- 8. Upon information and belief, defendants routinel assign plainclothes detectives to make photographic records of lawful public gatherings, including political rallies and marches, and retain the photographs in police files indefinite

Upon information and belief, defendants currently maintain numbers police dessiers on individuals and organizations for the perpose of recording comprchensive political and personal information about paysons and groups engaged in south versial political activity in baseau County. Said dessiers a entirely separate from outlinary criminal police records, and such dessiers southing the name, additions, photograph, name of

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organizations to which individuals belong, demonstrations, rallies and/or machings that such individual has attended, dates and locations of westings attended by the "suspected" individual, and other information concerning the individual's political views, associations, parameter life and habits.

dossions are kept on file indefinitely by the police and the Information adlegadly contained therein is exchanged with, and distributed to, other agencies, including the Federal Beneau of Investigation. Such information is also actually or potentially available to other governmental agencies interested in the identities of parsons or organizations that do not agree with government policies, and/or procedures.

11. Information contained in such designs may also be distributed to governmental agencies for purposes of considering employment, promotion, quanting of licenses and passports; and to private employees and private political organizations.

12. Upon information and belief, the Massau Cosmodice Depth/ment establishes and maintains links of memberal in controversial political organizations, lists of the identical and names of such organizations, lists of presons in Massau County who hald unorthodom or vapopular political views and

lists of persons who associate with or who are related to such persons. This information is actually or potentially available to police and others.

Defendants attend many meetings to photograph 13. and gather information on individuals or groups for the above described dessiers. Police attendance and intelligence. gathering at such meetings is not determined by any real or \$100 potential threat of violence or other unlawful activities at sucy meetings. Rather, the presence of police for intelligence gathering purposes at any given meeting or demonstration is determined by the particular political or social views held by the organizations or by the individuals sponsoring such meeting, the political or social views to be expounded at such meeting and the political or social views of individuals expecte to participate as audience or as speakers at such meeting. The Massau County Police Department doos not regularly, if at all, compile dossiers or photograph citizens at public assemblies, demonstrations or meetings held by citizens whose political and social views are consonant with those of government officia? or of the Police Department or whose political views are: considered by said officials to be "orthodox" or non-controversia

Vietnam Veterans Against the War

On July 19, 1971, a confidential source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised it was recently learned that the national office of the Vietnam Veterans Against the War (VVAW), New York City (NYC), has authorized the holding of a national convention of the VVAW in Northern Minnesota during the last week of July or the first week in August, 1971. Regional Coordinator of the VVAW for Minnesotaland Town, was advised of this. The first three days will deal with convention activities and the final four days will consist of a festival arranged by Intersect Productions of Minneapolis, Minnesota. Half of the money raised by the festival will go to the VVAW. Location of the convention in Minnesota was unknown to source.

The VVAW is a veterans organization with a national office located at 25 West 26th Street. NYC, whose first published objective is as //:awollot

"To demand an immediate cessation of fighting" and the withdrawal of all American troops from Indochina. We cannot allow one more human being to be killed in Indochina."


Source further advised that the VVAW is beginning a nationwide collection of food, clothing and medical supplies for the blacks in Cairo, Illinois. Support for the United Front of Cairo, a group of militant blacks led by the Reverend Charles Koen, is considered essential to advance the struggle in Cairo. In NYC, the War Resisters League (WRL), 339 Lafayette Street, the Fifth Avenue Vietnam Peace Parade Committee (FAVPPC), 17 East 17th Street, and the Episcopal Peace Fellowship (EPF), 300 9th Avenue, are cooperating as collection points for these supplies.

### WRL

The WRL was founded in 1923 and is the American Section of the War Resisters International, a worldwide pacifist movement...

### FAVPPC

The FAVPPC is publicly known as a NYC organization that has organized and participated in anti-vietnam war demonstrations in NYC and has provided transportation for anti-Vietnam war demonstrators outside of NYC. \ \

VIETNAM VETERANS AGAINST THE WAR (VVAW) PROPOSED CARAVAN FROM ST. LOUIS, MISSOURI, TO CAIRO, ILLINOIS July 19-20, 1971

On July 13, 1971 who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised that information had been received regarding the possibility of the Vietnam Veterans Against the War (VVAW) supporting a food and meal caravan to Cairo, Illinois, for the black community from all over the country.

On July 15, 1971, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised that it had been determined that residence at Kansas City, Missouri, was the gathering place for the foodstuffs and clothing being collected by the Kansas City VVAW. is president of the Kansas City VVAW chapter. further advised that the Kansas City contingent would proceed to St. Louis, Missouri, on July 18 or 19, 1971, to meet with other VVAW groups and then proceed to Cairo, Illinois.

Spot checks by an Agent of the FBI at the residence of Kansas City, Missouri, during the period July 16-20, 1971, failed to detect the formation of any group at that location. Additionally, there was a lack of indication that clothing or foodstuffs were being collected at home:

The VVAW was founded in the spring of 1967 by six young Vietnam veterans in New York City. At the beginning of 1968, with 600 members, VVAW opened a national office, founded the first GI newspaper, "Vietnam GI", and sent close to 500 veterans into the McCarthy campaign to beat down the red

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

baiters. After getting gassed at the Democratic convention at Chicago and caught in the general "down" of the peace movement, VVAW was nearly inactive until the moratoriums in the fall of 1969. Members of VVAW led student strikes on major campuses across the country and battled Veterans Administration Hospital authorities ever threats to throw amputee Vietnam veterans out for signing anti-war petitions. At present, membership of the VVAW, nationally, consists of 8,500 members.



NY, on May 23, 1971. The affair which lasted from the morning until about 7:15 p.m. was attended by about 150 persons. The purpose of the WSI was to let the American public hear from the lips of veterans of the war in Vietnam actual accounts of alleged atrocities committed by American military personnel against the Vietnamese people.

The VVAW is a veterans organization with a national office located at 25 West 26th Street, NYC, whose first published objective is as follows:

"To demand an immediate cessation of fighting and the withdrawal of all American troops from Indochina. We cannot allow one more human being to be killed in Indochina."

The WSI was opened by Steve Noetzel, former Green Beret and Vietnam war veteran from Floral Park, NY. Noetzel stated he was 30 years of age and Coordinator of the Queens and Long Island Chapters of the VVAW. Noetzel was dressed in a combat fatigue shirt and a green beret. He made the statement that "My Lai was no unusual occurrence." He stated that the term "Winter Soldier" was a name taken from Thomas Paine's salute to those soldiers who remained at Valley Forge during the winter of 1776. Noetzel mentioned that, "We face our greatest responsibility at present and we must serve beyond our enlistment."

Michael Fischman told of a helicopter flight in which a colonel ordered him to direct machine gun fire at two unidentified persons on the ground saying, "See if you can hit them." Fischman said that he killed them.

Noetzel told of the deaths of 12 Vietcong soldiers who were thrown from helicopters in 1963. He also spoke of an albged Green Beret tactic of throwing prisoners of war into a room with a python to make them cooperative and also of electric shock equipment used on prisoners.)

paul Piatti recalled that his combat group received orders that if one round of sniper fire came from a village, they should level it. He recalled once entering a village and after finding no rifles, he and his buddles burned the village down.

Craig Williams mentioned the brutality of an American officer who took a pencil and jammed it into the ear of a Vietcong prisoner, who died shortly thereafter.

During the proceedings, several films were shown one being entitled, "Evil Hour" which depicted the effects of United States military actions on the children in Vietnam

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Winter Soldier Investigation

At approximately 6:00 p.m., a "guest panel" was formed and discussions were held concerning "testimony" previously given. The rally was closed with an address by an individual who was introduced as a Vietnam veteran who had lost both legs in the Vietnamese War. The speech given by this person was critical of United States policy in Indochina.

The WSI was orderly and peaceful and no arrests were noted.



in Cairo, Illinois, a town with three armored trucks and a 30 caliber machine gun mounted on top of its police station.

"IS THIS THE FREEDOM YOU FOUGHT FOR?

"Cairo may be located in a northern state, but it is a Southern town in the most nightmarish sense. Violence grew with the civil rights struggle. On the night of March 31, 1969, white vigilantes shot into an all-black housing project for over 2½ hours. It was not the first instance of violence directed at the black community but it was the worst to date and marked the start of a new age in Cairo. The Black people stood up, refusing to stay 'In their places'.

"Shortly after the shoot-out the black citizens began an economic boycott of racist merchants. That boycott is still in effect, having recently entered its third year. Increased violence has accompanied the boycott.

"The VVAW has been assisting the black citizens of Cairo in their stand by providing such necessities as food, clothing, legal and medical aid. More help though and some of the

Vietnam veterans around the area have begun to respond to this need. Last December 24th a group of veterans from Fayetteville, Arkansas, took 50 cases of food to the people of Cairo. They also took clothes, oranges and candy to help make Christmas a bit brighter for the children. The vets then picketted with the boycotters. Already there are signs that this is starting in New Orleans and elsewhere. Several VVAW members have gone to New Orleans to start organizing there, recognizing the threat and that Cairo and New Orleans could become rallying points around which to gather their black brothers, especially in the South an area poorly represented in VVAW.

"The poor citizens of Cairo have invited the members of VVAW to join them in Cairo on July 20th and later dates." Leadership of all factions of this struggle will be in Cairo for support.


"Besides joining into Farm Day activities there are other ways in which vets can help the black people of Cairo. Those able to spend a week or more there could give valuable assistence in various projects. Cairo minority church groups have developed a housing development Corporation which has now, despite strong opposition, been funded. Eventually 100 new homes for rental by Cairo's poor and 200 to 300 homes for sale will be built. A housing factory has been in operation for about 6 months. They have cut housing costs by a full one-third. Local clinics are being set up as are stores. A shopping center, long delayed by illegal means, will be built. Other programs in employment and production are being developed on a cooperative basis so that all the people can benefit. The boycott is the single most effective weapon (non-violent) available to the black community. A sucessful economic boycott provides the leverage needed for forcing the racist powers to the conference table. Once at the table, negotiations to resolve the problem of exploitation of all poor people can proceed. Also, the disolution of the vigilante group and the oppression of the poor whites who are being made to support the racist vigilantes, though they gain nothing from this save the ability towalk down the street without being spit upon, can be brought about. It is important to note that a great many of the poor white are

members of the vigilantes for various reasons. To begin with, it provides one means of venting their frustrations at the oppression and exploitation the power structure heaps upon them, also it provides a source of income, (for people with out jobs a stipend, no matter how small, is justification for doing what they must do), finally it must be remembered that the racist conditioning of poor whites, i.e., you don't have a job now and if you don't keep those niggers in their place when one (job) opens up a nigger will get it and you'll still be out in the cold, has been devastatingly effective.

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

#### COMPLAINT

# I. Jurisdiction

1. This is an action arising under 42 U.S.C. 1983 and 1985 and 28 U.S.C. 2201 for declaratory, injunctive and other

relief to redress deprivation by defendants, their agents, employees and others acting in concert with them, purportedly acting under State law, statute, ordinance, regulation, custom or usage, of the plaintiffs' rights, privileges and immunities secured by the Constitution of the United States. Jurisdiction rests upon 28 U.S.C. 1343(3) and 1343(4). Plaintiffs have been and, unless relief in this case is granted, will continue to be deprived by defendants, their agents and employees, purportedly acting under State law, of the following rights secured the plaintiffs and the members of the class they represent by the Constitution of the United States:

- (a) The rights secured the plaintiffs, and the members of the class they represent, by the First and Fourteenth Amendments to the Constitution of the United States to assembly publicly and/or demonstrate peacefully and lawfully in support of their political and social viewpoints on issues of public concern;
- the Fourteenth Amendment to be free from illegal police practices, including arrests under Section 26.125 revised ordinances of Kansas City, Missouri, Desecration of the Flag, and Section 26.35, R.O., Kansas City, Missouri, Interferring with an Officer, for flying a banner of a type not approved by the Police Department and/or in a manner not approved by the Police Department of Kansas City, Missouri.
- (c) The rights secured by the Due Process Clause of the Fourteenth Amendment to be free from illegal police practices, including the compilation, maintenance and improper use of police intelligence files or dossiers of individuals and erganizations who peacefully and lawfully exercise their rights of free speech, assembly, association and petition at demonstrations and other similar events at various times throughout the City of Kansas City, Missouri.

## II. Class Action Allegations

- 2. This is a class action brought by the named plainti under Rule 23(b)(2) of the Federal Rules of Civil Procedure on behalf of themselves and all others similarly situated. The plaintiffs and the other members of the class are persons who attend or participate or who wish to attend or participate in any public assembly or demonstration in Kansas City, Missouri held by citizens groups or organizations whose political or social views conflict with those of the officials in the government or the Kansas City, Hissouri Police Department. The plaintiffs and the class they represent are unlawfully hindered, deterred or chilled from exercising the Constitutional rights of free speech, assembly, association or petition by defendants' practice of refusing to allow lawful assemblies or marches to be conducted by plaintiffs and others because the Police Department does not approv of the type of banner flown or the manner in which it is flown, and by defendants' practice of making and using special intelligence files or dossiers on individuals and organizations who are members of the plaintiff class solely on the basis of said individuals' and organizations' participation in public assembli or demonstrations such as those described above.
  - 3. The class is so numerous that joinder of all members is impracticable. Members number in the thousands. There are questions of law and fact, regarding the constitutionality of Section 26.125, R.O., Kansas City, Missouri, and regarding the constitutionality and characteristics of defendants' enforcement of said ordinance, and regarding the constitutionality and characteristics of defendants' dossier system, common to the claims of all members of the class. Named plaintiffs will fairly and adequately protect the interest of the class, since they have a deep committment to the public advocacy of controversial ideas and to the preservation of the constitutional rights involved in this action.

4. The defendants have acted on grounds generally applicable to the class, thereby making appropriate final injunctive relief and corresponding declaratory relief with respect to the class as a whole.

## III. Representative Plaintiffs

- Kansas City, is an unincorporated association whose members are veterans of one or more branches of the United States military serving during the era of the Vietnam conflict. Vietnam Veterans Against the War sponsors numerous peace testimonies and other activities including marches and assemblies throughout the City of Kansas City, Missouri, and all of such activities are peaceful and lawful. Its principle place of business is 1840 E. 77th Terrace, Kansas City, Missouri.
- (b) Plaintiff, John M. Upton, is an individual citizen of the United States residing at 1840 E. 77th Terrace, Kansas City, Missouri. He is the western Missouri coordinator for the national Vietnam Veterans AGainst the War and is an organizer of the local chapter of that organization.
- (c) Plaintiff, John Wright, is an individual citizen of the United States residing at 3348 Gillham Road, Kansas City, Missouri. He is a member of the local chapter of the Vietnam Veterans Against the War, and one of the organizers thereof.
- (d) Plaintiff, Randy Barnes, is an individual citizen of the United States residing at 1020 W. 44th St., \$5, Kansas City, Missouri. He is a member of the local chapter of the Vietnam Veterans Against the War, and one of the organizers thereof.
- (e) Plaintiff, Jack R. Smith, is an individual citizen of the United States residing at 53 Wall Street, New Haven, Connecticut 06511. He is a member of the national Vietnam Veterans Against the War and a regional organizer for that organization.



### IV. Defendants

- 6. (a) Defendant, Louis Benecke, is the Chief Prosecutor of the City of Kansas City, Missouri and is responsible for the prosecution of arrests made under Section 26.125 and Section 26.135, R. O., Kansas City, Missouri.
- (b) Defendant, Charles Wheeler, Jr., is the Mayor of the City of Kansas City, Missouri and is responsible for the conduct of the executive and administrative work of the City-and for law enforcement prosecution within its boundaries, pursuant to the Charter of the City of Kansas City and ordinances adopted pursuant thereto.
- (c) Defendants, Hamil, Snow, Shaughnessy, Capra, Tolbert, Hazley, Pelofsky, Berkley, Mann, Brownfield, Swyden, and Asel, are members of the City Council of the City of Kansas City, Missouri and as such have executive administrative responsibility for law enforcement prosecution within the boundaries of the City.
- (d) Defendant, Clarence Kelley, is the Chief of the Kansas City, Missouri Police Department and as such has executive and administrative responsibility for the enforcement of ordinances adopted by the City of Kansas City, Missouri. In addition, he is responsible, for the implementation of policies of the Board of Police Commissioners including policies with respect to gathering personal and political information about individuals and organizations as described herein.
- (e) Defendants, Kelley, Gilmore, Willits, Wells, and Ingraham, are members of the Board of Police Commissioners of Kansas City, Missouri and as such are responsible for the formulation and supervision of policies regarding the collection by the Kansas City, Missouri Police Department of personal and political information about individuals and organizations engaged in lawful activities, as described more fully herein.

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### V. Facts Constituting the Cause of Action

- 7. Prior to July 4, 1971, the Vietnam Veterans Against the War obtained a police permit for a march from the Liberty Memorial to the Country Club Plaza in Kansas City, Missouri on the evening of July 4, 1971. On July 4, 1971 a crowd of approximately 1,000 persons, including many members of the Vietnam Veterans Against the War and their supporters, gathered at the Liberty Memorial to hear speeches and to participate in the march to the Country Club Plaza. At approximately 8:00 p.m., as persons were being organized preparatory to the march to the Country Club Plaza, Captain Tye and Captain Ponessa of the Kansas City, Missouri Police Department informed organizers of the march, including plaintiffs, Upton and Wright, that the march would not be allowed to proceed as long as Jack R. Smith was a part of the color guard carrying the American flag in an inverted position from a pole.
- 8. At approximately 8:50 p.m. Jack R. Smith was arrested by Patrolman Houx of the Kansas City, Missouri Police Department and charged under Section 26.125, R.O., Kansas City, Missouri with: "Desecration of the American flag by flying it upside down." In addition, he was charged under Section 26.35 with mindering and interfering ... with a Kansas City Police Officer in the official performance of his duty by refusing to obey a lawful order." The order apparently was to fly the flag right-side-up or cease flying the inverted American flag.
- 9. Upon the information and belief of plaintiffs Section 26.125, R.O., Kansas City, Missouri has been, and continues to be, selectively enforced by the Kansas City, Missouri Police Department. Non-complying uses of the flag of a commercial nature do not result in arrest for the users thereof. The only persons arrested under said ordinance are persons using the flag to express dissenting, unpopular, or non-conforming views not consonant with the views of the government or the Kansas City, Missouri Police Department. This selective enforcement creates a special class of persons, classified

solely by the nature of their political or social views and subjects them to arrest, prosecution, and confinement, thereby depriving them of the Equal Protection of the Law guaranteed by the Fourteenth Amendment.

10. On the evening of July 4, 1971 members of the Kansas City, Missouri Police Department under the command of Clarence M. Kelley attended the speech, march and demonstrations sponsored by the Vietnam Veterans Against the War. To the knowledge of the defendants at least four, and possibly as many as eight, members of the Kansas City, Missouri Police Department were undercover agents who attended the demonstrations in informal clothing so as not to attract attention to themselves and photographed many of those in attendance, made a record of the event, and identified as many of those in attendance as possible, regardless of whether or not the persons in attendance were engaged in peaceful and lawful conduct.

- Il. Upon the information and beliefs of plaintiffs, members of the Kansas City, Missouri Police Department have attended many public assemblies and demonstrations held in Kansas City, Missouri by citizens groups and organizations whose general and political and social views conflict with those of government officials and/or the Kansas City, Missouri Police Department, in recent months. From the photographs taken and the records made at such assemblies and demonstrations, and from other material gathered by members of the Kansas City, Missouri Police Department, members of said department compiled intelligence files or dossiers on the individuals and groups participating in such assemblies. Such files are maintained by the Intelligence Unit of the Police Department.
- 12. Upon the information and belief of plaintiffs at present there are hundreds, and perhaps themsands, of files on individuals and organizations. Said file to complete and maintaine for the purpose of maintaining comprehensive, political and personal information about dissides persons and or seconds.

including photographs, connected with criminal offenses or arrests Many files contain the following information:

- a) Name and address;
  - Photograph;
- Names of organizations to which the individual subject belongs or whose demonstrations he or she has attended;
- d) Dates and locations of demonstrations attended by individual subject; and

Upon information and belief completed files are kept by the Police Department indefinitely, sometimes with or without the knowledge of the subject of the file. On information and belief, plaintiffs allege that no safe guards exist as to the disposition or access to the political and personal information and conclusions contained in the dossiers. Such information is actually or potentially available to other law enforcement agencies interested in "subversive" or dissident persons or organizations, to the Federal Bureau of Investi gation and the Secret Service, which maintain its liles on political "unorthodox" persons and "subversives", and, on information and belito private employers, to governmental agencies for purposes of considering employment, promotion, granting of licenses, passports

13. Attendance and intelligence gathering by members of the Kansas City, Missouri Police Department at assemblies, meetings and demonstrations, is not determined by any real or potential thr of violence or other unlawful activities at such meetings. Rather the presence of police for intelligence gathering purposes at any given meeting or demonstration are determined by the particular political or social view held by the organization sponsoring Sach demonstration, the political or social views to be expounded at su demonstration and the political or social views of individuals

expected to participate in or attend such demonstration. The Kansas city Police do not regularly compile files or photograph citizens at public assemblies or demonstrations held by citizens groups whose political or social views are consonant with those of the governmental officials or the police department or whose political views are considered by said officials to be "orthodox" or noncontroversial.

Smith was a part of the color guard carrying the American flag in an inverted position from a pole.
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- City, Missouri Police Department under the command of Clarence M.

  Kelley attended the speech, march and demonstrations sponsored by the Vietnam Veterans Against the War. To the knowledge of the defendants at least four, and possibly as many as eight, members of the Kansas City, Missouri Police Department were undercover agents who attended the demonstrations in informal clothing so as not to attract attention to themselves and photographed tiffed as many of those in attendance as possible, regardless of whether or not the persons in attendance were engaged in peaceful and lawful conduct.
- 11. Upon the information and beliefs of plaintiffs, members of the Kansas City, Missouri Police Department have attended many public assemblies and demonstrations held in Kansas City, Missouri by citizens groups and organizations whose general and political and social views conflict with those of government officials and/or the Kansas City, Missouri Police Department, in recent months. From the photographs taken and the records made at such assemblies and demonstrations, and from other material gathered by members of the Kansas City, Missouri Police Department, members of said department compiled intelligence files or dossiers on the individuals and groups participating in such assemblies. Such files are maintained by the Intelligence Unit of the Police Department.
- 12. Upon the information and belief of plaintiffs at present there are hundreds, and perhaps thousands, of files on individuals and organizations. Said files are compiled and maintained for the purpose of maintaining comprehensive, political and personal information about dissident persons and groups and are entirely separate from police interrogation, investigation or records,

including photographs, connected with criminal offenses or arrests.
Many files contain the following information:

- a) Name and address;
- b) Photograph;
- c) Names of organizations to which the individual subject belongs or whose demonstrations he or she has attended;
- d) Dates and locations of demonstrations attended by individual subject; and

Other information concerning the individual subject!

- political views, associations and perconupon information and belief completed files are kept by the Police
  Department indefinitely, sometimes with or without the knowledge of
  the subject of the file. On information and belief, plaintiffs
  allege that no safe guards exist as to the disposition or access to
  the political and personal information and conclusions contained in
  the dossiers. Such information is actually or potentially available
  to other law enforcement agencies interested in "subversive" or
  dissident persons or organizations, to the Federal Bureau of Investigation and the Secret Service, which maintain its files on politically
  "unorthodox" persons and "subversives", and, on information and belief
  to private employers, to governmental agencies for purposes of
  considering employment, promotion, granting of licenses, passports, etc.
- 13. Attendance and intelligence gathering by members of the Kansas City, Missouri Police Department at assemblies, meetings and demonstrations, is not determined by any real or potential threat of violence or other unlawful activities at such meetings. Rather, the presence of police for intelligence gathering purposes at any given meeting or demonstration are determined by the particular political or social view held by the organization sponsoring such demonstration, the political or social views to be expounded at such demonstration and the political or social views of individuals



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expected to participate in or attend such demonstration. The Kansas City Police do not regularly compile files or photograph citizens at public assemblies or demonstrations held by citizens groups whose political or social views are consonant with those of the governmental officials or the police department or whose political views are considered by said officials to be "orthodox" or noncontroversial.

- 14. The existence and use of the above described files is widely known. Many individuals who attend demonstrations know that their photographs are being taken by the police. Many individuals who would otherwise participate in and/or attend such demonstrations are deterred from feeing so by the knowledge that even attendance at peaceful, lawful demonstrations o constraint in their becoming the subject of a police intelligence file.
- 15. The practices described above significantly deter the free exercise, by dissident persons, of rights of political association assembly and speech. Persons holding political views deemed improper or unorthodox by the Police are deterred from engaging in political activity in support of their views, from stating their views in public, and from joining with others in pursuance of their views.
- 16. The information of a political and personal nature listed in the intelligence files is irrelevant to any legitimate purpose of the police in investigating and/or preventing crime.
- 17. The Police practices described above deprive plaintiffs and the class they represent of their right to anonymity in the conduct of their political activity and in their associations, in violation of the First and Fourteenth Amendments to the Constitution.
- 18. The Police practices described above chill and deter plaintiffs and the class they represent in the free exercise of their rights of speech and assembly, in violation of the First and Fourteenth Amendments of the Constitution.



19. The Police practices described above unconstitutionally interfer with the ability of plaintiffs and the class they represent to join with others in lawful political association in support of unpopular views in violation of the First and Fourteenth Amendments of the Constitution.

## VI. Relief

20. Plaintiffs and the members of the class they represent have suffered, are now suffering, and, unless relicf is granted by the Court, will continue to suffer irreparable injury and deprivation of their Constitutional rights by the actions of the actions of the actions of the injury caused by the actions of defendants, their agents and employees.

## WHEREFORE, plaintiffs request:

- a) A preliminary injunction restraining the defendants, their agents and employees, from interfering with any lawful march, demonstration, assembly, or other gathering on the basis of the type of flag, banner, emblem, or ensign being flown or the manner in which said flag, banner, emblem or ensign is being flown;
- b) A permanent injunction restraining the defendants, their agents and employees, from interfering with any lawful march, demonstration, assembly, or other gathering on the basis of the type of flag, banner, emblem, or ensign being flown or the manner in which said flag, banner, emblem or ensign is being flown;
- c) A preliminary injunction restraining the defendants, their agents and employees, from enforcing Section 26.125, R.O., Kansas City, Missouri, Desecrating the Flag;
- d) A permanent injunction restraining the defendants, their agents and employees, from enforcing Section 26.125, R.O., Kansas City, Missouri, Desecrating the Flag;

- e) A declaration that Section 26.125, R.O., Kansas City, Missouri, Desecrating the Flag, is unconstitutional on its face and as applied by the City of Kansas City and the Kansas City, Missouri Police Department;
- f) A preliminary injunction restraining the defendants, their agents, and employees, from gathering information from and about plaintiffs and the class they represent through compiling intelligence files and photographs of plaintiffs and members of plaintiffs' class on the basis of the latter's participation in or attendance at the First and Fourteenth Amendment protected meetings, demonstrations, and public assemblies he restricted with a social views are considered dissident or "unorthodox" by government officials and/or the Kansas City, Missouri Police Department;
- g) A permanent injunction restraining the defendants, their agents and employees, from gathering information from and about plaintiffs and the class they represent through compiling intelligence files and photographs of plaintiffs and members of plaintiffs' class on the basis of the latter's participation in or attendance at the First and Fourteenth Amendment protected meetings, demonstrations, and public assemblies held by citizens' groups who political and social views are considered dissident or "unorthodox" by government officials and/or the Kansas City, Missouri Police Department;
- h) A preliminary injunction restraining the defendants, their agents and employees, from disclosing to other law enforcement agencies, government agencies, private employers, or other persons or groups not expressly authorized by this Court, any information contained in the police intelligence

files heretofore compiled and maintained by the Kansas City, Missouri Police Department;

- i) A permanent injunction restraining the defendants, their agents and employees, from disclosing to other law enforcement agencies, government agencies, private employers or other persons or groups not expressly authorized by this Court, any information contained in the police intelligence files heretofore compiled and maintained by the Kansas City, Missouri Police Department;
- j) An Order requiring the defendants to destroy the intelligence files for plaintiffs and members of plaintiffs class now in their possession and any other similar dossiers of malification. The constitutional rights of the plaintiffs and the class they represent;
- k) A declaration of the unconstitutionality of the police intelligence gathering processes and compilation, maintenance and use of police intelligence files described in this complaint;
- 1) An Order appointing a special master to supervise defendants' compliance with the injunctions described in subparagraphs a) through i) above, with such powers of inspection and supervision as are necessary to insure faithful compliance with the Courts' Orders and to restore complete public confidence in the vitality of the rights of free speech; assembly, association and petition in the City of Kansas City, Missouri; and
- m) Any further relief which the Court may deem appropriate.




### **OBSERVATIONS:**



For information of all offices, VVAW is antiwar organization organized in 1967 and headquartered in New York City. Its published objective is "to demand an immediate cessation of fighting and the withdrawal of all American troops from Indochina." VVAW has participated in several demonstrations, including massive demonstration in Washington, D. C., 4/19-23/71.

To date no active investigation has been conducted regarding VVAW in absence of any significant indications of subversive involvement and/or involvement in disruptive or violence-prone activities. However, within past few months, tempo of VVAW activities has been increasing with several developments of direct concern to the FBIs responsibilities in the internal security field. For example, Bureau has received information that:

- 1. VVAW plans caravan to Cairo, Illinois, to furnish food and supplies to blacks who are boycotting white businesses. VVAW members reportedly have arms and will defend themselves against any attack by whites.
- 2. VVAW representatives met with representatives of North Vietnamese delegation in Paris during 6/71 7 4
- 3. Large portion of income for New Jersey VVAW comes from former CPUSA member.

- 4. VVAW is directly involved in aiding and financing, U.S. military deserters and has obtained false identifications, including Selective Service cards.

- 6. VVAW at Seattle is led by an individual who signed Socialist Workers Party (SWP) nominating petition.
  - 7. VVAW members plan press conferences in North and South Vietnam against war; and if barred from South Vietnam by South Vietnamese Government, they plan to enter South Vietnam clandestinely.
  - 8. VVAW in Memphis is controlled and dominated by members of Young Workers Liberation League, youth group of CPUSA.
  - 9. VVAW meetings in Kansas City are being attended by members of Young Socialist Alliance, youth group of Socialist Workers Party.

All recipients should promptly initiate survey to determine existence of VVAW in your divisions. If organized VVAW activity determined, conduct discreet preliminary investigation, through established sources only, to identify leaders, members, aims, objectives, and activities of the organization. Specific determination should be made as to whether each VVAW local chapter is infiltrated, dominated or controlled by basic revolutionary groups or other subversive elements. In addition, comments should be submitted as to potential for VVAW in each division to engage in disruptive acts of civil disobedience and/or violence.



On June 4 - 5, Terry DuBose, Texas Regional Coordinator of the VVAW, attended the National VVAW Conference in St. Louis, Missouri

In September at Arlington, Texas, the Arlington VVAW is putting together a Rapid American Withdrawal (RAW) to be conducted in the Ft. Worth - Dallas area. A RAW is a mock search and destroy mission conducted by veterans through a populated area to "bring the war home," so to speak.

In September at El Paso, the El Paso VVAW is putting together an educational speaker/film tour which will probably start in Denver and then go to Albuquerque, El Paso, Austin, Dallas, and Houston. They are trying to get National VVAW figures to speak.

In February (1972) the Regional Office of the VVAW is considering putting together an extensive Winter Soldier Investigation by Texas veterans to testify to war crimes and atrosities. \ \

### IV. MEMBERSHIP

Dues for the National Vietnam Veterans Against the War are \$5. Because of need for financing, the Regional Offices will collect the dues. No one will be denied membership in the VVAW because of the lack of money to pay membership dues but those individuals not paying will not be issued membership cards. \*\*

The membership requirements are that an individual is a veteran and is opposed to the war in Southeast Asia. Regular members must be Vietnam veterans. All veterans can join the VVAW as associate members. Associate members cannot serve on the National Executive Committee.

The following individuals responded to an advertisement in Playboy Magazine and comprise the approximately 536 veterans who have contacted the Texas VVAW concerning membership. It is noted that about 100 of these 500 plus are active duty brothers.





At approximately 7:00 P.W., August 18, 1971, a group of approximately 40 individuals displaying VVAW and Chicago Peace Council (CPC) signs staged a guerilla theater criticizing the Vietnam War and the refusal of permission for them (VVAW) to approach President Nixon during his visit to Springfield, Illinois.

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



Members of VVAW led student strikes on major campuses across the country and battled Veterans Administration Hospital authorities over threats to throw amputee Vietnam veterans out for signing anti-war petitions. At present, membership of the VVAW, nationally, consists of 8,500 members.

The National Peace Action Coalition was founded in 1970, by members of the Socialist Workers Party (SWP). Its basic objective is to unite masses of people, including labor unions, GIs, and the Black community in the struggle to end United States intervention in Southeast Asia through orderly and peaceful tactics. bit of his time with the YSA members in Kansas City. further advised that on May 23, 1971, a guerrilla theatre was filmed at the Kansas City VVAW meeting and an individual named (last name unknown) was present from California and he was said to be a member of the Ceasar Chavez group. During the meeting, he gave a speech quoting theory regarding Mao and Lenin.

On June 8, 197🎉 advised that another Kansas City VVAW meeting was held on June 7, 1971, and approximately twenty individuals attended. Among those attending were both YSA members. At this and meeting, Upton mentioned they were beginning to have problems with the national VVAW organization. He said some of their regional coordinators had been dismissed due to their SWP arphi ties and there have been attempts by the YSA and the NPAC to take over their organization. Upton further advised that several Senators were donating money to the VVAW, including Senator Edward Kennedy. Said that Upton ended the Senator Edward Kennedy. meeting by saying the national VVAW is planning to disassociate themselves with the NPAC and were, not going to affiliate with subversive groups.

On June 16, 1971, an article appeared in The University Daily Kansan, a daily newspaper published on the University of Kansas (KU), Lawrence, Kansas, campus, giving the following information: \\

An organizational meeting for a local chapter of the VVAW will meet at 7:00 p.m., Thursday, in Room 305 at the Kansas Union, according to the group's spokesman, David Clements Overland Park, Kansas. Clements recently returned from Washington, D. C., where he participated in a VVAW protest, and he outlined the following VVAW objectives:





- 1) Gain immediate ceasage of fighting and withdrawal of all American troops from Indo-China;
- 2) Demand that Congress enact legislation for the immediate termination of all funds being utilized by the U. S. Government;
- Demonstrate that our military tactics dehumanize soldiers and civilians;
- 4) Show Americans that their society is structured by racism which lets us view all non-whites as less than human;
- 5) Make clear that the United States has never undertaken an extensive open investigation of American war crimes in Indo-China;
- 6) Demand that all active duty servicemen and women be afforded their rights as citizens which are guaranteed by the United States Constitution and Bill of Rights, which are presently denied them by the uniform code of military justice;
- 7) Support all military personnel refusing to service in wars of aggression at home and abroad and also all persons refusing to be drafted;
- 8) Demand immediate legislation to provide proper care and services for all veterans in VA Hospitals;
- 9) Affirm that membership is not only concerned with ending the war, but changing the domestic, social, political and economic institutions which have caused and permitted the continuance of the war.

On June 4, 1971, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised that a VVAW organizational meeting was held at the Student Union at KU, Lawrence, Kansas, on May 6, 1971, and approximately thirteen people were present. Stated that most of the people were "straight" individuals who did not intend to disrupt anything or cause any trouble, but were merely disgusted with the Vietnam war



and wanted to show their disapproval.

On July 23, 1971, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised that a Kansas City PAC meeting was held on July 21, 1971, and a discussion arose at the meeting regarding the fact there was a split between the Kansas City VVAW and the Kansas City PAC. The split came about because the Kansas City VVAW did not wish to be associated with the Kansas City PAC and wished to have its own leadership, not to be controlled by the anti-war faction within the Kansas City PAC.

An article appeared in the Kansas City Times, a daily Kansas City, Missouri, newspaper, dated August 12, 1971, which consisted of an interview with John Upton, regional leader of the VVAW. In the interview, Upton said that he was a member of the Students for a Democratic Society (SDS) before joining the navy. He said he joined the SDS for practical reasons - to escape the draft and avoid a jail sentence for refusing to submit to induction.

The SDS was founded during June 1962, at Port Huron, Michigan, and in the 1960s functioned as the leading New Left campus-based student organization in the United States. From a stance of "participatory democracy," the SDS moved to a radical-revolutionary position. It maintained a national office at 1608 West Madison Street, Chicago, Illinois, until February 1970. Internal factionalism during 1969 produced three main factions: Weatherman, Revolutionary Youth Movement (RYM), and Worker Student Alliance (WSA). The Weatherman and RYM no longer consider themselves associated with the SDS. The WSA faction continues to use the name SDS.

A source advised on August 20, 1971, that he was aware of some vague mention concerning a planned Southeastern Regional Conference of the Vietnam Veterans Against the War (VVAW) to be held near Gainesville, Florida, September 4 - 6, 1971.

Source advised he learned that this conference was originally planned to be held in Orlando, Florida, but that these plans were cancelled due to the possibility of hostility from the local community towards such a meeting. Source advised that the location was changed to a more isolated, non-populated area so as to provide a more private atmosphere.

Source advised this conference is now planned to be held which was recently purchased in Archer Florida.

The VFP is an anti-war student organization on the campus of the University of Florida, Gainesville, Florida, and was supported by the Young Socialist Alliance (YSA) at Gainesville, Florida, at the time of its inception.

As the youth organization of the Socialist Workers Party (SWP), the YSA serves as the main source of recruitment into that organization. The YSA is described in the masthead of its official publication, "The Young Socialist Organizer," as "A multinational revolutionary socialist youth organization."

McCleave described himself as being a Vietnam veteran and indicated he joined with the oppressed peoples of the world. He invited everyone to join the veterans in Washington, D.C., April 18-23, 1971, where there would be a veterans' march to oppose the war in Southeast Asia.

A second source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised on April 14, 1971, that VVAW was not a part of the long established Veterans For Peace, but was supposedly exclusively for Vietnam veterans who were "young hippie-types."

The Chicago Today, an evening newspaper in Chicago, Illinois, in its April 22, 1971, edition, carried en page two, a story entitled, "Illinois Vets in Protest: Their Side of Viet War." This article told of six veterans from Illinois who were in Washington to protest the war. They were Bart Savage, Chicago; Andy McSheffery, D.C. Midlothian, Illinois, who merved with the Navy for more in Vietnam; Mark Johnson, Chicago, 13 months in Vietnam; Jim Umenhoffer, Champaign, Illinois; David Barber, Joliet, Illinois; Bill Weaver, Winnetka, Illinois

On March 19, 1971, a fourth source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised that the City of North Chicago received a letter dated March 18, 1971, from the North Chicago Chapter - Movement for a Democratic Military (NCC-MDM), Chicago Area Military Project (CAMP), and the Vietnam Veterans Coalition (VVC). These groups had requested the use of Foss Park, North Chicago, Illinois, for a rally May 16, 1971. This was to be an anti-war demonstration on Armed Forces Day.

The Waukegan, Illinois, News Sun, a daily newspaper, in its April 12, 1971, edition on page one carried an article entitled "Weathermen Plan Protest at Great Lakes." In this article Jennifer Dohrn, sister of Bernardine Dohrn, spoke before a group estimated at 3,000 people in Chicago, Illinois, on April 11, 1971. She told of plans to fill young people to protest the war. The article reported that one David McCleedy, also spoke and stated that the VVC was promoting the May Day march in Washington and the North Chicago demonstration, May 15-16, 1971.

### VORTHAM VETERANS AGAINST THE WAR (VVAW)

The March 4, 1971, issue of Chicago Heights Star, a semi-weekly newspaper reflected that David McCleave, a Vietnam war veteran, would speak at a peace rally at Park Forest Village Hall on that date at a meeting sponsored by the South Shore Women For Peace. He was described as a member of "VVC" and had participated in an investigation of alleged atrocities which were conducted by VVAV.

The fifth source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised on August 4, 1971, that a regional meeting of the People's Coalition for Peace and Justice (PCPJ) was held in Rockford, Illinois, on July 23, 1971. Attending this meeting was all Illinois, who represented the

A-sixth source, who has furnished reliable information in the most on August 17, 1971, advised that both identified themselves with the VVAW, but they had no group activity in the Rockford area.

Sources who are familiar with various phases of anti-war and subversive activity in the Chicago area advised in August, 1971, that they were not aware of any organized VVAW activity in the Chicago area.

A PCPJ press release, dated March 1, 1971, described the PCPJ as being headquartered in Washington, D.C., and consisting of 100 organizations which are using massive, non-violent civil disobedience to combat racism, povery, repression and war.

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
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

A VVAW group was founded in March 1971 consisting primarily of veteran students at Arizona State University, Tempe, Arizona. The group was a member of a Phoenix citywide coalition consisting of anti-war, anti-draft and minority groups which sponsored the National Peace Action Coalition April 1971 demonstrations in Phoenix, Arizona.

The National Peace Action Coalition (NPAC) was founded in 1970 by members of the Socialist Workers Party (SWP). Its basic objective is to unite masses of people, including labor unions, GIs and the black community in the struggle to end United States intervention in Southeast Asia through orderly and peaceful tactics.

Source stated that the VAW has not participated in any violent or disruptive demonstrations; however, members of this organization participated in the May 5, 1971, "March Against the War" in that they led this march from the UP campus to downtown Knoxville, Tennessee, where a peaceful anti-war rally was held.

A second source advised on June 10, 1971, that the VAW is an organization of veterans who attend UT, Knoxville, Tennessee, and one has to be a veteran in order to be a member of the VAW. Second source advised the VAW is interested primarily in ending the war in Vietnam.

- 1. To demand an immediate cessation of fighting and the withleavel of all American troops from Indochina. We cannot allow one more
- 2. To desend Congress enact legislation for the immediate termination of all funds being utilized by the United States government, its allies and the Central Intelligence Agency to support their illegal operations in Latin America, Africa, China, Russipa, and the countries of Vietnam, Cambodia, Laos, and Thailand.
- 3. To demonstrate that our military tactics dehumanize soldiers and civilians, and to make clear the United States government is prosecuting an Allegal, unjust and immoral war in Indochina.
- 4. To show Americans that their society is structured by a racism which lets us view all non-whites as less than human. # Hill Debate Over Flag Ends In Compromise

#### By TOM ADKINSON

Moratorium plans to fly the flag on the Hill at half staff yesterday were changed after two groups of veterans argued whether the flag should be lowered at all.

.Veterans Against the War and moratorium workers had planned to fly the flag at half staff all day, but another group of veterans, opposing this, and an administrative decision, let the flag stay at half staff for only one hour.

GOV. WINFIELD DUNN and Chancellor Charles H. Weaver decided late Tuesday night that if the situation merited it, the flag would be put at half staff for, only one hour. Chancellor Weaver said yesterday.

The moratorium workers got permission to lower the flag from Gov. Dunn carlier in the week after having been refused by Chancellor Weaver.

The Veterans Against the War, supported by the Student Government Association, presented a new flag to Vice Chancellor Howard F. Aldmon, late yesterday.

DR. ALDMON, accepting for the University, said "as far as I know, it will be flying in the morning (today)."

When the "peace" detail arrived to lower the flag yesterday morning, they found the flag ropes taped about 15 feet up the pole, and seven other veterans encricing the pole, vowing not to let the flag be lowered. All but one of the seven refused to give his name.

Associate dean of students Charles R. Burchett, representing the administration, made the ultimate decision.

"DEAN BURCHETT was on the Hill to make judgements on the spot," and it was his decision to implement the one hour agreement," said Chancellor Weaver.

"We didn't come here to cause trouble, but we can if we have to," said Charles Thompson, a business administration senior and one of those surrounding the flag pole.

Dean Burchett told the group salthough you may not like this, it (the lowering) has been authorized," then announced the flag would be lowered to half staff by Safety and Security officers, remain for one hour, then be taised by officers.



THE VETERANS who came to lower the flag protested, but to no avail.


Law student Ron Leadbetter, who joined the group surrounding the pole, climbed a ladder supplied by the Physical Plant, and untaped the ropes.

"The flag is being lowered to honor people who died fighting for its honor not for the people who died at Kent State," Leadbetter said.

SGA President Charles Huddleston said the lowering honored "those killed at Kent State, and Jackson State, and in Vietnam."

After the flag was raised an hour later, a veteran, John D. McPherson, threw his National Defense Service Ribben and his Weapons Qualifications medal at the base of the flag.



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

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

#### I. LOCATION

A flier handed to a Special Agent of the FBI during an anti-war demonstration held at the Colorado State Capitol Building, Denver, Colorado, on April 6, 1971, while United States Vice President Spiro Agnew was addressing the Colorado Legislature indicated that the Colorado Vietnam Veterans Against the War (VVAW) has a Denver area office in Room 7, 1460 Pennsylvania Avenue, Denver, Colorado, 80203, telephone 255-1006.

II. LEADERS

Member of Subject Organization

An article in the March 21, 1971, issue of "The Denver Post," daily Denver, Colorado, newspaper, wherein three representatives of the Colorado chapter of the VVAW urged interested veterans to participate in an anti-war demonstration to be held April 19 - 23, 1971, in Washington, D. C., identified Brian Adams, a former Army officer, as Regional Coordinator of VVAW. A first source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, on April 8, 1971, furnished a copy of the VVAW newsletter, issue number one, dated March, 1971, which set forth a list of VVAW Regional Coordinators. The Coordinator for Colorado and Utah was listed as Brian Adams, 1607 Race Street, Denver, Colorado, telephone

The April 12, 1971, issue of "The Denver Post" contains an article concerning the forming of a peace group in Denver called The Committee for Peace and New Priorities. Scott Halliday, representing the Colorado

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chapter of VVAW, was identified as one of the organizers of the new group.

Absecond source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised on April 16, 1971, that Robert S. Halliday and Brian R. Adams were co-signers on a check given in partial payment of cost of chartering a bus for use by VVAW. The "Rocky Mountain News", daily Denver, Colorado, newspaper, in an article in its April 20, 1971, issue set forth an interview with Scott Halliday conducted in Washington, D. C., April 19, 1971. Halliday, age 22, stated he works full time for the Colorado VVAW for no salary. The "Rocky Mountain News" in its April 27, 1971, issue identified Scott Halliday as the State VVAW Coordinator.

MEMBER OF SUBTET ORGANIZATION

A third source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised April 14, 1971, that organizers of a VVAW peace march at Colorado State University (CSU), Ft. Collins, Colorado, planned for April 15, 1971, were Ralph Swain and Rob Modisette, Colosus Students.

A fourth source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised August 1, 1971, that as of July 27, 1971, Brian Adams, Scott Halliday, Steve Norris, and Phillyoung were working at the VVAW office, 1460 Pennsylvania Avenue, Denver, Colorado.

## III. MEMBERS

The April 1, 1971, issue of "The Denver Post" quotes Brian Adams as stating that the Colorado VVAW, which started only a month before, has about 200 members. The April 27, 1971, issue of the "Rocky Mountain News" reports that Scott Halliday, State VVAW Coordinator, stated that Colorado VVAW has 300 members. The April 28, 1971, issue of the University of Denver "Clarion," official campus newspaper, in an interview with Ray Chase, an active member of the Colorado VVAW, reports that according to Chase the VVAW had over 300 registered members at the last count taken just before the April 19 - 23, 1971, demonstrations in Washington, D. C.

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## IV. OBJECTIVES

On June 22, 1971, a fifth source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, furnished a leaflet obtained at the "Winter Soldier Investigation" held by the Colorado VVAW in Denver, Colorado, June 19 and 20, 1971. This leaflet sets forth the objectives of VVAW. They are as follows:

#### OBJECTIVES OF VIETNAM VETERANS AGAINST THE WAR:

L. To demand an immediate cessation of fighting and the withdrawal of all American troops from Indochina; we cannot allow one more human being to die senselessly in Indochina.

2. To demonstrate that our military tactics dehumanize soldiers and civilians, and to make clear the underlying governmental policies of the U.S. military and the Nixon administration in prospecting an unjust and immoral marring and indoching.

3. To bring together a national coalition of vetorans, National Guard and reservists, and active—duty servicemen and wemen for peace, so that the men and women who have first—hand knowledge of the military and the Indochina War can effectively voice their opinions.

4. To shown that opposition to the war does not stem from cowardice or disloyalty; the best way to keep faith with our fighting men is to BRING THEM BACK ALIVE --- NOW:

5. To show that Americans allow their society to be pervaded by a racism which lets us view Asians and our own minorities as less-then-human. This racism pushes our minorities through inferior schools and into the combat arms. Thus, we send our minorities off to die in a disproportionately high number while we kill Asians indiscriminately. We demand that the military recognize its complicity in America's domestic and international racism.

6. To demand immediate increase in Veterans Administration funds to correct the deplorably inhumane conditions that prevail in VaA. hospitals, i.e. and to facilitate the initiation of rehabilitative programs responsive to the needs of all veterans.

7. To make clear that the U.S. has never undertaken an extensive, open investigation of American war crimes in Indochina. We demand that the U.S. Government, in its war in Indochina, affirm the principles of Nuremberg. While we as former GI's, recognize the responsibility of the individual soldier to refrain from committing war crimes, we also recognize that the ultimate and primary responsibility and guilt of American war crimes lies with our policymakers at all levels.



We endorse the efforts of the American Servicemen's Union to win a Bill of Rights for servicemen.

9. To support active-duty GI's refusing orders to fight in S.E. Asia. We support all Americans refusing to be drafted.

Fifth source on April 21, 1971, furnished a leaflet captioned "Open Letter to the Congress of the United States," which source was handed during an antiwar rally held April 17, 1971, on the Colorado State Capitol Building grounds, Denver, Colorado. The letter indicates it was prepared by the VVAW and lists the following 16 demands:



DEMAND FOR PUBLIC HEARINGS ON RECRESS OF GRIEVANCES OF VETERANS OF THE INDOCHINA WAR

VIMINAM VETERANS AGAINST THE WAR, on behalf of its members end all other people who have worked toward peace, place before the Congress of the United States the following demands:

- 1. The Congress enact legislation to necessitate the immediate, unilateral, unconditional withdrawal of all United States Armed Forces and Central Intelligence Agency personnel from the countries of Vietnam, Cambodia, Laos, and Theiland.
- 2. The Congress enect legislation to terminate all funds appropriated for the continued presence of the United States Military, its Allies and the Central Intelligence Agency in the countries of Vietnam, Cambodia, Laos and Thailand.
- 3. The Congress enact legislation for the termination of all funds being utilized by the Central Intelligence Agency to support their illegal operations in Latin America, Africa, China, Europe, and the countries of Vietnam, Cambodia, Laos, and Thailand.
- 4. The Congress refuse to grant the 200 million dollars requested by the Administration for the continued United States support of the corrupt military machinery of the illegal government of Cambodia.
- 5. The congress enact legislation for the immediate repatriation with full amnesty to those men and women who are in prison or in self-exile by reason of their refusal to serve in the military.
- 6. The Congress convene immediate full public hearings into the charges of War Crimes committed against the people of Indochina as a result of Official and Be Facto United States Military policy in the conducting of the illegal war of aggression in the countries of Vietnam, Cambodia, Laes, and Thailand.
- 7. The Congress allow the Vietnam veterans who brought these charges at the recently concluded Winter Soldier Investigation to testify with full Congressional immunity at these public hearings.
- 8. The Congress without regard for domestic political consideration issue a statement to the American people that the only means of securing the release of American Prisoners of War is through the immediate cessation of all acts of aggression against the countries of Vietnam, Cambodia, and Laos, the immediate withdrawal of United States support in any form to the illegal, corrupt, government of Theiu, Ky, and Khiem, and the immediate withdrawal of all United States and Allied Forces from the countries of Vietnam, Cambodia, Laos, and Thailand.
- 9. The Congress enact immediate legislation to provide proper care and services for all patients in Veterans Administration Hospitals.
- 10. The Congress enact immediate legislation to make available job training and placement in both the public and private sectors for every returning Veteran.





- 11. The Congress enact immediate legislation providing the necessary funding for the structuring and implementation of drug rehabilitation and psychotherapy programs for returning veterans of the Indochina War.
- 12. The Congress enact immediate legislation providing the funds and means necessary for the Veterans Administration to provide materials, services and subsistence required by veterars in the course of their educational and vocational and vocational endeavors.
- 13. The Congress address itself immediately to the reordering of national priorities to serve the dire domestic social, economic and educational needs of all the people.
- 14. The Congress convene a joint session to be addressed by a member of our organization.
- 15. The Congress of the United States of America cease immediately acting in tandem with the Executive Drance and meet its responsibility under the Constitution of the United States of America to protect the interest of and safeguard the rights of all the people of the United States of America.

In an interview with Ray Chase, a University of Denver student and an active member of the Colorado VVAW, which appeared in the April 28, 1971, issue of the University of Denver "Clarion," Chase stated that the **V**VAW is a non-profit organization and is not a radical peace demanding coalition, but rather an organization of firsthand authorities whose experiences in Vietnam have convinced them that what the United States is doing in Southeast Asia is a grave mistake. Chase said that the VVAW is a non-partisan organization which is sincerely opposed to the war because of the unnecessary loss of American lives and the unforgivable maiming of the bodies of young men. He stated that the VVAW is dead set against the way the Army has been "unjustly used to carry out the military blunders of the past and present Presidential administrations."


### V. ACTIVITIES

Special Agents of the FBI on April 6, 1971, observed a group of about 20 males grouped behind a VVAW banner during an anti-war rally at the Colorado State Capitol Building, Denver, Colorado, during the time that United States Vice President Spiro Agnew was addressing the Colorado Legislature. The rally was attended by 800-to 1,000 persons, mostly young and white. Brian Adams, Boby Morning, and Dony Pfeiffer of the VVAW Colorado MEMBER OF SUBJECT ORGANIZATION

The VVAW at CSU, Ft. Collins, Colorado, planned a fund-raising party for April 10, 1971. Admission was to be \$1.50 per person, according to the article which appeared in the April 8, 1971, issue of the CSU "Collegian," official campus newspaper.

On April 14, 1971, third source advised that a peace march sponsored by VVAW was planned for April 15, 1971, at 12:00 noon from the CSU campus, Ft. Collins, Colorado, to downtown Ft. Collins and return. The march was organized by Ralph Swain and Rob Modisette. A Special Agent of the FBI observed on April 15, 1971, that the peace march occurred as scheduled without

incident. Approximately 125 individuals participated. At the march, said the veteran group plans to send 10 of its members from Ft. Collins to Washington, D. C., to take part in the peace rally there April 18 - 23, 1971. The April 9, 1971, issue of the CSU "Collegian" reported that CSU VVAW had collected approximately \$700.00 from students and faculty and from a garage sale to sponsor sending the 10 veterans to Washington, and at a cabinet meeting April 8, 1971, the Associated Student Government voted to appropriate an additional \$235.00 to defray trip expenses.

According to the April 12, 1971, issue of "The Denver Post," the Colorado VVAW participated through its member Scott Halliday in organizing a peace group called The Committee for Peace and New Priorities made up of Denver area business and professional people and representatives of existing peace organizations. The goal of the new group was to put pressure on Congress to withdraw all American troops from Southeast Asia by the end of 1971.

On April 16, 1971, secondarounce advised that Brian R. Adams, Regional Organizen of VVAW in Colorado, on that date paid \$2,366.00 to the Greyhound Bus Company, Denver, Colorado, to charter a bus to travel from Denver to Washington, D. C., April 17, 1971, and return. \$2,355.00 of the amount was in the form of money orders Sixth source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised on April 21, 1971, that these money onders had been issued by Joseph T. Urgo, Public Relations Chairman of TVAW, 156-5th Avenue, Room-735, New York City. On ZNY Y. April 17, 1971, Special Agents of the FBI observed the bus chartered by VVAW depart 1460 Pennsylvania Avenue for Washington, D. C. In addition, several carloads of individuals were also observed to depart. Approximately 53 persons left in the bus and by car. According to the May 4, 1971, issue of the CSU "Collegian," approximately 55 Colorado veterans, including 10 from Ft. Collins, participated in the demonstrations in Washington, D.

On May 8, 1971, Fourth Bourge advised that six individuals, five of them black, traveling by car from Denver to Washington, D. C., to participate in the VVAW demonstrations were arrested by state police in Pennsylvania for violation of the Uniform Firearms Act, possession of dangerous drugs, and larceny.

In an interview which appeared in the April 27, 1971, issue of the "Rocky Mountain News," Scott Halliday stated that the Colorado VVAW delegation that participated in the demonstrations in Washington, D. C., the week before intended to conduct an anti-war door-to-door campaign in the Denver area. He stated that the campaign will be in cooperation with the Colorado Committee to Set the Date, which asks for complete military pull out from Vietnam by December 31, 1971.

On May 1, 1971, Special Agents of the FBI observed Bob Morning of the VVAW at the parade and rally held that day under the sponsorship of the Colorado Peace Coalition (CPC).

The CPC is an ad hoc umbrella organization of several anti-war and anti-draft groups in the Denver area. Its original leaders were Mary Walter and Joe Johnson, members of the Colo Socialist Workers Party (SWP), and it is largely dominated by SWP and Young Socialist Alliance (YSA) affiliates.

The SWP has been designated pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

As the youth organization of the Socialist Workers Party (SWP), the Young Socialist Alliance (YSA) serves as the main source of recruitment into that organization. The YSA is described in the masthead of its official publication, "The Young Socialist Organizer," as "A multinational revolutionary socialist youth organization."



During the above rally a Colorado VVAW flier was handed out which urged a massive letter writing campaign to United States Congressmen in support of legislation for the immediate total withdrawal of United States forces from Southeast Asia. Another flier handed out at the rally advertised a meeting to be held by CPC and the Colorado VVAW on May 2, 1971, where GI "solidarity actions" for May 15 and 16, 1971, would be planned. According to fourth sources the May 2, 1971, meeting was held and representing Colorado VVAW were Scott Halliday and Bob Morning. A tentative schedule for a demonstration-type rally at Acacia Park in Colorado Springs, Colorado, May 15, 1971, to be followed by a march to Ft. Carson, Colorado, was agreed upon.

On May 15, 1971, Special Agents of the FBI observed that the rally took place as scheduled at Acacia Park and Ft. Carson, Colorado. 150 to 200 individuals met at Acacia Park, where several anti-Vietnam speakers were heard. Among them was Scott Halliday of Colorado VVAW. Approximately 50 of those at Acacia Park demonstrated at Ft. Carson later in the day. No pertinent incidents occurred.

The May 6, 1971, issue of the CSU "Collegian" reported that Ralph Swain of VVAW announced the CSU VVAW was initiating a postcard campaign in the next two weeks to obtain support for a definite withdrawal date of American troops from Southeast Asia. The postcards signed by Ft. Collins citizens would be sent to members of Congress.

On April 30, 1971, a seventh source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, furnished a leaflet concerning a panel discussion to be held at the SWP Book Store, 607 East 13th Avenue, Denver, Colorado, on April 16, 1971, concerning "April 17 in Denver and April 24 in San Francisco and Washington, D. C." The panel was to feature members from the VVAW, the Crusade for Justice, the Student Mobilization Committee, and the United Women's Contingent, a sub-group of the CPC.





The Crusade for Justice (CFJ) is a militant Mexican-American organization founded in 1968 with headquarters in Denver, Colorado. Its political arm is known as "La Raza Unida" - The United (Mexican-American) People. Its objective is development of the Mexican-American community in political education and social action.

The Student Mobilization Committee to End the War in Vietnam (SMC) is controlled by the SWP and its youth affiliate, YSA. SMC initiates and supports public demonstrations against the war in Southeast Asia.

An eighth source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, on May 27, 1971, furnished a leaflet which was being handed out on the streets of downtown Denver a few days before. The flier indicates that Colorado VVAW has joined with another group called Colorado Campaign to Set the Date, with Scott Halliday of Colorado VVAW listed as a sponsor. The address for Colorado Campaign to Set the Date is 1460 Pennsylvania Avenue, the same building where Colorado VVAW is located.

The May 28, 1971, issue of "The Denver Post" carried an article indicating that members of the Colorado VVAW on May 29, 1971, would begin a petition campaign asking for an end to the Indochina war by next December. 31. Signatures on postcards would be requested and the cards would be delivered to the Colorado Congressional delegation. In the article, Scott Halliday indicated that a 50-man task force of VVAW members would be utilized. A press conference by four members of the Colorado VVAW was reported in the June 1, 1971, issue of "The Denver Post." The conference related to the meaning of Memorial Day in America and deplored the loss of American lives in the war in Vietnam.

On June 11, 1971, fifth source advised that the Colorado VVAW is planning a "Winter Soldier Investigation" June 19 and 20, 1971, to be held in Denver, Colorado.



The purpose is to investigate war crimes by American soldiers. There will be a panel of lawyers and ministers to discuss the offenses with those present. On June 14, 1971, FIRM source stated that the Spring Against the War Committee (later called Rocky Mountain Freedom Conspiracy) is supporting the Colorado VVAW in the latter group's efforts to hold the "Winter Soldier Investigation." Both groups will distribute posters and leaflets throughout Denver.

The Spring Against the War Committee, also known as Rocky Mountain Freedom Conspiracy, commenced as a sub-committee of the CPC, according to Tourth source. When it advocated and carried out several disobediences in connection with a demonstration at the Denver Federal Center wherein its members impeded traffic and 24 of them were arrested, the CPC withdrew its participation in the committee's activities.

An invitation to attend the Winter Soldier Investigation from the Colorado VVAW, addressed to the Denver Office of the FBI, was received June 17, 1971.

On June 4, 1971, fourth source advised that one Mike Oliver of the National Office of VVAW was staying for a couple of weeks at where Brian Adams of the Colorado VVAW lives in order to work on the forthcoming war crimes investigations in Denver. The June 20 and 21, 1971, issues of the "Rocky Mountain News" and the June 21, 1971, issue of "The Denver Post" carried articles relating to the Winter Soldier Investigation held by the Colorado VVAW at the Indian Center, East 16th Avenue and Gaylord Street, Denver, Colorado. Church for the Denver area. The panel for the June 20, 1971, session consisted of Byron Johnson, a <u>Professor</u> and Regent at the University of Colorado, Boulder, Colorado; <u>Attorney</u> Rudolph Schware; former Denver Juvenile Court Judge Ted Rubin; Dana Wilbanks, a <u>Professor</u> at Iliff School of Theology; and Ved P. Manda, a <u>Professor</u> at the University of Denver Law School.

On June 22, 1971, fifth Bounde advised that Gary Guy, whom he knows to be involved in the operation of the SWP Book Store and connected with the CPC, manned a literature table outside the Indian Center where the Winter Soldier Investigation was held. He passed out leaflets and offered for sale militant type literature and books.

On June 30, 1971, The curre advised that an unknown representative from Colorado VVAW was present at the June 24, 1971, meeting of the Rocky Mountain Freedom Conspiracy (RMFC). This representative commented to the group that the VVAW would be happy to have the support of the RMFC. RMFC plans to leaflet at Ft. Carson, Colorado, in an effort to get soldiers to resist the war, to go AWOL, and to find ways out of the military. According to fifth source, on July 26, 1971, Scott Halliday was present at the July 22, 1971, meeting of RMFC. He indicated that in addition to attending the CPC's march on August 6, 1971 (Hiroshima Day), VVAW might give support to RMFC in some of its demonstrations.

During the candlelight march and rally sponsored by the CPC on the evening of August 6, 1971, Special Agents of the FBI observed Don Pfeiffer, a member of VVAW, and Brian Adams spoke. Adams made frequent references to the Winter Soldier Investigation in Detroit, Michigan, attacked the United States fighting force in Southeast Asia, and attempted to draw parallels with Social the destruction that occurred in Japan during the Second World War. Among other speakers were Jim Lauderdale, SWP candidate for Governor of Colorado in 1970; Fern Gapin, a representative of the Women's Contingent Against the War; Jon Hillson, a representative of SMC; and Burt Wallrich, a representative of the RMFC.

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the July 17, 1971, meeting of CPC, wherein the fall calendar for the organization was discussed, it was brought out that CPC will assist the VVAW in activities that the latter organization plans for October 25, 1971. This source on August 2, 1971, provided a letter sent by CPC to its supporters. The letter, among other things, advertises the fact that on October 25, 1971, GI's and veterans will lead Veteran Day actions during the fall campaign against the war in Indochina. The name Brian Adams, Colorado Regional Coordinator, VVAW, appeared as one of several group representatives sponsoring the CPC letter.

The August 26, 1971, issue of "The Denver Post" contained an article concerning activities at the National Student Association (NSA) Congress being held at CSU, Ft. Collins, Colorado, August 20 - 29, 1971. The article indicated that John Kerry, 28, from Waltham, Massachusetts, one of the leaders of a national group called VVAW, spoke to students at the Congress on August 25, 1971. Kerry suggested that American GI's could voluntarily return to Vietnam and help rebuild the country. According to the article, Kerry indicated that he had just returned from a trip to Paris, France, to talk with delegates at the peace talks, including those from North Vietnam. He indicated that as far as the North Vietnamese are concerned, "Everything is on the table," and that if the United States would set a definite date for withdrawal of troops, the prisoners of war would be released and negotiations could start. He characterized the Nixon administration as "absolutely immoral, and intends to play out the war." STEMBER OF SUBJECT ORGANIZATION

VVAW has chapters in every state and a membership of about 22,000. He stated that he was one of a six-member VVAW governing board.

According to "The Denver Post," "Rocky Mountain News," and CSU "Collegian," other speakers before the NSA Congress were Senator George McGovern, Democrat, South

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
Dakota; Representative Pete McClosky, Republican, California; bbr Benjamin Spock, anti-draft advocate; and Dr. Daniel Ellsberg, former Pentagon Aids charged with the release of secret Pentagon papers.

The August 25, 1971, issue of "The Denver Post" indicated that the Colorado VVAW in cooperation with the Colorado Campaign to Set the Date and a group called the Business Executive Move for Vietnam Peace were sponsoring a luncheon honoring United States Representative Paul McClosky at noon, August 27, 1971, after which McClosky was to speak at the NSA Congress, Ft. Collins, Colorado.


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

New Orleans evaluates the New Orleans VVAW not to be directlyianfiltrated, dominated, or controlled by any basic revolutionary group. However, New Orleans notes ties VVAW has admitted with Peoples Coalition for Peace and Justice (PCPJ) during demonstrations in Washington, D.C., in April and May, 1971. New Orleans also notes local VVAW ties with New Orleans Peace Action Centerion, Student, Liberal Federation, and Movement for Demonratic Society (MDS), which have appeared to be attempts to gain acceptance and support of the general radical community. That VVAW wishes to act on its own in New Orleans is demonstrated by its holding it's own meetings and sponsoring its own anti-military leafletting at the U.S. Customhouse.

New Orleans evaluates local VVAW's potential to engage in violence as minimal. To date, the statements of leaders re the activities in support of blacks in Cairo, Ill., have not shown an intent to recruit local person to travel there. Reference to firearms have not shown any intent to actually obtain firearms in New Orleans, and no firearms are currently known to be in the possession of local VVAW persons. VVAW activists have participated in acts of defiance fantiser leafletting and pickets of Orleans Parish Prison), but in these cases, these activities have not amounted to disruptive acts of civil disobedience since no confrontation with civilians or police was sought.

New Orleans recommende that this organizational case through the fall of 1971, to determine and report,

(1) future organizational and recruiting efforts, (2) militant and violence-prone intentions, including travel to or support of activities in Cairo, Ill.,

(3) the local acquisition of firearms, and (4) other protest activities which may amount to civil disobedience.

New Orleans sources are aware that the FBI is not interested in legitimate civil rights, partisan, political, or campus organizations, unless or until such activities become violence-prone. Aside from the course material and local law enforcement authority.

New Orleans feels that the current informant coverage of VVAW activities is ample.

## VIETNAM VETERANS AGAINST THE WAR (VVAW)

The VVAW was first noticed in New Orleans on May 23, 1971, and persons adopting the VVAW label have been active in general anti-war leafletting, have demonstrated in support of blacks, have associated with other white militant activists, and have indicated an interest in firearms through August, 1971.

in bill Stated on May 17, 1971, that three New Orleans activiststraveled to Washington, D.C. for the Anti-War Demonstrations there in April and May, 1971, which activities were sponsored by the Peoples Coalition for Peace and Justice (PCPJ) and the National Peace Action Coalition. (NPAC).

The PCPJ is a national anti-war organization founded in early 1971, reportedly sponsored by the Communist Party, United States of America, and which helped organize the May Day Demonstrations in Washington, D.C. in May, 1971.

The NPAC was founded in 1970 by members of the Socialist Workers Party (SWP). Its: basic objective is to unite masses of people including labor unions, GIs, and the black community in the struggle to end United States intervention in Southeast Asia through orderly and peaceful tactics. The SWP has been designated pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

These New Orleans activists made contact in Washington, D.C., with VVAW organizers there, among other national group representatives. As a result of that contact, national VVAW activists were invited to New Orleans. to New Orleans.

In July and August, 1971, have advised that the VVAW has held seven meetings apart from other groups and as a distinctly labeled VVAW group.

Other activities engaged in by the VVAW in New Orleans, reported between July 7, and August 19, 1971, have included the following:

Leafletting efforts to recruit members at Louisiana State University at New Orleans (LSUNO) on July 1, and July 23, 1971.

Supporting the New Orleans trials of Black Panther Party (BPP) members on July 8, 1971, on charges of Attempted Murder in the fall of 1970.

Leafletting of the Armed Forces Induction Center, which leaflets urged inductees to resist the military and join the VVAW (but which did not exhort inductees to evade the draft), on July 30, August 6, and the week of August 9-13, 1971.

The joining of a picket protest demonstration with other militant groups at the Orleans Parish Prison on July 31, August 6, and August 15, 1971, in support of demands made by black inmates there.

In addition, where advised on August 6, 1971 that three New Orleans VVAW members traveled to the VVAW convention in St. Louis, Missouri, on June 8, 1971 and participated in that convention.

Regarding local VVAW intentions and philosophy on June 1, 1971.

Sonny Keys. VVAW organizer from Arkansas, described VVAW's organization to be decentralized and organized around regions determined by states. He also stated that the VVAW should include persons whose philosophies ranged from wanting to effect change within the system to those who wanted outright revolution. He stated that

tactics such as bombing the Capitol building were outside the scope of the VVAW.

further advised on June 11, 1971, that on June 7, 1971, Sonny Keys spoke of the United Front in Cairo, Illinois, describing it as an organization including the VVAW, supporting the blacks there. Keys also said that he would go in the near future to Jackson, Mississippi, to confer with unknown persons there regarding VVAW actions to be taken in Cairo, Illinois. In addition, advised on July 7, 1971, that Sonny Keys stated on June 29, 1971, that VVAW's politics were "people's instituted socialism." Keys went on to say that "we have to crack the shell of this government so it will fall," and later that "the enemies of the United States and Russia are their economic systems." It was not clear if Keys was speaking his own personal thoughts or those of VVAW.

Another indication of VVAW's philosophy as reported by the on August 4, 1971, was the statement on July 23, 1971, by VVAW organizer DON DONNER, who stated that the VVAW should try and consolidate support of the many other separate local New Orleans single-purpose groups, but that such a coalition should remain in the hands of VVAW. DONNOR further stated that a tactic approved by the VVAW is confrontation in demonstrations and other such activities, but that these incidents should stop short of arrests.

additionally advised on August 4, 1971, that during the recruiting/organizing meeting on July 26, 1971, it was made clear by DONNER that the group in New Orleans was going to "work with labor and blacks" and that such activities would be on an experimental basis since other VVAW groups were not working in those areas. The same source advised on August 9, 1971, that during the August 9; meeting, DONNER stated that the group should prepare for a major demonstration in New Orleans to include the support of other radical groups, to take place when the National Draft Law currently in Congress becomes effective.

Sonny Keys lirst spoke in New Orleans about his organizing with the VVAW, and in answer to a question about draft counseling, he stated that the VVAW would set up a draft counseling office. Just as the VVAW was known to NOPAC members, similarly, members of the NOMDS showed an interest in late May, 1971, in welcoming VVAW members in New Orleans according to the North May 26, 1971.

on August 15, 1971, noted that the VVAW had snown some support of Black Panthers on trial in New Orleans as well as support of Black Panthers and other blacks incarcerated in Orleans Parish Prison. However, no information has been developed since that time showing any well established contact between the VVAW and the Black Panther Party.

The Black Panther Party (BPP) is a black extremist organization started in Oakland, California, in December, 1966. It advocates the use of guns and guerrilla tactics to bring about the overthrow of the United States Government.

Another major factor observed at the Conference was the presence of numerous speakers representing the New Party. According to the speakers, the New Party feels changes can be made in the United States by working within the existing system, but that the party is "anti-capitalist" and supports worker control of production. Our informants learned that the New Party is attempting to divide existing forces in the Republican and Democratic Parties and hopes to run its own candidates at all levels in city, county and state elections.

Although no firm decisions were reached regarding specific action to be taken by VVAW during Fall, 1971, it is clearly apparent that various subversive organizations, not the least of which is YSA, are actively and vigorously attempting to infiltrate and utilize VVAW to their own ends.
