SUBJECT:

VIETNAM VETERANS AGAINST THE WAR WINTER SOLDIER ORGANIZATION (VVAW/WSO) IS - VVAW/WSO

Re Albany letter to San Antonio dated 1/2/74; and ouston nitel to the Bureau, dated 1/8/74.

Referenced Albany letter states that the license mimber RWY 335, which appeared on a Toyota at the VVAW/WSO meting held December 7 - 9, 1973, at Oneonta, New York, may possibly have been RWY 533.

On January 8, 1974, records of the Motor Vehicle Division, Texas Highway Department, Austin, Texas, were checked for 1973 Taxas License RWY 533 and these records disclosed that this Ecense plate is for a 1970 Chrysler four door.

In view of the fact that the Houston sources know of one from their area who has a Toyota and the fact that the license plate furnished by Albany checks out to vehicles with priptions other than a Toyota, San Antonio is conducting no ther investigation.



COLLECTIVE REPORT MAKES



BUILD VVAW/WSO





The growth of \ AW/WSO during the past four onths varied from region to region. Those regions fairly well established saw more work being done by chapters, whereas the regions that are less established saw a further decline in activity. For instance, in Denver where an old established chapter/regional office was in existence, the region grew by five chapters. In Connecticut-Rhode Island on the other hand, as there were no strong chapters, the region has become defunct. This is also the case in Louisiana and Montana-Idaho. Other regions such as New Mexico-Arizona, Oregon and North-South Carolina saw little, if any, sustained activity. Regions where weak regional offices have been moved to more viable chapters such as in E. Pa-Delaware, can rebuild due to the new consolidation of the regional office with an established chapter that can provide leadership to create a viable region.

In some cases, such as in New England, the lack of response from the regional office to letters and phone calls indicates that that regional office is defunct despite the work being done by individual chapters. This attitude on the part of the regional office shows an inexusable lack of concern for building unified, working regions. On the other hand many regions such as New York, Ohio etc., and California have many active chapters and working regional offices resulting in an ever-increasing level of activity. Generally, this growth of regions and the activity of individual chapters around the country continues the trend of VVAW/WSO in growing into a strong anti-imperialist force, in spite of the fact that in some places VVAW/WSO is weaker than ever.

During the past few months, international chapters have emerged or grown stronger. In November, the Union of American Exiles in Britain became the London Chapter of VVAW/WSO and there is a possibility that several other chapters may form in England as a result of this. In Japan, chapters continue to build and publish newspapers for distribution to GIs stationed there. These Japan chapters are organized and run by GIs. In addition to these VVAW/WSO chapters, we have established close ties with other international groups of Americans, such as AMEX-Canada and Vancouver American Exiles Association.

VVAW/WSO has, now more than ever, the capacity and dedication to build into the unquestionably largest, most active mass organization in the country. In order to achieve this goal, there are certain tendencies that have to be struggled with internally to avoid a setback in our growth. In some instances during the past few months, certain regions have developed internal struggles that have affected the unity of the organization. In some cases, individual members have left the organization or have limited the amount of work for fear of confronting the problems and resolving them or by not understanding the inner workings of disputes. Of course there are cases where the politics and practice of individual are incompatible with the philosophy of the organization and this represents a different form of discussion. The point is that individuals and chapters should be aware that the resolution of internal problems can only be accomplished through principled struggle.

Another tendency that must be avoided is that of building bureaucracies which ultimately lin—the capability of chapters to c—rate successfully. Arugment for the sake of argument is detrimental. Paperwork for the sake of paperwork takes away from other activities. Getting caught up in minor detail and missing the major points detracts from accomplishing our goals as an organization. Making the revolution a career instead of a way of life satisfies only the indivdual making this error. If a clearer conception of what we as an organization with ten objectives represent and if the necessity of mass work was more clearly understood, then these tendencies would be lessened.

We must also try and avoid rumor-mongering and always confront others with stories that may be detrimental in building solidarity between members, chapters, regions and the national office. Our objective is always to advance the struggle. Rumor-mongering and back-stabbing certainly don't help this.

We should also realize that we are bound by the decisions of the steering committee and that individuals should not try and circumvent those decisions. This individualism clearly seems to be for personal gain or ego, and not in line with the basic philosophy of the organization that has developed over the years.

Another tendency that must be recognized and dealt with is the defeatist attitude of people who say, "We can't do that, it won't work." We have seen this crop up from time to time and those individuals who consistantly have this attitude should re-examine their commitment to the organization. With experience and an optimistic attitude we can do what we want. We must constantly develop this assurance and confidence in ourselves and in our organization abilities.


Also during the past few months we have seen a continuation of what we will call 'organizational diffusionism'. This tendency manifests itself in chapters setting up projects under other names or by totally liquidating organizational identity in a coalition or in a joint project. This tendency weakens the building process of VVAW/WSO. If a chapter feels that using the name VVAW/WSO is politically unsound and opts for a front name or subjects the organization to a totally subordinate role in a coalition or project, then the potential form building VVAW/WSO nationally is affected. This does not mean that we cannot join in coalitions or work with others. On the contrary, this is encouraged as long as it means that the objective of building VVAW/WSO and advancing the struggle is realized. If this occurs (organizational diffusionism) we should seriously consider why we are doing this and struggle to avoid it.

"Build VVAW/WSO" is a good slogan with which we can combat these tendencies. If we constantly thought of what is best for VVAW/WSO and what will advance the anti-imperialist struggle, we would be better able to organize and grow. There are many issues that we can work around: the continued war in Indochina, amnesty, discharge up-grading, prisons, GIs, the Lawton/Gardner trial, Operation County Fair, Cairo, etc. Many chapters have already begun working on programs in these areas and are very successful in the work being

done. For instance, in Milwaukee the chapter has grown considerably by the direct actions around the VA and the demand for one discharge. In Florida, work around Starke Prison and in San Francisco work around discharge upgrading has led to a growth and political advancement for those involved. Other work that must be done is to support struggles and to explain events that occur. For instance, in Columbus, Ohio the chapter supported the truckers who were demanding lower fuel prices. If the war re-escalates in Vietnam, every chapter regardless of where they are located should demonstrate. Chapters wherever they are can explain the energy crisis or the rising prices for food. All chapters can do support work for the boycotts of the Farm Workers and the Farah workers Selling Winter Soldier can be done anywhere. Finding distribution points for the paper can be done anywhere. Another idea that people should remember is that we have become an international organization and that our single chapters are not alone, but part of a network that has developed a high regard by other US organizations, and international movements and governments. This could and should aid us in our work locally.

We are a good, strong organization with a lot of potential for growth. If we accept the responsibility of our commitments to building the anti-imperialist struggle, if we constantly remember who the real enemy is, if we understand the importance of mass work, and if we continually guard against unhealthly tendencies, then we will Build VVAW/WSO.

It is high time to everyone be given a strong r inder that VVAW/WSO has adopted three national projects which are simply not being given full support by chapters and regions. There is no region that can say that they have been working around the Lawton-Gardner trial, the struggle in Cairo and Operation County Fair to the fullest of their capabilities. We view this as a rather sad predicament because if we are to adopt national projects, either we work on them or we drop them. It is as simple as that. There are people in Riverside, Bogue Chitto and Cairo who are depending on us and we may correctly be accused of letting these people down.

We realize that people have a tendency to relate to the spectacular. For example, we adopted Cairo as a national project when the heat was really coming down in that community. People rallied around the idea, but as soon as things cooled off a little, the majority of our support was withdrawn to the level of lip-service. The same thing happened in our adoption of the Gainesville trial as a national project during a crisis situation. We can say that chapters and regions did a great deal of work around that trial, and this is understandable in light of the fact that the trial in Gainesville was an organizational attack. Now that the trial in Gainesville is over, we feel that it is time that we re-affirm our commitments to our other national projects and take these commitments more seriously by actually doing concrete work around them.

At this particular point, Gary Lawton and Zurebu Gardner are in desperate need of national support. If what is going on in Riverside cannot be considered the "spectacular" then we don't know what can. The lives of these brothers are depending on the work we do in building support and raising funds for them, and this is no t the time to pay little more than passing acknowledgement that this is a national project. The situation in Riverside is critical -- more so than it has ever been in the past -- and chapters are making a gross error if they do not rally behind these brothers and do everything possible to ensure their freedom. There is a great deal of work that needs to be done in all communities regarding this trial. We must take what is happening in Riverside to our particular areas and spread the word about this racist outrage. Educational work needs to be done, speaking gigs need to be done, money needs to be raised, and full-scale support needs to be given. VVAW/WSO has committed itself to doing all of these things, so let's get it on and do it! We have national projects which, for all practical purposes, have been ignored. This act of ignoring intense struggles is not what VVAW/WSO is all about.

Veterans Affairs

The main ongoing work dealing with veterans is discharge upgrading, which falls under the category of Amnesty. A list of resource material and offices dealing in all aspects of veterans problems will be ready by the end of January.


This Project is now being given full attention. In November, a member of the National Collective spent three days visiting the Collective and the people of Bogue Chitto. Historical and current data on the area is being gathered for use in an upcoming OCF Brochure, Winter Soldier and news packets for distribution to other news media. Further progress on OCF will be detailed by the Bogue Chitto Collective in their report.

A joint clothing drive with Cairo and Bogue Chitto was organized during the last few months. Most of the clothes were gathered by the Friends of the United Front of Cairo in St. Louis. In return for half of the clothes, VVAW/WSO is to provide the truck to transport the clothes to Cairo and Bogue Chitto. An 18-foot truck was scheduled to leave St. Louis on December 23rd, but due to heavy snowfall in St. Louis, the departure date was postponed to mid-January. Money for the truck rental is being raised from donations from our chapters. Truck rental one-way to Bogue Chitto, including about \$30 for gas, will-be about \$250. We're about \$50 short. A member of the St. Louis Chapter will be driving the truck.

The joint clothing drive was originally conceived as a midwest project, but circumstances required us to call on all chapters to assist with finances. Another drive in Spring or Summer will be undertaken if interest is high.

At the St. Loui ISCM, the National Collective is given the responsibility of researching the feasibility of establishing a national prison project. After four months of letter-writing, gathering information, and speaking with people, we can say that not only is there a "feasibility" of establishing a prison project, but if VVAW/WSO fails to develop such a program we may be making a serious political and organizational error. For those of you interested in statistics, we can say that the list of prisoners that we have contact with has grown much more rapidly than we expected. Prior to the St. Louis meeting, we had approximately 50-60 names on our Winter Soldier subscription list and were mailing to approximately 30 prisons. As of this Yellow Springs meeting, the list of prisoners has grown to almost 300 prisoners that we have contact with in over 60 prisons. Considering that VVAW/WSO has grown among this many inmates in the short time of four months, we can say that the response our organization has received within prisons has been something equal to overwhelming.

We have contacted approximately 30 organizations in all parts of the country who are doing prison support work, asking for ideas and feedback on the idea of a national prison project. The majority of these groups are local and do support work with one or two prisons in their area (this is because few national organizations are dealing with prisons on a broad level, though many organizations do offer lip-service to prison struggles). The responses that we have received from these organizations contacted has been extremely enthulastic. The over-riding trend in all of the letters has been that it is vitally important for the prison movement to have a national organization involved in prison struggles on a wide, national level for purposes of coordination and really understanding what is going on in this country's prisons. The organizations contacted have been very supportive of the project idea and were pleased that VVAW/WSO, in particular, might be the organization capable of a national prison project which is solely set in a political context. We are one of the few organizations with the human resources and organizing skills to plug into prison struggles in a real way.

Moving on to the response we have received from the prisoners themselves, the prison project takes on a much more definitive form. The majority of in-mates who have directly contacted our office have joined VVAW/WSO after reading Winter Soldier. They realize that they are in no real position to do mass educational and agitational work, yet they are interested in becoming a part of a national organization in order to alleviate the isolation of being a single, politically aware, prisoner. Also, though their mass work is limited, they see the necessity of their position as prisoners to work with other inmates around them and discuss the problems of this country and ways in which those problems may be solved. Many prisoners seem to be quite entrenched in the idea that political education is important in their special position and that educational work is necessary if prisoners are to understand the reasons why they are incarcerated.

We now have VVAW/WSO members in almost all of the 60 prisons that we have contact with and the majority of these members are third world people (black or Chicano). Many of these members are veterans, but the majority are

not. Those which are of veterans feel a strong ident, with VVAW/WSO be-cause they feel that, like veterans, they have received a first-hand view of how our society operates (they often compare prison life to what has gone on in Indochina). Growing out of these single memberships has come prison chapters. To date, we have chapters in two federal prisons -- Leavenworth, Kansas and Marion, Illinois. We also have chapters in Waupun, Wisconsin and the USDB at Ft. Leavenworth. Chapters are forming in Springfield, Missouri; Lucasville and London, Ohio; Soledad, California; Huntingdon, Pennsylvania; Angola, Louisiana; and Starke, Florida. The prisoners' rationale behind organizing VVAW/WSO chapters is the recognition that in order to make real change and fight on a

more effective level, organization is vitally important for them.

State And Barrier

Many inmates have expressed the idea that a large number of prisoners are concerned simply with their own welfare and are struggling against their own personal oppression. With the developing political understanding going on inside prisons, inmates are discovering that their own personal oppressions do not matter in the context of the oppression which is facing the entire prison population (and the oppression facing all of us on the outside). For this reason, many prisoners have expressed that their personal battles are no longer important and that the real key is to band together and battle for better conditions within the prison as a whole. Also, as stated before, the prisoners are anxious to be involved in not only a prison struggle, but in the struggles that are going on outside the prison walls. They have a belief that what is being done to them today will be done to the entire American people tomorrow. They feel the importance of a national organization in this respect and recognize that imperialism is the real enemy that must be dealt with because it is imperialism that has placed them in a prison cell.

... The major function of a prison project would be for VVAW/WSO to plug into prison struggles wherever and however possible. This means that the level of prison work will vary from region to region and will depend on the contact inside prisons of a specific region and the organizing capabilities of that region. The major points of the prison project which are to follow are the suggestions of prisoners themselves. Since this project will exist for prisoners, it is important that they have a lot to say about the development of the project. One of the major thoughts that has arisen in communications with inmates is that we must at all times avoid the idea of "prison reform." As a brother in Marion puts it: ! There are many groups dealing with prison reform today, however, most of them do not realize that memo prison reform is not the answer. True, prison reform may stop some of the brutality and terrorism that exists behind prison walls but it will not prepare the men and women behind those walls for society nor will it stop others from coming to prison. A revamping of our entire social and political system is the answer, not prison reform. It is the social ills that create the need for prisons -- not the reverse. Most prisoners today, at least those who have become politically aware, realize this and do not support prison reform as such. We fully realize that helping us to get out of prison, and we all want out, is not worth much if we must resort to crime in order to survive." This is a common sentiment among prisoners and we feel that their wishes should be heeded. Therefore, we should keep in mind that prison reform is not to be a major focus of the project.

Though prison reform should not be our aim of cal, there are some demands which are of a sform nature which may be de with in doing prison organizing. One prisoner suggested that we draw up a program calling for an end to the present repressive systems as they now function. Though prison reform should not be our work, there are some immediate demands that should be made. These include things such as conjugal visits, minimum wages for work done, more community rehabilitation programs, early releases, access to the courts and media, less oppressive visiting rights, better medical facilities, increased protection of women's maternal rights, transportation for visitors to and from the prisons, etc. This "program" idea will have to be discussed in depth to decide whether or not we wish to include a similar list of demands in a prison project.

Other ideas which have come out of the prison project idea include a Free Book Program. This would entail contacting publisher who offer free books to prisoners (or reduced costs). Out of this a bibliography of these books would be drawn up and sent to the inmates. Then, inmates could order, direct from the publisher, which books they choose. The reason for this would be to provide some idea of reading which are available (and hard to come by in prisons) which are of a political nature and provide a means by which inmates may continue their political education and development.

An important aspect of a prison project should include legal support. It does not make much sense to mobilize prisoners into taking direct action in the battle for their existance if there is no legal support available on the outside. In light of this, it will be important for VVAW/WSO chapters who are working around prisons to make contact with sympathetic lawyers who would be willing to file petitions, work on defense, etc. if the need arises. We would suggest that concrete organizing not begin until legal contacts are searched out and secured.

Communications should also be a major focus of the project. Many prisoners are desperate for people to correspond with, and many are especially interested in political communications. The majority of prison correspondence would be handled by the chapters. People must remember that corresponding with inmates is not a light responsibility. After a few letters, the prisoners will begin to expect to hear from certain people, and they must not be let-down in this respect. The people doing the writing should be responsible and disciplined enough to get the job done on a regular basis. Many of the inmates will not ask for much in their letters, they simply need someone to communicate with. Also, people should be prepared to do "errands" or leg work for the inmates, i. e. you may be requested to find out about something, make contact with someone, etc. This does not generally take much time but it means a great deal to the prisoners and saves them a great deal of work in trying to make contact with people on the outside. Also, whenever possible, VVAW/WSO members should try to get on the prisoner's visiting list because of the importance of personal contact and the fact that much more can be discussed in person because of tight mail censoring.

Other aspects of a prison project could include making contact with the families of prisoner whenever possible. It is highly ossible that the families of prisoners can be drawn into the organization if they see that we are doing concrete work to help them and the prisoners. Time should be spent with the families and political education should be offered to help people understand why their husband, son, daughter, wife, etc. is incarcerated.

Direct action against prisons should also be the job of chapters. Several regions are already working around prison struggles and activity such as marches, leafletting, demonstrating for conjugal visits, etc. has already been conducted. Other regions should consider doing this type of direct action and all regions should do whatever possible to bring the conditions in our prisons home to the American people. This will include political education work on a mass level. For example, the struggles going on inside prisons should be publicized widely. Agitational and educational work should be done around the behavior modification programs now being conducted, and actions directed at the prisons now practicing behavior modification should be done.

In conclusion, all of the above ideas regarding a prison project have come from the prisoners themselves. We will have to discuss them and discover which ideas are real for VVAW/WSO. Once the project is established, we feel that a project office will be a necessity if prison activity is to be coordinated. Since the majority of prisoners who receive Winter Soldier contact the National Office address for help and information, the National Office is willing to take on the responsibility of acting as the project office and coordinating prison activity that is going on around the country. This will require some support and cooperation from the regions and chapters. For example, the National Office will need to know the names of prisoners in the various regions, and these names should be sent by the region. Also, any type of prison support work that VVAW/WSO chapters are involved in should be reported to the NO so that there will be a central collection place of all information and so that this information can, in turn, be gotten out to all of the regions. We see this central collection place as a necessity.

The Prison Workshop will discuss all of these ideas in detail and decide if a national project around prisons is realistic and what the project will entail. The above is a collection of ideas from which the workshop can proceed.

I. BACKGROUND

As was pointed out in Newsletter #14, a number of problems were encountered in working with the U.S. Preparatory Committee(s) for the Moscow World Peace Congress. Basically, it was felt that VVAW/WSO's delegation to Moscow was manipulated and dealt with in a less than principled manner by the organizing committee (s); this manifested itself in terms of the size of the delegation, problems around funding the VVAW/WSO delegates and a general lack of respect for our organization.

As of the St. Louis NSCM we had been old by Jim Forrest, the U.S. Secretary to the World Peace Council stationed in Helsinki, that VVAW/WSO would have two free scholarships to the Congress. The NSC designated that Ann Bailey and Brian fill these positions. These scholarships were given to the organization on a national level and were to be paid by the International WPC's funding, not from the national or regional U.S. Preparatory Committee. Things turned out quite differently than anticipated, however. Despite the fact that we were approached as a national organization for participation in the U.S. delegation to Moscow, we found ourselves having to deal with separate, regional, World Peace Council organizing committees from the East coast, Mid-West, and West Coast. While all of these organizing committees were affiliate organizations of the CPUSA they "seemingly" had little or no coordination with each other on a national level.

Over and above the hassles presented in trying to organize a national VVAW/ WSO delegation from a regional basis, other problems also arose. The two free scholarships VVAW/WSO was promised by Jim Forrest were cancelled. Then only one scholarship was available for Brian Adams and was being provided by the Mid-West WPC organizing committee. It also was not for the entire Chicago-Moscow trip, as promised, but only for the trip from NYC to Moscow. Not only was funding unavailable for Ann Bailey, but a clear attempt was made to cut her from the U.S. delegation altogether: with or without independent funding! A decision was nearly made to actually pull out of the trip when without the knowledge of the National Collective, Ann raised the necessary funding for her trip, and forced them to include her on the delegation as they were supposed to. (John Naveau was held up with being allowed to go on the Mid-West contingent of the U.S. delegation until literally a day or two before the plane left, with evasive, "maybe yes, maybe no" answers. He also had to pay for his own trip). This all led to the inescapable conclusion that the people organizing the delegation were juggling things around to suit their own purposes, and that VVAW/WSO was treated in a very disrespectful, manipulative manner.

II. MOSCOW

· Despite all this unfortunate and unnecessary haggling, Brian Adams, Ann Bailey and John Naveau did make it to Moscow. The meetings held there with the various foreign delegations were extremely productive in terms of promoting

struggle being waged around the world, and in familiarizing these struggles with the work VVAW/W is doing in the U.S.

Particularly useful bilateral meetings were held between VVAW/WSO and the delegations from: Cambodia (GRUNC), the PRG, the DRV, the Popular Front for the Liberation of Oman and the Arab Gulf, Japan, the Democratic People's Republic of Yemen, Zimbabwe (Rhodesia), and the Democratic People's Republic of Korea.

The Korean delegation made a particularly strong appeal for us to work on the issues surrounding the reunification of north and south Korea and the removal of the 45,000 remaining U.S. troops still stationed in Korea. Given the exceedingly unstable situation in Korea today, and the very real possibility of renewed hostilities involving major U.S. military operations there, this request takes on an even greater signifigance.

III. PROPOSAL FOR A LETTER OF CENSURE

gota.

During the World Congress of Peace Forces in Moscow an incredibly regretable incident occured. On November 1st, Ann Bailey was asleep in her room at the hotel where all the delegates stayed, when an unknown intruder entered her room and most viciously assaulted and raped her. While the identity of the rapist was never established, Ann was certain that he was not a member of the U.S. delegation. As unspeakable as this was, the treatment she received from the Soviet police authorities was harder to understand. The questions asked her read like a Chicago police blotter: "Did you like it? Did you lead him on? Did you really try to resist?" It was made very clear that they would be more than pleased if we would drop the whole matter immediately. The point being that Ann was treated in the same manner a rape victim would be treated by a police officer in the U.S.A. In the context of a supposedly socialist state, this is difficult to understand.

Feeling that such treatment was inexcuseable, a letter was sent to the CPUSA and the U.S. Secretary of the World Peace Council, organizers of the U.S. delegation, demanding an apology for this; that the matter should be brought to the attention of the proper Soviet authorities; and a return of Ann's travel expenses. A reply was never received at all from the CPUSA -- the letter was totally ignored! The WPC sent us a very evasive letter saying how "shocked" they were but not even mentioning the specific criticisms we had raised -- thus a de facto ignoring of the letter sent to them. Feeling that this response, or lack thereof, from the responsible organizing bodies for the Moscow World Congress of Peace forces was unacceptable, the following proposal is submitted:

PROPOSAL: That the National Office and Ann Bailey jointly draft an official letter of censure to the U.S. Secretary of the World Peace Council and to the CPUSA, the responsible organizing bodies of the U.S. delegation to the Moscow World Congress of Peace Forces, for the following reasons: 1) For failure to respond to the letter sent to them by the National Office of VVAW/WSO regarding the situation surrounding the assault of Ann Bailey while she was in Moscow. 2) For the disrespect shown Ann Bailey and VVAW/WSO as an organization by ignoring the letter. 3) For failure to respond in any real manner what-soever to the chauvinistic and insensitive treatment afforded Ms. Bailey by Sov-

The following section contains some of the current thinking of the National Collective concerning a direction VVAW/WSO's natio I amnesty program should be taking. It is hoped that this section will provide some basic guidelines for action. Thus the questions spoken to are some of the major questions that have arisen in the course of our amnesty work so far.

I. AMNESTY IS NOT A HOT ISSUE YET!

Despite what many may think, amnesty is not yet a burning issue on the American political scene. Universal, unconditional amnesty is not even a household word much less something Congress is going to support at this point. Amnesty will remain an issue that gets pushed aside in the face of other crises issues: such as the way Watergate and impeachment bumped amnesty from the news last spring. It will, however, be a long term issue offering a solid basis for ongoing grassroots organizing.

It is perhaps the central task of VVAW/WSO's amnesty campaign to make amnesty a real issue. Until we do, there is no way we can ever expect to win our demands. The only way amnesty will be made into an issue that the system is forced to deal with will be through the grassroots organizing we do to push it forward. Only when it is an issue widely supported in our communities, only when there is a high consciousness of what it means at the grassroots level, can we finally expect to achieve our demands. Through our concerted efforts, however, we do have the capability of building such community support.

2. NEED TO USE THE MEDIA!

Section of Section

It should go without saying that we need to use the media to develop the amnesty movement as much as possible. Lists of media contacts should be developed and regularly sent news releases about regional or local VVAW/WSO amnesty activity. When DUP's are opened, news conferences should be held announcing them. Public service announcements (PSAs) should be made on a regular basis on radio, cable TV, etc., to alert the community to the discharge upgrading counciling available. When direct actions are being planned, such as around the VA. unemployment centers, etc., news contacts should be advised in advance of what is going on. In short, the media should be used as a form of mass outreach wherever possible. But just like other forms of outreach, whether its leafletting, public speaking or whatever, it's not going to happen without first doing the necessary ground work.

WE NEED A UNIFIED NATIONAL VVAW/WSO CAMPAIGN!

We cannot fail to understand the need for a united effort on a national level in VVAW/WSO's amnesty campaign. Unless our campaign is national in scope, unless we are all operating according to the same overall, coordinated plan, our efforts will be drastically less effective. This national strategy bears itself out in all regions and chapters working on the same basic projects -- discharge upgrading, national demonstrations, etc. -- and in supporting the same political analysis. i.e. our amnesty pamphlet.

4. NEED FOR UNITY OF F MANDS

As our amnesty pamphlet points out, we need to <u>locus</u> the entire amnesty <u>issue</u>, on all categories of war resistance, rather than just on a particular cated gory of resistors. Our elogans, speeches, etc. mustalways put forward a unified demand of unconditional amnesty for all categories of resistors. Should we allow ourselves to only deal with badly discharged veterans, for example, we would be splitting the amnesty movement up and thereby weakening our forces. To date, this has not been a problem, but as our community work gets more involved on a day-to-day basis, primarily with discharge upgrading, we must guard against such tendencies.

5. ORGANIZING/FOCUS VETS/GI's

While the political program we focus on must maintain unity of demands for all categories of war resistors, the primary organizing focus of our amnesty strategy must be GI's and badly discharged veterans. This is not to say that individual regions or chapters might not do extensive work with other categories of resistors, i.e. exiles, prisoners, etc., but that the overall national effort is directed at organizing badly discharged vets and GIs as a priority. When we have the capacity for really concentrating on other categories, we may move into organizing with them at a later date. But at this point in time, our strategy must be to concentrate our forces where they will be most effective. GIs and badly discharged vets.

6. DUP BASIC ORGANIZING TOOL

From this need to concentrate our forces on organizing Glajand badly discharged vets, we must utilize the discharge upgrading projects as our primary organizing tool. As Gis and Vets form, by far, the single largest category of those affected by amnosty, their mobilization for amnosty is absolutely critical. The DUPs are one very concrete program that will enable us to do this. Understanding that discharge upgrading is a service and may easily lead one up the path of totally non-productive "councelingism" we must struggle to see it only as a political organizing tool. If we allow ourselves to become primarily "counselors", not only danying our position that amnesty is a class question and we are thus utterly opposed to a case-by-case review for war resistors, (whether they are exiles, prisoners, or badly discharged vets) but we are wasting our time as well. We know that only 1 out of 7, badly, discharged vets will have their discharges upgraded. The only approach to amnesty by definition then, must be a political one. The DUP's must serve to educate badly discharged vets to this and serve as a means of: 1) locating them. 2) educating them and finally 3) hopefully organizing them into a movement for a universal discharge. VVAW/VSO is already well on the way to doing this. DUPs are already set up in Oakland, San Francisco, Dayton, St. Louis, New York City and Milwaukse. Denver, Chicago, Buffalo, Washington, D.C. and others are well on the way to setting up projects there.

7. NEED TO SET UP DUPS ASAP AS OFFICIAL VVAW/WSO PROJECTS

For a number of external and also internal reasons, it is clear at this point that we must move as quickly as possible to set up official VVAW/WSO DUPs wherever possible. Secondly, many areas have held back from moving towards setting up, in their regions until they could hopefully come up with some sort of fundame is a mistake. It now appears very unlikely that VVAW/WSO will get any large at all. If we are able to get funding, there is a very real risk of being form water down the political approach of discharge upgrading to such an extent make it virtually useless. We can and must be prepared to set up DUPs are on our own resources. We must be totally self reliant in this area. If we conside support well and good; if not, we will proceed anyway. We have allowed through our own experience that we are quite capable of doing discharge grading on our own resources with just about zero for a budget.

Finally, we must avoid overly mystifying discharge upgrading and there paralyzing ourselves into inaction. Discharge upgrading is no mystery, required no magical skills and can easily be learned by us all. The DUPs are the concour national amnesty program. We must set these projects up as soon as political vyaw/wso projects. Unless the DUP projects are identified official vyaw/wso projects, coordination of this work on a national level with badly hampered.

8. ORGANIZING VETS AT POINTS OF OPPRESSION.

The basis for agitation around amnesty, specifically badly discharged versus, must be consistent community outreach at those points of oppression in the community where badly discharged vets are getting screwed. These would be the Vetcrans Administration, (as Milwaukee has done), at unemployment office drug clinics, welfare offices, "manpower" type hiring halls, job sites, unical so forth. Not only are these points of oppression where we can find badly discrete to organize and acquaint with our DUPs, but they are the most blatant extenses of why we must fight for amnesty, of how the government has passed a life semion vets by giving them a less-than-honorable discharge.

9. ORGANIZING GIS

Organizing GIs into the amnesty movement/single discharge movement renot be quite as easy. This naturally stems from the fact that GIs haven't rece a bad discharge, or are not really certain that they may eventually get one, are many ways that GIs can be tied into the amnesty movement, however. Privily it is developing consciousness around the anti-imperialist nature of amnest the duty and right of soldiers to refuse to serve in an imperial army, in illegal exploiting and oppressing other nations. Also, must work can be done around tary stockades, in retraining groups (as Lowry AFB) where many GIs realized their separation from the military isn't going to be on the best of terms.

Programs may be developed around the various coding systems used by "military. Agitating around SPNs for example. Educating GIs to their existance what they mean and that GIs have a right to know in advance what their SPNs are and who gives it to them.

Above all, the st important thing to remember a terms of bringing amner ty to the GI movement is to ASK THEM what relevance to the GI movement they see in amnesty. Ask in what logical tie-ins to GI will can be made. If we proceed in this manner we'll definitely achieve a lot more success than if we just go charging in with pre-conceived notions about how this will work out. We must see through practice how the GI movement can be successfully linked up with amnesty.

10. AMNESTY & CONGRESS (

There has been considerable confusion around this question and how VYAW/ WSO will relate amnesty to Congress. It is important that we understand how an amnesty campaign will relate to this question. Primary in our work is the understanding that what is important is the ANTI-IMPERIALIST nature of our amnesty campaign. Our politics on amnesty, the progressive aspects of the amnesty movement, must always be in command of our actions. Regarding Congress and amnesty then, we must remember that we really don't care how Congress does, or does not, relate to amnesty at this point because we know that it will not act favorably on it until it is forced to do so. Until we in the amnesty movement can successfully mobilize our communities to support amnesty, we obviously can't expect Congress to do so. Thus, utilizing some form of Congressional approach at this point in time must be seen as a TACTIC that can be used. A tactic that may or may not be selected from the various alternatives the situation offers. Amnesty by definition is not a revolutionary issue and thus, by definition, we are forced somewhere along the line to deal with the fact that either the President or Congress must ultimately grant it. 
11. RECRUITING PEOPLE INTO THE AMNESTY MOVEMENT

Once contact is made with badly discharged vets, or anybody who is interested in amnesty, it is important to try and incorporate them into working on our amnesty campaign. There must be something for them to do before they can be expected to feel they are part of the campaign. Needless to say, there is no way we can successfully build broad community support without constantly recruiting new people into the amnesty movement.

A list of specific activities is going to depend on the given conditions in each region or chapter. A few activities are listed below: collecting petitions, for use in recruiting people into the amnesty movement and for fundral sing lists; forming outreach teams to leaflet, poster, etc. on a regular basis; media teams to develop propaganda, i.e. sending letters to the editor, PSAs, etc.; direct action; getting unions to support universal amnesty; using impeachment lists for amnesty mailers (vitally important to play up erosion of administration's credibility and what that means for the amnesty movement); set up defense committees to support those in need of amnesty, i.e. writing letters to judges, attending trials, letters to newspapers. In short, this is the type of standard defense work such as that being done around Dick Bucklin's trial.

12. NATIONAL AMNESTY ACTION PROPOSAL!

Given the need to make amnesty an issue, and given the understanding that the only way to do this is through massive, grassroots organizing, we submit the following as a general strategy proposal for the next 6-9 months of VVAW/WSOs



- as a local one, and the need for VVAW/WSO to bring its amnesty campaign to the attention of as many people across the nation as possible, that VVAW/WSO hold a national action on amnesty in late June or early July in Washington, D.C.
- (1) That this action would not be seen as an end in itself, but the first step in publically unveiling our amnesty program on a national level.
- (2) That all regions would build for this action beginning in late spring. This would include holding coordinated regional "building" actions.
 - (3) The D.C. action would be organized and controlled solely by VVAW/WSC.
 - (4) That the demonstration would be 3-4 days in length.
- (5) That the demands/slogans for the demonstration would be <u>Universal</u> <u>Unconditional Amnesty</u>, <u>A Universal Discharge for All Vets</u>, <u>U.S. Really Out of Indochina</u>.
- (6). That the targets of the actions would be the Veterans Administration, the Discharge Review Boards, the Pentagon, Congress, the Dept. of Justice.
- (7) That this would not be an action petitioning Congress for anything... it is not a lobbying action. One tactic might be to make demands on Congress, but not to lobby.
- (8) That the National Collective organize a demonstration collective and draws up specific proposals for the action as was done in Gainesville. Planning for this would begin as soon as possible.

It must be seen that this action is dependent upon, and secondary to, actually doing the grassroots organizing necessary to make amnesty a real issue in our communities. Unless amnesty is a real issue, this proposed national action will undoubtedly be a failure.

EXTERNAL REPORT

The United States movement saw a decline in action after the signing of the Paris peace agreement. At the present time we see the movement moving into different directions with the realignment of forces into basically two camps. The first is action against U.S. imperialism, with a continuing emphasis on Indochina; and the other into a reformist movement of electoral politics and/or "moral" anti-war activity not entailing real education about the system.

During this period VVAW/WSO takes on special significance. As one of the very few remaining national mass organizations, it maintains the importance of pushing the anti-imperialist struggle, educating the American people and continuing to strengthen and build itself.

At the present time VVAW/WSO is working in our communities, building our base and working with local coalitions and organizations. This work is continuing to build the respect already existing for the organization at the same time we work in a national coalition with PCPJ and in NCUUA and hold leadership positions in the National Alliance Against Racist and Political Repression without organizational affiliation.

The practice (past and present) of VVAW/WSO has made us a widely known organization across the United States. This practice has seen its fruit in the respect accorded the organization by the American people. A case in point is the total rejection by the American public of the government charges against the Gainesville 8 and VVAW/WSO.








Following the regional reports, it was decided that a list of resources which the various regions have available for sale to chapters should be compiled by the National Office. In order to get this list out to all chapters as soon as possible, it was decided that January 31, 1974, would be the deadline for chapters to send a list of the resources they have available to the National Office. The compiled list of resources and materials will be sent out shortly after this deadline.

NOSCAM REPORT:

A report was not given at the meeting from the NOSCAM office because they cid not have time to prepare a written report. Instead, NOSCAM will be sending a progress report on the project to all regions in the near future.

One thing that was brought up at this time was the <u>VVAW/WSO G.I.</u> News, the newsletter published by NOSCAM-Chicago. Chapters are currently receiving this newsletter via the National Office once a month. Because of the financial situation of NOSCAM, the NOSCAM-Chicago people have asked that those chapters able to coso should subscribe to the newsletter in order to help insure that this newsletter is published in the future. Subscriptions for one year cost \$3.00 and the money should be sent to the NOSCAM-Chicago office.

OPERATION COUNTY FAIR REPORT:

Status of VVAW/WSO within the region: The Veterans Service Association on campus in Tuscaloosa, Alabama has a few VVAW/WSO members running it. We so a regional meeting together after the August NSCM to see what membership existed and to get some chapters back together. There was representation of the VVAW/WS Bogue Chitto Collective, a couple of members from Ruscaloosa and three other towns in Alabama. It was a camping party and nothing was accomplished. The Beg

Chitto Collective has be asked by the regional office! lo outreach and arrange for another attempted regional meeting in Bogue Chitto. All Operation County Fair marerial from the regional office was turned over to the Bogue Chitto Collective last October. So the regional representation of the Alabama/Mississippi/Tennessee region in effect now lies with the Bogue Chitto Collective as the only functioning VVAW/WSO chapter within the region.

Status of Operation County Fair: The temporary clinic building is still under construction. Actually only a few hours each week is spent on construction due to: lack of funds for major work, i.e. plumbing; relying on skilled community members to donate their available hours to the carpentry or electrical work. The interior construction now involves sealing the inside walls with insulation, paneling, and tiling the floors. The pipeline and plumbing is held up by the winter rains.

The IRS application for tax exempt status is completed but the final ruling by the IRS could take as long as a year. In most cases in which an organization is reasonably assured of being granted exemption, the IRS will issue a temporary letter of exemption.

The health problems of the community are serious. Though non-existant to most poor people, the health care delivery that is present is not the quality known in other states. Many diseases and problems go undetected and untreated. Segregation in medical facilities still exists. The health care offered now by the clinic staff members includes emergency first aid (on call) providing transportation, accompanying patients to health care facilities where they act as "health care advocates" to insure proper and prompt treatment and follow-up. Donated supplies to the clinic are being utilized under the direction of the medical director. A second physician has made a verbal commitment to see patients in the clinic on a limited basis and work with the nurses in bringing health care directly into the community.

Financial situation: The donations received from chapters and other groups or individuals is deposted directly in the Martin Luther King Jr. Memorial Clinic account. The People's Farm and VVAW/WSO Bogue Chitto Collective survive through individual salaries earned and sponsors. The money used to support the Collective is a separate account from that of the Clinic.

The reasons for keeping mail addressed personally and not by organizations is to keep as unnoticed as possible to the local pigs and cut down on mail rip-offs.

The presence of a VVAW/WSO chapter in an area as rural as Selma, Alabama has made many people curious -- both in the hostile, racist community, and in the poor, black and friendly community. Awareness of our presence spreads much farther than the immediate community and contacts made in Selma.

One of our members is involved in the initial stages of learning how to bring "health work" into the prison system. Members of the collective are also learning about GI organizing potential at Craig Air Force Base in Selma and disseminating information. The chapter is active in selling and handing out the Winter Soldier paper, collecting signatures in support of Melvin X. Smith, and doing political education about the Gulf, grape and lettuce boycotts. One of our members, also on clinic staff, has been asked to speak to a small group of local college students about the basics of various drug use and abuse. There is a tremendous lack of knowledge about this, and if possible the subject could be brought into larger workshops in the area.

Major difficulties with securing responsible and capable members to support this project from within the community itself have set us back several times. Resestablishing community trust, community involvement and back-tracking over administrative mishaps have been setting as back each time another member of VVAW/WSC leaves due to irresponsibility or other problems. Since there are no resources within the state, volunteers are desperately needed to carry on this work.

Major difficulties with securing consistent support from the national organization itself for this national project has made extremely slow progress also. The Bogue Chitto Collective has picked up on the receptiveness of the local community and from blacks within Selma interested in this project and in VVAW/WSO. If the support from the national organization can respond to these difficulties now, the Project would not be endangered.

The original proposal making the California Regional Office the Clearinghouse for the project has met with communication problems and duplication of roles since VVAW/WSO members within the community have been able to handle more of the Project. An updated Proposal for OCF laying out the lines of communication, security, and the purposes of the project has been distributed to be voted on later in the meeting.

First, hello everyone, and thanks to anyone who sent me articles or bought a library. Since April, I've run off two editions of the PVS Library, or in other words, 628 stencils! That is why I am now saving money from the Library sales to raise the \$1200 I will need to convert over to offset press.

Since Spril, 1973, I have sold sixty more copies of the library. Even after conversion to offset, the price will remain the same: \$6 for vets, \$10 for students (the decadent kind), \$15 for libraries and professionals, \$20 to magazine companies, \$25 for City governments, and \$50 to the VA and all other federal bureaucracies! So far, the VA has not bought one. Also, prices are negotiable.

I have a few additions coming soon. About 5 more articles, a cover page, and get this, a table of contents! Yes, Friends, now you will know what is in the lib-rary without having to read all of it.

I have a couple of requests. If you send in articles, that's fine. But don't forget to include the date and publication or the author's name. Contact libraries at the Universities, and in the City Systems, and sell them libraries for \$15 -- ask for pre-payment.

We are almost ready to start PVS rap groups here in Milwaukee again. This time we have professional help. We have screened the people, using the video-tape on Don Kemp and PVS. Our first meeting will be January 21st, where the structure will be set up and things are looking good.

Also, Don Kemp's NEW TRIAL is coming up! The chapter and the Clearing-house put together packets to be mailed out, and we have received good responses. Don's case is an important one. Our success in this trial will affect 18 other appeals of vets in prison, just in Wisconsin alone! His case will set a National Precedent when we WIN!!!

GARY LAWTON TRIAL/DEFENSE COMMITTEE:

At the present, the San Bernardino chapter of VVAW/WSO is functioning as the Defense Committee. There are many problems around this trial and it is now more important than ever before that VVAW/WSO make a major push to free Gary and Zurebu. This is the first time in the history of California that a third trial is being scheduled after two previous mistrials have been declared. From this alone, it should be evident to everyone that the government will be making a major effort to finally get a conviction. One of our major priorities is to get this third trial stopped before it begins. The best way to do this is to flood the judge and prosecution with telegrams and letters from around the country, letting them know that we are watching Riverside and demanding that the charges be dropped. (The addresses for the people who should receive these letters are included in the National Defense Committee Workshop Report).

Another major problem of the defense that VVAW/WSO chapters should be working on is the finding of a lawyer for Gary. The Defense Committee, National Office and California region have been looking for attorneys willing to take the case since the second trial ended and no one seems to be willing to touch it. In essence, Gary has been abandoned by nearly every "progressive" lawyers organization and law collective that we can think of. Chapters should be looking around in their communities and making contact with good lawyers for the purposes of pressuring somebody into taking the case. It is important that political lawyers be found because thus far, the trial has not been treated as a political trial (which it most definitely is). Also, a lawyer should be aggressive in the courtroom because there will be a whole series of liars on the witness stand which need to be exposed. If chapters know of lawyers who might be interested in the case, the names should be sent to either the Defense Committee, National Office, or California Regional Office for follow-up and contact.

Other things which need to be done around the trial are fund-raising because of the desperate financial situation of the defense committees. Also, national educational work needs to be done around the trial -- media gigs, press conferences, demonstrations, etc. The case must be publicized on a nationwide level and the politics of the trial must be stressed.

Following the report on the Gary Lawton trial, the steering committee collected money and sent a telegram of solidarity to Gary from the entire body.

OLD BUSINESS

AFFILIATION WITH NCUUA:

SHADOW DOTALL OF A HARD SHADOW

.. A discussion of NCUUA (National Council for Universal and Unconditional Amnesty) was held, covering the history of our affiliation with NCUUA from the Toronto Amnesty Conference to the present. Also discussed were the various forces in the amnesty movement in the United States and Canada. The members of VVAW, WSO who sit on the council felt that it was premature to vote on formal affiliation with the council and it was recommended to the Steering Committee that this discussion be tabled until the next NSCM. It was also pointed out that the council consists of some very progressive organizations and this was considered in the recommendation for fability. Therefore, the following proposal was made:

PROPOSAL: That the decision on affiliating with NCUUA be tabled until the next NSCM.

VOTE: This proposal passed with a vote of 57-yes; 10-no; 3 abs.

This means that the VVAW/WSO members on NCUUA will see what happens over the next few months and new information will be brought to the next NSCM for discussion and a vote.

ALTERNATIVE SERVICE PROPOSAL:

At the St. Louis NSCM, a proposal concerning National Coordinators and their spending time in a chapter between terms of office was made. Because this is a policy decision, the proposal had to be taken back to the regions and voted on at this meeting. The proposal was voted on in two parts and the votes are as follow:

PROPOSAL #1: The term of office for a VVAW/WSO National Coordinator be fixed at the length of one year. Coordinators may elect to run for consecutive terms of office upon the completion of their current term. Two members of the National Collective will come up for re-election at each NSCM.

:VOTE: This proposal passed with a vote of 59-yes; 7-no; 4 abs.

PROPOSAL #2: If a Coordinator is re-elected for consecutive terms, he or she must take two weeks to a month between terms (as far as is practical) to do work in a fledgling local chapter outside of his or her home region. While working in this chapter, the coordinator shall not function as a representative of the National Office, nor shall the coordinator assume a formal leadership position in the local chapter. The intent of this is twofold: to give the coordinator a concrete idea of organizational problems at the lowest level of VVAW/WSO and to use the coordinators experience to help establish a local chapter. The burden will be upon the coordinator to find a local chapter willing to take him or her; and to report this at the NSCM that will vote upon their renewed term of office. The local chapter shall assume responsibility for the coordinator's room and board, although the National Office shall assist to the extent they can.

VOTE: This proposal passed with a vote of 43-3/4-yes; 12-1/4-no; 14 abs.

Amendments to this proposal were made later (see National Steering Committee Workshop report), but this proposal, as printed here, became official VVAW/WSO policy at the final adjournment of the Yellow Springs NSCM.

ELECTION OF NATIONAL COORDINATORS:

Though there were four people running for the four vacant positions, a great many problems arose around the voting procedure for this election. After one

of conducting the electrons would first be to elect the for people and then decide the -length of the terms (2 purple for one year; 1 person for months; 1 person for 4 months) by having the regions list the elected coordinators in order of priority.

For the vote on whether or not a person was to be a national coordinator, the following people were elected by the following votes: Brian Adams (49-yes; 13-no; 8-abs); Ed Damato (49-yes; 13-no; 8 abs); Sam Schorr (49-yes; 13-no; 8-abs); and Marla Watson (48-1/2-yes; 16-1/2-no; 5-abs).

When the priority system of ranking individuals was used and the terms of office decided, the votes were as follows: Marla Watson - 37; Ed Damato - 34; Brian Adams - 31; Sam Schorr - 28. This means that Marla Watson and Ed Damato were elected for the one year terms; Brian Adams was elected for the 8 month term; and Sam Schorr was elected for the four month term.

"IN FROM THE COLD" ENDORSEMENT:

A discussion of the "In From the Cold" Project of CARIC (Committee for Action/Research on the Intelligence Community) is contained in the St. Louis NSCM minutes. VVAW/WSO has been asked to endorse this project and regions were to discuss this and vote on a VVAW/WSO endorsement at this meeting. The "In From the Cold" Investigation into the Intelligence Community was originally scheduled to take place in February, but CARIC is now aiming for the autumn of 1974 for these hearings to take place. It should also be noted that VVAW/WSO is the only organization which has been asked to endorse this project. In light of the information given by CARIC on this project, the following proposal was made:

PROPOSAL: That VVAW/WSO endorse the "In From the Cold" Project... on the intelligence community which is to be sponsored by CARIC.

VOTE: This proposal received unanimous acceptance.

A representative from CARIC stated that they would like as much VVAW/WSO participation as possible. People who have worked in intelligence or had dealings with the intelligence community should contact CARIC. Also, if people have names of individuals who may be interested in testifying, CARIC should be notified. All names of those testifying will be kept secret until the day they are to appear at the hearings. It should also be noted that the transcripts of the testimony will be placed in the CARIC library and VVAW/WSO will have access to this testimony.

KENT STATE GRAND JURY: " STREET OF BLOOD AND AND AND ADDRESS OF THE STATE OF THE ST At the St. Louis NSCM it was decided that VVAW/WSO was to receive a status report on the existing Kent State Grand Jury at this NSCM. The status of this grand jury was reported to the effect that nothing much is going on. No witnesses have yet been called or subpoened. Certain aspects of this new investigation are shaping up to look as though Terry Norman (an undercover policeman from the Washington, D.C. police force who has since been uncovered) may be used by the government as

Also, there are approximately 7 guardsmen who are indictable, though it is likely that none of these guardsmen are the ones responsible for the shootings. More information on the Grand Jury will be given to the regions as information becomes available.

OBJECTIVE 8 CHANGE PROPOSAL:

The following proposal for a change in Objective #8 was written by the MOINK-region and sent out to all the regions prior to the NSCM. Because all regions have had a change to discuss this proposal, it was included under Old Business. The proposed change reads:

"Resolved to fight sexism which forces an inverior status on women, chan-not neling them into lower-paying jobs and endless unpaid hours of household drudgery. United States imperialism depends for its very existence on this oppression of women as a source of domestic slavery and cheap labor. We must show that men and women who do not conform to stereotyped sex roless are also discriminated against. We must fight sexist attitudes and actions are these reasons, and because they divide the people against each other, making us less able to struggle together for change."

VOTE: This proposed change failed with a vote of 10-yes; 60-no. Because of the proposal's failure, this objective was then taken to the Sexism Work-shop for further discussion and revision.

REPORT FROM MOSCOW WORLD PEACE CONGRESS:

A fairly comprehensive report on the World Peace Congress in Moscow is included in the National Office Reports and discusses the problems that arose around this trip and the positive aspects of VVAW/WSO's participation in the Congress. The NO Report also discusses the rape of Ann Bailey and the rationale for making the following proposal:

PROPOSAL: That the National Office and Ann Bailey jointly draft an official letter of censure to the U.S. Secretary of the World Peace Council and to the CPUSA, the responsible organizing bodies of the U.S. delegation to the Moscow World Congress of Peace Forces, for the following reasons: 1) For failure to respond to the letter-sent to them by the National Office of VVAW/WSO regarding the situation surrounding the assault of Ann Bailey while she was in Moscow. 2) For the disrespect shown Ann Bailey and VVAW/WSO as an organization by ignoring the letter. 3) For failure to respond in any real manner whatsoever to the chauvinistic and insensitive treatment afforded Ms. Bailey by Soviet police officials after the assault occured. Amendment: That this letter of censure be published in the National Newsletter.

VOTE: The proposal passed with a vote of 65-1/2-yes; 4-no; 1/2-abs.

REPORT ON CAMBOL IN CONFERENCE IN PARIS:

Barry Romo (Natic 1 Office) and Pete Zastrow (M NKWVAWPA region) recently attended the Stockholm Conference for Solidarity with Cambodia in Paris. 'A report on this trip is contained in the January issue of Winter Soldier but a few items were reported at the meeting. Pete and Barry both expressed how impressed they were with the Cambodians they met in Paris. It appears as though the Cambodian people know exactly what they are doing and it is evident that victory will soon be theirs. In Paris, they emphasized the fact that they are not planning to seize Phnom Penh. This is not because of a fear of U.S. bombing, but because they are militarily concentrating on the entire country. Liberation forces are surrounding other small towns in the country which are in need of liberation and setting up blockades on the major highways. This is to put military pressure on the Lon Nol regime while at the same time, concentrating on consolidation and education in the liberated zones.

Other items of interest is the fact that approximately 30,000 political prisoners are being held in Phnom Penh jails by Lon Nol. Also, the economy of the liberated zones of Cambodia has increased to the point that Cambodia is now able to export rice to the PRG of Vietnam and the Democratic Republic of Vietnam. Supplies seem to be no problem. Many of the supplies needed by GRUNC and FUNC are captured from Lon Nol troops supplied by the U.S. Also, because of the corrupt ness of the Lon Nol regime, the liberation forces are able to purchase just about everything they need. Because of this, they are more in need of money than supplies of any sort.

Following the report on this trip a discussion on the validity of sending VVAW/WSO representatives to international conferences was held. The major reasons for sending representatives lies in the fact that VVAW/WSO is allowed the opportunity of building solidarity with liberation struggles from around the world. The world looks at the U.S. movement with a great deal of respect and it is important for liberation forces to be aware of the mood of the American people in determining their tactics. VVAW/WSO is in a position to give these liberation struggles this type of first-hand and honest insight. Also, first-hand contact with liberation struggles lends credibility to our organizational assertions that the war in Indochina is not yet over and offers the vehicle for us obtaining vitally important information about these struggles to take to the American people.

REPORT ON LEAVENWORTH FEDERAL PRISON:

Secretary of the second

A presentation on the situation in Leavenworth Federal Prison was given by a representative from the Great Plains region. Also, a discussion of the situation in Leavenworth is contained in the January issue of Winter Soldier and a report on the indictments coming down on the prisoners is given. It should be understood that when the indictments regarding the July 31st rebellion are handed down, many VVAW/WSO members will be affected. The indictments are going to function as a means of rounding up political people within the prison and those individuals who are organizing for their basic rights and existance. Because of this, it is important that the trials of the Leavenworth brothers receive as much organizational support on a nation-wide level as is possible. The trials will center on the conditions within the prison and present the sudden explosion of July 31st as a justified action. Money is needed for the Leavenworth brothers, as well as political education work around the case. Also, the Kansas City chapter has requested that any individuals who have experience in setting up defense committees are needed in K.C. where the defense committee is located.

WORKSHOP REPOR S

CHILD CARE/DAY CARE WORKSHOP

This workshop was hastily called because of the recurring problems at this NSCM pertaining to the care of our children. Discussion in the workshop centered on two basic issues. The first issue being how this organization should deal with the immediate problems of childcare/daycare. It was brought up that the simple mechanical problems could be (and should have been) worked out by the host region. Valid criticism was leveled against the host region for failing in many respects in coordinating childcare/daycare.

PROPOSAL: That the hosting region will assign each region attending the NSCM the responsibility of providing childcare/daycare on a shift basis, providing there are at least three members of that region attending.

This will take effect upon passage.

VOTE: This proposal passed with a vote of 39-yes; 20-no; 1 abs.

Following the acceptance of this proposal, a second proposal was made which in affect amends the previous proposal.

PROPOSAL: That delegates working on childcare be on a percentage basis according to the number of delegates from each region. This type of responsibility is also to be worked out for food, security and clean-up. (Clarification: This means that if there are four delegates, four shifts will be taken).

Amendment: That every delegation place their members on a rotating basis so that responsibility is shared equally by all delegates attending ing the meeting.

VOTE: This proposal passed with a vote of 48-3/4-yes 6-1/4-no.

Next, the main argument was how VVAW/WSO would deal with taking care of our children. It was discussed that children should not be forgotten and we must collectively handle this situation. It was also pointed out that just because the original workshop was cancelled because it received the least interest of all other workshops, this does not mean that it was a forgotten issue. Priority for the four-day NSCM is with politics. Obviously the other workshops held a higher priorith. It was also pointed out that the NSCM is not the place to struggle with peoples views towards children. This should be done on a chapter/regional level, as well as personal. Therefore, the following proposal was made.

PROPOSAL: That chapters and regions discuss the problems of how to raise their consciousness pertaining to the children in our organization and children in general. That problems that have arisen at this NSCM be discussed and dealt with on local levels.

"VOTE: This proposal received unanimous acceptance.



INDOCHINA WORKSHOP

ANALYSIS OF INDOCHINA SOLIDARITY WEEK

There were very few demonstrations and/or media splashes, but there was some good outreach done, which helped to raise consciousness about the fact that the war is not over. As a result, there has been established some sort of base for doing continuing education on U.S. involvement in Indochina. Much of the outreach and recruiting for VVAW/WSO was done around many new people who had never been touched before this action.

This workshop sees the need for continuing to build solidarity with the peoples of Indochina. Some suggestions from the workshop in regard to future actions:

- (a) Chapters and regions who do things that focus on the struggle in Indochina should try to send either directly or through national any pictures and/or articles written about these actions to the Indochinese representatives in Paris.
- -(b) That the National Collective should send special mailings on such actions to all chapters before the National Steering Committee Meeting minutes are finished, so they can begin work immediately.

PROPOSAL FOR NATIONAL ACTION

When dealing with the N. Illinois/Iowa proposal, there was unanimous agreement that we propose to the National Steering Committee a like proposal. There was one specific amendment around the issue of impeachment. We felt that using the term "impeachment" was too legalistic, that in fact, it was the same as asking Congress to end the war. The people have the power to "kick Nixon out," and this has also been our line in Winter Soldier. The reason for including the "Kick Nixon Out" principle is for the purpose of maximizing forces who are against the war in Indochina.

We concluded also that we absolutely must deal with demands for cutting off aid to Thieu and Lon Nol and for the release of prisoners in South Vietnam and Cambodia within the context of the three basic principles of unity of the demonstration.

PROPOSAL: That on or about January 27, the first anniversay of the Vietnam Peace Agreement, VVAW/WSO will sponsor demonstrations in cities throughout the U.S. around three major principles of Unity:

- (a) Implement the Treaty/End all Aid to Thieu and Lon Nol
- ...(b) Universal & Unconditional Amnesty for All War Resistors which was
 - (c) Kick Nixon Out! AVV BUART

We feel that these three points are extremely important to bring before the public at this time. Progressive left forces must secure leadership of the struggles around these issues; specifically the annesty and impeachment issues, before the ruling class can gain the initiative with their much-watered-down versions of these issues; and completely obscure the crucial links between them and the anti-imperialist struggle as a whole.

Chapters should advise the National Office of the dates of actions before 1/17.

VOTE: This workshop report and proposal received unanimous acceptance.

MASS ORG. AIZATIONS - PRIORITIES WO. SHOP

We recognize that chapters and regions have differing resources, conditions and energies. Not all of us can do all of the work we would like to do. We recognize that in many areas we are spread too thin and our work lacks force. We feel it is time that we begin to evaluate our work (local, regional, and national) in terms of political priorities.

These six guidelines for determining priorities were put forward by California:

- 1. Does it elevate the political consciousness internally?
- 2. Does it have potential for recruitment and building the organization?
- 3. Does it have potential for developing mass support?
- 4. How well does it meet the 10 objectives of VVAW/WSO?
- 5. Does it further an overall class struggle?
- 6. Is it feasible in your chapter area?

(After these six priorities were given by California, it was realized that similar guidelines are contained in minutes from previous NSCM meetings, specifically the Palo Alto and Chicago meeting minutes. Chapters should refer to these minutes for direction, ideas, and a means of analyzing work).

PROPOSAL: That all delegations use the California guidelines (with input from the Palo Alto minutes) in their regions and chapters to evaluate their work. That regional round robins at future NSCMs include the results of evaluations on chapter work, regional work and national projects. The next NSCM shall list National Projects in order of political priority so that areas that can not work on all National Projects would have guidelines in deciding on where their energies should go. Priorities for National Projects will be set by evaluating the practice of the entire organization with close consideration on the concrete conditions in the world at the present time. National priorities should be reviewed in this manner at every NSCM.

Amendment: Each delegation should bring recommendations and analysis for national priorities for discussion in the workshop on mass organizations at each NSCM.

VOTE: This workshop report and proposal received unanimous acceptance with a vote of 59-yes; 6- abs.

It was later noted that when analyzing our work, the over-riding guideline we should use is whether or not a project or work builds VVAW/WSO. This is of primary importance and should be a guiding principle.

ORGANIZING STREET VETERANS WORKSHOP

Street veterans are former GIs who have returned to a civilian society and are employed in low-income jobs, unemployed or who are in school merely as a form of existence. "Street veterans" is a cultural definition and not defined by location: it is a lifestyle and a psychological attitude.

There is a diversity between urban and non-urban areas. Areas most likely to have veterans are VA concers and within the community—such places as bars and recreation centers, college campuses, unemployment centers, social functions, etc.

A. Outreach

The media is helpful in outreach, through the use of rap programs and sympathetic reporters. Posters and bulletin boards in stores, laundromats, college campuses, etc. are also helpful.

Outreach can also be done by obtaining veteran enrollment: lists from colleges, conducting door-to-door petition campaigns, using the lists of some VA representatives who will cooperate, and through leafletting events such as parades.

B. Why we should Organize Street Vets

As an oppressed group of veterans they usually don't relate to this society. Their alienation is evidence of their rejection of this society's goals and values. Although some are seeking an alternative, others have been driven to despair and are simply seeking to exist.

VVAW/WSO relates to the street veterans and they in turn may relate to us as a mass organization with a veteran base, working with them to overcome their feelings of helplessness in dealing with their problems.

C. Organizing

Organizing begins with getting acquainted. Conversations point out grievances, such as: frustration at not finding a job; psychological oppression by society upon unemployed veterans (unemployment is "unmanly"); speaking to non-politicized veterans about immediate problems and putting those problems into a political perspective (problems are not personal but universal and they can help themselves and others through working together).

The Winter Soldier can be used to show what VVAW/WSO has, is, and is proposing to do in helping veterans. It can also be used to show the imperialist nature of the VA and the GI Bill.

Street veterans must be organized. Each chapter is responsible to seek out street veterans, talk with them, and try to raise their political awareness through programs such as DUP, amnesty, and PVS rap groups. We must organize them to work toward a real solution to the problems facing them and others.

tantipoint is that in order to help others deal with their problems and move to a better place, we must first have a deep understanding of our own selves in relation to the nature of the anti-imperialist struggle.


VOTE: This workshop report received unanimous acceptance and is meant to serve as guidelines for how VVAW/WSO can begin to plug into the problems of street veterans.

POSSIBILITY OF A DOMESTIC COUP WORKSHOP

One of the weaknesses of the American left is that serious discussions on the possibilities of a military coup have never taken place. Only through the process of political education can a serious and non-paranoid analysis be made, and the necessary plans for individual and collective survival be devised.

Collective preparation can include the formulation of alternative lines of communications and exchange of information. However, neither individual nor collective preparation can be effective without the proper political education concerning the possibility of such an event.

Political education should be designed to evaluate, in a non-paranoid manner, the rationale, mechanics, and ramifications of any attempt to seize control of the population through the use of military or police force.

An understanding of the nature of totalitarianism -- its forms and practices -- is essential to any understanding of a coup attempt. Among the recommended readings on modern totalitarian thought is B. F. Skinner's <u>Beyond * reedom and Dignity</u>. A recommended resource on furthering the understanding of the possibility/mechanics of a domestic coup is the Special Report of the Senate Committee on Emeragency Powers (October, 1973, available for free by writing the Committee, c/o. U.S. Senate, Washington, D.C. 20510). In addition, an analysis of government options will be available from CARIC in mid-January (P.O. Box 647, Ben Franklin Station, Washington, D.C. 20044, send self-addressed stamped envelope).

PROPOSAL: That the National Office of VVAW/WSO prepare a continuing of objective and serious analysis of the possibility of a domestic coup for inclusion in Winter Soldier.

VOTE: This workshop report and proposal was accepted with a vote of 60 of 64-1/4-yes; 17-1/2-no; 1-1/4-abs.

OBJECTIVES WORKSHOP

The purpose of the objectives workshop was to establish a vehicle to look at the ten objectives as a "whole"; to give an overview of all ten objectives in applying them to our everyday struggles.

The general feeling of the workshop body was that the first nine objectives are somewhat repetitious, overlapping, rhetorical, wordy, lengthy, had contradictions, and in cases, are grammatically incorrect. It must be noted however, that not all members of the workshop had criticisms of all nine objectives.

Since it was felt that the input received was the basic feeling of the organization nationally, solutions to resolve this problem should be as expedient and democratic as possible. Therefore we propose the following:

PROPOSAL: That the changes to objectives will be dealt with as follows:

- 1. Chapters and regions discuss objectives and draw up changes (if any) and/or consolidations.
- 2. Regions submit written reports to National Office by March 1, 1974.
- 3. National Office compiles and consolidates regional reports and re- 300 avises them as necessary, though the number of objectives is not to examine the ceed 10. This will be completed and mailed by March 15, 1974 and a limiting to
 - 4. Chapters and regions discuss the revised objectives and vote to accept or propose to amend them.

......

5. At the next NSCM in April, final drafting of the objectives will be completed in the workshop.

6. This final draft will be rediscussed regionally and voted on.

7. This draft will then be voted on at the NSCM held in August, 1974.

The objectives revised by the national office are composites of the content of the regional reports and not necessarily the precise wording. Regions should not be locked into their particular style of writing, but should discuss the content.

VOTE: This proposal passed with a vote of 53-yes; 12-no.

ORGANIZATION OF NSCMs WORKSHOP

1. Amendment to the Working Paper as to the election of National Coordinators:

"In the case of the resignation of a national coordinator, the national office shall, by means of the national newsletter, advise the chapters that a vacancy has occurred and that nominations for the position are open. Further, resignations of national coordinators must be accompanied with the effective date of that resignation.

Nominations of individual national coordinators shall be made for specific vacancies for the remainder of that particular term."

VOTE: This suggested amendment to the working paper (or by-laws) of VVAW/WSO received unanimous acceptance. Because this is a policy decision, this amendment will have to be discussed in the regions and voted on at the next NSCM before becoming policy.

RECOMMENDATIONS FROM THE NSCM WORKSHOP

1. A strong recommendation that, after business is concluded, an analysis of the NSCM take place and that this be entered into the minutes. This recommendation is made with a realization that criticism is vital for the building of a strong mass organization.

VOTE: This recommendation was accepted by a majority consensus.

2. The workshop recommends that VVAW/WSO analyze those factors which restrict membership in the National Office to single persons willing to live collectively. The analysis should be conducted with a view towards organizational alternatives which will afford, to a broader portion of the membership, an opportunity to feasibly serve in the National Collective. Regions should be prepared to offer their analysis of this problem, with a workshop, at the next NSCM.

VOTE: This recommendation was accepted by a majority consensus. (This means that chapters and regions should discuss the criteria for national collective members and discuss how the regions can help with the problem of all members of the collective having to live together at this time, i.e. is financial assistance feasible, etc.)

3. We recommend that egions, prior to the next NSC! set up at the regional level, workshops to dear with the problem of voting responsibilities of delegations.

VOTE: This recommendation was accepted by a majority consensus. (This recommendation was made in light of the fact that some regions are "locked in" to a specific vote and this is detrimental to the steering committee. Regions should consider flexibility in light of new information in the voting of their delegation.)

4. The following is a proposed amendment to the Alternative Service Proposal which was accepted at this NSCM.

PROPOSAL: That the word "fledgling" be dropped and in the place of the term "fledgling chapter," the words "chapter, organizing committee or project" be added. Also, that the last line of the proposal be dropped.

VOTE: This amendment received unanimous acceptance. Because this is a policy amendment it must be taken back to the regions and voted on at the next NSCM.

SEXISM WORKSHOP


There were two reports/opinions from this workshop so the steering committee voted to print both reports from the sexism workshop in the minutes for the purpose of providing a basis for discussion around this question on the regional level. Also, since the objectives are to be written by the national office based upon input from the regions, it was decided that Objective #8 would not be voted on at this meeting. Following are the two reports.

The state of the REPORT A

The workshop suggests the following revision of the 8th objective:

"to demand an end to sexism which forces an inferior status on women, channeling them into lower-paying jobs and endless unpaid hours of house-hold work. United States imperialism depends for its very existence on this oppression of women as a source of domestic slavery and cheap labor. To bolster this oppression, both men and women are forced into sexual stereotypes and attitudes (man to woman, woman to woman, and man to man) that act to discriminate against them. We must fight sexist attitudes and actions because they divide our people against each other, making us less able to struggle together for change."

The workshop strongly recommends that the organization at all levels investigate, research and struggle around the question of homosexual oppression. We do not feel that the oppression of homosexuals needed to be specifically mentioned in this objective, but that the organization cannot ignore this question. This means a thorough discussion of the role of sexual attitudes and what effect these attitudes have on our struggle against U.S. importalism. People must not avoid this struggle because it is controversial or sensitive, because we cannot progress if we avoid any issue.



REPORT B

We accept the proposed objective from the "Report From the Workshop on Sexism" paper, except for two changes.

We wish to delete the paranthetical expression -- (man to woman, woman to woman, and man to man) -- because we feel that it is totally unnecessary to the meaning of the objective and because it conjures up sexual images in the readers mind. Sexual relationships and practice have no place in a political objective.

We wish to delete paragraph #2 entirely, that deals with discussion and struggle around the question of oppression of homosexuality. The oppression of homosexuals is not an important political question because struggling against this oppression does not challenge U.S. imperialism. The government and institutions can easily stop oppressing homosexuals without the system being radically changed. This is not true of the struggle against the oppression of black people, Chicanos, Indians and the oppression of women. Gaining true equality for these groups would strike a major blow to imperialism, if not destroy it.

In the spirit of Objective 10, we do not feel that discussion and struggle arround homosexual oppression is a priority or should be, and that we should not get bogged down in rapping about sex. Barry reminded us about our international obligation to move the struggle against U.S. imperialism forward here at home. And we should always examine our priorities in terms of how it will concretely advance the struggle against U.S. imperialism.

The second recording the straightful the transfer of the state of the state of VVAW/WSO work with GIs is anti-imperialist in nature and anti-imperialism. should be the sole political focus of our GI work. The imperialist nature of the US military is self-apparent and does not, we believe, need further explanation. There

The thrust of our GI organizing activities should be to effectively "neutralize" the military as a weapon of oppression at home and abroad. By neutralization what is meant is rendering the military incapable or ineffective so that it cannot be used to further oppress the peoples of the world. Neutralization can only be accomplished in a political context, i.e. through organizing tactics and political education; anything less should not be considered.

In our GI work we must analyze the class makeup of the military. At this time, many third world, and poor people are forced, for economic or other oppressive societal reasons, to join the military. We must realize that our brothers and sisters do not become the enemy simply by being in the military and that their oppression is as great as before, leading many of them to active, albeit unorganized, rebellion. In working with them, we must remember we are all in the same struggle and must not take a paternalistic or other counter-productive attitude toward GI work.

Therefore, the GI workshop of VVAW/WSO recommends that each region discuss and implement the suggested political context of GI organizing.

At the next NSCM, feed back on this paper should be presented at another GI workshop. Further, this next workshop should write a national working paper for the organization to follow in its GI outreach.



"WINTER SOLDIER" WORKSHOP

"THE PAPER IS THE LIFELINE OF THE ORGANIZATION"

The paper is the most important tool that the organization has. The paper is the common demoninator which covers all aspects of our work. Selling the paper provides the following results:

- 1. Provides funds for keeping chapters operational.
- 2. Recruits new members and keeps the old members.
- 3. Provides political education for people cutside the organization.
- 4. Provides political education for people inside the organization.
- 5. Keeps VVAW/WSO visible to the community and is one of the basic programs for organizational outreach.

The following methods are strongly-suggested for selling the paper as proven by practice.

- 1. Always sell in teams of two or more people for the following reasons:
 - a. Avoids getting busted or hassled by police. A man beautiful and
 - b. Provides mutual support, particularly if paper sales are slow.
 - c. Provides a show of organizational strength to people.
 - d. Members learn sales techniques from each other.





- 2. Sell the paper a se same location at regularly seduled times. This is especially important when the weather is bad. When people see us selling papers in adverse weather they are going to take us much more seriously. This provides them with the opportunity for them to contact us to offer criticisms, ask questions or JOIN!!!
- 3. Try to get Winter Soldier into stores in your community.
- 4. All chapters should get a rubber stamp with their address and stamp the front page so that the community or paper purchasers will know who to contact in their area.

The following general locations are strongly suggested, as proven by practice, as good selling locations: Shopping Centers, VA hospitals and offices, Military Recruiting offices, Unemployment offices, welfare offices, Mass Political functions (should be cleared prior by hosting organization), schools, plants, bars, and community functions.

FINANCES:

Financial responsibility for the paper must and does lie with the ENTIRE Organization. SUBSCRIPTIONS ARE THE KEY!!

Gift Subs: Give subs as gifts to relatives and close friends.

Institution Subs: Every chapter must take the responsibility for approaching libraries and other institutions for subs.

These ideas have been brought up before in previous workshops and have not been adequately acted upon. It is essential that the organization put these suggestions into practice in a regular on-going programatic form.

A critical evaluation of progress as relates to the above suggestions for paper sales must be included in the written regional round robin reports for all future NSCMs.

VOTE: This workshop report received unanimous acceptance.



AMNESTY WORKSHOP

The following report is a proposal.

That the Yellow Springs NSCM adopt the amnesty strategy and action proposal contained in the National Office Reports.

- 1. That all regions and chapters collect and forward to the National Amnesty Clearinghouse, (NAC) all information pertaining to their work and/or relationships with the National Council of Churches, ACLU, CALC, CCCO, Americans for Amnesty, FORA and Safe Return, AFSC, and the National Campus Alliance for Amnesty and the American Veterans Committee or other similar groups or organizations working on amnesty. Because of the discussion of our work on amnesty at Yellow Springs, this is seen as being absolutely essential to our successful, coordinated national VVAW/WSO amnesty campaign.
- 2. That the NAC prepare and distribute a "who's Who" of the various individuals and organizations discussed in our analysis of our national amnesty work.



- 4. That additions to the strategy paper be made on the following subjects:
 (a) the need for internal political education; (b) a discussion and analysis of the discharge review board; (c) on the need for working with and building coalitions with honest, progressive organizations?
- 5. That the NAC rewrite the sections on GIs based on input from NOSCAM. The sense of these sections on GIs will remain the same.
- 6. That the sections of the VA workshop proposal dealing with the relationship of the VA and amnesty work be adopted.
- -7. That the NAC develop an official VVAW/WSO amnesty button. That this button will conform to the following criteria: (a) that it reflects the organization's politics on amnesty; (b) that it be identified with VVAW/WSO; (c) that it says "UNI-VERSAL & UNCONDITIONAL AMNESTY;" (d) and that the only logo used, if any, be the official VVAW/WSO shield and inclusive of the lettering.
- 8. That the VVAW/WSO amnesty pamphlet and petition continue to only be produced by the NAC.
- 9. That other VVAW/WSO amnesty materials (posters, bumper stickers, leaflets, etc.) be produced on a regional or chapter level with the only provisions being that they conform to our national amnesty campaign's guidelines and that the only logo used, if any, be the official VVAW/WSO shield.
- 10. That the NAC distribute an official VVAW/WSO discharge upgrading political training manual as soon as it's completed.
- 11. That Dayton VVAW/WSO coordinate and prepare a monthly DUP counseling/political newsletter to only be distributed internally by Dayton to VVAW/WSO chapters working on discharge upgrading and all regional offices.
- 12. That corrections be made on the slogans for the national amnesty action contained in section 12, B, (5) of the National Office Report: slogan #2 will read "A SINGLE-TYPE DISCHARGE FOR ALL:" slogan #3 will be reworded in a better manner but the sense of it is to remain the same.
- 13. That in section #6 of the National Office Report on ammesty, the following sentence be dropped: "We know that only one out of 7 badly discharged vets will have their discharges upgraded." This topic to be covered on the section to be written on discharge review boards.

(It was suggested that people read the Amnesty Report in the National Coffice Reports carefully since it is the basis of our amnesty strategy over the next several months. A copy of the strategy paper revised according to this workshop will be sent to all chapters as soon as it is completed). <u>DEFINITION</u>: A National Defense Committee shall be an effort to defend the organization and membership of VVAW/WSO. The NDC can only be viable if it is, organized from a long term prospective and built from the chapter level to the national level. Trained local Defense Committee cadre are necessary for a coordinated and effective defense of VVAW/WSO.

PROCESS: In or r to build a unified defense of t, two tasks initially face VVAW/WSO. First is the preparation of an analysis of past and current trials involving VVAW/WSO and the criteria for future involvement in political defense efforts. Secondly, a training program must be established to teach local members the political and mechanical process of establishing a local defense effort.

In order to facilitate this process, a meeting will be held of VVAW/WSO members who have worked on Defense Committees in Chicago on Feb. 23-25, 1974. The Chicago and Milwaukee chapters will prepare an agenda and arrange the meeting A report from this working group will be made to the membership through the National Newsletter.

GARY LAWTON: The NDC workshop criticizes VVAW/WSO for allowing this national project to become a crisis. However, we realize that this body must not have understood its responsibilities at the time the motion to support Gary was passed in July, 1972.

Since Gary's third trial will begin in the spring, we propose that each region and chapter send as many letters, telegrams and petitions to the DA, the trial judge, and the county supervisor. All petitions, etc., should center on a demand that there be no third trial, and they should be addressed personally to the following:

Local organizations should assist in the search for a lawyer for Gary Lawton, using the following criteria: good political judgement and practice, and an ability to conduct an aggressive cross-examination. It was also suggested that VVAW/WSC send a representative to the up-coming national meeting of the National Lawyers Guild to discuss the hassles we have encountered around the Lawton trial and the situation with lawyers.

Chapters and regions should be responsible for outreach, political education, speaking gigs, etc. within their communities. All copies of leaflets, posters, newsletters, etc. should be sent to the defense committee and the Judge.

THE LEAVENWORTH 3/33 is a prime example of why we need local trained cadre. Mike Mazzetti and Perry Sanders have agreed to travel to Kansas City to assist in the formation of a defense committee. They will work with four progressive lawyers and the local VVAW/WSO people to establish community support for the upcoming trials at Leavenworth.

· if possible) to the truckers' struggle: This is to be disseminated to the drivers to facilitate support coordination throughout the country.

II. Proposed that there be another workshop at the next NSCM in April centered on work-place organizing. This workshop will include criticism and self-criticism around our support activity concerning the truckers' struggle.

CVOTE: All of the above proposals received unanimous acceptance.

PVS WORKSHOP

Certain symptoms of PVS are common throughout our society, such as lack of faith in leadership, lack of trust, drug abuse, suicide rate, and maritial strife. For our society, the Vietnam War intensified these problems, but for the Vietnamera veteran these problems were magnified and multiplied by his/her actual participation.


We reject the word "readjustment" as defined by the VA. We refuse to adjust to a society based on oppression and exploitation. Rather, we see readjustment as getting together with our brothers and sisters and learning to love and be loved, and how to be trustful.

RECOMMENDATIONS TO THE VVAW/WSO NATIONAL CLEARINGHOUSE ON PVS

- 1. That the clearinghouse start a collection of all known existing PVS rap groups.
- 2. That this information be added to the library and that this list of rap groups be updated every six months.
- 3. That the clearinghouse finish a table of contents that will be mailed out to all recipients of the library.
- 4. That people who have already received libraries will be able to order single copies of papers for the purpose of updating, and will not be required to buy a whole new library.
- 5. A 30-minute 1/2 inch black and white videotape on the case of Don Kemp and PVS is available for reproduction and/or rental.

VOTE: This workshop report received unanimous acceptance.

NEW BUSINESS



BE IT PROPOSED that the following definition of Operation County Fair and delineation of authority and responsibility be accepted as the authority for OCF by the National Steering Committee of VVAW/WSO; and that this proposal supercede all aspects of the original proposal.

I. DEFINITION

Operation County Fair shall be a National Project of VVAW/WSO. The goal of this Project is to politicize people and educate them around our objectives by providing health care for those areas of the Counties of Dallas, Perry and Wilcox, Alabama, where health care is either non-existent, inadequate, discriminatory or expensive. The initial focus will be in the community of Bogue Chitto. The goals within the community of Bogue Chitto are to 1)organize political discussion groups which are consistent with the objectives of VVAW/WSO, 2) construct a medical clinic, 3) provide equipment for the Clinic, 4) develop long range financing for the Clinic, 5) develop long range staffing program for the Clinic, 6) provide emergency health care, 7) provide home health care, 8) act as health advocates for community members, and 9) conduct health education classes.


As progress is made on goals within the community of Bogue Chitto, and as resources permit, services will be expanded throughout Dallas, Perry and Wilcox Counties, using the Martin Luther King, Jr. Memorial Clinic in Bogue Chitto as the headquarters.

Operation County Fair will cease to be a National Project of VVAW/WSO when it has been determined by the National Steering Committee of VVAW/WSO that the people of the area being served can maintain an adequate health care system without the aid of VVAW/WSO.

The political purposes of Operation County Fair are to educate the public about two important contradictions within U.S. society. The first is racism, and the second is inadequate, expensive and discriminatory health care. Racism is evident in every institution in our society, including the field of health care. The health care profession, in most cases, bases most of its decisions on a) profit and b) maintaining a privileged class within our society. With such thinking governing the policies of the health care field, one's race and economic position take on special significance. Since oppressed nationalities in the U.S. (as well as all poor people) have little influence on the government in general, and the health care field in particular, good health care will remain a luxury for these people until fundamental changes are made.

We are seeking to provide a needed service while at the same time educating the public as to the need for an overall change in the health care field. We are not trying to reform, or patch up, or fill in the gaps where our society has failed; we are ultimately trying to change the roots of existence for the health care profession.

Further, we are attempting, through our involvement in Alabama, to expand, develop respect for, and educate the public as to the objectives of Vietnam Veterans. Against the War/Winter Soldier Organization.



- A. Writing the monthly Newsletter and sending it to the National Office by the end of each month.
 - B. Prepare and submit status reports every two weeks to the National Office.
 - C. Review all applications for work on OCF in Bogue Chitto.
 - D. Receiving and storing or depositing all donations.
 - E. Complete application for tax deductible status for the Clinic, and follow up.
- F. Provide for emergency and home health care, including transportation and health advocacy, in Bogue Chitto, Alabama.
 - G. Sole representative of VVAW/WSO in the Bogue Chitto community.
- H. Prepare and keep updated the OCF slide show and when possible do speaking engagements for other regions.
- I. Arrange political discussion groups consistent with policy and objectives of VVAW/WSO.
- J. Report to its regional coordinator on a regular basis as with any other chapter responsibility.
- K. At all times the Collective will operate in accord with the aims and wishes of the Board of Directors of the Martin Luther King, Jr. Memorial Clinic Bogue Chitto.

III. RESPONSIBILITY OF NATIONAL OFFICE

- A. Solicit professional and para-professional volunteers, donations of money, supplies, medical equipment and clothing.
- B. Mail OCF Newsletter to all VVAW/WSO chapters and to the OCF mailing list.
- C. Review all applications for work on OCF in Bogue Chitto; check references of applicant.
 - D. Do slide show speaking engagement regarding OCF.
 - E. Communicate with Bogue Chitto Collective at least once every two weeks.

IV. SECURITY

A. Applications for work in Alabama on OCF will be obtained from the National Office. All applications shall be filled out completely and returned with a picture of the applicant to the National Office.

- B. Final decision on volunteers for work in Bogue Chitto on OCF will rest jointly with the National Office and the VVAW/WSO Bogue Chitto Collective.
- C. The National Office will forward copies of all applications with the picture to the Bogue Chitto Collective.
- D. All volunteers working on OCF in Dallas, Perry and Wilcox Counties will do so under the auspices of the VVAW/WSO Bogue Chitto Collective.
- E, All volunteers will be on probation for the first thirty (30) days from the immethey arrive in Bogue Chitto. During this time, the volunteer can and should take part in all discussion regarding Operation County Fair. However, during this probation period, the volunteer may be dismissed at any time by either the members of the Bogue Chitto Collective who are not on probation, or by the National Collective of VVAW/WSO.

VOTE: This proposal received unanimous acceptance and is now the guideline for running the Operation County Fair Project.

NOMINATIONS FOR N TIONAL COORDINATOR:

The terms of office for Barry Romo and Sam School will be completed at the next NSCM in April. This means that two national coordinator positions will be open and two coordinators will be elected at the next meeting.

Nominations for National Coordinator were then taken and the nominees questioned. The following people were nominated to fill the positions which will be open in April and these people will have to inform the National Office of their decision to accept or decline the nomination at least 60 days prior to the next NSCM. The nominees are: Sam Schorr (National), Pete Zastrow (MOINKWVAWPA), Barry Romo (National), Jeannie Dolly (California, and Bill Hager (California).

WSI ON CONCEALMENT OF US CASUALTIES IN VIETNAM:

The New York/N. New Jersey region came to the meeting with the intention of proposing a WSI on the concealment of U.S. casualties in Vietnam. The purpose of such an investigation would be to expose the U.S. military in their on-going attempts to deceive the American people, and would be run similarly to other Winter Soldier Investigations, i.e. testimony would be gathered and given, etc. This proposal was tabled by the region, but New York stated that they would be acting as a Clearinghouse for information of this type. If regions or chapters have information concerning the concealment of casualty figures or would like information on this project, contact the New York regional office: P.O. Box 902, Ellicott Station, Buffalo, New York 14215.

ROUND ROBIN REPORTS PROPOSAL:

PROPOSAL: That in the future no oral Round Robin reports be given at NSCMs. Written reports from regions should include a summary of the work they are doing with an overall analysis of the strengths and weaknesses of the region. These reports should show clearly what things were done right and wrong, what tactics proved to be effective, etc., so that we can learn from each others errors and practice. Round Robins should be honest reflections of the Region's work. Amendment: That time is to be set aside for delegates to read all Round Robin reports and time alloted where questions about the written reports may be asked the regions on a one-at-a-time basis.

VOTE: This proposal passed with a vote of 53-yes; 7-no; 5-abs.

PROPOSAL ON DEATH DRUGS:

At the St. Louis NSCM, it was decided that we would hold a workshop on Death Drugs at this meeting. Because few people signed up for the workshop, it was cancelled. In light of this, the following proposal was made.

PROPOSAL: That we have a workshop at the next NSCM on Death Drugs for the purpose of drawing up a VVAW/WSO position paper on the subject.

Amendment: That workshops be set up in the regions for the purpose of discussing Death Drugs and bringing in-put to the NSCM.

VOTE: The poposal for a Death Drugs work op was unanimously accepted.

PROPOSAL FROM NOSCAM:

According to the Amnesty Workshop proposals, NOSCAM is to compile a newsletter on discharge upgrading and mail it to all chapters doing discharge upgrading work and to regional offices. Because of this, the following proposal was made:

PROPOSAL: That NOSCAM be empowered to extend subscriptions of the Discharge Upgrading Project newsletter to those individuals and groups who are working with VVAW/WSO on discharge upgrading on a case-by-case basis. This is specifically in regard to the Military Law Project in St. Louis and the Lawyers Military Defense Committee in Washington, D.C.

VOTE: This proposal failed with a vote of 29-3/4-yes; 30-1/4-no.

VVAW/WSO SOLIDARITY SONG:

: :::

A brother from the Colorado region had written a song based on the objectives of VVAW/WSO and sang it several times at the NSCM. Because there was a great deal of enthuiasm around the song, the following proposal was made:

PROPOSAL: That Russ Scheidler's song be adopted as a solidarity song of VVAW/WSO and that the song be sung at the closing of the meeting.

VOTE: This proposal received unanimous acceptance and the song is printed below.

Following the acc. ance of Russ's song as a solid ity song, it was suggested that regions should kick around the idea of putting together a summer tour of VVAW. WSO members. This group would tour the country, visit various regions and do things such as speaking gigs, songs, theater, cultural items, etc. all of which would be in line with our objectives and projects. Regions should discuss this idea and if there are ideas or questions, people should contact either the Ohio or Colorado regional offices. This tour idea would work something like the IPC tour which occured this fall around the country.

SITE AND DATE OF NEXT NSCM:


Two regions volunteered to host the next NSCM -- California and Wisconsin. Because the organization already adopted a policy (in July of 1972) of keeping NSCMs in a centrally located part of the country, the California region withdrew their proposal to host the meeting.

- Therefore, the next NSCM will be held in Milwaukee, Wisconsin and the date for this meeting is to be April 11-15, 1974.

CRITICISM / SELF-CRITICISM:

As suggested by the NSCM workshop, a criticism/self-criticism session was held following completion of the meeting. Regions took turns offering their criticisms and self-criticisms and the following is a compilation of the major points which were raised.

- 1. There were major criticisms of the whole Steering Committee for its failure to place practice ahead of paperwork. Proposals were placed in terms such as "should, analyze, research or write an article" but the NSC did not place any demands on itself. The purpose of a NSCM is to decide what the national organization will be doing, but the majority of the "work" done was in terms of no burdens on the membership. This was seen as detrimental as it leaves the organization with no active projects for membership to work around. This can be seen by comparing what was done around two different issues. The NSC voted to have the National Collective write many things such as a paper on the possibility of a domestic coup, but it would not vote on positive action to be taken for brother Gary Lawton. This abdicating of work responsibility cannot help build VVAW/WSO. People must be prepared at the next NSCM to vote on actual work proposals, not on creating new paperwork.
- 2. Some regions criticized themselves for being late to meetings or being lax in plenary or workshop participation. This was viewed as a lack of discipline which is detrimental to the steering committee as a whole.
- 3. On the whole, there was a lack of discipline shown by the body. There was talking while others were talking, and general disruptiveness. Also, people were making points which had already been made for the purpose of hearing one-self talk. This played out in terms of ego and needs to be combatted. More discipline should be exercised to cut down on discussion time, disruption, etc. and so that we can get down to our real work.



5. People showed a lack of respect for other people and delegations by being intolerant of certain political positions. We should be more careful in recognizing where other delegations are coming from and show more respect for diverse positions.

6. The Friday night elections were severly criticized as being something of a horror. Some regions were very disruptive with their voting and this caused us to spend four hours electing four people for four positions. At the time of the elections, the meeting completely degenerated due to a lack of discipline and getting hung up in procedural questions.

7. Logistically, the host region was commended for the excellent facilities provided. This was perhaps the most physically comfortable NSCM we have had. Sue Rovick and Bill Davis, the people in charge of food preparation and overall logistical coordination, were specifically thanked for the fine jobs they did. The host region did state that it was a mistake to hold a NSCM in a town where there is no chapter because the particulars of the town were not known.

8. There was a good deal of criticism about childcare and jobs such as food, clean-up and security. The childcare system (as well as volunteers for the other jobs) broke down during the meeting, but Ohio said that the "percentage" system of doing work which came out of the childcare workshop worked admirably. Some regions stated that they were unclear at the beginning of the meeting as to how much responsibility they were supposed to take in logistical jobs. Other people said that people showed a lack of discipline in not showing up for the jobs they had signed up for.

9. Positive statements were made to the affect that spirit at the meeting was high. Also, good political discussions were held in the workshops and the level of political education was high. Overall, a growth in the organization and forward progression was seen.

10. Overall, the criticism/self-criticism session was very good and quite productive. People took the task of criticism with a great deal of seriousness and made the discussion very worthwhile.



This investigation is based on information which indicates that captioned organization is engaged in activities which could involve violations of Title 18, U. S. Code 2383 (Rebellion or Insurrection), 2384 (Seditious Conspiracy), 2385 (Advocating Overthrow of the Government), 2387 (Sedition), 793 (Espionage), 844 (Explosives and Incendiary Devices), 2155-56 (Sabotage) and 2101 (Antiriot Laws).

VVAW/WSO was organized in New York City in 1967 as an organization of Vietnam veterans to protest the American involvement in the war in Southeast Asia. VVAW/WSO engaged in various protest activities but during late 1971 demonstrated increasing militancy, culminating in December, 1971, with VVAW/WSO takeover of various American landmarks and public buildings. Information was also developed indicating that some VVAW/WSO chapters were cooperating with or infiltrated by communist-dominated groups including the Communist Party, USA, and the Socialist Workers Party. Certain VVAW/WSO leaders were quoted as telling members VVAW/WSO is a revolutionary organization and not "just another group of war veterans." VVAW/WSO leaders have traveled to North Vietnam and have reportedly established liaison with revolutionary or terrorist groups internationally. During July,

1972, VVAW/WSO leaders and members were indicted by a Federal Grand Jury, Tallahassee, for violation of Federal statutes, including conspiracy to riot during Republican National Convention, August, 1972. One of these individuals was also indicted for possession of an unregistered explosive and incendiary device. In January, 1973, at a National Steering Committee meeting, VVAW/WSO leaders discussed programs aimed at obtaining support from or influencing active duty military personnel. They also discussed obtaining access to classified Government information to be used against U. S. interests and one leader subsequently actively engaged in such activity. /There were also indications at this meeting that VVAW/WSO activists possessed the technical knowledge and training to carry out any revolutionary program proposed. In addition, information has been reported from a source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, that a VVAW/WSO member previously discussed engaged in sabotage and was possibly involved in the destruction of a munitions train in Arizona. VVAW/WSO is currently headquartered in Chicago, Illinois.

The YSA is a multi-national revolutionary socialist youth organization. It is the youth group of the Socialist Workers Party (SWP) and is controlled and dominated by that organization.

The SWP has been designated pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

The Center for Radical Education (CRE) was organized off-campus near San Diego State. University, San Diego, California, to present an alternate approach to education. CRE has built up the best library of subversive literature in San Diego. CRE does not openly advocate a violent overthrow of the United States Government at this time or violations of other laws; however, the activities of CRE indicate advocacy that eventual violent revolution to overthrow the present capitalist system in the United States is necessary.

Post Vietnam Syndrome (PVS) is a VVAWsponsored program to provide advice, counsel, and other forms of rehabilitative assistance to Vietnam returnees who

encounter difficulties in the transition from military to civilian life.

At a film preview sponsored by the CRE at San & Diego State University (SDSU) on September 9, 1973, source advised that a local movement participant and ex-VVAW member, secretary that the VVAW is considering attempting a comeback in the San Diego area. Stated is thinking about trying to reorganize this group.





ACTIVITIES 'IN CONNECTION WITH THE VVAW/WSO

The VVAW/WSO is a national organization composed primarily of veterans of the war in Vietnam that has organized and participated in numerous demonstrations against the war in Vietnam during 1970-1972, including the seizure of the Statue of Liberty, New York City, and the occupation of the Betsy Ross House, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, in December, 1971.

Six members of the VVAW/WSO were indicted by a Federal Grand Jury, Tallahassee, Florida, July, 1972, on charge of conspiracy to violate the Federal Antiriot Law.

On April 25, 1973, a source advised that during a meeting of the VVAW/WSO National Steering Committee & Placitas, New Mexico, on April 21, 1973, it was voted to change the name of VVAW to VVAW/WSO.

The 1973-1974 issue of the "Campus Key," a listing of organizations chartered on the UNM Campus for the current academic year lists the VVAW/WSO as one of these organizations. In addition, the subject is listed as one of the "Organizers." The stated purpose of the VVAW/WSO group at UNM is "to educate the public on the social ills of racism and sexism which create the basis for a divided society and lay open the doors for future wars."

According to an article which appeared in the August 30, 1973, issue of "The New Mexico Daily Lobo," student newspaper published at UNM, the subject, during the course of interview, stated he was serving as a coordinator for the VVAW/WSO organization at UNM and that the principal concern of this group was working for amnesty for individuals who were in violation of the Selective Service Act or who had deserted the Armed Forces because of their opposition to the Vietnam War. This article also set forth that from July 28, 1973 until August 7, 1973, the subject had been in Gainesville, Florida, to attend the trial of the eight VVAW/WSO members for alleged.







One of these individuals was also indicted for possession of an unregistered explosive and incendiary In 1/73 at a National Steering Committee meeting, VVAW/WSO leaders discussed programs aimed at obtaining support from or influencing active duty military personnel. discussed obtaining access to classified Government information to be used against U.S. interests and one leader subsequently actively engaged in such activity. The VVAW/WSO is a national organization composed primarily of veterans of the war in Vietnam, that has organized and participated in numerous demonstrations against the war in Vietnam during 1970-72, including the seizure of the Statue of Liberty, New York City (NYC) and the occupation of the Betsy Ross House, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, in December, 1971. Its national headquarters is located in Chicago, Illinois.

On January 15, 1974, a confidential source advised that the monthly meeting of the VVAW/WSO, NYC Chapter, was held at the headquarters of the NYC Chapter, Washington Square Methodist Church, 135 West 4th Street, NYC on January 7, 1974. The number in attendance varied from about 20 to 40 during the lengthy meeting. The meeting was chaired successively by a former National Coordinator, VVAW/WSO, and

Vietnam Veterans Against the War/Winter Soldier Organization (VVAW/WSO)

The major part of the meeting was devoted to a report by a former National Coordinator, VVAW/WSO, on the National Steering Committee (NSC) meeting of VVAW/WSO held at Antioch College, Yellow Springs, Ohio, during December 27-31, 1973. Urgo reported as follows:

A Workshop on Priorities was held at which the following six major points were discussed with the suggestion that the local chapters do the same with regard to their priorities.

- 1. Does the priority elevate political consciousness?
- 2. Does it help recruit new members?
- 3. Does it build mass support?
- 4. Does it fulfill the organization's ten objectives?
- 5. Does it promote class struggle?
- 6. Is it feasible for the particular local area?

A workshop was held on the possibility of a domestic coup. Urgo did not elaborate on this.

A national mandate was given to support national actions around the subject of Indochina on January 27, 1974.

A VVAW/WSO organizers conference will be held during the summer of 1974 at an unspecified time and place to train organizers.

A workshop was held on labor which reported on successful efforts by several members of the VVAW/WSO in Ohio and Pennsylvania to help organize truck stoppages in those states during December, 1973, with respect to fuel shortages.

Vietnam Veterans Against the War/Winter Soldier Organization (VVAW/WSO)

Work on prisons will become a major VVAW/WSO project. (phonetic) and travel to Leavenworth Prison to help build support for the Leavenworth 3/30. This refers to the United States Penitentiary at Leavenworth, Kansas, at which three prisoners have been indicted and thirty are facing indictment. Urgo did not specify the charges. VVAW/WSO Chapters are active in the United States Penitentiary at Leavenworth and at the New York State Prison, Attica, New York. Efforts will be made to help build existing chapters and to start new chapters in other prisons. VVAW/WSO members were urged to correspond with prisoners but only if they intend to continue with the task as prisoners depend heavily on support from the outside.

An intensive week of meetings will take place in Chicago, Illinois, on February 23-25, 1974 to plan for political defense and the upcoming trials of Riverside, California, the Leavenworth trials and other trials involving veterans.

Amnesty is another major project of the VVAW/WSO nationally. A national action is tentatively scheduled for late June or early July, 1974, on the amnesty issue. probably in Washington, D. C. with the targets being the Veterans Administration Building, the Pentagon and the Justice Department Building. In preparation for this national action local chapters will hold Discharge Upgrading Projects concerning the upgrading of less than honorable discharges given to Vietnam War veterans and the conducting of publicity campaigns around local draft evader-returnees who turn themselves in.

Another workshop revolved around "Operation County Fair" which is the establishment of medical care facilities in the counties of Dallas, Perry and Wilcox in Alabama. The NSC agreed to support this and also the planned clinic and educational project planned for the community of Boga Chita, Alabama. VVAW/WSO members are urged to send money, clothes, medical supplies, medical volunteers and construction personnel to help build the clinic and get the project going.

Vietnam Veterans Against the War/Winter Soldier Organization (VVAW/WSO)

A Winter Soldier Investigation will be held in 1974 on the concealment of United States casualties during the War in Vietnam.

An announcement was made of the project known as "In from the Cold", a Winter Soldier type investigation planned for early 1975 on United States intelligence activities during the Vietnamese War and currently to be directed by a Washington, D. C. based organization known as Committee for Action/Research on the Intelligence Community (CARIC). This project has a budget of \$40,000. Questionnaires are being prepared and will be sent to persons believed to be willing to give testimony.

The NSC agreed to continue its support of the Cairo United Front, a citizens group in Cairo; Illinois, that aids the Negro community in that city.

VVAN/WSO was organized in New York City in 1967 as an organization of Vietnam veterans to protest the American involvement in the war in Southeast VVAW/WSO engaged in various protest activities but during late 1971 demonstrated increasing militancy, culminating in 12/71 with VVAW/WSO takeover of various American landmarks and public buildings. Information was also developed indicating that some VVAW/WSO chapters were cooperating with or infiltrated by communist-dominated groups including the Communist Party, USA, and the Socialist Certain VVAW/WSO leaders were quoted Workers Party. as telling members YVAW/WSO is a revolutionary organization and not just another group of war veterans." VVAM/WSO leaders have traveled to North Vietnam and have reportedly established liaison with revolutionary or terrorist groups internationally. During 7/72, VVAW/WSO leaders and members were indicted by a Federal Grand Jury, Tallahassee, for violation of Federal statutes, including conspiracy to riot during Republican National Convention, One of these individuals was also indicted for possession of an unregistered explosive and incendiary device. In 1/73, at a National Steering Committee Meeting, VVAW/WSO leaders discussed programs aimed at obtaining support from or influencing active duty military personnel. They also discussed obtaining access to classified Government information to be used against U.S. interests and one leader subsequently actively engaged in such There were also indications at this activity. meeting that VVAW/WSO activists possessed the technical knowledge and training to carry out any revolutionary program proposed. In addition, information has been reported from a source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, that a VVAW/MSO member previously discussed engaging in sabotage and was possibly involved in the destruction of a muntions train in Arizona. 

Six members of the VVAW were indicted by a Federal Grand Jury, Tallahassee, Florida, July, 1972, on charge of conspiracy to violate the Federal Anti-Rict Law.

On September 24, 1973, advised that it was announced at the "Midwest Amnesty Conference, sponsored by the VVAW/WSO," at Cincinnati, Ohio, September 21-23, 1973, that there would be a Amnesty Conference at Edgewood College, Madison, Wisconsin, October 26-28, 1973. Handling the arrangements for this conference would be the VVAW. The conference was to be entitled, "Wisconsin Amnesty Project."



REPORTS FROM VVAW CHAPTERS

The following chapters presented reports which were typewritten; namely, New York City, Buffalo, Westchester-Putnam, Rochester, Ithaca, Orange County, Oneonta, and Mid-Hutchinson Chapter. The typewritten reports consisted primarily of problems concerning organization. Three chapters were not represented at the regional conference, that is the Albany, Potsdam, and Suffolk County Chapters. The Albany Chapter is basically inactive.

OLD BUSINESS CONCERNING VVAW

There was a vote on the proposal to reopen the Winter Soldier investigation. Buffalo, New York City, and Rochester Chapters had voted in their chapter meetings to support the proposal and the region voted for the proposal to be submitted to the National Steering Committee at the next meeting.

Regarding Objective Number Eight of the National Objectives of the Vietnam Veterans Against the War/Winter Soldier Organization, which regards sexism, the proposed change of Objective Number Eight written by a chapter in Ohio and contained in National Newsletter Number 15, was voted down. No dalegates from the New York Region to the National Steering Committee meeting will support the Ohio rewrite.

IMPEACH NIXON CAMPAIGN

The suggestion of a National effort by Vietnam Veterans Against the War to press for NIXON'S impeachment was voted down.

New York City Chapter Report

Regional meeting 12/8/73

Since its last report, the NYC Chapter has continued its internal reorganization. We have developed a whole system of office procedures including files, log books, notebooks for newsletters and mirrites from National and Regional. There are still some staffing problems as everyone works.

We have established a steering consittee, 4 rotating members and Joe Hirsch. We have instituted a minimum pledge that all those who vote in meetings cust pay. 35 for employed, \$2 for students, \$1 for unemployed. We also reinstituted \$5 yearly dues for those who went to belong but don't want to vote. Other fundraising activities have been: Beer Blast (very successful), selling FFZ & WHM, and puters.

We have been having weekly nestings around the ten objectives, one a week, with one session on the class struggle for which we read the Manifesto. We suspended publication of Lock! I Load until we have greater political excessent.

Another thing we've been involved with is the New York City Vets Coalition. It grew out of our involvement with St. Albans hospital demonstrations. One of the central forces has been Karl McCerden, where the commissioner of MOVA (Mayors Office of Veterans Affairs), and members of his staff. There has been quite a lot of discussion about our involvement in this coalition, as many of the groups have unclear politics and little constituency. We are also very unclear as to the motivation of MCVA and McCarden, so we're treating the whole thing very carefull.

We had our first real EUP counseling session this Tues. night. We did a lot of publicity, but only had one person cons down (through a referral). We now see how hard its going to be to get it off the ground. We are continuing our internal training, and are trying to get law students on work-study to work with us.

We have supported and cosponsored several things, a slide show on the GI movement, a Cambodia demo., a demo around the one Korea policy at the UN. We will be sponsoring a demo. on Dec.15th as part of the Indochina Solidarity Coalition which was formed to do this demo to reinforce the fact that the war isn't over.
