A VVAW/WSO leader in a southeastern region contemplates withdrawing his region and taking several others with him due to dissatisfaction with the National Office. He feels the VVAW/WSO should have strong leadership and a hard revolutionary stance should the need arise. VVAW/WSO functionaries in Los Angeles are aware of a power struggle in the organization and of a split into Stalinist and Maoist groups, the latter following a peoples revolutionary line. In the past, VVAW/WSO has presented a pacifist image to gain public support but many hard core revolutionary types are disenchanted with current leaders. The NSC meeting in St. Louis, Missouri, 8/23-27/73, produced no direct confrontation on these issues and it was determined that although ideological friction exists between Stalinist and Maoist factions, the dispute was not divisive enough to discupt the organization's affairs. meeting produced proposals to work for amnesty for deserters and draft evaders and discharge upgrading. Petitions on this subject will be presented to Congress. Plans also were made to infiltrate the military noting if a revolution comes, help within the military is necessary. VVAW/WSO is also planning to organize support in prisons throughout the country. Instructions were given on how to jam law enforcement radio frequencies, including the FBI. Delegates were chosen for representation at a meeting of the Soviet-dominated World Peace Council in 10/73 and three VVAW/WSO leaders privately expressed displeasure with the Soviets noting they want to use the group for propaganda purposes. Prior to the VVAW/WSO NSC meeting held in St. Louis, Missouri, 8/23-27/73, we developed information to the effect Scott Camil, Southeast regional coordinator then on trial in Gainesville, Florida, planned on withdrawing from the VVAW/WSO and setting up his own organization in opposition to the present Chicago-based group. Camil counted on at least six other regions and possibly an additional two backing his action. He originally intended to have a letter of withdrawal read on his behalf at the NSC meeting but later changed his mind due to his preoccupation with his trial. Camil feels the current national leadership is weak and does not follow a hard enough line in dealing with the Government. He feels better qualified to lead and, while he has never stated a revolution is necessary or inevitable, he, nevertheless, feels the VVAW/WSO should have strong leadership and a hard revolution stance to capitalize on any eventuality, even revolution, should the need arise.

At the same time two VVAW/WSO functionaries in Los Angeles, California, were aware of a power struggle within the VVAW/WSO and described the factions as the Stalinist capitalist group which follows a socialist, nonrevolutionary line and the Maoist group which believes in a peoples revolutionary line. The current national officers are considered by the Los Angeles leaders to be Stalinists while the small. Maoist group is in the process of growing. They acknowledged the VVAW/WSO has presented a pacifist-type image in the past in order to gain public support but noted many VVAW/WSO members are hard core revolutionary types who are disenchanted with current leadership. They feel the VVAW/WSO is presently the only well organized group in the "Movement" and that it should continue to build and prepare for the eventuality of being forced to fight. Without commenting specifically, they alluded to a desire to stockpile weapons in California in the future should there be a need to fight for their freedoms.







The second source advised on September 24, 1973 that the Conference Coordinator was Cincinnati, who is a member of the Cincinnati VVAW/WSO.

PROCEEDINGS

On September 24, 1973, the second source advised that the initial session on Friday evening, September 21, 1973, was non-productive, informal, and devoted mainly to partying.

The first source advised on October 3, 1973, that the Saturday, September 22, 1973 session was chaired by Of Dayton, Ohio. Attendance was approximately 30 persons, with many persons going in and out at different intervals. The lated that his group in Dayton, Ohio, an affiliate of VVAW/WSO, was known as NOSCAM. He stated that the main purpose of this group was to work for amnesty, to upgrade military discharges, and to make efforts to correct military abuses. NOSCAM has Post Office Box 1625 in Dayton, Ohio. In that regard, it was stressed that a thorough knowledge of military regulations was necessary and this was broken down into four major categories: Department of Defense Directives; Service Level Regulations; Base Regulations, and Unit Regulations.

The Uniform Code of Military Justice (UCMJ) was discussed and Judicial and Non-Judicial Punishment is to be a good way of contacting and working with GI's. Article 15 of the UCMJ was said to be an excellent tool to reach military personnel.

The second source advised on September 24, 1973, that the War in Vietnam Workshop was conducted on Saturday afternoon, September 22, 1973. This consisted of a historical accounting of Southeast Asia, its customs and traditions, social and political evolution. Considerable discussion ensued on the subject of how to deal with AWOL's and deserters and the term "deserters" is to be avoided in the future. Such persons will be referred to as those "on extended leave" or those "on voluntary retirement from the military."

A discussion was held on the subject of abusive treatment by military superiors of their subordinates and Article 138 of the UCMJ was discussed. It was noted that under the demands of unconditional and universal amnesty, one objective is to eliminate the grades of discharges, leaving only a certificate of length of time in service in their place. In the mean time, discharge upgrading efforts should continue on a case by case basis.

The second source advised that the strategy of the group, in part, was to "flood the system with so much paper work as to create a backlog of at least five years on cases to be heard by the Discharge Review Board and the Board of Corrections of Military Records."

On September 24, 1973, the second source advised that at the meeting on Sunday, September 23, 1973, Bob Moore announced that the Chicago area military project no longer exists. There was no explanation as to what had brought about its demise.



On November 15, 1971, Source Three advised that the Memphis Chapter of the VVAW/WSO was organized by members of the Memphis Chapter of the Young Workers Liberation League (YWLL) in May and June, 1971. The membership of the Memphis Chapter of the VVAW/WSO included members of the YWLL from its inception and these members participated in and influenced the planning of this chapter.

> The YWLL is a front organization of the Communist Party, USA (CPUSA). It was formed as a Marxist-Leninist youth group in February, 1970.

On September 13, 1971, Source Three furnished a leaflet distributed by the Memphis Chapter of the VVAW/WSO in September, 1971. This leaflet contained the statement of Obpurpose for the VVAW/W80 nationally as well as actions adopted by the Memphis Chapter of the VVAW/WSO. These are as follows:

Nationally:

- A total U. S. military withdrawal immediately from Southeast Asia.
- The securing of GI and veterans' rights by fighting to end racism and repression both in the military and out of it, increasing employment for veterans, and improving Veterans Administration medical facilities.

On October 10, 1973, Source Four advised that the Memphis Chapter of the VVAW/WSO joined the Memphis Chapter of the YWLL in sponsoring and participating in demonstrations in the Memphis, Tennessee, area protesting American involvement in the war in Southeast Asia in 1972 and 1973. These two organizations jointly published an underground newspaper known as 'These Times' in early 1973. The Memphis Chapter of the VVAW/WSO was inactive during the period April - October, 1973.



HOMEPORTING

A lot of you who are reading this are homeported overseas, stationed in "ESTPAC, or on a long cruise. Even with talk about the "peacetime Navy," there are plans for homeporting more ships in Japan, Australia, and the far east. There is increased Navy activity all over the world. According to the Armed Forces Journal (March 1972), this year's Navy budget is the highest in history. It is higher than any other branch of the military. Why is the "peacetime Navy" more active than ever before?

Nixon and Kissinger talk about present foreign policy as a new one which is consistent with self-determination and world-wide democracy. They talk a lot about self-help, regional responsibility and an end to the US role as world policeman. but what to these words really mean and what are the people in power really planning?

WORLD BALANCE OF POWER

In the past, the US and USSR were by far the most powerful countries. US foreign policy was based on the east/west split and the "cold war." But today China, Japan, and Western Europe are becoming more powerful. The US is still the most powerful single force. But to maintain control over the US empire, anti-US alliances must be prevented between the other powers. And to keep control over the rest, Third World liberation struggles like in PI and Vietnam must be defeated. In coming decades, the country

In coming decades, the country which controls oil, mineral, and other resources will control the key industrial areas of the world and hold a club over underdeveloped countries. For example, Japan imports 98% of her oil, so as long as the US controls the sea lanes and the sources of oil, Japan is forced to be a Junior Partner to the US.

US INTERESTS ABROAD: PROFITS AND CONTROL

Secretary of the Navy John Warner made a speech about the Nixon Doctrine and the Navy to the National Security & Industrial Association. (printed in Aviation Week 11/27/72). He outlined three main areas of interests the US (and Japan) has abroad.

OIL: "By 1985 we will have to import i of our petroleum needs. to assure this flow---ind you can imagine the implications of an interruption -- will require a Navy capable of seeing that oil producing countries are not subjected to such pressures that the flow subsides." The flow subsiding is not the real issue though. In the past ten years six oil producing countries have nationalized their oil fields (Egypt, Syria, S. Yemen, Somalia, Algeria, and Iraq). This means they bought from US owners at least 51% of operations in their own countries. The Org. nization of Oil Exporting Countries (OPEC) was formed in 1971 to give them more leverage in bargaining with the industrial giants. These two. actions have lowered the profit per barrel for US companies there by 50%. The amount of oil coming to the US hasn't declined, but the powerful oil companies make less money now on Middle East oil. So it seems the US

military is protecting the US monopoly control over oil rather than the american people's ability to drive their cars or heat their homes.

THE OIL COMPANIES & S.E. ASIA



Major oil companies have staked out the waters of S.E. Asia for exploitation, Vietnam's location is strategic.

RAW MATERIALS: "Oil is not our only import. You are aware that 69 of 72 vital raw materials, without which our business could not function, are wholly or in part imported into the US." But just like with oil, the real issue is not trade, out ownership of raw material sources.

MULTINATIONAL CORPORATIONS:
"Increasingly multinational corporations rely on close coordination of plants scattered throughout the world. Components from half a world away are brought into this country or taken to another." What Warner doesn't say is that these corporations

are costing American working people their jobs. Multinational corporations have moved all over the world to find cheap labor, exploit the rich resources of underdeveloped countries, and to find new markets and tax loopholes. The typical attitude of IS manager in South Africa is: "I'm here to make a profit. the Bantus don't like it they can work elsewhere. "(Fortune magazine, 7/72) The attitudes of Dole managers in Philippines, Zenith in Tsiwan, Chrysler in Japan and Japanese managers in Indonesia and South Kores are pretty sim-

People in the US and all over the world oppose the Nixon Doctrine. people in underdeveloped countries want to raise their standard of living and rid themselves of American puppet dicta-tors like Thieu in Vietnam and Park in South Korea. When their struggle looks like it might be successful, their country is called a "trouble spot" and the US military makes threatening moves. The people in power in the US have never proved that nuetral or socialist countries would not trade with the US. In fact we trade with most of them now. What the Navy is protecting is profits and power, and what people are fighting for is a decent way of life.

HOW WILL THE NIXON DOOTHINE ACHIEVE ITS GOALS?

There are three major points in the new US strategy:

1. Withdrawal of ground thoops. Nixon will withdraw most ground



troops from overseas while increasing the efficiency of those that remain. New shows of force will take the form of air and sea power, with ground troops used in unusual situations.

2. Depend on allies for regional self-defense. Key countries in each region will police their own area using their US subsidized and supplied military forces. They will be backed up by US sea and air power. Examples of regional policemen are Israel (which is getting out of hand), and Japan. Japan is a key ally. She has the third largest navy in Asian waters (after the US and USSR) and an With her own interests air force. to protect in South Korea and elsewhere, with US bases all over Japan, and with the US controlling her sea lanes, she will remain a reliable, but competitive, ally. It's no accident that the first aircraft carrier to be homeported 1h WESTPAC. 1s in Japan.



3. Use of sophisticated mobile forces: The Navy will probably be the most important branch of the military in the next 25 years. It will continue controlling sea lanes. Also, carriers will be sent to potential "trouble spots" as a show of US force. As Norm Polmar puts it - "5000 people floating into a harbor tells you the US is interested as hell in the area. It says 'power and interest.' We have the power to help you or kill you, you bastard." (Far Eastern Economic Review, 4/9/1973)

HOMET CRITING

According to Navy spokespeople, in peacetime the 7th
Fleet can normally deploy only one
of every three carriers in the
Fleet. The other two are either
in US homeports or in transit.
For its new post-Vietnam role, however, it needs to maximize its on
call carrier forces. By giving
ships foreign homeports, it can
greatly increase the patrol time
per ship of the fleet. They also
say it helps sailor morale, which
shows they haven't spent much time
in Yokosuka. The same logic holds
true for other kinds of ships with
foreign homeports.

foreign homeports.

"Probably our basic problem," says Capt. De La Mater, special assistant to Admiral Zumwalt, "is with the State Dept. and Congress who see it as further expansion overseas." Rear Admiral (ret.) Gene LaRocque, who now heads Washington's Center for Defense Information, makes the point even more strongly. "I see the Navy moving into the Indian Pacific Ocean area under any excuse possible. And homeporting is one way to do it. We'll slide into Singapore and elsewhere by homeporting." (FEER 4/9/73)

Like carrier deployments, homeporting is a powerful political tool. It is expansion under

the name of readiness. Its a committment which can go almost unnoticed by the American people and Congress. Its not soing unnoticed by the Japanese people though. They have formed a strong group to fight against the US military plans for Yokosuka.

There are limits to homeporting though. It represents an enormous outflow of dollars. So the Navy is trying to homeport on the cheap. No bases should be built, and port facilities should already be in existence. Yokosuka drydock six is ideal - the facilities already exist, there are lots of skilled workers. They hope the area is large enough to absorb 5000 sailors and 1200 families. If you look at Tokyo on a map, this seems true, but adding 5000 people to the Honcho may not be as smooth as they hope.

It is important to expose Nixon's talk of self-help and selfdefense for what it is: self-determination for American businessmen and foreign elites who need protection from their own people. The Nixon doctrine is designed to keep US business and power on top of the other world powers and the developing nations. The Nixon doctrine is also a foreign policy that is being resisted all over the world: by Americans, including sailors and their families homeported in foreign countries; by Japanese people like those in the antihomeporting movement; and by people like those in the Philippines and letnam who want to develop their countries for the good of their people. The Nixon administration is trying to pull a fast one, but time is running out.

WHY WE NEED CVN-70 -- Zumwalt

Because the arguments advanced by Navy chieftain Admiral E.R. Zumwalt for procurement of the CVN-70 provide a particularly revealing summary of U.S. naval strategy today, it is worth quoting from his Fiscal 1973 budget presentation at length:


"The aircraft carrier has at least three very critical missions. First, it is an important part of our national tactical air capability. As we reduce our overseas land bases outside of Europe in consonance with the Nixon Doctrine, the aircraft carrier has become increasingly central to that mission. It has and will continue to be, in many cases, as in Vietnam in the beginning, the only way we can bring air support to allies in need.

"Second, the aircraft carrier is a necessary part of our sea control forces.... If any U.S. forces are to be delivered to support our overseas allies in the face of opposition at sea, that is if we are to have any credible alliances, we will need carriers and modern ones.

"Third, the carrier provides peacetime presence. As the number of our land-based forces deployed overseas declines, we will need to keep some evidence of power in sight. This will at the same time sustain our allies confidence in us and demonstrate by our presence both our capability and our determination to protect our commerce and our sources of strategic materials from any interruption."

"... We have the mission of manifesting an overseas presence sufficiently powerful and visible to make plain to any possible adversary, as well as to our allies, that any effort to challenge our vital overseas interests or those of our allies could bring confrontation with American armed might."

Japanese People's Movements

When the Midway comes to Japan, it will be met with huge demonstrations by tens of thousands of Japanese people. At least one of these will be as large as some of the largest anti-war actions ever held in the US. Yet the Japanese military is not involved in any wars right now, and the Midway will not be going immediately to Yietmam to bomb. So why are the Japanese people opposed to the Midway's homeporting in Japan? We have to go back to the end of World War II to see why their opposition is so strong.

THE US AND ITS "JUNIOR PARTNER"

General MacArthur came to Japan to supervise the US occupation in 1945. A main aim of the US was to break up the huge monopolies (called zaibatsu) which gave Japan strength to fight a war. Also, the US businesses didn't want the competition. And both the US and Japanese people wanted these companies broken up.

But by 1947, American control of Asia was being threatened by the Chinese revolution and by popular revolutions in Vietnam and Korea. And conditions were bad in Japan, working people were prepared to have a general strike which would have changed the government.

So the US reversed itself. It crushed the labor unions, and encouraged the Japanese zaibatsu to rebuild. But the US capitalists didn't like the idea of a strong Japanese military that would support an independent empire to compete with the US. So the US wrote a constitution for

Japan which says that "land, sea, and air forces will never be maintained."

This constitution, which also eliminated the powerful role of the Emperor, was popular among the people of Japan, but not with the government. By 1951 the US and Japanese governments agreed to a Mutual Security Treaty that made Japan a "junior partner" of the US.

But the people were opposed to the US bases, and there were demonstrations against them which made the US nervous. They decided that Japan needed to rearm some to protect bases. They created the forerwiner of the Self Defense Forces. This was a direct attack on the Constitution by the government.

And in 1960, the US and Japanese governments agreed bases would remain and that more steps were needed to build up the Japanese military. This was very unpopular. The people didn't want US bases for one thing, and they felt that a large military would oppress them at home and get them into war again overseas.

There were huge demonstrations all over Japan, and the Prime Minister was forced to resign. But the US knew what it wanted from Japan. They sent a nuclear sub to Sasebo to "show the flag" during this crucial time. This was to show the Japanese that the US might give them even worse terms, like more bases. It was a threat to all Japanese who had good reason to hate anything nuclear after Hiroshima and Nagasaki.

But the treaty (called AMPO) was renewed anyway, and by 1962 the armed forces was up to 243,000 men. The army had 13 divisions, the navy had 468 ships, and the air force had 1,100 planes. The Japanese people saw more of their taxes going to support a military that was not only illegal, but that they distrusted and didn't want. The Liberal Democratic Party, totally dominated by the strong monopolies, moved to crush the opposition to this remilitarization.

VIETNAM WAR

During the Vietnam War, as in the norean War, the Japanese fought in parliament and in the streets to oppose US intervention in other people's affairs. Part of this anti-war feeling was also against the Japanese government which allowed the US to use the country as a supply depot. Japanese tig business made a pile during the war supplying US troops with weapons and supplies. These businesses made about \$2 billion at the height of the war directly from their ties with the US military.

The Japanese cidn't need the extra jobs, there was a labor shortage. And inflation and pollution, both realted to the war, were getting worse.

As before with the Korean war and security treaty struggles, there were hundreds of demonstrations against the war in Japan. Probably the biggest was in Shinjuku, Tokyo in 1968, when people tried to stop trains carrying aviation fuel and weapons bound for Vietnam. Over 100,000 people clashed with the police for a whole day, and trains had to be rerouted for days afterwards.

BEAUTIFUL MT. PUJI?

The US, under the AMPO treaty, still has 173 bases in mainland Japan or Okinawa. Gradually, some of these are turned over to the growing Self Devense Forces, and many like

Yokosuka are shared. The Japanese people have tried to force the US to give bases up so the land could be used for farming or housing. One of these bases, the North Fuji base, has been the focus of struggles by local people since 1955.

The firing range, called Kita Fuji, occupies about 20,000 acres on gently sloping land at the base of Mt. Fuji. The land traditionally belongs to a whole village, and was used collectively by the peasants for crops and grazing. In 1936, one third was taken by the Japanese military to train troops that fought in WWII. And when the US defeated Japan, the US declared that it would be a US training area. It has been exactly that since.


In 1955, the people began to fight for the land. Women organized the Shibokusa Mothers Group to oppose both the military use of the common land, and the fact that the village was becoming a military town. The president of the group said:

Unless we love our land and nature and make better use of it, we cannot be human beings; as long as we depend on the US military we are not human beings... Once we lost the land, our basic spirit had also been lost.

The Women started to live on the land, moving around to prevent shelling practice. They sat down in front of flame throwers. They have been fighting for 18 years. During the Viet nam war, when marines trained there every day, their slogan was "Don't link Mt. Fuji with Vietnam."

But the US military is determined too, since the base is the only good firing range in Asia. Now the Self Defense Forces use the range also, and have 900 people stationed there. Riot police have gone in many times, and the headquarters of the movement was

bulldozed at least 28 times, only to be rebuilt each time.

The Kita Fuji peasants and antiwar GIs have established some solidarity. Marines have made tapes to encourage others "to reject orders to practice for murder." These are broadcast over the radio to the base.

CRACKS IN THE KEYSTONE

Okinawa is the "keystone" of the US military ever since it was captured from Japan in 1945. The WWII peace treaty with Japan left the Okinawans dominated by a US military commander. And soon the island of one million people was covered with bases. Over ½ of US bases in Japan are on this small island. Many people are forced from their land into working on the bases.

In the early 1960s, most Okinawans felt that they should be part of Japan again, and US control was getting more oppressive. But they wanted good terms for reversion, not to be a Japanese satellite. But Japan was greedy and demanded heavy control of their lives. When the Japanese premier visited in 1965, demonstrations against him were so large that he had to hide out on

a US base.

Militant strikes by the Zengunro baseworkers union got stronger every year. In 1970, after a US jeep killed a woman, ten thousand people took control of the streets in Koza and fought all night. Over 80 US vehicles were burned.

When Okinawa finally reverted to Japan in 1972, the people's problems

got worse. No are occupied by 9 the Self Defen. Forces and US troops. And most SDF troops are not there to defend Okinawans, but to stop a rebellion by Okinawans against US bases and their new Japanese masters. Feelings get stronger every day as Japanese companies build refineries and factories that are too polluting for Japan proper. Also prostitution is increasing as more Japanese hotels encourage Japanese tourists to come.

So now the Okinawans have three enemies.

STOP THIEU'S TANKS!

Kanagawa Prefecture, where Yokosuka base is located, is also blotted by other bases, including the
Sagami maintenance depot. All during
the Vietnam war, damaged armored personnel carriers, tanks, and other
vehicles were repaired there to be
used again. Every week the Sagami
citizens could see muddy tanks and
APCs coming from Yokohama to their
city. And every week they saw trucks
with rebuilt weapons heading back to
Yokohama. But for a long time nothing
happened.

Then in the summer of 1972, trade union and citizens groups began to fight against the base. They fought

on the legal front, which eventually failed, and finally mobilized thousands of citizens. They put up tents near the base main gate. At first, only left-wing youth were involved, but after the riot police cracked heads and arrested people almost daily, the whole city rose up angry against the US and Japanese governments. It was citizens of Sagami, not


outside agitators, and reacted to police violence by throwing rocks and bottles in the battles with police.

This is one description of the scene:

Two or three thousand people from all walks of life would gather every night near the tent village, couples, businessmen, families, workers, boisterous young men, mothers and children. Spontaneous teach ins were formed where people freely expressed their opinions and asked questions: why do we have to stop the transport of US military vehicles, how can we demand that bases be moved out of the city, why are the helmeted students here, how can we struggle against those brutally armored riot police?"

Inder police attacks, all the people became the enemy of the riot police. After a month of struggle, when the Army tried to move out ten APCs, there were 10,000 people blocking the street, and more than 5000

of them decided to sit-in. It was only with the help of thousands of police that the tanks got through.

SAILOR RESIGNS

I have refused to allow myself to take any part in the launching of these planes. Here in Japan I have recieved much support for my struggle. Though the Japanese do not want the US here, their behavior to just plain people is outstanding. I can think of no place I would rather live. My support is with the Japanese people 100% particularly in their stuggle against the tanks. I wish there were more I could do to help them in this. The struggles going on now, both with the tanks and my own with the Navy, really illustrates how much people all over are alike. The feelings here are the same as America. Now that I have seen how world wide the peace movement is my hope is lit anew.



Throughout the 1950s and 1960s Japanese resistance to the US mili-tary and their "own" military has grown stronger. A large groups called Beheiren (Citizens Committee for Peace in Vietnam) struggled to end the war, especially Japanese participation in it. They held huge demonstra-tions, and even worked with anti-war American servicepeople. And now even more people are willing to fight to end the remilitarization of Japan under the Nixon doctrine.

The Midway homeporting is a new stage in Japan-US collaboration. The US now needs Japan to help fight its wars and police the area. The people see that their country will be used as a big base for any wars that the US will wage in the future. With the Midway here, and their Self Defense Forces growing by 20% every year, they can see more clearly than many people in the US what will happen again in Asia. It is more than likely that Japan, with a government that follows the US line, will engage in another war with other Asian people. Their determination to stop this collaboration is growing every day, as you can see by the demonstrations all over against homeporting.

In Yokosuka alone, there are several groups planning demonstrations

in September and October. These will be even larger than last spring when the Midway was first expected. The groups are strongest in schools and factories in Kanagawa Prefecture, but also several citizens groups were formed just to oppose homeporting.

One of these groups is the Yokosuka Citizens Group, which shares the Vietnam Veterans Against the War office. They are hoping to work with American servicepeople against the homeporting. Other groups are still larger, and are led by either oldleft or new-left groups with different political ideas.

Most of these groups and people are not against servicepeople and their families. For over 6 years, since some sailors refused to go to Vietnam, they understand that military related people are a lot like themselves, and don't want to be stationed away from home. In the past many servicepeople have strongly supported the Japanese people in their struggles, and the Japanese want to build solidarity between the groups to fight the real enemy -- the mi 'tary command and US and Japanese government policies.

As in most of the demonstrations in the past 13 years, there will be divisions between Japanese groups about which is the best way to win their fight. But all of them are opposed to homeporting, and their demonstrations they hope will help educate other Japanese people about the issue

and get them moving.

YOKOSUKA: A ROSE CARDENS

Through coercion and promises the Navy convinced all but 400 of the Mid-Way crew to volunteer to be homeported in Yokosuka. Many sailors on other ships were also originally volunteers. But after being here for awhile, many want to go back to the states and want no part in the Navy's overseas mission. It would be interesting to take a polll after the Midway has been here for a few months, to see how any sailors and marines would still volunteer.

THE HONCHO: BARS & WOMEN

There are two US military installations in Yokosuka. The official one
is the base. The unofficial one is
called The Honcho or shit street or
Thieves Alley, depending on how you
feel about it. There are bars, stick
dog stands, and souvenier shops. Its
purposes are to rip Sailors and Marines off and to help the brass keep
the troops pacified. Its patrolled by
SPs and the bar owners are told in
advance about ships movements, so they
can be ready.

Few peopl lly dig the Honcho. But there's not ther place to go if you dont speak Japanese, have little money, and are pretty tired after working or skating all day. The bars have been remodeling and enlarging to get ready for the Midway. The number of guys stationed here will double. Many Sailors and Marines already stationed or homeported here dont want the Midway to come-they feel an already bad scene will be worse.

The main attractions of the bars are women, booze, and juke boxes. Most of the bar owners advertise their women as the hottest and sexiest. The women earn money by having drinks bought for them. This means they have to flirt and tease to make a living. A man never has to light his own cigarette, pour his own beer, or treat any of these women like, people. A lot of them aren't prostitutes, like in PI because they aren't as desperate. This causes resentment and misunderstandings because of the ads, and the lifer's sea stories.

Bar women spend 10 hours a day 7 days a week getting shoved, mauled, insulted, felt up, ridiculed, propositioned, leered at, laughed at, and talked at. They have to pretend they love it or they lose drinks and money. Its not real common for sailors and women on the Honcho to establish good, close relationships.

Why do women work in bars if its such a bummer? Many of them got started in the bars the same way you got sucked into the service. Many are from poor families, small towns and farms. The bar owners send recruiters around promising fun, travel, and glamour. The owners "lend" the women money for travel, clothes, make-up, and living to help them get started. They paint a pretty good picture-remember Join the Navy and see the world, while learning a skill? After they work awhile they get the picture, but then it's too late. They have to keep working to support themselves, stay well dressed and pay back the debt on top of that.

Many guys say the bar women make lots of money. Some of them do. They are the exceptions though. They are the most attractive by western standards and know the hussling routine real well. Plus they pick up money on the side through prostitution. But a few people make it in the service too by getting lucky breaks in the beginning or by brown-nosing. But that doesn't change the fact, that the Navy and Marines aren't such a great life

for the majority of Els. And even for the Bar Women who make lots of money, it's still hard and degrading work.

One way out is to hustle enough money to live, pay the debt, and save for a new start. Another way out is to marry a sailor or marine, have him pay the debt and hope the US is a better place. Some of the women are daughters of bar women and get trapped from birth. Many older women stay on even after the debt is paid, because it is the only thing they know how to do. If you think this still sounds a lot like the military, you're right.

Who benefits from all this? Not sailors or marines or bar women. But the bar owners make a lot of money. The brass think they have a good way to keep the troops happy. They dont really care as long as you keep working and saluting. As bad as the Honcho is it's something to do with time and money.

DOPE


The other form of pacification in Yokosuka is dope. The brass is pretty lenient even though they crack down occasionally or in example cases. Guys say that when there is going to be a piss test or they are going to rum the dogs through, you almost always hear about it in advance. The brass was really cracking down on the Midway before it left, but we'll have to see how that changes here. If you are : caught sentences are usually pretty light or you can volunteer once for the Drug Exemption program. Its pretty bullshit, most people use drugs while going through the program.

The Japanese government is much more harch than the Havy. People have done several years for possession, and there is no amnesty program.

The most popular and easiest to get drug is scag. People snort it, smoke it and shoot it. One guy estimates that 25% of the guys in his division are regular users. Most people dont get strung out like junkies in the States, but smack can bring you down pretty far. In Japanese drugstores you can buy speed, reds, and pink ladies. Pink Ladies, the second most used drug here, are like a cross between an upper and downer. Absinthe, said to be opium based, is served in the bars, watch out because its cured in worm-wood which is a slow acting poison in large quantities. Acid and speed on the street are usually pretty poor quality and grass is hard to get, except when a ship is back from a cruise.

Why do most people use downer drugs? They are easiest to get. Also as one sailor said "Most people use it to get away from everyday life on the ship. Its almost impossible to get away from Yokosuka or the Navy without going in debt. And you really cant have any hobbies on the boat or in the barracks." Another added --" The Navy is really using drugs as an escape valve. If youre strung out or worried where you're going to get your next fix, you're really not worried about illegal EMI and shit like that. You're not worried about losing your rights."

The Navy uses drugs just like the establishment in the American ghettoes does. As long as the people they are trying to keep down



are on downers they have no problem. The Mavy has a two-faced policy. On one side they tell the press and Congress that they are fighting the drug problem. But on the other side they know they need drugs to keep the lower EMs from fighting back against military injustice and the bad living and working conditions in the Navy.

DEPENDENTS IN YOKOSUKA

About one third of the Midway crew is married. Over the next year many women and children will be coming to join their husbands. Many women whose husbands are on other ships are here already. Base housing was scarce even before the Midway came. This means many people will have to find housing on the economy. It's better in some ways because you can get away from the military. But women can also feel very isolated if they don't speak Japanese.

Also women married to EMs get pretty bad treatment by the military. There aren't many recreation or training facilitles. The medical system is infamous for poor treatment of EM wives. The Navy tries to deprive women of their civil rights by



harassing their husbands or threatening to lift their command sponsorship if they speak out. So it's real important for women to know their rights.

Two women work at New Peoples Center, one is a lawyer. We want to meet other women and learn more about women's lives in Japan. Also if we get together, we can find ways to support each other and work for changes. Women in Okinawa have fought for better conditions and even established a day care center.

This a pretty bleak picture of life for EMs and their families in the area. But that's how it is now. Japan is good to visit and for the Japanese who live here. But none of us should be here. We belong back in the states trying to solve problems there.

FROM THE MIDWAY:

We people of the Center for Servicemen's Rights and concerned sailors aboard the USS Midway wish to express our support of the right of the people of Japan and all of Asia to determine their own future, and to be spared massive US military presence.

The idea of homeporting a carrier in Japan is an extension of the policies that led to the Vietnam conflict. It allows the US government to keep a strong check on the people of Asia and to oppose any country whose ideas of liberation differ from that of the US government. There will always be the threat and fear of another Vietnam as long as the US government is allowed to carry on its policy of imperialism throughout the world.

The Navy presently is trying to fight the GI movement on the USS Midway by transferring most of the crew, and especially those who are against US government policies, off the ship and replacing them with "volunteers." This does nothing to change the conditions and policies that Midway sailors are resisting and oppressed by in the homeporting of the Midway. As this becomes clear to the "volunteer" lower EMS, we think they too will turn against homeporting and join with Japanese friends to fight homeporting in Yokosuka.

Until then, we shall continue to oppose this policy and give our support to the people of Japan struggling against homeporting.

RESISTANCE ON THE MIDWAY

The Midway's last overseas cruise was the longest any carrier had ever made. Having experienced the long hours, oppressive working and living conditions, dictatorial military "justice", and seeing first hand the Navy's mission; many sailors did not want to be homeported overseas. They felt being based in Yokosuka would be like a two year cruise.

Several sailors contacted people in the Stop Our Ship movement in Alameda. After talking with other sailors who had organized on ships and bases, they decided to circulate a petition against the homeporting. The petition was a way to rap with other guys on the Midway, and to get an idea how strong the opposition to homeporting really was. They didn't trust the Navy volunteer figures because the bureaucratic procedures made it hard to understand how not to volunteer.

The petition had four main points.

(1) We are freely opposed to the excessive expansion of US military forces

overseas. (2)We object to the false statements made by the military that there is an all volunteer crew.

(3) We disapprove of the US governments lack of preparations in providing housing and other living accomadations.

(4) It is the right of all military personnel as citizens-soldiers of the US to practice individually or collectively their rights as citizens, namely; free speech, peaceable assembly, freedom of the press, and the



right to petition Congress.

In the first few days they got over 200 signatures. Then the Capt. ordered them to stop. He said they must have his approval before they could circulate a petition to Congress. With the help of the Bay Area Military Law Panel, they filed a suit against the Captain and the Secretary of the Navy. The suit is still in Federal Court. The Navy is trying to kill it by transferring all the plaintiffs off the ship.


Even though the petition is in limbo, sailors continued to organize against the Homeporting. Japanese people and Americans working with the GI movement in Yokosuka made a slide show about homeporting which was shown several times at Shakeys in Alameda. Also on Armed Farces Day people from the Midway, Oriskany, and other boats came to picnic, hear music, and talk about ways to build the movement. One of the main things people from the Midway did was to educate themselves about homeporting and American Imperialism.

In August the Captain decided he might get a better response from the crew if he changed his reputation from hardass to nice guy. He gave a barbecue on the flight deck for the crew, to answer their questions about homeporting. He assumed that since all the lifers and officers would be there to back him up, no one would ask difficult questions or oppose the Midway's mission.

He was dead wrong. It turned out that lots of people had been doing hard thinking about homeporting. About 200 Blacks took a unified position against homeporting and Navy racism. Other Black and White sailors who had been studying homeporting and US imperialism let loose with their questions and feelings too. He cut the question period short.

During the next month, the Navy tried to get all the troublemakers off the ship. Their goal was an all-volunteer docile crew. They fell 400 short of all-volunteer and far short of docile. They forgot that some of the most active people ... re once volunteers. The best anti-Navy organizing is done by the Navy itself. The realities of homeporting will become clear to the new volunteers just like they did to the previous volunteers.

September 10th, the day before deployment, Midway brothers sent a message of solidarity to the Japanese anti-homeporting movement.



of information on the NLG or its projects, the court approved settlement provides that present or former NLG members may request that their individual files which reflect Guild affiliation or activities be similarly withheld. Pursuant to this provision, the NLG has compiled the attached list of individual NLG members who have requested relief under 8c(iv) of the Settlement.

Accordingly, IMD is requested to identify any individual on the attached list who has a file reflecting NLG affiliation or activities which was created prior to 3/1/77. Any identified file should be appropriately labeled to insure non-disclosure as required by the settlement. Please advise Legal Counsel Division as to the results of the indices search, including the number of individual files identifiable with the NLG, individuals for whom no file could be located or are not identical, and the actions taken to comply with the order. In addition, please preserve all search slips in case we are required to respond to the Court regarding our compliance. It is likely that no files will be identified with a substantial number of the individuals on the attached list. Finally, inasmuch as the Settlement applies to all FBI files, the Field should also be requested to conduct indices searches and to appropriately label their files.

We recognize that this is a time-consuming chore that is being imposed on IMD during a time of limited resources. Nevertheless, we have made this commitment to the court and we are

IT IS HEREBY STIPULATED AND AGREED by and among the parties as follows:

- 1. The parties agree to settle and compromise this action on the terms indicated below.
- 2. This action is hereby dismissed with prejudice as to all defendants except the City of New York, <u>i.e.</u>, the "federal defendants."
- and for its administrators, successors and assigns releases and forever discharges, the United States of America, its departments, agencies and past or present officials, officers and employees (and their heirs, executors, administrators, successors and assigns) from all claims whatsoever, in law, admiralty, or equity, which plaintiff and its administrators, successors and assigns hereafter can, shall or may have for, upon or by reason of any surveillance, investigation, disruption, or similar conduct by the Federal Bureau of Investigation ("FBI") directed toward the National Lawyers Guild (the "Guild") at any time prior to the date of this stipulation; provided, however, that

plaintiff is entitled to rely upon the federal defendants' representations set forth in paragraph 7 below, and any claim based upon any conduct of the federal defendants inconsistent with such representations shall not be barred by the above release.

- 4. Each party shall bear the costs and expenses of this litigation as they have been incurred or paid as of the date of this stipulation and no costs or expenses shall be taxed subsequently. Plaintiff and its attorneys waive all claims for attorneys' fees and expenses in connection with the prosecution of this action.
- 5. This stipulation and agreement does not constitute an admission by the plaintiff that any of the conduct of the federal defendants was lawful, or an admission by the federal defendants or any of their present or former officials, officers or employees that any of their conduct was unlawful or legally actionable.
 - 6. Without conceding the legality or illegality of any of the federal defendants' actions, the parties agree that the discovery in this case has shown the following:
 - a. The FBI engaged in extensive activities with respect to the Guild for the period 1940 through March 1975, and in the course of those activities generated voluminous files on the Guild.
 - b. It appears more likely than not that between 1940 and 1951 the FBI surreptitiously entered the Guild's national office approximately 7 times without judicial warrant or

Attorney General authorization and copied the Guild's internal records. Some of the material thus obtained provided the Government in advance with drafts of a report the Guild was planning to release criticizing FBI surveillance practices, and with details of the Guild's related public campaign calling for an investigation of the FBI. The FBI used this material in an effort to counter the Guild's report even before its issuance.

- c. The FBI without judicial warrant maintained a wiretap on the Guild's national office telephone between 1947 and 1951.
- d. Information derived from the surreptitious entries formed a material part of the information placed before the Attorney General for his consideration in deciding whether to initiate proceedings to designate the Guild as a subversive organization under the Federal Employment Loyalty Security Program, Executive Order 10450. Such designation proceedings were begun in 1953.
- e. The FBI received information from an informant on the national executive board of the Guild in 1953 and 1954 who reported on its deliberations and discussions with counsel concerning the Guild's defense of the EO 10450 admini-strative designation proceedings and its conduct of related litigation against the Government.
- f. In 1958, the Department of Justice determined that on the basis of the evidence then available it was unable to go forward with the designation proceedings, and the Attorney General therefore rescinded the proposal to designate the Guild

as a subversive organization under EO 10450. There were no further proceedings against the Guild under EO 10450.

- g. The FBI continued its activities with respect to the Guild after the designation proceedings were discontinued in 1958. A Department of Justice review conducted in 1972 of the FBI's files on the Guild for the preceding five years concluded that there was no basis at that time for an investigation of the Guild under the Internal Security Act of 1950. In 1974-1975 the FBI, with Department of Justice authorization, conducted a preliminary inquiry concerning the Guild's prison work without discovering any basis for a further investigation.
- h. Alleged or suspected criminal wrongdoing was not the predicate or reason for FBI activity concerning the Guild. No criminal prosecutions of the Guild were ever authorized or undertaken by the Department of Justice.
- i. From 1940 through the early 1970's, the FBI placed Guild members on its Security Index, Adex and related indices because of their leadership positions in the Guild or, in some cases, because of their membership in the Guild in conjunction with their actual or suspected membership in other organizations.
- j. The FBI engaged in certain COINTELPRO and similar disruptive operations against the Guild and Guild members. The FBI used information it had derived from its other activities with respect to the Guild and Guild members for that purpose.

k. The FBI over several decades provided information from its files on the Guild affiliation and activities of individuals to the National Conference of Bar Examiners at the request of the NCBE.

l. Further, at various times in its activities with respect to the Guild, the FBI used numerous informants and confidential sources, including Guild members and staff and third parties in contact with the Guild; obtained Guild bank records from banks with which the Guild had banking relations; obtained information from the National Conference of Bar Examiners and from some character committees; monitored trash covers on the Guild; and obtained information about the Guild from its surveillance of the law offices of some Guild members, which surveillance included use of trash covers, wiretaps, informants on the temporary or permanent staff of the law offices, bank records and surreptitious entries.

m. The conclusions stated here do not imply that the FBI did or did not engage in other activities.

- 7. The federal defendants represent as follows:
- a. There is not now, and has not been since March 1977, any FBI investigation or preliminary inquiry of any nature of the Guild or its chapters, or of its projects, activities or enterprises readily identifiable as such or of individuals based upon their Guild affiliation or activities, and the FBI does not presently have information warranting any such investigation or preliminary inquiry.

- b. To the extent, if any, that FBI inquiries or investigation of third parties has resulted in surveillance or acquisition of information about the Guild since March 1, 1977, no information so acquired has been stored in FBI investigative (i.e., non-litigation) main files on the Guild or its projects (as specified in Appendix A hereto) or see-referenced or otherwise indexed to the Guild or its projects, except as may have been disclosed to the plaintiff in this litigation.
- c. There have been no additions to FBI investigative (i.e., non-litigation) main files on the Guild or its projects (as specified in Appendix A) or to see-references on the Guild or its projects, since March 1977, except as may have been disclosed to the plaintiff in this litigation.
- d. The FBI is not now, and has not since March 1977, engaged in any activities intended to disrupt or impede the activities of the Guild or the Guild activities of its members, or the activities of individuals based upon their Guild affiliation.
- e. The FBI does not now, and has not since March 1977, used Guild members as informants or confidential sources with respect to matters involving the Guild or Guild activities, placed wiretaps or pen registers on Guild telephones, surreptitiously entered Guild premises, obtained access to Guild bank records, maintained mail covers on Guild mail, maintained trash covers on the Guild, obtained access to Guild information at mailhouses used by the Guild, otherwise secured mailing or

membership lists of the Guild or obtained phone records on the Guild's phones.

- f. Since March 1, 1977, and presently, the FBI has not provided information on the Guild affiliation or activities of individuals to the National Conference of Bar Examiners or to bar admission committees.
- 8. The federal defendants agree to the following disposition of their files concerning the plaintiff:
- a. For purposes of this provision, the "FBI files on the Guild" means Headquarters, Field Office and Legat main files on the National Lawyers Guild and its projects (as specified in Appendix A); wiretap logs included in the main file on Robert Silberstein; EBF's to the Guild main files and the wiretap logs in the Silberstein main file; the see-reference cards and any other similar computerized or non-computerized reference capable of locating Guild-related information in files other than main files on the Guild, as well as references to the Guild in the Elsur Index and any indices to the informant files; and copies of the foregoing and any summaries thereof included in the FBI file on this litigation (62-117572). It is limited to documents created prior to the date of this stipulation.
- b. Within 180 days after the date of this stipulation, the FBI shall place all copies of the "FBI files on the Guild" in its possession or custody in secure storage under the supervision of the Deputy Assistant Director, Legal Counsel Division, and shall not dispose of, or permit access to, such

files before the year 2025. At that time the files may be transferred to the National Archives and Records Service.

- c. The federal agencies which are parties defendant to this action (specifically, the FBI, the Central Intelligence Agency, the National Security Agency, the Internal Revenue Service, the Office of Personnel Management, the Postal Service, and the Departments of Defense, Justice, State, the Treasury, the Army, the Navy and the Air Force) shall not use, release or disclose, within or outside the Government:
 - (i) any "FBI files on the Guild" readily identifiable as such, or copies thereof, in their possession or custody;
 - (ii) any portion of any document or record which is shown on its face to have been generated, prior to the date of this stipulation, in the course of any FBI activities directed in whole or in part toward the Guild, to the extent it concerns the Guild or its activities or the Guild affiliation or Guild activities of any individual;
 - (iii) any information contained in(i) and (ii) or reasonably identifiable ashaving been derived from (i) and (ii); or

- (iv) any portion of any document or record created prior to March 1, 1977, or the information contained therein, to the extent that it mentions the Guild affiliation or Guild activities of any individual, provided, however, that because of the federal defendants' representation of the practical impossibility of assuring compliance with such broad restrictions, the following limitations shall apply:
 - (a) With respect to documents or records of defendant federal agencies other than the FBI, this subparagraph (iv) shall apply only to such documents or records as are contained in a file the subject of which is either the Guild or a "Requesting Individual" (as defined below).
 - (b) With respect to documents or records of the FBI, this subparagraph (iv) shall apply only to such documents or records as are contained in a main file the subject of which is a "Requesting Individual" (as defined below), or in a volume containing see-references to the Guild, or in serials which are see-referenced to a

Requesting Individual (but only to the extent that such serials are accessed through the name of the Requesting Individual).

- a present or former Guild member who requests, in writing, that this subparagraph (iv) be applied to him or her, and who includes in such request his or her full name, any previous names, date and place of birth, and social security number. Such information is required to identify relevant documents and records and will not be used for any other purpose. Requests must be sent to plaintiff's counsel and forwarded by them to counsel for the federal defendants within 180 days of the date of this stipulation.
- d. Nothing herein shall preclude any agency from returning to the FBI any "FBI files on the Guild" or copies thereof in its possession (in which event the FBI shall handle such files as provided in subparagraph (b) above), or from disposing of any files by either destroying them in the ordinary course of business, or transferring them to the National Archives and Records Service in or after the year 2025. The United States Attorney's Office for the Southern District of New York will

return any copies of the "FBI files on the Guild" in its possession to the FBI within 90 days of the date of this Stipulation.

- e. If, upon the application of a third party, subparagraphs (b) or (c) above, or any portion thereof, shall be invalidated by any court, no other provision of this stipulation and order shall thereby be affected.
- notwithstanding, the Department of Justice may have access to and use of any of the documents and records described in subparagraphs (a), (b) and (c) above to the extent relevant and material to the defense of the United States or any of its departments, agencies, officers or employees in any judicial or administrative proceedings the gravamen of which arises from conduct alleged to have occurred prior to the date of this stipulation. Appropriate records shall be maintained of any such use. Upon completion of the litigation for which the records were necessary, they and any records derived from them shall be restored to the status quo ante except if they were filed as part of the court record in the litigation.
- g. Nothing in this stipulation shall preclude the Guild from requesting the release to it, under the Freedom of Information Act or any successor statutes, of those portions of the "FBI files on the Guild" not previously released to it, or the FBI from releasing the same to the Guild if appropriate under such statutes; provided, however, that the Guild shall make no such request prior to January 1, 1994.

h. Nothing in this stipulation shall preclude the federal defendants from releasing or disclosing any document or file at the request or with the authorization of the subject of such document or file.

PCS had its own corps of roving lawyers who would represent servicemen; however, it should be noted that the lawyers presently utilized by VVAW are affiliated with the National Lawyers Guild, which has been recognized as the legal arm of the Communist Party of the US. The primary activity of the New People's Center is the protesting of the announced fact that the US aircraft carrier "NIDPAY" will be making Yokosuka Navy Base its home port.

In the past, antiwar/antimilitary Japanese activists have given extensive assistance to the antiwar US civilians working in Japan; however, with the withdrawal of US forces from Vietnam, the antiwar Sapanese activists' attitudes and priorities have begun to change. Therefore, it will be interesting to note the extent of the support provided to VVAW in the future. Without this support, the success of VVAW in Japan will be in jooperdy. Through its known associations, it appears that VVAN is attempting to cain a firm foundation with the radical groups in Japan, and is not associating solely with the antiwar/antimilitary organizations as PCS mainly did in the past.

Attached reports apparent largescale effort which has just been launched by Vietnam Veterans Against the War/Winter Soldier Organization (VVAW/WSO) on nationwide basis to determine possible movement of American forces which have been alerted in the U.S. and throughout the world within the past 24 hours. Although the purpose of the military alert has not been announced and the reason for the VVAW/WSO effort is as yet unknown, the entire operation is reminiscent of the VVAW/WSO operation during 4/72 during which a canvass of VVAW/WSO members, some in active military service, developed information indicating U. S. would bomb Hanoi and Haiphong. information was disseminated by VVAW/WSO prior to the actual bombing and could have seriously jeopardized U. S. military operations and lives of servicemen.

As confirmed by FBI and local law enforcement, and campus informants/sources, VVAW has been dormant as a visible activity in Louisiana since March, 1973, when four persons used the VVAW label when attending a demonstration in support of Indians at Wounded Knee. One source characterized the group at that time as being not well based in current revolutionary political issues, not well organized, and the former members' interest being elsewhere. No VVAW label has been seen on campus since that time, even during the fall, 1973, semester registration, when many old groups set out tables and sign-up sheets. Even during the summer, 1973, ongoing w issues of, and support for, the Gainesville Eight trial, no attempt was made by any local activists or sympathizers, Louisiana coordinator, to travel or 🔘/ including urge others to travel to Gainesville, Fla., for that trial.



Cooperation with Soviet/Foreign Revolutionary Representatives. No VVAW individual currently in New Orleans has been known to have any international or foreign contacts of any type.

Infiltration of FBI/CIA/Military. During the investigation preliminary to the Gainesville Eight trial, New Orleans FBI conducted interviews with all known VVAW members and associates of Gainesville Eight defendant PETE MAHONEY; thus it would seem

likely that VVAW members would realize that they would be well known by local FBI. See New Orleans LHM dated 8/25/73 in this case, which indicated that the was being addressed with VVAW membership forms of active duty servicemen. Referenced letter pointed out, among other things, the Marxist-Leninist orientation of VVAW/WSO leaders, their apparent willingness to cooperate with Soviet-bloc representatives and other foreign revolutionary groups and individuals, and their plans to infiltrate the FBI, Central Intelligence Agency and the military. The letter was intended to be informative as to the current situation within the VVAW/WSO but during its preparation the need for numerous offices to examine their coverage became apparent. In one instance, for example, an office with no member informants recently RUC'd its case to Chicago, commenting there was no information available concerning the VVAW/WSO. A review of files at FBIHQ, however, disclosed there were active chapters within the territory of this office which apparently had not been investigated.

As noted in referenced letter, the responsibility for effective investigation of the VVAW/WSO, including the development of member informants, lies with each individual field office. Accordingly, you should thoroughly review your files concerning captioned group to determine the adequacy of your coverage bearing in mind the import of the information in referenced communication. For your additional information in this regard, lists of VVAW/WSO regions and chapters and individuals connected therewith dated 9/8/78/48/4 4/5/73 disclose the following located within your division. You should conduct appropriate preliminary inquires to identify the individuals listed above and to determine the extent of their VVAW/W80 activity. You should also conduct sufficient inquiry to identify other VVAW/WSO members who participated in this activity at the locations noted. Be guided by Bureau letter dated 6/2/73 which gives guidance as to the scope of investigations to be conducted in VVAW/WSO matters. National, regional and local coordinators and individuals who attend the National Steering Committee meetings should be of sufficient interest to warrant complete investigation in view of their role in shaping the policies and international contacts of the VVAW/WSO. Depending on individual circumstances, these investigations should resolve their veteran status, determine if they had intelligence or other specialized training while in the service, establish their reserve status if any and, if so, whether they have access to classified information. Reports should be submitted accompanied by appropriate ADEX recommendation.

with regard to informant coverage and development, a compilation of data available as of September, 1973, shows your office to furnish information concerning the VVAW/WSO through artillation with other subversive groups. Considering the Marxist-Leninist revolutionary posture of VVAW/WSO leaders and increasing cooperation with revolutionary groups, it is felt this coverage can be improved upon. Any plans to develop informants in the VVAW/WSO must take into consideration the fact that following the indictment of the eight VVAW/WSO activists in Florida last year, a purge within the ranks of the VVAW/WSO took place and many individuals were expelled because they were thought to be informants. During the trail the defense spent a great deal of time questioning informants who testified as to how they were developed and handled.

You should be sure any informant directed against the VVAW/WSO has a cover story which will stand close scrutiny. It would also be desirable to review this situation with existing informants in order to make sure their cover stories are air tight.

Within 30 days from the receipt of this letter, you should advise the Bureau of the results of your review, the current status of the VVAW/WSO within your division, informant coverage including member informants specifically identified and steps you intend to take to develop member informants in order that you may be apprised on a timely basis of pertinent activity.





Since the last issue of the Fi a plot has come to light -- a plot by certain heavies of the squadrons that have just returned from "down South." There have been numerous "counseling sessions" for individuals involved in the movement. There have even been outright threats of courts-martial for simply working on the paper. It has also been stated (erroneously) in official publications that to be associated in any way with the Fi house is against wing and station regulations. All in all we have been subjected to a victous campaign of lies and half-truths intended to intimidate people who wish to clear their minds of Marine Corps garbage and think for themselves. So it comes time once again to clear the air and the good name of the Fi after this most recent smear campaign.

The first and probably most pertinent fact is that you cannot be legally busted for writing for the paper or distributing it (off base, off duty and out of uniform) or for coming out to the Fi House to rap. The paper and the house are perfectly legal under DoD Directive 1325.6 and MCO 5370.4. You also have a clear legal right to possess one copy of this or any publication (on base or elsewhere) and to join any 3.1. movement organization and attend its meetings. These orders are final authority over any wing or station orders to the contrary. The old wing and station orders with which some people have been threatened have always been interpreted to be consistent with the higher orders (or else they would be illegal) however confused and ambiguous their language may seem. As proof, if you need it, ask your favorite porker why no one has ever been busted for working on the paper in its four years of existence? Your favorite porker will probably change the subject.

The Fi is not a front for the Russian or Chinese communists or anyone else. It is us. (If we had all that backing we wouldn't have to ask for donations to keep the paper going!) If you must put a label on us, "left-oriented" might do. We do have Markist literature available; so does Tricky Dick and few have yet called him a dreaded Pinko for it. The recent government crisis called "Watergate" has dramatically and convincingly shown the world the suppressive "police state" attitudes and behavior of the United States government under the Nixon administration. The National Security Act of 1947; which established the CIA, expressly prohibits it from having any "police, subpoena, law enforcement powers or internal security functions." Any secret operations inside the U.S. are specifically forbidden.

But then John D. Erlichman, the recently fired chief White House edvisor on domestic affairs, called the Deputy Director of the CIA (which was then Cushman) and asked him to help in the burglarization of the offices of Dr. lewis Fielding, psyciatrist for Daniel Ellsberg (who they tried to burn for releasing to the press the famous Pentagon Papers).

Cushman agreed, and proceeded to outfit he burglars with CIA gear, including phony I.D.'s, a camera disguised as a tobacco pouch, voice alteration devices, and a red wig.

Cushmen had to know, maybe not in exact detail, that some form of illegal violation of the National Security Act was going on Acter all, you don't loan out sophisticated government equipment without knowing something strange is going on.

On May 6th, Sunday, sources close to the Webergate case (probably Justice Dept. prosecutors) told reporter Segment M. Horsh of the New York Times about Cushman's involvement in the Ellsberg burglary. The Fimes printed it in Monday morning's paper. And that is how the shift hit the Isn.for our head pig.

Before the day had ended, CIA director Jomes R. Schlisinger had promised on inquiry into the matter and no less than three congressidal committies were planning to do likewise. DEMOCRACY DIES

AGAIN

The list of ligitimate governments toppled by the cretinous military mind was lengthened last week with the bloody coup in Chili. The freely elected Marxist government of Salvador Allende Gossens fell before the combined brutality of all the Chilian armed forces. In only two days the coup claimed several thousand people killed or wounded. Allende himself perished, "by his own hand," as the ruling junta would have us believe.

And what of our government? There was no cry of outrage at this crime. The State Department issued a statement saying that the department would not comment on or in any way interfere with the internal affairs of another country. This seems rather odd to hear from a regime which has bathed itself in Asian blood for the last five years. Allende initiated a sweeping program of reform, which included nationalization of foreign industrial operations, beginning with total government ownership of the giant copper concerns, whose Amerikan owners had been weefully slow in training Chilians for more important, better paying jobs. I.T.T. want so far as to offer the U.S. government il million to prevent Allende's election and the content in office, held discussions with the C.I.A. on possible ways to remove him from his post.

Are we to swallow this plea of innocence from Nixon and Co.? Surely people can see through this international plot: After Vietnam, Cambodia, South Korea, the Philippines and Greece, would you trust your local American ambassador?



AMNESTY

With the scandals of the Pentagon Papers and now the Watergate exploding before the eyes of America, Nixon and the government is faced with a very serious credibility gap. In trying to maintain power this credibility gap poses a very serious threat to the Nixon gang. They must do everything they can to convince the people that they aren't out-and-out crooks and at least 'sort of' looking out for the needs of the people. Granting amnesty would instead imply that the war in Indochina was wrong, and that those who resisted it were right! This would in effect legitimize resistance to the government. As much hot water as Nixon is now in with the American people, the last thing he wants is more resistance. Amnesty would prove what we've said all along--the war was wrong!

A second major reason Nixon doesn't want to grant amnesty is because of the economic implications involved. The U.S. economy is clearly in trouble-witness the spiraling cost of living, (food prices, gas prices, etc.), and the continuing crisis of unemployment. With a signifigant percentage of the entire labor force effectively excluded from real jobs by virtue of less than honorable discharges or prison records for war resistance, this crisis of unemployment is much easier to hide. A Dishonorable Discharge makes what is a problem of our entire, militarized, economy seem to be the problem of the individual; one who is being economically punished for being a 'bad boy.' The truth is that there are simply not enough real jobs to go around, and the less than honorable discharge is one way of lessening the visibility of the problem. Nixon also realizes that the war resisters wouldn't be the type of passive dage slaves that he'd like to see in the work force. They lought for their rights once, and could be expected to do so again. No amnesty is thus partially geared to breaking any spirit of labor milcancy these people would potentially ring to the labor straggle by keeping them jobless or chronically uneatployed.

STATEMENT OF DELEGATES OF EXILES, ACTIVE DUTY GIS AND VETERANS TO A WORKING SESSION ON AMNESTY: EUROPE, FEBRUARY 19-21, 1973

At a time when we are told the war is coming to an end, American troops, materiel and advisers still remain in Indochina and U.S. intervention in the affairs of the Indochinese peoples continues. We, war resisters in exile, active duty Gls, and veterans demand that the U.S. government withdraw all its troops from Indochina and strictly adhere to the January 27 agreements of end the war.

The American government's illegal intervention in Southeast Asia has been opposed by a majority of American people. Hundreds of thousands of men and women in the U.S. have suffered a loss of civil rights. Hiberty, and jobs because they have been in opposition to the war or subjected to the racism and oppression of the American military and graft systems. Contrary to Nixon's deliberate distortion about the "lew hundred" anti-war exiles, there are in fact 60-100,000 of them. 

FODDING?

At El Toro Marine Corps Station in Santa Ana, California, Cpl. Mike Tippett is being charged with "fodding" two F-4 Phantom jets. FOD stands for Foreign Object Damage, which means leaving tools, bolts or other foreign objects in the jet engine intakes after repairs are finished.

However, in Mike's squadron 12 such incidents have occurred since August. This points out that morale is getting low and differnt is on the rise.

Manytimes fodding occurs because of earelessness, but more often the cause may be anti-military senti-ment.

The GI's in Mike's squadron have been getting harassed quite a bit from their Commanding Officer.

Mike Tippet faces more than ten years in prison for being suspected of the fodding crime. The evidence against him is weak, and there are no eyewitnesses to the alleged crime. In fact, two days after Mike was put in pre-trial confinement for being the cause of all the fodding, another plane blew up on the flightline.

Mike's case is similar to that of Billy Dean Smith, who is being framed for fragging two officers in Nam. Mike is being prosecuted because of his political beliefs and activities and not because of fodding at all. The brass knows that planes can always be replaced, but when you start changing people's ideas about the war and such, that is so great a threat to them that they try to stick it to you. But Mike's getting lots of help from the people and is bound to beat this tum rap.

Pro-Amnesty Sgt. Jailed

The Army is considering court-martial charges against a drill instructor who, while on duty, proposed conditional amnesty for draft resistors. SSgt. Conrad Rondeau, 33, a seven-year Army veteran with one tour in Vietnam, is currently being held in the Ft. Ord stuckade after he refused to stop talking about amnesty and would not see a psychiatrist.

Rendeau first advocated, on a local TV program, that amnesty be granted to those who agree to return and serve six years in the National Guard. His problems started, however, when he discussed his proposal while in uniform on active duty. Thus, the Army claims he engaged in political activity specifically prohibited by the government regulations and the Hatch Act.

Rondeau recently dismissed his civilian lawyer, Fred Novinger, of Montercy, CA, who was a prosecutor in the infamous 1968 Presidio-San Francisco mutiny case. If convicted, Rondeau, charged with seven counts of "vocal refusal to obey orders," faces five years confinement and a DD. (NOMLAC, SF CHRONICLE 2/30, and MONTEREY PENINSULA HERALD, 4/7)

STRAMS AFE

(Rapid City, S.D.) - Lawyers for defendant of the Wounded Knee occupation have made citizens arrest of three FBI agents who accaulted attorneys of the Wounded Knee Legal Defease - Offense Committee. Lawyers also charged that the FBI had been bugging and conducting other types of electronic surveillance of the defense operations for the Native Americae participants in the occupation from a building PBI agents had moved into located next door to the committee's law office.

Officers and men of the Liberation Army dress alike, eat the same food, sleep in the same hammocks, share the same bamboo huts.


Again the American officers are put on a pedestal by having fancy officers' clubs, officers' housing, different food, different recreation facilities and different uniforms.

Which kind of military would you rather be in?



FRAME-UP

LAWTON-GARDNER TRIAL

The situation in the Riverside courtroom where the trial of Garv Lawton and Zurebu (Larrie) Gardner is being conducted is becoming increasingly blatant in its racism and legal gymnastics. Lawton, Gardner and Nehemiah Jackson were previously tried in Indio, Cal. on charges of murdering two policement. The first trial ended in a hung jury. As the second trial was about to begin, Jackson was severed from the case. He is a young college student and the DA felt that Jackson's presence and image in the case would make it more difficult to get a conviction on Lawton and Gardner. So, an agreement was made between Jackson's attorney and the DA that if this second trial of Lawton ended in acquittal or a hung jury, Jackson would not be tried. It is becoming clear that Jackson's. charges will never see the inside of a courtroom. There was only one witness to testify against Jackson in the original trial, Sgt. Nash, a voice prifit expert from the Michigan State Police Dept. This single witness was recently charged with perjury in another California trial, so Jackson is as good as free.

Judging from the goings-on in the courtroom, we may begin to hope that Gary and Zurebu will also soon be free. The prosecution rested its case with the testimony of a young man named Inman. Inman testified that Sally Harris (a friend of Gary and Zurebu who had earlier testified that she knew nothing about the shootings) had told him that she was going to lie in court and say that she didn't know anything about the murders. Following Inman's testimony, the witness went into the hallway where he met Officer Lund (the new assistant to the chief investigator, Nelson) A defense supporter overheard Inman tell Lund that he wouldn't do anything

like he had done on the stand again, suggesting that he had lied under oath The defense began their case on Sept. 12th, and the first witness called was Officer Lund. He admitted that Inman had lied on the stand, so the testimony of Inman was impeached. Then, Detective Nelson was put on the stand and he admitted that the investigators had conducted 6-8 interviews with Inman and that two of these interviews were taped.

Keller, Gary's attorney, requeated these tapes and was allowed to hear them. On Thursday, the 13th, the jury was dismissed because the issue of introducing the tapes was to be discussed. Keller requested that the DA, Lee Porst, be charged with contempt for witholding evidence, and cataged Porst of being a racist and trying to frame his client and Garder. Porst jumped up and began moaning about how he was tired of always being referred to as the bad guy in this trial. The judge then retired to his chambers, listened to the tapes, and returned to tell the court that Keller could put the defense supporter who had overhead Inman and Lund on the stand, that Inman could be put back on the stand, and he warned the DA that he was walking a very thin line with regards to contempt charges.

"Before the Union, farmworkers slaved for 12-13 years without a day's vacation. The foreman had complete control. The foreman would approach a worker saying, 'You have one hour to prune 30 plants. If in that hour you don't, hit the road...' Those were the days when a farmworker with a family of 13 had to settle for an hourly rate of \$1.15.

"But the Union has improved our working and living conditions 100%. The work isn't killing us any more. Workers aren't harrassed and fired as they were before. Workers no longer have to jump when the grower comes, nor take off their hats in homage to him.

"When the Union came, out went the crooked foreman, the despots and the labor contractors who earned up to \$35,000 a year by robbing the crew they hired."

These statements were made by farmworkers who have experienced years of struggle in order for them to get where they are today. The United Farm Workers Union began in 1965 shortly after workers walked off the job after the growers tried to lessen the \$1.40 an hour wage that had been part of their contract. This marked the beginning of the successful five year strike and boycott aimed at grape growers in Southern California who had criminally treated the migrant farm workers; mainly Chicanos.

The nationwide boycott of grapes and the will of the striking farm workers forced the growers to recognize the Farm Workers Union, under the leadership of Cesar Chavez, as the legitimate representative of migrant farmworkers. In 1970 grape growers representing 85% of the industry signed contracts with UFWU.

Within the next year, the UFWU expanded and won recognition for farmworkers all across the country.

With the advent of an organized union, the grape and lettuce growers and agri-business recognized a threat to their immense profits. This led the growers to try to push through anti-union laws to outlaw strikes and boycotts by agricultural unions. The laws were passed in several states, but in California, Orregon and Florida the united forces of the farmworkers defeated these attempts to destroy the UTWU.

This led agri-business to try another way to break up UFWU, by introducing the Teamster's Union into the California farm areas. In 1970, the Teamster's Union contracts allowed for no workers' benefits as compared to the contracts signed by UFWU. The UFWU negotiated a union hiring hall, seniority system, pesticide control, nine hour limit, overtime pay, 'greivance procedure, medical benefits, control on layoffs collective bargaining and a pension? plan, while the Teamsters offered none of these that would benefit the workers.

In April of 1973, when the UF WU contracts expired, the growers in league with the bosses of the Teamsters Union signed the contracts the Teamsters in an outright attempt to destroy the rights the workers had fought for and won under the UFWU. Those represented by UFWU dropped from 40,000 to approximately 6,000. The workers realizing immediately what was in store for them, struck the fields of Coachella, California; the first harvest area. Workers from Salinas volunteered to support the Coachella strike realizing that this battle was necessary to save the union. Within one week after the 'sweetheart' deals between the growers and the Teamsters, hundreds were arrested as the growers learned quickly that the farmworkers were. determined to remain represented by UFWU. As the workers struck, Teamster 'organizers', in actuallity goon squads, were called in to keep the workers down.

In July, a group of 50 goons armed with pipes, clubs and chairs attacked the nonviolent farmwork rs in order to bust up their strike. It August Nagi Daifullah, an Arab farm worker was killed after being bea en by a cop and two days later Juan De LaCruz, a striker was shot to detth

After the two murders, the Teamster's Union voided their signed contracts with the growers in an attempt to placate the outraged farm workers. This action by the Teamsters has successfully covered up the fact that the killing of DeLaCruz was done by one of their goons. But the aim of the Teamsters Union is still to destroy the UFWU. The day after the announcement was made about voiding the contracts, they announced that they would attempt to organize workers in San Diego County.

The Farm Workers Union has a long hard struggle ahead to finally represent the farmworkers. The workers are becoming very impations; the Teamsters and the AFL-CIO. But as their force and pressure continue to topple the attempts to subvert their union, they are picking up the support of millions of workers around the country, who view the struggle of the farmworkers as their own.

The Farmworkers ask that all people continue to boycott grapes and head lettuce during these crucial months.



These points are particularly relevant so long as not at all coordinators are able to succeed themselves in office.
