A preliminary inquiry was initiated concerning the subject for the purpose of determining if the subject was a leader or activist of the Vietnam Veterans Against the War/Winter Solder Association (VVAW/WSA) activities of which could involve violations of Title 18, U.S. Code, Section 2383 (Rebellion or Insurrection), Section 2384 (Seditious Conspiracy), Section 2385 (Advocating Overthrow of the Government), Section 2387 (Sedition) and Section 793 (Espionage).

VVAW/WSA was organized in New York City in 1967 as an organization of Vietnam veterans to protest the American involvement in the war in Southeast Asia. VVAW/WSA engaged in various protest activities but during late 1971 demonstrated increasing militancy, culminating in 12/71 with VVAW/WSA takeover of various American landmarks and public buildings. Information was also developed indicating that some VVAW/WSA chapters were cooperating with or infiltrated by communist-dominated groups including the Communist Party, USA, and the Socialist Workers Party Certain VVAW/WSA leaders were quoted as telling members VVAW/WSA is a revolutionary organization and not "just another group of war veterans." VVAW/WSA leaders have traveled to North Vietnam and have reportedly established liaison with revolutionary or terrorist groups internationally. In 1/73 at a National Steering Committee meeting, VVAW/WSA leaders discussed programs aimed at obtaining support from or influencing active duty military per-They also discussed obtaining access to classified Government information to be used against U.S. interests and one leader subsequently actively engaged in such activity. were also indications at this meeting that VVAW/WSA activists possessed the technical knowledge and training to carry out any revolutionary program proposed. In 8/3 at a National Steering Committee meeting, some members of the national leadership REC-49



promoted education of the entire VVAW/WSA membership in Marxist-Leninist doctrine directing the organization into political growth along Marxist-Leninist lines. The VVAW/WSA currently has a factional dispute between Maoist and Stalinist groups. The Stalinist group is supported by the National Office of VVAW/WSA. Additionally, the National Office contributed financial support to a program of recruitment of military personnel designed to promote political indoctrination with the objective of creating disruption and disorientation within the military at such time as there is a revolution within the United States. VVAW/WSA is currently headquartered in Chicago, Illinois.

On 4/11/73 and advised that the subject as Delaware appeared among those names on the VVAW chapter list regional offices and the VVAW project offices as of 4/5/73 in Chicago, Illinois.

Sources who are familiar with certain phases of New Left type activity were contacted with negative results regarding the subject. These sources are as follows:



On 8/6/73, Captain Intelligence Unit, Delaware State Police, Troop 6, Wilmington, Delaware advised that his records reflected that was one of several individuals who took part in a Veteran's Day ceremony on 10/24/71. The group requested permission to participate in some memorial service and to show their opposition to the war. He advised that the had contacted the Delaware State Police, requested permission to march and was advised that no march parade permit was necessary outside the Wilmington City limits.

In order to obtain background data, his department conducted investigation in connection with and interviewed in October, 1971, at which time indicated that all members of the group were definitely Vietnam veterans, that he was attending the University of Delaware on a GI Bill and was receiving disability from the federal government. He advised that the VVAW group he was affiliated with were interested in wanting better drug rehabilitation for the returning Vietnam veterans and not just getting a urine analysis and a few pills and then discharged from the service. His group

also wanted jobs for the returning soldiers. His group also wanted an end to the war immediately. He also advised that they did not intend to make any trouble, that they had respect for the dead, all dead Americans as well as all nations.

Captain advised that during the brief demonstration on 10/24/71, that and his group were exceedingly cooperative and did not interfere or disrupt any police procedures or other activity at any time. He said that was extremely cooperative and went out of his way to be sure that his group was complying with police requirements and not doing anything that might interfere with police activity or cause them to be arrested. Captain advised that bent over backwards to comply with the law and that in his opinion in no way constituted a threat to the community or any form of government via state, local or federal. He could not in any way classify as a radical but as an individual who had sincere beliefs concerning the war and proper treatment for returning veterans.

He was living at Delaware with three other male students, all veterans. The group became acquainted with another group of students, all veterans. The whole group during "bull sessions" talked about their respective war experiences. Because the group felt the war in Vietnam was "bad" when they heard of the VVAW they thought it might be a good idea to try and organize a group in Delaware.

The whole VVAW activity in Delaware occurred in 1971 to the best of his knowledge. There were three planned VVAW activities by the Delaware group - one at the University of Delaware in 10/71, one at Rodney Square, Wilmington, Delaware and the other at a Memorial Service at the Memorial Bridge, Wilmington, Delaware in 10/71.

There was no real organizer or head of the Delaware group which may account for its short-lived existence and lack of support. It is now defunct in Delaware and has been since early, 1972.

The Post Office has asked him to advise the sender of his new address which he has declined to do because he does not want the VVAW to know his new address since he has no further interest in the group.

In addition to the three Delaware activities, above, he went to New York for a VVAW demonstration in November, 1971. He also attended a National Steering Committee in Kansas City in 1971 and also attended a rally in December, 1971 in Washington, D.C.

He met SCOTT CAMIL while in Kansas City who later became involved in the "Gainsville 8" trail in Florida.

He never knew of any VVAW people from Maryland and does not know if there is any organized group there. When he was in Washington, D.C. in 12/74 he met one "guy" who claimed he was from Maryland. He could not recall his name.

The reason why he and his friends wanted to organize a VVAW group in Delaware was to:

- 1. Make people aware of the Vietnam War and the immorality of it.
- 2. Get better drug rehabilitation for Veterans
- 3. Get better job opportunities for Veterans.

The only other group he is familiar with is the Youth Against War and Facism, Wilmington, but the few people still associated with the group are "really goofy" and he would have nothing to do with them.

He said the VVAW literature he has received in past seems to indicate the group is getting into prison problems and the like, although still retaining the VVAW name. He has no interest in these issues and feels if

someone kills someone else, they should go to jail and not claim the system is wrong and they are innocent.







The VVAW was formed in 1967 as an organization of Vietnam veterans to protest American involvement in the war in Southeast Asia. Since that time VVAW leaders have told members the VVAW is a revolutionary group, not "just another group of war veterans." Also, the membership has been told the VVAW has been asked to cooperate on an international level with many organizations, including communist and Maoist groups. Additionally, it was indicated that "anti-imperialist groups" consider the VVAW a potent organization of similar stature in the U. S. In April, 1973, the group changed their name to VVAW/WSO so that non-veterans could become members. Current VVAW/WSO national officers are Marxist-Leninist oriented and strive to educate their membership in Marxist-Leninist doctrine.

I. HEADQUARTERS

On December 6, 1973, during a meeting of the Tampa VVAW Chapter, it was announced that the Tampa coordinator had rented a store at 305 West Waters Street, Tampa, to use as VVAW headquarters. The rent will be \$75.00 per month. The Red Star Cadre (RSC) will join the VVAW in the building and will help split the cost of expenses. The office will probably open on December 8, 1973.

The Red Star Cadre (RSC) was formed in Tampa, Florida, during October, 1972, as a Marxist-Leninist (M/L) study group. As of May, 1973, the RSC was in contact with other M/L groups attempting to form a new M/L Communist Party in the United States.

VVAW headquarters at 305 West Waters Street, Tampa, Florida, was officially opened on January 7, 1974. A pay telephone was installed in the office with telephone number 935-9003. The RSC has joined the VVAW in the headquarters and is splitting the rent and expenses. The two groups are also interested in having the Tampa Socialist Collective (TSC) as a third group in headquarters and overtures have been made to TSC.

The Tampa Socialist Collective (TSC) is an independent Marxist/Leninist organization in Tampa, Florida, which closely follows the political line of the October League (OL).

June 30, 1973

The OL was formed in 1969 in Los Angeles, California, as an informal group of Marxist-Leninist individuals with the purpose of instilling in the working class a Marxist-Leninist philosophy. In late 1971, its founders decided to organize nationally to form a new Maoist oriented communist party in the United States with the purpose of uniting and leading the working class and its allies, the oppressed minorities, in a military insurrection to establish a new proletarian state. As of January, 1974, the OL claimed to have 9 chapters and is continuing to expand nationally. Numerous OL leaders and members have visited the People's Republic of China and the OL is known to have received financial support from the Chinese Government.

The present headquarters of the Tampa VVAW is at the Unity House, 305 West Waters Street, Tampa, Florida. The house is shared by the VVAW and RSC. VVAW meetings are held each Saturday at 1:00 P.M. at the headquarters.

On January 17, 1974, a meeting of the Tampa VVAW was held at the University Center, USF. Discussed at the meeting was the Tampa VVAW Charter which was passed May 18, 1973. The points of the charter are as follows:

- 1. To go by the rules and regulations of VVAW-Winter Soldier Organization.
- 2. To do everything in our power to free all prisoners both foreign and domestic.
- 3. To do everything in our power to free all oppressed people both foreign and domestic and bring the land back to the masses.
- 4. Work with any group as long as they do not try to trot us.
- 5. You cannot hold an office with another group while holding office in VVAW. Also, you cannot hold office in VVAW and be an officer with another group.
- 6. Members cannot vote if dues are not paid up to date. If you do not pay for three months, you can be kicked out.
- 7. Election of Coordinator will be held every two years. Coordinator can be re-elected for two more years.
- 8. Vice Coordinator will be elected every year. If Vice Coordinator leaves, the Coordinator can pick a Vice Coordinator to finish out the year.

Secretary will be elected once every year.

- 9. Coordinator and Vice Coordinator-Secretary will be the Steering Committee.
- 10. If Coordinator dies Vice Coordinator takes his job for the rest of the term. He will appoint a Vice Coordinator

to finish his term. If Coordinator goes to jail - Vice Coordinator takes job until he gets out.

- 11. Coordinator cannot vote but if there is an
 even vote Coordinator can decide which way the vote will go.
- 12. This charter cannot be changed for two years and only at election time but can be added to as long as no changes are made.

We the new members of the Tampa Chapter of VVAW-WSO hope that this charter will build a better VVAW Chapter for Tampa.

We should dedicate ourselves in our work to liberate our people.

At a VVAW meeting on October 31, 1973, the VVAW Treasurer's report was given announcing that the Tampa VVAW Chapter was in debt for September, 1973, in the amount of \$800.00 and in October, 1973, in the amount of \$169.00. These debts included office supplies and mailing.

Advised that the TSC would support the VVAW for any demonstration at Raiford during the upcoming trials of prisoners who rioted at the prison.

October 23, 1973

The African Peoples Socialist Party (APSP) came into being in St. Petersburg, Florida, in May, 1972. This political organization is made up of blacks whose aims are to assist blacks in breaking the bonds of slavery and placing the destiny of blacks firmly in black hands. The APSP is a direct outgrowth of the Junta of Militant Organizations (JOMO) and was formed to assist the property of JOMO, in his unsuccessful attempt to be elected mayor of St. Petersburg, Florida.

The International Junta of Militant Organizations, Incorporated (JOMO), was incorporated in the State of Florida in January, 1971. JOMO was founded in St. Petersburg, Florida, in May, 1968. According to JOMO literature, the United States of America is a colonial power where African people are being colonized. JOMO also believes that African people have no responsibility to perpetuate, sustain or protect the United States and it is the duty of all African people to arm themselves to protect their families against the racist white-power structure.

The leaders of the Tampa VVAW Chapter and RSC held a meeting to draw up an agreement for making the two groups a collective for unified action in regard to the prison reform project of the VVAW. It was emphasized that the collective must be anti-Imperialist in nature.

On Saturday, September 15, 1973, members of the Tampa VVAW attended the Florida State Regional VVAW Conference at Withlacoochee State Park, Sumter County, Florida. members attended from Tampa.

Six members of the Tampa VVAW participated in a march from Gainesville, Florida, to Raiford State Prison, October 27-28, 1973, to protest conditions at the Raiford State Prison.

October 29, 1973

On November 12, 1973, the Tampa VVAW sponsored a march in Tampa, Florida, to coincide with the Veteran's Day Parade and had as its theme the impeachment of President NIXON. Approximately eight persons participated.

November 12, 1973

On November 14, 1973, the Tampa VVAW held a press conference at USF, Tampa, with members of the Tampa and St. Petersburg, Florida, press, concerning the Tampa VVAW prison reform project. The press was furnished information on the demands and platforms of prisoners as backed by VVAW.



Attached advises legitimate veterans' groups from New York City plan to have 800 persons travel by bus to Washington, D.C., 3/29/74, to picket U.S. Capitol and White House. New York City chapter of VVAW/WSO will not participate as that group plans owndemonstration in New York City that date. WFO requests New York to check bus companies regarding bus reservations to Washington, D.C., 3/29/74, and to telephonically confirm departure of same.



DETAILS:

The Vietnam Veterans Against the War (VVAW) was formed in 1967 as an organization of Vietnam veterans to protest American involvement in the war in Southeast Asigo. Since that time VVAW leaders have told members the VVAW is a revolutionary group, not "just another group of war veterans." Also, the membership has been told the VVAW has been asked to cooperate on an international level with many organizations, including communist and Maoist groups. Additionally, it was indicated that "anti-imperialist groups" consider the VVAW a potent organization of similar stature in the U. S. 

The DAM has been self-described in its newspaper issued during late 1971 as a democratic socialist party composed of radicals and revolutionaries who desire to create a group that will present a viable alternative to the failure of earlier radical groups. During its initial stapes, NAM was known as the New American Communist Party.

Another concert by is scheduled in Boulder for April 19, 1974. The report indicated that the Boulder Chapter has started projects on amnesty, discharge upgrading, post-Vietnam syndrome and prison support.

The Colorado Springs Chapter also presented a report at the Regional Convention in Denver in which that chapter enumerated actions they had participated in since the December, 1973, Regional Convention. Concerning the Amnesty Project, representatives from the chapter along with people from Clergy and Laity Concerned (CLC) (a group of religious leaders and laymen who have opposed the Vietnam War over the past several years appeared before the City Council to ask that the council take a stand on ammesty. The request was refused. Chapter representatives also went before an informal meeting of the Colorado Springs Human Relations Council January 10, 1974, on the question of amnesty and people from the military spoke in rebuttal. Nothing came from the meeting. At the February 14, 1974, meeting of the Human Relations Council, they said they would recommend that Colorado Springs not discriminate in job hiring because of bad discharges. Chapter representatives also went before a meeting of the area's non-profit organizations on February 14, 1974, concerning amnesty but generally speaking the organizations were not receptive to the chapter's ideas.

Concerning the Colorado Springs Chapter's Stockade Visitation Program, CLC arranged through the Stockade Chaplain permission which enabled chapter members to visit men who did not get visitors during regular hours. Such visits were made on January 16, 17 and 24, 1974 and they were well received. On January 31, 1974, the U. S. Army at Fort Carson, stopped the program stating they were going to turn the program over to the Area Council of Churches.

In the Denver Chapter report it was stated that the chapter has three members involved in the Rocky Mountain Discharge Upgrading Project. Efforts have been made to circulate a petition at Metropolitan State College, Denver, to have a student/faculty vote on whether or not Metropolitan State College (MSC) should have a Reserve Officer Training Cource Program. 400 signatures have been obtained but their efforts have been lacking in support and organization. The report stated that the demonstration at the state capitol grounds went fairly well.

The Lowry Project group (a small group of VVAM/WCC Denver Chapter members who publish an anti-Air Force news letter called, "Blue Screw" but whose activities are not considered sponsored by VVAW/WSO) submitted a report at the Regional Convention. The project stated it was continuing to put out the "Blue Screw", conduct GI counseling, support Defense Committees and support people on base at Lowry Air. Force Base who do not want to or cannot relate directly to the Lowry Project. This group requested more assistance from VVAW/WSO and indicated members of its group were moving to 1107 Columbine.

This investigation is based on information which indicates that captioned organization is engaged in activities which could involve violations of Title 18.

VVAW/WSO was organized in New York City in 1967 as an organization of Vietnam veterans to protest the American involvement in the war in Southeast Asia. VVAW/WSO engaged in various protest activities but during late 1971 demonstrated increasing militancy, culminating in December, 1971 with VVAW/WSO takeover of various American landmarks and public buildings. Information was also developed indicating that some VVAW/WSO chapters were cooperating with or infiltrated by communist-dominated groups including the Communist Party, USA, and the Socialist Workers Party. Certain VVAW/WSO leaders were quoted as telling members VVAW/WSO is a revolutionary organization and not "just another group of war veterans". VVAW/WSO leaders have traveled to North Vietnam and have reportedly established liaison with revolutionary or terrorist groups internationally. During July, 1972, VVAW/WSO leaders and members were indicted by a Federal Grand Jury, Tallahassee, for violation of Federal statutes, including conspiracy to riot during Republican National Convention, August, 1972. One of these individuals was also indicted for possession of an unregistered explosive and incendiary device. In January, 1973, at a National Steering Committee meeting, VVAW/WSO leaders discussed programs aimed at obtaining support from or influencing active duty military personnel. They also discussed obtaining access to classified Government information to be used against United States interests and one leader subsequently actively engaged in such activity. There were also indications at this meeting that VVAW/WSO activists possessed the technical knowledge and training to carry out any revolutionary program proposed. In addition, information has been reported from a source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, that a VVAW/WSO member previously discussed engaging in sabotage and was possibly involved in the destruction of a munitions train in Arizona. VVAW/WSO is currently headquartered in Chicago, Illinois.

FLORIDA/GEORGIA ROUND ROBIN REPORT

Since the last NSCM, Florida/Georgia Region has participated in six demonstrations. The purpose of these actions was to emphasize Amnesty, the freeing of all Political Prisoners, VA Hospital conditions, and the impeaching of the head pig. Since 15 December VVAW/WSO has been picketing and leafletting the Miami VA Hospital, receiving overwhelming support of the patients and workers alike.

Since the Miami Office opened, it has been the target of a tear gas bomb followed by a telephone threat with the warning to free Cuba and to free Henry. Two days later the VVAW/WSO car was stolen and later found about five blocks away by a member. FBI has contacted three members of Miami Chapter. Typical harassment and intimidation gig. ACLU is filing a formal complaint against the FBI for this. On December 22, we received another threat. We were given the alternative of leaving the building or going up with the TNT charge that was placed in the building. Fortunately, it was just another fucking crack-pot call.

The following is a list of what the active Florida/Georgia chapters are presently working on:

Tallahassee - Prison Reform

Gainesville - Starke Prison Defense Committee

Broward - Presently in the process of

rebuilding. Working in coalition with Dade County on the VA Hospital.

Dade County - Doing constant VA Hospital work

with Broward County. Active dup.

Tampa Chapter has resigned from the Florida/ Georgia Region. This pull-out was the result of internal conflicts, which we hope can be overcome, so that Tampa will be re-enstated into the Region.

Gainesville reported that they have sold Winter Soldier sub to the VA Hospital.

 Implement the Peace Agreement Working closely with the Union of Vietnamese. Had actions on November 17 and December 23. Planning an action within a coalition for Jan. 27. Distributing literature and other on-going education.
- B. Counter Recruiting: Chapters have been speaking gigs or literature tables on campuses when Military recruiters come.
- C. Gary Lawton: Maximum possible participation in attending trial, disseminating information, and working with defense committee. Frantically trying to find a lawyer with good politics for the 3rd trial.
- D. Amnesty: Doing speaking engagements, panel discussions and debates for Church groups, on campuses, for conferences and community organizations. Have done radio spots and sponsored community meetings on Amnesty. Put out petitions, bumper stickers, buttons, Christmas cards, posters and fund raising mailing. Have film "Perspectives on Amnesty" available for rent. Working with War Resisters Committee in Lompoc Federal Prison around Amnesty. Two active Discharge Upgrading Projects. Five projects in embryonic stage. Two active projects are handling 170 cases after 4 months work.
- E. PVS: One functioning PVS group. Have interest for more groups, but no available para-professional help or coordination of this national activity.
- F. NOSCAM: We contact the names forwarded to us from NOSCAM by mail and have placed them on our monthly membership mailing list. We have had no response from any of these contacts.
- G.I. Organizing: Working on G.I. papers "Up Against the Bulkhead", "Up From the Bottom", and "Fight Back". Have working relationships with G.I. Project Alliance, MDM and G.I. Forum. A few members are doing active duty counseling.

- H. Operation County Fair: Up until this NSCM have acted as clearing house for OCF. Implemented national OCF newsletter in coordination with National Office and Boga Chitta. Have continual dothing and supply drives. Involved in attempting to improve national communication on OCF.
- I. Farmworkers: Continue to distribute literature and information, attend demonstrations.
- J. Newspaper Sales; Increasing. Have set up bookstore and organizational distribution. Mail out copies to our membership and supporters mailing list.
- K. Prisons: Increased communication inside county, state and federal prisons. Chapter forming in Lompoc Federal Prison and DUP project starting in Soladad State Prison.
- L. Silk Screen Workshop: Were donated 35 screens and support equipment. Have it set up and a collective working. Have produced our first poster, on Amnesty.

II. STRENGTHS AND WEAKNESSES OF THE REGION

- 1. The entire region is working around the issue of amnesty, the weakness is that there is no coordination of this work on a regional level. We have not been very successful in building coalition work around the issue of Amnesty because many organizations are confused about the dazzling footwork that the National Council of Churches and similar organizations are putting on.
- 2. We have been recruiting many people into VVAW/WSO through our Work with Amnesty, especially the Discharge Upgrading Project.
- 3. We are doing no work around the VA due to lack of coordination and energy.
- 4. We are not doing systematic work around GI organizing. The present system of outreach that we have been using has been unsuccessful.
- 5. We have had a continually functioning regional office with a 5 person full time staff (at present). 3



un Mili

chapters in the region have offices that are staffed on a daily basis. There is one sub-regional office. The fact that we have only 3 chapter offices is a weakness.

- 6. We have a functioning regional steering committee (different than the regional office) which meets on a regular monthly basis.
- 7. Communication and coordination of work in the region has improved 100% in the last 4 months.
- 8. 3 people are running for the position of regional coordinator, a first in California history.
- 9. We have a functioning regional and sub-regional structure which is designed to give members the greatest amount of imput on policy decisio.
- 10. Have some problems in leadership getting bogged down in functionary and bureaucratic type work, and as a region sometimes get caught up in making policy for policy's sake.
- 11. Have implemented a membership and chapter criteria policy which insures a better level of security.
- 12. Have implemented an internal funding policy which recognizes the need for membership support since we cannot depend on liberals forever and builds a sense of responsibility for the organization. Internal Funding also supplies money so that people do not have to be independently solvent to hold leadership positions which require travel, high phone bills, etc.
- 13. Not all members are participating in Internal Funding on an equal level, due to lack of education on the importance of it.
- 14. There is an increased level of study of political theory on a chapter level. There is no organized cohesiveness to this study.

Proposals from California - Nevada Region

I. PRIORITIES WORKSHOP: We propose that there be a Priorities Workshop at this NSCM. We feel that the work of the organization is diverse and often spread too thin. In recognition of this fact, we recommend that the following guidelines established at our last Regional Conference be used for a basis of discussion.





- 1. Does it elevate the political conciousness internally?
- 2. Does it have potential for recruitment and building the organization?
- 3. Does it have potential for developing mass support?
- 4. How well does it meet the 10 objectives of VVAW/WSO?
 - 5. Does it further an overall class struggle?
- II. PROPOSAL FOR ADMENDMENT ON ALTERNATIVE SERVICE PROPOSAL FOR NATIONAL COORDINATORS:
- 1. Change two weeks to one month to read one to three months. \checkmark
- 2. That the region that the coordinator will visit have control of where the coordinator will work, based on the needs of the region with imput from the chapters and projects effected.
- 3. Change: local chapter shall assume responsibility for the coordinator's room and board to read local chapter will assume responsibility for coordinator's room and the National Office will assume responsibility for their board.
- III. ROUND ROBIN REPORTS Proposal for adgenda under new business. In the future tat no oral round robin reports be given at NSCM. Written reports from regions should include a summary of the work they are doing with an overall analysis of the strengths and weaknesses of the region. These reports should show clearly what things were done right and wrong, what tactics proved to be effective, etc., so that we can learn from each others errors and practice. Round Robins should be honest reflections of the Region's work.

IV. LOCATION OF THE NEXT NSCM

We propose that the next NSCM be held in California. At present we have no specific location to propose, but

will have that together one month after this NSCM, and would notify all chapters by mail at that time. We propose this for several reason. 1) Our region is presently growing and has both the energy and abilities to host a NSCM. 2) It cost our gegion at \$1,500 to send our delegation to each NSCM. The expense and length of time it has to take to get to the NSCM has been a great hardship on us. 3) We can be sure to provide a place where the weather will be good.

REGIONAL REPORT - Ohio-Indiana-Kentucky-Michigan-West Virginia-Western Pennsylvania

December, 1973

It has been a good four months highlighted by vigorous growth and work by the Columbus chapter around most of VVAW/W50's national projects, continuing expansion of NOSCAM through the Dayton chapter, and the establishment of a prison support project through the Cincinnati chapter and the regional office.

SPECIFIC PROJECTS

AMNESTY: 500 VVAW/WSO amnesty pamphlets have been distributed around the region, but, because of the length, Columbus VVAW/WSO prepared and is distributing an amnesty leaflet which will be used by other chapters in the future (copy attached). Columbus is also going door-to-door with amnesty petitions. Each chapter has been doing publicity work around amnesty through media and public appearances; a midwest amnesty conference was held in Cincinnati, and another is planned for Dayton in January.

Dayton and Columbus have established discharge upgrade counselling centers and have presented part 1 of a two-part workshop session on military counselling and discharge upgrading. Dayton in particular is doing work around the Melvin X. Smith case, and Columbus wrote and distributed a leaflet dealing with the Karl Armstrong case. To fund the counselling center in Dayton a foundation grant of \$2400 was managed by the Dayton chapter. An attempt to get amnesty funds through a region-wide fund-raising letter was moderately successful.



WOMEN: An improved version of VVAW/WSO objective #8 has been written and printed in the national newsletter, along with our reasons for it as they emerged through regional discussion. There has been no effort aimed specifically at getting women into the organization, because we have had a substantial number of women members for some time.

GAINESVILLE: A vigil and victory celebration was held in Cincinnati where press coverage was good; as other regions probably discovered, the media was suddenly interested in comments from VVAW/WSO and we made some useful contacts.

INDOCHINA SOLIDARITY WEEK: Some chapters did poster work; Cincinnati in a united front with the local Committee Against the Indochina War, did media work, leafletting, and, on October 6, a large rally/demonstration in support of the Indochinese people.

PRISON SUPPORT WORK: A project around visiting rights has been started by the regional offica (see leaflet attached). 100 prisoners are in regular communication with us, many of these in personal contact with VVAW/ WSO members in the region. NLG people are working on specific cases we have been informed about. In conjunction with comrades from Eastern Pennsylvania, we sponsored a live concert in the prison at Huntington, Pa where a chapter has now started. This was in response to a brother inside, who informed us that the prison administration had offerred a barbershop quartet of quards for the one live concert per year allowed to the inmantes. The VVAW/WSO concert included Barbara Dane, one of the brothers from Attica, and some 20 musicians -- the response was fine. Cassette of that concert will be available in the near future.

GI WORK: We are in touch with many of the active duty brothers whose names have been given to us by NOSCAM;



military counselling is going on in Columbus and Dayton Otherwise, active duty work is handled by NOSCAM and the Dayton chapter (see the NOSCAM report). As part of this project we are also corresponding with several brothers in military prisons.

DEFUNCT REGIONS: At the last steering committee meeting we acquire responsibility for two defunct regions with the understanding that we would try to hold them together until such time as they could become regions again.


The people who operated the regional office in Pittsburgh came to one of our regional meetings; though they were initially upset that we had assumed control of their region, they left the meeting reasonably happy with that arrangement--there was nothing happening there. We received the mailing list--a good list but not used for almost two years, with the result that we are just now getting a clear idea of who is left in that area. Independently we are in contact with various groups (particularly mine workers) and individuals in that area and see a great potential for organizing there. The fact that a good organization had been built up but allowed to die through neglect points to the nned for someone--probably national office--to keep close track of weaker regions so that some action can be taken before they disappear.

The Michigan regional office has been contacted several times, but we have not yet been able to get the information from there. As a result, we have been establishing contacts on our own, as yet with moderate success. We are in contact with some people--mostly single individuals-- in most of the major cities, but there has been no spectacular result as yet from these contacts.

WINTER SOLDIER: We distribute 3500 copies per month and usually need to ask for more; store sales are increasing, particularly non-bookstore sales. We find the paper a tremendous recruiting tool--response is surprisingly good, often just on the basis of the basis of the paper we get letters interested in joining the organization.

VA: Columbus VVAW/WSO confronted the regional VA representative with a list of demands; this work continues.





FUNDING: Foundation money for military counselling, and fund-raising letters around amnesty have been mentioned. A movie benefit showing collected approximately \$750 in Columbus. Two chapters are now able to afford a paid staff, thus freeing these individuals from other work.

Dear Fellow Visitor,

Like you, we are friends and families of Ohio prisoners, and are concerned about the health, welfare, human rights, and civil liberties of prisoners and their families. We are further concerned about the inhuman living conditions within Ohio's "correctional institutions," such as poor medical care, less-than edible food, and restrictive policies regarding contact with outside communities. We realize that it is the economic and social structure of our country which defines and produces "crime." Finally, we recognize the political repression, both inside and outside of prison, which is used to intimidate and cease the work of those persons fighting for a decent life.

As a first step to correct these conditions, we are building a movement in Ohio to bring about necessary changes in visiting rights and regulations in Ohio's prisons and jails. Among the changes we are demanding:

- 1. Conjugal visiting rights for wives or husbands of prisoners; at least one 12 hour private visit per month.
- 2. Extension of visiting hours: 8:30 A.M. to 10:30 PM.
 - 3. No restriction on numbers of visits.
 - 4. No restriction on numbers of visitors, relatives, or friends.
 - 5. No restriction on visiting room behavior except for what is illegal in a public place.
 - 6. Free public transportation for visitors to and from prisons to the major cities in the state on a regular basis.
 - 7. Protection of women prisoners' maternal rights, including legal custody and visiting rights for children.



8. Recreation areas and equipment for prisoners and their visitors.

We know that these changes do not get at the heart of the problem behind the prison system, but they are a first step and they will improve the situation of those we are visiting. To gain these demands we are planning legal suits, demonstrations, pickets, etc., and we need both your help and your suggestions. NEW YORK - NORTHERN NEW JERSEY REGION ROUND ROBIN REPORT


Regional Operations - A new regional coordinator was selected at the October regional meeting. Another regional meeting was held in early December. A regional newsletter, coming out on a monthly basis, has been started. There has been a general revising of office procedures. Currently there is no activity taking place that we know of in Northern NJ.

Indochina Solidarity Week - This was a strong activity in the Buffalo and NYC Chapters. In other parts of the region, it was weak or non-existent due to communications breakdowns over the summer. It was generally well thought of by those who partcipated, although there were criticisms of some of the specifics.

<u>Prisons</u> - Buffalo Chapter is working with the Attica Brothers Legal Defense and some members are on the jury project (based largely on the Gainesville jury project), as well as with the Martin Sostre Defense Committee. NYC Chapter is working with the defense for Carlos Feliciano and with Frente Unido. Most chapters answered the call to send in letters of support for Gary







Lawton and Zurebu Gardner. We have 30 prisoners in 13 prisons and prison farms on our mailing list.

Winter Soldier implementation - There is some resistance to this concept. Much of it stems from a lack of long term thinking about the nature and goals of VVAW/WSO. A few people feel threatened by the concept as it now stands. A large number support the concept but feel that to try and create a scenario for faster change would be premature. There has also been some failure to consider the goals and function of a mass organization.

Women in VVAW/WSO - Buffalo Chapter has an ongoing women's group. It is generally a feminist consciousness raising and support group and about half the women involved are active in other programs of the Chapter. NYC Chapter is starting a women's group that is conceived more as a caucas within the Chapter. Other chapters have active women, but not to the extent that they are strong enough to form women's groups.

Gainesville - Because the trial ended on Labor Day weekend, little activity was carried out then. NYC Chapter held a well publicized and successful victory party in the beginning of October. Other chapters held informal celebrations among the membership.


GI Work - There are few bases in NY-NNJ, and we don't have chapters near those that do exist. We are in contact with those active-duty brothers referred to us through NOSCAM. Buffalo Chapter is considering a program of leafletting Guard and Reserve armories.

Jr. ROTC - Work against this program, and counter recruitment work, will become a major effort in the region in the future. Current, Joe Urgo in NYC is starting a study project on Jr. ROTC and could use any pertinent information and resources other regions and chapter can supply.

WSI on Concealment of U.S. Casualties - This has been endorsed as a regional project as far as setting up a clearinghouse and gathering information. The proposal is enclosed for consideration this NSCM.







Fund Raising - NYC Chapter had a successful beer blast and is planning another. Buffalo held its fourth successful benefit party and also entered a team on a local sports trivia quiz show. Proceeds from that are going to Bogue Chitto. The regional office is planning a book and record sale.

Political Education - Buffalo Chapter has started a weekly PE group at its storefront. Readings include theory and American labor history. NYC Chapter has a group that studies theory as well as the National Objectives of VVAW/WSO. Efforts to start PE groups in the smaller chapters have not been successful to date.

Impeachment - Buffalo, Rochester and NYC Chapters
have all participated in community based impeachment rallies.
Other chapters are actively publicizing the issue.

Amnesty - NYC Chapter and Mid-Hudson worked on an amnesty coalition in the Hudson Valley. Buffalo Chapter has worked on two coalitions in Western NY and has close ties with AMEX in Toronto. Other chapters are starting work on this issue.

Chapters have started counselling programs and/or DUP clinics.


<u>PVS Rap Groups</u> - Buffalo, Rochester, NYC and Westchester/Putnam Chapters have or are starting rap groups.

Assessment - Some of the chapters that existed in name only have folded during low periods of activity last spring and summer, but the reat are becoming stronger as organizational positions clarify. Currently there are ll active chapters in the region. Communications are still shaky in some areas, but are improving. There is a new sense of unity in most of the region, but there is still some resistance to organizational growth and change and political education.

NY-NNJ Proposals for Antioch NSCM:

Workshop Proposal - There be a workshop on the possibilities on a military coup in this country and how





we, as an organization and as individuals, can prepare ourselves to deal with it.

Proposed - We propose to the NSC that National Office organize a week of local activity (along the lines of Indochina Solidarity Week) to be carried out as chapter conditions allow.


ST. LOUIS COLLECTIVE ROUND ROBIN REPORT

The ongoing project in the St. Louis area for the past ten months where the greater portion of the collective energy has gone, is the coffeehouse project. When we speak of a coffeehouse we are not just speaking of a small gathering place where people people can sit around sipping coffee but, also a base from which the St. Louis collective can #1 establish an independent financial base #2 acquire _isibility in the immediate community as well as the community at large #3 use the building as a foundation in which projects relevant to ourselves as VVAW WSO and projects relevant to the community can be established/

After a lo month struggle we finally made a major step toward making these goals a reality. On Dec, 26 1973 the St. Louis collective purchased a thirty one room building located in a lower class neighborhood in the inner city. In doing this we have become the first chapter, to our knowledge, in the U.S. to have become our own landlords hence giving our chapter a material permanence which is vital to our existance.







The coffeehouse is not yet open to the public, financial hassels are still presenting stumbling blocks in some areas, but, we continue to make headway. Cultural events such as plays and musicals have taken place at the coffeehouse. We are now on the verge of opening for business.

Considering all the grief we have endured the coffeehouse project has been educational for us in the practical sense by learning first hand, how an urban political system operates. It has been educational for us in that we have learned to develope skills and resources with which to overcome that system.

With the greater porton of our energy being involved with the coffeehouse projects such as distributing Winter Soldier, G.I. organizing and speakers bureau have not received as much attention as we would like, however, we remain conscious of thier importance.



The Baltimore chapter devotes almost its entire energies running the Military Law Project/
Highway 13 at Odenton, Md. This GI project at Fort
Meade is involved in publishing a GI and veteran paper,
providing counseling and legal referral to GI's and
supporting other worker actions. There is a great
need for active outreach and organizing in the Baltimore
area.





The College Park chapter revitialized during Indochina Solidarity Week. They were active in support of the IPC show. Some of their members work on Highway 13. On the U. of Maryland campus is actively working with the Vets Center and helping vets with hassles with the VA.

The DC chapter also worked with the IPC show during Indochina Solidarity Week. A couple of members work with Highway 13 plus the chapter sells the paper in DC with Winter Soldier and provides financial support of the paper. Other members are involved with CARIC. Members have picketed with the Farmworkers. Recently, activity has centered arround establishing a DUP and working on impeachment, and forming a study group with active duty GI's. There is still a great need for active outreach and organizing as well as a better coordinating of activities in this chapter.


There are a few members in Virginia but no organization. Hopefully this will improve when back moves down from Rochester, N.Y. and begins organizing.


The regional office main activities besides trying to coordinate activities in the region have been supporting Highway 13, aiding the setting up of a DUP in Washington, speaking on Amnesty, and corresponding with prisoners. In addition contact has been made with a working class coalition in Baltimore to develop support for Universal, Unconditional Amnesty. At our last regional meeting it was decided that the regional office would start to help the chapters set up a PVS project.

The major strengths of the region is there is a hardcome of active interested members willing to build VVAW/WSO. We are developing support from GIs at Fort Meade and in Washington for Highway 13. Progress has been made on starting a DUP, training sessions have been held, and we have started work on cases. Our primary weakness is lack of members and funds. We need better regional coordination plus better means of getting information to members.

Discussion of Workshops and Proposals

<u>Women-Objective 8</u> - There has not been very much outreach to women in this region. This is primarily





a result that there has not been that much outreach at all in this region. Since St. Louis we have been trying to get the few members we do have together. Highway 13 has been making a fairly substantial effort to reach women GIs. They have set up a women's counseling night and publish regular articles on women in the service.

Our region accepted the following guidelines for objective 8:

"RESOLVED to fight sexism which produces rigidly defined sex and life-style roles. The rights of men and women, heterosexuals, lesbians, and homosexuals to grow free from predesigned sex roles is a priority in building a new society. We recognize that we must fight the sexism within society and ourselves which serves as an integral part of imperialism."

<u>Prisoners</u> - this region supports the construction of an 11th objective to deal with the concept of political prisoners. While many people are imprisoned for political reasons in the U.S. all prisoners are political prisoners by virtue of the system we live in.

The regional office has been corresponding with prisoners but no support actions have been held yet.


Indochine Solidarity Week - Major activity in this region centered arround supporting the IPC show and postering. Because of a lack of active membership there was not enough postering and little outreach.

They should lend their organizing skills and knowledge.



REGIONAL BEFORE - ALASE - TESTITION RELIGIO


Since the 1 st MCM, the Alaska-Washington Region has continued to show a decline in active membership. In part due to the lessening tensions around Vietnam, and in part due to the somewhat unclear programs passed by the two preceeding NSCMs, we have been forced into a retronchment of forces.

Nevertheless, we have been making fairly good progress in a number of areas:

Our chapter at Fort Lewis has been continuing to work with active duty Glo. As an indication of its effectiveness, that chapter co-ordinates at Ft. Lewis was recently gaven 30 days in the stockade for his part in distributing leaflets emposing the macism of one of the officers on the post. Over 100 GE attended the trial at one point or another, and we picked up 6 new members as a result. The brother is out now, and back at work exposing the military.

One of the side outcomes of the Ft. Lewis incident was to show black Gls on the post that we are not just bullshitting when we say we are trying to fight racism. A reflection of the past work we have been doing on the post shows up when we note that almost half of the chapter members one black at Ft. Lewis.

We have also been doing outreach work at places where a lot of vets congregate (the VA, the unemployed at office, local bars, etc.). While there has been no obvious result thus far, the seeds have been planted for future actions. The main action on the adjects will be coming up in late February at the state capitol in Olympia when the legislature will be voting on a comprehensive GI bill package for the state.

The min work we have done around the Gainesville trial has I on propedant in nature. Whenever we could, we have raised the issue and explained the frame up.




At the present time, we are concentrating all of our forces or building the action mentioned above at Olympia. We for that our primary goal should be the organizing of value around the immediate survival needs of the veterans community. Along with that, we plan to extend our prison work here in Washington.

The main problem to are having is getting the street vets together behind programs which will help them get what they want. We have been doing some general outrach work, but we have not as yet hit upon any formula by which we can mobilize sizable support from the vets community. This is in part due to the general lethergy of the vets thouselves, and, in part, due to the lack of a good program on our page. We hope that our new efforts will be more successful that those of the past.

One of the project that may help in these efforts is the project them. That is local newsfetter in Scattle. We hope to be able to lay out some of our ideas in that form on a monthly basis. It will also







serve to keep the local vets informed on the general happenings around the country of interest to them. If we can get enough bread, we hope to be able to give the newsletter away; otherwise we'll probably charge about 5¢.

So, while our efforts since the last NSCM have not been exactly earth shattering, we have been able to at least pull together a hard core of cadre out of which, we are confident, will arise a new and stronger veterans force in our region.

COLORADO/UTAH/WYOMING ROUND ROBIN REPORT:

The region is now in the process of a large re-building campaign in which we hope will even awaken Utah and Wyoming which have always been difficult states to organize. The main activity is as usual centered around the state of Colorado. The growth of the organization in the last three months has been remarkable. Colorado has 6 chapters, 3 of which are considered active. Colorado Springs, Denver and Boulder would be considered the strong arm chapters in our region at this time. Organizing efforts are being made by sisters and brothers in Greeley, Colorado Mountain College-Glenwood Springs, Lorretta Heights College, and Antonio or Adams State College.

After the last NSCM in St. Louis, Colorado worked on postering for IndoChina Solidarity Week, which concluded with a regional meeting and party on Oct. 6th. Soon afterwards we joined with the Rocky Mountain Military Project and the National Lawyers Guild in establishing a support and defense committee for Dick Bucklin, a war resister and four year exile from the U.S. Army. Dick gave us the opportunity in his political trial to help bring the issue of unconditional amnesty closer to the communities of the Rocky Mountain area. We will continue our support and committment to Dick thru the trial in early Jan. and further, if he is not freed. Denver continues to work with







the Amnesty Task Force and chapter members have spoken at local churches and forums on the issue of amnesty.

On Oct. 20th, the region leafletted for amnesty for veterans at the Denver Veterans Day Parade. We also demonstrated with song and spirit against the whole idea of this parade across from the reviewing stand. The response from both the people attending and the media was excellent.

The Denver Chapter has been fighting an administrative act by the Metropolitan State College to bring ROTC into the school without the consent of the student body. In addition, they have been working with a once a month political education program for the community and themselves, Bach Mai Hospital assistance with Colorado Aid to Indochina; have established ties with the African Liberation Committee; and are involved with the Crusade for Justice and others in a Chile Solidarity Program and Dinner to be presented in mid-January. They along with the Regional Staff Collective have committed themselves financially and both now have a new office in the Capital Hill area of Denver.

The Boulder chapter has leafleted against Navy recruitment tables set up at the University of Colorado, are working on a campus P.V.S. program, and sponsored Englands, executive secretary of the International Confederation for Disarmament and Peace in a speaking gig on IndoChina and The Left in Japan. They were also to bring the Covered Wagon Singers to Boulder but the show fell thru because of the needed support of student workers who went on strike at that time. They were later hosted in a home in Denver and played there for a few VVAW/WSO friends.

Colorado Springs has been most active with their Red Door Military Counseling Project and the many demonstrations before the community in the last few months. Among these, the Air Force Academy, the El Paso County Veterans Affairs Office and Safeway with the United Farmworkers. Plus, most recently, they both hosted our regional convention and presented the film "S. Vietnam: A Question of Torture" in a public showing in the Springs.



REPORT TO NSC DECEMBER 1973

Status of VVAW/WSO within the region: The Veterans Service Association on campus in Tuscaloosa, Al has a few VVAW/WSO members running it | being one). We got a regional meeting together after the August NSC to see what membership existed and to get some chapters back together. There was representation of the VVAW/WSO Bogue Chitto Collective, a couple members from Tuscaloosa and three other towns in Alabama. It was camping party and nothing was accomplished. The Boque Chitto Collective has been asked by in Tuscaloosa to do outreach and arrange for another attempted regional meeting in Bogue Chitto. All Operation County Fair material from the regional office was turned over to the Bogue Chitto Collective last October. So the regional representation of the Ala/Miss/Tenn in effect now lies with the Bogue Chitto Collective as the only functioning VVAW/WSO within the region.

Status of Operation County Fair in Bogue Chitto, Al: The temporary clinic building is still under construction. Actually only a few hours each week is spent on construction due to: lack of funds for major works i.e. plumbing; relying on skilled community members to donate their available hours to the carpentry or electrical work. The interior construction now involves sealing the inside walls with insulation and paneling and tiling the floors. The pipeline and plumbing is held up by the winter rains.

The IRS application for tax exempt status is completed but the final ruling by the IRS could take as



long as a year. In most cases in which an organization is reasonably assured of being granted exemption, the IRS will issue a temporary letter of exemption.


The health problems of the community are Though non-existant to most poor people the serious. health care delivery that is present is not of the quality known in other states. Many diseases and problems go undetected and untreated. Segregation in medical facilities still exists. The health care offered now by the clinic staff includes emergency first aid (on call) providing transportation, accompanying patients to health care facilities where they acted as "health care advocates" to insure proper and prompt treatment and follow-up. Donated supplies to the clinic are being utilized under the direction of the medical director. A second physician has made averbal committment to see patients in the clinic on a limited basis and work with the nurses in bringing health care directly into the community.

Financial Situation: The donations recieved from chapters and other groups or individuals is deposited directly in the Martin Luther King, Jr. Memorial Clinic account. The People's Farm and VVAW/WSO Bogue Chitto Collective survive with sponsors and individuals salaries respectively separate from each other and the clinic's expenses.

The reasons for keeping mail addressed personally and not by organizations is to keep as unnoticed as possible to local pigs and cut down on mail rip-offs.

The presence of a VVAW/WSO chapter in an area such as rural and Selma Alabama has made many curious in both the hostile, rasist community and poor black friendly community. Awareness of our presence spreads much farther than the immediate community and contacts made in Selma.

One of the members is involved in the initial stages of learning how to bring "health work" into the prison system. Members of the collective are also into learning about GI organizing potential at Craig Air Force Base, Selma and disseminating information. The chapter is active in selling and handing out the Winter Soldier paper, collecting signatures in support of Brother Melvin X. Smith, and doing political education about the Gulf, Grape and Lettuce Boycotts. One of the members also on



clinic staff has been asked to speak to a small group of local college students about the masics of various drug use and abuse. There is a tremendous lack of knowledge about this and if possible could be brought into larger workshops in the area.

Major difficulties with securing responsible and capable members to support this project from within the community itself have set us back several times. Re-establishing community trust, community involvement and backtracking over administrative mishaps have been setting us back each time another member of VVAW/WSO leaves due to irresponsibility or other problems. Since there are no resources within the state volunteers are desparately needed to carry on this work.

Major difficulties with securing consistent support from the national organization itself for this national project has made progress extemely slow also The Bogue Chitto Collective has picked up on the receptiveness of the local community and from blacks within Selma interest in this project and in the VVAW/WSO. If the support from the national organization can respond to these difficulties now the Project would not be endangered.

The original proposal making California Regional Office the Clearing House for the project has met with communication problems and duplication of roles since VVAW/WSO members within the community have been able to handle more of the Project. An updated Proposal for OCF laying out the lines of communication, security and the purposes has been distributed.







Chicago has selected a new steering committee for the next six months; also, a regional staff for the same time period.

In Sept. we received member back from the Gainesville Defense Committee, only to lose him again in late Sept. to the Carl Armstrong Def. Comm. Hopefully, if the Melvin X. Smith Def. Com_ ever gets together, he will be staying in Chgo.

We have re-instituted political educationals in the chapter. The attempt was made to hold them weekly, but we haven't done so for quite awhile now.



A 'wo ans Suffrage" educational s been put together by several women members of the Chgo. Chapter to be presented on Jan. 6 yth.

Because of some discussion of paper selling and why people can't seem to sell the paper, we felt that every issue of the paper should be fully discussed within two weeks after its release. That way people would have to read the paper (there have been individuals who were negligent in doing this) and knowing the contents of what your selling is the first step towards the Winter Soldier paper being a good outreach tool.

Our membership has increased rapidly so that Chicago now has 24 active members. An attempt at paying dues of \$5 per member on a monthly basis.

We have done several speaking gigs these past few months on Amnesty and discharge upgrading.

At the Midwest Amnesty Conference, we had one participant which was from DeKalb.

The Chicago Chapter worked in a coalition in Illinois for an Illinois Amnesty Conference which was held on November 10, 1973. An all day affair, VVAM/WSO held the chair positions in both the Community Organizing and Organizing GIs and Resistors workshops. The legislative workshop was attended by several members of our Chicago Chapter. The result of the Amnesty Conference was that ICUUA (Illinois Committee for Universal Unconditional Amnesty) was formed. The necessity for building up the chapters outside of Chicago is very important at this time if VVAM/WSO is to maintain several of the leadership positions on this ICUUA project.

For Indochina Solidarity Week, the Chicago Chapter, along with the National Office, postered all over Chicago - we also held a benefit with the Indochina Peace Campaign Tour on September 27, 1973. We assisted the Tour thru-out their 2-day stay in Chicago by doing leafletting, postering, setting up information/selling booths.

The Covered Wagon Singers traveled thru Chicago on their return trip from New York (this was after their coffeehouse burned down). We had a local guerilla theater perform, along with the C.W.S. on November 30, 1973 with half the admissions going to rebuild their project in Mountain Home, Idaho. The Chicago Chapter lost money on this benefit and it was suggested that we find a new strategy for attracting people to our future fund-raising activities.

As for our DUP, the date of November 1, 1973 as the "kick-off" of it, came andwent. Now that we have rented an office the DUP shall begin after the first of January, 1974.



MARXIST-LENINIST-MAOIST SUPPORT

Third source, on January 7, 1974, advised that the overall attitude at the Mass Organization Workshop session of the National Steering Committee (NSC) was that of a communist movement. Source stated some persons in attendance claimed to be Marxist-Leninist, others Progressive Labor Party (PLP), and a few proclaimed to be Socialist Workers Party (SWP).

PROGRESSIVE LABOR PARTY

The Progressive Labor Party (PLP), founded in 1965 by former members of the Communist Party, USA (CPUSA), who assertedly followed a Chinese Communist line, is a revolutionary Marxist-Leninist organization dedicated to a dictatorship of the working class.

SOCIALIST WORKERS PARTY

The Socialist Workers Party (SWP) has been designated pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

The first source advised on January 2, 1974, that among the leadership of VVAW/WSO present at the NSCM was Barry Romo. Source advised that and former officer were all followers of the Maoist philosophy or ideology. Romo stated that he anticipated an inner struggle in VVAW/WSO between the followers of Mao and the followers of "the old Communist Party." He expected this conflict to come to a head when the Maoist group feels they have enough strength to take care of VVAW/WSO. That would either result in Maoist control or cause a complete split in the VVAW.


Source stated that from other conversations he formed a basis of opinion that the California Region, Washington, D.C. Region, Wisconsin Region, Bogue Chitto, Alabama and Columbus, Ohio Chapters of the VVAW were all of the Maoist ideology.



FACTIONALISM

The first source advised on January 2, 1974, that he had learned that there was a dispute prior to the commencement of the formal NSCM as to the seating of the Tampa, Florida delegation. The Miami Chapter of VVAW/WSO made certain charges against Tampa including the allegation that Tampa had no headquarters, lied about the number of members in the chapter, and misrepresented certain of their other activities. Source stated that Tampa presented refutations of these charges. The Miami Chapter took the position that Tampa had withdrawn from the Florida Region, was an unaffiliated chapter of the VVAW, and since they were not regional representatives, they could not be permitted to attend the NSCM. In addition, Miami refused to allow Tampa to attend the NSCM as observers from the Florida Region. Concerning the above, each region or chapter held a caucus and it was decided that due to the present VVAW/WSO rules, Tampa could not attend the NSCM; however, it was proposed that some future effort be made to rectify this type of situation.

PINANCIAL REPORT OF NATIONAL OFFICE

Seventh source furnished on January 3, 1974, a financial report of the National Office in written form which is set forth, verbatim, exactly as it was distributed at the NSCM in report form, on pages 42 through 46.

Ninth source on March 6, 1974, advised relative to the National Office filing for a tax exempt status with the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) that the National Office had been advised by the American Civil Liberties Union that the VVAW/WSO leaders should give out as little information as possible in regard to their tax status and that VVAW/WSO, at least temporarily, would enjoy a tax exempt status.

REPORT ON FINANCES AND INCORPORATION

This written portion of the report on finances and incorporation, we will only briefly describe the very complex situation of paperwork that has been going on for many months.


One of the fundemental ideas to grasp is that each chapter and region MUST have an accurate and complete accounting system that can meet IRS requirements. We have hired an accountant, read books and changed our system at least six times, and it will have to be changed once more. It is imperative that a bookkeeping system be set up for any account bearing the name of VVAW/WSO. only real answer to any question of how, is to get in touch with a lawyer or an accountant that is throughly trained in the area of not for profit corporations. We went to the AFSC and they referred us to a very straight, but very good, accountant who worked for them and knows exactly what was required of us $_{\star}$ We cannot help in this area because each State has its own tax regulations that must be met, besides the numerous and complex paperwork of the IRS. The basic thing is that you are a BUSINESS, and therefore must file tax returns and pay all tax liabilities. Even non-profit groups pay income tax for employees (FICA & unemployment). Do not think that because we are a movement group that the tax laws don't apply. The IRS has and will be used as a tool of repression.


The financial sheets attached to this report compromise the financial transactions of National Office only. Each expense has been totaled under an account heading. However, the accounts do not give a complete breakdown of expenses. This means that an account like travel takes in more than gas money; such as plane fares, food while travelling, car rental, etc. Since we will have to change this system, more detailed reports will begin in 1974. The new system will reflect program expenditures such as monies spent for Winter Soldier (postage, truck rental, boxes, etc.).

It should be realized that any renumeration in any form to anyone from organizational money is considered wages (except professional services). This means that if a chapter or region pays part of someone's rent or gives them gas money, that is called a wage and taxes must be paid on that (FICA). And the "company" must file a tax return also. Again, get a good lawyer who knows the tax law.

COMPONIAL

Natical has filed for a tax exeastatus with the IRS. The details will not be written down as our lawyers wish to give as little info to the government as possible. Therefore, the discussion of the exemption will be given orally and covered more throughly in the workshop. Remember, all aspects of the exemption are for LEGAL purposes only and should not affect certain decisions. These discussions should be considered as business dealings and security must be in the fore-front. That sounds cryptic, but will be explained orally.

SPECIFIC ACTIONS RECOMMENDED OR TAKEN AT NSCM

Sources utilized in this memo advised immediately following the NSCM that the following specific decisions or proposals were accomplished at this NSCM:

NOSCAM

The NOSCAM Office did not prepare a written report. A plea was made for the various chapters to make financial contributions to assist in the preparation of the NOSCAM newsletter.

OPERATION COUNTY FAIR

It was noted that the only functioning VVAW/WSO chapter within the Alabama-Mississippi-Tennessee region is at Bogue Chitto, which is the driving force with Operation County Fair. A temporary clinic building is still under construction. Internal Revenue Service has not made a final ruling on the tax exempt status. Other area efforts include GI organizing potential at Craig Air Force Base in Selma, Alabama.

PVS CLEARINGHOUSE (POST VIETNAM SYNDROLL)

CONTRACTION

The PVS Clearinghouse in Milwaukee,
Wisconsin contains articles, books, etc. dealing with the
Post Vietnam Syndrome maintained in a libary. Efforts
are being made to add to the library and to sell
accumulated materials.

GARY LAWTON TRIAL/DEFENSE

The San Bernardino, California Chapter of the VVAW/WSO is functioning as the Defense Committee revolving about the third trial of Gary Lawton. Efforts to date have been unsuccessful in finding a lawyer willing to take the defense responsibility for the third trial.

AMNESTY

The NSCM affirmed continuing priority for universal and unconditional amnesty and arranged for continuing propagandizing for this cause through use of posters, bumper stickers, etc. as well as newsletters and other mailings to be made to persons of influence within the community.

A proposal for the VVAW/WSO to affiliate with the National Council for Universal and Unconditional Amnesty was tabled until the next NSCM.

> COMMITTEE FOR ACTION/RESEARCH ON THE INTELLIGENCE COMMUNITY (CARIC)

Saint Louis region proposed national endorsement of the CARIC program to spot light from a critical standpoint governmental investigations of a security nature. The NSCM endorsed the "In From the Cold" project in the Intelligence Community, which is being sponsored by CARIC.

MOSCOW WORLD PEACE CONGRESS

The NSCM voted that the National Office and jointly draft an official letter of censure to the United States Secretary of the World Peace Council and to the Communist Party, USA (CPUSA), for their failure to take sufficient aggressive collective action following the alleged of while the World Peace Congress.

Barry Romo of the National Office and of Ohio reported on their recent trip to Paris and expressed that they had been extremely impressed with the Cambodians they met in Paris. The Cambodians reportedly emphasized that they are not planning to seize Phnom Penh because they are militarily concentrating on the entire country. Approximately 30,000 political prisoners are reportedly being held in jail by Lope Col.

LEAVENWORTH, KANSAS PRISON

Indictments handed down following uprisings in the Leavenworth Federal Prison were evaluated as a "means of rounding up political people within the prison". VVAW/WSO resolved to provide persons under indictment therewith as much nationwide support as is possible.

CHILD CARE/DAY CARE

NSCM criticized the host office for insufficient child care arrangements and took steps to $\mathcal{E}^{(2)}$ correct this in the future.

PROPOSED NATIONAL ACTION

NSCM unanimously adopted the proposal that on or about January 27, 1974, VVAW/WSO will sponsor demonstrations in cities throughout the country with issue of demonstration to be "Implement the Treaty/End all Aid to Thieu and Lon Nol"; Universal and unconditional amnesty for all war resistors; Kick Nixon Out!"

MASS ORGANIZATIONS

Proposal of the Mass Organizations Workshop was accomplished using the following six guidelines for determining priorities as set forth by the California region:

- 1. Does it elevate the political consciousness internally?
- 2. Does it have potential for recruitment and building the organization?
- 3. Does it have potential for developing mass support?

STREET VETERANS

NSCM concluded that local attention should be given to the organizing of Street Veterans, which was defined as former GI's who have returned to a civilian society and are employed in low income jobs, unemployed, or who are in school merely as a form of existence.

POSSIBILITY OF A DOMESTIC COUP

NSCM accepted a proposal that the National Office of VVAW/WSO prepare a continuing objective and serious analysis of the possibility of a domestic coup for inclusion in the Winter Soldier. The workshop formulated this proposal noting that "one of the weaknesses of the American Left is that serious discussions on the possibilities of a military coup have never taken place. Only through the process of political education can a serious and non-paranoid analysis be made and the necessary plans for individual and collective survival be devised".

The workshop further noted that "individual preparation can consist of stockpiling the material that will be in short supply in the event of a coup; food and clothing stores, gas stations and other resources normally available to the public will not be readily available if a coup does occur".

OBJECTIVES WORKSHOP

A proposal was passed at the NSCM calling for chapters and regions to discuss objectives and submit written reports to the National Office by March 1, 1974. The National Office will thereafter consolidate the regional reports, formulate a number of objectives not to exceed ten and furnish same to the regions by March 15, 1974, for eventual vote on them at the next NSCM to be held.

SEXISM

NSCM Workshop on Sexism demanded an end to that sexism which forces an inferior status on women

ends

and alleged the United States imperialism pends for its very existence on this oppression of women as a source of domestic slavery and cheap labor. A separate report noted that homosexual oppression is not a priority and that the group should not get "bogged down in rapping about sex".

PRISON WORKSHOP

NSCM unanimously accepted workshop reports which encouraged attention to contacts with prisons and individual prisoners. It was agreed to initiate contact with prisoners, attempt to provide legal assistance to prisoners and provide prisoners with objectives and publications of the VVAW/WSO. It was agreed to use amnesty as a tool to relate to prisoners.

GI ORGANIZING

The workshop report in this category received unanimous acceptance in which it was stated that the thrust of GI organizing activities should be to effectively "neutralize" the military as a weapon of oppression at home and abroad. Neutralization should be accomplished in a political context ie through organizing tactics and political education.

VA WORKSHOP

This workshop report received unanimous acceptance. The workshop concluded that the VA is discriminatory in its treatment of Vets with less than honorable discharges.

That the VA benefits are sub-standard and de-humanizing;

That the VA uses benefits as a club held over the heads of radical vets:

That the VA is used more as a pacifist than as an agency working for real help and that the VA is used for recruitment for the military.

"WINTER SOLDIER"

The NSCM concluded that the Winter Soldier probably is the most important tool that the organization has and concluded that more efforts must be made to increase the circulation of the Winter Soldier.







PRESS CONFERENCE

The "Yellow Springs News", a weekly publication of general circulation at Yellow Springs, Ohio, issue of January 2, 1974, contained an article captioned, "Viet Vets Meet Here" which read as follows:

"The 'eleventh national steering committee meeting' of the Vietnam Veterans Against the War Winter Soldier Organization was held here Friday through Monday. Over 100, including representatives from each of VVAW-WSO's 21 regions, attended.

"The principal purpose of the meeting was 'to give political direction to the organization.' according to steering committee representatives who met with this reporter at a press conference late Monday afternoon. A campaign seeking amnesty for all, against whom charges have been made or who have been punished for opposition to U. S. participation in the wars in Southeast Asia, was planned.

"This campaign includes the seeking of a single type of discharge for those separated from any branch of the military services. This would mean that any 'less than honorable' discharge would be replaced by such a uniform discharge, the Vietnam Vets spokesmen told the NEWS. There are a half-million with less than honorable discharges resulting from opposition to participation in the Indochina wars, they claim.

"Development of the amnesty program is in keeping with ten major objectives of VVAW-WSO, it was pointed out at the press conference. 'Our primary object is to end the war in Vietnam, which is still going on a year after the Paris peace agreement was signed . . . over 50,000 have been killed since . . U. S. planes still bomb, some with U. S. pilots . . . 22,000 official U. S. representatives, former military men, now 'non-military' still assist the Thieu government in Saigon' they charge. Both the Thieu government in Saigon and the Lon Nol government in Cambodia, repressors of the people there, would collapse without U. S. help, they claim."







SITE AND DATE OF NEXT NSCM

The second source advised on January 4, 1974, that the NCSM at Yellow Springs, Ohio, concluded with a party on the evening of December 31, 1973, with all persons in attendance leaving the location on the morning of January 1, 1974.

It was announced that the next NSCM will be held in Milwaukee, Wisconsin from April 11-15, 1974.

NATIONAL OFFICE ALUATION OF REGIONS

Seventh source on January 3, 1974, advised that the general condition of the regions attending were described as follows by the National Office:

ALASKA-WASHINGTON: According to its regional report, the Alaska-Wash. Region is on its last legs. Except for a hard core group of three or four people, that region no longer even exists. Its main work is of a type that does not require large numbers of people. Thus it tends to concentrate on petition drives and low key propaganda rather than on large actions, or take overs. This region will die with the next few months.

CALIFORNIA-NEVADA: This regions problems are much like the Alaska-Washis. They seem to be doing a lot of work that is rather low key. There does not seem to be much coordination between various chapters in the region. They have done some work in the area of amnesty which should be watched as a potential source of growth, but, all in all, I'd have to say that the Calif.-Nev. group seems very weak in general

COLORADO-UTAH-WYOMING: This region seems to be growing at a respectable rate. This is in the main part due to its activities around a whole range of issues. This region seems to be more cohesive and better organizaed than most other regions. Its main strength is its ability to concentrate its forces on one project at a time. Nevertheless, there does seem to be some problems developing as they expand into the college vets scene. They are having trouble relating to the problems that those vets have in regard to the GI bill, etc. There are already signs of splits between the college and the non-college chapters.

PLORIDA-GEORGIA: The Flor.-Ga. report (#4) points out the main problem that this region has faced since the end of the Gainesville Trial. It has been plagued by a serious of splits which have left it all but useless. First, it was Scott Camile who split and took a number of active people with him; now the entire Tampa Chapter has quit the VVAW/WSO Region. While most of the problems are personal in nature, at the base is a strong disagreement with the direction of the organization. All in all, I'd say that this region is too weak to last much longer.

N. ILLINOIS-IOWA: Except for Chicago, there is no region (#5). Try as they might, the people in



Chicago can't end the borders of the region outside of the city limis. Even within Chicago, it alf, the entire membership (according to their stats) is 24 members who are at all active. A pretty sorry showing for a city with hundreds of thousands of vets. The people in the chapter, however, seem to be pretty hard core mouth-revolutionairies. This is most likely why they find it difficult to draw too many new people into the region. All in all, Chicago may have a short burst of new members (provided it carries out VA occupations), but in the long run it too is doomed to disintegrate.

S. ILL.-E. MO.-ARKS.-OKL.: This region did not submit a written report. The main reason it did not, is because they aren't doing anything to put down on paper. Rnough said.

D.C.-MARYLAND-VA.: The main concentration of this region is on its Committee for Action/Reaserch on the Intelligence Community (CARIC). CARIC is attempting to gather information on the workings of domestic spy nets which various units of the intelligence community have set-up. As to other activities, this region was almost destroyed by the DC Police and the FBI, and is just now getting back together again. (For CARIC see #6)

TEXAS: This region is once again trying to get active. The main driving force behind the renewed effort is John Kniffen (former Gainesville defendant).


Weak region. It has done little more than token work in the last 6 mos.

OHIO-IND/-KENT.-W. VA.-W. PA.-MICHIGAN: Despite the impressive name, only the Ohio part is active (#7). The other areas listed above have no VVAW/WSO chapters in them at all. The Ohio section, however, has been very active. This is mairly due to the fact that this region has been concentrating its work around draft and military counselling, and around amnesty. Yet, this type of organizing, while visable, does not in the final analysis add many new members to the group. Thus, we must view the Ohio section, in the final analysis, as an extreamly effective propaganda group and little more. It does, however, have the potential to develop into a serious force, and should thus be watched.

WISCONSIN-MINNESOTA: This region (#8) has been the only one which has engaged in direct militant action when it took over the Milwaukee VA office (twice). This action has brought it quite a few new members. In the end, however, these types of actions will be counter-

VVAW/WSO was organized in New York City in 1967 as an organization of Vietnam veterans to protest the American involvement in the war in Southeast Asia. VVAW/WSO engaged in various protest activities but during late 1971 demonstrated increasing militancy, culminating in December, 1971 with VVAW/WSO takeover of various American landmarks and public buildings. Information was also developed indicating that some VVAW/WSO chapters were cooperating with or infiltrated by communist-dominated groups including the Communist Party, USA, and the Socialist Workers Certain VVAW/WSO leaders were quoted as telling members VVAW/WSO is a revolutionary organization and not "just another group of war veterans." VVAW/WSO leaders have traveled to North Vietnam and have reportedly established liaison with revolutionary or terrorist groups internationally. In January, 1973, at a National Steering Committee meeting, VVAW/WSO leaders discussed programs aimed at obtaining support from or influencing active duty military personnel. They also discussed obtaining access to classified Government information to be used against U. S. interests and one leader subsequently actively engaged in such activity. There were also indications at this meeting that VVAW/WSO activists possessed the technical knowledge and training to carry out any revolutionary program In August, 1973 at a National Steering Committee meeting, some members of the national leadership promoted education of the entire VVAW/WSO membership in Marxist-Leninist doctrine directing the organization into political growth along Marxist-Leninist lines. The VVAW/WSO currently has a factional dispute between Maoist and Stalinist groups. The Stalinist group is supported by the National Office of VVAW/WSO. Additionally, the National Office contributed financial support to a program of recruitment of military personnel designed to promote political indoctrination with the objective of creating disruption and disorientation within the military at such time as there is a revolution within the United States. VVAW/WSO is currently headquartered in Chicago, Illinois.

The Socialist Workers Party (SWP) has been designated pursuant to Executive Order 10450.


G. Control of Other Organizations

II. PLANS AND ACTIVITIES

A. Party Building

For all practical purposes, the VVAW does not exist anymore in Houston. It has merged with the Prairie Fire Organization and is presently in the Prairie Fire Organization. It was stated that some members belonging to the Prairie Fire Organization are sympathetic to the aims and ideals of the October League (OL).

The OL was formed in 1969 in Los Angeles, California as an informal group of Marxist-Leninist individuals with the purpose of instilling in the working class a Marxist-Leninist philosophy. In late 1971, its founders decided to organize nationally to form a new Maoist oriented communist party in the United States with the purpose of uniting and leading the working class and its allies, the oppressed minorities, in a military insurrection to establish a new proletarian state. As of January, 1974, the OL claimed to have nine chapters and is continuing to expand nationally. OL leaders and members have visited the People's Republic of China and the OL is known to have received financial support from the Chinese Government.

The Prairie Fire Organization is described as a University of Houston campus-approved organization with its main goal or thrust being "anti-imperialism". It is mainly a student-oriented organization.

At a meeting of the VVAW/WSO, the main discussion concerned the upcoming visit of JANE FONDA to the University of Houston campus.


