To request that Information Management Division (IMD) PURPOSE: conduct a search of general indices to identify any person on the attached list that has an individual file reflecting activities in or affiliation with the National Lawyers Guild (NLG) and its projects and to appropriately label the file to insure compliance with the attached settlement.

(1) That IMD conduct a search of general indices RECOMMENDATION: to determine whether any individual on the attached list has a file identifiable with the NLG or its projects.

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(2) That IMD place a copy of the attached settlement in each file identified or otherwise appropriately label each file to insure compliance with the attached settlement.

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On 10/12/90, the parties to the captioned civil action entered into the attached Settlement and Stipulation of Dismissal. The Settlement was approved by the Court on 10/13/90. In addition to a general prohibition on the use or dissemination

of information on the NLG or its projects, the court approved settlement provides that present or former NLG members may request that their individual files which reflect Guild affiliation or activities be similarly withheld. Pursuant to this provision, the NLG has compiled the attached list of individual NLG members who have requested relief under 8c(iv) of the Settlement. 1

Accordingly, IMD is requested to identify any individual on the attached list who has a file reflecting NLG affiliation or activities which was created prior to 3/1/77. Any identified file should be appropriately labeled to insure non-disclosure as required by the settlement. Please advise Legal Counsel Division as to the results of the indices search, including the number of individual files identifiable with the NLG, individuals for whom no file could be located or are not identical, and the actions taken to comply with the order. In addition, please preserve all search slips in case we are required to respond to the Court regarding our compliance. It is likely that no files will be identified with a substantial number of the individuals on the attached list. Finally, inasmuch as the Settlement applies to all FBI files, the Field should also be requested to conduct indices searches and to appropriately label their files.

We recognize that this is a time-consuming chore that is being imposed on IMD during a time of limited resources. Nevertheless, we have made this commitment to the court and we are

STIPULATION AND

ORDER OF SETTLEMENT

AND DISMISSAL

77 Civ. 999 (PKL)

IT IS HEREBY STIPULATED AND AGREED by and among the parties as follows:

- The parties agree to settle and compromise this action on the terms indicated below.
- 2. This action is hereby dismissed with prejudice as to all defendants except the City of New York, <u>i.e.</u>, the "federal defendants."
- and for its administrators, successors and assigns releases and forever discharges, the United States of America, its departments, agencies and past or present officials, officers and employees (and their heirs, executors, administrators, successors and assigns) from all claims whatsoever, in law, admiralty, or equity, which plaintiff and its administrators, successors and assigns hereafter can, shall or may have for, upon or by reason of any surveillance, investigation, disruption, or similar conduct by the Federal Bureau of Investigation ("FBI") directed toward the National Lawyers Guild (the "Guild") at any time prior to the date of this stipulation; provided, however, that

plaintiff is entitled to rely upon the federal defendants' representations set forth in paragraph 7 below, and any claim based upon any conduct of the federal defendants inconsistent with such representations shall not be barred by the above release.

- 4. Each party shall bear the costs and expenses of this litigation as they have been incurred or paid as of the date of this stipulation and no costs or expenses shall be taxed subsequently. Plaintiff and its attorneys waive all claims for attorneys' fees and expenses in connection with the prosecution of this action.
- 5. This stipulation and agreement does not constitute an admission by the plaintiff that any of the conduct of the federal defendants was lawful, or an admission by the federal defendants or any of their present or former officials, officers or employees that any of their conduct was unlawful or legally actionable.
- 6. Without conceding the legality or illegality of any of the federal defendancs' actions, the parties agree that the discovery in this case has shown the following:
- a. The FBI engaged in extensive activities with respect to the Guild for the period 1940 through March 1975, and in the course of those activities generated voluminous files on the Guild.
- b. It appears more likely than not that between 1940 and 1951 the FBI surreptitiously entered the Guild's national office approximately 7 times without judicial warrant or

Attorney General authorization and copied the Guild's internal records. Some of the material thus obtained provided the Government in advance with drafts of a report the Guild was planning to release criticizing FBI surveillance practices, and with details of the Guild's related public campaign calling for an investigation of the FBI. The FBI used this material in an effort to counter the Guild's report even before its issuance.

- c. The FBI without judicial warrant maintained a wiretap on the Guild's national office telephone between 1947 and 1951.
- d. Information derived from the surreptitious entries formed a material part of the information placed before the Attorney General for his consideration in deciding whether to initiate proceedings to designate the Guild as a subversive organization under the Federal Employment Loyalty Security Program, Executive Order 10450. Such designation proceedings were begun in 1953.
- e. The FBI received information from an informant on the national executive board of the Guild in 1953 and 1954 who reported on its deliberations and discussions with counsel concerning the Guild's defense of the EO 10450 administrative designation proceedings and its conduct of related litigation against the Government.
- f. In 1958, the Department of Justice determined that on the basis of the evidence then available it was unable to go forward with the designation proceedings, and the Attorney General therefore rescinded the proposal to designate the Guild

as a subversive organization under EO 10450. There were no further proceedings against the Guild under EO 10450.

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- g. The FBI continued its activities with respect to the Guild after the designation proceedings were discontinued in 1958. A Department of Justice review conducted in 1972 of the FBI's files on the Guild for the preceding five years concluded that there was no basis at that time for an investigation of the Guild under the Internal Security Act of 1950. In 1974-1975 the FBI, with Department of Justice authorization, conducted a preliminary inquiry concerning the Guild's prison work without discovering any basis for a further investigation.
- h. Alleged or suspected criminal wrongdoing was not the predicate or reason for FBI activity concerning the Guild. No criminal prosecutions of the Guild were ever authorized or undertaken by the Department of Justice.
- i. From 1940 through the early 1970's, the FBI placed Guild members on its Security Index, Adex and related indices because of their leadership positions in the Guild or, in some cases, because of their membership in the Guild in conjunction with their actual or suspected membership in other organizations.
- j. The FBI engaged in certain COINTELPRO and similar disruptive operations against the Guild and Guild members. The FBI used information it had derived from its other activities with respect to the Guild and Guild members for that purpose.

The FBI over several decades provided information from its files on the Guild affiliation and activities of individuals to the National Conference of Bar Examiners at the request of the NCBE. 1. Further, at various times in its activities with respect to the Guild, the FBI used numerous informants and confidential sources, including Guild members and staff and third parties in contact with the Guild; obtained Guild bank records from banks with which the Guild had banking relations; obtained information from the National Conference of Bar Examiners and from some character committees: monitored trash covers on the Guild; and obtained information about the Guild from its surveillance of the law offices of some Guild members, which surveillance included use of trash covers, wiretaps, informants on the temporary or permanent staff of the law offices, bank records and surreptitious entries. The conclusions stated here do not imply that the FBI did or did not engage in other activities. The federal defendants represent as follows: There is not now, and has not been since a. March 1977, any FBI investigation or preliminary inquiry of any nature of the Guild or its chapters, or of its projects, activities or enterprises readily identifiable as such or of individuals based upon their Guild affiliation or activities, and the FBI does not presently have information warranting any such investigation or preliminary inquiry. 5 -

- b. To the extent, if any, that FBI inquiries or investigation of third parties has resulted in surveillance or acquisition of information about the Guild since March 1, 1977, no information so acquired has been stored in FBI investigative (i.e., non-litigation) main files on the Guild or its projects (as specified in Appendix A hereto) or see-referenced or otherwise indexed to the Guild or its projects, except as may have been disclosed to the plaintiff in this litigation.
- c. There have been no additions to FBI investigative (i.e., non-litigation) main files on the Guild or its projects (as specified in Appendix A) or to see-references on the Guild or its projects, since March 1977, except as may have been disclosed to the plaintiff in this litigation.
- d. The FBI is not now, and has not since March 1977, engaged in any activities intended to disrupt or impede the activities of the Guild or the Guild activities of its members, or the activities of individuals based upon their Guild affiliation.
- e. The FBI does not now, and has not since March 1977, used Guild members as informants or confidential sources with respect to matters involving the Guild or Guild activities, placed wiretaps or pen registers on Guild telephones, surreptitiously entered Guild premises, obtained access to Guild bank records, maintained mail covers on Guild mail, maintained trash covers on the Guild, obtained access to Guild information at mailhouses used by the Guild, otherwise secured mailing or

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membership lists of the Guild or obtained phone records on the Guild's phones.

- f. Since March 1, 1977, and presently, the FBI has not provided information on the Guild affiliation or activities of individuals to the National Conference of Bar Examiners or to bar admission committees.
- 8. The federal defendants agree to the following disposition of their files concerning the plaintiff:
- a. For purposes of this provision, the "FBI files on the Guild" means Headquarters, Field Office and Legat main files on the National Lawyers Guild and its projects (as specified in Appendix A); wiretap logs included in the main file on Robert Silberstein; EBF's to the Guild main files and the wiretap logs in the Silberstein main file; the see-reference cards and any other similar computerized or non-computerized reference capable of locating Guild-related information in files other than main files on the Guild, as well as references to the Guild in the Elsur Index and any indices to the informant files; and copies of the foregoing and any summaries thereof included in the FBI file on this litigation (62-117572). It is limited to documents created prior to the date of this stipulation.
- b. Within 180 days after the date of this stipulation, the FBI shall place all copies of the "FBI files on the Guild" in its possession or custody in secure storage under the supervision of the Deputy Assistant Director, Legal Counsel Division, and shall not dispose of, or permit access to, such

files before the year 2025. At that time the files may be transferred to the National Archives and Records Service.

- c. The federal agencies which are parties defendant to this action (specifically, the FBI, the Central Intelligence Agency, the National Security Agency, the Internal Revenue Service, the Office of Personnel Management, the Postal Service, and the Departments of Defense, Justice, State, the Treasury, the Army, the Navy and the Air Force) shall not use, release or disclose, within or outside the Government:
 - (i) any "FBI files on the Guild" readily identifiable as such, or copies thereof, in their possession or custody;
 - (ii) any portion of any document or record which is shown on its face to have been generated, prior to the date of this stipulation, in the course of any FBI activities directed in whole or in part toward the Guild, to the extent it concerns the Guild or its activities or the Guild affiliation or Guild activities of any individual;
 - (iii) any information contained in(i) and (ii) or reasonably identifiable ashaving been derived from (i) and (ii); or

- (iv) any portion of any document or record created prior to March 1, 1977, or the information contained therein, to the extent that it mentions the Guild affiliation or Guild activities of any individual, provided, however, that because of the federal defendants' representation of the practical impossibility of assuring compliance with such broad restrictions, the following limitations shall apply:
 - (a) With respect to documents or records of defendant federal agencies other than the FBI, this subparagraph (iv) shall apply only to such documents or records as are contained in a file the subject of which is either the Guild or a "Requesting Individual" (as defined below).
 - (b) With respect to documents or records of the FBI, this subparagraph (iv) shall apply only to such documents or records as are contained in a main file the subject of which is a "Requesting Individual" (as defined below), or in a volume containing see-references to the Guild, or in serials which are see-referenced to a

Requesting Individual (but only to the extent that such serials are accessed through the name of the Requesting Individual).

a present or former Guild member who requests, in writing, that this subparagraph (iv) be applied to him or her, and who includes in such request his or her full name, any previous names, date and place of birth, and social security number. Such information is required to identify relevant documents and records and will not be used for any other purpose. Requests must be sent to plaintiff's counsel and forwarded by them to counsel for the federal defendants within 180 days of the date of this stipulation.

d. Nothing herein shall preclude any agency from returning to the FBI any "FBI files on the Guild" or copies thereof in its possession (in which event the FBI shall handle such files as provided in subparagraph (b) above), or from disposing of any files by either destroying them in the ordinary course of business, or transferring them to the National Archives and Records Service in or after the year 2025. The United States Attorney's Office for the Southern District of New York will

return any copies of the "FBI files on the Guild" in its possession to the FBI within 90 days of the date of this Stipulation.

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e. If, upon the application of a third party, subparagraphs (b) or (c) above, or any portion thereof, shall be invalidated by any court, no other provision of this stipulation and order shall thereby be affected.

- notwithstanding, the Department of Justice may have access to and use of any of the documents and records described in subparagraphs (a), (b) and (c) above to the extent relevant and material to the defense of the United States or any of its departments, agencies, officers or employees in any judicial or administrative proceedings the gravamen of which arises from conduct alleged to have occurred prior to the date of this stipulation. Appropriate records shall be maintained of any such use. Upon completion of the litigation for which the records were necessary, they and any records derived from them shall be restored to the status quo ante except if they were filed as part of the court record in the litigation.
- g. Nothing in this stipulation shall preclude the Guild from requesting the release to it, under the Freedom of Information Act or any successor statutes, of those portions of the "FBI files on the Guild" not previously released to it, or the FBI from releasing the same to the Guild if appropriate under such statutes; provided, however, that the Guild shall make no such request prior to January 1, 1994.

h. Nothing in this stipulation shall preclude the federal defendants from releasing or disclosing any document or file at the request or with the authorization of the subject of such document or file.

VVAW/WSO was organized in New York City in 1967 as an organization of Vietnam veterans to protest the American involvement in the war in Southeast Asia. VVAW/WSO engaged in various protest activities but during late 1971 demonstrated increasing militancy, culminating in December, 1971, with WAW/WSO takeover of various American landmarks and public buildings. Information was also developed indicating that some VVAW/WSO chapters were cooperating with or infiltrated by communist-dominated groups including the Communist Party, USA, and the Socialist Workers Party. Certain VVAW/WSO leaders were quoted as telling members VVAM/WSO is a revolutionary organization and not just another group of war veterans. VVAM/WSO leaders have traveled to North Vietnam and have reportedly established liaison with revolutionary or terrorist groups internationally. During July, 1972, VVAN/NSO leaders and members were indicted by a Federal Grand Jury, Tallahassee, for violation of Federal statutes, including conspiracy to riot during Republican National Convention, August, 1972. One of these individuals was also indicted for possession of an unregistered explosive and incendiary device. In January, 1973, at a National Steering Committee meeting, VVAW/WSO leaders discussed programs aimed at obtaining support from or influencing active duty military personnel. They also discussed obtaining access to classified Government information to be used against United States interests and one leader subsequently actively engaged in such activity. There were also indications at this meeting that VVAW/WSO activists possessed the technical knowledge and training to carry out any revolutionary program proposed. In addition, information has been reported from a source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, that a VVAW/WSO member previously discussed engaging in sabotage and was possibly involved in the destruction of a munitions train in Arizona. VVAW/WSO is currently headquartered in Chicago, Illinois.



First source continued to advise as follows

The convoy stopped near Louisville, Kentucky, during the night of July 28, 1973, and met part of the Ohio contingent. Everyone set up camp and went to bed. There were no meetings regarding the Gainesville triaka u

On July 29, 1973, the Ohio contingent departed on their own, leaving one car behind which joined the Milwaukee convoy. Nothing transpired during the day. The convoy made camp near Atlanta, Georgia. Everyone was tired from traveling all day, so all went to sleep.

On July 30, 1973, the convoy departed the camp site outside of Atlanta and proceeded on to Gainesville. The convoy arrived in Gainesville in the late afternoon, and identification cards were issued to all members of the convoy as these cards were part of VVAW security. The convoy proceeded to a designated camping area where everyone and the cars were stamped and checked over by VVAW people out of Tampa, Florida, who were in charge of security. Due to the rainy weather, nothing transpired, with the exception of setting up camp and going to town for necessary supplies

On July 31, 1973, a general assembly was held at the camp site, with the main spokesmen being Brian Adams and Discussion took place regarding an incident which

other men, were wanted by Gainesville police for beating up another men named who was installing portable latrines at the case site. Supposedly stole a gun from has a grudge against the VVAW as he was proviously turned down for membership within the VVAW organization. Discussion took place concerning a nightly silent candlelight vigil to show support for the "Gainesville 8." It was amounced that Judge Arnow had instituted a "gag rule" which prohibited anyone from making any statements concerning the trial. Those violating this "gag rule" would undoubtedly face a isil sentence. Any statements should be cleared through as he would be the one handling press relations or issuing statements on behalf of the VVAWAR A.

A silent candlelight vigil was held in front of the courthouse during the evening hours until approximately 10:00 p.m. Approximately 140-180 people attended this vigil. No arrests nor incidents occurred.

On August 1, 1973, everyone rose early as only 45 people were allowed in the courtroom. Those interested in attending had to get to the courthouse at an early hour to get in line for a seat. Others went out to picket various business establishments. During the late afternoon, the VVAW held a guerrilla theater in front of the courthouse. This theater consisted of skits depicting various viblent harassment-type tactics being displayed by the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI), Secret Service, the Central Intelligence Agency (CIA), and other law enforcement personnel against the VVAW and members. The Milwaukee Chapter put on a skit on what it is like to be a Vietnam veteran. There was no discussion of any violent-type strategy to be displayed at the trial. The main leader or coordinator for the protest activities seemed to be a veteran who was in a wheelchair named Ron Covac (phonetic).

Daring the skits, an unidentified individual came out of the courthouse yelling, "FBI was caught bugging at the trial." This was a big menale booster for the protesters, and the general concesses among the VVAW was that the whole courthouse was bugged by the FBI. After the guerrilla theater ended, a silent condlelight vigil continued outside the courthouse until approximately 10:00 p.m.

On August 2, 1973, everyone was up early to get seats at the trial. Picketing continued at the business establishments. During the evening, a general assembly was held at the camp site. The assembly consisted of the "Gainesville 8" lawyers bringing everyone up to date regarding the trial. They also explained some of the technicalities of courtroom procedure. This assembly lasted for about one hour, and then everyone proceeded to the courthouse for an all-night vigil. Approximately 150-180 people attended, where one torch remained lighted; however, the crowd dwindled with approximately 30 people staying through the night.

The following VVAW regions were represented at Gainesville:

Wisconsin, California, New Mexico, New York, Michigan, Colorado, Kansas, New Jersey, Florida, Texas, and Ohio.

There seemed to be excellent communication between the VVAW and local authorities, as well as with Federal authorities; thus, all activities seemed to run smoothly with little problem and no major confrontations.

One unidentified individual was reportedly being arrested for violation of the "gag rule." The Gainesville police constantly had people patrolling the area and walking through the camp grounds. They were easily identified as they were shirts with Gainesville police printed on the outside. They were generally accepted by the VVAW, as long as they identified themselves.



PURPOSE:

This is to set forth a brief summary of topics of discussion at captioned conference.

St. Louis has determined that this conference concluded at 10:30 p. m. 8/27/73 and that 66 individuals were in attendance. Surveillances conducted by St. Louis disclosed 54 vehicles from 15 states were driven by individuals who attended.

Topics discussed included organizing the VVAW/WSO in prisons, Veterans Administration hospitals and military bases in foreign countries by using a "military out reach program." Delegates also received instructions in electronic surveillance consisting of detecting and jamming FBI radio frequencies. The national office reported receipt of a letter from an unidentified high Government official in Cambodia who praised the VVAW/WSO for its good work in the U.S.

Invitations were extended to those in attendance to attend a VVAW/WSO sponsored Labor Day parade in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, and to attend Attica demonstrations set for 9/6-16/73 in Buffalo, New York.

We had informants from five field offices in attendance at this conference who will be debriefed immediately upon their return and more detailed information will be obtained

This investigation is based on information which indicates that captioned organization is engaged in activities which could involve violations of Title 13, U. S. Code 2383 (Rebellion or Insurrection), 2384 (Seditious Conspiracy), 2385 (Advocating Overthrow of the Government), 2387 (Sedition), 793 (Espionage), 844 (Explosives and Incendiary Devices), 2155-56 (Sabotage), and 2101 (Antiriot Laws).

VVAW/WSO was organized in New York City in 1967 as an organization of Vietnam veterans to protest the American involvement in the war in Southeast Asia. VVAW/WSO engaged in various protest activities but during late 1971 demonstrated increasing militancy, culminating in December, 1971 with VVAW/WSO takeover of various American landmarks and public buildings. Information was also developed indicating that some VVAW/WSO chapters were cooperating with or infiltrated by communist-dominated groups including the Communist Party, USA, and the Socialist Workers Party. Certain VVAW/WSO leaders were quoted as telling members VVAW/WSO is a revolutionary organization and not "just another group of war veterans." VVAW/WSO leaders have traveled to North Vietnam and have reportedly established liaison with revolutionary or terrorist groups internationally. During July, 1972, VVAW/WSO leaders and members were indicted by a Federal Grand Jury, Tallahassee, for violation of Federal statutes, including

conspiracy to riot during Republican National Convention, August, 1972. One of these individuals was also indicted for possession of an unregistered explosive and indendiary device. In January, 1973 at a National Steering Committee meeting, VVAW/WSO leaders discussed programs simed at obtaining support from or influencing active duty military personnel. They also discussed obtaining access to classified Government information to be used against U.S. interests and one leader subsequently actively engaged in such activity. There were also Andications at this meeting that VVAW/WSO activists possessed the technical knowledge and training to carry out any revolutionary program proposed. In addition, information has been reported from a source who has furnished reliable information in the past, that a VVAW/WSO mem ber previously discussed engaging in sabotage and was possibly involved in the destruction of a munitions train in Arizona. VVAW/WSO is currently headquartered in Chicago, Illinois.

On August 6, 1973, advised that VVAW/WINTER SOLDIER chapters located in the Midwest Region panned to hold a Regional Conference in Joplin, Missouri the weekend of August 11 - 12, 1973. Plans were subsequently changed and this meeting was held in Kansas City on August 18, 1973.



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



WATERGATE-IN PERSPECTIVE

by Dick Goldensohn

The real scandal, of course, is not what happened at the Water-gate on how it was dealt with by officials in the Justice Department or 21 the White House. The real scandal is the manner in which the entire country is run by a relatively small group of males in exec-

utive positions in business and government.

The greatest value of the exposes surrounding the Watergate incident is that they give us all a clear, if micro-cosmic view of the behavior of the people in governing circles at a time when a larger view is often obscured by the sheer magnitude and scope of the

larger transgressions.

For example, the present bombing of Cambodia openly co-ordinated by the U.S. Embassy in Phnom Penh, is a much greater crime in every sense than the act of breaking into the Watergate. It is a violation of international law and of American constitutional law, as well as a crime against the innocent people who are its vic-tims. The murder of Fred Hampton at four in the morning was a much greater intrusion of privacy than the photographing of Dan-iel Elisherg's psychiatric records. The activities of Donald Segretti's comparison political soborage may be reprehensible but they pale in comparison with Gen. Lavelle's raids over North Vietnem and that role in substagging peace negotiations.

Reach & B. B. Co. by the law

It may be scandalous for Nixon not to report a \$250,000 con-tribution from a financier in trouble with the SEC, but should it be less of a scandal if it had been reported? Isn't it an even greater scandal that in a supposed democracy almost all important elec-tions are financed by millionaires, often to elect other millionaires who are certain to protect their mutual interests?

len't it really a much larger scandal than Watergate that Nixon

can raise a million dollars at a \$1000 a place dinner (May 9), while millions of Americans are asked to subsist on 50¢ for dinner and many more are not even getting that because of outbacks in the


It may be a scandal that Hunt scied to manufacture cables pointing the finger at Kennody for the murder of Diern, but isn't equally scandalous for Nixon to suggest that Diem was worthy of American support?

Isn't it a scandal when Kissinger excuses the Christmas bombing of Hanoi and Haiphong and then begt us to have compassion for the "tragedy" of those directly implicated in the Watergate bundag?

Watergate may open our eyes to what has been going on inside the government in Washington, but it should not blind us or disthe government in Washington, but it should not blind us or distinct us from seeing the greater outrages of the Nixon Administration. The revelations should serve as a light to make visible what was otherwise darkened and hidden. We third see that its dazzle does not blind us. If this can be done, possibly Wastergate will be the beginning of a long process of moving to a new level of consciousness in the entire country.

We must however, be alors that the people in power will ulti-mately do everything they can to repair the damage, except, of course, change. Their response is typified by a New Jersey poli-tician who said receptly. The first thing we must do to wipe out official corruption is to restine people. Jaith in the government.

It may be that as events and exposes pile up; Nixon will no longer be able to hold on. But even if that happens it will not be an answer to the real scandal. As the observer put it. "The ruling circles may even be willing to secrifice Nixon in order to insur that the investigation goes no further."







"I was involved in an argument with a bar girl over the price of a drink, I was loud. They came in and put ne under military apprehension for drunk in public. think that their red arm-bands entitle them to use unnecessary force in restraining (arresting) GI's, or to out-right heat them. It one point the beatings became so severe that the ex-CO of RAMS-12 went to the Provost Marchall's Office and told an officer there "If any more of my mon get club-

bed, I's going to bring in a night stick and beat you myself!"
Unfortunately, it seems as though none of the commanders on this base seem to genuinely care about this problem. But you, as a snuffle, can fight back. How? No, not with your own night stick, but with the UCHJ. That's right? You can turn the regulations around and shove them up their asses.

If you witness a beating, try to catch the M.P.'s name on his tag. But don't speak to them, or move in too closely - you can get arrested for interference. If you can't read his same, look at his face. Go directly to the PMO and look for this M.P. You have the right to know his name and you can't be arrested for interference once the arrest is over. All you need in the B.P.'s name and rank. At the scene of the arrest you whould have gotten witnesses, people you know and who will write statements in support of your charges. Make note of the time and approximate location.

When you have this information, you go to Wing Legal on Fingeide. The legal office has to except your information and write up the charges on legal forms. In most cases of this nature it would be UCMI article 128 - assumbt.

Two questions you probably have:

Q: Can I write this M.P. up, even though he did not injure me?

- A: Yes, anyone witnessing a crime may charge the persons committing the act.
- Q: What if the M.P. outranks me? Can I still write him up?
- A: Yes on both counts. All persons in the service are subject to the SCMJ, and an E-1 can legally charge a general.





BLACK CAPITALISM A JOKE

The fuss being made in some circles over the 'Black Enterprise, monthly magazine's list of leading Black-owned companies in the U.S., has amused San Francisco Chronicle columnist Milton Moskowitz. Under the heading "Black Capitalism -- Still Just a Trickle" he dramatically points out the fallacy of the Black capitalism concept.

"How strong", Moskowitz asks, "is the Black-owned part of the economy? Well, you can easily assess the strength by noting these salient features:

--The largest company, Motown, wouldn't rank among the 1000 largest industrial corporations in the nation, -- The combined sales of the 100 largest Black -owned companies come to \$473 million. Universal Oil Products, a company that ranks 269 on the Fortune magazine 500 list, does that much business by itself.

--The largest employer is Pitteburg-based All-Pro Enterprises, a hamburger and chicken franchise operation, its reported payroll is 675 employees."

Our printing ranges from 750-850 per issue and all but about 150 are distributed to 61s here in Iwakuni. Starting in October we launched a campaign to force the base to allow GIs the right to distribute the FI off-base. After some struggle on both the legal and the political fronts this was achieved and we conside it a significant victory. Thus since the end of October the FI is being distributed in the streets by GIs for the first time since it was first published 3 years ago.

The overwhelming majority of the articles carried in the FI are written by GIs here in Iwakuni (or Nam Phong). During the discussion on the direction of the FI (see below) we made an analysis of the 5 issues immediately preceding the discussion (Aug 30 to Oct 30) and found that out of a total of 54 articles, 9 were taken from news sources (e.g. PNS, CAMP News, Rising Up Angry etc), 3 were written by civilians attached to the project, and 42 were written by GIs (5 of them collectively and 7 of them mailed in from outside Iwakuni).

In conclusion we feel that the FI is our best and most successful tool in doing political education with the masses of GIs.

2. Over the past 3 months we have developed an increasing number of contacts with the Marines stationed in Nam Phong, Thailand (Rosegarden). The units down there are home based here in Iwakuni and there is a steady interchange of personnel. At this time we send the FI and other literature to about 35 GIs down there. However, we don't know how much of it is getting through. Apparently some gets through and some is stopped. We are making efforts to clarify this situation with the idea of filing some sort of legal action against the Marines for tampering with the mail, but so far we have not been able to get the evidence together. Our responses from Rosegarden have been few. We don't know, again, how much of this is due to a) their not getting our lit and letters, b) their answers being ripped off, and c) they being too stoned to get it together to write. So far it is clear that all of the above reasons are operating to some extent.

Rosegarden is an extremely repressive base with horrible working and living conditions. This dissatisfaction is tremendous. Also tremendous is the supply of grass, opium, and smack. The reaction of most of the GIs is to stay stoned most of the time (the potency of Thai weed is justifiably legendary).

There have been at least two attempts at organization that we know of occurring at Rosegarden. Out of a couple of meetings between men of the squadrons an organization called "the brothers of H.A.D. (Happy Ass Dopers)" was formed. This organization printed and distributed a leaflet, resulting in a bust and eventually the group dissolved (or dissipated in a cloud of smoke). The other major event was when a career traffic controller decided he opposed the war and circulated a petition we had sent him calling in strong language for Nixon to sign the peace treaty. In 2 hours of work he collected over 200 signatures (showing the broad-based anti-war feelin on the base). Eventually repression forced him to destroy the petitions in order to prevent them from falling into the hands of the enemy and they shipped him out of Rosegarden for a time.

activists in a very public way -- "We want to talk to you about the activities of John Radical because we are compiling dossiers on all potential subversives at the base and we know that you are acquainted with the "suspect."

Generally the level of repression has reached an intense level and it has been reflected in the fact that people are afraid to relate to us. Thus as our cadre are shipped out, transferred, discharged, placed on restriction for petty offenses (not uncommon) our numbers are dwindling fast. For example in October there were at least 10 activists working with the movement here on a regular (almost nightly) basis. Now we are down to 4.

4. VVAW organizational matters. This section deals with VVAW as an organization. The major specific activities of VVAW/GI Movement are discussed in separate sections below.

We think that VVAW has provided a good structure for the planning and carrying out of activities. It has enabled us to try to set up a permanent organization rather than an undefined group. However, naturally there have been problems and the real potential of VVAW as an organizational form have not yet been realized. There has been some confusion expressed by some GIs as to what is the relationship between the GI movement, Semper Fi, and VVAW. Some of this confusion stems from simple misunderstanding about the fact that VVAW includes active duty GIs or misunderstanding that the 3 names basically cover the same group of people, and the same activity. This confusion is working itself out and has not seriously hampered us. Although there is a small element of people who oppose YVAW because it is an organization—"I'd work with the GI Movement but not VVAW." For some this comes from a middle-class anti-a organization attitude, for others fear of repercussions from the Marines for joining a group.

In addition to the activities, discussions, etc mentioned in other parts of this report, VVAW has sponsored a number of cultural events, such as trips to places in Japan, bar-B-ques, etc. Also discussions, leaflets, posters, etc. that are not specifically discussed.

In terms of numbers of people relating to the VVAW the attendance at the weekly meetings gives the best picture. The first 4 meetings (Sept) about 10-15 people (three-quarters GIs). The fifth through eleventh meetings (Oct & first half of Nov) about 13-18 per meeting (four-fifths GIs). The 12th & 13th meetings (last half of Nov) November, immediately after Nixon's election, breakdown in peace talks, and the beginning of heavy repression on base) 21 people meeting (4 of them civilians). The last 3 meetings, since the continuance of repression, discharges of activists, transfers, etc. are down to a low of 7-10 (2 civilians).

The structure of the chapter has gone through changes and experimentation which has not yet ended. Initially we had a chairman, vice-chairman structure. This was unsatisfactory as the chairman stopped relating to the chapter soon after election (he was very short) and the vice-chairman only took on the role of chairing meetings (because that was all he was authorized to do). This meant that the work of co-ord-inating activities fell to the civillan activists. At the 6th meeting a huge struggle

This structure held s promise, but unfortunately only one minister seriously carried out his (or her) responsibilities and then he was kidnapped to Nam Phong. The other two ministers: one was chosen as an effort to increase the marginal involvement of a GT who every wanted to see become an activist -- this failed because his ministerial responsibili did not increase his activities and when he dropped out we were left ministerless. The third minister was unable to carry our her duties because she was out of the country for extended periods with her husband (Navy flyer). At the last meeting i was decided to keep trying the minister system (with new ministers) even though the chapter is now very small. The purpose of maintaining the system is so that it wi be in existence and experienced when the chapter grows again.

Three problems manifested themselves in our organizational work, and has made it hard for us to recruit new members. The first was a difficult time developing programs for mass activity. The difficulty is because it is illegal for GIs to participate in demonstrations while in a foreign country. Thus the best organizing tool is taken away from us. Likewise, the off-limits order on the Hobbit hindered

The second problem was cliquishness among the original group of GIs who forme the chapter. This was a tight group that had a network of relationships with each other from before they became political activists. This problem, while struggled with lightly, was never adequately dealt with. It was a failing not to combat this stronger.

The third problem, similar to the second, was bourgeois (middle class) attitue on the part of some of the activists. Such attitudes as competitiveness, one-up-manship, contempt for those with less formal education, materialism, intellectualisets. This is clearly a class question between those GIs who are college bound and see the way for themselves to be upwardly mobile and those who are not college or middle-class oriented. Although there was one criticism-self-criticism session on these problems (which resulted in some marked improvement) these questions were never systematically studied. Another failure has been the lack of making available a substitute orientation for the middle-class orientation. For example discussion of "Serve the People" attitudes vs. competitiveness.

- 5. We have on several occasions tried to initiate a program of Barracks counseling So far it has not proved successful. The GI counselors are reluctant to publicize it due to the probability of repression. There have not been many people who showe up looking for help.
- The Hobbit Nobile Bookstore and Newsstand is now finished and in operation. T is a newstand/bookstore built on a two wheel cart that we take into the streets whe we distribute FIs. We intend to experiment with it on other types of occasions. I provides us with a base to distribute literature and sell books to GIs who are reluctant, or not sufficiently motivated, to come to the house and buy books or get literature. The mobile bookstore is also seen as an ince offensive re-action to the off-limits order against the Hobbit. They placed the Hobbit off-limits to prevent GIs from coming in contact with revolutionary thought, now we are taking the Hobbit bookstore to the GIs in the street.
- 7. We have had a hard time holding pre-scheduled discussion groups. For some reading with a set time and a reading assignment have not been able to get off the ground. We are still trying various forms and methods. There have been several informal, spontane ous d.g. on various issues and subjects. But systematic political

education has not happened. This is a major area of weakness. Below are three of the major discussions/struggled of the past months. In addition to these we have had discussions of Captalism, Socialism, Sexism, Sex, College., Imperialism, Escapism/organics/counter-culture/class, etc. Most of the above topics were spontaneous, un-systematic, cursory, etc. There have been a couple discussions of racism and relationships of Blacks to the VVAW.

The only struggle that has occurred at the project was around the question of leadership. During the course of a meeting in Oct it came time to elect officers. At this point a GI read off a prepared statement condemning the concept of leadership (as inherently elitist and oppressive), opposing, voting on anything as oppressive, proposing that VVAW act as a collective-without formal leadership--operating on the basis of consensus, and expressing the fear that in the future a formal leadership structure would allow a lerder to impose his ideas on the group (although he said he felt that that had not happened as yet). In the course of the discussions that followed he indicated that his beliefs were founded on Americaist ideology, and that he learned a lot of these beliefs from two civilians who had previously been in Iwakuni. The dissussion rambled on during and between the next two meetings. It was a long confusing, sometimes heated, rambling discussion. One problem was that there was so much raised in the statement that it proved impossible to keep the discussion on one focus, rather it kept jumping from subject to subject. Also the discussion was very abstract since VVAW had not had any formal leadership up to that time anyway.

The two civilians (NLG and PCS) working with the project ergued strongly for the necessity of leadership. Pointing out that leadership always exists, that there is no such thing as a vacuum of leadership. That since leadership was inevitably going to exist it was better to have it formalized and elected so that it could be criticized and replaced and be more efficient and democratic. Also they pointed out that if there was no leadership from GIs then the task of co-ordinating activities fell by default onto the civilians which was a wrong thing to have happen.

By the end of the third meeting it seemed that among those speaking (a minority by this time) there were three positions being articulated. A)-the anti-leadership anarchist line (2 strong advocates), B)-an "I don't think non-leadership will work but would like to try it as an experiment to see what happens" line (about 4 advocates), and C)-the pro-leadership line (2 advocates). At this time it was proposed by the pro-leadership side that a vote be taken on the "let's have no leaders" proposal and that if it passed (as the pro-leader advocates expected) they would follow it and try to put it into practice. Ther then followed another big struggle with the anti-leadership advocates who were opposed to voting on principle. Eventually it was decided to have a vote. The vote was split 7 to 6 against the "lets have no leaders" idea (lots of people having been driven home by the hours of long argument).

The close vote and the discussion left us essentially without a structure. At this point the civilians who had been performing the co-ordinating role had to leave for a conference in Tokyo. Since no leadership structure or individuals had been chosen by the meeting, in effect the "no-leaders idea" was tried. Even after the return of the civilians it was clear that the lack of leadership (or at least defined areas of responsibility) were seriously hurting the movement. Eventually it has fielded all members of VVAW (except the original proponent of anarchism--who had rotated) agreed to the need for defined areas of leadership.

Although. Isrugglo was aducational and endingerively in terms of a final decision, the strugglo itself was devigive, disruptive, and demonstraing. For three works almost all work was paralyzed and to this day there are still some bad feelings growing out of it.

9... Following Kissinger's speech about "parce is at hand" in October; there were 3 or 4 discussions about what the FI's line should be increased to the new peace moves. Many of the GIs felt that the peace plan was either a defeat for the Vietnamese or at best a compromise with victory. Needless to say they were not enthusiastic about it. Also it was strongly felt that the whole thing was a trick to K get Nixon elected. Eventually we decided that whatever the legalisms of the treaty said the real question was one of power, and that power stemmed not from a treaty but from people and guns, thus we were in no position to second guess the Vietnamese. We decided that the line of the FI should be to support the Vietnamese desire for Nixon to sign the treaty and to take the line that Nixon is not a peacemaker, but those reallyy responsible for the peace were the heroic Vietnamese fighters and the international peace movement.

10. There was a good discussion about the direction of the FI early in November. It was pointed out at that time that the FI had run almost no articles in the past 2 months that dealt with class struggle, racism, or sexism. This was seen as a failing. On the other hand it was also pointed out that the articles in the FI, unlike many GI papers, are almost all written by GIS. Since people write articles based on their knowledge (either first hand or studied) the articles by the GIs tended to be mostly about the war (imperialism, base conditions, their own oppression, their movement, etc., It was decided to start including more articles from other sources and try to include more coverage of class, race, and sex, However, articles by GIs should not be excluded, rather the FI should be enlarged. Since that time the problem has diminished due to the transfer/discharge of so many GI activists.

and the legal of the rest of the second ida un Relations with the Japanese commades in Beheiren remain good and Theire Hobbit is going through rough times, They are losing money at a rate of a about \$55,000 per month. This is primarily due to the fact that GIs no all longer patronize the Hobbit. ... In order to alleviate the economic squeeze, some of the Japanese have taken part time jobs. At the same time the activity of the Hobbit members with local youth has increased markedly (possibly as a result of the decline of American presence, in the Hobbit?) and a core of anti-war local youth is being formed, which in conservative I wakuni is a great achievment. Most of is the local youth are workers, as the college students are away at college. The result of this has been a certain amount of growing apart between the GI Movement and the Hobbit: This separation is not a politin ical gulf, or any sort of hostility, but rather our time is simply not spent together very much. Two of the Beheiren members continue to work closely, with the GI Movement as their primary assignment and Reber, continues to live at the Hobbit. Whenever possible we try to include each other in our activities:

^{12.} Covering the walls in the community ground the base with posters is one of our major activities. So far we have used a different political type posters and 3 or 4 announcing events. All posters are designed and made by us (Japanese and Americans). The posters take a militant pro-Viotnamese revolutio line, rather than a pacifist anti-war line.

December an emergency meeting of VVAN was called. Although by this time our ranks had seriously deploted by repression, we were able to cover the area with new posters, write and print an EXTW edition of the FI, and mobilize about 20 people (12 GIs) for a mass distribution and petition campaign for Friday night the 22nd. This was a successful activity and about as close to a demonstration, as we could legally get without all the GIs getting busted. It was also covered in the local Japanese press with pictures and small stories Getting at the regular FI out for the New Years payday and the round of M Yule parties have prevented us from mounting further activities, specifically against the B-52 raids since them. On Jan 3rd the Japanese are going to fly kites against the base, and we will be able to get some GIs there to support it although since it's on a workday, our numbers will be limited.

14. Overall assessment. This being the New Year and all that trash it seems in order to make an overall assessment of the movement here. As we see it we have three primary goals. A) To develop politically conscious revolutionaries who will continue the struggle wherever they are in the military or civilian life to do political education among the masses. B) Develop an anti-war climate of opinion, stimulate anti-war activity and resistance to the military. C) To support (with legal defense, publicity, etc) individual and spontaneous group acts of resistance to the military. We feel that at this time it is not feesible to build a mass, permanent organization of GIs (like a labor union). Not do we think it is the function of a legal above-ground organization like ourselves to engage in illegal activities.

On the basis of these criterion the movement here has been in the main very successful. In the past few months 4 GIs have left Iwakuni with the political education, experience, drive, and determination to become conscious political activists (2 to civilian life, 2 to other Marine bases). In addition over 20 people have joined national VVW which is a move towards political activity after return to the states (in addition of course to their activity here). The FI is widely read on base and there is a growing anti-war sentiment. We feel that the poor morale, high incidence of sabotage, lousy work, and general slow-down that is clearly evident at the Nam Phong and Bien Hor bases is, at least in a small way, the result of our (and the GI Movement in general's) effort. We have handled many cases arising from resistance to the military and have been successful in the majority of them. Overall we feel that, up to this time Iwakuni has been one of the more successful GI Movements.

It appears that in the natural order of things, when a GI movement becomes too strong the enemy moves to break it up with red-briting, lies, propaganda, discharges, transfers, etc. This seems to be part of the life cycle of any resistance movement. Thus we are about to enter the "winter" phase, with a small number of activists, movement supporters on base hesitant to join us openly, and facing new forms of opposition. However we know that their opposition either wenes or becomes meaningless through repitition. That the oppression of the war, the oppression of the Karines, the march of historical forces, and our work will soon cause the movement here to blossom into spring. Our task during this period is to A) defend ourselves as much as possible against the opposition, B) use the time provided by a low level of activity for intensive political education, C) make strenuous efforts at reaching new people and forming a new cadre of activists, D) maintain our mass educational work (primarily the FI), E) maintain our morale and spirit and not

- 1. Wall; to story off with YVW horegrouptinues to hold weekly meetings. The extendent varied from 9 to 14 over the last two months (5-11) GI's. One new person has become a regular activist and one person who participated sporadically has also become a regular.
- 2. Late in December or early in January we set up an organizational system of three ministers. Information-meaning the Flabasically, Education-meaning discussion groups, bookstore, library, etc., and Activities-trips, events, etc. Over the last two mouths this system has not worked as well as it could have. Only one Ministry (Information) has really functioned, The is probably because there is a regular task that needs constant work, that falls under the ministry (the State of the constant work, that falls under the ministry (the State of the constant work are plant out at the VVAW meetings and the Minister of Education has not the stive in develop ideas, etc.
- 3. We decided that regular, VVAW cadre should day \$10 per month dues, unless they had a particular financial problem that exempted them. So, for this seems to be working O.K. under the firm control of our madam of the exchequer.
- 4. As far as the base here, it appears that the war of red-baiting has susided for the moment. However, the level of generally petty harrasment of all the troops on the bas remains yery high. Possibly it even escalated with the return of VMFA 211 and VMFA 31 (the fighter-bomber squadrons from Bein Hoa). Super chicken-shit grooming and clothin orders, etc.
- 5. Our contact with Nam, Phong continues, primarily by talking with GI's who are rotati through Ivakuni. They report that the conditions at Rosegarden are still terrible. Discontent very very high. VMFA 232 held a series of meetings that were as big as 40-GI's at one time, although they have fallen apart now. MABS-15 has also tried to hold meetings but they have been busted and harrased heavily. Mebers of this unit told us that mati-war literature and literature on GI rights was confiscated by the enemy on grounds of being subversive. There is a heavy case load of trials, stemming from the oppression there. About 80% of the immates of the Iwakuni brig are from Rosegarden.
- 6. A few day's ago (about Feb. 27th) the advance parties from VMFA 533 (and possibly VMFA 232) were ordered back to Nam Phong. This indicates that the planned return of these squadrons will be delayed some time. Nhy they were ordered back no one seems to However, in October, the same thing happened to the advance parties from VMFA 211 and and it signaled the decision to keep the planes in Vietnam and escalate the bombing in the terror raids of December. Whether the return of the parties from Nam Phong indicate new shift in administration policy or not we don't know.
- 7. On Jan 20th (Inauguration day), Beheirin held a demonstration. About 45 people march from the train station to 4 corners (a very good time out for Iwakuni). From 4 corners most of them made their way to the main gate where they chanted and sang for about a hour, then marched on base to deliver a protest to the base commander. About a dozen, VVAN members were gathered to support their demonstration, distribute literature, talk bystanders, etc.
- 8. We have re-instituted the idea of "sunday supper", that is a public dinner at the Fa house on sunday's ... So, far they have been pretty successfull, with humbers of reaters reaching a shigh of about 30. This has provided a good informal time to get together, attract new people, rap, etc.

11. We made up a set of packets containing back issues of the FI, anti-war literatur pamphlets, etc. That packet was about 2 inches thick. The original idea was to give them to members of the returning squadrons. However, this never got done, due to general fucking uplandower, the packets have proved to very handy to give to GI's who are going south, or who ask for lot's of literature, or who are going to other stations, or who are just suddenly turned on. Also they are great for whittling away at the icredible dusty, mouldy, piles of old FI's, old (and new) leaflets, literatur underground papers, etc. that clutter up the house.

12. We have decided to launch a campaign built around the slogan "VLL OF US, ALL THE WAY HOW." Basically a "back Home" campaign we are doing oublicity (so far FI articles and posters) around themes dealing with why do we have foriegn bases, local people don't want foriegn bases, we don't want to be here, we are ALL prisoners of we should All go home, etc. We discussed the danger of some people relating to the campaign in a rascist anti-Japanese way, but decided that we could successfully combatthat. The we will stress this for about 2 months. As we see the response we will institute hew forms of activity around the idea (petitions, demo's, etc) If anyone has any idea let us know.

13. We are also trying to get the goods on the base exchange which used the currency re-valuation to raise their prices 25%-35%. Hopefully we can get enough evidence on them to start a ruckus.

14. Our bookstore is doing O.K. There are some items that go like hotcakes and other that sit on the shelf forever, but all in all it seems to be doing well. The mobile bookstore doesn't sell very many books but is a good base from which to distribute literature, pamphlets, ets. as well as getting into raps. We havn't taken it out as much as we should have, partly due to the weather, partly to laziness, partly due to early darkness.

15. We have finally been able to launch regular program of political discussion groups. We have a discussion each week, and in the last 9 weeks it has only been aborted twice. So far we have had discussions on:

A) Class attitudes, led by Judah, a discussion that started very slow but later became quite lively and generally was considered to be very good.

B) The Communist Manifesto, led by Don & Bob. This was a difficult one, as the manifesto is hard to read and understand and hard to relate to our lives.

C) Section III of the Enemy (Imperialism's Home Base) led by Pooch, a pretty good discussion.

D) Lapsalachien Peoples History Book, led by Harry, difficult because only Harry had read it and so discussion was more of a lecture. It seems that it is better to have discussions around things several people have read or things that people can relate to their con lives even if they havn't read the specific article.

E)Cuba, led by Reber, good discussion

F)Section IV of the Ehemy (Hang Ups) led by Pooch, ery good discussion.

G) Women's Movement and Women's Film, led by Gloriz (from Ckingwa) a very good discussion.

17. The FI still is going well, coming out every payday. We have started to print more articles from other papers, etc, to get a wider coverage of subjects and also because the number of cadre available to write articles has diminished semewhat? There was a good discussion on the disefullness of Lifer of the Month. It was felt that although it may serve to alienate, or piss of some potential supporters it's value as an outlet for frustrations, and it's general popularity outweighed the disadvantages.

another he had worked for the FBI, Secret Service, CIA, and various police intelligence departments. In conjunction with his presentation, displayed two telephone lineman test sets and three telephone bugs, two of which were for insertion inside the phone itself and the third of a "hang on" variety consisting of an antenna and two connecting wires for outside use on phone lines. described at length how the devices worked and also how to detect them, but much of the discussion was extremely technical and not totally understood by source.

described bugs allegedly installed by this Bureau and indicated that a radio monitor of these bugs would be conducted on frequencies close to the normal transmission frequencies of this Bureau. displayed two radios and alternately tuned in FBI, Secret Service, and police department frequencies and provided the delegates with information regarding these specific frequencies.

also indicated that the telephone companies cooperate with this Bureau so as to provide a sound-activated device at a remote point from the subject telephone, which device would ring when the subject phone did and all communications on the subject phone were thereby taped.

laimed that he was capable of detecting a bug on the phone by simply calling the suspect phone. His normal \$200 fee for such service would be reduced for movement organizations.

delegation and indicated others could be stolen from telephone company trucks. He explained how to utilize such sets at apartment house switch boxes so as to make free phone calls.

At times, when a local or Federal major case is being investigated laims he has left bugs marked with the letters "FBI" and a serial number in places where persons involved in the investigation could find them. This was done simply as a harassment technique. Also

claimed he had marked his own bugs with the letters "FBI" and serial numbers so as to discourage removal by local authorities or phone company personnel if inadvertently discovered.

also displayed a jamming device for radio and telephone bugs, but source was unaware of how this device worked other than it emitted a signal of some kind. howed how to make such a device from an electric razor or a coil from a Ford automobile. It was underscored that mobility was essential to the operation of such a device so as not to have it detected by a direction finder.

Additionally showed how to build or where to buy all the equipment displayed. "Fecommended the "Anarchist Cookbook" and "The Electronic Invasion" by ROBERT BROWN as source material for building electronic surveillance equipment and the Radio Shack as the place to buy parts nationally.

and video tape subjects thereof via a personally-owned, unmarked truck.

regarding weapons and are armed while in their residence although neither carries weapons on their person when away from home.

Throughout presentation, he interjected comments regarding explosives and incendiary devices and at one point he indicated that an effective method of blowing up automobiles was to utilize detonating wire and a blasting cap in the automobile gas tank. Also, he described fire bombs made from oil and fertilizer. These comments regarding explosives and incendiary devices were not well received by the delegates, however, the continued to refer to them throughout his presentation.

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



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observed the VVAW/WSO demonstration at the Role Corps Day, Ohio State University, Columbus, Ohio, on 5/24/73.

This investigation is based on information which indicates that captioned organization is engaged in activities which could involve violations of Title 18, U.S. Code, 2383 (Rebellion or Insurrection), 2384 (Seditious Conspiracy), 2385 (Advocating Overthrow of the Government), 2387 (Sedition), 793 (Espionage), 844 (Explosives and Incendiary Devices), 2155-56 (Sabotage) and 2101 (Antiriot Laws).

VVAW/WSO was organized in New York City in 1967 as an organization of Vietnam veterans to protest the American involvement in the war in Southeast Asia. VVAW/WSO engaged in various protest activities, but during late 1971, demonstrated increasing militancy, culminating in December, 1971, with VVAW/WSO takeover of various American landmarks and public buildings. Information was also developed indicating that some VVAW/WSO chapters were cooperating with or infiltrated by communist-dominated groups including the Communist Party, USA, and the Socialist Workers Party. Certain VVAW/WSO leaders were quoted as telling members VVAW/WSO is a revolutionary organization and not "just another group of war veterans". VVAW/WSO leaders have graveled to North Vietnam and have reportedly established limison with revolutionary or terrorist groups internationally. During July, 1972, VVAW/WSO leaders and members were indicted by a Federal Grand Jury, Tallahassee, for violation of Federal statutes, including conspiracy to riot during Republican National Convention, August, 1972. One of these individuals was also indicted for possession of an unregistered explosive and incendiary device. In Manuary, 1973, at a National Steering Committee meeting, VVAW/WSO leaders discussed programs aimed at obtaining support from or influencing active duty military personnel. They also discussed obtaining access to classified Government information to be used against U.S. interests and one leader subsequently actively engaged in such activity. There were also indications at this meeting that VVAM/WSO activists possessed the technical knowledge and training to carry out any revolutionary program proposed. In addition,

information has been reported from a source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, that a VVAW/WSO member previously discussed engaging in sabotage and was possibly involved in the destruction of a munitions train in Arizona. WVAW/WSO is currently headquartered in Chicago, Illinois.

VIETNAM VETERANS AGAINST THE WAR

The Vietnam Veterans Against the War (VVAW) is a national organization whose membership opposes the war in Vietnam and the Selective Service System. The VVAW has sponsored demonstrations in protest against the war in Vietnam throughout the United States.

On March 26, 1973, a first confidential source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised a meeting sponsored by the VVAW, was held at 2699 Clifton Avenue, Cincinnati, Ohio. This was a Regional VVAW Meeting. Eleven persons were present at the meeting, including from the Columbus, Ohio Chapter of VVAW. Nothing of importance was discussed at the meeting and those present went to a private residence for dinner and beer when the group failed to transact any business at the meeting.

The "Ohio State Lantern", a daily newspaper of Ohio State University (OSU), Columbus, Ohio, contained an article in the March 30, 1973 issue reporting the Columbus Chapter of the VVAW is planning regular visits to the Veterans Administration Hospital (VAH) in Chillicothe, "The VVAW is involved in more than returning combat Ohio. medals to protest American foreign policy", Coordinator William Davis said. According to Davis, the VVAW project will consist basically of entertainment.

The Columbus Chapter of VVAW is also busy setting up a program involving counseling to persons now in the military, especially students in Reserve Officers Training Corps (ROTC).

On April 27, 1973, a second confidential source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised the Columbus Chapter, VVAW, held a meeting at the Wesley Foundation near the OSU campus, Columbus, Ohio. Sixteen persons attended this meeting. The Ohio-Indiana-Kentucky Regional Representative of VVAW from Dayton, Ohio, attended the meeting Columbus, Ohio Chapter Coordinator, VVAW, chalred the meeting and stated he is furnishing military counseling to members of the National Guard and ROTC.


Winter Soldier organization (WSO), which is open to all persons, not just Vietnam veterans.

1973 of the Columbus, Ohio Chapter, VVAW, prepared a paper captioned, "Espionage at Kent State", in the form of a questionnaire. The paper solicits contacts with anyone having information about Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) or police surveillance activities at Kent State University, Kent, Ohio.

On May 4, 1973, a third confidential source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, furnished a copy of a VVAW newsletter, which announced the first VVAW/WSO camp-out for families in the Hocking Hills of Southern Ohio, scheduled for May 11 through 13, 1973.

On May 18, 1973, the third source advised the VVAW/WSO camp-out, a social affair for families, was held at Hocking Hills on May 11-13, 1973.

The VVAW newsletter furnished on May 4, 1973, also announced the Columbus Chapter, VVAW, is joining the Cincinnati and Dayton Chapters in publishing newsletters and these cities are part of the Ohio-Indiana-Kentucky regional VVAW. Also, a study group is being formed by the VVAW with meetings scheduled to be held at the Wesley Foundation, Columbus, Ohio.



The VVAW newsletter stresses the need for money, announces counseling for military objectors and requests volunteers to assist in answering the telephone at the VVAW office, 30 West Woodruff Avenue, Columbus, Ohio. The VVAW requests money to form a VVAW Regional Defense Committee and denies the stories concerning torture of Vietnam veterans while they were held prisoners of war.

On May 21, 1973, the second confidential source advised VVAW members met with representatives of other groups in Columbus, Ohio, on May 21, 1973, for the purpose of planning activities to disrupt ROTC Corps Day on the OSU campus, Columbus, Ohio, scheduled for May 24, 1973, and to protest the existence of ROTC on campus at OSU. VVAW members prepared posters denouncing President Nixon and leaflets to be circulated announcing the rally.

Special Agents of the FBI observed about fifteen persons carrying signs which denounced President Nixon and protesting ROTC activities during Corps Day activities on the OSU campus, Columbus, Ohio, on May 24, 1973. There were no incidents or arrests made during the demonstration, which ended peacefully following the departure of ROTC members and their families from the commencement activities.

On June 13, 1973, the third confidential source advised he knew of no recent activities involving VVAW members in Columbus, Ohio.

On July 11, 1973, a fourth confidential source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised the VVAW is now known as VVAW/WSO. The source stated the only current activity being discussed by VVAW/WSO representatives concerns building a unified action to protest the upcoming trial in Gainesville, Florida.
