broad Street, Columbus, Ohio, with a group of others. Source identified these members as follows:

On September 20, 1972, Columbus, Ohio Police Department, advised that a group of b7C approximately fifty (50) to sixty (60) demonstrators

assembled in front of the Statehouse, Columbus, Ohio, at approximately 4:45 p.m., to await the arrival of Vice President Agnew. His arrival was greeted with anti-Agnew chants, sprinkled with obscenities. At 6:45 p.m., the group of demonstrators moved to a position across the street from the RKO Palace Theater, where the Vice President was scheduled to address the Ohio State Republican Convention. The demonstrators continued to chant anti-Vietnam War and anti-Agnew and anti-Nixon slogans. The group continued its activity until approximately 8:10 p.m., when the Columbus Police Department commenced making arrests. The group was told to disband. The arrests were initiated when the demonstrators began to use obscene language.

- 2) Go into Veterans Administration Hospitals, meet the veterans, and become outside force working to upgrade, develop, and expand care, counseling, and educational programs.
- 3) Improve the quality of service at the Veterans Administration campus office.

The "Ohio State Lantern," an official campus newspaper at Ohio State University (OSU), Columbus, Ohio, in the edition dated November 21, 1972, contained an article which announced a teach in concerning the killings of two black Southern University students, which was scheduled to be held November 22, 1972, at the Ohio Union.

The announcement was made by Karen Dilday, whom the newspaper described as a member of the Students for a Democratic Society (SDS). According to the article, the teach-in would be sponsored by several groups which had dubbed themselves as "Columbus United Front to Fight Against Racist Murder." The groups include the following:

Students for a Democratic Society



Students for a Democratic Society (SDS) was founded during June, 1962, at Port Huron, Michigan, and in the 1960's functioned as the leading New Left campus-based student organization in the United States. From an initial posture of "participatory democracy," SDS moved to a radical-revolutionary position, with debate centering on how best to create a revolutionary youth movement. Internal factionalism produced a split during the SDS National Convention in June, 1969, which resulted in the following three factions: Weatherman: Worker Student Alliance (WSA); and Revolutionary Youth Movement (RYM). The Weatherman and RYM are no longer affiliated with SDS. The WSA continues to use the name SDS and maintains its national headquarters in Chicago, Illinois.

WEATHERMAN

Weatherman, formerly a faction of Students for a Democratic Society (SDS), controlled the SDS National Office from June, 1969, until its closing in February, 1970. Weatherman then entered an underground status and adopted a tactic of "strategic sabotage," with police and military installations designated as primary targets.

STUDENTS FOR A DEMOCRATIC SOCIETY/WORKER STUDENT ALLIANCE

Worker Student Alliance (WSA), a faction of Students for a Democratic Society (SDS), was expelled from SDS in June, 1969, by the then dominant Weatherman faction but continued to use the name SDS and opened an office in Boston, Massachusetts. WSA aligned ideologically with the Progressive Labor Party (PLP) and in February, 1971, mo ed to Chicago, Illinois. Students for a Democratic Society/Worker Student Alliance currently shares office space with the PLP in Chicago.

REVOLUTIONARY YOUTH MOVEMENT

Revolutionary Youth Movement (RYM), a pro-communist revolutionary youth organization, was organized in 1969, first as a faction within the Students for a Democratic Society, then as a separate group with headquarters in Atlanta, Georgia. RYM was unsuccessful in attracting support, and by mid-1970 it was practically defunct.

PROGRESSIVE LABOR PARTY

The Progressive Labor Party (PLP) was founded in 1962 by individuals expelled from the Communist Party, USA, for following the Chinese communist line. Its objective is the establishment of a militant working—class movement based on Marxism—Leninism and MAO Tse-tung thought.

INDOCHINA COALITION

The "Ohio State Latern," an OSU daily student newspaper generally circulated on the OSU campus. Columbus. Ohio, in its May 8, 1972, issue, in an article captioned, "Anti-War Rally Set for Today," described the Indochina Coalition as a recently formed group opposing the war in Indochina.

"OUR CHOKING TIMES"

"Our Choking Times" is a black student newspaper published on the campus of OSU, which appears irregularly while school is in session.

The November 28, 1972, edition of the "Ohio State Lantern" contained an article which noted that the Vietnam Veterans Against the War, Incorporated, was presenting a series of "rap" sessions in various dormitories to acquaint students with the VAW's conception of the "truth behind the Vietnam War." Films were to be shown and the "Pentagon Papers" were to be the source of truth. According to the article, education is the goal of VAW to keep people informed about the Vietnam War. The

announcement was made by Dinu "Mike" Rehner, described as a junior student from Worthington, Ohio. There is no indication in the "Lantern" as to how many sessions were held nor if they were successful.

A fifth confidential source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, on January 31, 1973, advised that a very few unidentified members of VAW from Columbus, Ohio, traveled to Washington, D.C., to participate in the demonstrations in connection with the Presidential Inauguration, January 20, 1973, but the gathering was held there, not in Columbus. Source had no information as to what action took place in Columbus prior to that date and stated the activities of VAW in Columbus, Ohio, are presently at a very low state.

A sixth confidential source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, on March 13, 1973, advised that VAW, Columbus, Ohio, had applied for recognition as a campus organization at OSU. According to application, dated October 16, 1972, the purpose of the Columbus VAW was "to provide public with informational and educational aspects of the war and to provide counseling and community services for veterans." The Vietnam Veterans Against the War (VVAW), is a national organization composed primarily of veterans of the War in Vietnam, that has organized and participated in numerous demonstrations against the war in Vietnam during 1970-1972, including the seizure of the Statue of Liberty, New York City, and the occupation of the Betsy Ross House, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, in December, 1971. Six members of the VVAW were indicted by a Federal Grand Jury, Tallahassee, Florida, July, 1972, on charge of conspiracy to violate the Federal Antiriot Law.

On March 5, 1973, a confidential source who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised the following.

A Southewast Regional Conference, sponsored by the VVAW, was held at a camp site in the Withlacochee State Forest in Sumter County, Florida, on March 2-3, 1973. The conference was attended by approximately 35 to 40 individuals from throughout the State of Florida. Although VVAW members from chapters outside the State were invited, none was in attendance at the conference.

The conference began at approximately 9 a.m., on March 2, 1973, with the chairman being WILLARD TIMOTHY MOORE, VVAW leader of Pampa, Florida. Those attending the conference signed a list which was maintained by Scott Camil, Southeast Regional Coordinator of the VVAW.

The first order of business taken up during the conference was chapter reports from throughout the state. Reports were given for Jacksonville, Gainesville, Tallahassee, St. Petersburg, Tampa, Miami, and Broward County, Florida.

A discussion was held concerning changing the name of the VVAW due to the fact that the Vietnam War is over, and the present name may not appear relevant to the overall population. Several alternative names were discussed, however, they finally decaded that the group would not vote on making a change in the name, but would make sure that the subject was brought up at the national coordinating committee meeting in Albuquerque, New Mexico, in April, 1973.

Scott Camil discussed with the group the possibility of setting up a regional or state steering committee, rather than having a regional coordinator in the State of Florida. He said that each chapter in the state would vote for its own chapter coordinator and these coordinators would then a utomatically be members of the state steering committee. It was felt this would be a more democratic method of running the VVAW in Florida. The proposal on having chapter coordinators and a state steering committee was voted on and passed by the group. In addition, a vote was taken and it was unanimously approved that the state steering committee would be based in Tampa, Florida, with Tampa as the new headquarters for VVAW.

Elections will have to be held in each chapter throughout the state at a later date in order to ascertain the names of the chapter coordinators who will make up the state steering committee. It was explained that each chapter coordinator would have one vote with the VVAW steering

committee and each chapter should have a minimum of eight meetings: a year. In addition, state steering committee meetings will be held two weeks prior to any national meetings, to formulate regional policy, and then two weeks after the national meeting to report to the chapters what transpired at the national meeting.

A discussion was held concerning the financial situation of the VVAW and Camil indicated the VVAW state organization was presently \$2,000 in debt with a bank balance of only \$2.50. He said to help eliminate this problem, in the future each member joining the VVAW would be assessed a fee of \$5.00, followed by monthly dues of \$2.00. A discussion was held concerning the trial of the "Gainesville Eight" in Gainesville, Florida, to be held in April or May, 1973. The group was advised that efforts are being made to obtain sympathy demonstrations throughout the country during the time of the trial in support of the members on trial.

In addition, all members of the VVAW in Florida are being urged to come to the site of the trial to demonstrate in support of the indicted members. Camil advised that it was hoped that extensive publicity would be gained from the trial and demonstrations. A discussion was held by Willard T. Moore concerning the Indian movement in the United States. Moore stated that the Indians would very much like to gain VVAW support for the struggle for their rights. The vote was taken by the group and it was voted to support the Indians in their freedom struggle. No definite plans were made during the conference concerning the direction to go in support of the Indians, because an individual who was scheduled to appear to speak on behalf of the American Indians, did not appear.

VVAW member from Tallahassee Florida, led a discussion concerning support for the United Farm Workers (UFW). She stated the UFW, like the Indians, are seeking the support of the VVAW in their boycott against the A & P supermarkets and nonunion lettuce. The group voted

and decided to support the UFW in their boycott by not buying nonunion lettuce and by not shopping in A&P supermarkets.

Discussion was held concerning the VVAW-supported project, "County Fair", in Selma, Alabama. This project is an attempt to provide medical supplies, food and anything else needed to help the poor people of this economically stricken area. The group voted to support the "County Fair" project.

The conference ended at approximately 5 p.m., March 3, 1973, with members breaking camp and returning to their respective homes.

> Southeast Regional Conference Sponsored by Vietnam Veterans Against the War, March 2-4, 1973, Sumter County, Florida

On February 24, 1973, Source One advised Scott Camil, Southeast Regional Coordinator, Vietnam Veterans, Against the War (VVAW), Gainesville, Florida, by letter dated March 19, 1973, announced that a VVAW Southeast Regional Conference was to be held in Sumter County, Florida, on March 2-4, 1973. Camil noted the conference would be held at an isolated campsite near the Withlacoochee River, directly off the Webster Exit of Interstate 75, south of Ocala, Florida, and those attending should come prepared to camp out. Camil note: that there would be VVAW representatives from Miami, Fort Lauderdale, Hollywood, Pompano Beach, Jacksonville, Tallahassee, Tampa, and St. Petersburg, Florida.

VVAW is an anti-war organization organized in 1967 and headquartered in New York City. Its published objective is "to demand an immediate cessation of fighting and the withdrawal of all American troops from Indochina." VVAW has participated in several demonstrations, including massive demonstration in Washington, D. C., April 19-23, 1971.

The tentative agenda for the conference was listed as follows:

- 1. Chapter and Area Reports
- 2. Regional Report

- Coordinator's Report and Criticism of the Region

 - e. County Fair
 - f. Regional Proposals
- 6. Election of Regional Coordinators

Source One advised on March 5, 1973, that a Southeast Regional Conference sponsored by VVAW was held at a remote campsite in Sumter County, Florida, on March 2-3, 1973, with conference ending at approximately 4:30 p.m., March 3, 1973. The conference was attended by approximately 35 individuals, none of whom were noted to be from outside the State of Florida.

The program for the conference began on Saturday morning, March 2, 1973, at 0 a.m., and was chaired by Tim (Last Name Unknown) from Tampa, Florida. The first item on the agenda was chapter and area reports which were given for Gainesville, Tallahassee, St. Petersburg, Tampa, Broward County, and Dade County, Florida. Scott Camil gave the area report for Gainesville, Florida, and Frank Lall and spoke for the Tallahassee, area.

Southeast Regional Conference Sponsored By Vietnam Veterans Against the War, March 2-4, 1973 Sumter County, Florida

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Most individuals speaking indicated that they were encountering a tough time organizing VVAW chapters, especially with the end of the Vietnam War as there was no real issue at this point. Camil also noted that the VVAW was in desperate need of money in the Gainesville, area, especially with the upcoming trial of the "Gainesville Light" since that trial will cost approximately \$125,000.

Approximately two hours of the conference was taken up with the discussion concerning the changing of the VVAW name. It was proposed that the name be changed to Vietnam Veterans Against Wars to indicate that the group was against all wars not just the Vietnam War. It was pointed out, however, that VVAW had already established its reputation on a National basis and it would be difficult to re-educate the population to the name change.

It was noted during this discussion of the VVAW name change that YVAW had proof that 24 Central Intelligence Agency Agents have been dispatched to the Philippines because of anticipated uprising in that particular area and this might be one area that could be highlighted since the end of the Vietnam War. In addition, it was suggested that all VVAW chapters throughout the country boycott Gulf Oil Corporation as that enterprise is backing the Portuguese Army which is fighting against the natives of Angola, South Africa. No conclusions were reached as to the change of the VVAW name, however, it was decided to leave any name change up to the National Office.

After lunch, Scott Camil made a few brief remarks suggesting in a sly way that he could not do all the work and suggested that a Regional Steering Committee be set up to run VVAW in the southeast region. Camil said that if a Regional Steering Committee was set up it would be best to have it headquartered in Tampa, Florida, where they have more members and support. This would eliminate some of the pressure being placed on VVAW in Gainesville, Florida, area due to the "Gainesville Eight."

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During discussion, it was also pointed out that merely having one Regional Goordinator was more of a dictatorship than if a Steering Committee was set up with various individuals which would obviously be more democratic. A vote was taken and it was unanimously approved that the region be run by a Regional Steering Committee. At this point, it appears undecided as to the number of individuals on the Steering Committee and exactly who would serve on the committee.

Finances constituted the next discussion on the agenda and it was noted that currently there is a \$5 a year membership fee for new members which goes to the National Office and as of this date there would be a \$2 a month regional membership fee with \$1 going to the region and \$1 going to the local chapter.

It was also noted that probably within a month, this charge would be raised to \$3, with \$1 going to each the local chapter, the regional organization, and the National Office. It was also noted that VYAW Regionally as well as Nationally is in desparate need of money, especially due to the trial of the "Gainesville Eight."

This topic led directly into a discussion on the "Gainesville Eight" which was handled by Camil and he noted that they anticipated the case would be dismissed on Tuesday, March 6, 1973, when a preliminary hearing would be held in Pensacola, Florida, due to two facts; one being that one of the lawyers handling the defense of the "Gainesville Eight" had his briefcase stolen allegedly by Federal Agents; and two, that the Federal Government had wire taps on the "Gainesville Eight." If dismissal of the case was unsuccessful, Camil noted they would rather have the trial in Gainesville, Florida, as they expect demonstrators from all over the country to come to Gainesville, Florida, during the trial period. In anticipation of this, they have been working with local interest groups to provide food, shelter, and medical supplies.

All arrangements have been made to handle these items for the demonstrators, however, should the trial be moved to Pensacola, no facilities exist at this location to handle these matters and consequently, in the event the trial is set for Pensacola, VVAW is desparately trying to establish a chapter in Pensacola, Florida.

In addition, Camil indicated that all VVAW chapters throughout the United States have been urged and instructed to hold demonstrations in cities where VVAW chapters exist during the trial of the "Gainesville Eight." It is hoped through these demonstrations to receive national media coverage such as was received by the "Chicago Seven."

of Tallahassee, Florida, them led a discussion concerning the "County Fair." She indicated that this merely was the code name for the Peoples Revolutionary Farm located a few miles south of Selma, Alabama, where 22 acres of land had been donated to build a city or nation within the confines of the United States. Each chapter of the VVAW was urged to gather medical supplies, money, and any other items which might be of help to individuals running this farm to further the permanent establishment of this farm. Indicated that she had the address if anyone desired to write or send anything to this particular group. I also suggested that in order to build any national organization, it is necessary to get the backing of some union and/or other large organization. She noted this enables the particular group involved to draw on the union and/or organization membership to generate support for a particular issue as well as to receive financial backing. As a result of this discussion, it was voted and approved that VVAW support the United Farm Workers Union.

VIETNAM VETERANS AGAINST THE WAR (VVAW)

A source, with whom insufficient contact has been had to determine reliability, but whose known activities would place him in a position to possess excellent information concerning the activities of anti-war groups in the Philadelphia area, furnished the following information on March 9, 1973:

In December, 1971, members of the VVAW held an encampment in Valley Forge, Pa.When a group of VVAW members took over the Statue of Liberty in New York City, those at the encampment talked of "taking over" Independence Hall. Various suggestions were given as to what should be done at Independence Hall, including one suggestion of using grappling hooks to pull the Liberty Bell out of Independence Hall into the street. The group decided to enter Independence Hall and went to Philadelphia from Valley Forge at 2:30 a.m., on December 27, 1971. Their plans were to enter Independence Hall by the second floor. If any guards were inside Independence Hall they would be put out and the group would then take the period furniture in Independence Hall and barriade the doors with the furniture. For police to get into Independence Hall they would then have to destroy the furniture. Police would be told of the above.

The group entered Philadelphia, went to the Friends Meeting House at 4th and Arch Streets, and sent out "scouts" to recommiter Independence Hall. The "scouts" came back and told VVAW at Friends Meeting House that the Philadelphia Police had completely surrounded Independence Hall. The group then decided to invade the Betsy Ross House and entered the Betsy Ross House through the second floor. They were later put out of the Betsy Ross House and arrested by the Philadelphia Police Department.

Source also advised of activities of VVAW and stated he felt that at the present time, VVAW National Office was no more than a clearing house for the interchange of information by the regional offices, and that the Philadelphia Regional Chapter and the National Officewere often at odds and there was much friction between the two offices. 



> The VVAW was founded in the spring of 1967 by six young Vietnam veterans in New York City. At the beginning of 1968, with 600 members, VVAW opened a national office, founded the first GI newspaper, "Vietnam GI", and sent close to 500 veterans into the McCarthy campaign to beat down the red baiters. After getting gassed at the Democratic convention at Chicago and caught in the general "down" of the peace movement, VVAW was nearly inactive until the moratoriums in the fall of 1969. of VVAW led student strikes on major campuses across the country and battled Veterans Administration Hospital authorities over threats to throw amputee Vietnam veterans out for signing anti-war petitions. At present, membership of the VVAW, nationally, consists of 8,500 members.

The Sacramento Chapter of the VVAW was formed in 10/71, and ultimately reached a total of ten members. Its lodging and meeting place at 1618 H Street, Sacramento, burned to the ground over the Thanksgiving, 1972 weekend, and the organization died at that time. It had already been on the verge of extinction from lack of funds and lack of interest by both the public and the returning Vietnam veterans themselves. It would seem that the end of the war and the return of the POWs have effectively slammed the lid on any possibility of regeneration.

The self-expressed objectives of the Sacramento VVAW group were twofold: namely, to press toward ending the war and to assist Vietnam veterans in matters pertaining to housing, education, employment, adjusting to civilian life, etc. During its year-long existence, the members consistently rejected violence or disorder in any form and at no time acted outside the law in expressing their dissent and objection to the war.

In view of the above, Sacramento is discontinuing its investigation of the VVAW and considers this matter RUC'd.

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



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KENT STATE

Three weeks after the May 4, 1970 killings at Kent State University, Ohio state Senator and KSU administrator Robert E. Stockdale told a hand-picked group of Ohio newsmen:

We need a real, statewide intelligence system that could identify these [radicals]—could grab the necessary legal mechanics and could with the cooperation of national authorities identify, convict and rid ourselves of this type of professional scourse. That type of thing is very essential. We have to be able to identify and rid our campuses pretty quick of the next 100 or 200... with a minimal amount of legal procedures which almost makes it essential that under certain conditions we're going to have to have a red alert which would set aside some of the slow, sloventy, you're innocent until proven guilty tradition.

Two years later, on the evening of April 24, 1972. Kent city police officers, acting on information from two local attorneys, staked out the parking lot of a predominantly student-occupied apartment complex. Two persons came out of one of the buildings. They were Reinhold "Ron" Mohr and Alan Morris. Both were KSU students and both were members of the campus chapter of the Vietnam Veterans Against the War (VVAW). On a prearranged signal from Morris the police moved in and arrested Mohr. At that time they had no idea who Mohr was. All the city police knew about him was that he was carrying a Chinese-made AK-47 automatic rifle—the kind used by the North Vietnamese Army—and a Chinese-made, rocket-propelled grenade-launcher (RPG). They knew too that Mohr had been trying to pass the weapons to members of the VVAW, saying, "They're good to kill pigs with."

Mohr was taken to the city police station for booking. Once there, he revealed himself to be an undercover agent for the KSU security force (the campus police). His assignment, he said, had been to infiltrate the VVAW and other radical and anti-war groups. Mohr. was held overnight, pending a decision on the legality of his possession of the weapons by agents of the Youngstown office of the Alcohol, Tax and Firearms Division of the Internal Revenue Service. The next morning federal agents found the weapons to be inoperable. After he had signed them over to the federal authorities, Mohr was released.

Both weapons were declared inoperable because there was no ammunition at hand for them. In addition, the AK-47 had a hole drilled in its gas chamber changing it from an automatic to a single-shot rifle. The question of the legality or illegality of the weapons was thus carefully side-stepped, and, under subsequent questioning by newsmen, KSU director of security, James Fyke, admitted that the weapons were "not necessarily legal." A few weeks later, while appearing before the Campus Security Advisory Committee (CSAC), composed of faculty and students, Fyke changed his position somewhat. He said, "Under federal policy any police officer working in any undercover status is automatically exempted until such time as he comes back to the surface from any of these illegal gun kinds of violations." Subsequent checks made by CSAC members at three other IRS branch offices in Ohio have disclosed that mere possession of the firing mechanism of either weapon—much less the whole weapon—is illegal.

In the days following Mohr's arrest—which was made possible by a tip to the VVAW from a campus security officer—a series of accusations were made against him. Members of the Joe Hill Collective, a Marxist-oriented descendant of the Students for a Democratic Society, filed a series of affidavits stating that Mohr had tried to induce them to dynamite Rockwell Hall, a 3-story granite and brick building that houses the KSU Army and Air Force ROTC departments and the student records office. Another person claimed that Mohr had set up a plan with the "place, time and dates" to kill three Kent city police officers. This person refused to sign an affidavit because

Other members of the Kent community have admit buying marijuana, amphetamines and chemical hal cinogens such as LSD from Mohr, both for their own and for resale. Apparently, though, Mohr's drug to ficking is legal under a recent decision handed down the U.S. Ninth District Court of Appeals. Ruling another case, the court held that undercover poofficers were permitted to buy, sell and otherwise a lilegal drugs in order to maintain and enhance the images.

Mohr's arrest came at a tense time on the camp—the week before the second anniversary of the May murders. Students demanded that action be taken to p vent a recurrence of the use of undercover agents. Fi denounced the arrest and the resulting uproar as a "te issue" and "a test of my credibility and honesty." was, he said, "deliberately created as a hoax. These kir of lies," he said, "are putting us in a 1984-type sin tion." The whole incident was the result of "the sproffensive of a combination of anarchists and starry-eq individuals" led by a "well-trained cadre who know the revolutionary manual well."

Speaking to the CSAC, Fyke said:

What we have done is quite legal, quite ethical. We have not invaded the privacy of any persons. This is the question I have not resolved in three years a Kent State—who are these people who are involved in these political activities that have been harmed in any way by direct or indirect surveillance? Students, I think are always paranoid about something or other. This is the nature of being a student. Now Mr. Mohr's privacy has been invaded. He has been publicly detained. [They took away his constitutional and civil liberties by exposing him.

Newly appointed KSU president, Glenn Olds, a form ambassador to the United Nations Economic and Soc Council and Nixon campaign adviser, told the Daily Ke Stater that "before he came to KSU he would not he believed the level of discontent among the students a faculty over security and would not have believed undecover agents would have had such an impact on tomunity." As a result of increasing student pressor from the Mohr affair, Olds on May 1 issued a "Resof mended Policy Statement on Surveillance." (William McKinley, Olds's executive assistant, has since call the statement—prepared by the CSAC—a "bunch garbage" and openly admitted that its release was more than a ruse on Olds's part to defuse a potentia explosive situation.)

Two main points were made in the recommend-Policy Statement. First, surveillance—or secret watchi as the CSAC called it—would not occur unless there we probable cause to believe that a crime was either beplanned or being committed and no other appropria investigative techniques were available. Purthermore, surveillance were to become necessary, the director security would notify the president of the unive

Appearing before the CSAC, Fyke objected to the requirement of written notification; it was unduly cumbersome and impractical. Further, he said: "I am not privileged to discuss these cases with the president because he is the public. It would not be legally or ethically possible for me to do so." According to Fyke, he wa responsible not to the university president but to the Portage County prosecutor and the law director of the city of Kent. Continuing, Fyke said, "I feel that there is no police agency-bar none-which takes its oath of office seriously that can operate without covert, secret surveillance activities on occasion. Once somebody says something to another person the thought is no longer private, it is public. Therefore for me to overhear you make the comment or for me to be the third person in a group when you make the comment does not put me in the role of being an eavesdropper or surveiller. If you don't want anybody to know it, don't say it. Don't write it. Don't do anything with it."

The second main point in the proposed Policy Statement was that no students would be employed or used voluntarily by the KSU security force for surveillance, nor would they be paid for information voluntarily given. Full-time police officers who attended school were specifically exempted. Mohr was just such a case. On this point, though, B. Earle Roberts, chairman of the criminal justice studies department at KSU and chairman of the CSAC, told me: "I don't deny that there are undercover agents on campus who are unpaid and who are constantly giving information and intelligence. It's part of the times." Then, warming to the subject, he concluded: "It's in the finest tradition of American law enforcement."

Fyke expanded on this point before the CSAC. "I have probably 100 persons who on a voluntary basis report various activities of what they feel is a criminal nature." There are, he said, "informers in every single group, including some of the most covert, supersecret members of the most radical, militant organizations."

One of the most useful groups of informers, Fyke told the CSAC, was the Faculty Senate Observers, a group set up after the 1970 killings to provide unbiased monitoring of demonstrations for the faculty's information and guidance. Recognizing the implications of what Fyke had said, CSAC member and chemistry professor, Allen Rahwitch, burst out: "If that statement with regard to the Faculty Senate Observers gets out of this committee, they're destroyed. Our constituted duty is to be objective observers reporting back exclusively to the Faculty Senate."

While the CSAC-Olds proposed Policy Statement laid down guidelines on the use of undercover agents by the KSU security force, it made no mention whatsoever of their use by other police agencies. Early last November Fyke admitted that he knew that agents from the Portage County sheriff's office, the four-county regional drug control agency, the Ohio State Patrol, the Ohio State narcotics squad, the Ohio Bureau of Criminal Investigation and a federal task force were operating on campus. He said that other agencies, too, may have had agents working on campus at that time but he did not know for

On the same day that he promulgated the proposed Policy Stateme. Olds announced that photographic surveillance wou we restricted to "specific matters related to current criminal cases." Three weeks later, the Stater carried a front-page picture of KSU security officer Jerry Frankhouser, dressed in civilian clothes and carrying a camera at the site of an anti-ROTC demonstration. Upon being challenged by Stater reporters, Frankhouser showed them a press pass indentifying him as a photographer for the Cleveland Press. A bit later the Stater reporters saw Frankhouser pass a roll of film to a uniformed KSU security officer. Their suspicion further aroused they called the Press and were told that Frankhouser had done no work for the paper in more than four years.

Frankhouser's use of press credentials was not withou precedent at Kent. In June 1969, Margaret Ann Murvay a KSU student, appeared before the U.S. House Interna Security Committee and told them how, during the previous school year, she had assisted the KSU security force while acting as news director of the campus station WKSU. After recording interviews with student activists or taping the proceedings of political meetings, she would duplicate her tapes and pass them to KSU security officers.

On May 4, 1970, a man with a camera is said to have run screaming and waving a pistol from the shootings or Blanket Hill. The Scranton Commission and the FBi identified the man'as Terry Norman, a free-lance photographer. Yet others have said that Norman bragged repeatedly to friends that he was employed by the FBI Further, newsmen from the NBC news bureaus in Akror and Cleveland uncovered the fact that Norman had beer employed as a KSU security officer. Following the killing at Kent they tracked him to assignments, first with the Washington, D.C., Police Department and, more recently with the Miami, Fla., Police Department. After more than a year of trying, the NBC newsmen were unable to get a satisfactory report from the FBI as to whether or no Terry Norman's pistol had been fired on May 4, 1970.

Immediately following Mohr's arrest, Olds ir structed the CSAC to investigate the incident and its wide implications. The focus of their investigation shifter apidly from the Mohr case to the intelligence operation of the KSU security force in general. Fyke, himself, neath drew the connection between the Mohr incident and the security force's general policies. He told the CSAC "One of the purposes of undercover agents is gettin intelligence. I do not deny this at all. It is not rare and is not exceptional. It's just a continuing kind of thin where once you've started one agent you can put to more men out to follow up those branches from the first

The anti-Fyke group, consisting almost solely of th student members, was led chiefly by Mike White, a your. Methodist minister and graduate student in philosophy Kent. The pro-Fyke faction was made up mostly of facul administrators, and inonuniversity people, it was led

the pharges that White leveled most strongly against Eastman and Roberts was 'at they were too closely tied to Fyke to reach an unlissed assessment of the KSU security force. Both Eastman and Roberts had been Fyke's teachers at Michigan State University police school from 1960 to 1963. (That was the same time that the MSU police school was setting up Diem's secret police operation in South Victnam.) Later, Fyke and Eastman worked for the Public Administration Service, a consulting firm, in Chicago. While there they served as consultants to the President's Commission on Crime, helping to write the commission's report on police

In 1965 Roberts came to Kent State as coordinator of the law-enforcement studies program. He was followed two years later by Eastman, who took over the forerunner of the present Center for State and Local Government. In 1969 Fyke arrived at Kent State, working first as a researcher in Eastman's operation, After the killings all three served as consultants to the university commission set up to reorganize the campus police department. Finally on January 1, 1971, Fyke became KSU director of security, a position analogous to campus chief of police. In addition, Fyke and Roberts were major contributors to the book Municipal Police Administration edited by Eastman in 1969. Published by the International City Managers Association, it is the standard work in its

When I asked Fyke about his connections with the other two, he said that he had been Roberts' and Eastman's student at MSU. Roberts at first denied this. Eastman denied having had anything to do with Fyke's being employed at KSU. All three denied having been involved in the MSU Vietnam project.

The first major issue of dispute within the CSAC was the keeping of intelligence dossiers by the KSU security force. White pushed for inspection of the files by the CSAC; Eastman and Roberts resisted. On May 5, 1972, Olds granted CSAC permission to inspect the records. The next day Fyke moved to block the inspection, claiming that it would be "unethical and illegal." Finally



at the end of May, a CSAC subcommittee was allowed to look at the index to the intelligence files, but not at the actual files.

The subcommittee found 3,000 names in the indexonly fifteen of which concerned active criminal cases. Almost all files were less than a year old. The names were indexed according to the following criteria: persons arrested or about to be arrested for narcotics, violent revolutionary activity, gambling and prostitution; names submitted by other agencies; victims; informers; sexrelated crimes and pornographers. The index also contained noncoded entries of activist faculty, Kent city ministers and members of the VVAW, the Black United Students and the Kent Gay Liberation Front. According to the subcommittee report there were no index entry codes for promerty theft—the most common commis crime

One evening late in the spring quarter, while the effort to gain ac iss to the files was being pushed, White SU campus to downtown Kent to visit drove from the some friends. Snortly after arriving, he looked out the front window of his friend's house and saw an unmarked car parked across the street with two KSU security officers inside. Parked a short distance away was a KSU police cruiser with two more officers inside. In the driveway of the house was another unmarked car with three KSU security officers and director of security Fyke inside. White

and a lawyer friend went outside to find out what the KSU police were doing. They were told that a license plate check was being run on the lawyer's car which was parked in the driveway. Later, when the CSAC asked Fyke what his department's jurisdiction was outside KSU property, Fyke said, "Our authority off campus is that of a private

Throughout the spring and summer, Fyke denied repeatedly that the information in the intelligence dossiers was being shared with other agencies. Finally, at the August 18th CSAC meeting, he reversed himself and admitted that for more than a year and a half the KSU security force had been exchanging files at weekly and biweekly meetings with local police departments, the Ohio State Patrol, the Ohio National Guard and other agencies. According to CSAC documents, Fyke also expressed a belief that "any employer has a right to know all he can about a prospective employee, regardless of whether it is information of a noncriminal or personal nature."

The dissemination of the KSU intelligence data is prob


ably far greater than even this would indicate. In one of his first moves as security director, Fyke tied the KSU security force into the FBI's National Crime Information Center (NCIC), a highly computerized information storage and retrieval system that by 1975 will provide every police agency in the United States with access to the records of every other police agency.

While the battle of the dossiers was being fought in Kent, Ron Mohr was moving toward a reinstatement hearing before the Ohio State Personnel Board of Review. The hearing was held in Columbus on October 4, before two of the board's three members, Frank E. Avren and Earl W. Allison. Avren is a former state highway patrolman; Allison is a former prosecuting attorney in Franklin County (Columbus), who admitted during the hearing that he had supervised undercover narcotics agents as part of his job.

There are at least four peculiarities about the hearings. First, neither of the two veterans who exposed Mohr. Ken Johnson or Alan Morris, was subpoensed to testify. Second, the witnesses against Mohr were intensively questioned off the record about their political and social beliefs. Third, the name of Jim Rucker-the man whom Mohr identified during the hearing as having sold him the AK-47 and the RPG-was deleted from the official transcript. Finally there was the board's finding which reinstated Mohr. It said, in part:

. . the Board (was) not favorably impressed by the demeans of these three witnesses (against Mohr) on the stand. In several instances, it was the manner of speaking and the tone of voice rather than the content of the answers which detracted from the credibility of the

In view of the commendable way he was carrying ou his undercover assignment and his straightforward and candid testimony, as opposed to the many factors de-

At that point the university dropped its efforts to remove Mohr from the security force.

Commenting on the current situation, McKinley said, "I've told President Olds he's lost control of the police department. There are people up there who have no notion of the First Amendment to the Constitution. They think they're going to hold back the Communist tide. Our Constitution's been abrogated up there and it has to be reasserted."

Speaking before the CSAC, Fyke said: "The president's office knew about Ron Mohr many months ago. They knew that he was under. They knew his name. I had assistance from the personnel office in seeing that his name was not publicly bandied about. So I'm not taking anybody's heat. I don't want anybody thinking I was doing anything underhanded and scurrilous and secretive and that other members of the administration didn't know anything about it."

On November 27, 1972, the Ohio Civil Liberties Union and the ACLU national office brought suit against Kent State University, its top officials and members of its security force in U.S. District Court in Cleveland. The ACLU charged the university with unlawful acts of provocation. Further, acting on behalf of the VVAW and various students, the American Civil Liberties Union asked more than \$250,000 in damages and an injunction against any further undercover political surveillance on the part of the university.

On January 5, Ohio state attorneys moved for dismissal of the case. The state called first for sovereign immunity. Since all the defendants were being sued for the performance of their official duties as they understood them, the state attorneys argued, the suit in effect was really against the state of Ohio. Therefore the ACLU and the Kent plaintiffs must have the state's consent to be sued. Ohio would not consent. Further, the state attorneys said that even the alleged violations of the plaintiffs' constitutional rights "does not, in itself, preclude the operation of sovereign immunity," because undercover police operations, including Mohr's activities as a provocateur, are part of the state's "highest function; namely to react swiftly and decisively to insure the protection of the public security."

The state of Ohio also contended that, since nothing had happened to them, the Kent plaintiffs had no grounds

for pressing the case. The state attorneys wrote: "Plaitiffs would are arently seek a recovery from this Coxbecause they we developed a paranoia and are plaguwith lears that have never been realized. Actions und the federal Civil Rights Act must be based on real anot imagined or speculative" violations of one's constitutional rights. The state attorneys continued, "The Costitution does not guarantee that government officidisclose their identity as such to any person. The right being ... betrayed by an informer ... is the kind risk we necessarily assume whenever we speak."

Finally, the state attorneys called for a dismissal the case because the plaintiffs were not really interest in claiming damages. Rather, the plaintiffs were seeki a broad-scale investigation of KSU's security and intel gence-gathering activities, to be conducted by themselv as private parties armed with the subpoena power of federal district court and the power of cross-examinatic. The state attorneys warned, "courts should not ventuinto a realm foreign to the judiciary, one in which managable standards may not yet have been developed, resolve the competing claims as to the appropriatent of technical details of the security system."

What it all comes down to is that the state of Oh has declared the highest function of government to the maintenance of security. To achieve this end the state of Ohio has time and again shown itself willing to perm even to demand, that its security officers perform a that, were they committed by a private citizen, would criminal. It is no coincidence that the chief case cited it the state in its move to dismiss the Mohr case w Krause v. Rhodes. Krause is a Pittsburgh electrical corpany executive who is trying to sue the state of Ohio fifthe wrongful death of his daughter, Allison. Along will Jeffrey Miller, Sandy Scheuer and Bill Schroeder, sl was killed by the Ohio National Guard on May 4, 1971 at Kent State University.

Six members of the VVAW were indicted by a Federal Grand Jury, Tallahassee, Florida, in July, 1972, on charge of conspiracy to violate the Anti-Riot Law.
