

A preliminary inquiry has been initiated concerning the subject for the purpose of determining if he is a leader or activist of the Vietnam Veterans Against the War/Winter Soldiers Organization (VVAW/WSO), activities of which could involve violations of Title 18, United States Code, Section 2383 (Rebellion for Insurrection), 2384 (Seditious Conspiracy), 2385 (Advocating an Overthrow of the Government), 2387 (Sedition), and 793 (Espionage).

A confidential source furnished information on September 24, 1973 that the name . Massachusetts 01420 appeared on a VVAW/WSO chapter and region list as of September 8, 1973.

VVAW/WFO was organized in New York City in 1967 as an organization of Vietnam veterans to protest the American involvement in the war in Southeast Asia. VVAW/WSO engaged in various protest activities but during late 1971 demonstrated increasing militancy, culminating in December, 1971 with VVAW/WSO takeover of various American landmarks and public buildings. Information was also developed indicating that some VVAW/WSO chapters were cooperating with or infiltrated by Communist-dominated groups including the Communist Party, USA, and the Socialist Workers Party. Certain VVAW/WSO leaders were quoted as telling members VVAW/WSO is a revolutionary organization and not "just another group of war veterans." VVAW/WSO leaders have traveled to North Vietnam and have reportedly established liaison with revolutionary or terrorist groups internationally. January, 1973 at a National Steering Committee meeting, VVAW/WSO leaders discussed programs aimed at obtaining support from or influencing active duty military personnel. They also discussed obtaining access to classified Government

information to be used against United States interests and one leader subsequently actively engaged in such There were also indications at this meeting that VVAW/WSO activists possessed the technical knowledge and training to carry out any revolutionary program proposed. In August, 1973 at a National Steering Committee meeting, some members of the national leadership promoted education of the entire VVAW/WSO membership in Marxist-Leninist doctrine directing the organization into political growth along Marxist-Leninist lines. The VVAW/WSO currently has a factional dispute between Maoist and Stalinist groups. The Stalinist group is supported by the National Office of VVAW/WSO. Additionally, the National Office contributed financial support to a program of recruitment of military personnel designed to promote political indoctrination with the objective of creating disruption and disorientation within the military at such time as there is a revolution within the United States. VVAW/WSO is currently headquartered in Chicago, Illinois.

Arrest Record Check

On October 30, 1973, the second source advised that the had never been arrested in the Massachusetts area.

On December 20, 1974, records of the Massachusetts Commissioner of Probation, Suffolk County Courthouse, Boston, Massachusetts, a central repository for all criminal and traffic conviction records within the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, were checked concerning and no arrest record could be located.

<u>Activities</u>

On October 30, 1973, the second source advised that on July 4, 1972, had participated in a VVAW march held in Massachusetts to protest American participation in the war in Southeast Asia.

The VVAW is a veterans' organization with a national office at 25 West 26th Street, New York, New York. Its first published objective is "to demand an immediate cessation of fighting and the withdrawal of all American troops from Indochina." VVAW has participated in several demonstrations, including a massive demonstration in Washington, D.C., during the period April 19-23, 1971.

Informants who are familiar with subversive activities and in particular activities of the VVAW/WSO in the New England area were contacted concerning during February, 1974. These informants had no information concerning Visco.

Results of Interview



Bogue Chitto/Cairo - Clothing Truck Arrives

An 18-foot truck filled with clothing left St. Louis on January 19th, stopping in Cairo to unload half of the clothes and arriving in Bogue Chitto late that night. The clothes were collected over the past few months, mainly, by the Friends of the United Front(of Cairo) in St. Louis. The truck was driven to Bogue Chitto by members of the St. Louis Chapter of VVAW/WSO.

In this project with the United Front, we agreed to handle the transportation in return for half of the clothing they would collect. The total bill will come to about \$300, including getting the driver back to St. Louis. (The truck was turned in in Selma.) We have collected all but \$70 of this from the Chapters. Since the National Office is not "out of the woods" in regard to money, we ask that each chapter consider sending in another \$5.00 to help us cover the money that we laid out for the truck rental and gas expenses. We would also be interested in hearing from Chapters that would like to plug into another clothing drive in the Spring or Summer.

Trotekyism - Analysis Available

Left in Form, Right in Essence - A Critique of Contemporary Trotskyism, is a 32-page pamphlet written by Carl Davidson who is a staff writer for the Guardian newspaper. The pamphlet covers, in broad outline, both the historical and present-day issues raised in the people's struggle by the Trotskyists and presents a rebuttal to their views from a Marxist-Leninist viewpoint.

Questions discussed in the pamphlet include: The permanent revolution, socialism in one country, the two-stage theory in the national liberation movement, the united front against fascism, and others. The author also discusses the Trotskyist view of China, both historically and today, and gives an acount of the origins of the Trotskyist movement in the United States. Of particular interest is the examination of the present theory and practice of the Trotskyists, specifically the Socialist Workers party, and the unity of their reformist views with the modern revisionists.

Although the pamphlet contains a lot of theory which may require other reading to fully grasp, the pamphlet does offer an excellent starting point for analyzing Trotskyism, especially as it relates to VVAW/WSO and our position on Indochina and imperialism. Indochina Demonstrations -

In line with the Indochina Workshop at the NSCM, which called for demonstrations on or around the 27th of January, the following chapters have informed us of what they are planning for that weekend:

Chicago, Illinois - A march and rally with three speakers talking on the three different demands: Implement the Treaty/End all Aid to Thieu and Lon Nol; Universal and unconditional Annesty for all War Resisters; Kick Nixon Out!! One of the speakers will be John Young, former POW. About 10-15 other organizations will be participating in the march called by the Chicago chapter.

Washington DC - The chapter will join in a march and rally with the Ad Hoc Committee to Honor the Vietnam Peace Accords. The march will wind up at either the Saigon Military Procurement Office or the State Department. That night there will be an informal meeting for the public by the speakers, which includes Tim Butz of the chapter.

Colorado- The chapters of the Colorado region will conduct a two day fast at the State Capitol Building in Denver. On Sunday, January 27th, they will break their fast with a Vietnamese neal and will sing songs composed by Vietnamese political prisoners. All are invited to the fast and meal.

Northern California - The chapters of Northern California will take part in a demonstration with the Indochina Solidarity Committee. This action will consist of exhibits, slides, films, etc. At night a public meeting will be held and one of the speakers is a VVAW/VSO member with a UD who will speak on amnesty. The California regional meeting will attend the night speaking.

Milwaukee, Wisconsin - The chapter will sponsor a march and rally which will take place in their local community. The demonstration will have the three demands of the organization as per the NSCM.

Bogue Chitto - The collective will be leasletting schools and churches in the area for three days.

Pennsylvania - Several of the PA chapters will leastet and petition over the weekend in Philadelphia. They are aiming for 10,000 signatures on the petitions.

Tallahassee, Florida - The chapter will conduct a teach-in about Indochina.

Buffalo, New York - The chapter will conduct a picket line in dowtown Buffalo with the three demands being focused.

London, England - The London Chapter will conduct a vigil with the British Campaign for Peace in Vietnam on January 27th at the US embassy.

All chapters conducting demonstrations, etc. should send us reports and pictures for possibl inclusion in the next issue of Winter Soldier.

Committee to Defend the Leavenworth Brothers

The Committee to Defend the Leavenworth Brothers (temporary name of the defense committee being established by VVAW/WSO to defend the charges now coming down at Leavenworth Federal Prison) is pulling together quite well. Several people within the Kansas City community have exhibited interest in the defense, and the committee should be in full-swing in the very near future. Kansas City VVAW/WSO is responsible for the formation and coordination of this defense committee and the brothers who have been (and will be) indicted are members of the Leavenworth Prison chapter of VVAW/WSO.

There are no new developments as far as further indictments are concerned, and the grand jury has not yet reached any decisions. Also, there have been no developments regarding a trial date for the three brothers (Odell Bennett, Alf Hill and Alfred Jasper) recently indicted on trumped-up charges stemming from two incidents which occured in late August and in October. (For information on these charges see the January issue of Winter Soldier).

There are some problems, however, in that Odell Bennett has been transferred back to Leavenworth from Springfield Medical Facility in Missouri. This transfer occured approximately three weeks ago, and Odell has been on a hunger-strike since the transfer occured. The rationale behind this strike is that Odell is demonstrating his resistance to the brutality of Leavenworth. His life is not safe while he is in Leavenworth; and knowing that it is a policy of the Bureau of Prisons to transfer prisoners who are ill or not eating to the nearest medical facility, Odell is protesting so that he may be sent back to Springfield. Melvin Smith Publicity -

The Buffalo chapter of VVAW/WSO wrote letters to all the newspapers and radio stations informing them of the case of Melvin Smith. As a result of their letters the chapter got two radio call-in shows and a story on Smith was published in the Buffalo Challenger, which is the Black community newspaper. Two of the largest papers in Buffalo are interested in doing a story. All this was accomplished by letters. If other chapters tried the same thing on Smith, Lawton, County Fair, etc. it would probably result in the same experience as occured in Buffalo. It is at least worth a try.

Prison Work

At the Yellow Springs NSCM, VVAW/WSO adopted prison work as a national project. Chapters and regions should pay close attention to the prison workshop report and the report on prisons in the National Office Reports. The minutes include the responsibilities of the regions with regard to prison work, and these should be carried out as soon as possible. Also, regions should pay close attention to the suggestions for prison organizing that are included in the minutes. There are some good ideas as to where to begin doing prison work. Also, as new ideas arise, they should be sent to the Project Office (which is located in the National Office). The Project Office is to begin publishing a prison newsletter which will be sent to all chapters and to our prison mailing list. It was stressed in Yellow Springs that this newsletter will be dependent on in-put from the regions. We need to know what is going on in the prisons in your area in order to have material for the newsletters. We are planning to mail the newsletter to prisoners along with the Winter Soldier. In light of this, we are setting the 1st of every month as the deadline for prison reports from the regions to be sent to the Project Office. This will enable us to complete the prison newsletter before the push on the newspaper begins. So, send in news for the prison newsletter by the 1st.

There were a few very important points raised during the Prison Workshop as far as prison organizing is concerned which aren't contained in the minutes. The first point is that if we were to apply a "rule" to prison organizing, it could probably best be put into the word "consistency." This means that without the prisoners, we can't have much of a prison project; therefore, contact with the prisoners in your region has to be consistent. It is a heavy responsibility to keep correspondence up and visiting adds to this load. If people in the chapters are not committed to fulfilling this responsibility, then they should not be given the job. In short, the flow of information must be kept moving -- between the chapters and prisons, and between the chapters and the Project Office.

Secondly, it is vitally important that we listen to what the prisoners are telling us. If they request that you cool it for a while because the heat may be coming down, then by all means DO WHAT THEY SAY. They are in the best position to know what is going on, and we must follow their instructions at all times (unless someone asks you to do something totally unreasonable). We are not about the business of getting people in more trouble than they already have, so watch what you do, and remember that it is safe to assume that all mail will be read by prison officials.

Along with this point goes the idea that we have to protect our "contacts" as much as possible. This means that we should not be passing around their names and the activities the prisoners are involved in. If a new person writes for information and is interested in the organization, then by all means, answer him/her. However, if you have other contacts in the same prison that you have been in touch with for quite some time and trust, do not give that name out to the "new" contact. Instead, pass the "new" name on to the old contact and have the person you know best look the other person up. Also, if other people come around looking for prison contacts, don't give out the names unless you are sure why they want the names and that they are honest folks. Our prison membership is not now public information and should be guarded with some disgression. There are informants everywhere, and there are probably more inside the pri-

Don Kemp Convicted!

The trial of Don Kemp began on January 14th and was over by the afternoon of the 18th. In actuality, the trial of Don was to determine whether or not he was insane at the time his wife was murdered; so the week in the Waukesha was in effect a sanity hearing. The jury was to determine: "whether or not a defendant was in a reasonable degree of medical certainty, did suffer from a mental disease or defect so as not to have the ability to appreciate the wrongfulness of his conduct or to conform his conduct to the specifications of the law." The jury was to give a yes or no answer to this, and after deliberating less than an hour, the jury unanimously voted that Don was sane.

Don has 90 days to appeal this decision, and in order to do so, we find that he is faced with the same problem that many other political prisoners are discovering -- he cannot find an attorney to handle his appeal. The appeal will first be presented in the State Supreme Court, and the higher court can make one of three decisions for trial. Either they can try the case themselves (which is unlikely because it will be a heavy precedent setting case); they can send the case back to Waukesha County (which probably won't happen because they have already had the case twice); or they can pass the hearing on to the Federal Supreme Court (which is probably what will eventually happen).

Don also has a criminal conspiracy suit filed against several individuals in his case. One of these people is a Dr. Cahill (the D. A. s prize witness) who was the only doctor that testified that Don was sane at the time of the shooting. All of the other professional people stated that he definitely was suffering from PVS. Though the majority of testimony was extremely technical in nature, it looks as though the jury didn't pay much attention to it because of the fact that they only deliberated for less than an hour.

The Defense Committee looks at the trial as a success in many ways. Many people in the conservative town of Waukesha were reached (as were people all over the state). Also, the D. A. was well exposed as a pig, and there is already a movement started to have him deposed at the up-coming election in which the D. A. is running for judge. The media in Milwaukee and Waukesha is doing a lot of good follow-up work, both around Don and the D. A., so the case of Don and PVS is far from being a dead issue.

The Defense Committee is somewhat concerned about the welfare of Don.

He is back in Waupun State Prison, and there may be some danger to his life be cause of the criminal conspiracy case that Don has filed. Because of this, people
are asked to send letters to the Warden at Waupun, asking that Don's welfare be
safe-guarded. The address is: Warden Gray, Box C, Waupun, Wisc. 53963.

Don's spirits are high and he sends his love to VVAW/WSO members everywhere. If people wish to write to Don and offer their support, he may be contacted at the same address as Warden Gray.


Amnesty -- Get DUPs Going ASAP

At the Yellow Springs NSCM, it was decided that from the "first of January, 1974 through late spring, major efforts will be made to set up official VVAW/WSO Discharge Upgrading Projects in all areas that it is feasible." This is just a timely reminder that NOW is the time we should be doing this. We know that we aren't going to go anywhere in our amnesty work unless we BUILD the amnesty campaign. On the basis of the strategy decided upon in Yellow Springs, this means, in large part, setting up and running VVAW/WSO DUPs.

Building the Amnesty movement has got to start with first making it a community issue. With our DUPs the focus of this, it is the CENTRAL TASK of our organization to develop an awareness of what amnesty means to our communities, an awareness that it is an issue that will directly effect the lives of a lot of people here in the U.S.

Bearing this in mind, we've got to keep our time schedule in perspective. It is only another 60 days or so before the regional "building actions" will be held in preparation for our national action in Washington this summer (again see Yellow Springs NSCM minutes). These regional building actions have got to be held in conjunction with setting up our DUPs and doing as much community outreach as possible. IF we are going to carry out the strategy passed in Yellow Springs, we have got to get it on now!

Less-Than-Honorable Discharges - Court Decision

The U. S. Court of Appeals for the Fifth Circuit (New Orleans), in Thompson v. Gallagher, handed down a decision on December 28, 1973, that establishes the constitutional principle that public employers may not discriminate against veterans with less-than-honorable discharges in their hiring practices. The case, which was received on appeal from the U. S. District Court for the Middle District of Louisiana, involved Tommy Thompson (Plaintiff) and the Honorable Harry K. Gallagher, Mayor for the City of Plaquemine, Louisiana (Defendant).

Tommy Thompson served in the United States Army for 22 months before being discharged under other-than-honorable conditions on May 14, 1970. He went to work for the City of Plaquemine, Louisiana, on December 16, 1971, as custodian at the city diesel plant. Five weeks later, the city council passed the following ordinance:

Resolved, that any person employed by the City of Plaquemine or by the Emergency Employment Act, if said person is a veteran, must have an honorable discharge and must be a man of good character.

The day after the ordinance was passed, the City of Plaquemine fired Thompson because his employment violated the ordinance. Thompson sued the Mayor of Plaquemine under 48 U. S. C. 1983, charging that his dismissal violated his rights under the due process and equal protection clauses of the Fourteenth Amendment, that it was a bill of attainder and that it was an expost facto law. Jurisdiction was asserted under 28 U. S. C. 1331, 1343, 2201 and 2202. Thompson sought a declaration that the ordinance as applied to him is unconstitutional, an injunction restraining the mayor from applying the ordinance to him, and an order reinstating him to his position at the power plant, with compensation for wages lost as a result of the dismissal. Thompson appealed, after the District Court ruled in favor of the City.

Thompson attacked the ordinance on both equal protection and due process grounds. The Court of Appeals stated in its decision, "The question is whether the challenged statute is a rational means of advancing a valid state interest. A regulation not reasonably related to a valid government interest may not stand in the face of a due process attack. Likewise, a classification which serves no rational purpose or which arbitrarily divides citizens into different classes and treats them differently violates the equal protection clause." The Court went on to say, "The ordinance thus creates two different classifications. First, it divides the employees of the city into veterans and non-veterans. In addition, it distinguishes between veterans with honorable discharges and those with other-than-honorable discharges."

In reversing the lower court decision, the Court of Appeals concluded by saying, "... The Plaquemine ordinance subjects veterans to standards to which non-veterans are not subjected. It also disqualifies veterans who have received other-than-honorable discharges, in spite of the fact that a veteran may receive a discharge for a wide range of reasons, many of them totally unrelated to performance as a city employee. By no stretch of the imagination could such

Police Attack N. Calif. Sub-Regional Coordinator -

On the night of February 6th, Bob Hood, sub-regional coordinator of N. Calif. VVAW/WSO was attacked and brutally beaten by Oakland police officers. Bob had stopped his truck to act as a witness for a friend who was being harassed by police only to have them turn on him instead. One officer proceeded to point a .38 at Bob and ordered him to put his hands up. When Bob complied, the cop suddenly knocked him to the ground and began choking and beating him. Nearly beaten unconscious, the two officers handcuffed Bob and threw him into a squad car. When they searched him they found a Swiss Army knife in his pocket. Saying something like "ahah a weapon", the cops began making jokes about how Bob had attacked with a knife. After a huddle to get their story straight, Oakland's finest then took Bob down to city jail and booked him for 'assault with a deadly weapon against a police officer.'

An escalating wave of repression has been going on with in Oakland ever since the actions of the 'Symbonese Liberation Army' came to light. Police had already failed in one bogus attempt in mid-January to link VVAW/WSO up with the SLA and the Marcus Foster slaying (see newsletter #18). Since then, Bob's house and office have been searched and members of the East Bay chapter have been under extensive surveillance.

The same night Bob was arrested, police stopped and interrogated a number of members of the East Bay chapter, asking them specifically if they were in VVAW/WSO. With SLA activities in Oakland and the current pressure they are under to solve the Hearst kidnapping the Oakland PD has responded with a wave of near hysteria. But perhaps more importantly, the situation has provided police with an excellent excuse for terrorizing movement people and intensifying their spying on movement organizations.

Reactions to the attack on Bob by the Oakland PD indicates that they may have made a bad mistake. The \$5,000 bail needed for Bob's release from jail was quickly raised. A number of groups such as Women for Peace and the Indochina Solidarity Committee showed their solidarity by filling the courtroom for his arraignment the following day. In addition, numerous individuals, groups and even a union local immediately began filing complaints with the DA's office and the community relations board of the police department.

This contemptible and outrageous frame-up will not be allowed... In Bob's words, "We are not worried because we have the truth on our side and all we have to do is lay out the facts so that 12 people from the community can see through the police lies."

Charges Against San Quentin Six Dismissed

Six black and Chicano defendants, charged with the murder of three white guards and two white prisoners in San Quentin prison in 1971, have all had the charges against them dismissed by Superior Court Judge Vernon Stoll. Judge Stoll announced his decision on January 17th, stating that the indictments were unconstitutional. Stoll ruled that blacks, Chicanos, youth and low-incomes workers had been systematically excluded from the grand jury which handed down the indictments. The government prosecution intends to appeal the judge's decision.

The San Quentin Six were charged after the shooting of August 21, 1971, which killed George Jackson, two other prisoners and three guards. The six were also charged with conspiring to escape from the "adjustment center" in San Quentin prison.

Lawyers are now planning to go to federal court to get the six transferred out of the San Quentin "adjustment center" into the main part of the prison. The men have been in maximum security units for the past four to seven years.

Vietnam-Era Women -- A New Organization

Three weeks ago in Chicago, a meeting was held to form a new organization of women -- Vietnam-Era Women. The purpose of this group is to unite women who are "relating" to veterans. This group is being funded and organized by the National Council of Churches, and is, in essence, the "ladies auxilliary" of the National Veterans Resource Project. The National Office was never notified of this Chicago meeting, nor have we received any contact from the NCC regarding this new group. If people are contacted by Vietnam-Era Women or have any information on the group's activities, information should be sent to the N.O.

New Indictments for Leavenworth Brothers

On February 7, a Kansas City, Kansas grand jury returned major indictments against brothers in the Leavenworth Federal Prison. The indictments relate to the July 31st uprising which took place in the prison. During the rebellion, four guards were taken hostage and one guard was killed. These new indictments are separate from the indictments which were handed down a few months ago charging Odell Bennett, Alf Hill and Alfred Jasper with inciting a mutiny and assaulting federal officers.

The charges and people involved in what may be considered the beginning of the grand jury indictments include: Odell Bennett, Jessie Lee Evans, Alf Hill and Alfred Jasper charged with murder, assault, and kidnapping. Also, William Hurst, Jesse Lopez and Armando Miramon were charged with kidnapping and assault. All of these brothers are members of the Leavenworth chapter of VVAW/WSO. If these people are convicted in the Leavenworth trials, they will have nothing to look forward to other than life imprisonment.

The grand jury also indicted two other brothers on charges unrelated to the July 31st rebellion. Eli Fiaaler was indicted for assault with intent to kill and LaCount Bly was charged with assault after escape. To the best of our know-ledge the grand jury is still deliberating and further, less severe indictments relating to July 31st are highly probable.

The Leavenworth Brothers Offense/Defense Committee is planning an action for February 18th called Operation Leavenworth. This action is to be a convoy led by Phillip Berrigan to Leavenworth where a demonstration and vigil is to be held. Car caravans from all over the states of Missouri and Kansas are expected to participate. Some problems have arisen in that Father Berrigan was prohibited by the Federal Parole Board from leading the march and vigil. He has assured the defense committee, however, that he will be participating in the action and providing his full support. The demonstration will put forward three demands to the Bureau of Prisons: 1. Comply with the July 31st negotiations of "no reprisals," and release all "Leavenworth Brothers" from the hole; 2. Drop the frame-up charges against brothers Odell Bennett, Alf Hill, and Alfred Jasper; and 3. Comply with the July 31st "13 grievances." More information about this action can be obtained from the defense committee.

The Leavenworth Brothers Offense/Defense Committee has a major request to make of regions and chapters. They need news clippings about the 31st uprising very badly in order to put together the press packet for the trials. Films for Fundraising and Political Discussion

(The following is a condensed version of a review which appeared in the Jan. 16th Guardian.)

"When the People Awake," made by anonymous Chilean filmmakers and the Tricontinental Film Center in New York, is a first-rate political documentary that offers a social history of Chile. The 60-minute color film traces the development of imperialism (first British, later U.S.) in Chile and then focuses on the first two-and-a-half years of the Allende Popular Unity government.

"When the People Awake" is a propaganda film in the best sense of the word. It educates and informs, creatively using historical photographs, newsreel clips and interviews, making its points with strong visual images as well as the spoken word. Particularly effective is an interview - broken up and used as an on-going contrast - with an upper-class woman representing the views of the Chilean right-wing parties. Likewise telling are shots of the "housewives" protest march in which it is clear that the bearers of the pots and pans are not on intimate terms with the daily realities that confronted Chile's working-class and peasant women. This is an important film, uncompromisingly anti-imperialist but equally uncompromising in its refusal to bow to the political cant of those who would weep for Chile while denying its self-evident political lessons.

Tricontental is also distributing a Swedish-made documentary on the Uruguayan "Tupamaros." Filmed clandestinely in Uruguay, "Tupamaros" includes unique footage of the urban guerrilla group's famed "People's Prison" and some of its most illustrious guests - among them British Ambassador Geoffrey Jackson and U.S. police agent Dan Mitrione (the subject of "State of Siege"). Like the Tupamaros themselves, the film is action-oriented. Its "theoretical" theses concentrate on the group's strategy for developing "parallel power" in Uruguay in order to offer the masses a believable revolutionary alternative. Both films are distributed by: Tricontinental Film Center, 244 West 27th St., New York, NY 10001.

regional report

March 29th -- Vietnam Veterans Day!

Our beloved President has recently declared that March 29th is to be set aside as Vietnam Veterans Day. There is to be a large parade in Washington, D.C. on that day and the D.C. VVAW/WSO chapter is already planning to participate in the action. Other chapters should check to see if similar activities are being planned in their regions and do whatever possible to plug into parades, etc. We should definitely make an effort to be visible on Vietnam Veterans Day and regions should notify the National Office of any action they plan to participate in on the 29th.

Many chapters around the country held demonstrations around the three demands of implementing the agreements, ending all aid to Thieu and Lon Nol; universal and unconditional amnesty for all war resisters; and kick Nixon Out!! There will be an article in the next issue of the Winter Soldier which will go into the details of where and when they occured.

One demonstration that occured was not covered in the news and we feel that we should explain what happened here. Six veterans, members of the VVAW/WSO chapter in Washington DC took over the Saigon Information Office of Psy/War Ministry. They planned to stay until the United States recognized its responsibility in implementing the agreements signed in Paris on January 27th of 1973. The vets went into the building at 12:30 on January 25th and stayed there for one hour when at such time the Executive Protection Service entered the building and arrested them. They are being charged with interference of a diplomatic mission. The trial date is March 6th in the US Superior Court in Washington DC. The members will present as their defense the entire question about the legality of the Theiu government in Saigon and the reasons for a continued office of psy/war in Washington DC. For more information write: VVAW/WSO, 2028 P Street NW, Washington DC 20036.

Other chapters that had demonstrations include: Miami, Florida; Chicago, Illinois; Milwaukee, Wisconsin; Denver, Colorado; San Francisco, California; Kansas City, Missouri; Rochester, Buffalo, New York City, New York; and Columbus, Ohio. If you had a demonstration let us know soon and send pictures and reports of the actions.

Film Showings -

The Columbus, Ohio chapter of VVAW/WSO recently held a fundraising film showing of Butch Cassidy and the Sundance Kid. About 1,600 people showed up and the chapter made about \$1,100 in receipts, literature sales and donations. Before the film showing they passed out copies of the amnesty booklet and are now getting some feedback from those who read it, (good feedback). The chapter is preparing a pamphlet on how to set up such film showings and any chapter that would like to do the same should write to VVAW/WSO, PO Box 10116, Columbus, Ohio 43201 for a copy. They are holding another film showing this week of MASH and expect to do even better.



Since the NSCM in Yellow Springs, several regions have increased their level of activity in doing PE work around the Lawton/Gardner trial. Colorado is doing leafletting in their chapter communities around the trial and the Maryland/Virginia/Washington, D. C. region is in the process of having petitions signed which demand the release of Lawton and Gardner and the dropping of all charges. If other similar activity is going on, copies of leaflets, etc. should be sent to the National Office.

In Ohio, the region has gotten two colleges to pay for Gary coming, and he will be doing a speaking tour of the region at the end of this month. If people are interested in attending and seeing Gary, he will be in Akron and Cleveland on Feb. 25th; Mansfield and Columbus on the 26th; Cincinnati on the 27th; and in Dayton on the 28th. Other regions should consider this idea and see if there is a possibility of getting honorariums for Gary to do speaking. This will be a big boost in educating people and building support around the trial on a nationwide basis and it will also draw in money for the defense. California is also in the process of planning a state-wide speaking tour for Gary or Chukia and more will be said about this later.

On the 12th, we will have available a four-page, newsprint handout on the Lawton/Gardner trial. These will be available for the regions and are to be ordered from this office. (The handouts are very similar to the ones that were produced for the Gainesville trial and demonstrations). We have only ordered 5,000 copies of the handouts because of financial problems, but if people would pay for the handouts that are ordered, we could order another run in the near future. Let us know how many you will need and please keep your orders reasonable so that we will not run out of the handouts in the immediate future.

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St. Louis Chapter Art Sale

From February 17-24, the St, Louis chapter of VVAW/WSO will be involved in a benefit art sale. The purpose of the sale is to raise money for the chapter project, the Chestnut Tree Coffehouse and to familiarize the community with the existance of this project. The chapter will be selling art work by local St. Louis-area artists and an exhibit of authentic engravings by the 18th century British satirist, William Hogarth, will also be shown. All proceeds from the sale will go to the coffeehouse which is making slow, but sure progress. To date, the building which houses the coffeehouse has been purchased from the city by the chapter. The restaurant is on the verge of opening and one five-room apartment unit has been fully renovated and is presently occupied. National Defense Committee Meeting

At the Defense Committee Workshop in Yellow Springs, it was decided that a meeting would be held in Chicago from February 23-25. Participating in this meeting will be people in VVAW/WSO who have had experience working with defense committees in the past. The purpose of the meeting is to define a way in which we can build a unified defense effort by preparing an analysis of past and current trials involving VVAW/WSO. Out of this, criteria for future involvement in political defense efforts will be outlined. Also, a training manual for defense workers is to be put together, so that people can be taught the political and mechanical processes of establishing defense efforts.

The Chicago and Milwaukee chapters are responsible for preparing the agenda and making preparations for the meeting. If chapters have suggestions for the meeting's agenda, items should be sent to the National Office (who will forward them to the chapters). Also, regions should notify N.O. as to how many people will be attending. Further information on this meeting and its results will be carried in the National Newsletter.

Operation County Fair

Enclosed is the February OCF Newsletter. In addition to our Chapters, the Newsletter was mailed to the 300 people on the OCF mailing list. If you know of doctors, nurses or anyone else who may be interested in receiving the Newsletter, let us know.

The clothing drive was very successful. In the process of delivering the clothes to the new Mall, the truck got stuck in the mud up to the axle. A lot of community members came over to help get the truck out; the excitement led to an enthusiastic community gathering. Thanks to the Friends of the United Front and all of our Chapters which helped make this project a success.

Linda Regnier and George Brazeau are now the only two VVAW/WSO people in Bogue Chitto. Diane Schmidt has taken an indefinite leave of absence, and Rich Craven has returned to St. Louis. They are desparately in need of some people who are willing to come down for two or three weeks to help with the physical labor at their house. They have no plumbing or out house, and they could really use a plumber to help them get their house together.

Three VVAW/WSO members from St. Louis, two registered nurses and one former hospital corpsman, will be moving to Bogue Chitto in early March to stay for about 4 months to help with organizing the health program in the community. Chapters should start looking for a dedicated person in their ranks that they could send down to Bogue Chitto in June (or earlier) to keep up the mementum after the St. Louis people leave.



At the Antioch National Steering Committee five people were nominated for the two positions of National Coordinator that will expire in April. Thus far two of the five have declined the nomination; Jeannie Dolly of Oakland, California and Barry Romo of the National Office. The following are their letters of declination.

January 30th, 1974

I wish to decline my nomination at the Yellow Springs NSCM for National office. I accepted the nomination on the floor of the meeting so that I could express to the entire organization why I feel that my nomination was incorrect and reflects a lack of seriousness in the way that some of us view the selection of leadership.

First, I assume that my nomination and second came from a favorable impression of my practice in the plenary sessions and workshops of the NSCM, the first and only one that I have attended. Except for two members of the California delegation, no one has any day to day practice with me. I am fully aware that I am articulate and give a strong impression in meetings. This quality, however is no basis on which to judge the quality of my daily work, nor my abilities to lead a national organization to which I have belonged for less than a year.

As we move more in the direction of the Winter Soldier concept, the organization as a whole appears to be accepting and strengthening the role of women in VVAW/WSO. I feel that the support that I have received from my nomination from members of the NSC is primarily because I am a woman. This points out two errors in thinking. I may well be one of the most qualified women in the organization to be in National Office. This does not mean that I am one of the most qualified people in the organization. Secondly, women do not develop leadership by being thrust into positions they are not prepared to fill. This way of developing woman's leadership is damaging to the organization and moreover to the woman herself. I have been in this position in other organizations and do not want to see VVAW/WSO repeat a clearly mistaken pattern.

I think that I am qualified in many respects to be in the National Office, but an not prepared to fill the position at this time due to the shortness of time that I have been in VVAW/WSO. I consider it an honor to be considered for a position of this responsibility, and thank those who have expressed their support for me.

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

For the past two years I have had the privilege of serving in the National Office. From this position I have been able to watch the organization grow and mature on a national and international level; weather the storms of government oppression without turning reformist or disintergrating; solidify its anti-imperialist stand and move forward to the point where we can all say, VVAW/WSO is one of the best mass organizations in the country.

It is therefore hard to decline the nomination for a third term. But the time has come for me to return to California to do work specifically around the Lawton/Gardner trial and help in building the local and regional organization, the real backbone and power of VVAW/WSO.

In April, 1972, when I was first elected to the National Office we were told to make the office into a collective. The next year and a half saw the struggle to build one. Some of the people elected saw themselves elected to serve themselves and not the organization. At the same time 'collective' to them meant going along with decisions they agreed with and disregarding decisions when they were in the minority. The resulting struggles in the collective and in the organization as a whole saw these people leave not only the national office, but VVAW/WSO to other organizations where they could be 'heavies'.

These struggles and the resulting experience have led me to some conclusions about service in the national office and the people elected to come here.

When electing people it is imperative to pick the most competent and experienced people available. People that have already proven their ability to struggle and work collectively in their respective regions and chapters. It is not enough to advocate people because of 'potential' and then hope that the person grows into the position. Not only must the person live and work in the pressure cooker atmosphere of the national office, but represent VVAW/WSO to national and international groups. He/she must be able to adapt to changing situations, accept criticisms and criticize without individualistic ego involvement. To do any less would be a disservice to the national collective, to the entire organization and to the people looking to VVAW/WSO for direction.

With this in mind and also my deep concern in seeing the national organization continue to grow, I now take the point of personal privilege in recommending two people to fill the two positions open at this time. The first being Sam Schorr and the other being Peter Zastrow.

I have worked with Sam for the last year in the collective and know from practice his ability for principled struggle and following collective decisions. Also the work he is doing in the office at this time is invaluable and must be completed.

I've known Pete for two years and have seen his excellent work at both the chapter and regional level. I have also attended national and international conferences with Pete and he has always represented the organization and not himself. He has consistantly been receptive to struggle excepting criticisms without becoming defensive and offering criticism without ego involvement. This observed practice makes him the best possible person for national office at this time.

I can only close by reaffirming my faith and dedication to the organization and to its direction, and to say that I am only leaving the day to day work of the national office for the day to day work of local. Build VVAW/WSO.

Anyone desiring LMDC to represent their clients before the Discharge Review Boards must supply us with the following information before the application is submitted:

- 1. A signed application. We will complete it and file it.
- 2. Complete service records.
- 3. Supporting documents.
- 4. Brief of the case to be submitted with the application.
- 5. Our questionnaire and retainer completed.
- 6. If applicant will appear, a detailed statement of his version of the case.
- 7. If he will not appear, a detailed affidavit of his version of the facts and an explanation in detail why he cannot appear.

We have 200 cases of our own and can only handle your hearings if you work the case up. We are not superhuman.

Do not just put down our name as counsel and file an application without contacting us.

Bob Hood Arraignment Date Set -

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It looks like the police of Oakland, California are out to nail Bob Hood, VVAW/WSO and the anti-imperialist movement. In the last newsletter, (#19), we described the brutal attack on Bob, completely unjustified by anything that Bob did. Besides being beaten, Bob has been charged with 'assault with a deadly weapon', (a pocket knife) and 'assault on a police officer'. Both these charges are felony offenses, carrying sentences of six months to life. On Friday, February 22, Bob was taken to a pre-trial hearing to determine if there is enough evidence to bring him to trial. Over 40 community people came to support Bob at the hearing.

It became apparent from the testimony of the police involved that the attack on Bob was part of a growing attempt to link VVAW/WSO with the actions of the SLA. During the hearing, it was determined that the policeman who beat Bob was a member of the Oakland 'red squad, (strange co-incidence!?) The police also stated that they were 'alerted' to be on the watch for members of VVAW/WSO because the organization was a violent group.

Again and again, the government and the police have tried to destroy VVAW/WSO primarily through frame-ups that have little relation to reality. In each case, they have used media propaganda to exhort on the theme that VVAW/WSC is violent and incites violence. By linking us with the SLA, they hope to remove us from any effective political work. This hasn't worked in the past, and will fail again.

Bob goes up for arraignment March 3rd in Super. Court where it is presumed a trial date will be set. The Bay area chapters are mobilizing a VVAW/WSO Defense Committee and building support among the community and other anti-imperialist groups. As one defense committee worker put it, "People are taking this case seriously because they see it as the first attempt to discredit movement groups by linking them up with the actions of the SLA. We will not allow Bob to go to jail nor allow the police to set-up the movement."

International Women's Day -- March 8th

March 8th is recognized around the world as International Women's Day. This holiday was instituted as an international day in 1910 and was set aside to honor working women and women involved in struggle everywhere. (A history of International Women's Day is contained in the March Issue of Winter Soldier).

It seems reasonable to guess that educationals and demonstrations regarding International Women's Day will be occurring on March 8th in cities across the country. VVAW/WSO should make every effort to plug into these activities or sponsor Women's Day events wherever possible. March 8th will be celebrated in countries around the world, and VVAW/WSO should make a point to also be involved in the celebrations. Reports on all Women's Day activities should be sent to the National Office.

At a time when women are taking leading roles in the struggles going on in this country, we must set aside March 8th to honor these sisters, as well as recognizing the progressive role played by women in struggles the world over.

By now, everyone should be familiar with the fact that the Federal Bureau of Prisons is conducting brutal and inhuman behavior modification projects in several federal and state prisons across the country. Knowledge as to the use of drugs and psycho-surgery in these programs, and prisoners' resistance to having their "behavior modified" has increased. Because of this, the Bureau of Prisons has come under severe pressure and this pressure has recently begun to take its toll.

On February 6th, the prisoners of this country gained a significant victory in their struggle as the Bureau of Prisons announced their decision to dismantle the behavior modification project in the Springfield, Missouri Federal Prison. The project START (Special Treatment and Rehabilitative Treatment) had become a target of hatred and resistance for federal prisoners across the country. The Bureau said that the decision to phase out the START program did not mean that the bureau was giving up on the concept of behavior modification, but that the decision was based on "economic" reasons. (Few inmates were involved in the program and the ratio of staff to inmates was so high as to make it not "feasible" to continue).

A week later, the government announced a ban on any further use of Federal anti-crime money for behavior modification, calling a halt of the programs it has funded for the systematic manipulation of the behavior of prisoners. It also banned the use of anti-crime money for psychosurgery, medical research and chemotherapy. The ban, effective immediately, was announced by Donald E. Santarelli, administrator of the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration. The decision means that prisons and other institutions now using LEAA funds for such things as drug experimentation and research will have to either cease operations or find other funding.

Though these two announcements may be seen as victories in the struggle for human and legal rights going on in our prisons, these decisions do not mean that behavior modification programs will come to a halt. For example, state prison systems will still have the freedom to establish behavior modification programs because they do not receive LEAA funds. Also, HEW is in the process of setting aside money for programs similar to START. Many questions regarding continued B. M. programs go unanswered. For example, the fate of the Butner, North Carolina special behavior modification facility has not been clarified. Millions of dollars have been spent on the project (including LEAA funds) and it is doubtful that the program will now be ceased as a result of these decisions. At the same time, future behavior modification facilities are in the works. A prison similar to the one in Butner is being designed for Portsmouth, New Hampshire. This facility will be constructed under the direction of six New England states and will house the so-called "troublemakers" of the prisons in the New England area. Though funds from LEAA have been stopped and though START is being phased out, we must view the cessation of future programs with a great deal of scepticism, and do everything we can to get the word on these "Pavlovian" projects to the American people.

At the Yellow Springs NSCM, the workshop on the National Defense Committee decided that a meeting would be held in Chicago on February 23-25 to draw'up 1) an analysis of past and current trials involving VVAW/WSO, 2) the criteria for future involvement in political defense efforts, and 3) the development of a training program to teach local members the political and mechanical process of establishing a local defense committee.

This meeting was held with over 13 people attending from Wisconsin, N. Illinoi Kansas, Colorado and the National Office. Overall it was very productive and result in the drafting of a working paper on these specific issues to be presented at the next NSCM in Milwaukee. As soon as all the various reports have been completed, the National Office will be sending them out for analysis and discussion by regions and chapters.

regional report

Milwaukee Student Committee -

The Milwaukee chapter of VVAW/WSO recently began a counter-recruiting drive in the area's high schools. A committee was set up to find high schools that were on the list of those to be the victims of military recruiting. The committee obtained several speaking engagements at various schools and have met with a tremendous amount of success. At one school, the members of the committee were asked to come back the next day, after they had shown the film "Army", to continue the discussions that soon led from the military to general conditions in the city and country.

The chapter began coordinating and working with the Wisconsin Youth for Democratic Education, (WYDE), a group of students who are organizing in their schools. This group publishes a monthly newspaper, The Red Pencil, which in the January issue had a story on the aims of VVAW/WSO.

On March 1st, the Student Committee of VVAW/WSO was invited to lead a school-wide seminar at Shorewood HS. The chapter plans to show "Army" and "Only the Beginning", in addition to discussing the war, various boycotts and the military recruiting. VVAW/WSO Oneonta Proposal for Hospital -

Homer Folks Hospital in Oneonta is owned by the State of New York and was used as a tuberculosis facility up until one year ago, when it was closed. Now the state is deciding what to do with this 200 acre hospital. Local people want the area used for veterans. Some veteran organizations, like the VFW, and American Legion want the hospital turned into a nursing home for older veterans.

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The Oneont apter of VVAW/WSO prepared proposal that was presented at hearings held by a state assemblyman. The VVAW-WSO proposal would call for low-rent housing for single and married veterans; a drug-free rehabilitation center for veterans; subsidization for veterans attending school who hold less-than-honorable discharges, who are in many cases unable to receive assistance; and special facilities for those veterans who are amputees, deaf, blind or otherwise disable.

The proposal also calls for the State of New York to turn the property over to Oneonta State University, who would advertise the facility to veterans interested in continuing their education. This proposal would allow for veterans to receive benefits presently denied them by the government; benefits that ask for no more and no less than the right to live a decent life. 
Person in Support of Leavenworth Brothers

On February 18th, over 200 supporters of the Leavenworth Brothers held a silent march and vigil at the U.S. Penitentiary at Leavenworth, Kansas. This demonstration was sponsored by the Leavenworth Brothers Offense/Defense Comm. Car Caravans approached the town of Leavenworth and contained people from Kansas, Missouri and Iowa. A rally was held and speakers included Phillip Berrigan and a VVAW/WSO member. (Berrigan had previously been barred by a federal parole board and prison Warden Daggett from participating in the march.) Following the rally, the demonstrators then silently marched in single file to the prison, with the first 26 people wearing the name and number of one of the brothers and with chains around their ankles. At the prison, a petition was presented to one of Daggett's assistants while the supporters stood in silent tribute to the brothers for 10 minutes. They then marched away singing. At the prison, the demonstrators were greeted with shouts and cheers coming from the cell blocks that could see the march. The petition to the warden demanded: 1. Release the Leavenworth Brothers from solitary confinement; 2. drop the charges against all the Leavenworth brothers; and 3. comply with the July 31st list of 13 prisoner grievances. The demonstration came off without a hitch and remained peaceful and free from police harassment.

Anti-Nixon Demonstration in Huntsville, Alabama

On February 18th, the Bogue Chitto chapter of VVAW/WSO, along with the Colma Coalition to Impeach Nixon demonstrated to Kick Nixon Out in Huntsville, Alabama. Nixon was in Huntsville to appear with George Wallace in the "Honor America" celebration which was conducted on Washington's Birthday.

Approximately 75 anti-Nixon people attended the speech and made themsolves extremely evident as they stood directly in front of the speaker's podium and held up signs reading: "Kick Nixon Out" and "Impeachment." The demonstrators received little harassment from the crowd and several people approached the anti-Nixon forces, asking if they too could carry a picket sign.

Cincinnati Groups Demonstrate Against Ford -

On Wednesday, February 20th, Vice-president Gerald Ford went to Cincinnati to speak in support of a local politician. His visit prompted a demonstration sponsored by the Throw the Burn Out Committee. The Cincinnati chapter of VVAW, WSO as well as the Columbus chapter participated. The demonstration focused on the energy freeze and the removal of Nixon from office.

About 250 people showed up and forced the VP to use the back entrance at the Cincinnati Convention Center, where he spoke. The demonstrators were spirited and made their presence felt by the numerous chants and songs.

Wherever Nixon and Ford go, they receive the same kind of reception. These demonstrations are a true reflection of the sentiment of the American people to get rid of all these crooks and to warn big business that we are tired of their exploitation of us and all the people of the world.

With the exception of one slogan, all of the items covered in the outline are in accordance with the SC workshop and proposal passed at that meeting. We would like the regions to read this and give us feedback. The one proposal that must still be voted on is the inclusion of "Kick Nixon Out". Please let us know about this ASAP.

Lawton/Gardner TribReport



The third trial of Gary Lawton and Zurebu Gardner is tentatively scheduled to begin on May 20, 1974. Pre-trial motions for a dismissal of the case are now being prepared and should be submitted and decided upon in the near future. For those of us who have been concerned about the lack of an attorney to defend Gary, our worries are over. A lawyer has been found. Chief Counsel for Gary will be Franklin (Skip) Glenn of San Jose, California. Skip worked on the San Quentin trials and will soon be moving to San Bernardino (his home town) to work on the case. Skip has been appointed by the court upon Gary's request, which means that his fees and expenses will be paid by the state. William Kuntsler will be assisting Skip with pre-trial motions for dismissal of the charges, and may also be working on some of the actual trial proceedings.

Enclosed is a four-page hand-out which was recently printed and is available for chapters and regions. We have approximately 4,500 of these hand-outs on hand, and we can order more if regions can use them. Regions should let us know how many of these leaflets they will be needing. If large orders are desired, (such as 1000), we would request that the regions pay for them so that we will have the money to order more copies in the future. The price for 1000 leaflets is \$15. Let us know as soon as possible how many hand-outs your region will be needing.

Gary will be available to do speaking gigs for regions prior to the starting of the trial. Several regions have expressed an interest in bringing Gary into their communities for the purpose of raising money and educating the public as to the severe racism and oppression involved in this trial. If chapters or regions can get colleges (or similar institutions) to finance expenses and honorariums for Gary, you should contact the Riverside Political Prisoners Defense Committee and fill them in on the details, so that scheduling and arrangements can be worked out.

Objective Changes

At the Yellow Springs NSCM, it was decided that the National Office would be given the responsibility of re-writing the 10 objectives in a more condensed and concise form. Regions are to have discussed their preferred changes in the objectives and have them sent to the N.O. by March 1st where the changes are to be compiled and sent back out to the regions by March 15th. In order to compile the regional suggestions, the N.O. must have received the suggestions and thus far, we have only heard from Colorado. One region has asked for an extension to March 8th and this extended deadline is acceptable. Other regions who wish to have their suggestions considered in the re-writing of the objectives must send the changes (or a note suggesting there be no change) as soon as possible. For more details on the objective re-writing, check the NSCM minutes from Yollow Springs. We hope to have a lot of in-put from the regions in this re-writing, so get your suggestions in the mail today!

In late January more than a dozen homes in Bogue Chitto received bags of groceries, Winter Soldier newspapers and other information along with personal visits from Linda and George. A lot of time is spent fixing up the Mall and visiting the community. The Mall is taking in money from clothing sales and is open on a regular basis with the help of community members. The Mall is a concrete block building located on the land on which the VVAW/WSO people live.

Linda has made contact with the Federation of Southern Cooperatives which has cooperatives in farming, small business, day care centers and health centers throughout the South. They provide research and training for its members, classes on conducting meetings and how to operate a board of directors, as well as the obvious value of cooperative ventures. The possibility of them assisting the Martin Luther King Jr. Clinic is being explored. More details will follow as we learn more about the FSC.

The lease on the building which will serve as the Martin Luther King Jr. Clinic was signed recently and will begin on April 15, 1974, the tentative opening day for the Clinic.

The Collective needs people who are willing to come down and do some physical labor. Even if it's for only two weeks, they can use the help. Look around your chapter and see if anyone is available.

Amnesty and Prison Reports

At the Yellow Springs NSCM, it was voted that regions and chapters would send in a monthly report to the National Office detailing the amnesty work that they are involved in. A few regions have sent such reports in, but we suspect that there is a lot more amnesty activity going on than we are hearing about. It is important that these reports be sent in if we are to get a comprehensive view of amnesty work and be able to coordinate amnesty efforts. Along these same lines, it was also decided at Yellow Springs that regions would provide reports on the prison work that they are involved in for the Prison Project Office. As with the amnesty reports, few prison reports have been received. These reports should include the type of work that is being done around prisons, as well as items for the prison newsletter (which will only come out if there is NEWS). In line with these NSCM decisions, we hope that regions will make a more conscientious effort to get these reports in to the N.O. on a more regular basis so that our project work can be better understood, analyzed, and coordinated.

Various other actions such as at the Discharge Review Boards, the Saigon and Cambodian embassies would have to be researched to the feasibility of having them and could be added to the scenario later. The 2nd and 3rd actions would build for the march and rally on July 4th. These actions would focus on VVAW/WSO whereas are march and rally could invite all organizations that agreed to the four demands of artire scenario. The educationals in the evening could include booths set up by agions and chapters that are working on specific projects, as was done at the Gainesville demonstration with much success. The major demonstrations would occur in the morning and would allow for, hopefully, good press coverage.

Demonstration Logistics Committee: This committee would be composed of people selected by the National Office Collective in accordance with the NSC proposal. These people would be responsible for procuring the needed equipment and supplies and would not constitute the leadership of the demonstration which would be led by the National Office Collective and the Regional Representatives.

Finances: A Budget will be drawn up by the National Office. Regions and chapters would be expected to provide financial assistance.

Logistics: A list of necessary equipment will be drawn up in the future.

Speakers: A speaker's list will be drawn up and the various individuals will be contacted by the National Office.

Legal Assistance/Medical: Will be firmed up in the future.

"Vashington DC Chapter: Will provide assistance to the DLC.

'Iding: Each chapter and region will be expected to build for the demonstration by the regional actions and individual projects and demonstrations. Chapters should utilize press contacts and try and obtain radio and TV spots if possible. Loaf-letting, postering and stickering are encouraged. The National Office will utilize the WINTER SOLDIER and the newsletter to put out information about the demonstration. A Poster will be printed as well as a handout.

OUTLINE OF AMNESTY DEMONSTRATIONS



At the Antioch National Steering Committee Meeting, the body passed a resolution calling for the organization to conduct concerted regional demonstrations which would help build for the national demonstration in Washington DC. The following is a proposal drafted by the National Office Collective in accordance with the decision of the NSC.

REGIONAL DEMONSTRATIONS

Dates: May 17-18, (Friday and Saturday)

Reason: These dates would occur approximately four weeks after the NSCM in Milwaukee and approximately six weeks prior to the National demonstration. It would allow enough time to plan for both successfully.

Scenario: Friday, May 17 - Imaginative actions around the VA offices.

Demand would be Single Type Discharge for All. Vets
and those listed in the VA Workshop Report - Dec '73.

Friday Night - Public meetings, focusing on all categories of amnesty and the VA actions of the day. Would be used to build for Sat.

Saturday, May 18 - March and Rally - Demands would be the same as the January 26-27 demonstrations: Implement the Agreements/End all Aid to Thieu and Lon Nol; Universal and Unconditional Amnesty for All War Resisters; Kick Nixon Out. This march and rally would focus on all categories of amnesty as opposed to the Friday actions which would focus on veterans. It would also serve to unite as many organizations as possible under the three demands.

These actions on May 17-18 would serve to focus on the upcoming demonstratio in Washington DC. It would also allow chapters and regions to gauge what kind of support they have in the community prior to building for the Washington demonstration.

WASHINGTON DEMONSTRATION

Dates: July 1-4, (Monday to Thursday)

Reasons: It would allow people three days travel time to Washington and three days back. Governmental offices would be open from the 1-3 of July. The demonstration would build for a culmination on July 4th. This is the one week of the year where most students would be off, and where many factories are closed, insuring as large a turnout as possible for the organization.

Slogans: Universal and Unconditional Amnesty for All War Resisters
Single Type Discharge for All Veterans
Implement the Agreements/End All Aid to Thieu and Lon NotKick Nixon Out
(The first three demands were chosen at the NSCM. We feel that the last
demand should have been included and need a straw vote on this to add it.
What with the climate in the country now for kicking him out of office it wow
be senseless to omit this from our demands. Let us know soon.

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Farah Strikers are Victorious!

The 3,500 striking Farah workers have won a victory in their battle for union recognition and decent wages and working conditions. On Sunday, Feb. 24th, Willie Farah (president and chief stock holder of Farah Manufacturing Co.) finally gave in to the demands of the strikers after a bitter 21 month fight. The strike settlement includes: Union recognition, a commitment from Farah to rehire 2,000 strikers fired for their efforts to build a union, and in addition Farah has agreed to pay strikers \$30 a week for 10 weeks or until they're rehired.

The Amalgamated Clothing Workers of America union officials noted the settlement is a major breakthrough in the campaign to organize the overwhelm-ingly unorganized clothing industry in the Southwest, which has long been a safe refuge for runaway shops which took advantage of the exploited labor of Chicano and women workers. The struggle of the Farah strikers also proved to blast the myth that women workers can't get organized. 80% of the Farah strikers were women.

Negotiations for a union contract began shortly after the union's recognition, and it may take a while to get the contract agreements settled. But the major victory has been won. The example of the Farah workers should be an example to working people throughout the country. They have proven that unity and struggle will inevitably lead to victory.

VIVA LA HUELGA!!

Leavenworth Brothers Convicted in First Trials

Two of the Leavenworth Brothers have already been tried on the charges which occured after the July 31st uprising. As was reported earlier, Odell Bennett and Alf Hill were indicted on assault and inciting a mutiny, while Alfred Jasper was indicted for assault and possession of a deadly weapon. Hill's trial on this charge began on March 4th, and Jasper's trial began on March 6th. Both of the brothers were found guilty on both counts. Odell's trial was scheduled to begin on the 1lth, but it has been temporarily postponed.

According to the Leavenworth Brothers Offense/Defense Committee, the trials of Alf and Alfred were a real joke. Both brothers were tried by an all-white jury in the somewhat reactionary community of Topeka, Kansas. 26 prospective jurors were called for the Hill trial, and 12 were selected. The jurors for Jasper's trial were announced to be those remaining in the 26 who did not hear the Hill case. The defense noted to Judge Templar that 10 of the 26 prospective jurors for the Hill case had been challenged by the defense, but the protest fell on the deaf ears of the judge. So, the trials continued and both were convicted. Sentencing has not been completed yet, but the maximum sentence that both brothers could receive is 20 years.

This is just the beginning of trials for the Leavenworth Brothers. Odell's trial for this first indictments is still to come and remains unscheduled. Also, there has been no trial date set for the trials of the major indictments, though they may not come to trial for another 3-4 months. Bennett, Hill, and Jasper, as well as Jesse Lee Evans have also been indicted for murder, kidnapping and assault as a result of the July 31st rebellion. Also, William Hurst, Jesse Lopez and Armando Miramon have been indicted for kidnapping and assault. More indictments may be handed down in the future which relate to the 31st uprising.



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Lawton-Gardner Trial

Enclosed with this newsletter is a copy of a petition which was put together by the Lawton-Gardner Offense/Defense Committee. The petition demands that the charges against Gary and Zurebu be dropped before the third trial begins. People should make every effort to get these petitions completed, and reproduce bulk copies in your chapter for the purpose of getting as many signatures as possible from people across the country to show the government of Riverside that we abhor this racist frame-up. These petitions should be returned to the Lawton-Gardner Offense/Defense Committee. Chapters and regions should also continue to discuss the possibilities of having Gary speak in your community. The Ohio speaking tour was quite successful and a total of approximately \$850 was raised for the defense, as well as being a very good method of getting the word on this case out to the public. If chapters are interested, they should contact the Lawton-Gardner Offense/Defense Committee to make arrangements. Getting your local college campus to sponsor the speaking by providing honorariums will be the best method of raising the money to pay for plane-fare, and speaking engagements should be set up in other parts of the community as well. The Chicago and Milwaukee chapters are planning a benefit for Gary, and he should be speaking there some time next month. Also, the California region is planning a state-wide speaking tour for Gary and Chukia. 
Nixon Coming to Chicago!

Nixon will be making his first appearance in a "northern" state since his election. Our beloved president is planning to speak at a businessmen's luncheon on March 15th at the Conrad Hilton Hotel. This is the first time that Nixon will be speaking at a semi-public event that is not being held in the deep south (which has been a strong-hold of Nixon supporters). Nearly every "left" organization in the city has banded together to hold a demonstration on the 15th outside the Hilton. The Chicago and Milwaukee chapters of VVAW/WSO will be there in full force, making the sentiment of "Kick Nixon Out" known to the man. Thousands of people are expected to be at this demo which should be a strong statement that Nixon and the policies he represents are no longer wanted in office. Details on the demo will appear in a later newsletter, but people should be aware that Nixon is traveling into hostile territory for the first time and be watching for the results.

An informant for the Waukesha Sheriff's Department was recently unconvered in the Milwaukee chapter of VVAW/WSO. In addition to providing security information on the organization to the police and attempting to destroy the chapter, the informant, Mary Ellen Miles (maiden name Mary Ellen Voelker), had apparently been trying to set up drug busts and parole violations on chapter members.

Mary Ellen Miles had first come into contact with VVAW/WSO through our prison project at Waupun State Penitentiary, where her husband is an inmate, in June, 1973. Rapidly developing a great interest in the organization, and especially its prison work, she more-or-less had joined by the 1973 Milwaukee VVAW/WSO Labor Day Parade. By October, 1973 she was making statements about how VVAW/WSO needed a national prison project, giving indications to a number of chapter members that she'd really like to have a lot to do with it. Only a few months after joining the organization, Miles was already traveling to the National Office to discuss just such a prison project proposal.

By early November, Miles was noticed to have been pushing a number of strange and paranoid rumors around the chapter. A lot of what she seemed to be driving at was the need for chapter members to be armed to 'protect themselves' from some indistinct threat. It was shortly thereafter that a responsible source indicated that Miles was in fact a police informer. As nothing subsistantial in the way of proof could be obtained, she naturally denied the charge when confronted in a chapter meeting.

It was at this point that she began noticeably dividing the chapter. As suspicions about her had been voiced, and as she was noticed to be involved in a lot of rumor mongering and showed an undue interest in the subject of drugs, a number of chapter members became very alarmed about her. Things she did, such as being very aggressive about always trying to answer the office telephone, increasingly put people on their guard against her. Miles used this to drive a wedge between those who were closest to her as friends and those who were becoming overtly hostile to her. She seemed to have been aware that there were some internal chapter contradictions between the older E. Milwaukee chapter members and the somewhat newer W. Milwaukee chapter members. In any case, it was largely the W. Milwaukee chapter members that she established her closest personal friendships with and the ones she tried to rally around her.

The first specific attack she was active in fomenting came with the selection of the Wisconsin VVAW/WSO delegation to the Yellow Springs NSCM. She began this by launching an attack on a person in leadership in the chapter in hopes of 1)seeing her prevented from going to the NSCM, (Mary Miles of course wanted to go herself). and 2) trying to strengthen her cover in the chapter as the person she was attacking was one of those most suspicious of her. During this struggle, divisions in the chapter



became very acute and certain members began taking exceedingly reactionary stands in favor of the Mary Miles position. Again, these people were those who she had formed the closest personal friendships with.

Things progressed in this manner after the NSCM throughout January and early Feb. with the chapter remaining very divided and in danger of splitting. Given the name of one individual reportedly sent to prison as a result of Miles' testimony, the chapter passed a motion on Feb. 23 freezing her from any organizational duties until it could be checked out. At this point the still developing split in the chapter became full blown. Despite the chapter ruling on the 'freezing' of Mary Ellen Miles, one of the committees under the influence of her close personal friends decided that they would not abide by the decision.

Fortunately, the chapter came into concrete evidence at this juncture proving that Miles did in fact work for the police. A Milwaukee attorney had advised them that Mary Ellen Miles had testified for Waukesha police against a client of his in a drug case in 1972. With court documents from the trial he provided them, they learned the following:

- 1. That she had been busted on a heroin charge (along with her husband) July 12, 1972, and that she was busted on a second drug charge on Aug. 20, 1972.
- 2. That on Oct. 4, 1972 she set up a heroin bust on a number of people in Waukesha, Wis.
- 3. That she testified for the Waukesha Sheriffs Dept. on this bust at the trial held on Dec. 27, 1972 admitting that she had been "wired with a wireless transmitter during the bust;" that she had led to the arrest of at least 11 and maybe up to 50 people on drugs offenses; and that she had been working for the police all along.
- 4. That the arresting officers in the Dec. 27th trial were the same ones that had arrested Mary Miles and her husband earlier that summer.

From other court documents provided the chapter by the attorney, they also learned that:

- 1. On April 27, 1973, both drug charges against Mary Miles were dismissed.
- 2. The same State's attorney who moved for dismissal in this was the same individual that prosecuted the Dec. 27, 1972 trial that Mary Miles had testified in for the prosecution.

Given this evidence, the chapter held a meeting on 2 March 1974 where it was publically disclosed. A vote was then taken and Mary Miles was thrown out of the organization. Despite the overwhelming proof of her work as a police informant, there were still 3 people who voted against kicking her out of the chapter - again the personal friends she had cultivated and was still manipulating.

Hopefully this accounting of the role Mary Ellen Miles played in the Milwaukee chapter will give people a better idea of how police agents operate, what pitfall to avoid and to remind us all how serious the matter is: it cannot be taken lightly.

Certainly Miles was/is a very disturbed person with a history of serious drug problems. Apparently she had been compromised by her earlier drug busts and, at least initially, forced into serving as a police informant. It is a classic police method of obtaining informants. But this cannot change the fact that she did attempt to place herself in a very sensitive position in the organization nationally. Nor can it change the fact that she nearly succeeded in splitting the Milwaukee chapter or that she did succeed in urging chapter members to take exceedingly foolish and reactionary stands based solely on 'personal friendships' and totally divorced from any sound political judgement or just plain common sense. And finally, it cannot change the fact that she did approach chapter members about obtaining drugs or that she did suggest people obtain firearms even though for the individuals concerned it would have meant a parole violation.

There are some very basic lessons we must learn or relearn from this experience. One is that we are always going to have police agents of this sort attempting to penetrate our organization, to disrupt its activities, discredit its work and to actually put our members in jail. To assume otherwise is gross irresponsibility. We are a political organization and have got to fully understand what that means in our society.


Another is a basic fact of life in political organizations: Dope and politics spell disaster. Either politically in terms of the way dope charges would smear our name and discredit our work or politically and physically in terms of sending our people to jail. It is clear from the activities of Mary Ellen Miles, that the police are more than interested in trying to use dope as a weapon against us.

Finally, we should learn from the methods or tactics she used against us. She used existing differences in the organization, built around them and tried to further divide the organization at that point. She formed close-knit personal friendships and manipulated them in a divisive and disruptive manner. People were vulnerable to such manipulation because they did not operate on the basis of political judgement but from personal feelings and friendships. She also tried to organize personal attacks on chapter leadership in an attempt to weaken the organization and strengthen her position and her cover. These are all classic police tactics. We've got to learn from them if we are going to be successful with dealing with them in the future.

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Melvin Smith's Trial Postponed!

The issue of VVAW/WSO GI News that is enclosed with this mailing went to press and since then, the news has come in that the trial of Melvin Smith has been postponed to April 8th due to the unavailability of witnesses. 

34 years old

Miscellaneous: Represented VVAW/WSO in Paris in Dec. 1973 at the Conference of Solidarity with the Cambodian People.

Political History: Joined SDS immediately after release from service and stayed until the summer of 1969.

Dropped out and moved to Israel in Oct. 1969, returned to states, July 1970. Started a Vets for Peace club at school which later became a VVAW/WSO chapter.

Worked at VA hospital as a drug counselor on their Methadone program until bombing of Hanoi.

Regional Coordinator of California VVAW/WSO from June 1972 to Jan. 1973. National Coordinator from January, 1973 to present.

Participated in WSI in Detroit, 1971 and in Dewey Canyon III

Miscellaneous: VVAW/WSO delegate to 10th World Festival of Youth and Students, August, 1973.

Current functions in National Collective: Fund raiser, financial records, legal and incorporation, office machines, W.S. subs and literature sales.



Security Information -- A Compilation of Trends, Tactics, and Interest

During the past two months or so, there has been a significant increase in the number of FBI contacts and related incidents in and around the organization. Since these have not been incidents isolated to one or two areas of the country, it was felt that a general summation of what seems to be the overall pattern of such activity would put us in a better position to deal with it in the future and to better understand what may be behind it.

In addition to the surfacing of a police agent in one chapter, since the beginning of 1974, there has been a steady flow of FBI contacts, attempts to interview members, harrassment of members around their jobs, anonymous or crank phone calls often trying to seek information about active VVAW/WSO members, overt surveillance, and so forth. While it is naturally impossible to completely analyze what this all means, there are a number of general statements that can be made:





- 1. The FBI is under a lot of pressure to solve the Hearst/SLA kidnapping. As a result, they have put a blanket surveillance step-up on a number of movement organizations and individuals that they think might possibly have leads on the kidnapping. (It's also a good excuse for them to step-up plain old general political repression). The FBI is clearly making a routine check of VVAW/WSO to this end for any tie-ins between VVAW/WSO and the SLA nonsense. This sort of intensification in the level of surveillance is typical of other periods in the organization's history when major political incidents were occuring (such as Wounded Knee, the 1972 Miami Conventions, etc.)
- 2. The FBI has repeatedly been trying to pump our members for all information about our politics and the directions the organization is headed in politically. They want to know what our objectives are, are they going to change, what are we going to do around amnesty, do we want to end the draft, etc. They have made a real point of asking about Marxist influence in the organization, and specifically about any Marxist leanings in specific individuals in the leadership of the organization. They realize that the organization is not just doing work around Indochina and want to know as much as possible about what we are and what we will be doing. Additionally, it's also clear to them that VVAW/WSO has got itself together a lot more over the past year than they'd care to see us. As a result, their interest in us has correspondingly increased.
- 3. There has also been a great deal of questions asked about the subject of dope: do we use it, is it very common in the organization, do certain people deal in narcotics, does the organization support itself by selling dope, etc. Given the miserable showing they made around grand juries/conspiracy charges and the like during Gainesville, they are very interested in trying to nail us with a different type of attack. If they can manufacture a dope bust it would be tailor-made for their purposes.
- 4. After failure to destroy the organization with the trial of the Gainesville 8, there was an initial period during which the FBI seemed to pull back and let things cool off. There was just too much egg on their face behind Watergate, Nixon's crimes, and FBI agents falling out of courtroom broomclosets. Now they have evidently resumed the attack, taking up where they left off. A generalized tactic in all this is a stepped-up campaign of intimidation; constant reminders that they are watching us and know "what we're up to." A good reason why a lot of this is occuring is a hope that they can scare off membership and prevent us from growing. It is not just coincidence that many of the more recent FBI contacts have been with new members, members on the fringe of the organization.
- 5. Part and parcel of this is an indication that they may be planning to wage a slander campaign against us, to discredit the organization and portray it as a bunch of doped-up, bomb-throwing crazies. It was not mere coincidence that Rep. Ichord of HISC recently labeled us as "one of the groups most likely to move into terrorist activities." In a period of rapidly increasing political repression (which we are most definitely in), libelous attacks of this nature are naturally going to increase and become more vicious.

Obviously this is not all that could be said but it does put things into a general sort of perspective. We will continue to have to put up with harassment and intimidation of this sort and must adjust to it as best we can. The more we are deflected from the day-to-day conduct of our political work, the more successful the FBI is in its activities -- a fact we can never lose sight of in conducting our work.

If there are any general rules-of-thumb that we should try and follow, it should be keeping the work we are doing primary, remembering we are an open, mass organization and that our activities should be out-front and legal -- any links with illegal activities such as dope, etc. are simply out of the question. If and when we are approached by the FBI or other police agencies, we should remember that our best interests are the last thing they have in mind. We should be polite; politely telling them we will not talk to them. If we are arrested, we cannot allow ourselves to be jammed into saying anything unless it's in the presence of our lawyers. We may have said this hundreds of times but people all too often seem to forget it. For our own protection, we've got to remember it.

* * * * * * *

The following are a few examples of things to watch for in terms of what the FBI has in the past tried to elicit in the way of information from us and the general tactics they have used to do this. If chapters or regions have any additional suggestions to add they should send them to the National Office and we'll try and get them out in the newsletter.

TACTICS, INTERROGATION TECHNIQUES, ETC. (Not necessarily in order)

- 1 Provocateurs trying to sell members guns, bombs, tear gas or similar contraband material. ("Do you know any demo experts?" seems to be very common.)
- 2. Attempts to get members to buy or sell narcotics, including marijuana.
- 3. Trying to intimidate people with the physical presence of a real live agent

 -- experience has shown that many people seem to come totally unglued
 and forget everything they know about good common sense.
- 4. Approaching parents of members, trying to convince them that they can "help their son or daughter out" by giving them information.
- 5. Approaching weak or naive members of the organization -- often fringe or new members.
- 6. Manipulating people who are vulnerable due to recent busts, (usually drugs), parole violations, etc. to act as informants.
- 7. Trying to exploit personal grudges or internal organizational struggles to get people to give them information.
- 8. Contacting employers, trying to get people fired, or asking them for information on members.
- 9. Increased surveillance, contacts, etc. should be expected around major political events such as Wounded Knee, SLA, etc.
- 10. Phoney calls to catch people off their guard and get them to either say something stupid or to devulge some form of information.

- 11. Surveillance of personal and organizational mail through "mail covers,"
- 12. Getting people to talk with them by letting them think they are under arrest etc. The line here seems to go, "Get in the car" or "Come down to our office, we'd like to talk to you." People often assume that they are being ordered, not asked to do so.
- 13. Dropping information to people and trying to elicit their interest and get them to pursue the conversation -- bait such as this is never dropped accidentally; people trying to "outsmart" them are always going to end up losing.
- 14. Using a very familiar, friendly approach: "Say, John, you're not like the rest," or "we know that you're alright," or "you're a good dude". People have repeatedly fallen for this thinking that this particular agent is really a good guy and he is the one that is different from all other agents.
- 15. Trying to throw people off their guard by saying something like, "we know you're not involved in such and such," or that "you're not violent, etc." but what we'd like to know about is... "and it has nothing to do with you."
- 16. Trying to engage members in political arguments to see where they are politically "coming from."

AREAS OF INTEREST FOR THE FBI (Again, not in any specific order)

- 1. VVAW/WSO's politics: what are the objectives, what are we doing around amnesty, do we want to end the draft, etc.
- 2. Information on the personal life and personal political beliefs of individual members, particularly members in leadership positions. ("Do they have a record, are they on parole, what did they do in "nam", etc.)
- 3. Anything to do with dope.
- 4. Anything to do with guns, bombs, or "violence oriented" attitudes or statements made by members.
- 5. Information on credit card telephone fraud -- this is something that should be avoided totally.
- 6. Personal and internal organizational feuds.
- 7. Our National Steering Committee Meetings
- 8. Leading questions like "why are we so paranoid" and "why don't you trust us. "
- 9. Sources of organizational or personal funds.
- 10. Our regional and national actions: "what are we planning?"
- 11. "Will the organization continue to exist now that the war's over?"

Hopefully, people will read this information in the context in which it was written -- it is not meant to scare people or designed to provoke a wave of paranoia and ensnare the organization in a wave of "ultra-security consciousness." The last thing we want to do is get overly caught up in security and lose sight of what we are really all about. However, these are unfortunately the facts of life in a movement organization, information we should all share, and conditions that we must adapt to as an organization.

The following request was sent to us from the PVS Clearinghouse in Milwaukee. It concerns the case of William A. McFarland convicted of 2nd degree murder.



Flash: Police Attack Lawton-Gardner Offense/Defense Committee Members!

Riverside police attacked members of the LGODC as they waited in the Riverside Courthouse for the trial of William Palmer. Palmer, a member of the comm., was being tried on a phoney charge of supposedly 'assualting a police officer with a rusty hubcap.' Palmer was set up on this because of his relationship to the Lawton-Gardner trial. Amid a series of community struggles around police brutality, Palmer had been shot in the back by RPD officers shortly before the 1971 murder of two RPD officers that Lawton and Gardner are now charged with.

A picket line protesting the continuing police harrassment of both Palmer and Zurebu Gardner had been set up in front of RPD headquarters on March 22nd. The picket was very successful and had done a lot to expose the incredible police repressive surrounding the Lawton-Gardner trial. A leaflet distributed at this picket asked people to attend Palmer's trial on March 25th. Apparently, police officials decided that this would be a good opportunity to provoke an incident to try and stop future protest of their racist repression.

While members of the LGODC waited in the hall outside the courtroom, an RPD detective arrested Palmer's 14 year-old son on a 'burglary' charge. This prompted Palmer, Gardner, Chukia Lawton and Beverly Ruelle of the committee to demand to see the warrant for the arrest. Instead of producing one, the detective began striking Zurebu in the face and yelling for reinforcements. With cops swarming all over the place, Palmer was thrown on the floor, and Zurebu and Chukia viciously beaten. Chukia was choked unconscious and seriously injured on the arm and neck.

Palmer, Gardner, Ruelle, and Chukia Lawton were then arrested and hauled off to jail. Palmer and Gardner were charged with intent to do great bodily harm to a police officer, battery on a police officer and felonious resisting of arrest. Chukia and Beverly were only charged with the last two counts. Beverly was later released on an OR bond and Chukia was released, after a great deal of harrassment, on posting \$1,500 of a \$5,000 bond. Palmer is currently in jail under a \$25,000 bail and Zurebu under \$10,000. Newsreleases updating this will be sent out ASAP.

During the week of March 18th, Gary was in northern California doing speaking gigs at various colleges and community gatherings. People should be aware that a party was held for Gary while he was in Oakland and donations were taken at that party. Gary turned around and donated the money raised at the party to the VVAW/WSO Legal Defense Committee which is defending Bob Hood. Bob Hood Defense Committee Formed

VVAW/WSO in the Oakland and Bay Area has recently formed the VVAW/WSO Legal Defense Committee. The primary purpose of this committee will be to defend Bob Hood against the frame-up charges which have been brought against him by the Oakland Police Dept. The charges of assault on a police officer were brought against Bob after he was brutally beaten by police while trying to insure the rights of a friend who was being harassed. After the beating of Bob, police found a Swiss Army knife in his pocket, and charged him with assault with a deadly weapon. Bob could receive a prison sententence of six months to life if he is found guilty.

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
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of California) is just another in the long line of attempts to discredit and destroy VVAW/WSO. With the kidnapping of Patricia Hearst, the Bay Area police have unleashed a reign of terror on the "movement" in northern California. Thus far, Bob has been the most blatant victim of this increased police repression. Bob must be defended because his defense is the defense of VVAW/WSO. The defense committee has made two requests: 1. that chapters not send money for the defense because if money is raised, they would rather see it go to the defense of Gary Lawton and Zurebu Gardner; and 2. that letters protesting the harassment of VVAW/WSO and the frame-up of Bob be sent to the District Attorney and Police Department. Leavenworth Brothers Up-Date

The situation surrounding the Leavenworth Brothers has grown increasingly more absurd during the past week (and increased absurdity is getting hard to imagine). As was reported in this month's issue of Winter Soldier, one of the brothers, William Hurst, has been held separate from the rest of the six indicted brothers. Hurst was transferred to Marion shortly after the July 31st uprising occured, and has since been sent to the Wyandotte County Jail during the pre-trial proceedings and court hearings. The real reason why Hurst has been separated is not known, though it is strange that as the only white brother who has been charged he is being separated from his black and Chicano brothers now in Leavenworth. On March 20th, an inmate was discovered after having been strangled to death in the County Jail. A few days later, William Hurst was charged with the murder of this prisoner. At about the same time as the body was found, four deputies in the jail were discharged for reasons of brutality, but it is not yet known if the two incidents are tied together. The situation surrounding this inmate's death are still very unclear and not much is being said by jail officials, so more details will be forthcom-

Colorado Region Supports Denver Chicano Community

On March 17th, Colorado chapters of VVAW/WSO joined the Chicano community in Denver to support the National and International Day of Solidarity with the Crusade for Justice and the Chicano Movement. A march and rally was held on the 17th in commemoration of events which took place a year ago in which Luis "Junior" Martinez (a member of the Chicano community) was murdered by Denver police. Over 1500 people turned out for the march and rally to demand: solidarity with the Chicano movement, solidarity against political repression, the release of all political prisoners, the ceasing of political frame-ups, and that the memory of Martinez live on. The day was a major political event for the Chicano community and VVAW/WSO was the only predominently white organization to sponsor the Crusade for Justice activity.

Southern California Slide Show on V.A.

The California sub-regional office and Long Beach chapter have been discussing the idea of putting together a slide show on VA hospitals as a means of exposing the manner in which veterans are treated by the Veterans Administration. If chapters have had experience in confronting the VA, know of horror-stories about the VA, or have photos, etc. they should contact the Long Beach office at: VVAW/WSO, 1810 E. Anahiem, Long Beach, Calif. 90813 and let the people there know what sort of information you have available.

Miami VVAW/WSO Counter Recruitment -

Each year a Youth Fair is held in Dade County, Florida. This year as in the past the US military had displays on the various armed forces in order to recruit the young into the war machine. The Miami chapter of VVAW/WSO went to court in order to be given a booth at the fair to counter the lies of the military. The court ruled in our favor, and a booth was set up on the 10th day of the 11 day fair. During th the chapter passed out 6,000 leaflets, sold over 300 copies of Winter Soldier and passed out old copies of the paper and other information. They felt that for the time they were there, a good majority of the people agreed with their point of view.

The booth they were given was in the midst of the recruiting booths; the VVAW/WSO booth just 15 feet from the USMC physical fitness competition platform. The military people were fairly hostile to the VVAW/WSO chapter, but the people at the fair weren't. Counter-recruitment is happening around the country. Now that the volunteer army is in effect, it would be a good idea for chapters to find out more about how to get included in fairs, schools, etc., that allow the military a chance to peddle their wares. Buffalo Film Showings -


The Buffalo, New York chapter of VVAW/WSO has begun a series of film showings in their storefront. The films vary from The Murder of Fred Hampton to Red Detachment of Women. Other films in the series show the anti-imperialist struggles taking place in Guatemala, Palestine and Mozambique. Several of the films deal with the history of the labor struggles in the US.

The chapter is getting the films from Ohio Newsreel, Tri-continental and New York Newreel. They find that the films do to things: first, they are making this information available to a wide number of people in the Buffalo area and second, they are learning about these struggles themselves. In the near future they will begin using these film showings to raise money for the chapter. In the meantime they suggest that other chapters try the same program. Proposed Objective Changes

Enclosed with this newsletter is a draft copy of the proposed objectives. As decided in Yellow Springs, the national collective was given the task of compiling and re-writing the national objectives based on input from each region. National was then to send out the re-worked objectives to the regions for their discussion prior to the Milwaukee NSCM. The enclosed draft is the result of our efforts. We must point out that only five regions submitted proposals and those regions that did not submit anything should criticize themselves for this failure to act upon Steering Committee decisions.

Before getting into the actual wording of the objectives, the collective decided on several criterion that we used as a basis for discussion. First, was the objective anti-imperialist in nature and did it push forward the antiimperialist struggle?; second, was it as BROAD as possible without losing its content?; third, was it as concise as possible?; and fourth, was it focused on a major contradiction in the imperialist system. The reason for the first criterion is self-evident; we are an anti-imperialist organization. Secondly, we felt the objectives should be as broad as possible so that they effectively expressed the feelings of members who may differ on the particulars of the contradiction but agree on the nature of the general problem. Thirdly, we felt that the objectives should be as concise as possible to avoid lengthy descriptions that do not have to be included in the objectives. Lastly, we felt that the objectives should focus on major contradictions because these are the points that the majority of people can unite around in the anti-imperialist struggle (though they do not exclude contradictions or struggles related to the same area of discussion). We wanted to avoid spelling out every struggle. that exists in the U.S., while providing the basis for work on those struggles which are not specifically mentioned.

would understand where our name comes from. This was to be tied into a preamble to the objectives. We agree that there should be a preamble that provides a broad perspective on VVAW/WSO's work. We also felt that the preamble must be concise, though even a little rhetorical, to convey our understanding that the problem facing us today is the system of imperialism.

Finally, we tried to incorporate all the suggestions submitted and mentioned from the regions. There were many conflicting points of view and on these, we tried to broadly define the problem so that both views were included. Please come to Milwaukee prepared with the outlook that these are national objectives and must apply to the perspectives and work of the entire organization.



PVS Brochure

Enclosed is a brochure entitled "Post-Vietnam Struggle - The Psychological Contradictions of Vietnam Veterans." The brochure was a joint project of the PVS Clearinghouse and the National Office and is intended as a concise analysis of the problem for both members and non-members. This brochure will now give interested people an alternative to buying and reading the lengthy PVS Library if they want to learn about PVS. Interested people will always have the option of investing in the Library. It also allows us to do more mass work in this area now that we have something to handout.

While we're on the subject, please keep in mind that the PVS Clearinghouse relies on conscientious people across the country to take the time to clip articles from newspapers and magazines that concern PVS - either articles analyzing PVS and/or stories on effects, such as a Vietnam vet involved in a shoot-out or suicide. Individually these incidents may bare no relationship to PVS, but collectively they offer important evidence on the effects of the War. Please keep an eye open for articles. Also, people may be interested to know that Penthouse Magazine began a series on the problems facing Vietnam veterans in their March issue.



House Judiciary Committee Holds Hearings On Amnesty-VVAW/WSO Barred!

The U.S. House Judiciary Comm. recently held a week of subcommittee hearings on amnesty legislation which barred participation from a number of groups representing people directly affected by the need for an amnesty. Headed by Rep. Kastenmier of Wisconsin, these hearings only took testimony from anti-amnesty groups such as the Pentagon, the VFW and the American Legion and from proamnesty groups for the most part representing liberal church organizations. Ed Damato of VVAW/WSO's National Amnesty Clearinghouse was flatly refused permission to read a brief statement on how amnesty affects the more than one half million badly discharged veterans by Rep. Kastenmier who said to him, "how dare you assume to represent veterans!" Other groups similarly refused entry into the committee's hearings included Walter Collins of SCEF, a political prisoner that did nearly 3 years in a federal prison for refusing the draft, and Sandy Rutherford, a wife of an exile in Canada and a representative of the Vancouver American Exiles Association.

Terry Seltzer, Regional Coordinator for the Md.-Washington, D.C. region of VVAW/WSO, had tried for over two weeks to arrange for this testimony from VVAW/WSO and had been led to believe that we and other groups representing people directly affected by amnesty would be allowed to put forward our positions on the issue during the hearings. Instead, the House Judiciary Committee saw fit to refuse all amnesty constituency groups permission to speak on the issue. It is hard to imagine a more reactionary position being taken by them in doing this.

The primary reason VVAW/WSO had attempted to participate in these hearings in the first place was because it was felt that, given all the clouding of the issue by other organizations and the government itself, at least putting forward a clear anti-imperialist perspective on amnesty would have been an important step. The refusal of Congress to even listen to us, however, was not unexpected - we've known all along where they really stood on amnesty and that the only way a real amnesty will be obtained is through a massive grassroots campaign. If nothing else, the D.C. experience utterly confirmed this belief.

Begin Building for the Regional and National Amnesty Demonstrations!

A timely reminder: with only about 45 days left until the May regional amnesty/VA actions and about 90 days to the national action in Washington, we don't have any time to waste. As the April 11-15 Milwaukee SCM is staring us in the face, it should be particularly clear to us all that we really are going to have to get moving on these as soon as possible. After the Milwaukee NSCM,

we will not only have to concinue to build a grassroots—am gn for amnesty and our DUPs, etc., but have to simultaneously pull together good regional actions, (less than a month after Milwaukee!) and build a massive outreach campaign for the July demonstration in DC. There is one hell of a lot to be done in a very short period of time.

Preliminary discussions with our lawyers and the DC Park's Commission have already begun and things seem to be moving well. While negotiations for a campsite, parade and demonstration permits may, as always, take awhile, they generally look favorable. The DC regional office has been particularly helpful both in obtaining a lawyer and in discussing these permits with the Park's Commission.

It is going to be extremely important to build as much support as possible for the July 4th rally with other groups and coalitions. The more work we do in building this sort of support, the more successful the July 4th demonstration will be. Attempts should naturally be made to get other groups to endorse the actions, but also to get them to actually build for them and to send their people with us when we go to DC in July.

As the proposal for the demonstration in Newsletter #20 for adding the slogan, 'Kick Nixon Out' was accepted, it has now been added to the demonstration's points of unity. People should begin using this in building support for the demos.

This is a national action and should be seen as the primary task of the organization at this time. This is the only way that we will be able to make this action as great a success as it can and will be.

Pentagon Announces End of SPNs?

On Thursday, March 21, the Pentagon announced that they were dropping the SPN codes from military discharges. These codes appear on all discharges and in many cases, mark a veteran with some perverted stigma for life, regardless of the type of discharge, (honorable, etc.) Some of the more infamous SPN codes include: bedwetting and inadequate personality.

Under the new system to go into effect by the end of June, the code will be abolished and replaced with a written discription of the reason for discharge, available only on the specific request of the veteran. In addition, any veteran with a bad SPN could write to the various services and request one that has no code on it.

The pressure built around the country over the use of such discriminatory codes, proved a victory for us. But we should not be fooled by this reversal in Pentagon policy. For one thing, the SPN codes were always 'secret' and not to be given to the public. In fact, according to Rep. Seiberling of Ohio over 20% of all corporations polled in a survey he took showed that they had, and used the codes in hiring veterans. With this history we can expect the corporations and the Pentagon to work out some special deal, enabling the discrimination to continue.

But the major fact remains that there are hundreds of thousands of veterans who have bad SPNs on their discharge papers. These veterans will still be the victims of this discrimination in spite of the fact that they can write in for a possible new DD-214. With the precedence of the discharge review boards backlog in upgrading of discharges, we can imagine how bogged down the system will become. It would take years for the new discharge papers to be given out.

The battle for a single-type discharge with no punitive codes will intensify. Because of this new system, the Pentagon will say they are doing there best, but we recognize that they are only deceiving the public into believing that the discharge system has improved. Thousands of veterans will continue to lose jobs and chances of decent employment because of the codes and the types of discharge.

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



EDITORIAL

In commemorating International . Women's Day, it is fitting that we reaffirm our determination to struggle against the systematic exploitation and oppression women undergo in this country. We must always retrember that the cause of this oppression is a system - imperialism. The roots of sexism are in this system: it is the enemy we must comtat, not some inherently perverse stature of men.

In the context of today's economic erisis, the oppression of women in the US stands out in ever sharper relief. Our économic system needs to keep wages as low as possible. This is accomplished, in part, through chronically high unemployment which maintains a large pool of cheap reserve labor. Women and 3rd World people have historically formed this group in the US. In any economic pinch, they are the first ones to get it. Today, already holding the poorest paying jobs, unable to get equal pay for equal work, women are the ones who must hold the front lines against skyrocketing food prices and fuel costs. With the hundreds of thousands of job layoffs recently, much of the gains women have made towards equal employment in past years have been eroded in a few months. Those remaining employed find that their frozen wages can't begin to keep pace with the inflation-

It is becoming oleer to most Americans that we are in for a rough time in this country. We have increasingly less choice about combating the mounting problems we face; the struggle for major change in our society is becoming a necessity. To do this we will need to be as united as possible. The divisions placed between the people are clearly our enemy in this.

It has been said that women hold up half the sky. Certainly without women both participating in and leading the struggle for change in the US we will never get anywhere. only look to the incredibly crucial role women played in the struggle for liberating Vietnam to see the truth of this. We must understand that in the US, the rising of the women will be the rising of us all.

NEWS BRIEFS



LEAVENWORTH PENITENTIARY

On February 7, 1974, a Federal Grand Jury sitting in Kansas City, Ka, handed down major indictments in connection with the July 31, 1973, inmate rebellion at the U. S. Penttentiary at Leavenworth, Kansas. Though the content of the indiaments has not been made official, we have learned that Odell Bennett, Jesse Lee Evans, Alf Hill and Alfred Jasger have been charged with murder, assault and kidnapping. William Hurst, Jesse Lopez and Arman do Miramon were charged with assault and kidnapping. All are VVAW/WSO members. Bennett, Hill and Jasper have also been indicted for post-July 31 incidents. On Feb. 13th, after having been severely beaten, these men were brought to confetor discussion of the indictments; bne man required 29 stitches in his head. Seventy inmates have been placed in isolation cells following a protest of the beatings.



POLICE ATTACK N. CALIF. VVAW/WSO COORDINATOR

On Feb. 6th, Bob Hood, N. Calif. Coordinator, stopped his truck to act as a witness for a friend who was being harassed by police. The police then pointed a . 38 caliber pistol at him and order ed him to put his hands up. When he complied, he was knocked to the ground and beaten. Bob was taken to City Jall and booked for "assault with a deadly weapon against a police officer," after police found a pocket knife on him.







USS LITTLE ROCK

Ten black sailors announced at a news conference on February 13th, that they were the victims of racial discrimination. They made the announcement at a hotel room in Naples, Italy, along with their lawyer, Robert S. Rivkin from the Lawyers Military Defense Committee.

The announcement came as a result of a previously unpublicized fight which took place on the cruiser USS Little Rock on Nov. 8, 1973, while on patrol in the Meditarranean during the Middle East crisis. The fight broke out after a white seaman attacked a black sailor with a wrench. The black sailors said the incident followed months of racial tension and the institutionalized racism of the ship's officers. One white seaman involved got 45 days in the brig; the other was acquitted. The black sailors are asking that their case be removed from the ship's command. They face a maximum of 6 months' confine ment and a Bad Conduct Discharge,



FARAH STRIKERS WIN VICTORY

In an inventely broad and harshly provided statement, a Fational Labor Reinformation of the statement of the Amalgamated Clothing Workers of America to organize in Farah plants. Farah will appeal the ruling.

The strikers, mostly Mexican-American women, went on strike in May, 1972, for job security and union recognition in an effort to end poor working conditions and low pay. A boycott of Farah pants has been on for over a year. The boycott and strike bave forced a shutdown of 4 plants and the loss of millions of dollars to Farah.

Chief Gounsel for Gary Lawton in his third trial will be Mr. Franklin S. Glenn of San Jose, California; Assis tant Counsel will be Mr. William Kunstler from the Center for Constitutional Rights in New York City. Pre-trial motions have been filed by the attorneys in an effort to call a halt to the harassment of Lawton and Cardner. Which Comes First In America?

PROFITS vs PEOPLE

Richard Nixon, in his State of the Union address, tried to scare away America's economic crisis by saying: "There will be no recession in the United States of America." This statement comes as a shock to the millions of Americans facing a deluge of rising prices and shrinking buying power. Even Nixon's aides are having a hard time making reality fit the distortions of Nixonomics.

Ground beef is \$1.39 a pound, gas oline is over 50¢ a gallon and a loaf of bread may cost as much as a dollar in the spring. Five million people are out of work and economists say that it could be as high as 7-8 million by the end of the year. The inflation rate is hovering at 8% while wages are being held to a possible 5.5% increase. However, the corporations in agriculture and energy are showing enormous profits while wage earners are drowning in the "non-existent" recession.

The answer to this contradiction is summed up in one word: exports. According to United Nation statistics, a third of the wheat bought on the world market comes from the United States and Canada. During the 1960's, the US exported over 40% of its cotton, rice and major grain crops. Japan now eats 29% of all U.S. meat exports and in 1973, the U.S. tripled its total meat exports. Not only does agribusiness profit from exports, the energy industry has reported that most of its phenonemal profits in the last quarter of 1973 came from foreign oil sales and production.

To understand the importance of exporting U.S. production, one need only look at the related industries. As the corporations send more to foreign markets, the supply available to American consumers shrinks accordingly. When wheat is sold overseas, the cost per bushel domestically rises. This affects the meat industry since feed comes from grain. Now take the high cost of meat and add it to the rising cost of transporting that meat and you have a \$1.39 for hamburger. That's a pretty simplified picture, so let's look at the grain industry in more detail.

Testifying before the House Committee on Ways and Means, Secretary of Agriculture Earl Butz said: "Exports are responsible for about one-fifth to one-quarter of net farm income,... This year we are exporting the produce of more than 80 million acres, equivalent

to nearly 30% of hary steel cropland. Atthe dame time, the criment of ice may the property of the control of the contr supply at home, Nixon allowed the grain industry (read: corporations like Con-- a subsidiary of ITT, Tenneco, General Foods, Greybound and Safeway) to make a killing with the Soviet wheat deal. While witholding information from the public about a major wheat sale to the Soviet Union; he let the giant grain dealers in on the eccret, allowing them to buy up wheat supplies cheaply. Then, when the price of wheat on the world market had jumped several dollars, the exporters unloaded the wheat to the Russians, thus making a huge profit (part of which included 150 million dollars in government subsidies which are funded by taxpayers money).

All this exporting causes a shortage on the domestic market and forces prices up. Cattle feed costs more, thus causing a rise in the prices of wholesale beef. This causes a ripple in the whole meat industry as everyone raises their price, until it reaches the consumer (who can't raise the money to pay for it). No one who steps inside a supermarket can miss this. In August, 1972, a dozen eggs cost 31¢ in Chicago. A year later that same dozen eggs cost 80¢. In June, 1973, a pound of chicken cost 45¢ in New York City. Just two months later, in August, that same pound of chicken cost 74¢.

The fuel industry works the same way with an even more drastic effect. In earlier issues of Winter Soldier, we explained that the fuel "crisis" was a planned shortage, but it is also important to realize that the super profits the oil companies are reporting come from the inflated prices of oil on the world market. Exxon, one of the biggest oil producers, had an overall profit increase of 50% for 1973. Seventy-five percent of that profit was made overseas. Everyone knows the effect that the fuel shortage has had in terms of jobs and the very way Americans must now live. To further illustrate the trouble the economy is in, the GNP (Gross National Product) showed only 1% increase. That means that the supply of goods on the U.S. market is dropping while the prices for those goods are rising,

Besides the stagnation in U.S. production at home, many companies are moving their factories to other countries where labor is cheap and unbrantised. Already, whole factories have been moved to Alvica, Alia, and Latin America. Only book new oil refinery has been constructed overseas. These movements overseas play a key part in domestic inflation. Inflation, put simply, means that the dollar has less value for purchasing goods while the supply of goods decreases.

This is the essence of imperialism. Nixon and his policies are only protecting this basic tenet of the American economy -- the scramble to make profits. If Exxon and ITT can make more money by selling and producing in foreign markets then that's what they will do. They will also insure their ability to do this by controlling the policies of the federal government to the extent of buying a president, pouring millions into campaign contributions, lobbying, and asking for military protection of their foreign holdings. Inflation does not hurt ITT. We oppose imperialism because it hurts us -- the poor, wage earners and small business. people alike. To demand an end to imperialism means to demand an end to joblessness, an end to high prices, an end to government by the dollar, and an end to wars like Vietnam. To kick Nixon out of office is to show that we are opposed to these practices and will not tolerate loss of lives or food for the rise of profits.

The Continuing War

INDOCHINA

"Now that we're not actually dropping bombs, we must maintain our capability to resume such action if we have to, " This was said by Gen. Jon Vogt. U.S. Air Force Commander.

This and other government statements make the point for us that the U.S. government is prepared, willing and ready to resume the air war in Indochina at any time. It is therefore necessary for the movement to continue to press for a complete end to aid for Thisu and Lon Nol; implementation of the Paris Agreement, and recognition of the legitimate governments in Indochina.

VIETNAM

Thieu and his Saigon associates have been continuing their violations of the Paris Peace Accords. There has been no move by Saigon toward the formation of a National Council for National Reconciliation and Concord, which, according to the treaty, was to include communist and non-communist opponents and was to organize national elections. Thieu has gone so far as to cancel all elections and then self-righteously declare that "there will be no peace."



At the same time, Thieu has been attacking the PRG controlled areas. Up to 100 air sorties a day have been launched by Saigon (TIME Magazine). With this, Thieu has also launched more than 100,000 "pacification" and police operations in the areas he controls. Not only does he detain and torture political prisoners, but for some time now Saigon prison guards have been dropping corpses of political prisoners into the rivers, where numerous naked, headless, armless and legless bodies can be seen floating everyday. Strict ordert have been given that under no circumstances can these bodies be fished out and buried.

The U.S. Congress and President have continued to back these practices by voting \$1.1 billion in military aid to Thieu, and they have now moved to increase it by an additional \$1 billion worth of war materials.

LAOS

Implementation of the February, 1973, Laos Pezos Agreement is still being wilayed by the U.S. and its lettles in Vientiane. The agreement called for complete withdrawal of foreign military (specifically naming the United States), Yet, the U.S. has refused to withdraw its Thai mercenaries; trained and paid for by the C.I.A.

In addition, Vientiane troops (trained, financed and "advised" by the U.S. government) have been attacking areas under the control of the Lao Patriotic Front. They have refused to allow civilians to return to their homes and villages (called for by the agreement) if these areas were controlled by the Patriotic Front.

The conduct of the Pathet Lao on the other hand, has been considerably different. As shown by a report in the Washington Post: "They (Pathet Lao) are models of deportment. They have opened up a free medical dispensary complete with an accupuncturist which has very much impressed the local population. Medecine on the government side is not free nor plentiful. Interviews indicate that the Pathet Lao enjoy sympathy among the population of Luang Prabang who are sick of corrupt government and military officials."

CAMBODIA

The situation for the Phnom Penh government is deteriorating hourly. The liberation forces have been shelling Phnom Penh with captured U.S. 105 Howitozars. At the same time, they have blockaded the Mekong River and cut the two major roads into the city, thus isolating Phnom Penh and bringing it to economic collapse.

Lon Nol troops continue to desert en masse. A whole unit stationed at Kompong Tram refused to fight and crossed over to the side of the National United From terms of Linker weapons with them. Even though Lon Nol continues to tell his troops that they are fighting "North Vietnamese and Viet Cong," the troops at the front line know from first-hand experience that this is nonsense: "The voices that call from across the river are Khrner voices," (New York Times),


The U, S. continues to be the only power holding the Lon Nol government together. Internally, it is our tax dollars that finance all aspects of this corrupt group. Internally, it is the U, S, that keeps the pressure on our "allies" for continued recognition of Lon Nol over Shahouk. DISCHARGE REVIEW BOARDS



One of VVAW/WSO's Discharge Upgrading Project

The military's system of discharges is something most people, including GIs and veterans poorly understand. A more unjust, racist institution would be hard to find. There are 5 types of discharges issued by the military: honorable, general (GD), un-desirable (UD), had conduct (BCD), and dishonorable (DD). Only two of it these, BCDs and DDs, are given as a result of a court-martial. The rest are given by administrative procedure Of the 560,000 Vietnam-era veterans with less-than-honorable discharges. (LTHD), all but 33,000 were given administratively where the individual receiving the discharge was not able to cross-examine witnesses, challenge affadavits or appeal decisions in military courts. Whether punitive or administrative, all LTHDs play havoc with people's lives. Badly discharged vets are rarely eligible for the GI Bill or VA benefits and have a miserable time finding decent jobs. Rep. Seiberling of Ohio conducted a survey that found over half of all companies polled admitted discrimination in job hiring against badly discharged vets. The problem is growing. Last year alone. the Army issued over 50,000 LTHDs or 16.4% of all discharges in 1973!

The only legal means of changing a LTHD is to apply to the Discharge. Review Board, (DRB), or the Board for Correction of Military Records, (BCMR). Each branch of service has its own DRB and BCMR in Washington, DC. The DRB usually consists of 5active duty officers, (one female if the applicant is a woman). The DRB can only change a discharge or issue a new one. It cannot review a discharge stemming from a General Court-martial. These cases must go to the BCMR.

Composed of at least a civilians, the BCMR can review cases denied by the DRB. Unlike the DRB, the BCMR is not limited to discharge upgrading, but can also grant back pay and allowances. Application to these boards can be made in a number of ways; by affadavite; in person, with or enthout countion of all .. The vet must pay for all costs involved in this: transportation of himself, his counsel or witnesses, If the DRB and/or the BCMR denies an appeal, the individual's only alternative is to file suit in Federal District Court in Washington - a luxury few can afford.

There are a number of categories of appeals that the DRB or BCMR may act (avorably on, including: LTHDs caused by AWOL if problems at home were involved; having a clean record up to receiving a LTHD; having a clean record since receiving one; getting into trouble after combat duty; receiving a LTHD for drug abuse, (all veterans receiving bad discharges because of drugs prior to Aug. '71 may have them upgraded - about 50% actually are); if the offense was committed off-base, off-duty, out of uniform, against a ci-vilian. Getting the boards to approve the case on these grounds is not at all assured.

Due to the expenses involved, lack of knowledge about the review process, lack of qualified counselling services. etc.. very few badly discharged vets have actually applied to the boards for upgrading. The review system clearly discriminates against 3rd World and working class people. From 1967-73 only 36, 379 appeals were heard. Of

these, only 8, 451 were upgraded. This is but a small fraction of the 386, 637 vets receiving LTHDs during the same period. (The army, with a 13% approval rate on appeals, presently takes from 1 1/2 to 2 years to hear a case!) As over 160,000 vets have received LTHDs since 1972 alone, it sepears that the number of people affected by bad discharges is growing at an alarming rate.

The problem facing these veterans is part of the disaster caused the American people by the war in Indochina. A war that has caused to date over 6 million Indochinese casualties and left the US with over 55,000 dead and 300,000 casualties. Bad discharges resulted from the resistance to the war and the racism and oppression of the military, (in 1972, the Dept. of Defense 'noted' that black GIs were twice as likely to receive LTHDs than white GIs). Because the war was wrong, resistance was right. Just as we are now raising a demand for amnesty for those who resisted the war by going into exile, underground or prison, so we are raising the same demand for GIs who resisted the war and the military. These are the 560,000 Vietnam-era vets who received LTHDs.

What should we be doing to obtain this? VVAW/WSO is setting up discharge upgrading projects around the country to counsel hadly discharged vets, and prepare and file appeals. which amounts for the se veterans will be won. The counselling of badly discharged vets and filing of appeals in itself will not win amnesty. What we are demanding to a single-type discharge. This means that when someone leaves the military, all he or she would receive would be a certificate of separation; no categories of discharge at all would be given. We demand that this single-type discharge be given retroactively to all vets.

By fighting for the single-type discharge as an integral part of the amnesty campaign and by getting as many badly discharged vets as possible to file for upgrading with the review boards, there is an awful lot of pressure that can be concentrated on the system. By joining together we will be able to win this demand. A singletype discharge demand is the only thing that makes sense.

G.I. Resists Riot Duty

(Fort Kobbe, Canal Zone) Pfc. Stanley Kuzminski is awaiting court-martial at Ft. Kobbe in the Canal Zone for disobeying a direct order. It all started in Oct. 1973, when he applied for discharge as a conscientious objector and his claim got tangled up in red tape.

In his own words: "My company and another company were scheduled to give a demonstration on riot control for the Undersecretary of the Army. (Ed. note: This was prior to Kissinger's visit to the Canal Zone to negotiate a treaty that was supposed to refurn the Canal Zone to the Panamanian people. The Army's riot training was intended as a precaution against a recurrence of what happened 10 years ago, when 21 protesting students were killed by American soldiers). "My company plays the part of a violent mob that is dispersed by riot troops. There is sniper fire, agitators, casualties, the whole bit... On the 17th of January the battalion was notified that the demonstration would be held the 22nd. On the 18th, 1 was ordered to go to the reheareal with

"Before the first rehearsal, my platoon leader approached me and told me I was going to participate. I told him I couldn't because it was against my beliefs and a violation of my rights. He said it was not against my beliefs and rights because I would not be carrying a gun. I then argued that this was a part of riot training, which is combatoriented training. . . I was given a direct order to participate. I didn't actually participate... I just walked along behind the crowd with my hands in my pockets. When they were dispersed and were sup posed to run, I walked... On Monday the 21st, I was again ordered to go to the riot and participate. I went to the riot, but I refused to participate."

Kuzminski was then ordered a

Kuzminski was then ordered a summary court-martial, which he refused on the 31st, and is now waiting on the Army's next move. At this point, the Army may decide to drop charges. If they don't, he can expect a special court-martial. His CO claim is still hanging somewhere in the bureaucracy, and he is facing 6 months' confinement and a Bad Conduct Discharge.

Stanley has no access to any civilian attorney in the Canal Zone, though an ACLU lawyer in New York has agreed to work with him and his JAG lawyer by long-distance phone and mail. (Alconbury AFB, Hunte, England)
Air Force 5gt. Dan Pruitt was convicted by a court-martial on January
28 of eight counts of setusing to cut
his hair. Pruitt, who considered
hair length and personal apperance
to be the concern only of the individual GI, was sentenced to four
months' imprisonment, a bust in
rank, and a Bad Conduct Discharge.

Supporters of Dan Pruitt wanted to attend his trial, but the judge, Major Wright, allowed only 18 spectators and newsmen into the tiny courtroom and refused to move into a larger room. Although many airmen were put on extra duty to stifle support for Dan, stickers reading "Fight the Hair Reg: Support Dan!" were visible all over the base. Civilian members of London VVAW/ WSO contacted the media and circulated petitions, collecting more than 800 signatures. Dan appeared on TV before his trial and gained a lot of supporters throughout England.

During the trial itself, one airman was busted for "distributing unauthorized literature" because he was handing information sheets to newsmen. Another was charged with "improper dress" because he had a "Support Dan" sticker attached to his uniform. Dan's lawyer, former Air Force resister Tem Culver, argued that the hair regulations were unconstitutional and abridged Dan's rights of self-expression. He further pointed out that WAFs were working in Dan's career field, and that since there was no job discrimination between men and women in that field, there should be no rules for personal appearance that only applied to one

Wright ruled that equal employment was not a general "unisex rule," and that the Air Force's hair regulations were legal. He then made a cute comment suggesting that Pruitt might not know "whether he was a man or a woman." This implying secret remark will be one of the bases on which Pruitt's lawyers will ask for a reversal of the conviction on appeal.

Dan's case has greatly increased interest among Gls in England in the fight for Gl rights. Several of them have joined VVAW/WSO/which has many members who are veterans and draft resisters, as well as U.S. and British civilians; this linking up of Gls, vets, and exiles can only strengthen the growing amnesty movement and promote discussion of how Gl Rights and universal; unconditional amnesty are part of one and the same demand: Freedom for all of our brothers and sisters!

TO STRUGGLE!

A.F.R.ACISM EXPOSED



(Ent AFB, Colorado) A black airman, a VVAW/WSO member, is facing serious charges at Ent AFB as a result of rampint racism among the security police at the base. AlC Charles Beaman will be court-martialed on March 18 on charges of assault on a policeman, failure to obey a direct order, threatening words,

and disrespect to a superior officer.

The charges stem from an incident that took place on December 11, 1973. On that day a female member of the Security Police (SPM) stated that a black GI had made an obscene gesture toward her. A black airman was arrested; Beaman and a number of other black Gle were present and observed the arrest. Half an hour later, Beaman was driving his car on the base when SPs stopped him and forcibly dragged him from his car after he refused to get out. He had been given no reason for why he was being stopped, and thus he was within his rights to refuse to get out of the car. After being vanked out, he was searched, ordered to park his car, and told he was being taken to the Ent security complex. He re-fused to go along with the "orders," and when he was stabled by an SP, he struck back in 1866-defense. The next thing he knew he was lving on next tains he knew the was lying on the ground, being somed by the SPs. He was theitheld for two hours, during which time the was stomped on again when he refused to hand over his identification. After he was re-leased, he went he the clinic, where he couldn't ast visions who he couldn't get lightment; ad this to the clinic scome ents be reportofficer, who was totally uncooperative and got into an argument with Beaman. This led to the "disrespect" charge against Beaman.

This incident is only the latest in a series of events involving white SPs at Ent and their harassment of Beaman and other black Gis. Beaman and some friends were stopped for a traffic ticket by some SPs in July, and were subjected to verbal racial epithets before being confronted with the SPs drawn guns. Beaman complained, but no action was ever taken against the SPs.

The pattern of harassment of black airmen at Ent has its roots in the nature of the base and its security force. All of the SPs involved in these incidents have been white, since most of the SPs at Ent are white. Also, the Ent brass are particularly airaid of any militant actions by GIs who want their rights respected. Ent is a top-security, hush-hush base where a lot of classified work takes place. The authorities there want to make sure that blacks on the base "know their place."

SMITH HASSLED IN PRISON

(Fort Leavenworth, Kansas) The Army has decided to court-martial Melvin Smith for the shooting of a first sergeant in Quang Tri, Vietnam, in 1971. Smith was suffering from a grave head injury and deep emotional stress when he randomly fired a weapon in a mess hall, wounding three men, one fatally. Despite overwhelming psychiatric testtimony that he was insane at the time, he was convicted of murder and sentenced to life in prison. He won a reversal on a technicality last September, and has been informed that he will face a second general court-martial on March II or 13. It will be held at Leavenworth.

Meanwhile, the prison brass has been going to great lengths to try to suppress information about, and support for, Malvin's case. As publicity around it began to grow, the prison authorities began tampering with mail into and out of the prison. When a recent letter from Melvin to VVAW/WSO was printed in the VVAW /WSO GI NEWS, a copy of the paper was stolen by the prison brass from the prisoner for whom it was intended. The Director of Custody then confronted Melvin with it and wrote Smith up for a "Disciplinary Hearing." It probably means that he will be sent to isolation; as it is, he has been confined to his quarters and is not free to visit with his brothers. The Director also informed Melvin that all of his mail--in and out--was being read and Xeroxed before it went on its way. The authorities have suggested to Melvin that he had better shut up or "things will get worse for him.

er in the beautiful kind of eloquence known as protest!"

Melvin Smith goes to trial in less than a month. He needs support and help, both in terms of his trial and in terms of his day-to-day struggle at Leavenworth. He has been singled out by prison authorities because they consider him to be the "ringleader" of black protest at the prison.

Vietnam Veterans Against the War Winter Soldier Organization

Objectives

- 1. To demand an immediate cessation of fighting and the withdrawal of all American troops, planes, and military and economic aid from Southeast Asia. We cannot allow one more human being to be killed in Southeast Asia. We support as a basis for the cessation of these hostilities the various peace proposals of the People of Southeast Asia or such future plans as they develop based upon their right of self-determination and actual control of their own destinies.
- 2. To demand the immediate termination of all other operations by the United States Government, its agencies, and American business interests that are designed to suppress the rightful struggles for liberation and self-determination of the Peoples of Africa, Asia and Latin America. This includes the maintenance of dictatorial governments, economic domination, and the theft of the natural resources of other countries. The United States should make reparations in a program acceptable to the Indochinese for all of the damage done by the United States.
- 2. The definanciant sells of the Court and women, reservists and national guardsmenning afforded the same rights that are guaranteed withe United States Constitution and Bill of Rights that at presently denied by the Uniform Code of Military, Justice. We are appalled that our active-duty GIs are treated as less than first class citizens. We endorse the efforts of our active-duty sisters and brothers in their struggle to democratize the military.
- 4. To support all military personnel refusing to serve against their consciences in wars at home and abroad. We demand that Congress enact legislation for the immediate repatriation of those brothers and sisters who are in prison or in self-exile by reason of their refusal to serve in the military. It must also involve an end to all repression and a freeing of all political prisoners.
- 5. To demand there be no distinctions as to types of discharges and that a single type of discharge be issued, and that this be retroactive. We also demand all veterans receive all rights and benefits under the VA; and that compensation for disabilities be based solely upon the degree of disability for veterans and their families, without regard to sex, race, rank or length of service.
- 6. To make clear that the United States has never undertaken an extensive, open investigation of American war crimes in Indochina. In its war in Indochina, the principles of Nuremberg have been violated. As active-duty and former GIs, we recognise the responsibility and guilt of the individual soldier

to refrain from committing war crimes. We also recognize that the responsibility and guilt of war crimes committed in the name of America lies with our policy makers at all levels.

- 7. Resolved to fight racism, to show Americans that our society is permeated by racism, which manipulates whites into viewing non-whites as inferior or less than human. This racism pushes Third World People through inferior schools to inferior jobs and into combat arms. Thus Third World People are sent off to die in disproportionately high numbers as we kill Asians indiscriminately. We also demand the US military recognize its complicity in America's domeatic and international racism.
- 8. Resolved to fight sexism, to show that sexism plays a major part in promoting war. We must show Americans our society is permeated by sexism, which forces an inferior status upon women, reducing them to subservient sexual objects, and which robe both men and women of their natural growth. This institutionalized sexism channels women into unfulfilling. lower paying jobs which are servite interest to the property of the prope
- 9. To support the democratic right of Americans to unionize and strike to protect their income and safeguard their employment. We consider all legislation designed to suppress these rights, including mandatory arbitration, to be illegal and not in the interests of the American working people. We also demand full employment for all Americans, including free educational and vocational training for all who need or want it. We refuse to participate in the efforts being made to separate us from other working people, making veterans enemies by giving us the charade of employment priority. We condemn this as a method of encouraging enlistment by the false promise of employment after-service. We also condemn the use of active-duty GIs, Reservists and National Guardsmen as strikebreakers.
- 10. To dedicate ourselves to these principles and objectives which directly relate to the imperialist suppression of the People of the World by the United States government. We understand this war is imperialist in origin and affirm that the membership of VVAW/WSO is not only concerned with ending this war, but with changing the domestic, social, political and economic institutions that have caused and perpetuated its continuance:

On the anniversary of the signing . of the Peace Agreement on Ending the War in Vietnam, it was evident that these agreements were being violated by the United States and the Thieu government in Saigon. This fact prompted VVAW/WSO to organise and participate in demonstrations across the country to heighten the public awareness around this and other major issues of the day. In addition to demand. ing an end to US involvement in Indochine, VVAW/WSO also demanded that Nixon be kicked out of office for criminal acts against the American people and the people of the world, and for universal and unconditional amnesty for all war resisters. These demon-strations united around these three demands drew the support of many other organizations, in what is becoming a united effort to expose the administration in Washington DC and the buginess: men who control it.

The demonstrations were kicked off in Washington DC, on Friday January 25, when six members of VVAW/WSO and one reporter entered the Saigon Information Office's Psy/War Ministry and asked the occupants to leave. Eventually all of the employees left and the VVAW/WSO members draped bamers out of the window reading, 'Implement the Peace Accords' and another reading, 'VVAW/WSO'. After one hour of occupation, the police broke into the building and arrested the dem-

onstrators who had intended to stay there until the US recognized its duty to implement the peace accords. Just prior to the police break-in, the vets called the Provisional Revolutionary Government's Paris office to express their solidarity with the Vietnamese people.

The six members were taken to jail and were finally charged with interference with a diplomatic mission. They will be tried in the US Superior Court on March 6th and the veterans will challenge the legality of the Saigon government as their defense.

On Saturday, January 26th, the organization initiated and participated in demonstrations, rallies and vigils across the country. Some of these groups include: CAGLA, the October League, RU, PSP, the New World Re-

source Center, the National Lawyers Guild, the Cultural Workers Committee, Bread and Roses, and the Throw the Burn Out Coslition.

In Milwaukee, Wisconsin the chapter organized a march through their neighborhood and drew 200 community people out into the rain to demand implementation of the agreements, universal and unconditional amnesty for all war resisters, and Kick Nixon Out! After the march and rally, about 75 community people and VVAW/WSO members got together informally and discussed the reasons why these demands are necessary for all the Airsewican people.

A two day fast and a nighttime vigil were sponsored by the Denver, Colorado Springs and Boulder chapters. These events were held on the steps of the Capitol Building in Denver. About 25 people fasted for the two day period, and the vigil attracted over 125. The fast was marked by enthusiastic support from the people of that city who were in agreement with the three demands.



In recent weeks we have been mbarded with media reports of the alleged activities of the Symbionese Liberation Army (SLA). The SLA is purportedly responsible for the Nov. 6th slaying of Oakland School Superintendent, Dr. Marcus Foster, and the Feb. 4th kidnapping of Patricia Hearst, daughter of newspaper magnate Randolph Hearst. Whoever is responsible for these acts has set in motion a very unfortunate series of events that cannot but have adverse effects on progressive forces in the US and N. Calif. in particular,

Dr. Foster's murder was certainly no way in which to raise any issues around the Oakland school system. It only served to obscure any legitimate demands for change that were being made. Similarly, Ms. Hearst can in no way be held responsible for the polical role played by her father in the US. Her kidnapping and the slaying of Dr. Foster were irresponsible acts of terrorism conducted by a few individmale. VVAW/WSQ.pondemns them.

Additionaly, these events have provided police officials and right-wing media sources a golden opportunity to attack movement organizations in the Bay area. Oakland police and media personnel have already tried unsuc-cessfully to link VVAW/WSO with the Foster slaying, hoping to thereby discredit our work. An Oakland PD spokes man went so far as to say that they had "reason to believe that VVAW could be involved" in the slaying. Statements such as this are totally unfounded either in political or evidenciary fact. But, as we have learned from the Lawton/ Gardner trials, police officials are more than willing to frame movement activists when the real suspects cannot be located.

VVAW/WSO firmly believes that it is the American people themselves that will make significant social change in this country. In the long struggle w are facing to end oppression here, it is only the American people who will be able to achieve their own liberation from it. We must never lose sight of the fact that the people are the real heroes in this process, not individuals isolated from them.

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WINTER SOLDIER

After deliberating less than a hour on January 18th, a Waukesha County jury found Donald Kemp, a 26-year old Vietnam veteran, sane when he shot and killed his wife Diane in June of 1971, In pronouncing him sane they upheld his conviction of first-degree, premeditated murder and his sentence of life imprisonment.

In Vietnam, Don's job was to fire on the ARVN, the NLF, the North Vietnamese or the U.S. units who had called their own truce in a given area. If an American unit refused to make contact by going the other way, it was Don's responsibility to fire on them and give their position away to the 'enemy'. If the villagers in an area became too secure', it was Don's job to kill some village officials to bring some heat on the NLF from the village people.

After Don came home he began having nightmares. He was paranoid about the safety of his family and insisted that they put chain locks on all the doors. He started drinking and taking downers to get rid of his nightmares flashbacks from Vietnam,

He was samitted three separate times to the VA Hospital and was an inpatient for a total of 23 weeks where he was doped up on librium, stelazine and thorazine - the last two, heavy tranquilizers often given to people diagnosed as psychotic. They discharged him as an inpatient on May 5, 1971, and as an outpatient on June 10th because the paychfatrist he had been seeing was leaving the VA and because Don had showed some improvement. That night, while having a flashback/nightmare, he was awakened by his wife whom he then shot thinking that she was 'the enemy'. He shot her with a . 22 caliber pistol which be kept under his pillow.

Don can't remember anything about the next five days. June 15th he turned himself in at the VA Hospital, carrying a bottle of rum, the loaded gun and with his kids - ages 3 and 5 - in bend.

On July 7, 1972, Don Kemp was pronounced same and automatically convicted of first-degree, premeditated murder; he then began serving his life sentence.

While in jail, Don formed a group among other Vietnam vets to deal with the problem of PVS (Post-Vietnam Syndrome or Post-Vietnam Struggle). He also worked on his appeal.

Judge Clair Voss ruled that the phrase "Post Vietnam Syndrome" could not be mentioned in court. The five witnesses who testified were all psychiatrists. Three said he was not responsible for his acts at the time of the crime, one said no one could make that decision, and one had no opinion.

in his summation, McConnell called combat neurosis "hogwash and a smokescreen... Mr. Kemp is a fraud, a drunk and a drug addict. " Referring to the 30-35 VVAW/WSO people who were coming to court every day to support Don, McConnell said, "These people are here to fool you, "

And so Donald Kemp is back in Waupun Prison, sentenced to stay ther for the rest of his natural life. He's working on his appeal and has a \$3 million law suit against the Veterans Administration Hospital for the murder of his wife.

Throughout the trial the role ofthe War in Don's actions was not explored. But even as the Waukesha DA. admitted, there are psychological casualties in any war, which in itself should command lehiency in cases such as this. But the Vietnam experience compounded the problems produced by war. The routine murder of defenseless people, torture, defoliation, free fire sones, terror bombing, mass relocations, napalm and white phosphorous and the overwhelming firepower were particular to Vietnam, What was more particular wa that our soldiers were fighting for a lie. The brutality of other wars could usually be rationalized by participants because there was some meaning, such as fight-ing the spread of facism. Not so with Vietnam; we were not fighting for democracy - we were defending a dictator

And so with the case of Don Kemp the people who govern us have again . shown their inhumanity. They refuse to admit what effect the War actually had on Vietnam veterans like Don and that the problems created by the War did no magically disappear with the signing of the Peace Agreement. There are thousands of other vets like Don who may b on drugs, in prison, leading dead-end lives - waiting for America to wake up. A victory for Don will be a victory for us all.

SLAVE'S RIGHT TO REBEL

FREE RUCHELL MAGEE

A man is now sitting in the San Jose County Jail who has spent the majority of his life struggling for freedom. That man is Ruchell Magee -- a black political paisoner for nearly 20 years who has for all practical purposes been forgotten by the people of this country. Ruchell's fight against the racism of our society began when he was 16 years old and living in his bome state of Louisiana. In 1955, he was found guilty of "attempted aggravated rape" of a white woman by an all-white jury. Though the woman-who had been raped failed to identify Ruchell in a police line-up, he was sentenced to 12 years in the Angola State Penitentiary.

After six years in prison, Ruchell was paroled and moved to Los Angeles in 1962. Within seven months after his parole, Magee was again caught up in the racism of our court system. This time, he was charged with a kidnapping which supposedly arose out of an argument over \$10. Based on the coerced confession of the alleged "victim," (a confession which was illegally admitted in court) Ruchell was again convicted of a charge he was innocent of, and sentenced to one year to life in prison. Magee was sent to San Quentin where he fought for and won the right"

to a new trial in 1965, on the grounds that testimony had been illegally presented at his first trial. Ruchell's court-appointed attorney entered a plea of "innocent by reason of insanity," When Magee objected to this plea, he was gagged, dragged from the court-room and beaten by guards. The judge in this second trial (who just happened to also preside over the first trial) ordered the jury to either (ind Ruchell insane or guilty of the kidnapping. He was found guilty and sentenced to life imprisonment.

Ruchell returned to San Quentin and immediately began filing briefs and appeals to the courts -- petitioning for his freedom. His belief in the justice of this country was shattered in Feb., 1970, when a young black prisoner was murdered by San Quentin guards. Ruchell pledged (along with many other prisoners) that the truth of this murder would be taken to the outside world, and the prison responded by unleashing a reign of terror against all prisoners who had been involved in speaking out against repression in the prison.

www.years of fruitless years of brutality and an overwhelming desire for justice and freedom, Ruchell appeared in the Marin County courthouse on August 7, 1970, to testify on behalf of a fellow prisoner. On this day, Ruchell rebelled against his oppression in what has come to be called the "Courthouse Slave Rebellion," On this day in court: Jonathan Jackson rose from his seat and said: "All right gentlemen, this is it, " The prisoners then made their bid for freedom and attempted to escape in a van, taking with them the court's presiding judge. Marin County Sheriffs opened fire on the van and indiscriminately murdered Jonathan Jackson, William Christmas, James McClain, and Judge Harold Haley. Following the murder, Ruchell (the only surviving prisoner) was charged with murder, conspiracy to free the alleged Soledad Brothers, and kidnapping. These charges came to trial in 1972 and during the trial, it was dis covered that the bullet which killed Judge Haley was traced to a weapon of one of the guards. With Ruchell's involvement in the murder having been disproved, the jury deliberated and returned hopelessly hung.

The murder charge against Ruchell was then dropped and he is still awaiting his second trial on kidnapping charges resulting from the Slave Rebellion. Since the first trial, Ruchell has been practically abandoned by his supporters. Following are some excerpts from a letter which Ruchell recently sent to Gary Lawton and the Riverside Political Prisoners Defense Committee.

"I am in need of sincere support to get my message to the people. Sincere defense committee support is the only way the injustice will be exposed or stopped. The past committee support I have been getting can be described only as an extension of my oppression. . I don't know what you have read or heard in the news media, but the state agents do not want to let this slave case go to trial again. They have no case. Period. I haven't committeed any crime; but any black man (victim of Police (rame-ups) can be caught by the judicial traps of slave oppression. It is no crime to break out of the traps of slave oppression!"

"The California defense committees and supporters haven't shown me
anything -- except foolishness and exploitation. Progressive people must
strive to improve (build) our society.

That is why i am eppealing to the people
in facts, law and evidence that the
court-appointed lawyer in 1965, all-out
railroaded me, by tricking the jury intofinding me guilty. This was done
through the use of the lawyers' vicious
false insanity/guilty plea. All that is
needed to prove this "undisputable fact"
is my being allowed the right to be
heard in court, in that I may produce
the factual evidence."

Ruchell Magee remains strong and determined to gain his freedom and he has continually maintained his complete innocence in all of the charges he has been imprisoned for. Ruchell is just one of the many victims of the racism exhibited by our court system and our society as a whole. At this time, unless support from the people of this country is given to Ruchell, he will be destined to spend the remainder of his life behind prison walls. Ruchell's political history and it's culmination in the Courthouse Slave Rebellion should be an example to all of us who are involved in the struggle for freedom and equality.

"I',m not guilty but I'm laying my life on the line to prove this fact."

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Nixon Aide, Veterans Talk

Presidential Help on Problems Pledged

By Joseph D. Whitaker Washington Post Staff Writer

A group of five disgrun--teled veterans, who failed Thursday to get an opportunity to discuss veterans' prob-lems with President Nixon, was admitted to the White House yesterday to talk with one of the President's advisors, who promised that Mr. Nixon would begin working to solve some of the problems the group outlined.

When they emerged from the one-hour, 20-minute conference with domestic advisor James Cavanaugh, lead ers of the California based organization, called American Veterans Movement (AVM), told newsmen the meeting was "a success."

"Mr. Cavanaush assured us that the administration will begin to respond to the fact that there is a national voterons crisis in this country," said Ron Kovic, leader of the group. Kovic is confined to a wheelchair from injuries he received in Vietnam.

Cavanaugh, the associate director of the President's Domestic Council, said he promised the veterans he would personally review each area of concern and "get back to them with a quick and prompt response.

"The President is quite insistent that all of America's veterans get every considerations and benefit they are entitled to," Cavanaugh

Kovic and six other veterans attempted a takeover of the Washington Monument Thursday morning after their first attempt to see President Nixon failed. The group-three members of which were in wheelchairswas ejected from the monument by U.S. Park Police. The veterans alleged that the police used unnecessary force-a charge that police officials denied.

As a result of yesterday's meeting, Kovic said, his group from now on will be in direct contact with Cavanaugh whenever the members have a problem. In addition, Kovic said Cavanaugh will visit the group's headquarters in Delray Calif., to talk further about veterans' problems.

Problems outlined by Kovic revolve pround what he called "deplorable conditions" in the nation's veterans hospitals and inefficient handling of veterans' benefit checks, which he said are often one and two months in arrears.

"We left the White House today with the idea that somebody is going to take some positive action," Kovic said, "but if the administration doesn't respond, they're going to see a veterans protest like nothing they've ever seen."

Kovic said the 6,000 members of AVM and thousands of veterans in other groups.

are ready to set up tent encampments in key cities across the country if pressing problems are not soon alleviated.

"The people in this country don't seem to realize that the national veterans crisis is a powder keg," Kovic said. "If something isn't done, the whole thing is going to explode."

Kovic, a native of Ladysmith. Wis., was born on July 4, 1946. "Since that day, I guess I've been sort of a super patriot," said Kovic, who said he is an ex-marine sergeant who was awarded the Bronze Star and Purple Heart for his service during two tours of duty in South Vietnam.

"When I joined the Marines. I wanted to be John Wayne, Sergeant York, and Audie Murphy all rolled into one," Kovic said, "I went to Vietnam to win the Medal of Honor of die try-

Kovic's aspirations were ent short on Jan. 20, 1963 when a Vietcong bullet entered his right shoulder, passed through his right lung and severed his spinal cord. He was permanently paralyzed from his chest down.

"I was bitter about my injury," Kovic said, but I have been even more embittered by the deplorable, unspeakable, degrading conditions of veterans hospitals ...

and the fact that men who have fought for the United States in Vietnam cannot get the basic, decent care they deserve."

Ring this will be the first regional meeting on V. Work, we want to found considerable time on reports from the different areas and discussion of the reports. Obviously, one of the things we can get from this meeting is an exchange of information and understanding of what the problems are overall. At the same time, it should be an emportunity to clarify what different lines exist. These lines can be struggled out at a fater national meeting and one organisational time developed. In writing reports, Comrades should give their political analysis, touching on the following questions:

- 1. What has been going on in your area ongoing mass work, spontaneous struggles, other organisations, problems?
- 2. What are main mass demands of vets (GIs) in your ence?
- 3. What has been the role of Third Morld this (GIs) in your area? Should building multinational unity be a main focus at this time?
- 4. How do you see the role of V'A' / WSO? Specific criticisms,
- direction it should be moving?
- 5. How do you see the role of the vets' (GI) movement within the overall struggle for revolution? Relationship to the workers' movement. Reports should be written and xeroxed.

The next item on the agenda would be VVAW/WSO, as the only national organisation dealing with veterans' issues. In general, the VVAY/WSO line is not to build the mass veterans' movement, though good work is being done in some places. Discussion should focus on our work with VVAY/WSO and or developing guidelines for the futurb. 

On November 30, 1973, furnished copies of various letters from the Vietnam Veterans Against the War/ Winter Soldier Organization (VVAW/WSO), office, Dayton, Ohio, written by GARY STAIGER, concerning applications completed by prospective members of VVAW/WSO. These applications were being forwarded to the regional office, De Kalb, Illinois, for handling. Subject, whose address is Illinois, was one of the applicants. shown as

The Vietnam Veterans Against the War (VVAW) was founded in the spring of 1967, by 6 young Vietnam veterans in New York City. At the beginning of 1968, with 600 members, VVAW opened a national office, founded the first GI newspaper "Vietnam GI", and sent close to 500 veterans into the Mc Carthy campaign to beat down the red baiters. After getting gassed at the Democratic Convention at Chicago and caught in the general "down" of the peace movement, VVAW was nearly inactive until the moratoriums in the fall of 1969. Members of VVAW led student strikes on major campuses across the country and battled veterans administration hospital authorities over threats to throw amputee Vietnam veterans out for signing antiwar petitions. At present, membership of the YVAW, nationally, consists of 8,500 members.

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



The Buffalo, Oneonta, Ithaca, Westchester-Putnam and Rochester Chapters had provided typed reports of their activities.

JANUARY 27

In line with national directives, the Buffalo chapter planned a week of activities around the anniversary date of January 27. We put out a leaflet stressing the three demands and publicizing the picket line demo that was held for two hours in front of the Federal Court Building. The demo was followed with an educational support that evening for friends and supporters.

Amnesty and Discharge Upgrading Projects

We have been working for some time with the Amnesty and Reconciliation Committee, a group representing a large number of religious and liberal organizations. It has been hard work, but A.R.C. is now coming out with a leaflet for mass distribution and a letter to raise funds.

The discharge upgrading project will also be coming out with a leaflet. Limited chunseling is being done now and lawyers David Addlestone and Susan Hewan of the Lawyer's Defense Committee in Washington actually prepare the briefs for appeal. More people have indicated an interest in working on the project and the goal is to be able ultimately to prepare our own briefs.

Political Education study group

For a couple of months a group of approximately 20 people have been meeting weekly to study in seven agreed-upon areas of interest: 1) labor struggles, 2) native American and third world struggles, 3) prisons and political prisoners, 4) oppression of women, 5) imperialism 6) Marxist theory, and 7) the history of socialist movements in the United States. Minutes of these discussions are kept both as a record of progress and as an aid to new members.

Film Committee

This is an on-going and regular community program that has proved its worth as a vehicle for internal education and struggle. The program has limited out-reach capacity only because we have not been consistently able to schedule films far enough in advance to publicize them properly.

Winter Soldier distribution

Paper sales are becoming an effective out-reach vehicle as well as an improved means of raising funds through a program of consistent presence at the Buffalo unemployment office.

Farah Strike Committee

Buffalo VVAW/WSO called for and is now a mamber of a coalition to support the Farah Strike. The coalition consists of VVAW/WSO, Attica Brigade, C.U.L.A. and a number of independents. 'The coalition will struggle around three points of unity:

1) a struggle against women's oppression

2) a struggle against run-away shops

3) a struggle for the basic democratic right to unionize. The strike committee's work should be extremely effective as a lot of publicity (free) will be generated around the Farah issue due to the AFL-called for and city-announced "Farah Week" to be held the second week of March.

Attica Coalition Committee

We are supporting the struggle of the Attica Brothers through participation in the Buffalo Attica Coalition and through close contact with the Attica Brothers Legal Defense Committee. This activity meets the six guide-lines suggested by national, and will allow for a real growth in the organization as we build stronger contacts in the Third World community.

Our activities in the coalition have centered around communications and co-ordination of activities planned for the end of this month in conjunction with Calendar Court Calls for the Brothers. We've taken responsibility for organizing and maintaining a mass rally on Monday, February 25, the first day of court calls. We intend to mobilize the community through leafletting to come out and pack the courtroom throughout the Calendar Court Days.

We have also worked with the Attica Brothers Legal Defense in what they believe is the most complete and comprehensive jury selection survey ever done. The Buffalo chapter has been asked to file an Amicus Brief with the court in support of the Jury Project's charge that the jury selection process in Erie County is overwhelmingly discriminatory against the young, third world people, and women.

Other activities planned include picketing, support suppers,

films, and rap sessions with the community.





ipter Report Oneonta, N.Y.

Since the NSCM, our chapter has been pulling itself back together, with considerable success. We have some new members and we now number 20 people. At a film showing recently five people said they would come to our next meeting; if they join, we will have 25 people. Following is a summary of our recent activities:

-Literature tables are being used for outrosch and

recruiting new members.

-Our amnesty campaign has consisted of leafleting, selling the posters and position pamphlets. In many cases we give people the posters and pamphlets rather than sell them. An amnesty committee has been set up in the chapter.

-January 27 activity: Three days of leafleting on continued U.S. agression in Vietnam, and a letter on the same subject published in the Oneonta Star.

-Winter Soldier street sales have tripled and four

local stores are now selling the paper.

-We sent letters to Riverside, Calif. Telegrams were too expensive We had a one-sentence telegram written up,

and they would have cost us \$7.00 each.
-Homer Folks Hospital - Homer Folks is a former tuberculosis facility which the state closed a year ago. Local people clearly want the facility to be used for veterans. The other veterans group (VFW, DAV, American Legion) want a nursing home for veterans. Our proposal is that the facility be turned over to the State University and that for at least five years the facility be used to the advantage of Vietnamera vets. Included in the proposal are special facilities for disabled vets (physically as well psychological), lowrent housing for vets and their families, and drug rehab. for addicted vets who want to go to school. Our proposal has been well publicized and it looks like it will be getting very serious consideration. Thanks to the NYC chapter for the drug info they provided. Chapters who want a copy of the position let me know.



Round Robin Report

The Westchester Futnam Chapter is coming together. We've been holding regular meetings, collecting dues modelled after. NYC, and have picked up new members.

In the beginning of March we will present our amnesty position to WestPAC, a clearinghouse/coalition of county organizations. We're anticipating support from ACLU, Clergy and Laity Concerned, and several local peace groups, and feel this should help in getting the area together behind universal and unconditional amnesty. The following week we're doing a (fund-raising) program at SUNY at Purchase -- showing the 90 minute Winter Soldier film with discussion after.

As a result of mectings of the VVAW/WSO Mid-Hudson Coalition (Mid-Hudson, Orange County, Westchester Putnam (MHOCWP)), there is an amnesty action planned for West Point on May 18th. It will be a lead-in to the Washington DC demo. We see the possibility of this developing into a regional action and will bring it up as an agenda item Sunday.


The chapter got some press coverage with an article in the local paper. We're also taping a radio show next week.


We've been invited to participae in a local high school's "Human Relations Veek" in April. We'll have a table for a day and will be given an hour and a half prime time for a program. On March 23rd we'll be taking part in the Concerned Democrats' "Issues Conference." We'll have a speaker on the program with Ogden Reid, Howard Samuels, Al Lowenstein, and Ramsey Clark and have a table set up for the day.

To push WINTER SOLDIERS we sent back issues to our 50 area libraries requesting them to include the paper with their reading selections and urging them to buy subscriptions. No news yet.

Rochester Chapters were not obtained. The chapters that did not provide typed reports orally described their activities as follows:

Mid-Hudson Chapter

The Mid-Hudson Chapter is working on the amnesty issue in connection with a local committee that has connections with the CPUSA. A problem has arisen in this regard because the CPUSA is alienated from the VVAW/WSO because in the recent past the VVAW/WSO had written a letter of censure to the CPUSA concerning some of their activities. In regards to amnesty, some media coverage of "Winter Soldier" articles has been obtained and the VVAW/WSO has also had time on some radio programs.

"Winter Soldier" is selfdescribed as the official national publication of the VVAW/WSO published monthly by the National Collective of the VVAW/WSO, 827 West Newport, Chicago, Illinois.

Orange County

The Orange County Chapter has succeeded in getting three major newspaper articles and a one hour program on radio concerning amnesty. Unfortunately, there has been little local response to this coverage. On January 27, 1974, several clergymen gave sermons supporting the amnesty position of the VVAW/WSO. There has been some work involving the impeachment issue, which has drawn a mixed response.





Suffolk County

The Suffolk County Chapter had broken up for a while and is just back together. It has not done much in the recent past but it has a lot of good ideas for the future. It is trying to become involved in some sort of legal action on Long Island and is attempting to send the "Winter Soldier" newspaper to prisons:

New York City

The NYC Chapter has recently become involved in a coalition with the Mayor's Office on Veterans Affairs (MOVA) regarding the amnesty issue. The chapter is pushing for a new coalition without MOVA because MOVA is run by an active duty Major and is seen as an attempt to channel veterans' agitation and frustrations into liberal solutions, thereby disorganizing any effort at presenting unified radical demands.

The NYC Chapter is having organizational problems and the Coordinating Committee of the chapter is trying to get more control over the activities of the individual members. The chapter has initiated an Outreach Program to get in contact with veterans and in this regard tables have been set up in the Port Authority Bus Terminal in NYC. The chapter is attempting to get Gary Lawton to go on a speaking tour. Peter Mahoney, who is from NYC, is currently available for speaking tours.

"Winter Soldier" issue of March, 1974, page two, reports that Gary Lawton is to be tried for a third time for the murder of two Riverside, California policemen.





Peter Mahoney is a former National Coordinator of the VVAW/WSO and a "Gainesville 8" defendant.

"Gainesville 8" refers to the eight VVAW/WSO leaders and members who were indicted by a Federal Grand Jury, Tallahassee, Florida in October, 1972 for violations of Federal statutes, including conspiracy to riot during the Republican National Convention, August, 1972. The eight were acquitted during August, 1973.

report on the activities of the New York-Northern New Jersey region since the last conference. Source furnished a copy of the report, which follows:



VVAW/WSO NY NNJ Regional Office

Round Robin Report - Regional meeting, Orange County, Feb. 16 & 17, 1974.

- 1. Since the last Regional Meeting, the Regional Coordinator and eight delegates from the Region attended the 11th National Steering Committee meeting at Yellow Springs, Onio in Dec., 1973. Delegates were from the Buffalo, Rochester, Ithaca, Oneonta, Mid-Hudson and NYC Chapters. At the last minute, the delegate from West Chester-Putnam could not attend and the seat was filled by Mike Mazzeti, currently with the Leavenworth Brothers Offense/Defense effort.
- 2. The region is slowly growing. There is a Chapter forming in Attica Prison and possible Chapters in Fredonia. Prison in Leesburg, NJ and the Utica Rome area. For the time being, the Region is handling communications for the currently defunct Connecticutt-Rhode Island Region. Right mow, we distribute 900 copies of "Winter Soldier" a month from the Regional Office: 700 to Chapters and 200 on a Regional mailing list.
- 3. Unfortunately, there has been little progress done on the Regio Winter Soldier Investigation. Due to a misunderstanding, it was not brought to the floor at the NSCM. It will be brought to the floor in the April NSCM. We are currently trying to get petitions, buttons and bumper stickers for a large scale amnesty campaign in the Region.
- 5. Balance at the last Regional Meeting was \$266.34. Income since then has been \$359.55 and expenses have been \$129.70. The current balance is \$269.19. Areas of income are donations, reimbursement for NSCM fees and resources and approx. \$240.00 raised in a book and record sale at the end of last month. Areas of expense are postage, resources, NSCM fees, office supplies, \$50.00 to the National Office for the Cairo-Bogue Chitto clothes drive and telephone calls. We have recently started a new system of book-keeping that will ultimately help us in filing for incorporation and non-profit tax status.
- 6. Assessment Due to a shortage of time and energy for committme the Regional Office has not been able to follow through on on-going programs to the extent necessary to guarantee success. In future weeks, an effort will be made to spread some of the work and correspondence out and to organize the Ri for maximum efficiently. Overall, though the state of the Region is good and chapters are growing in committment and activity.



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following information concerning some of the chapters in the region:

The chapter at Albany, New York is defunct.

The chapter at Potsdam is re-forming and has 40 people involved.

The chapter forming in Leesburg, New Jersey at the F-1 Prison is having a hard time due to the repressive atmosphere at the prison.

the National Steering Committee meeting of the VVAW/WSO that had been held in Yellow Springs, Ohio, December 26-31, 1973. Following this a discussion was held regarding criticism of the National organization, some of which has arisen regarding the rank and file treatment of the National Coordinators by the general membership. It was suggested that the various regions send letters to the National Collective to show their support. A letter to the National Collective from the New York-Northern New Jersey Region was proposed, which will show solidarity to the National Collective regarding criticism of the Collective by the members of the organization. This was unanimously approved. This letter will be sent to the National Collective shortly.

advised that on the afternoon of February 16, 1974, discussions were held on "Winter Soldier", Prisons, Amnesty and Discharge Upgrading and Coalitions.

Regarding the newspaper "Winter Soldier", it was decided that the rhetoric in the newspaper is better and not an embarrassment to the organization as it had been in the past.





Concerning distribution of the newspaper, it was learned that NYC gets 1,500 copies, Mid-Hudson gets 50 copies, Westchester-Putnam gets 350 copies, Orange County gets 100 copies, Buffalo gets 2,200 copies, Oneonta gets 200 copies, Ithaca gets 50 copies, Suffolk County gets 500 copies, Potsdam gets 200 copies, and Rochester gets 500 copies for monthly distribution. 250 copies are also sent out by the region to people on the general mailing It was brought out that some problem with the distribution of the paper has arisen lately. It was decided to check the bus lines to see if the paper could be distributed quicker by bus. It was decided that when the paper is distributed, the paper sellers should try for a consistent présence at a given location in order to facilitate the sales. It was learned that the NYC Chapter gives the paper free to GIs. It was also decided to look into the possibility of selling the paper at various bookstores on a consignment basis.

Concerning prisons, it was pointed out that the VVAW/WSO could probably make some progress in educating prisoners if they would contact representatives of various schools and academic programs which had been established within the prisons. VVAW/WSO Chapters are being set up at Attica, New York and Leavenworth, Kansas Prisons. The Trenton State Prison in New Jersey already has four political organizations operating within the prison.

Concerning amnesty and discharge upgrading, it was discussed that on March 8, 1974 Congressional hearings would be held regarding the amnesty issue. The National Collective should be contacted to ask them what their opinions is concerning these hearings. The National and the Washington-Virginia Chapters should be contacted regarding the March 8, 1974 hearings in order to get some members of the VVAW/WSO to attend the hearings.





It was felt that the VVAW/WSO should possibly take a liberal position regarding amnesty and not an anti-imperialist position. This means that amnesty should be tied into the objective of freeing all political prisoners.

Regarding the upgrading of discharges it was learned that there has been a recent court decision indicating that in the future honorable discharges cannot have attached to them a "SPN Number", which would indicate that the discharge was really given under other than honorable conditions. This presents a problem in removing these numbers from discharges that have been given in the past. The Buffalo Chapter has been mandated to research the court case to determine the retroactivity of the question. The NYC Chapter has a list of these "SPN Numbers" that are utilized and will send copies to all the other chapters.

Concerning coalitions, it was brought out that the VVAW/WSO will not form any coalitions with "Trots". There was some discussion at this point on the problems of being in the coalition with MOVA. It was learned that MOVA also had connections with "Penthouse" Magazine and the United Church of Christ. MOVA has attempted to diffuse all the programs that the VVAW/WSO is into. When VVAW/WSO members speak out the Mayor of NYC depicts these people as suffering from "crazed unresolved psychological problems". A proposal was made that a regional file be compiled documenting MOVA's connectionswith "Penthouse" Magazine and religious organizations.

CONCERNING A PERSPECTIVE FOR THE 10 OBJECTIVES

We are a mass democratic organization whose interests lie with the working class. This society was built and is maintained by the American working class, yet our human labor and sociallyproduced wealth are axpropriated by individual profiteers and The owners of the means of production enrich corporate elites. themselves at the expense of the workers who labor to build the society. The relationship of the capitalist class to the working class is inevitably exploitative. Capitalism needs the divisive, destructive dynamics of racism and sexism to keep the working class under its thumb. Owners and employers use sexism, racism, poverty, and structural unemployment to insure the availability of a work force at terms they can dictate. Other peoples of the world cannot escape the ravages of imperialism through which capitalism must expand. Only when the basic productive economic structure of this monopoly-capitalist society is fundamentally altered through working class struggle will imperialism, racism, sexism, and poverty be eradicated. With this struggle as a foundation, a new society will be created.

advised that there was some criticism of this Preamble, mainly by the who indicated that the Preamble was confusing inasmuch as it utilized too much Marxist-Leninist rhetoric, which would not be readily understood by individuals that the organization is trying to reach. A new Preamble was written, which reads as

"VVAW/WSO is a mass democratic organization whose roots lie in the working class. We have seen U. S. imperialism at work in Indochina and we experience its oppression every day in this country. We experience it on the job and in the unemployment line, in police repression and in racial discrimination, in sky-rocketing prices and the theft of our history of struggle. Our society was built and is maintained by the working class, yet out human labor and collective wealth are exploited by a profit-seeking corporate system. To enrich themselves, the owners of the means of production are attacking our living standards and destroying out environment.

"Capitalism to exist further exploits the history of racism and sexism in our society to keep people divided and powerless. Poverty and unemployment are also used by the owners and employers of the capitalist system to suppress the people and to maintain a work force at terms they can dictate. Only through unity of the working class and a commitment to ongoing political education and struggle against all oppression can we hope to end the inequalities of this system and stop its imperialistic nature."

furnished a rewrite of the Ten Objectives in the general form that they will be submitted to the National organization. This rewrite of the Ten Objectives is as follows:





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- "(1) Indochina there will be immediate implementation of the various accords in Indochina, cessation of aid to repressive regimes and non-interference with Indochinese liberation struggles.
- (2) Imperialism there will be an immediate termination of all operations by the United States Government, its agencies and American business interests that have decided to suppress the rightful struggles for liberation and self-determination of the peoples of Africa, Asia and Latin America.
- (3) Labor the organization will support all working peoples in their efforts to organize and strike in defense of their interests. The organization condemns all means of the state (i.e. strikes) used against working people. The organization ultimately supports the control of the means of production in this society by the workers.
- (4) Veterans the organization will work to secure for veterans educational benefits, medical care and productive employment which are the rights of all working people. The organization will resist all efforts to turn the veterans into a special interest group and will work to end all exploitation of veterans as a tool to divide the working class.
- (5) Militarism to end the use of the military as an oppressive and policy making force domestically and overseas and to end the spread of militarism in out society. (A sentence from the original objective as it now stands will also be used)
- (6) Racism the organization will work to achieve full democratic rights and total equality and self-determination for all third world people and oppressed minorities. The organization will struggle against racism in ourselves, in our organization and in our culture?





- (7) Sexism the organization will work to end economic, social, cultural and political discrimination against women and will work to guarantee women an equal place in society in the struggle. The organization will fight sexism in all its forms within the organization as it hampers struggles for liberation. (The delegates were evenly divided over the issue of including mention of homosexuality as a manifestation of sexism.)
- (8) Amnesty to secure universal and unconditional amnesty for all war resisters.
- (9) Political prisoners the organization will work to eliminate prisons, institutions and other methods that are used to sustain political and social repression. The organization will support all prisoners who are engaged in the struggle against oppressive policies and conditions within prisons. The organization will struggle for a society which offers genuine rehabilitation.
- (10) Ecology the organization will work to end the theft of natural resources and the destruction of the environment and to achieve an ecological balance with nature that will insure the health and maintenance of future generations.

stated that the proposed USMA action on May 18, 1974, will be coordinated by the Mid-Hudson chapter and that plans for this action will be finalized at the next regional meeting of the New York-Northern New Jersey Region to be held at Buffalo, New York, with Ithaca, New York, as a backup location on May 4-5, 1974. It was brought out that this action is a regional action and that all chapters should plan actions leading to a national demonstration in Washington, D.C., in late June or early July, 1974.

and advised that another piece of new business discussed on February 17, 1974, was the proposed speaking tour of Gary Lawton who will probably be available for such a tour In early April, 1974.

stated that the Suffolk County chapter indicated that they are sure they can get Lawton a \$150. honorarium for speaking at the Stony Brook College. The Oneonta chapter indicated that it will check into the possibility of Lawton appearing at Oneonta State College and the Buffalo chapter indicated that it could probably get Lawton a speaking rig at the State University of New York at Buffalo sponsored by the University of Buffalo Vets Club.





It was decided that an individual named (Last Name Unknown), who was with the Cary Lawton Defense Committee, telephone number (Last Name Defense Committee), be contacted to determine if Lawton would speak without receiving a honorarium. It was also decided that the region would contribute \$200. to the Gary Lawton Defense Committee.

advised that the VVAW/WSO will attempt to obtain speaking gigs for Cary Lawton at the State University of New York at Stony Brook, New York, Old Westbury College, Westbury, New York, and the Orange County Community College.

and advised that a discussion was held on Vietnam Era Veterans Day. Stated that it appeared that the Vietnam Era Veterans Day is a day that the Veterans of Foreign Wars and the American Legion are trying to set up to honor the veterans of the Vietnam war. If such a day is in fact set up, an action by the VVAW/WSO will probably be necessary to protest this "glorification" of militarism".

advised that the Vietnam Era Veterans Day has been proclaimed by the President of the United States to be held on March 29, 1974. It was mentioned that all chapters should meet "head on" any efforts by the administration to pacify veterans by actions locally and elsewhere, including one in Washington, D.C.

advised that two possibilities were discussed for activity by the region during the summer of 1974, the first being a VVAW/WSO educational caravan, and the second being a camp-out at High Falls, N., in late August or early September, 1974. A regional meeting could be held at the camp-out. It was decided that the idea of the educational caravan would be discussed further in the future.



If the preamble is accepted prior to the meeting, the New York State representatives will participate in the workshop on the rewrite.

advised that a discussion was held on the implementation of "Winter Soldier" concept upon the organization. The VVAW part of the title will not be dropped in the foreseeable future since the title gains credibility in referring to the organization. It was noted that the emphasis on veterans within the organization is intimidating to people who come into the organization under the "Winter Soldier" concept. The members of the organization must struggle together in order to provide the organization with the correct emphasis.

advised that it was mentioned that the long-range plans of the organization are to change its name to "Winter Soldier Organization" and to de-emphasize its image as strictly a veterans organization by openly recruiting non-veterans and women.





advised that the matter of direct action against the Veterans Administration (VA) was discussed. The Milwaukee, Wisconsin chapter had successfully taken over VA offices to bring attention to their demands regarding discharge upgrading. It was suggested that Milwaukee be contacted so that the New York Region might obtain copies of the leaflets used by the Milwaukee chapter and information concerning the action. It was decided that in the future the organization must make an analysis of the VA to determine how it works and where it fails.





Department was advised by letter dated 3/29/74 that in the absence of a specific request, the Bureau did not intend to initiate an investigation of the NCIN nor would any attempt be made to solicit the services of informants for the expressed purpose of traveling to Washington, D. C., to afford coverage of captioned demonstration. As of this date, no reply from Department has been received concerning this matter.

Numerous informants have been authorized to travel to Washington, D. C., for the specific purpose of covering the activities of their respective subversive organizations, so that any acts of violence or confrontation may be promptly brought to the attention of appropriate officials. These sources have been emphatically instructed to take a passive role and to avoid participation in or supporting of any confrontation or violence. These sources have also been advised that Bureau is not interested in legitimate acts of dissent in connection with captioned demonstration.

Any pertinent information furnished by sources will be afforded prompt dissemination to the Department, specifically the Civil Disturbance Unit, Secret Service, local authorities and to any other Governmental agency deemed necessary.

WFO, Chicago and Los Angeles being instructed to follow instructions contained in SAC Letter 72-17 (E) in covering proposed demonstrations. This provision (E), captioned "Lawsuits Against the Bureau," cautions field to utilize utmost discretion in conducting investigations in the security field, specifically in the coverage of demonstrations. It further cautions that information developed should be disseminated to only those agencies which have a legitimate need to receive it.







A preliminary inquiry has been initiated concerning the subject for the purpose of determining if the subject is a leader of activist of the VVAW/WSO, activities of which could anvolve violations of Title 18, U. S. Code, Sections 2383 (Rebellion or Insurrection), 2384 (Seditious Conspiracy), 2385 (Advocating the Overthrow of the Government), 2387 (Sedition), and 793 (Espionage).

On 9/24/74, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised captioned subject was in attendance at the Midwest Amnesty Conference, Cincinnati, Ohio, 9/21-23/73, which was sponsored in part by the VVAW/WSO. This source reported to no behalf of Chicago Area Military Project, attended this conference in an effort to meet with VVAW/WSO representatives to discuss the possibility of the Chicago Area Milimry Project functioning as a branch of the VVAW/WSO's national amnesty project. During this conference, policy regarding this matter was not established.

The Chicago Area Military Project is a Chicago based group primarily opposed to U. S. involvement in Southeast Asia. This group is also concerned with changes in military law as well as unconditional amnesty for those who oppose the Vietnam War.

Contact with appropriate sources, who are familiar with various phases of VVAW/WSO activity in the Chicago, Illinois, area, reflects captioned subject is not a member of the Chicago VVAW/WSO Chapter.



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

The VVAW was formed in 1967 as an organization of Vietnam veterans to protest American involvement in the war in Southeast Asia. Since that time, VVAW leaders have told members the VVAW is a revolutionary group, not "just another group of war veterans". Also, the membership has been told the VVAW has been asked to cooperate on an international level with many organizations, including communist and Maoist groups. Additionally, it was indicated that "anti-imperialist groups" consider the VVAW a potent organization of similar stature in the United States. In April, 1973, the group changed their name to VVAW/WSO so that non-veterans could be come members. Current VVAW/WSO national officers are Marxist-Leninist oriented and strive to educate their membership in Marxist-Leninist doctrine.

The St. Louis VVAW/WSO was formed in June, 1969 and affiliated with the National VVAW during 1971. Purpose of

the organization is to work for peace and the rights of minority groups through peaceful demonstrations; however, members have recently participated in guerrilla type training and reportedly have a cache of arms in case "it is needed in the streets".

On April 4, 1974 a confidential source whose reliability has been established advised that several members of VVAW/WSO were observed picketing and passing out literature in front of the Methadon Center, Cochran Veterans Administration (VA) Hospital, 915 North Grand, St. Louis, Missouri, at approximately 12:40 p.m., March 29, 1974. Between 2:30 p.m. and 4:45 p.m. six members of VVAW/WSO, St. Louis Chapter, met with Mr. Steve Savis, Director the the VA, St. Louis, Missouri. The group left Mr. Savis Office at approximately 4:45 p.m. There were no incidents or arrests during this demonstration.

On April 15, 1974 a second confidential source, whose reliability has been established in the past, advised that seven members of the St. Louis Chapter of the VVAW/WSO participated in a demonstration against the VA in St. Louis, Missouri at the VA Methadon Treatment Center, 915 North Grand, and at the Regional Director's Office, 1520 Market Street, St. Louis, Missouri, on March 29, 1974. The results of a meeting held at the Regional Director's Office of the VA was that the VVAW/WSO will submit a proposal to the VA, whereupon the VA will arrange so that four or five VVAW/WSO members could receive training to become VA counselors at a Veterans Service Center in the Soulard area of St. Louis, Missouri.

PURPOSE:

To advise of the highlights of VVAW/WSO NSCM in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, April 11 - 15, 1974.

BACKGROUND:

Six sources, including one in the National Office of the VVAW/WSO, attended captioned meeting. Sources advised that approximately 80 representatives of VVAW/WSO Chapters throughout the United States attended this meeting. Five main objectives were adopted and will be stressed in forthcoming activities, particularly during mass demonstrations scheduled for July 1 - 4, 1974 in Washington, D. C., at which approximately 3,000 people are expected to participate. These objectives are

- 1. Universal and unconditional amnesty.
- 2. End of all support of the Thieu regime in ... Vietnam and Lon Noll regime in Cambodia.
- 3. Decent benefits for all veterans.
- Full employment and education for all veterans.
- "Kick Nixon out."

Discussions indicated VVAW/WSO will merge for one-year trial period with the National Unitarian Organization of Churches (NUOC) which will provide funding and political support in the fight for amnesty, discharge upgrading and veterans issues. NUOC has not been fully identified as yet and there are no references in FBI Headquarters files.

Reportedly the majority of members support an anti-imperialist stance to build a mass organization which can appeal to leftists, anticommunists, communists, and individuals of all political persuasions which, as a consequence, appeals to a broad base of people. Thereafter, a grass roots political party can be formed which later can become anticapitalist in nature. The New York delegation felt the National Collective has developed an "elitist attitude" regarding the National Collective's role in the organization, feeling it is detached and superior to the mass membership. Samuel Schorr, number one national coordinator and leading Marxist-Leninist advocate, was reelected to the National Collective and Peter Zastrow, regional coordinator, Cincinnati, Ohio, was elected to the National Collective. Twelve workshops were held dealing with "death" drugs, amnesty, implant organizing, GI organizing, national defense, Indochina, mass demonstration organizing, VVAW/WSO objectives, prisons, general projects, Veterans Administration, and "Winter Soldier" publication. The next National Steering Committee Meeting is scheduled for August 8 - 12, 1974, and probably will take place in Buffalo, New York.

Security informants in attendance are being debriefed in detail and any additional pertinent facts will be brought to your attention.
