On January 19, 1973, a confidential source who has furnished reliable information in the past furnished an up-to-date two page document issued by the New York Regional Office of the Vietnam Veterans Against the War, which sets forth a list of New York State and Chapter Coordinators, which included captioned individual, RD #1, Cobleskill, New York - no telephone.

The Vietnam Veterans Against the War (VVAW) is a national organization composed primarily of veterans of the war in Vietnam, that has organized and participated in numerous demonstrations against the war in Vietnam during 1970-72, including the seizure of the Statue of Liberty, New York City, and the occupation of the Betsy Ross House, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, in December, 1971. Six members of the VVAW were indicted by a Federal Grand Jury, Tallahassee, Florida, July, 1972, on charge of conspiracy to violate the Federal Antiriot Law.

On March 13, 1973, a second confidential source who has furnished reliable information in the past advised [REDACTED] is currently a student at New York State University, Cobleskill Tech, Cobleskill, New York. A review of captioned matter indicates the need for an updated thumbnail sketch regarding the VVAW.

It is noted that communications from other offices have set forth various thumbnail sketches regarding the VVAW. Also, since Chicago was designated as Office of origin in this matter, there has been no change in the thumbnail.

During the January, 1973, VVAW National Steering Committee meeting, it was proposed that the name "Winter Soldier" be incorporated into the VVAW organizational name; however, this matter was deferred until the National Steering Committee meeting, to be held in Placitas, New Mexico, in April, 1973.

With the above factors in mind, Chicago will await results of the April, 1973, New Mexico meeting and thereafter submit a revised VVAW thumbnail sketch for Bureau approval.

He stated after he was discharged from the United States Army, he became concerned with the wanting peace in Vietnam. He stated one day he was reading a magazine and he saw an advertisement regarding the Vietnam Veterans Against the War organization. He wrote to the address, which he does not recall at this time, and requested to join this organization since he is a peace loving person and felt that the war in Vietnam was wrong. He stated he sent a five dollar membership but never received any type of card showing he was a member. He said he has received mail which included brochures and literature concerning the Vietnam Veterans Against the War. He says he has attended some Vietnam Veterans Against the War meetings, but declined to comment when or where the meetings were held.

The Vietnam Veterans Against the War (VVAW) is a national organization composed primarily of veterans of the war in Vietnam that has organized and participated in numerous demonstrations against the war in Vietnam during 1970 - 1972, including the seizure of the Statue of Liberty, New York City, and the occupation of the Betsy Ross House, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, in December, 1971. Six members of the VVAW were indicted by a Federal Grand Jury, Tallahassee, Florida, July, 1972, on charge of conspiracy to violate the Federal Anti-riot Law.

Mitchell ^{A.T.} Summoned in Protest Trial

PENSACOLA, Fla. (AP)—A federal judge has ordered former Attorney General John Mitchell to appear in court here Wednesday as a defense witness in a pretrial hearing for eight antiwar activists.

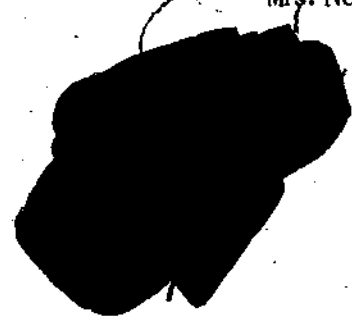
U.S. District Court Judge Winston Arnow overruled a motion Tuesday by an attorney representing Mitchell to quash a subpoena issued by lawyers for the activists, accused of plotting to disrupt the Republican National Convention last summer.

Arnow said he would require Mitchell to be present in connection with a defense effort to tie this in with the Watergate.

"They (the defense) want to explore with him the matter of whether there was an electronic surveillance by private people of the defendants," Arnow said. He added that he personally thought the allegation was "far-fetched."

Mitchell's lawyer, J. Harrell of Pensacola, argued that Mitchell was currently under subpoena by federal grand juries in Washington and New York and that his testimony would be immaterial and irrelevant in the Florida case.

Arnow left one possibility open that Mitchell would not appear. He suggested that Mitchell talk to defense attorneys by telephone in an attempt to convince them that his testimony would be relevant.



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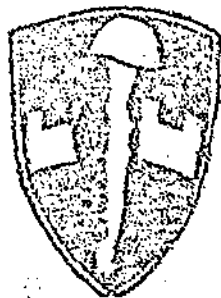

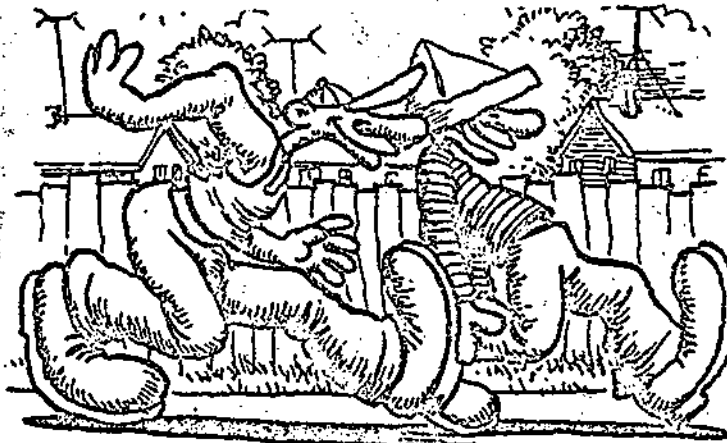

WHO WE ARE ? -- WHAT WE DO ?

Vietnam Veterans Against the War is an organization which began in 1967 in New York City when six anti-war veterans marched in a demonstration under the banner "Vietnam Veterans Against the War". This was the first public action by the group with many more to come. VVAW has participated in marches throughout the United States. In spring of 1971 VVAW sponsored the throwing away of war medals by 1100 veterans on the steps of the Capital Building in Washington. It was also VVAW who symbolically seized the statue of liberty in New York during Christmas of 1971. In early 1972 VVAW started to develop ties with the local communities to get at the basis of problems in our country. And as these ties grew, so did the organization. First into a truly national organization and now into an international group. There are chapters in Iwakuni Japan, Okinawa, and Germany as well as Yokosuka.

With the signing of the "peace treaty" VVAW activities are now becoming more and more important. Some of the programs in the States are - military counseling, doing research on post-vietnam syndrome, working as volunteers in local VA hospitals, aiding handicapped veterans in finding jobs. Here in Yokosuka our activities take the form of staffing a center where people can come without getting ripped off, providing counseling for discharges; a lawyer who will defend people for free; and fighting back at the lifers when they start to fuck with one of us. At the center there are folk and rock concerts from time to time. VVAW is also beginning a campaign to oppose the homeporting of the Midway in Yokosuka - we feel that we all should be sent home, NOT have more sent here.

Membership in VVAW is open to all active duty people and veterans alike, regardless if you have actually been to Vietnam or not. If you were or are now in the service you know what war is like - always fighting the lifers. To join VVAW all you have to do is read the list of objectives and agree with them, fill out the application form (obtainable from PO Box 26, Yokosuka) and contribute \$5.00 membership dues to help support the ongoing program. List of Objectives

1. To demand an immediate end to all fighting in Indochina. Withdrawal of all fighting troops from Southeast Asia.
2. To demand the immediate end of United States operations interfering with the rights of all people to determine their own destinies. This includes the end of all CIA operations.
3. To demand that all active duty people be given all those rights guaranteed by the Bill of Rights and the Constitution.
4. To demand that those who don't want to be in the military be released immediately. All political prisoners be set free.

MIDWAY?

We've all heard about the the Navy's plans to home-port the Midway over starting about September. The bars are all busy remodeling to rip off more money, the Navy's busy trying to discover more housing for 1,000 families they have no room for, apartments are getting more expensive on the beach. Did anyone ever stop to wonder just why another ship needs to come in the first place.

For Navy people the home-porting means a real bad deal both for those already here and those on the Midway. The first problem they will have to face is housing, unless they want to live all the time on the ship and the married people don't bring their families along, two pretty slim chances! Have you tried to get an apartment on the beach lately? Maybe you had to give yours up because of the rising cost of living here in Japan because our dear tricky Dick decided to devalue the dollar. Right now you can easily pay up to \$100.00 a month for a little apartment with two rooms and maybe a bath. Of course some people won't have to worry about housing, because theirs is supplied; the Brass.

If people do succeed in getting a place on or off base, they next thing they will confront is the prices for commodities and commodities in the commissary and the BX. Just after the was revalued all the prices on base, in the snack bars and cafeterias, BX, everywhere went up 15%! So not do do prices off base go up but the prices on base as well. And all this was supposed to have been taken care of by a 12% pay hike at the start of this year, but now that 12% doesn't even make a in the rising costs of living. But in the Navy, just like American society in general, it's the workers, the EM, who keep on paying, while the brass live high and mighty, like they are paid to do.....

We hear a lot about how having ships over here creates jobs for Japanese workers. But the fact is that March and Japanese workers are being laid off in RIF (reduction in forces) moves. The Navy says this is to save money and cut down on the dollar flow, but if they were interested in doing that, why send the Midway in the first place? They announced they will only hire contract work done by huge corporations like Sumitomo, which are non-union, and which takes the money from the workers and gives it to the huge corporations instead. The Japanese people don't need the American military over here to create jobs; there's a very small unemployment rate in Japan right now, and workers can get jobs. So the whole home-porting is a bad deal for the Japanese people, too. copy

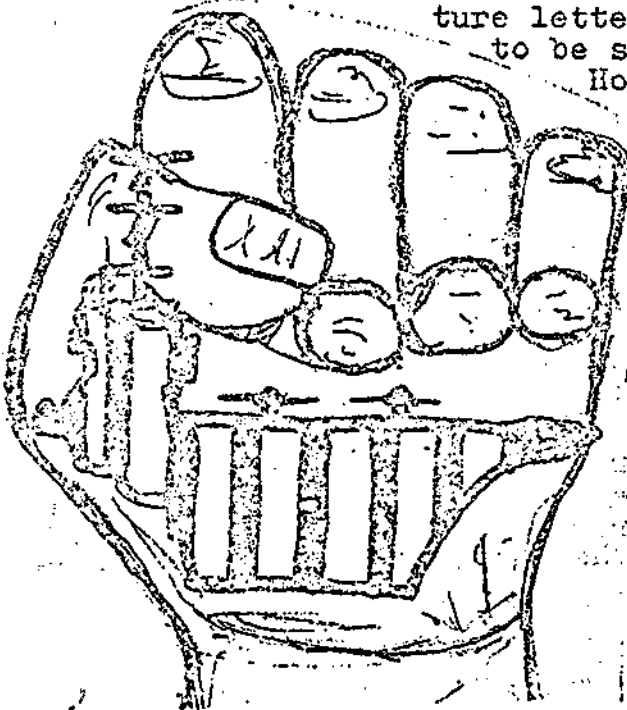

The Japanese people are also angered at the military stepping up its presence in Japan, because they want their land back, and they want to use it for peaceful purposes. Everyone's seen the demonstrations that happen a couple times a week, and a lot of them are to oppose the Midway. What if there were Japanese military bases in San Diego or Chicago? There have been such strong opposition to the American bases here that the military has been forced to cut down on the number of bases a little bit and make it appear as if they were giving back a lot of land to the Japanese. But the home-porting of the Midway shows that this isn't true at all.

Why can't the Navy take all these problems into consideration when its planning such big steps? Because their real purpose isn't to accommodate the people in the military service, or the people in the countries we occupy. The real purpose of the military is to act as the policeman for "American interests" abroad. What are these interests? They sure aren't our interests, or else they wouldn't have to draft (or threaten to) thousands of us, make us work in lousy conditions at low pay, thousands of miles away from family and home. They're the interests of a very few very rich and powerful businessmen in the US, who want to make sure that things like Vietnam don't happen too often. So they figure the best way to try to prevent that is to use us as cops, and keep a massive amount of weapons and equipment over here besides.

As far as we're concerned we don't need the Midway over here at all; for that matter, any of the other ships already here! So we're circulating a multiple signature letter (legal under DOD directives) to be sent to a congressperson.

Hopefully he will instigate an investigation into the home-porting plans. But the only way we'll ever stop the home-porting, or get anything done is to unite and get together! Come on by the New People's Center.

Dear Congressman Dellums :

As you probably know by now the USS Midway (CVA-41) is due to be homeported here in Yokosuka later on this year. This is really bad news for everyone all the way around.

For us GI's there will be problems such as housing shortages on and off base, the exchanges and commissaries will be under-stocked, the recreational facilities will be very over-crowded. Not to mention other problems like the bar area expanding and remodeling to rip off more money.

The Japanese people themselves will be affected also. Since March the exchanges have been laying off more and more Japanese workers. SRF workers are also being laid off. These workers will be replaced by workers from large companies such as Sumitomo, etc. who are non-union. That means more money will go to the large corporations instead of to the people who need it most.

We also feel that homeporting the Midway in Yokosuka is clearly another move by Nixon to farther oppress the peoples of Asia. We therefore respectfully oppose the Midway being homeported here.

As an American serviceman stationed here in Japan, I feel that I'm speaking for not only the active military but dependents and retired personnel who have chosen to make their home here. The yen-dollar situation is inexcusable. If the Great White Father and his galloping band of cohorts don't do some drastic decision making soon the people will!

The way it stands at this writing I wonder where I might get a decent price for the almighty \$. As we all know the prices here are damn right outrageous !!!

Tricky Dick is going to have to give everyone some kind of subsistence allowance. Not only the officers and lifers, in that order, but also the E-1. If he doesn't we just can't make it.

We have little military housing for the military dependents and what we do have is inadequate. People are forced to live in apts. on the beach that can run anywhere from \$125 to \$150 per month for nothing more than 1 room, a bathroom with no shower or tub, and a half-ass kitchen that you can't get more than 2 people in. By the way these are all unfurnished.

The prices are still rising. When is it going to stop? Did you know that the inflation rate in Japan is over 5% a year. Jesus Christ what do the assholes in the stockmarket expect us to do?

The Dept. of the Navy expects to homeport the USS Midway here which will make the prices even higher. Already many places are remodeling so they can accomodate the business they expect to receive from the Midway. Who do you think is going to pay for these changes? If you can't figure it out — It's you and me brother. Let's get together and fight this thing before it's too late.

Remember the Vietnamese have made Nixon the first President to lose a war we can make him the first President to lose an Army...Navy... Air Force.

PROSTITUTION

Prostitution is one of the most frequent and important ways GI's come in contact with women. It is a big business wherever GI's are stationed. Many people don't understand that prostitution serves the interest of the military. Folks often think that prostitution exists alongside the military as a business thing. They think that GI's relate to prostitutes only because there are no other women around, and because the military just can't improve the morals of GI's men will be men. But if you look at the situation more closely, it turns out that's not the whole story. Prostitution isn't only allowed, but encouraged and used by the military to make military people into the kind of men the military wants: dehumanized fighters with no feelings of love or compassion. Prostitution actually serves a purpose in military training and in keeping service people from developing whatever real and lasting relationships with women are possible in this country.

Once we're in the military, we are cut off from our families, our past and our friends. We're put in an all-male situation, where the number and kinds of contacts we have with women are limited by the men who give the orders. Women in the military are kept apart from GI's. They have special jobs as assistants to officers and lifers, and usually live in separate barracks, usually off-limits to enlisted men. And most women in towns near military bases are isolated from GI's. They are often few in number, and are generally warned to stay away from GI's.

So service people don't have any more than passing contact with women, and women get to be objects and fantasies in many people's minds. Since men come into the military already trained to see women as sexual objects, this isolation by itself would be enough to make people relate to women as whores.

But the military hasn't been content with physical isolation. GI's also get training and indoctrination about women from the first day in basic training. They learn that there are two kinds of women: those they are fighting for—wives, mothers, girlfriends, and those they should fuck—whores. Through this they are taught to separate sex from love and whores from girlfriends. They learn that getting their kicks through prostitution is tough and masculine. **CONT....**

At the same time, their officers warn them that other kinds of relationships with women won't work-- that their girlfriends are cheating on them, or their wives will probably divorce them before they are discharged. This kind of discouraging is done because wives are sometimes a threat to the "fightin force"-- they make GI's more careful about risking their lives, and a GI with a family is a LITTLE more likely to feel sympathy for a family in Vietnam. (But there's another side to this coin, which the brass also recognizes-- wives of GI's, like all wives, are supposed to support their husband's work uncritically, bear the brunt of their frustrations, and keep them pacified.)

The kind of training GI's get also ties sexual prowess with military skill, ties guns with cocks, ties killing people with fucking women. Good relationships with women are a threat to this way of thinking; so prostitution and short manipulating relationships with women are definitely in the brass' interest.

Women working with the GI movement in San Diego, a navy town, give examples of the way prostitution becomes a part of GI's lives in the navy: On the west coast, most sailors are part of the all-male WEST-PAC cruise, which is out at sea for eight or nine months, between Southeast Asia and the Philippine Islands. Every 30 to 60 days the ship will enter port for about a week. Once the sailors hit port they are encouraged by the example and "sea stories" of the officers and lifers to "raise hell." Prostitutes in ports like Olongapo, Philippine Islands, are cheap and plentiful. These women are presented to the GI's as compensation for military discomfort. Their availability is held over the men like a Pavlovian reward for "good service."

In between cruises the sailors return to a US port for about 4 months. Here, in an area like Broadway in downtown San Diego, they find an extension of the port overseas. They are discouraged by many tales of defeat from trying to meet potential girlfriends. They are instead encouraged to go downtown. All bases in the San Diego area have bus service from a central location on the base to and from Broadway. There the GI's will find an array of bars, skin flicks, and prostitutes--both in the bars and on the streets.

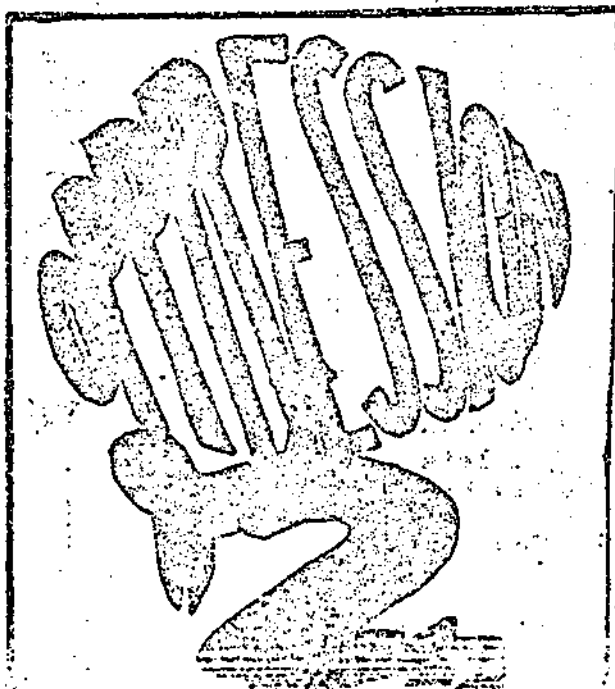
It's clear from this example that the military doesn't just accept prostitution because it can't get rid of it. The use of prostitution as a "reward" for the discomforts of ship duty shows one more way that the brass finds prostitution useful. The encouragement of officers shows they aren't neutral about prostitutes

Among other things, the joking and "sea stories" of officers is a way they try to break down the anger of low ranking men against high ranking men-I may be you officer, but after all, we're both men.




To get a clearer picture of the way the military uses prostitution, it's important to deal with prostitution in South Vietnam. Here racism against Asian people is added to male chauvinism, and GI's treat Vietnamese women like subhuman whores. GI's who have been taught to treat women like things and Vietnamese people like things are capable of being brutal to women who don't want to sleep with them. These attitudes and the economic upheaval in South Vietnam force thousands of South Vietnamese women to become prostitutes.



GI's are always encouraged to think of Vietnamese women as whores, and to go only to the GI-oriented bars where prostitutes are plentiful. GI's who try to form more lasting relationships with women are put down-and it's almost impossible for a GI to marry a Vietnamese woman. Prostitution is continually used to keep GI's from getting to know and respect Vietnamese people or their culture. This whole situation separates GI's from the South Vietnamese people, and creates feelings that let GI's kill without worrying about who they are killing.

So prostitution is used as a reward, a pacifier, a morale booster, and a propaganda device. In all of these ways, it is used to dehumanize GI's and keep them separate from other people: and those things are crucial to keeping the US military going.

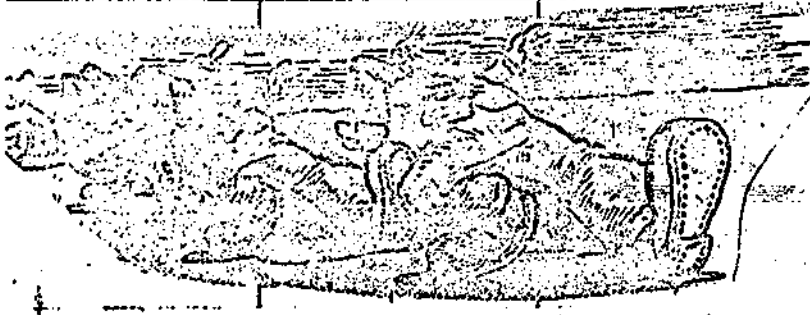

PLEASE READ

After 12 years of war and 25+ years of subversion by Americans Nixon has finally signed the peace treaty. Why did he sign it now? There are many reasons. For one thing he is tired of fighting, suffering defeat, and no sign of winning in sight. After spending 137 BILLION dollars and killing and wounding millions of people, and dropping more bombs than in any war in history, he may have realized that the US cannot win. All the wealth he represents cannot stop a revolution, it only held it back a while.

But there are other reasons for Nixon changing the US's involvement in SE Asia. The United States and other advanced industrial nations are sliding into a depression. The cities are decaying, schools and hospitals so overcrowded they can't do their jobs. There are few adequate public transportation facilities. Production of useful goods is less now than ever before, even though more and more money goes into military expenditures which are no good to anyone. Neglect and greed have let pollution threaten life and health. Inflation and unemployment-especially among vets-continues to grow. People have to work harder and seem to get less. Working people are taxed more and more, and get less and less.

The depression is coming not because of "those damn Japanese" or because "workers are lazy and greedy". Its because all the wealth in America is controlled by a small capitalist class: the bankers, large corporations, and speculators. Working people have to keep on paying higher taxes, while these large corporations, banks, etc, pay hardly any at all. Workers also have to pay them interest on loans and mortgages. Even now the corporations profit is increasing, while working people have to work more and more just to try to stay even.

Nixon was elected as the representative of this capitalist class. They back him, pay for his campaigns. Now that his campaign is over he will pay them back. This is the reason Nixon doesn't consult Congress, speak to the

press, even criticizes it when its critical of him, and holds down wages and not profits. Congress, the press, labor unions can be dangerous if they get in his way to impose poverty in America so the capitalists can stay wealthy.

Nixon's economic policy (phase 1,2,3, etc.) are designed to get Americans to work harder for less. The aim is to crush organized labor as a defense of workers against getting exploited. Workers who can't keep up with the pace of speedup, or who's jobs get eaten up by automation, will be tossed to the scrapheap of welfare. That's what welfare is: the people that capitalism has no use for. If Nixon's plans come true we will see blacks and whites fighting for the jobs that are left, at whatever wage the bosses want to pay.

So Nixon is just bringing the policies in Vietnam back home. He hopes to pacify Congress and the people back on the home front by acting like the peace maker, while he is preparing to cut our throats.

As Nixon's plans keep moving on we can expect to see a lot of resistance to his plans. Workers in auto plants, steel factories, mines, teachers, municipal workers, etc. will strike against plans to place them on the scrapheap. Ghetto and welfare victims will fight. If the different parts of the working class --black, white, women--can unite around a program to rebuild America in the interests of the people then America can be re-born. The government plans are to divide by race, trade, sex, unemployed from employed, GI from civilian, and keep us that way. We must educate and organize ourselves.

"What's this got to do with me, the Navy EM?" The answer is everything. Most GIs are from the working class, and unless they become lifers, will return to be part of it. While we are in the military as EM we form the weapon of Nixon and the capitalist class, which they will use in their interests abroad and at home. You didn't see Henry Ford out there on the line working 18 hours a day moving shells, did you! Even with the cease fire, ships still patrol along the coast of Vietnam, and the home-porting of the Midway at Yokosuka proves that the overseas function of policeman is still the same for EM. Back home the military will be used to break strikes and stand riot duty against other working people, just like the postal workers strike in 1970, or the conventions in 1972.

It should be clear that GIs performing these tasks will be their own enemy, being used to smash any chance our friends and families, and working people overseas as well, have to get a decent living. If that's not clear, think about after you get out of the Navy and go back into a job that's been speeded up, and work until you're worn out. It's not worth it. We've got to resist these plans, organize, build unity, change things around.

PRICES SKYROCKET

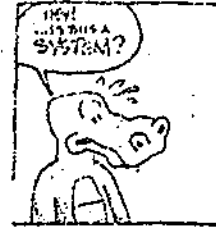
Wholesale prices rose in December at the fastest pace in nearly 22 years, the Labor Department reported.

December's increase of 19.2% was nearly triple November's 7.2% adjusted annual rate.

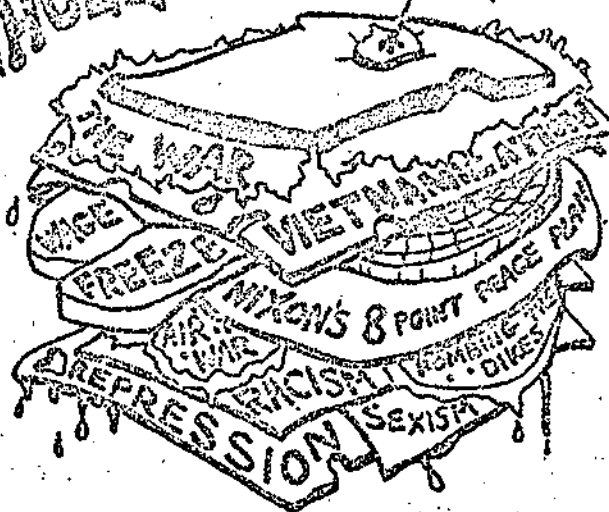
The incredible wholesale increase will begin affecting retail prices in late January and early February.

ARTICLE 15 - CAPTAIN MAST! LEGAL AID

Described in the Uniformed Code of Military Justice (UCMJ) as non-judicial punishment, this is punishment administered without a trial or a judge. Article 15 are supposed to be given only for acts that are against the UCMJ and only acts that could be punished by a military court. But because there is no court involved, accusations do not have to be proved. In other words, "You are guilty until proven innocent". It is used to intimidate the troops and keep you under control. Maximum punishment that can be given by an Article 15 by a LCDR or above are:

- A. Custody up to 30 days
- B. Loss of pay not more than half your pay for 2 months.
- C. Reduction to the lowest pay grade unless you are an E5 or above, then reduced 2 grades
- D. Extra duty for not more than 45 days
- E. Restriction up to 60 days
- F. Holding of your pay for up to one year, they can only take up to 50% for three months

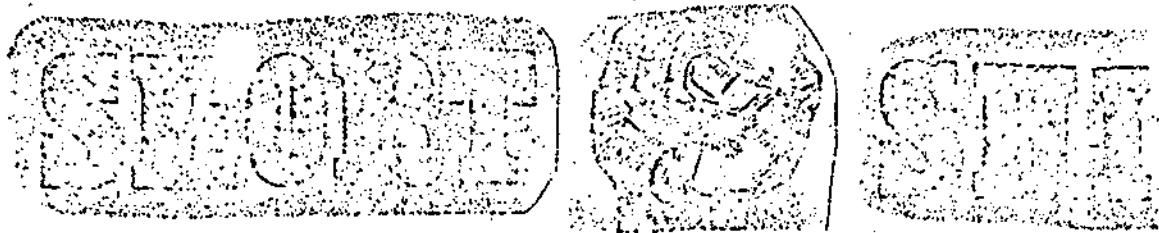
All of these punishments cannot be given at once, some can be combined. For example 30 days custody, reduction in grade and a fine can be combined. But things like restriction and custody, or fines and holding of pay cannot be given at the same Captain Mast.

If someone feels that the military does not have a good case they can refuse to sign for an Article 15. There are two ways a person can refuse :

- A person can call the militarys bluff and refuse to sign but NOT request a courts-martial.
- Or if you want to fight you may refuse the Art. 15 and request a courts-martial.

If you simply refuse to sign , the military can convene any of the 3 types of courts-martial depending on the offense you are charged with. If you are on board a ship you do NOT have the right to refuse a Captains Mast .

If you are going to accept an Art. 15 you may request witnesses on your behalf, and submit evidence for your side, as well as question those witnesses who are tesifying against you. The commanding officer is supposed to conduct an impartial hearing to consider all the evidence and only he will decide who is guilty. His punishment may have a lot to do with his personal feeling toward you. Also you should always appeal the punishment - you have nothing to lose all they can do is lower the punishment

NO RED or BLUE

The South Vietnamese Government, which recently banned the manufacture of any red or blue colored cloth in South Vietnam, has gone one step further. President Thieu's administration has passed a law making it illegal to import red or blue cloth of any type into South Vietnam. The Thieu government is opposed to red and blue materials because these are the colors of the N.L.F. and it is feared that South Vietnamese citizens might make N.L.F. flags out of the colored cloth. The newest law banning the importing of the material requires that all red or blue cloth be immediately dyed another color. If this is not done, the cloth will be seized by the government and its owners arrested. - LNS

WEAPONS AGAINST THE LIFERS

Article 121 of the UCMJ makes it a crime to wrongfully take, obtain or with hold from any person any money, property, or article of value of any kind. This also holds true if a lifer rips off any of your posters, books, leaflets, including this newspaper. So when the lifers come to take away your copy of OFF the BRIDGE write them up, they probably won't get court-martialed but it'll make them

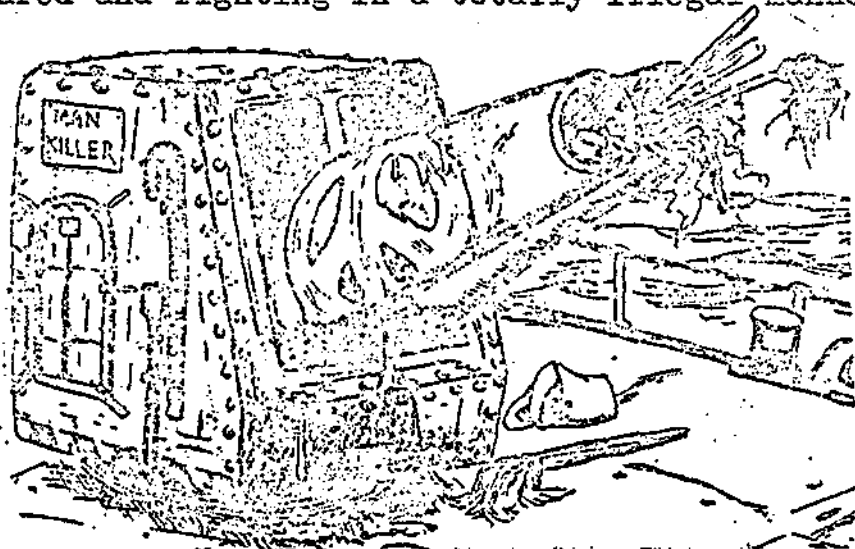
PAT CHENOWETH IS BEING FRAMED

When Nixon inaugurated his "peace" plan for Vietnam and moved the war from the ground to the air, the GI movement moved right along with it.

Crewmen aboard aircraft carriers throughout the Pacific, forced to work 20 hours a day loading the thousands of tons of bombs dropped daily on the people of Vietnam, have been resisting the racist and imperialist policies of the Navy with ever increasing militance and courage.

The movement aboard the USS Ranger, one of the carriers of the seventh fleet, is severely hampering the ship's participation in Nixon's invisible air war. Last July an unknown saboteur put a paint scraper and two 12-inch bolts in the Rangers giant reduction gears -- an act which rendered the ship immobile for nearly four months and cost over \$500 thousand. The act was one of at least 28 that have crippled the carrier since last spring.

En. Patrick D Chenoweth, a 21 year old enlisted man from Puyallup, Washington, has been singled out by the Navy to serve as a scapegoat ; an example to anyone who might consider sabotage as a method for taking out his anger and frustration against the war and the military. Arrested on August 2nd, Pat has been charged with willful destruction of government property and sabotage in time of war. If convicted he faces 35 years in military prison. The statute of sabotage in time of war has not been used since World War II -- and it is in contradiction to the fact that we are fighting a war never legally declared and fighting in a totally illegal manner.



NAVY HAS NO CASE

The evidence against Pat consists of three witnesses who claim they overheard him confess to his friends. But investigation has shown that at least 20 men were overheard making the same "admissions" - many brothers on the ship were eager to take credit for the act. Two of the three witnesses testified they thought he was joking when the alleged statements were made. Pat has no civilian criminal record and no military infractions other than two one-hour unauthorized absences. Yet he has been kept in pre-trial confinement at Treasure Island for four months. In a civilian courtroom the case would most certainly be thrown out for lack of evidence, but you're in the Navy now!

As the ship, which finally left for southeast Asia in mid-November, and other carriers carry out their tours of duty in the war zone, the reality of "Vietnamization" becomes very clear. When you walk over bombs to get to where you work and walk over bombs to get to where you eat, you're not so easily fooled by lies about "winding down the war". And brothers aboard ships are finding new ways to resist all the time. Brothers on the Coral Sea and the Enterprise circulated petitions protesting being sent back to Vietnam. An Indochina slide show was recently smuggled aboard the Ranger and shown in the carpenter's shack. Signs and posters to stop our ships are appearing all over the carriers, and the struggle of mostly black people against racism has emerged very powerfully on the Constellation and the Kitty Hawk over the past month.

As long as the harassment and as long as the military continues to deny the rights of GI's, they will be plagued by acts of resistance, whether it be striking out at the machinery of war through acts of sabotage or organized movements demanding an end to discrimination and racism in the service and demanding an end to this (for the sailor) all too invisible war. It is particularly important that the civilian anti-war movement rally to the defense of the GI brothers -- we must not allow them to stop the GI Movement! Sailors know the war first-hand, they know their friends and they know their enemy. Support the GI Movement!

ADVENTURES IN THE FORWARD HEAD

If he don't do anything about it, you can put a petition of Article 138 in to cover both the guy who screwed you and the Man, because he didn't do anything about it. This letter goes higher and higher on up the chain and makes things pretty hairy for them.

This, needless to say, kind of blew his mind, and he quickly changed the subject. I tried to finish taking a shit, and he left. I don't think I'll be bothered by such lifers for a while.

IF WE WANT OUR RIGHTS WE HAVE TO DEMAND THEM!!!

THE WAR'S "OVER," BUT....

Well, the war's been over for a couple months now, right? After all those years, millions dead, billions spent supporting a corrupt and unpopular dictator, diverting resources that could get better use at home fighting poverty and unemployment. After October, with "peace at hand", and then January, Nixon ordering the worst bombings in history. EM working 18 hours a day for him. We finally got "peace with honor", right?

Dead wrong. True, we should be glad that there's a cease fire, and in fact the bombing and shelling has been halted off the line and over Vietnam. But a lot of facts show that Nixon is only changing the appearance of the war, trying again to make it less visible, like he did in withdrawing ground troops and ordering in air and Navy. This time, with the withdrawal of the last Army and Marines and Air Force from Vietnam, will come a massive inflow of civilian's who will do the same things military people did. A conservative estimate is that there will be 10,000 such people: DOD employees, private corporation employees, even military people out of uniform.

Nixon's got a lot invested in Vietnam, and just because the overwhelming majority of Americans wanted out doesn't mean much. During November of last year, before the treaty was signed, he pumped in planes and arms so that the S. Vietnamese air force became the 3rd largest in the world. Some of the civilians going to Nam now may even be using that equipment, or at least training Thieu's troops to use it.

And outside of Vietnam itself what's happening is that there will be ships patrolling off the coast permanently. And check out some of the other Asian countries: Philippines Guam, Thailand-60,000 men, Taiwan 10,000 men, Okinawa 45,000 men, Japan 40,000 men, Korea 55,000 men. What the hell are we doing over here still, if the war is "over"?

These continued troops present, and plans like the reporting of the Midway this fall, mean that they still plan to try to direct the affairs of SE Asian people by the use of strong military power and coercion. Its about time Nixon and Wall Street stopped using EM as police for unpopular dictators like Thieu, Marcos, Park. What kind of democracy have we been fighting for these last dozen years, when S. Vietnam, Philippines, Korea, Thailand are all under dictatorship? We should get out completely from Asia, including CIA and DOD employees, and leave Asians to settle their own affairs.



On April 11, 1973, Source One, who has provided reliable information in the past, advised that a State meeting of the Vietnam Veterans Against the War (VVAW) was held on April 6 through April 8, 1973 in the South Lounge of the Red Jacket Dining Hall at the State University College of Arts and Science, Geneseo, New York.

The VVAW is a national organization composed primarily of veterans of the war in Vietnam, that has organized and participated in numerous demonstrations against the war in Vietnam during 1970-1972, including the seizure of the Statue of Liberty, New York City, and the occupation of the Betsy Ross House, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, in December, 1971. Six members of the VVAW were indicted by a Federal Grand Jury, Tallahassee, Florida, July, 1972, on charge of conspiracy to violate the Federal Antiriot Law.

Source One provided the following information concerning the VVAW meeting:

The meeting was held between the hours of 12:00 noon and 4:00 p.m. on Friday, April 6, 1973, and between 9:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. on Saturday and Sunday, April 7 and 8, 1973.

Authorization to hold the meeting on campus was granted by the Students Activities Committee of the Student Affairs Division on April 4, 1973 after submission of a written request by [REDACTED] New York, a sophomore at State University of New York, Geneseo. [REDACTED] requested authorization for a meeting of 40 delegates from around the state. [REDACTED] listed himself as representing the "Geneseo Students for a Humane Society."

A total of 28 persons attended the meetings over the weekend. The participants consisted of 23 males and 5 females. All participants were of college age with the exception of two older males, both approximately 38 to 40 years of age. The latter appeared to have been speakers at the meetings.

The program for the weekend appeared to have consisted of at least two guest speakers, a series of slide shows, and distribution of literature from the national VVAW organization and from the local State University of New York at Buffalo (SUNYAB). Business (if any) appeared to transact slowly at the meetings and the groups dispersed early each day (before 3:00 p.m. on Friday), (before 4:00 p.m. on Saturday and Sunday).

A check of the only parking lot in the area during the meetings revealed that the following vehicles were not registered to Geneseo students, not registered as dormitory visitors, and in all probability were driven by representatives to the VVAW meeting:

The VVAW was founded in the spring of 1967 by six young Vietnam veterans in New York City. At the beginning of 1968, with 600 members, VVAW opened a national office, founded the first GI newspaper, "Vietnam GI", and sent close to 500 veterans into the Mc Carthy campaign to beat down the red hatters. After getting gassed at the Democratic convention at Chicago and caught in the general "down" of the peace movement, VVAW was nearly inactive until the moratoriums in the fall of 1969. GENERAL INFORMATION

Wounded Knee 1973 - Update -

The situation at Wounded Knee between the feds and the citizens of the Independent Oglala Nation remains stalemated. Since the last newsletter, the government has presented a four-page proposal which amounted to nothing more than unconditional surrender, which the Indians naturally refused. The government remains adamant in not taking the demands of the Indians seriously. Government forces have been beefed-up around the perimeter of Wounded Knee. BIA Indian police have been called in in large numbers from reservations from around the country and are serving, at least for the time being, as a back-up force. There have been a couple of heavy firefights this past week, fortunately, without any casualties. Contrary to media reports, most of the shooting has been between the feds firing at one another from different positions. They really don't know what they are doing and they are also afraid. As a consequence, they have been real trigger happy. The feds are so inept, that when they fire off flares at night, they sometimes shoot them up into the wind, only to have them come down on their own positions. (They must have been trained by the ARVNs.)

One tactic being used by the government is to make it appear that the families of Wounded Knee do not support the take-over and declaration of sovereignty. These families were the ones who requested AIM to come in, in the first place. Last week when the roadblocks were temporarily lifted, the government told the residents that they would be free to go into Pine Ridge for food, laundry, etc., and that they would also be free to re-enter Wounded Knee. When the people tried to get back, however, they were denied access to their homes and were forced to take shelter in Pine Ridge. Many families are now cut off from their homes. One family of twelve is being forced to live in one small room. The government did this without any regard for the welfare of these families or their right to enter or leave their homes whenever they wish just so the American public would be duped into thinking AIM was in Wounded Knee without the consent of the people living there.

Inside the sovereign nation, construction has been progressing at a fast pace. In one week's time, close to 100 bunks have been built, fourteen new rooms have been erected, an underground warehouse has been established, hides of cows slaughtered for food are being held in areas ranging from first-aid to the use of weapons. The evenings consist of meetings of the entire community with information exchanged, singing and various other cultural activities being enjoyed.

Friday evening, March 16th, 349 people were sworn in as citizens of the new nation including 189 Oglalas, 160 Indians from other tribes, Chicanos and several whites and blacks. Fourteen other Indian nations have also issued Declarations of Independence.

People should not attempt, under any circumstances, to enter the Wounded Knee area. The feds have sealed the area off pretty effectively and all you are going to do is get busted. The legal defense committee has already got its hands full dealing with the 175 people that have already been busted and they don't need the additional strain on their resources. Their first priority is handling the legal needs of the Indian people. They can't do an effective job if they have to be diverted to getting other people out of the joint.

The Commo Center in Rapid City has been deluged with people coming in that don't want to do anything except hang around. Facilities are extremely scarce, so they don't want more people coming in than they have room for. There has also been a few weird, adventuristic people coming in falsely claiming to be with VVAW that have caused a lot of trouble and create friction with the Indians. So, the support center has requested that if you have any skills that can contribute to the support center and want to go, contact the National Office first, and we'll clear it with the people in Rapid City. They have urgently requested the following supplies for their office and for the people in Wounded Knee: medical supplies, food, money and office supplies: mimeo, pens, paper and again people skilled in office or medical work, paralegals, etc. Many chapters of VVAW have already brought in large amounts of supplies for the Indians, including Milwaukee, St. Louis, Kansas City, Buffalo and Missoula, Montana.

VVAW has taken part in many demonstrations around the country in support of the Independent Oglala Nation. Listed below are the ones we have knowledge of:

March 17 - Mt. Rushmore - Approximately 125 people including 75 from VVAW were blocked from Mt. Rushmore by the police who bulldozed snow on the road and then declared the road impassible.

March 21 - DeKalb, Ill. - Over 50 people participated in a silent vigil at Northern Illinois campus. Included was a short Indian prayer about Wounded Knee 1890.

New Orleans, La. - 25 people from VVAW and NAM picketed the FBI building in support of Wounded Knee.

San Francisco and Los Angeles, Calif. - VVAW took part in demonstrations and rallies in support of the Independent Oglala Nation.

Branson-Savage Bust - An update -

Another tactic used by the feds to try to break up support for the people inside of Wounded Knee was to arrest anyone in the area who looked like a supporter or potential supporter of the Indians, lock them up for a few days and then release them on bail with the stipulation that they must leave the area immediately. Over two hundred people were dealt with in this manner. Once in Jail, the POWs were heavily intimidated by the feds in hope of scaring them off for good. But, as always, this just served to make the people's will to resist and fight against the oppression that much stronger.

In response to a request from reliable persons in the struggle around Wounded Knee, the National Collective decided to send two representatives, Bill Branson and Bart Savage, to the Wounded Knee area for the purposes of gathering information and to express solidarity with the people of the Independent Oglala Nation.

Bill and Bart were arrested in the vicinity of Wounded Knee on March 13th by FBI agents and federal marshalls at a roadblock on Big Foot Road. They were charged with interfering with and impeding the official duties of federal marshalls. This charge is a felony and carries a maximum of five years in the can and/or a \$10,000 fine. The official duties of the marshalls were to man the roadblock and search every car that came up to it. Bill and Bart, having their car searched, in effect were interfering and impeding the marshalls from carrying out their official directives. (Catch-22)

They were taken to jail in Pine Ridge, to await transportation to Rapid City. They spent three days there including the first night sleeping on the cement floor with no blankets during a big blizzard and the windows open. One old man had to be rushed to the hospital with pneumonia the next day as a result of this.

They rode up to Rapid City on Friday with four Indian Brothers including a Cheyenne medicine man. They got there in time for their arraignment and bail hearing at 4PM. The US attorney was asking for \$50,000 bail each. He asked for the high bail because he didn't believe that if released they would leave the area but he also felt that if they left the area, they wouldn't return for trial. Logically, his solution was for them to stay in jail until their trial date. The magistrate, being a great humanitarian and defender of the oppressed, lowered the bail to a measly \$5,000 each.

On Monday afternoon another bail hearing was held. The situation was a little different this time. Every cell in Rapid City and Pine Ridge was completely filled. They were forced to transfer some of the people to Deadwood. So nine people, including Bart and Bill were released on their own recognizance. The conditions of the bail included that they had to leave the state immediately. During their stay in custody, they were questioned by the FBI in Pine Ridge and again in Rapid City. Each session lasted just long enough for them to read the two their rights and for Bart and Bill to tell them THAT THEY HAD NOTHING TO SAY. As of yet, no trial date has been set.

Charly Gray, of the National Collective, recently departed this office for Cuba as a member of the Venceremos Brigade. The Brigade is an organization that annually sends American youth to Cuba where they learn about the Cuban revolution and see how the Cuban people live. Charly will be in Cuba, with the Brigade, for about two months building housing for Cuban workers and their families somewhere outside of Havana. While the National Collective will really miss Charly during her stay in Cuba, the experience she gains will be an asset to the entire organization when she returns. The way the Cuban people have solved the problems facing their society and the way they have improved the lives of all their people holds a lot of lessons that all of us in VVAW can learn from. HASTA LA VICTORIA SIEMPRE! SOLIDARITY WITH THE CUBAN PEOPLE!!

US Committee to Aid the NLF-SVN -

The enclosed literature and brochures are from the US Committee to Aid the NLF-SVN. This group is based in New York City and has consistently provided VVAW and other movement organizations with information concerning the situation in the South of Vietnam. They do not charge anything for much of their literature and the rest is nominal in cost. We would suggest that any chapter that is interested in obtaining good leaflets and information on the struggle of the Vietnamese people should contact them. If it is at all possible for you to send along a little bread with your orders, do it. They've earned it. DON'T TALK TO THE FBI -

During the past few months we have been getting a steady flow of reports of FBI agents contacting VVAW people around the country. During the past few months we have concurrently been putting out a steady stream of advice: DON'T TALK TO THE GODDAMN FBI! Nonetheless we continue to get calls from righteous brothers and sisters telling us how they just talked with FBI agent so and so but that "they didn't learn anything they didn't already know." Somewhere there seems to be a communication gap in this steady stream of advice. So, here we go again. (PLEASE REFER TO NEWSLETTER #3 WHICH REPRINTED AN ARTICLE FROM KENT STATE VVAW ABOUT HOW TO DEAL WITH THE FBI.)

Elgin Slide Show -

The Elgin, Illinois Chapter has updated its slide show, presented at the Chicago National Steering Committee, since the cease-fire, and it is now entitled, "An Honorable Peace?". Copies can be purchased, complete with sound track for \$25. The rate is \$60 for people outside of this organization. REGIONAL NEWS

DeKalb, Illinois Report -

Now that DeKalb is going to be the regional office (effective after the April NSCM) people should know where we came from. The catalyst for our development was the mining of Haiphong. Tom Litney and Stan Taylor got together and decided it was time to get things going. Since then, we have grown to about 18 active members. The chapter began with rallies, Armed Forces Day action, trips to Cairo, the Republican Convention, mass leafleting, and participation in marches. Our most successful action was an anti-recruiting guerrilla theater put on in the University Center with the help of Bart Savage and Joe Petzel.

We have spent most of our time and efforts in educating ourselves and others, and in conjunction with this we are developing a revolutionary library. We worked with the DeKalb Anti-war Workgroup whose membership was in large part VVAW members. We showed slides and movies, brought in speakers, and held an information fair. We are having exchange sessions with Indonesian students and rap sessions on the ten objectives. We have set up information tables, have written papers on various subjects, met with several classes and had a lot of individual raps.

We have a PVS program started and are compiling a regional manual of guidelines and information, and have recruited help from the University Health Center's psychiatric staff as a referral service. We have also made ourselves available to the community for help with VA hassles, bad discharges and general hassles, (ie, support for the Powerports basketball team that was kicked out of their intramural league because they didn't believe in the university's macho, competitive philosophy of sports). Our chapter has also supported black teacher Dmitra Gronemeier in her fight against the sexist, racist staff who fired her for her refusal to play their game.

We have come to recognize the need to live as brothers and sisters and develop our politics collectively. The chapter is now run by a collective leadership with a rotating coordinatorship to do the shit work. We began a volleyball team in a men's intramural league with women on the team, but have not been confronted because the other teams have failed to show up. Soon, we may be getting a house for the collective to live in.

As a chapter we hope and look forward to VVAW's eventual conversion to a Winter Soldier organization. We intend to struggle for as long as it takes or to the end of our lives, whichever comes first. We feel the ten objectives can best be obtained by an organization such as Winter Soldier suggests, which can best utilize the available talent.

Redwood City, California Report -

The Redwood City Chapter is actively supporting the Farm Worker's boycott by picketing a local Safeway store one day a week. We are also spreading information about the Farah pants strike and the closing of our county hospital, which has been threatened by the county health department. The chapter has become active in other community organizations; our members participate in a night child care center, the People's Food Co-op, the Chino Defense Committee, the Neighborhood Development Council, and one of the brothers, Frank Milatzo, was just hired by People's Medical Center as an organizer for community fund raising. Frank has also put together a People's News Service which receives input from the local movement groups as well as sources such as Asian News Service. He passes on the information through a weekly talk show on a cable TV channel, a weekly news show on the Stanford University radio station, and through some contacts that he has developed at a commercial FM station and at KPFA (Pacifica) in Berkeley. Another vet, Jesse Young, has some programming going at Foothill College radio station. The value of this could be demonstrated by a visit of someone from the Gainesville Defense Committee, for example, at which time we could make tapes for use at the cable TV station, as well as three or four radio stations.

The chapter has several members at nearby Canada College where the VVAW will sponsor a Political Awareness Film Program. Some vets there also laid a list of demands on the Junior College Board. While they haven't fired the College President yet, one immediate response was provisions for a Free Speech Hour each day.

Looking ahead, a consensus of opinion would show that the members are willing to mobilize for actions like Thieu's visit to San Clemente, but as the situation in Indochina has changed, so we must change. We expect to continue our involvement in other progressive organizations and community issues and thereby learn to better serve the people.

Milwaukee, Wisconsin Report -

In response to a growing need among people in our community due to the rising cost of food, VVAW has begun an East Side outlet of the Milwaukee Food Buying Co-op. In the true sense of 'serve the people', we are trying to establish viable alternatives to the government, and at the same time educating people as to the reasons for our doing this.

So far, the response from the people has been absolutely incredible. In four weeks our total order has jumped from \$86 to \$189, with 15 family units participating. The reason for this being a 15¢ to 20¢ saving on each item on the list. We are acquiring a storefront in the neighborhood on May 1st, so that we can further expand our operations to SERVE THE PEOPLE!

NATIONAL OFFICE REPORTS -

\$50,000 Bail Set For Gary Lawton -

Recent developments in the trial of Gary Lawton, Nehemiah Jackson and Larrie Gardner have given cause for some limited optimism that these three brothers might be getting out of jail. After having been flatly denied bail for almost two years, the court has finally set a bail of \$50,000 for each of the defendants. While most courts would have immediately released them on personal recognizance bonds after the 9-3 verdict for acquittal in their first trial, it does nonetheless represent a small victory that they now at least have a chance of getting released on bond. The problem of actually raising the \$150,000 is something else altogether!

The trial itself has been scheduled for May 14th in the city of Riverside. To date no judge has been chosen to hear the case. Moving the trial from Indio to Riverside will certainly be a big help to the defense, given the increased visibility and community support they will receive there. John Thorn, George Jackson's old lawyer, was Gary's attorney for the pretrial motions for the second trial. Gary is still without a lawyer for the trial itself but a few attorneys are seriously considering taking the case.

Generally, the RPD is continuing its harassment of the defense effort and of the brothers in jail. Gary's health has improved somewhat but still is subjected to regular abuse by the guards. In addition, seven RPD officers recently broke into the home of a member of the Riverside Political Prisoners Defense Committee without giving any reason for the incident. The officer heading up this squad was Tennell, the same person that headed up the police unit that investigated the Gary Lawton case for the RPD.

The primary problem facing the defense effort, however, is financial. The fundraising situation is desperate. Unless each man can raise the \$50,000 bond, they will be forced to stay in jail for the duration of their second trial. Since their first trial lasted six months, longer than any criminal trial in the history of Riverside or San Bernadino Counties, and since Gary has already spent 23 months in jail - Larry and Nehemiah 17 months - this isn't a very pleasing situation. Without \$150,000 Gary, Larrie and Nehemiah will be forced to stay in jail. They need help raising bail! Research Department Report:

The purpose of the research department is to keep us informed of current developments and trends in US policy and war related technological development. As we assimilate various data, certain lies and contradictions have become apparent. Following are briefs of some information that we have come across. If anyone has further information or documentation that supports this info please send it to us.

The US has been training British and Brazilian troops at Camp LeJeune, NC. The exercises have involved incursions into Puerto Rico for "riot" training and were ostensibly 'good will' missions. Other countries have been receiving training by US State Police in this country. These actions indicate a general shift in US foreign intervention from use of our troops to use of the indigenous forces for counter-insurgency to prop up new puppet regimes that are pro-US. It is possible that there may be a new type of SEATO alliance formed in the next year where the US maintains its influence, not by direct participation, but through these satellite

regimes:

The main thrust of the Nixon administration is to reduce the visibility of the war, therefore, much of our work is to increase the visibility of the war and to explain its relevance to working, tax paying Americans. Hence, one of our main focuses of research has been on 'civilianization' of the war. The recruiting of civilian forces to continue our involvement and attempted control of Indochina is a violation in spirit of the whole agreement signed with the Vietnamese. This is a specific violation of Article 5, Chapter 2 and Article 6, Chapter 2. Why is it that the Nixon Administration has millions of US tax dollars to use in an illegal war after the treaty was signed, while there is decreasing aid for medical programs, and hospitals, education, housing, veterans' benefits, unemployment, food, etc.

Nuclear Weapons is another area in which we have been doing research. We received a call from Colorado VVAW who informed us that they received information on the transfer of the 134th Air Combat Wing from Offutt AFB, Nebraska to Thailand. The 134th has the triggering devices for nuclear weapons. We have heard from some former NSA people that there have been nuclear weapons stored in Thailand for several years. This transfer was to take place in the early part of January, just following the intense bombing of Hanoi and Haiphong. When we received this information we relayed it to friends in Washington DC, where hearings were in progress concerning some of Nixon's new appointees. The day after we called, official questioning were made on the US policy of using nuclear weapons in Indochina. During this time, Clements, one of Nixon's appointees admitted publicly that the possibility of using nukes in Indochina had not been ruled out. Because of international and some Congressional pressure, the US cancelled this transfer of the 134th.

Winter Soldier -

The paper should be serving a two-fold purpose; internal dissemination and mass outreach. The Chicago Chapter has sold Winter Soldier on the streets and to book stores and has sold over 200 copies. This not only brings in money for the chapter, but lets people know who and where we are politically.

It is really not enough to just pass it among friends. **DISSEMINATE TO EDUCATE.**

The next issue of Winter Soldier will be off the presses before the NSCM. Please notify us, ASAP, if you want us to bring your region's copies to New Mexico. We would strongly advise this to regions that have large CCD bills. Regions that are fairly close to Chicago should consider driving here once a month to pick the papers up. Regions on the East and West coast should particularly let us know about bringing the papers to New Mexico.

For those chapters that will submit articles for any issue, please be concise and have them type written, double-spaced. Remember the paper is only 16 pages.

Buttons -

The national collective has finally ordered both VVAW and I Support VVAW buttons, but they will not be ready for delivery for a couple of weeks. If chapters are interested in obtaining some, keep in mind that due to a financial strain, we ordered only 2500 of each. If chapters have no means of ordering buttons from their own sources, please order from us, but again, remember to be (ugghh!!) conservative as 5000 buttons must supply the entire organization for the time being.

Please have the statements notarized, as I would like to present them as evidence in a bad discharge case where my client waived all his rights under the coercive conditions at LBJ. All sources mentioned herein have furnished reliable information in the past.

On July 27, 1972, Springfield Confidential Source 1 advised that Vietnam Veterans Against the War (VVAW) as a group had no part in the demonstrations against the war in Vietnam, which took place at Southern Illinois University (SIU), Carbondale, Illinois, May 9-11, 1972, resulting in the arrest of approximately seventy persons. Source indicated that VVAW is a defunct organization at Southern Illinois University, not having held a meeting since around December, 1971. Source 1 stated that VVAW was formed as a local chapter at SIU and did not become affiliated with the national or regional organizations of VVAW. Source 1 advised subject was affiliated with VVAW at SIU and is currently enrolled for the summer quarter, 1972. Subject's Social Security Account Number is [REDACTED] Home address unknown. Source 1 further advised subject was not observed as a participant in demonstrations at SIU in May, 1972, has no known current affiliations with militant or new left groups, and is not regarded as violent.

The VVAW was founded in the spring of 1967, by six young Vietnam Veterans in New York City. At the beginning of 1968, with 600 members, VVAW opened a national office, founded the first GI newspaper "Vietnam GI", and sent close to five hundred veterans into the McCarthy Campaign to beat down the red baiters. After getting gassed at the Democratic Convention at Chicago and caught in the general "down" of the peace movement, VVAW was nearly inactive until the moratoriums in the fall of 1969. Members of VVAW led student strikes on major campuses across the country and battled Veterans Administration Hospital authorities over threats to throw amputee Vietnam Veterans out for signing anti-war petitions. At present, membership of the VVAW, nationally, consists of eight thousand five hundred members.

On October 20, 1972, Springfield Confidential Source 3 advised that VVAW at SIU first became active the beginning of the 1971 fall quarter; remained local in nature and never joined with VVAW, incorporated, although this was considered on several occasions. At no time was the SIU group ever involved in violent demonstrations. All their protests were peaceful and legitimate. Beginning about January, 1972, the activity of the VVAW at SIU decreased and the group has since become inactive and no organized activity exists at the present time.

On October 20, 1972, Source 1 advised that subject is not presently affiliated with any organized protest or revolutionary group at SIU. Subject's only affiliation at SIU was with VVAW and while this association existed did not advocate or participate in violent or revolutionary activity.

Source 2 advised December 26, 1972 that subject has not pre-enrolled for the spring quarter at SIU-Carbondale but that this is not a definite indication that subject has no plans of enrolling. Due to computerization of records, it is not possible to determine if subject's transcript has been forwarded to another school.

Source 1 advised February 26, 1973, that subject's name has not come up as being involved in any violent or revolutionary activity at Southern Illinois University (SIU). A review of the current student register at SIU on February 26, 1973, reflects that subject is not currently enrolled.

Another Governmental Agency advised March 14, 1973 that there is no record of subject ever having served in the United States Armed Forces.



On February 22, 1972, subject's name was obtained from a Vietnam Veterans Against the War (VVAW) list prepared for the purpose of distributing its newspaper, "HOA BINH" and lists members and supporters of VVAW in the regional areas of Colorado, Wyoming and Utah. The VVAW was founded in the spring of 1967 by six young Vietnam veterans in New York City. At the beginning of 1968, with 600 members, VVAW opened a national office, founded the first GI newspaper, "Vietnam GI," and sent close to 500 veterans into the McCarthy campaign to beat down the red baiters. After getting gassed at the Democratic Convention in Chicago and caught in the general "down" of the peace movement, VVAW was nearly inactive until the moratoriums in the fall of 1969. Members of VVAW led student strikes on major campuses across the country and battled Veterans Administration Hospital authorities over threats to throw amputee Vietnam veterans out for signing anti-war petitions. At present, membership of the VVAW, nationally, consists of 8,500 members u

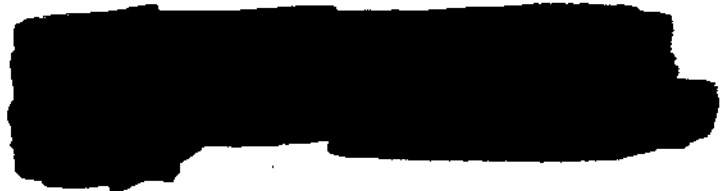

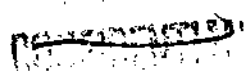

On 3/29/73, [redacted] Cincinnati, Ohio, PD, Intelligence Unit, advised that members of the VVAW would depart on 3/29/73, for Wounded Knee, South Dakota, carrying food and clothing. On the same date, [redacted] (who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised that he learned directly from [redacted] VVAW, that the group had changed plans and joined forces with MOU and RU. Source advised that the departure date had been set for the morning of 3/31/73. Source stated that the group would start in Cincinnati, Ohio, and travel to Miami University in Oxford, Ohio, where they would join other units which would be loaded with additional supplies. The group was thereafter to proceed to Wounded Knee, South Dakota.

On 3/29/73, [redacted] advised that a speech would be given at Miami University at 8:00 p.m. on 3/28/73. Source advised that approximately 1,200 students attended this speech and that five Indians made three talks. The Indians stated that they represented the Cleveland American Indians Center located in Cleveland, Ohio. The speaker stated the supplies including food and medicine would be collected on 3/29/73 and 3/30/73, and then transported to Wounded Knee, on Saturday, 3/31/73.

On Saturday, 3/31/73, Cincinnati Agents surveyed locations from which the caravan was scheduled to depart. No vehicles or activity were noticed at these locations. The Cincinnati Agents then drove to Miami University at Oxford, Ohio, where a surveillance was set up on vehicles suspected of participating in the caravan to Wounded Knee.

At 4:15 p.m. on 3/31/73, a caravan of four vehicles departed Oxford, Ohio, en route to Wounded Knee. Approximately one hour after the caravan left Oxford, Ohio, two of the vehicles returned to Oxford and two continued on the journey to Wounded Knee. A surveillance was reinstated at Oxford on the returning vehicles and it was determined that they carried a minimum of supplies and obviously did not intend to return to Wounded Knee.

On 4/1/73, a member of the two vehicle caravan stopped Omaha Agents in Sioux City, Iowa, and advised that his group were taking food and clothing to the Reverend NOAH BROKEN LEG, at Bishop Harris High School in Mission, South Dakota. The individual advised that the food and clothing had been collected as a result of a drive sponsored by Miami University at Oxford, Ohio, and further advised that his group did not wish to be arrested and had no intention of going to Wounded Knee but were only representatives from Oxford, Ohio, who had volunteered to deliver the food and clothing. The individual voluntarily allowed both vehicles to be searched by FBI Agents and nothing was located but food and clothing.

On 3/20/73, AUSA NORBERT A. NADEL advised that he would decline prosecution on any of the individuals involved under the Antiriot Laws Statute in view of the lack of probable cause. AUSA NADEL advised that if any additional aggravating circumstances should be developed he would reconsider prosecution. In view of the above, since no guns or ammunition were transported and since the drivers of the vehicles did not intend to go directly into Wounded Knee and since the AUSA declined prosecution, no further investigation is being conducted in this matter. However, investigation has been instituted within the Cincinnati Division on all individuals who participated in the caravan to Wounded Knee.

On May 3, 1973, a source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, reported the VVAW groups in the State of Washington are not functioning to any effective degree. Meetings are not being held on a regular basis and there does not appear to be any planned program of action. At the present time the focus of attention of the limited membership is on the following items:

1. The continuing military action by the United States in Southeast Asia.
2. Amnesty for draft evaders and deserters.
3. Veteran's benefits.
4. Post-Vietnam Syndrome (PVS).

To protest No. 1 above, a demonstration is being considered for the Seattle area on May 12, 1973, using the war and amnesty as rallying points.

With regard to point 2, the national office of the VVAW has made Portland, Oregon the center of amnesty action for the United States.

With regard to point 3, a demonstration which may be called DEWEY CANYON, III, is being considered for June, 1973, at Olympia, Washington (the State Capital) to protest cuts in veterans' benefits.

Regarding point 4, a conference sponsored by the VVAW in cooperation with the University of Washington, Seattle, is being considered for about May 17, 1973, regarding the PVS, which was not further identified as to the nature of this syndrome.

An attempt was made by the national VVAW office to impose a centrist (Stalinist) type organization on the entire VVAW organization. Among the proposals from the national office were:

1. Install regional officers sent from the national office.
2. Control VVAW activities from the top.
3. Expel all VVAW members who are also affiliated with the Progressive Labor Party (PLP).

The Progressive Labor Party (PLP) was founded in 1962 by individuals expelled from the Communist Party, USA, for following the Chinese communist line. Its objective is the establishment of a militant working-class movement based on Marxism-Leninism and MAO Tse-tung thought.

These three proposals were dropped after a storm of defiance was raised by the various regions. The national office leadership presently appears to be very weak. Unless they can stage a remarkable comeback, they probably will be "thrown out" at the next national meeting. An implication of the weakness was shown recently when a national conference was called for in New Mexico at the end of April, 1973, and then canceled by the national office. No known date or place has been set for a new conference.

On February 20, 1973, a teletype was received from the San Diego Division which was also furnished to the Bureau and Los Angeles, advising that a confidential source of the San Diego Office stated that the VVAW Regional Conference was held in Santa Barbara, California, on February 16 - 18, 1973, and that a reference was made to a proposed "Winter Soldier Investigation." The purpose of the Winter Soldier Investigation according to the source was to inform the public about nuclear and hydrogen bomb storage sites, radio activity, and other dangers created as a result of existence of these devices, possibly in Japan. This information was reportedly compiled for future possible presentation before the United States Senate and the San Diego source stated that there were people in high Government positions and in the Pentagon willing to testify regarding this matter.

The San Diego Office requested Los Angeles and San Francisco to contact any sources who were in attendance at the VVAW Regional Conference at Santa Barbara for additional information concerning the Winter Soldier Investigation and furnish any information to the Bureau.

The file indicates that this communication was initialed for the file by SA [REDACTED] and there is no indication that any attempt was made to query our sources in the VVAW concerning this information. In conversation with SA [REDACTED] he stated that it was his position that none of the San Francisco sources were specifically sent to the VVAW conference and, therefore, he did not feel it was necessary to contact any sources.

SA [redacted] is requested to explain why he failed to relay this information to Agents handling VVAW sources since the possibility exists that although the San Francisco Office did not send any of their sources to the conference at Santa Barbara, some may have attended or our sources may have been in contact with persons who did in fact attend and would, therefore, have information concerning the Winter Soldier Investigation.
