

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A CONFIDENTIAL SOURCE, WHO HAS FURNISHED RELIABLE

INFORMATION IN THE PAST, FURNISHED THE FOLLOWING INFORMATION ON NOVEMBER SEVENTEEN DASH EIGHTEEN, LAST, REGARDING THE VVAW STEERING COMMITTEE CONFERENCE HELD IN KANSAS CITY OVER THE WEEKEND OF NOVEMBER TWELVE DASH THIRTEEN, LAST.

A TOTAL OF APPROXIMATELY EIGHTTYFIVE PERSONS ATTENDED:
THAT CONFERENCE FROM ALL OVER THE UNITED STATES. DELEGATES
WERE COMPRISED OF REGIONAL AND STATE COORDINATORS OF VVAW,
ALONG WITH OTHER MEMBER DELEGATES. THE MEETING DISCUSSED
POLICIES AND PLANS OF THE VVAW.

JOE URGO JOINED HUBBARD IN FRIDAY NIGHT'S DISCUSSION

AND LATER ON SUNDAY, NOVEMBER FOURTEEN, LAST, URGO HIMSELF
SAID MORE, REGARDING THE POSSIBILITY OF A VVAW INSTIGATED
RELEASE OF PRISONERS OF WAR PAREN POW PAREN BY THE NORTH
VIETNAMESE. IT WAS NOT SPECIFIED BY EITHER URGO OR
HUBBARD IF SUCH A POW RELEASE WOULD BE PART OF THE NEXT
VVAW TRIP TO NORTH VIETNAM, BUT IT IS EXPECTED THAT THIS
IS THE REASON FOR THAT VVAW TRIP. HUBBARD SAID THAT HE
WOULD KNOW TEN DAYS AFTER HE LEFT PARIS OR SOMETIME AROUND
NOVEMBER TWENTYTHREE DASH TWENTYFOUR, NEXT, WHEN IN THE NEAR
FUTURE, AND HOW MANY VVAW MEMBERS WOULD BE ALLOWED TO
ENTER NORTH VIETNAM, AND THUS THE PERSONS TO GO ON THAT
TRIP WOULD BE DESIGNATED BY VVAW NATIONAL LEADERSHIP AT
THAT TIME. A LIST OF TEN TO TWELVE WAS TO HAVE BEEN MADE
OF PERSONS TO PREPARE FOR THE TRIP

URGO. WHO HAD RETURNED FROM NORTH VIETNAM IN AUGUST. OF THE WAR RESISTERS LEAGUE LAST . WITH OF THE WOMEN'S STRIKE FOR PEACE, SPOKE AND AS IF HE HIMSELF WERE WORKING FOR THE NORTH VIETNAMESE OFFICIALS. URGO SAID THAT THE NORTH VIETNAMESE DO NOT WANT TO SHIFT AMERICAN NEW LEFT EMPHASIS AWAY FROM THE ANTI DASH WAR ISSUE ONTO ANY OTHER ISSUE. THUS, THEY WOULD NOT WANT TO DISCUSS POW EXCHANGE DURING A VVAW TRIP TO WORTH VIETNAM BUT WOULD RATHER OCCUPY VVAW VISITORS WITH INDOCTRINATION .

NO ONE WAS HEARD TO SAY THAT THE CPUSA PAID FOR HUBBARD'S TRIP. HUBBARD WOULD SAY THAT THE VVAW LEADERSHIP IS PART OF THE PCPJ. URGO AT ONE POINT HAD STATED THAT WAY COULD ASSIST IN EFFORTS TO DELIVER MAIL FROM FAMILIES OF PRISONERS OF WAR TO POW'S THEMSELVES VIA AT ANOTHER POINT, AN UNKNOWN NATIONAL ORGANIZER SAID IN PASSING CONVERSATION THAT VVAW

WAW REPRESENTATIVE, SAID THAT SOME RICH LADY CONNECTED

IS A SOURCE OF FINANCES FOR VVAW. AL HUBBARD SAID THAT

THIS LADY WAS NOT A COMMUNIST BUT THAT SEVERAL OTHER MEMBERS

BELIEVE SHE IS

HIMSELF SAID THAT CPUSA IS NOT

FINANCING VVAW TO HIS KNOWLEDGE.

WYAW'S LEADERSHIP CONNECTION WITH PERSONS IN THE MILITARY IS NOT KNOWN TO WAW MEMBERS.

SEVERAL TIMES COMMENTS WERE MADE BY LEADERS INDICATING THEY DID HAVE CONTACT WITH SUCH PERSONS IN THE MILITARY BUT THAT THEY COULD NOT INFLUENCE WHAT THE MILITARY ACTIVISTS DID.

THERE WERE NO DISCUSSIONS BY ANYONE INVOLVING ANY
VVAW ACTION FOR THANKSGIVING, NEXT. THE ONLY REFERENCES

THIS POSTER WAS DESIGNED FOR USE BY ANY DELEGATION FROM
ANY AREA; HOWEVER, NOTHING WAS STATED IN THE CONFERENCE,
HEARD BY THE SOURCE, RELATING TO ANY SUCH ACTION. IN
ADDITION, AN ARTICLE ON PAGE THREE OF THE OCTOBER, LAST
ISSUE OF THE VVAW NEWSPAPER, "THE 1ST CASUALTY," ALSO
AVAILABLE AT THE CONFERENCE, INDICATED THAT VVAW WAS
CALLING FOR A THANKSGIVING BOYCOTT OF THE TRADITIONAL
THANKSGIVING MEAL. THE ARTICLE, HOWEVER, GAVE NO FURTHER
DETAILS OF THIS ACTIVITY.



THE BUCKS COUNTY PROPOSAL. WOULD CALL FOR MILITARY
PERSONNEL TO EXTEND THE NORMAL CHRISTMAS HOLIDAY TRUCE
IN VIETNAM BY REFUSING TO TAKE UP ARMS AFTER THE TRUCE
ENDED. THIS PROPOSAL WAS REJECTED SINCE IT WAS CONSIDERED
"TOO HEAVY" FOR VVAW AND SINCE VVAW COULD NOT GET THE
MILITARY PERSONNEL TO DO IT.

A SECOND PROPOSAL, "PHOENIX OPERATION," NAMED AFTER
AN ALLEGED CIA OPERATION TO ELIMINATE HEADS OF SOUTHEAST
ASIAN GOVERNMENTS UNFRIENDLY TO SOUTH VIETNAM AND
AMERICAN OPERATIONS THERE, WAS PROPOSED BY A NATIONAL
LEADER, POSSIBLY HUBBARD. THIS PROPOSAL WOULD HAVE
CALLED FOR A WELL DASH TRAINED UVAW GROUP IN WASHINGTON,
D. C. TO KIDNAP A UNITED STATES SENATOR, REPRESENTATIVE,
OR GOVERNMENT OFFICIAL TO HOLD FOR RANSOM TO PRESSURE FOR
ENDING OF THE WAR. NO OTHER DETAILS WERE GIVEN SINCE
THIS SEEMED TO BE ONLY AN IDEA FOR DISCUSSION. THIS WAS



REJECTED BY THE PARTICIPANTS OF THAT CLOSED, SESSION

SUNDAY, NOVEMBER FOURTEEN, LAST, WAS SPENT DISCUSSING PROPOSALS FOR VVAW CHRISTMAS ACTIONS, IN OPEN SESSION.

ALL OF THESE PROPOSALS WERE ACCEPTED IN PRINCIPLE, BUT NO FURTHER DETAILS WERE FORMULATED. IT WAS UNDERSTOOD THAT A FIVE DASH MAN COORDINATING COMMITTEE WOULD DEVELOP END PAGE EIGHT

THE SIX PROPOSED VVAW CHRISTMAS ACTIONS, ALL OF WHICH WERE ACCEPTED BY THE MEMBERSHIP, ARE AS FOLLOWS:

ONE DASH BURNING PUBLICLY A CHRISTMAS TREE WITH WAR TOYS
UNDERNEATH SIMULTANEOUSLY WITH PRESIDENT NIXON'S LIGHTING THE
NATIONAL CHRISTMAS TREE. IT WAS STATED THAT THIS TAKES PLACE
ON CHRISTMAS EVE, AND NO ONE SEEMED TO REALIZE THAT THE NATIONAL
CHRISTMAS TREE IS LIT WELL BEFORE CHRISTMAS EVE.

TWO DASH A "NON DASH CHRISTMAS DINNER," TO WHICH UVAW PAREN

NOT IN THE MILITARY PAREN WOULD INVITE PERSONS AND CHARGE ADMISSION,
AND WOULD CONSIST OF SITTING DOWN TWO EMPTY PLATES. THIS WOULD
DRAMATIZE ANTI DASH WAR AND ANTI DASH MILITARY PHILOSOPHY.

THREE DASH THE PUBLIC DONATION BY VVAW MEMBERS OF BLOOD TO BLOOD BANKS AND DESIGNATING IT FOR USE BY THE PEOPLE OF THE WORLD.

THIS FINAL FORM OF THE PROPOSAL DEVELOPED AFTER THE GROUP REJECTED PROPOSALS TO THROW THE DONATED BLOOD ON CHURCHES AND WAR MONUMENTS AND TO DESIGNATE IT FOR THE PEOPLE OF NORTH VIETNAM. BOTH THE "NON DASH CHRISTMAS DINNER" AND THE BLOOD DONATIONS WOULD BE DONE ON CHRIST-MAS DAY.

FOUR DASH PUBLIC TESTIMONY BY VVAW MEMBERS ON UNITED STATES
ATROCITIES COMMITTED DURING PAST CHRISTMAS TRUCES. THIS IS ALSO TO
BE DONE ON CHRISTMAS DAY.

FIVE DASH SOME OTHER SEPARATE FORM OF CIVIL DISOBEDIENCE TO BE EXECUTED ON CHRISTMAS DAY. NO DETAILS WERE PUT FORTH AS TO WHAT OR HOW, BUT SUCH DETAILS WOULD BE WORKED OUT BY THE FIVE DASH MAN COMMITTEE.

SIX DASH THE ESTABLISHMENT OF SANCTUARIES FOR SERVICEMEN PAREN INFERRING DESERTERS PAREN IN AREAS AROUND MILITARY BASES. ONE PROPOSAL, REJECTED AS BEING UNFEASIBLE, WAS TO TAKE OVER LOCAL CHURCHES. AN ALTERNATE IDEA WAS TO SIMPLY DECLARE A DESIGNATED AREA AS A SANCTUARY. THIS WHOLE IDEA, THOUGH ACCEPTED IN PRINCIPLE, WAS LEFT HANGING TO BE FINALLY DECIDED UPON BY THE FIVE DASH MAN COMMITTEE.

IN ADDITION TO THESE SIX CHRISTMAS ACTIONS, IT WAS STATED THAT THE FIVE DASH MAN COMMITTEE WOULD ALSO DECIDE ON NEW YEAR'S DAY ACTIONS.

FIVE LOCATIONS WERE DESIGNATED FOR THESE CHRISTMAS ACTIONS. THEY
WERE PUT FORTH BY REPRESENTATIVES FROM THOSE AREAS WHO VOLUNTEERED THEM
AS GOOD TARGETS FOR SUCH ACTIONS. IT WAS NOT INDICATED THAT THESE
CHRISTMAS ACTIONS WOULD TAKE PLACE ANYWHERE ELSE. THESE PLACES,
VOLUNTEERED FOR CHRISTMAS ACTIONS, WERE KILEEN, TEXAS, ATLANTA, GEORGIA,
AN UNKNOWN CITY IN CALIFORNIA, CHICAGO, ILLINOIS, AND VALLEY FORGE,
PENNSYLVANIA. IT IS PRESUMED THAT THE INDIVIDUAL MEMBERS OF THE FIVE
DASH MAN COMMITTEE TO PLAN THESE ACTIONS WILL BE IN CHARGE OF THE
ACTIONS TAKING PLACE IN THEIR AREAS.

ALSO OVERHEARD IN CASUAL CONVERSATION FROM UNKNOWN DELEGATES,
POSSIBLY FROM PHILADELPHIA, WAS THE STATEMENT THAT IT MIGHT BE A
GOOD IDEA TO "TRASH THE ARMY DASH NAVY GAME." HOWEVER, THIS WAS NOT
BROUGHT UP IN ANY MEETING AND SEEMED TO BE JUST AN IDEA OF A POSSIBLE
ACTION; JUDGING BY THE WAY IT WAS EXPRESSED, IT IS NOT THOUGHT THAT ANY
SERIOUS PLANS TO DISRUPT THAT GAME EXIST.

BUT NATIONAL AND REGIONAL LEADERS AND THAT SOME MEMBERS WERE TOO CONSERVATIVE AND THAT "WE'RE, IN A CONSERVATIVE ORGANIZATION.

MEMBERS FEEL, LIKE OTHER LOCAL DELEGATIONS, THAT MOST OF THE

VIETNAM VETERANS AGAINST THE WAR

On October 29, 1971

Petersburg, Florida Police Department, advised a Special Link
Agent of the FBI, that one JOHN CHAMBERS had made application with his department to allow 100 antiwar marchers (veterans) to march in downtown St. Petersburg on November 11, 1971.

CHAMBERS stated that this group had been barged from participation in the Veteran's Day parade in St. Petersburg on October 25, 1971

did not know if this group was militant or violence prone and did not know if a permit would be approved for this activity.

On November 15, 1971, a confidential source who has furnished reliable information in the past, furnished the following information:

JOHN V. CHAMBERS is the President of the Vietnam Veterans Against the War (VVAW) group in St. Petersburg, Florida, and is a student at the St. Petersburg campus of the St. Petersburg Junior College.

The VVAW, St. Petersburg, Florida, is a recognized student organization at the St. Petersburg campus of the St. Petersburg Junior College. This organization is made up of veterans who have served in Vietnam and has as its aim, by peaceful demonstrations and activities, to reveal to students and the public the horror of war and to help end the war in Vietnam.

On November 3, 1971, VVAW, St. Petersburg, Fla., held a guerilla theater on campus at SPJC after which they held the same theater in the streets of St. Petersburg.

On November 11, 1971, VYAW, St. Petersburg, Fla., held a parade and rally in that city at which JOHN CHAMBERS spoke and introduced the head of VYAW in Florida, name not recalled, who also spoke. Both speeches asked support for VYAW and to end United States involvement in the war in Vietnam.

and protest by a new left group was held at SPJC and although VVAW members were present, they did not participate in the temporary take-over of the office of the Dean of Student Personnel.

On November 16, 1971 furnished the identities of the leaders of VVAW, St. Petersburg, Fla. as follows:

JOHN V. CHAMBERS, President STEVEN BOWER RAYMOND ELLIS HARRY E BRADY

On November 16, 1971 condend who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised that he had just received information that a VVAW chapter had recently been formed on the Clearwater, Florida, campus of the St. Petersburg Junior College, with a membership of approximately 20-25 students. This group had had a small demonstration on campus against some U.S. Marine Recruiters who were on campus but the group had followed the guidelines set down by the school and the demonstration was peaceful.

On November 24, 1971 who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised that a chapter of VVAW had in fact been formed on the Clearwater campus in October 1971 and that their only activity had been the peaceful demonstration against the presence of U.S. Marine Recruiters on campus recently. VIETNAM VETERANS AGAINST THE WAR

On November 23, 1971 appeared at the Gainesville, Florida, Resident Agency of the FBI and furnished the following information concerning VVAW

VVAW has a strict policy of non-violence. ,

VVAW is a grouping of approximately 20,000 veterans of the Vietnam war who are opposed to the continuation of that war and believe that many atrocities have been committed by American servicemen in the Vietnam conflict. The VVAW believes that these atrocities have not been individual acts but have been promulgated by the United States policy in Vietnam.

Further, the war should be stopped immediately and that this could be achieved by VVAW through bringing the truth about the Vietnam conflict to the American people. In this regard, VVAW believes that they can work within the legal framework of the U.S.Constitution to achieve their primary objective of stopping the war in Vietnam.

in favor of democracy, believes in the U.S. constitution and should the United States be attacked, he would defend it.

Regarding policy made by national VVAW, each chapter can ratify or not ratify national policies and substitute its own policy instead. In other words, each VVAW chapter can operate autonomously from their national organization.

He advised that there are approximately 30 VVAW members in the Tampa, Florida area but no chapter has been formed



A. ADDRESS

On October 13, 1971 a first source made available some literature of the Vietnam Veterans Against the War (VVAW) which indicated its regional office for the States of Washington and Alaska was located at 520 Malden Avenue East, Seattle, Washington 98102, and the telephone number there was EAst 4-7539 as of October 1, 1971.

B. OFFICERS AND ACTIVISTS

1. SHELBY CARL HARRIS

On May 30, 1971 the "Seattle Times," a daily newspaper, reported SHELBY HARRIS, a Vietnam veteran, was a spokesman for the VVAW during a rally held on the eve of Memorial Day 1971 at Seattle.

On October 13, 1971 the first source reported the regional coordinator had signed some of the VVAW literature with the name, E.B. del F.SARIO.

The 1970 - 1971 University of Washington (UW) Student Directory contained the name of CORNEL del ROSARIO, 617 18th Avenue East, telephone EA 4-7456. The UW directory for the 1971 - 1972 academic year has not yet been published.

C. MEETING PLACE

Literature of the VVAW made available by the first source on October 13, 1971 indicated a regional weekly meeting was scheduled to be held every Monday at 8 p.m. at 520 E. Malden. This meeting was open to any member but Program Coordinators and Seattle/King County chapter officers were expected to attend each meeting. General regional meetings were to be held by all chapter officers and Program Coordinators once a month at different locations as soon as the membership had increased sufficiently to warrant this change.

D. MEMBERSHIP

The literature made available by the first source indicated the membershp of VVAW had doubled since the previous month and now (October 1, 1971) totals over 300 "and our membership drives have not yet begun." The regional office had received from the national office 250 membership cards, 250 VVAW buttons, 250 "I support" buttons, and 250 "1st Casualty" newspapers. The regional office will issue membership cards to those who join the VVAW in this region. Cards for those who joined through the national office were to have been mailed directly from the national office.

E. FUNDS

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The literature furnished by the first source indicated membership dues are \$5 but "This region will not exclude any brother or sister that desires membership in the VVAW on the basis of non-payment of dues."

The same material stated elsewhere in part "Because of the limitation of our treasury we were not able to send the mailing out to all our members in the region."

F. 'POLITICAL AFFILIATIONS

The material furnished by the first source stated in part "As brothers and sisters we cannot deny membership to any person because of that persons political affiliations. The VVAW is non-political in the sense that it will not ally itself with an established political party for the political gain of one and the detriment of another. Neither can the VVAW support an individual political candidate."

II. CONNECTIONS WITH OTHER ORGANIZATIONS

A. NATIONAL PEACE ACTION COALITION (NPAC)

The National Peace Action Coalition(NPAC) was founded in 1970 by members of the Socialist Workers Party (SWP). Its basic objective is to unite masses of people including labor unions, GIs, and the black community in the struggle to end United States intervention in Southeast Asia through orderly and peaceful tactics.

On April 23, 1971 the "University of Washington Daily" reported the VVAW was one of some fifteen groups making up the Seattle Peace Action Coalition (SEA-PAC).

SEA-PAC is the Seattle affiliate of the National Peace Action Coalition, according to a fifth source in April 1971.

On April 29, 1971 the fifth source reported the Veterans Against the War at the University of Washington was one of the organizations which endorsed the NPAC.

B. YOUNG SOCIALIST ALLIANCE

On August 20, 1971 a size source reported the SWP held a kick-off rally for the 1972 SWP candidates for President and Vice-president of the United States at Cleveland, Ohio. At this event an individual whose name was reported as "DON SONSETT" advised he was a member of a YSA local at Seattle and was actively working with veterans groups in Seattle. He said the VVAW is a good link in efforts to radicalize veterans. He said veterans were easy to organize.

III. VVAW ACTIVITIES

On May 17, 1971 the "Seattle Post-Intelligencer," a daily newspaper, reported the VVAW was one of several groups which had booths set up in barns during an anti-war rally held at Fort Steilacoom Park on May 16, 1971.

On May 31, 1971 the "Seattle Times" reported the Veterans Against the War had a contingent of about sixty persons which formed the closing segment of the annual Memorial Day parade held in Seattle on that date. The article indicated the group walked silently in a loose formation, rarely in step, and often responding to applause from bystanders with a peace sign and a smile.

On July 1, 1971 the "University of Washington Daily" reported the VVAW planned to join the American Legion's Independence Day parade the following Saturday.

On August 5, 1971 the "University of Washington Daily" reported the Veterans Against the War, an autonomous affiliate of the national organization, VVAW, planned to conduct a guerilla theater the following Sunday during the Seafair boat races. The purpose of the dramatization was to show the role United States soldiers play in the Indo-China war.

The article stated the VAW was a recognized organization on the University of Washington campus and its membership includes men and women with different political, cultural, and life style orientations having a commonality of experience in some branch of the Armed Forces. The VAW is held together by two basic positions:

1) Immediate withdrawal of all United States troops from Vietnam;

2) Constitutional rights for GIs.

On October 25, 1971 the "Seattle Times" reported the VVAW and a group of conscientious objectors marched near the end of a Veterans Day parade held that date.

On October 25, 1971 the "Seattle Times" reported the VVAW was one of several groups which participated in a rally composed of about 250 young people which assembled at the Seattle Community College and walked to Volunteer Park in Seattle the previous evening.

This trip is planned in order to transport food stuffs, medical supplies, and clothing to the black element of that city.

The VVAW was founded in the spring of 1967 by six young Vietnam veterans in New York City. At the beginning of 1968, with 600 members, VVAW opened a national office, founded the first GI newspaper, "Vietnam GI", and sent close to 500 veterans into the McCarthy campaign to beat down the red baiters. After getting gassed at the Democratic convention at Chicago and caught in the general "down" of the peace movement, VVAW was nearly inactive until the moratoriums in the fall of 1969. Members of VVAW led student strikes on major campuses across the country and battled Veterans Administration Hospital authorities over threats to throw amputee Vietnam veterans out for signing anti-war petitions. At present, membership of the VVAW, nationally, consists of 8,500 members.





Various sources in New Orleans indicated that the VVAW meets weekly in New Orleans, sometimes in conjunction with other organizations. Persons attending meetings usually average fifteen in number.

CONNECTIONS WITH OTHER ORGANIZATIONS

has advised through September and October, 1971, that the VVAW in New Orleans has met jointly with the New Orleans Peace Action Center (NOPAC) on September 7, 14, 21, and 28, 1971, and October 12, 1971. These meetings have been general planning and discussion sessions. The NOPAC has also supported the events planned by VVAW, which are detailed below:

The NOPAC was organized in the fall of 1970 to campaign for the election to the United States House of Representatives of Ben Smith. Though Smith was defeated, NOPAC continued to meet to organize antiwar activities in New Orleans.

Ben Smith acts as the main legal defender of liberal and radical causes in New Orleans

in addition to NOPAC, VVAW met jointly with the Workers' Militant Action Committee (WMAC) on September 14, 1971. The WMAC members, however, did not actually participate in the VVAW meeting but simply held their own meeting in another part of the same room. Several WMAC members did participate in VVAW anti-military leafleting activities at the United States Custom House in August, 1971, but since September 14, 1971, have not shown any interest or support in VVAW activities.

WMAC was formed by persons in New Orleans who had previously associated with Students for a Democratic Society (SDS) and the Progressive Labor Party (PLP) after both of those national organizations became defunct in New Orleans. WMAC has not shown any active interest in demonstrations.

Students for a Democratic Society (SDS) was founded during June, 1962, at Port Huron, Michigan, and in the 1960's functioned as the leading New Left campus-based student organization in the United States. From a stance of "participatory democracy," the SDS moved to a radical-revolutionary position. It maintained a national office at 1608 West Madison Street, Chicago, Illinois, until February, 1970. Internal factionalism during 1969 produced three main factions: Weatherman, Revolutionary Youth Movement (RYM), and Worker Student Alliance (WSA). The Weatherman and RYM no longer consider themselves associated with the SDS. The WSA faction continues to use the name SDS.

Weatherman, formerly a faction of Students for a Democratic Society (SDS), controlled the SDS National Office from June, 1969, until its closing in February, 1970. Weatherman then entered an underground status and adopted a tactic of "strategic sabotage," with police and military installations designated as primary targets.

Worker Student Alliance (WSA), a faction of Students for a Democratic Society (SDS), was expelled from SDS in June, 1969, by the then dominant Weatherman faction, but continued to use the name SDS and opened an office in Cambridge, Massachusetts. WSA aligned ideologically with the Progressive Labor Party (PLP) and, in February, 1971, moved to Chicago, Illinois, where it opened the SDS National Office at 1225 South Wabash Street.

The Progressive Labor Party (PLP) was founded in 1962 by individuals expelled from the Communist Party, USA, for following the Chinese communist line. Its objective is the establishment of a militant working-class movement based on Marxism-Leninism and MAO Tse-tung thought.

members of the Student Liberal Federation (SLF), also known as the Student Liberation Front (formerly a chapter of SDS at Louisiana State University in New Orleans (LSUNO), has supported VVAW recruiting activities on the LSUNO campus and in the SLF leaflet-paper, "The Thorn," advertising an upcoming VVAW meeting on September 21, 1971.

Another New Left group with whom VVAW has had contact was self-styled "Mic Crae's Guerrilla Group" (MGG).

The MGG consisted of the associates of Fitzhugh Mc Crae. Mc Crae bragged to a local television reporter of his group's plans to commit acts of terrorism. All of those plans were shown to be spurious in nature.

On September 1, 1971, the advised that at the August 31, 1971 meeting of VVAW, a person by the name of Fitz (later identified as Fitzhugh Mc Crae) and two other associates attended the meeting at the invitation of Don Donner, the leader of VVANCIA New Orleans Fitz claimed that he represented the "yippies" and asked that the VVAW support the group's activities in the future Members of VVAW felt that Fitz

The first confidential source advised on September 3, 1971, that Fitz

Fitz also proposed a protest activity between September 7 and 10, 1971, at a New Orleans convention of oil and gas companies, which activities would dramatize how those companies exploit America by handing convention delegates oil and blood-soaked fake money and possibly spraying them with oil. Don Donner was not impressed with these plans.

On September 14, 1971, the advised that at the September 7, 1971, meeting of VVAW and NOPAC, everyone in the meeting agreed that no one wants to associate with Mc Crae and his group. One member said that she was afraid that Mc Crae would possibly attract the attention of law enforcement officers, and it was not wise for anyone to associate with him for fear of being arrested. The group as a whole also agreed that Mc Crae's erratic tendencies could lead to violence which VVAW did not want to engage in.

On September 21, 1971, the stated that at the September 14, 1971 joint meeting or vvaw, NOPAC, and WMAC all the members again expressed their disdain of Mc Crae.

stated on November 10. 1971, that no connection had ever been shown by any of the leaders of VVAW in New Orleans with any national New Left

or subversive organization other than the national headquarters of VVAW itself. Pointer has stated that VVAW headquarters does not have too much influence on the plans of local VVAW.

OTHER ACTIVITIES

The VVAW's participation in picket protest demonstrations at the Orleans Parish Prison in support of prison reform demands have been previously reported. It is noted that those demonstrations never sought or developed any violence or confrontation.

September 14, 1971, that at the September 7, 1971 joint meeting of VVAW and NOPAC, it was suggested by a member of NOPAC that some action or demonstration should be planned to coincide with the visit of General Westmoreland in Hammond, Louisiana at an unknown time in the future. However, no specific plans were made, and no information from any source showed any further consideration given to such a demonstration.

On September 1, 1971, the adv sed that at the August 24, 1971, meeting of VVAW Don Donner stated that the New York headquarters of vVAW had advised all VVAW groups that they should work toward the support of a VVAW-sponsored boycott, by servicemen on duty, of Thanksgiving turkey. The VVAW was going to urge servicemen not to eat Thanksgiving turkey and to commit actions leading to court martial as a way of showing a concerted demonstration



of resisters to the military and the war in November, 1971. The VVAW was also urging its members state-side to support this action by unspecified activities leading toward arrests of VVAW members. No further details were given by Donner. Nothing else was done at the meeting to implement any such actions; no plans were made for VVAW activities around Thanksgiving.

Since that time, no source has provided any information regarding any more mention of VVAW plans regarding anti-war activities around Thanksgiving, either by persons inside the military or by civilian VVAW members.

on November 10, 1971, the stated that Conner has never again mentioned anything regarding VVAW-sponsored boycott of Thanksgiving meals by VVAW members in the military or commission of court martial offenses. The source evaluated Donner's advocacy of this on August 24, 1971, as simply mouthing the national VVAW proposal of those activities. At that time Donner had been quite proud of the fact that he was receiving information directly from the New York headquarters of VVAW. The source also recalled that the VVAW membership at that August 24, 1971, meeting did not seem at all receptive to any such plans because none of them wanted to be incarcerated in the Orleans Parish Prison. Since that time, VVAW members have not heard any more about any such Thanksgiving activities by VVAW inside or outside the military.

The dvised on October 4, 1971, that on September 28, 1971, during a meeting of the VVAW and NOPAC, Don Donner, said that VVAW would participate in the Veterans Day march on October 25, 1971. Donner, said that he was in the process of arranging that participation with the group administering that parade made up of various New Orleans veterans organizations. Donner said that he 176 hoped that the veterans organizations would refuse permission for VVAW to march so that VVAW would then bring a law suit against that group, by which attention could be drawn to the VVAW and its anti-war philosophy.

The advised on October 13, 1971, Donner said it had been decided that the VVAW would not be allowed to march in the veterans parade on October 25, 1971, and that he was contacting a lawyer to file a suit against the veterans group.

On October 26, 1971, the advised that on Monday, October 25, 1971, VVAW members and supporters gathered at Canal and Galvez Streets to join the Veterans Day parade as they passed by that point. Don Donner personally conversed with the Chief of Police who was standing there. Donner explained that VVAW wished to dramatize the need to end the war in Vietnam. He was told that they could not join the parade and that, if the VVAW marched alongside the veterans parade, that would constitute the offense of parading without a permit.

Donner then led the VVAW demonstrators, some of whom had not ever appeared at VVAW meetings previously, in a VVAW march for about a half a block on the sidewalk alongside the veterans parade. At a certain point, a policeman stated that the VVAW marchers, if they passed him, would be committing the offense of parading without a permit and would be arrested. Nost of the VVAW persons purposely passed the policeman and were directed to a paddy wagon and were placed under arrest. No violence or confrontations took place.

The arrest records of the New Orleans Police Department showed the following persons as being arrested in the 2100 block of Canal Street at 8:45 PM on October 25, 1971. on the charge of parading without a permit:

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

Vietnam Veterans Against the Composition, Incorporated (VVAW)

The Vietnam Veterans Against the War, Incorporated (VVAW) is a veterans organization with a National Office located at 25 West 26th Street, New York City (NYC). Its first published objective is to demand an immediate cessation of fighting and the withdrawal of all American troops from Indochina.

On October 24, 1971, a representative of the Naval Investigative Service Office (NISO), NYC, advised that at 12:00 noon on October 24, 1971, the VVAW would picket a Veterans Day activity of the Military Order of the World Veterans (MOWW) to be held at the Temple Emanuel, 5th Avenue and Wars (MOWW) to be held at the Temple Emanuel, 5th Avenue and East 65th Street, NYC. Members of the VVAW had been denied membership in the MOWW.

On October 25, 1971, a representative of the New York City Police Department (NYCPI), Security and Investigations Section (SIS), advised that a group of about 50 demonstrators, including the VVAW, demonstrated at the Temple Emanuel, 5th Avenue and East 65th Street, NYC, on the afternoon of October 24, 1971 to protest Veterans Day activities of the MOWW at that Plocation. Six demonstrators were arrested. The identities of the arrestees were not immediately available.

On November 23, 1971

NYCPD, East 67th Street, NYC, made available arrest records of that precinct which disclosed that the following six persons were arrested at East 65th Street and 5th Avenue, NYC, on October 24, 1971 between 4:15 p.m. and 4:30 p.m. during VVAW demonstration:


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

On this list appeared the names of Bob Dunne, 25 West 26th Street, MYC, Regional Coordinator for Vietnam, Jack Smith, 53 Wall Street, New

Haven, Connecticut, Regional Coordinator for Connecticut-Rhode Island and Ed Damato, 25 West 26th Street, NYC, Regional Coordinator for NY-Puerto Rico.

Source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, made available Liberation News Service (LNS) Packet 378 dated September 25, 1971. Page three of this packet set forth information that Joe Urgo, a member of the VVAW National Staff, and two other persons, traveled to Hanoi, North Vietnam, during August 13-21, 1971. During their stay they asked to meet with the Prisoners of War (POW) in North Vietnam but were denied. They were given a tape recording by United States POWs held by the Provisional Revolutionary Government of South Vietnam.

The LNS is self-described as an underground news wire service, with headquarters in NYC, which publishes news packets weekly that are sold to radical New Left underground newspapers. It was founded in 1967, and reportedly has a paid circulation over 600.

October 14, 1971

The VVAW's source of income has been through membership dues which are \$5, sale of buttons and bumperstickers, and through donations which are solicited at anti-war demonstrations, in which they have participated. The VVAW maintains a checking account at the Connecticut Bank and Trust Company, Mansfield, Connecticut, Account Number 251-367-6. During August, 1971, the Connecticut Chapter of the VVAW was \$3,000 in debt.

During September, 1971, the VVAW was still approximately \$12,000 in debt with a balance of \$1.88 in the bank and could not afford to send their financial statement to National Headquarters in New York. SMITH, while at the office of the VVAW in Connecticut, has been very concerned over possibilities of subversive groups attempting to dominate or infiltrate the VVAW and has been most careful to make sure that events of which VVAW will be participating, would be nonviolent in nature so as not to scar their image.



Haven't really got much to say - car's still hastling the hell out of me. Its sunday and I'm sitting in my office listening to Gonoud's Faust. (I've appropriated a little gear from Comm.) This is really helping me keep my head together. I can come up here and get away from all that whole desperate scene. I truly believe the worst thing about the military is not the pettiness or harrassment, nor the dehumanization & slavery, but rather the stence of rotting psyche's. This is a human sewage plant.
I've got a new address, again - but this time its not much

different.

I can't have any idea about the strength of the movement although I get discouraged by hip Kapitalists calculating the min. net profit margin acceptable on a dope sale. And red-eating rednicks don't do me much better. Nor do "brothers" who are unable to comprehend the notions of now or brotherhood.

Still, I can confidently say that the monster is crumbling. The adjutant was a little upset when he found that one platoon had applied for drug exemption and discharge — unanimously!

The program has only been going here for a little over a month, and, just in this reg't, (pop 2500?) there have been close to 250 applications. Over 150 are being processed or are out now! But, what adds humor, is that people apply for drug exemption just when convenient. A buddy was busted, U.A., waiting for office Hours, he goes on exemption.

More humor. Another buddy was busted holding the bag. (The probably won't do anything.) He was, and still is training N.C.O. It is his job to organize (but not give) drug abuse lectures.

"Michigan VVAW co-ordinator Dewey Ames estimated that over 8,000 GI's will assemble in Washington, D.C. for the action. 'We have been getting a good response,' he said, 'and expect about three hundred men from the state to attend'. \ \

"According to Ames, 'the five day encampment will end in the afternoon of the twenty-third with all veterans leaving the way they came; in peace'."

The article further reflected that individuals interested in participating in the march should contact VVAW at 4605 Cass Avenue, Detroit, 48201, or call 831-3446.

A Special Agent of the Federal Bureau of Investigation by suitable pretext on April 16, 1971 determined that the Michigan Vietnam Veterans Against the War were to leave Detroit at approximately 7:30 p.m. on April 17, 1971 scheduled to arrive at Georgetown University, Washington, D.C. on April 18, 1971. The veterans would be traveling in four trucks and an undetermined number of cars which might be available. The exact number of veterans going to Washington, D.C. from Michigan had not been determined although the caravan anticipated stops through Michigan prior to departing Detroit for the purpose of picking up participants.

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



On November 23, 1971, a source who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised that the Pittsburgh Chapter of VVAW has office space at 3601 Boulevard of the Allies, Pittsburgh, Pa. It is a loosely-run organization with about 30 active members. They have no elected officers and decisions are made collectively. There is very little leadership, with Bob Clarke and John Onda providing most of what leadership there is. All activities are decided by a unanimous vote minus no more than two descenting votes.

On October 13. 1971, source advised

The August 28, 1971, issued of the "Daily World," carried an article entitled, "Soviet Youth Secure and Confident," which reported that John Onda of the Pittsburgh Young Workers Liberation League (YWLL), and a Veteran who was active in the VVAW, was one of five delegates who toured the Soviet Union at the invitation of the Soviet Komsomol (Young Communist League), to study living and working conditions of young workers in Russia.

The "Daily World" is an east coast newspaper.

The YWLL, Pittsburgh, Pa., was founded in 1970 by the WPD-CPUSA. Its objective is the promotion of the aims: and objectives of the CP-USA.

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VIETNAM VETERANS AGAINST THE WAR (VVAW)

Source said primary weaknesses of VVAW is the lack of leadership and an excessive use of alcohol and drugs. Many of the group have drinking and drug problems. Members also tend to become hysterical when things go wrong.

Source advised that VVAW is one of six groups which constitutes the Serve the People Coalition (STP) in Pittsburgh. He said even though VVAW is part of the Coalition, they have no official ties with any other group in the Coalition or with any basic revolutionary or other subversive groups, with the exception of



Source advised that an example of this is as follows: He stated that during the Spring of 1971, BOB GODLOVE, a member of the UBVC, spoke to the UBVC and received a \$200.00 speaking fee. Objectives

On September 17, 1971, source advised that the goal of the UBVC is to establish programs at SUNYAB and the City of Buffalo which will encourage students and veterans to support their demand for an immediate end to the War in Vietnam and immediate withdrawal of all U.S. troops from that country and Southeast Asia. Source stated that at a meeting of the UBVC on June 23, 1971, attended by 17 individuals, the following resolutions were adopted and committees established to carry out these plans:

(1) That UBVC become active in the local labor movement and "educate" the working individuals as to the connect on between our capitalist economy and the address such as Vietnam.

(?) That UBVC become active in City of Buffalo s summer "Youth Cultural Program" with the hope of establishing contact with young men in the Buffalo area who will be eligible for the draft in the next few years, and to counsel these youth on methods of avoiding the draft.

- (4) That UBVC write a letter to National Vietnam Veterans Against the War condemning JOHN KERRY because of his family background and because of his political aspirations. UBVC feels that KERRY is in support of the U.S. Government and is only using VVAW to further his political desires.

In addition to the above, source provided several slingers handed out at various meetings of the USVC which demand such things as amnesty for all draft evaders and deserters, the termination of funds being used by the CIA to support "their illegal operations" in Latin America, Africa, China, Europe and Incodhina. In addition to the above, economic demands are made such as tax reform, the above, economic demands are made such as tax reform, the above minimum income of \$6,500.00 and demand that the guaranteed minimum income of \$6,500.00 and compensation U.S. Government and "giant corporations" pay compensation for the damage done to Vietnamage life and society.

Activities

On October 1, 1971, source advised that on September 29, 1971, another meeting of the UBVC was held. Two movies were shown, the first concerning the activities of the VVAN in Tashington and the second was a film on Army basic training showing how soldiers were trained in These files were presented by (Last Hame Unknown), who identified themselves as members of the Fort Hood Coffee House and Defense Front. These movies were attended by approximately 25 people who appeared to be curiosity seekers but also appeared to be in general agreement with the sentiments expressed in the movies. After the movies a meeting was held to elect officers for the UBVC. Source advised that at this meeting it was indicated that the UBVC would meet on the first and third Friday of each month at 5:00 PM at the Beef and Ale House, Main Street, Buffalo, New York.

On October 26, 1971, Agents of the FBI observed a demonstration of the VVAV. At 12:00 noon that date, approximately 40 demonstrators gathered at Lafayette Square, Buffalo, under a banner marked Vietnam Veterans Against the

War. At approximately 12:20 PM, demonstrators commenced marching, marched past the New York State Employment Office, Franklin Street, Buffalo, to the Federal Office Building, 1021 Main Street, Buffalo. Group was composed of approximately 30 white males, six white females and four blacks, college types appearing to be in their 20s. The rally and march was generally orderly and an escort was provided by the Buffalo Police Department. The demonstrators chanted various anti-war slogans as they marched, although they attracted little attention. Photographers of WBEN TV, Buffalo, noted during march.

Buffalo Police advised entire march and rally was conducted in an orderly fashion without incident. No arrests or injuries were reported to any law enforcement personnel or demonstrators. The demonstration terminated at 1:05 PM and the group dispersed peacefully


On September 30, 1971 who has provided reliable information in the past, advised that on January 26, 1971, Jon R. Floyd initially requested permission to organize a special interest club at the University of Texas at Arlington (UTA), Arlington, Texas, which was to be known as the Veterans for Peace. This organization is now known as the Vietnam Veterans Against the War (VVAW). The purpose of this organization was given as follows:

- 1. To make the student population at the University aware of the truths concerning U.S. Military involvement in Southeast Asia.
- 2. To bring to a halt U.S. Military involvement in Southeast Asia.
- 3. To delete the use of force from the United States arsenal of political weapons.

On July 14, 1971 who has furnished reliable information in the past, made available a copy of the objectives of the National VVAW, which is set out as follows:

- 1. To demand an immediate cossation of fighting and the withdrawal of all American troops from Indechina. We cannot allow one more human being to be killed in Indechina.

To demand Congress eract legislation for the immediate termination of all funds being utilized by the United States government, its allies and the Control Intelligence Agency to support their operations in Latin America, Africa, China, Europe, and the countries of Vietnam, Cambodiz, Laos, and Thailand.
- 3. To demonstrate that our military tactics dehumanize soldiers and civilians, and to make clear the United States government is prosecuting an illegal, unjust, and immoral war in Indochina.
- b. To show Americans that their society is structured by a racism which lets us view all non-whites as less than human. This racism pushes our minorities through inferior schools and into the combat arms. Thus, we send our minorities off to die in disprepentionately high numbers while we kill Asians indiscriminately. We domand that the military recognize its complicity in America's domestic and international racism.
- open investigation of American war crimes in Indochina, affirm the principles of European R. As active daty and former GI's, we recognize the responsibility of the individual soldier to refrain from committing war crimes. We also recognize that the responsibility and guilt of war crimes committed in the names of America lies with our policy makers at all levels.
- 6. To demand that all active-duty servicemen and women be afforded the rights as citizens that are guarantzed by the United States Constitution and Bill of Rights that are presently defied them by the Uniform Code of Military Justice. We are appaled that servicemen and women are treated as less-than-first-class citizens. We endorse the efforts of our active-duty sisters and brothers in their struggle to democratize the military.
- 7. To support all military personnel refusing to serve against their consciences at home and abroad. We demand Congress enact legislation for the immediate repairiation with full amnesty to those brothers and sisters who are in prison or in self-exile by reason of their refusal to serve in the military. We support all persons refusing to be drafted.
- 8. The immediate legislation of reform measures to provide an adequate level of services and benefits to all vetarans, including medical, housing benefits, educational and vecational training aid, and job placement.
- 9. That there be no distinction as to types of discharges and that a single type of discharge be issued; and that all veterans receive all rights and benefits under the VA, and companyation for service connected

On October 15, 1971 who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised in September, 1971, that David K. Robinson received permission from Texas Christian University (TCU), Fort Worth, Texas, to organize a club called the VVaw. Robinson stated that the purpose of the organization was to bring an end to the war in Southeast Asia. Robinson advised that membership dues would be five dollars, of which three dollars would go to the National office in New York.

Advised there are approximately 23 members at TCU and that they do not appear to hold regular meetings or to be very active in carpus affairs.

On November 22, 1971 who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised that on September 15, 1971, a VVAW organization was formed on the Eastfield Junior College (EJC), Mescuite, Texas. This organization has held two meetings a month on the campus of EJC and follows the purposes and objectives of the National VVAW advised the VVAW at EJC has not planned any demonstrations or marches to date.



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

Paper membership in the VVAW is probably around 100 and active members are mostly "hippie-type" student radicals, none of whom are over 30 years of age and some of whom are using various narcotics.

The VVAW funds, to date, have come from donations, the VFP and other peace groups, and it would appear that their resources at this time are very limited.

The VVAW members tend to associate only with each other, but they support the Black Panther Party and are accepted in radical circles and by other peace groups. Also, they refer to the police as "pigs," but at the same time, are very anxious to maintain a good image with the press.

The Black Panther Party (BPP) is a black extremist organization started in Oakland, California, in December, 1966. It advocates the use of guns and guerrilla tactics to bring about the overthrow of the United States Government.

The VVAW, as presently constituted, is organizationally inept, financially weak and could possibly be faced with problems from those members who are users of narcotics. Their aims and purposes are targeted toward ending the war in Vietnam and with this end result, now appearing to be a distinct possibility, the organization, as presently constituted, should be short lived.

A source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised in early April 1971, that an organization by the name of the Peace Action Coalition (PAC) was organized on the University of Tennessee (U-T) Campus, Knoxville, Tennessee, in order to work in conjunction with the National Peace Action Coalition (NPAC) in order to create interest in the massive anti-war demonstration, Washington, D.C., April 25, 1971 through May 5, 1971. The PAC working with the Young Socialist Alliance (YSA) at U-T, set up information booths on the U-T Campus.

The NPAC was founded in 1970 by members of the Socialist Workers Party (SWP). Its basic objective is to unite masses of people including labor unions, GIs, and the black community in the struggle to end United States intervention in Southeast Asia through orderly and peaceful tactics. The SWP has been designated pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

As the youth organization of the SWP, the YSA serves as the main source of recruitment into that organization. The YSA is described in the masthead of its official publication, "The Young Socialist Organizer," as "A multinational revolutionary socialist youth organization."

Safety and Security Department (SSD), U-T, Knoxville, Tennessee, advised a Special Agent of the Federal Bureau of Investigation on November 22, 1971, that the PAC is not

recognized as a campus organization by U-T and the faculty advisor is Dr. Richard Schuler connected with the Political Science Department.

The PAC is loosely organized, attempts to hold weekly meetings and cannot "get off the ground" as an organization. He stated the PAC is primarily interested in the anti-war movement.

The first, second and third source, who have also furnished reliable information in the past, advised in October and November 1971, that the PAC at U-T is active in the anti-war movement, however, it is loosely organized. The PAC started holding meetings on the U-T Campus in early October 1971, and at these meetings plans to attend and participate in the anti-war rally held November 6, 1971, Atlanta, Georgia, were discussed.

The leaders of the PAC are Jerry Foster, Alvin Burrell, Robert Thompson, and Walter Heilman. Burrell is the Treasurer and makes arrangements to obtain chartered buses to travel to anti-war demonstrations, the last one being held in Atlanta, Georgia, November 6, 1971. Approximately 25 to 30 individuals attend PAC meetings and 18 to 20 attend Steering Committee meetings of this organization where coming activities are formulated. Individuals attending are asked to join, however, membership is not a requirement to attend meetings because of the lack of interest by most students. The PAC welcomes any individual who will attend meetings or assist the PAC in their work.

The PAC obtains money to operate by setting up literature and information booths on the U-T Campus and asking for contributions and selling literature at these booths as well as at PAC meetings. In addition, letters are sent out to appropriate individuals including faculty members asking for donations to the anti-war movement.

PEACE ACTION COALITION

Sources stated the PAC advocates peaceful anti-war demonstrations.

The first source advised October 14, 1971, that the PAC sponsored an anti-war moratorium at the Student Center at U-T October 13, 1971, with approximately 75 to 80 individuals attending.

In the November 4, 1971, issue of the "U-T Daily Beacon," student publication, U-T, Knoxville, Tennessee, it was indicated that the PAC sponsored a talk at the University Center by David Troung, the son of a former South Vietnam Presidential Candidate who has been imprisoned in South Vietnam. Troung was critical of the South Vietnam Government releasing prisoners of war and at the same time continuing to keep his father a prisoner.

Second source advised November 8, 1971, that 36 individuals departed by chartered bus from the U-T Campus early November 6, 1971, and traveled to Atlanta, Georgia, where they participated in anti-war march at the State Capitol, returning to Knoxville the next day, November 7, 1971.

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contact with whom has been insufficient to determine his reliability, advised on May 20, 1971, that William Patterson, Vietnam veteran residing in El Paso, Texas, was the subject of recent publicity when he turned himself in to military authorities at Fort Bliss, Texas, claiming to have committed crimes against the Vietnamese people. Patterson as of May, 1971, was also attempting to organize and recruit in behalf of the Vietnam Veterans Against the War (VVAW).

The "El Paso Herald Post," dated April 2, 1971, page B-7, contained an article entitled, "Former GI Confesses to Killings." The article related that William L. Patterson of 10308 Newport Drive, El Paso, Texas, a former Army specialist and Vietnam veteran, handed U. S. Army authorities at Fort Bliss, Texas, a confession of premeditated murder. Patterson alleged he was guilty of participating in the murder of unarmed civilians in Vietnam.

On April 21, 1971 Criminal Intelligence Division (CID), Fort Bliss,

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advised that no prosecution was contemplated by military authorities. λ

"The Prospector," student publication of the University of Texas at El Paso (UTEP), issue of June 3, 1971, page one, contained an article entitled, "Antiwar Veterans Seek Members for El Paso Chapter." The following is quoted from the article:

"Vietnam Veterans Against the War (VVAW) is starting a drive to get new members in the El Paso area, according to Bill Patterson, local organizer.

"The VVAW are telling the American people the views and experiences of veterans who have first-hand knowledge of the American involvement in Vietnam and disagree with American policies there.



Source also advised that in addition to obtaining funds from the University legitimately, they also obtain funds by having members of the UBVC speak to the UBVC as "guest speaker." Source advised that an example of this is as follows: He stated that during the Spring of 1971, BOB GODLOVE, a member of the UBVC, spoke to the UBVC and received a \$200.00 speaking fee. According to the source, The \$200.00 fee was given to the UBVC by the Student Association of SUNYAR

Objectives

On September 17, 1971, source advised that the goal of the UBVC is to establish programs at SUNYAB and the City of Buffalo which will encourage students and veterans to support their demand for an immediate end to the War in Vietnam and immediate withdrawal of all U.S. troops from that country and Southeast Asia. Source stated that at a meeting of the UBVC on June 23, 1971, attended by 17 individuals, the following resolutions were adopted and committees established to carry out these plans:

- Labor movement and "educate" the corking individuals as to the connection between our capitalist economy and the need to create wars such as Vietnam.
- (2) That UBYC become active in City of Buffalo's summer "Youth Cultural Program" with the hope of establishing contact with young men in the Buffalo area who will be eligible for the draft in the next few years, and to counse L these youth on methods of vavoiding the draft:

The rally and march was generally orderly and an escort was provided by the Buffalo Police Department. The demonstrators chanted various anti-war slogans as they marched, although they attracted little attention. Photographers of WBEN TV, Buffalo, noted during march.

Buffalo Police advised entire march and rally was conducted in an orderly fashion without incident. No arrests or injuries were reported to any law enforcement personnel or demonstrators. The demonstration terminated at 1:05 PH and the group dispersed peacefully.

On September 30, 1971 who has provided reliable information in the past, advised that on January 26, 1971, Jon R. Floyd initially requested permission to organize a special interest club at the University of Texas at Arlington (UTA), Arlington, Texas, which was to be known as the Veterans for Peace. This organization is now known as the Vietnam Veterans Against the War (VVAW). The purpose of this organization was given as follows:

- 1. To make the student population at the University aware of the truths concerning U.S. Military involvement in Southeast Asia.
- 2. To bring to a halt U.S. Military involvement in Southeast Asia.
- 3. To delete the use of force from the United States arsenal of political weapons.

- l. To demand an immediate cessation of fighting and the withdrawal of all Archican troops from Indochina: We cannot allow one more human being to be killed in Indochina.
- 2. As active duty and former Olis, we recognize the responsibility of the individual soldier to refrain from committing war crimes. We also recognize that the responsibility and guilt of war crimes committed in the names of America lies with our policy makers at all levels.
- 6. To demand that all active-duty serviceman and women be afforded the rights as citizens that are guaranteed by the United States Constitution and Bill of Rights that are presently denied them by the Uniform Code of Military Justice. We are appaled that servicemen and women are treated as less-than-first-class citizens. We endorse the efforts of our active-daty sisters and brothers in their struggle to democratize the military.
- 7. To support all military personnal refusing to serve against their consciences at home and abroad. We demand Congress enact legislation for the immediate remainstant with full amnesty to those brothers and sisters who are in prison or in self-exile by reason of their refusals to serve in the military. We support all persons refusing to be drafted.



In its issue for September 28- October 4, 1971, the "Space City" carried a notice captioned "VVAW". In this article, it was mentioned the Houston chapter of the VVAW was to hold its first organizational meeting on October 5 in the Houston Room at the UH. For those interested in the VVAW who would be unable to attend this meeting, a telephone number of 526-6257 was provided.

The "Space City" is a weekly "underground" newspaper published in Houston, Texas.

The telephone number 526-6257 is carried in the "Space City" as that of the Space City headquarters at 1217 Wichita, Houston.

On October 13. 1971

The JBRL now defunct formerly was a small group of individuals in Houston, Texas, who had previously been associated with the now defunct Students for a Democratic Society (SDS) in that

Students for a Democratic Society (SDS) was founded during June, 1962 at Port Huron, Michigan and in the 1960s functioned as the leading New Left campus-based student organization in the U.S. From a stance of "participatory democracy", the SDS moved to a radical-revolutionary position. It maintained a national office at 1608 West Madison Street, Chicago, Illinois, until February, 1970. Internal factionalism during 1969 produced three main factions: Weatherman, Revolutionary Youth Movement (RYM) and Worker Student Alliance (WSA). The Weatherman and RYM no longer consider themselves associated with the SDS. The WSA faction continues to use the name SDS.

Weatherman, formerly a faction of SDS, controlled the SDS National Office from June, 1969, until its closing in February, 1970. Weatherman then entered an underground status and adopted a tactic of "strategic sabotage", with police and military installations designated as primary targets.

Worker Student Alliance (WSA), a faction of SDS was expelled from SDS in June, 1969 by the then dominant Weatherman faction, but continued to use the name SDS and opened an office in Cambridge, Massachusetts. WSA aligned ideologically with the Progressive Labor Party (PLP) and, in February, 1971, moved to Chicago, Illinois, where it opened the SDS National Office at 1225 South Wabash Street.

The PLP was founded in 1962 by individuals expelled from the Communist Party, USA, for following the Chinese communist line. Its objective is the establishment of a militant working-class movement based on Marxism-Leninism and MAO Tse-tung thought.

On November 8, 1971 reported an anti-war demonstration was held in Houston, Texas on November 6, 1971. The demonstration began with assembly at the Houston City Hall followed by a march to Hermann Park, where a rally was held representing the VVAW reportedly had signed up about 17 new VVAW members at this rally.

At this rally pamphlets were passed out under the name of The Vietnam Veterans Against the War with the address 1217 Wichita, Houston, and telephone number 526-6257.

On November 24, 1971 reported he had recently visited headquarters of "Space City" at 1217 Wichita and saw no indication that the VVAW had any space at these headquarters nor any representatives of that group at this location.

On November 29, 1971 advised the VVAW had become a campus recognized organization at the UH on November 2, 1971. The list of individuals affiliated with this organization at the UH submitted at the time recognization was requested included only the following names:

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

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
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

The Vietnam Veterans Against the War (VVAW is an anti-war organization organized in 1967 and headquartered in New York City. Its published objective is "to demand an immediate cessation of fighting and the withdrawal of all American troops from Indo-China."

In February, the Winter Soldie Investigation held its second, unoificial public hearing to demand Senate investigations into the war operations carried on every day by every soldier in Vietnam.

The first hearing was held in Washington. D.C. with a panel of sixty Vietnam veterams testifying as to their activities in the war. There were some eighty signed testimonies at that time.

The second hearing was held in Dotroit where some 100 Vietnam veterans testified and 300 others sat in the wings with additional testimonies.

The U.S. invaded Laos during the Detroit hearing, to which the VietNam veterans' organization responded with a call for immediate nation-wide actions, no specific date to be set. (At the same time, Madame Minh made her appeal to the Ann Arber conference.)

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The hearings are being conducted by an incorporated, legitimate organization of Americans service veterans--Vietnam Veterans Against The tribunal is an outthe War. growth of the Citizen's Commission of Inquiry which took place in December. Senators McGovern and Kennedy are pushing for official investigations from within the Senate. If that doesn't happen, Senator Percy will read the some 1000 pages of transcript into the Congressional records. In January, demands were made of the Secretary of the Army to hold war crimes investigations of orders made by officers.

Having already done their duty for their country, the Vietnam vets hope to use the media and public reaction to force the investigations

The action name the group will a use during the spring is Dewy Cannon 3. This results from the Lactian maneuvers. Dewy Cannon 1 was the secret invasion of Laos by the Marines; Dewy Cannon 2 was the open movement of the ARVN--relocating around Laos; and Dewy Cannon 3 will be bringing the war home through a continuation of the Winter Soldier investigations.

The vet campaign is in support of the People's Peace Treaty. After the Detroit hearing, sixty vets travelled to Windsor. Canada, to co-sign the Peace Treaty with several Vietnamese. "We have come together for more than just a fragile

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peace; we have dedicated ourselves to eradicating the roots of war and oppression, domestic and international." (The Treaty is also to be read into the Congressional records.)

In late March, vets will return to Washington to throw a body bag (bags used to transport the dead from battles to the pile), filled with metals from the vets, on the White House lawn-permit or no permit. (Bonus Army No. 2)

The document of boggining for the Spring Offensive will be a march through Washington in full dress

uniform carrying toy M-16's on Monday, April 19. (Deay Cannon 3)

Mike McCuster, the Oregon Co-ordinator of Vietnem Veterans Against the War, is interested in getting as many as sixty Oregon vets to go back for the march.

(During this interview. McCuster was reminded that the 19th of April was the day, 196 years ago, that the first shot of the American Revolutionary War was fired in Lexington—he smiled and remarked that they would fire the first shot of the second.)

mike, a sargent in VietNam between 1966 and 1967, rapped down the philosophy of the veterans organization around the My Lai insidence specifically and war crimes generally.

"William Calley cannot be held responsible for the war policy of America. Ity Lai was a natural outgrowth of policies which are carried out day to day.

For ten years, hundreds of thousands of us carried out operations against the Vietnamese daily with the same racism and the same goal of total obliteration of the Vietnamese people and culture. That is the root of the massacre at My Lai. To Calley's men, what they did that day in My Lai was not out of the ordinary. If Calley is to be tried, all of us must be tried."

My Iai is only a microcosm of this war of continuing oppression against all, even that town. The same area Calley burned has been turned for many years. In October, 1969, My Iai was totally destroyed a second time, but no one is on trial' for that. The government is using the whole thing as a way to hopefully appease the American people with another scapegoat tactic. As Mike said, "If Calley is responsible for thy Lai-then they can say the rest is a good clean, just and humane war."

(By the way, the survivors of the <u>first massacre</u> are suing the American Defense Dept. for the loss of belongings and food. This war is so obviously a war against the peoples of Vietnam that they can't just fight guerillas for they are the people. "It is right to rebel." Chairman Mao.)

The Vietnam Veterans Against the War are supporting the Massachusetts Bill recently introduced in the Oregon Legislature making it illegal for Oregonians to fight in an undeclared war.



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

John Wayne isn't what war is all about

Minter soldier investigation reveals more atrocities

By ROD PATTERSON Vanguard Staff

Officials in the Nixon administration claim the US is winning the minds and hearts of the Vietnamese. But many Vietnam veterans believe the President's policles involve winning their hearts and minds "to the tune of 20 rounds of ammunition in the head."

That appeared to be the consensus of 11 veterans at PSU Tuesday as they presented testimony into alleged war crimes and atrocities committed on the Vietnamese people by US forces.

The Winter Soldier Investiga. tion, held in SMC's Ballroom from 12:30 p.m. to 3:30 p.m., included two films and testimony that American troops kill prisoners, rape, torture and kill innocent civilians and defoliate the country's jungles.

One film, "Winter Soldier," contained excerpts from a national investigation held in Detroit late last year. The purpose of the inquiry, said one veteran testifying, is not to present phony indictments against the United States. It is not a mock trial and they reach no verdict. They simply attempt to inform the American public of what is happening in Vietnam.

The veterans call their investigetlon "Winter Soldier Investigations," after a phrase by American Revolutionary writer Thomas Paine. In 1776, in a pamphlet entitled "The American Crisis" Paine wrote: "These are the times that try men's souls. The summer soldier and the sunshine patriot will, in this crisis, shrink from the service of their country."

It is not uncommon, say veterans, for atrocities to occur every day. They often take the form of throwing Vietnamese suspects from helicopters after binding and gagging them and chopping off fingers, breasts, ears and heads to scare other prisoners into talking. After the Americans get the information they want, they may do the same to the informer, they say.

Dan Nicholson, PSU student and Air Force veteran, said, "All Vietnam veterans call upon Americans in forming an impartial war crimes commission to investigate atrocities committeed in Southeast Asia. We are committing genocide and we have turned all of Indochina into a series of concentration camps."

Acts committed in Vietnam, said Bob Welgh, a member of the Lane County Vietnam Veterans Against the War, are in direct violation of the Principles of Nuremberg. Under those principles, war crimes include murder, ill treatment of prisoners, plunder of property, and deportation, he said.

The day to day operations in Vietnam are to remove people from their villages and to wipe the villages off the map," he said. "I saw this happen every day."

Under "forced urbanization," Nicholson said, "We move in and tell villagers they can't live there any more, no matter how long they've lived there. After they leave, we level the village so they can't go back."

live in cities, they become, said Nicholson, prostitutes, orphans and beggars Because they are forced to leave beggars.

They don't know what communism or capitalism is. They didn't even know who Ho Chi Minh was, he said.

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Romblawton, who served in Vieta.

nam as a personnel specialist in
1966, cited further examples of the "dehumanizing" effects of
forced urbanization.

"The Vietnamese go to the garbage dump to try to find comething to eat beg for something to eat," be said. Since Americans are under orders not to permit this, he said, the Vietnamese are shoved away with gun butts or may have garbage dumped on them."

They were dehumanized and we were told they are all our enemies. So, whatever we did to them was all right," he said.

Part of the problem, as explained by Newton, is that US forces are not given enough instruction in the Vietnamese culture.

"It meant nothing to us," he said. "We had no classes in understanding their culture. Our culture was great and when we went into town, we acted like typical Americans – we stole from them and slapped them around if they got in our way."

they got in our way."

John Norem, member of the
Lane County Vietnam Veterans
Against the War and a former
US Marine, served in Vietnam
as a rifleman, interpreter, and
radioman. He was wounded after
a month and a half of duty and was
shipped home.

Norem's testimony perhaps best illustrated the claim by Dan Cougle, who was in Vietnam from 1965 to 1970 that "you're in a different state of mind while you're there. The first thing you notice is a complete hatred of the people."

"The first bodies I saw," said Norem. "were American bodies. That made me very mad and the first thing I wanted to do was kill some gooks. The next bodies I saw were gooks and that made me glad."

Next, Norem saw bodies he helped kill and his mood changed to one of indifference.

"I didn't feel glad or sad. I just felt like I was part of the machine." he said

machine," he said.

Norem confirmed Nicholson's earlier charge that the Vietnamese do not fully understand what this war is about when he said, "They don't know what's going on or what communism is all about. They plant a little field of rice and we used to go through the field and kick the shoots down. We could do what we wanted over there. It happens all the time because people just don't think about it."

He said Americans yell "Chou Hoi" - loosely translated meaning surrender and we will help you - down the holes that the Vietnamese crawl into and often shoot the Vietnamese as they exit.

Some veterans claim they were conditioned to believe that anything they did was all right because they were saving the nation. Norem said a chaplain told him killing "was not so bad being that it's in the name of the United States."

The claim by some supporters of the war in Vietnam that the US is fighting communism in Vietnam was also attacked by Norem.

was he's a Democrat or Republican?" he asked. "If he's a communist, does that negate his humanity does that negate his right olive?"

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Perhaps one of the most pressing questions brought to light by testimony about such wer crimes is why these soldiers did not report the incidents to their commanding officers.

One reason may have already been stated by Cougle - soldiers in Vietnam are in a different state of mind. Nicholson said he felt like a pawn. Norem said the alleged atrocities are common knowledge and soldiers in the field are operating on orders from the command.

"Who are you going to report it to? The command?" he asked.

Free fire zones are another atrocity, according to Norem. They are areas set aside where if anything moves, you can shoot it, he said.

"Anything that moves that is not on your side is a target. Kill it or do whatever you want to do," he said. "If you don't want to do it, there's someone next to you who will."

He described one instance when an elderly Vietnamese woman was caught in the zone and shot. Some children came along and the Americans, said Norem, rubbed their faces in the woman's bloody wounds.

If, as the veterans claim, they received little information about the culture of Vietnam, they learned less about accords of the Geneva convention. According to one veteran, they are told how to act if they are taken prisoner, but they are not informed how to treat the prisoners they capture.

Hence, a lot of the war crimes testimony centers around mistreatment not only of the civilians, but the prisoners as well.

Nicholson said US forces are defoliating the jungles of Vietnam with a chemical known as "Agent Orange." He said, "It contains thalidomide and it's eausing birth defects."

One veteran, Dennis Hoppe, 20, who just returned from Vietnam two months ago, seemed to sum up what the other 10 veterans tried to get across in their testimony when he said, "John Wayne isn't what war is all about."

"If this war is going to be stopped, then it's going to have to by stopped by the people." Nicholson said.

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

The Vietnam Veterans Against the War regions of Washington and Oregon are starting a drug rehabilitation campaign for veterans of the Indochina War. The drug problem, as recently brought to the attention of the general public by the press — and one which we have known to be acute for quite a long time through experience — is a problem of particular concern to us since, in comparison to the population of the United States, a disproportionate number of our brothers are affected. The primary purpose of the convention is to discuss the policy we will follow and the involvement of VAW chapters and regions in the Western U.S. concerning drug rehabilitation.

Our political involvement as an organization, in other words, What the Hell do We do Now?, will also be an issue under discussion.

The convention will be held in Trinidad, California, on the 28th and 29th of August, 1971. All VVAV members and their quests are invited to attend. The site is an 8 acre tract of land, formerly the Trinidad Head Therapy Center, privately owned, with a waterfront of 200 feet on the Pacific Ocean. Cooking and sanitary facilities are provided by three fully-equipped kitchens, two full-bathrooms and two half-bathrooms. Space for camping is available, which will accommodate more than 500 persons. Additional spaces are available, which will accommodate another 200 on the beach. Each vet should provide his own sleeping bag, tent (if you want one), food and whatever other forms of entertainment desired.

The site is just off Highway 101, two miles north of Trinidad, which is about 23 miles north of Eureka (and 15 miles north of Arcata — and 61 miles scuth of Crescent City, Calif.) Take the SEAVIEW DRIVE exit toward the beach (the Seaview Motel sign is a landmark), turn onto Seaview heading south — some 200 yards before you reach the COLONIAL INN you will see a dirt road; turn right onto that and follow it to the convention site, which is a group of stately appearing buildings forming something of a fat L. The dirt road elbows to the left past a part which dead ends. Take it to the left which leads right into the site. We will have signs directing you in case you get screwed up.

Del Rosario, from Mashington, and I will be on the site a few days beforehand. If for no other reason, the convention will provide a nice two days at the beach, and whoever wants to stay on a few days more is heartily welcome. Of particular interest for the Oregon bunch — hopefully (tongue in cheek) — elections will be held for a new regional coordinator. I am not much of an organization man and have not done much of a job in organizing the Oregon WAW: I believe someone who is really into organizing should put himself for election; however, this no Ladie's Aid Society with weekly teas and knitting sessions; so the organizing and activities should be of a realistic nature cognizant with our expectations. 

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

The Vietnam Veterans Against the War (VVAW) is a veterans' organization with a national office at 25 West 26th Street, New York City. Its first published objective is "to demand an immediate cessation of fighting and a withdrawal of all American troops from

New England Region

Indochina."

The VVAW "Newsletter" dated March 24, 1971, as furnished on April 20, 1971, by reflects the New England VVAW Regional Office is located at 65A Winthrop Street, Cambridge, Massachusetts, telephone (617) 492-5570. This office was opened in early March, 1971, to serve Vietnam veterans in Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Vermont, New Hampshire, and Maine. VVAW chapters were to be formed in local areas of New England with the Regional Office acting as a central clearing house and resource center.

It was suggested that in forming local chapters ads should be taken out in local newspapers and local colleges could be contacted for the names of veteran-students.

MEMBER OF SUBJECT ORGANIZATION The March 23, 1971, issue of the "Boston Herald" Traveler," a daily newspaper published in Boston, Massachusetts, reported that the VVAW was seeking the names of 170,000 people in Massachusetts who had received the state bonus for service in Vietnam. Arthur Johnson, regional coordinator for the New England VVAW, said that the names were being sought so they could be contacted by his group.

New England Regional Office shares space with MassPax,
an organization seeking the end of the Vietnam war through
peace candidates and peace legislation and with the Legal
In-Service Project (LISP), an organization which counsels
active-duty, military personnel.

Chapters

The April 9, 1971, edition of the "Press Herald," a daily newspaper published in Portland, Maine, reported that a VVAW chapter had recently been formed in Maine.

On June 2, 1971 and advised the VVAW has a chapter at Southeastern Massachusetts University, North Dartmouth, Massachusetts.

The August 31, 1971, edition of the "Providence Free Press," a weekly newspaper published in Providence, Rhode Island, reported that a VVAW chapter had been organized in Rhode Island in April 1971, and claimed a membership of 125 individuals. Its office was located at 119 Waterman Street, Providence, telephone (401) 331-9660.


On November 19, 1971 furnished a leaflet reflecting that a VVAW chapter had recently been formed in Worcester, Massachusetts, with an office at 19 Shussler Road, telephone (617) 799-7083.

The leaflet described the VVAW as a non-violent, non-partisan group of Vietnam veterans dedicated to ending the war, helping "our" brothers who have problems and preventing future Vietnams.

The group requested contributions and the opportunity for speaking engagements.

Leadors

On April 8, 1971 Stated that Arthur Johnson was the current regional coordinator of the VVAW New England Region.



The April 4, 1971, edition of the "Boston Herald Traveler" identified Arthur Johnson as a former Navy officer who had been discharged as a conscientious objector. This paper also reported that Beston cram was the other VVAW regional coordinator in New England.

"The Boston Globe," a daily newspaper published in Boston, Massachusetts, in its May 28, 1971, edition, represed Arthur Johnson was from Somerville, Massachusetts.

The "Boston Record American," a daily newspaper published in Boston, described Pestor Cram as a former Marine helicopter pilot from Cambridge, Massachusetts.

The May 27, 1971, edition of the "Lexington Minute-Man," a weekly newspaper published in Lexington, Massachusetts, reported that on May 24, 1971, one Marvin Gross appeared before the Lexington Board of Selectmen concerning the VVAW march during the period May 29-31, 1971. Gross stated he was a paid employee of VVAW and was not a veteran.

In November, 1971 advised John Kerry attended a VVAW Steering Committee meeting on November 23, 1971, in Kansas City, Missouri, at which time he resigned from the Executive Committee of the VVAW for personal reasons but stated he would continue to be active in VVAW and available to speak.

MEMBER OF SUBJECT ORGANIZATION

The March 28, 1971, edition of the "Boston Herald Traveler" reported Kerry, from Waltham, Massachusetts, was a VVAW Executive Committee member who was thrice wounded in Vietnam and awarded the Silver and Bronze Stars.

"The Boston Globe" on April 18, 1971, described Kerry as a former Navy lieutenant and swift boat commander in South Vietnam and a national organizer of the VVAW.

The June 1, 1971, edition of the "Boston Record American" reported John Kerry accompanied the New England VVAW during the period May 29-31, 1971, on their Memorial Day march from Concord, Massachusetts, to Boston.



On June 1, 1971; August 1, 1971; and September 20, 1971, "The Boston Globe" reported that Christophe Gregory was the new regional coordinator of the New England VVAW. He was identified as an Air Force veteran from Waltham, Massachusetts.

Membership .

May 24, 1971, that the New England VVAW has no definite membership but includes 500 to 600 interested people.

On October 21, 1971, a representative of the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI), utilizing a suitable pretext, telephonically contacted the VVAW office in Cambridge at telephone 492-5570. An unidentified individual answered and advised the VVAW has members in Maine, New Hampshire, Vermont, Phode Island, and Massachusetts and estimated the total membership as approximately 1,000, predominantly situated in the Greater Boston area.

Financing

stated in May, 1971, that the VVAW in New England was primarily financed through donations by interested citizens.

During the aforementioned telephone call on October 21, 1971, it was learned that the VVAW in New England receives most of its money through donations and collections.

Ties with Other Organizations

advised that Arthur

Johnson, 1970

is a permanent member of LISP and active in the establishment of an anti-war bookstore in Ayer, Massachusetts.

OODS TIAL

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It was previously mentioned that the New England VVAW shares office space with LISP.

On March 23, 1971 and advised that the Peoples Coalition for Peace and Justice (PCPJ) in its Spring Action Celendar of 1971 listed under "Dates to Keep in Mind" the notation "4/19-23/71, VVAW action in Washington, D. C."

A PCPJ press release dated March 1, 1971, described the PCPJ as being headquartered in Washington, D. C., and consisting of over one hundred organizations which are using massive, non-violent, civil disobedience to combat racism, poverty, repression, and war.

In April, 1971 stated that one Jery Lund who claimed to be a VVAW organizer from Massachusetts, and a former junior grade officer in the United States Navy, arrived in Atlanta, Georgia, during the weekend of April 2-4, 1971, to stimulate interest and enlist support for the VVAW demonstration in Washington during the period April 18-23, 1971. In Atlanta, he shared office space provided by the Atlanta Workshop in Non-Violence, a local draft and military counseling unit, and participated in a "Peoples Fair," a New Left festival sponsored by a representative cross section of Atlanta New Left groups. He also attended a meeting of the Atlanta Mobilization Committee, a coalition of New Left and peace groups dominated by the Socialist Workers Party (SWP) and Young Socialist Alliance (YSA), which engages in mutual sponsorship of Atlanta anti-war activities.

As the youth organization of the SWP, the YSA serves as the main source of recruitment into that organization. The YSA is described in the masthead of its official publication, 'The Young Socialist Organizer," as "A multinational revolutionary socialist youth organization."

The SWP has been designated pursuant to Executive Order 10450.





On May 3, 1971, the "Boston Record American" reported the New England VVAW had stated they would support the May 5, 1971, peace rally on Boston Common in Boston but would not support the planned civil disobedience in connection with this rally that concerned plans to shut down the John F. Kennedy Federal Building in Boston on May 6, 1971.

On June 2, 1971 stated that a VVAW representative attended a PCPJ meeting on May 27, 1971, at PCPJ headquarters, 173A Massachusetts Avenue, Boston, Massachusetts, and spoke of a VVAW Memorial Day demonstration to take place during the period May 29-31-1971

On June 15, 1971 across advised that at a meeting of the Greater Boston Peace Action Coslition (GBPAC) on June 7, 1971, it was reported the VVAW had endorsed a National Peace Action Coslition (NPAC) conference at Hunter College in New York City on July 2-4, 1971.

NPAC was founded in 1970 by members of the SWP. Its basic objective is to unite masses of people including labor unions, GI's, and the black community in the struggle to end United States intervention in Southeast Asia through orderly and peaceful tactics,

In June, 1971 and reported that at a National Conference of the PCPJ in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, during the period June 25-27, 1971, literature was distributed instructing coalition delegates to collect food, clothing, and medical supplies for their "brothers" in Ceiro, Illinois. A list of all VVAW regional coordinators, including the name Chris Gregory, Cambridge, Massachusetts, was supplied. Delegates were told that when their supplies were collected the regional VVAW coordinator in their respective areas should be called and he would arrange the pickup and transportation of the supplies.





On June 18, 1971 made available various documents utilized in the operation of the United States Servicemens Fund (USSF), 94 School Street, Cambridge, Massachusetts. One document contained various captions, one of which was "Military Legal Assistance." Under this caption was listed the VVAW, telephone 492-5570.

It was previously mentioned the above telephone is listed to the New England Regional Office of the VVAW.

The USSF is a fund claiming to support anti-military projects, such as GI coffee houses and anti-military GI newspapers throughout the country. Its function is supportive.

VVAW publicly distributed literature at Faneuil Hall, Boston, on October 7, 1971, requesting funds for the organization "National Action-Research on the Military Industrial Complex" (NARMIC). This literature revealed that NARMIC had been founded by the American Friends Service Committee (AFSC) in September, 1969, and was designed to aid and help organize community and campus groups in taking action against the Military-Industrial Complex.

"The Militant," which is the official weekly newspaper of the SWP, reported in its October 15, 1971, edition that the VVAW, GBPAC, PCPJ, and New England Student Mobilization Committee (SMC) would sponsor jointly a peace rally in downtown Boston on October 13, 1971.

The SMC is controlled by the SWP and its youth affiliate, YSA. SMC initiates and supports public demonstrations against the war in Southeast Asia.

"The Phoenix," a weekly radical newspaper published in Boston, reported in its November 17, 1971, edition that the VVAW planned to collect funds for the AFSC in Vietnam which furnishes limbs to Vietnamese who have lost theirs in the war.





It was previously mentioned that the VVAW shares office space in Cambridge, Massachusetts, with MassPax and LISP.

Aims and Objectives

On September 20, 1971, "The Boston Globe" reported the New England Regional VVAW had draftedlegislation proposing "total amnesty for Vietnam vets found guilty of abusing drug laws." The report reflected that Chris Gregory, the VVAW New England regional coordinator, had stated the VVAW wants to call attention to "totally inadequate rehabilitation facilities provided for addicts in the Boston area."

On October 13, 1971 advised the VVAW has set up an information and orientation desk at the Veterans Administration Hospital, Jamaica Plain, Massachusetts, and has entertained patients there with shows, music and books. VVAW buttons have been observed on personnel and patients at that hospital but there is no evidence the VVAW has engaged in unauthorized activities or distribution of their literature. Regulations forbid any organization from engaging in political activity or propagandizing their philosophy in such hospitals.

"The Daily World," an East Coast communist newspaper, reported on November 6, 1971, that the VVAW in New England had proposed a separate drug ward on the eleventh floor of the Veterans Administration Hospital in Jamaica Plain, Massachusetts, and a half-way house to be operated by ex-addicted GI's at an abandoned United States Navy base in Hingham, Massachusetts. This paper reported that federal funding is being sought for these projects.

On November 16, 1971 Furnished a leaflet bearing the caption "VVAW New England Region," which reflects the following information:

Military Counseling Project

VVAW works with and supports LISP, a military counseling organization for active-duty GI's. LISP helps





GI's with a variety of problems such as obtaining conscientious objector status, aiding in court-martial proceedings and medical discharges. LISP also acts as a referral agency for GI's with psychiatric or drug problems.

"Common Sence Bookstore"

VVAW works with and supports "Common Sence Books," a bookstore in Ayer, Massachusetts, near Fort Devens. This store provides an atmosphere for active-duty GI's to read and participate in constructive activities. Courses in literature, poetry, and crafts are offered. Help in publishing and organizing "Morning Report," the Fort Devens underground newspaper is provided by this store.

Research .

The VVAW has started to research the operation of the Veterans Administration and is working on legislation concerning veterans including unemployment and drugs. This fall VVAW will submit to Congress the following package of legislation for veterans' benefits:

- 1. Unemployment.
- 2. Realistic system of benefits for veterans.
- 3. Proposal for improving Veterans Administration facilities and patient care.
- 4. Proposals to amend military discharge procedures.
- 5. Guidelines for the rehabilitation of military and veteran drug addicts.

Drug Situation

VVAW in New England is currently in the process of setting up a live-in drug rehabilitation facility.



Veterans Administration Hospital

vvaw has established linkage with Veterans Administration hospitals in the area to demonstrate the group's concern and support to disabled veterans to obtain better treatment. Visits are made to hospitals to assist disabled veterans in organizing and helping themselves and to open up opportunities for these veterans to relate to VVAW activities.

Its published objective is "to demand an immediate cessation of fighting and the withdrawal of American troops from Indo-China." vvAV has participated in several demonstrations, including a massive demonstration in Washington, D. C., April 19 - 23, 1971.

I. Membership

Birmingham Confidential Source: 1 provided on August 30; 1971; a state-wide membership list for VVAW; Alabama; The list included 35 individuals who reside in the northern half of the State of Alabama;

II. VVAW Chapters

On August 16, 1971, Birmingham Confidential
Source 2 advised there were two existing chapters of
VVAW in the northern half of Alabama, one in Birmingham
with a membership of approximately six and one in
Tuscaloosa with a membership of approximately 30:

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III. Leaders

On August 16, 1971, Birmingham Confidential
Source 2 advised that MICHAEL Confidential of the Birmingham Chapter of VVAW. Birmingham Confidential
Source 2 has characterized CORNWELL as strictly nonmilitant and wanting to make changes "only from within the existing system".

On August 17, 1971, Birmingham Confidential Source 1 advised that TOW ASHBY is the leader of the Tuscaloosa Chapter of VVAV.

The September 13, 1971, edition of 'The Crimson-White," the University of Alabama newspaper, quotes ASHBY as saying, "... they (The Tuscaloosa YVAW) are one hundred percent non-violent and would not participate in civil disturbances"

IV. Weaknesses

The only obvious weakness noted among either of the above-mentioned VVAW Chapters to date has been the complete lack of organization and meetings of the Birmingham Chapter as noted by Birmingham Confidential Source 2:

V. VVAW Ties With Particular Revolutionary or Subsersive Groups

There are no known organizational ties between either the Birmingham or Tuscaloosa Chapter of VVAW with any particular revolutionary or subsersive group.

VI. Source of Funding

Neither of the Tuscaloosa or Birmingham Chapters of VVAW publish a newspaper or distribute leaflets. Neither Chapter preforms any activity which requires financial support. Birmingham Confidential Source 2

Re: Vietnam Veterans Against The War
(VVAV)

advised on September 2, 1971, that the only financial contribution required of VVAW members in Alabama has been a \$5.00 membership fee which is paid directly to the National VVAW Headquarters in New York City, New York.

VII. Prospective Views of Birmingham and Tuscaloosa Chapters, VVAW

The Birmingham and Tuscaloosa Chapters of VVAW have as their objective the ending of the war in Vietnam. Both Chapters are organized to reach their objective through peaceful, non-violent means and through action from within the "existing system".

The November 7, 1971, edition of the Tuscaloosa
News, a daily newspaper of general circulation, described
the Tuscaloosa VVAW Chapter membership as being actively
involved in volunteer service at the Veterans Administration
Hospital, Tuscaloosa, Alabama. The VVAW members, among
other voluntary activities, engage in sports activities
with patients and provide transportation for hospital
patients to and from the hospital and special rehabilitation
programs.

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
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Bruce Charles Patterson, Richard West, and Ronald Michael Thomey are currently members of the CVM. Source Two advised on February 2, 1971, that as of January 31, 1971, John R. Wierzba was a member of the Los Angeles Branch - Young Socialist Alliance (LAB-YSA).

As the youth organization of the Socialist Workers Party (SWP), the Young Socialist Alliance (YSA) serves as the main Source of recruitment into that organization. The YSA is described in the masthead of its official publication, "The Young Socialist Organizer," as "a multinational revolutionary socialist youth organization."

The YSA in the Los Angeles area is actually the youth organization of the SWP and follows the SWP aims and purposes to the letter. \ \

The SWP has been designated pursuant to Executive Order 10450. \

Although not holding any specific elected office of the CVM, the following individuals have been identified as demonstrating an enthusiastic and militant demeanor with regard to their participation in CVM sponsored activities and functions:

The VB was formed in June 1969, by a coalition of New Left organizations to encourage American youth to travel to Cuba in defiance of a ban on travel to that country by the United States Department of State. The ostensible purpose of the travel was to assist the Castro regime in the harvesting of sugar cane and other agricultural products and to give young Americans the experience of living in a revolutionary communist country.


On July 6, 1971, Source Four, advised that on June 25, 1971, Samuel R. Schorr attended the National Peoples Coalition for Peace and Justice (PCPJ) at Milwaukee, Wisconsin. \ \

The PCPJ was self-described in March 1971 press release as being headquartered in Washington, D.C., and consisting of over one hundred organizations employing massive civil disobedience to combat issues of war, racism, poverty and repression.

On June 17, 1970, Source Five advised David George Shulman was one of the editors of "Military Intelligence."

On July 14, 1970, Source One advised that the newspaper "Military Intelligence" is an anti-military publication self-described as an "analytical press service, whose purpose is to reach large numbers of GIs just coming into GI movement, and to give GI organizers material that they can hand to people that will fully answer their questions, lead them to action, and to make the GIs themselves into organizers.





Dennis Gale Mc Bride Robert Matthew Mc Kernan, and Buckley Stableton are members of the CVM.

ORGANIZATIONAL WEAKNESS

On October 26, 1971, Special Agents of the FBI observed a demonstration sponsored by the CVM, held at the Armed Forces Building, 4727 Wilshire Boulevard, Los Angeles, California, at which time approximately seventy five demonstrators protested the United States involvement in the Vietnam war. During the course of the demonstration, protestors attempted to block the entrance and sidewalk to the Armed Forces Building; however, these protestors were dispersed by the Los Angeles Police. Department without incident.

On October 20, 1971, Source One had advised that prior to the demonstration, the primary objective was to disrupt military inductions and counseling. This objective coincides with the CVM objectives as advised on September 17, 1971, by Source Four, who has furnished reliable information in the past, that at a September 9, 1971, meeting of the CVM, it was decided that the CVM would in the future participate in nonviolent civil disobedience and that draft boards and induction centers would be the focus of anti-war activity.

Source One advised on November 26, 1971, that the CVM's apparent failure to disrupt activities of the miditary induction center located in the Armed Forces Bulliding on October 26, 1971, has resulted in an even more pronounced apathetic attitude by the rank and file CVM members. Source One attributes the lack of significant achievement on behalf of the CVM activities is due primarily to little or no cohesion among members with regard to specific CVM policy and objectives toward current United States Indochina diplomacy and involvement. On July 7, 1971, Source One advised that at a July 4, 1971, CVM meeting Buckley Stapleton (supra) stated that the ground work





in forming the CVM would take a long time because "the CVM people were too divided upon their policies." Source One further advised that the demonstration of October 26, 1971; was the only singularly sponsored CVM demonstration and produced extremely limited effects in view of CVM projected goals of 500 demonstrators and disruption of induction activity.

ASSOCIATION WITH SUBVERSIVE GROUPS

Source One advised on October 27, 1971, that the CVM headquarters located at 1508 North 2nd Street, Santa Monica, California, were being occupied in conjunction with the PCPJ, which would assist in defraying rental and utility expenses.

Source Six advised on September 20, 1971, that the CVM is presently coordinating anti-war activities with the Peace Action Council (PAC) and has assisted in past demonstrations such as the PAC sponsored protest of manufacture of napalm at the Sergeant Fletcher Plant, El Monte, California, on August 6, 1971. On November 9, 1971, Special Agents of the FBI observed the CVM participating in a co-sponsored PAC dimonstration against President Nixon at the "Salute to the President" dinner at the Beverly Wilshire Hotel, Beverly Hills, California.

The PAC is an umbrella organization which coordinates demonstrations and other forms of protest against American involvement in Southeast Asia

Sources One, Four, and Six advised that with the exception of the two aforementioned organizations, CVM has no known association with other subversive or revolutionary groups

Source One advised on November 26, 1971, that funding for the CVM is achieved primarily from solicitation of donations from the members itself and occasional sale of leaflets and anti-war literature at demonstrations and rallies. As evidence of this fact, the CVM has frequently been behind in payment of debts and Source One advised on October 12, 1971, that a fund raising dance had been sponsored by the CVM on September 25, 1971 to pay delinquent telephone and utility bills in excess of \$180.





The entire conference lacked coordination and appeared to be a platform for John Merry, National Leader of VVAW, rather than for VVAW and Winter Soldier Investigation (WSI).

WSI was attended by many persons and approximately twenty persons testified. The testimony was taped, but was not filmed.

The entire convention was attended by no more than 120 persons, approximately 50 to 75 of which attended the WSI Hearing. Approximately 50 of those at the WSI Hearing were VVAW members from the states surrounding Oklahoma.

The audience for a speech by John Kerry was quite large. A workshop held after Kerry's speech was attended by quite a few people, including one student from Iran, who spoke to the crowd as well as the parents of a Marine who died in combat in Vietnam.

WSI and the workshops were emotionally trying experiences for many of the persons present. The reason many people were upset is that those persons testifying told of atrocities and "war crimes" committed by the U. S. service personnel.

The tapes made at the WSI Hearing were signed over to a local Oklahema City television station, possibly Channel 5.

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VIETNAM VETERANS ACAIRST THE WAR

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The BPP is a black extremist organization started in Oakland, California, in December, 1966. It advocates the use of guns and secretile tectics to bring about the oversthire of the United States Government.

On October 13 and 14, 1971 furnished the following:

Appreximately 100 persons participated in several "Stop the war - no business as usual activities in Norman, Oklahoma, on October 13, 1971, sponsored by the OU War Resisters League (WRL) with support of OU VVAW. Activities consisted of a "bike-in" tying up parking spaces in business areas near the OU Campus in an effort to stop business. On one occasion, "bike-in" participants blocked the sidewalk, but moved when police instructed them to break it up. No arrests were made. Later, a guerrilla theatre was conducted on the South Oval and balloons were released in the OU Administration Building in an effort to halt business operations of the university. A group later appeared at the OU Student Union chanting obscenities. Later, participants entered the Armory and served an eviction notice on ROTC. Further activities included a group marching through the union chanting obscenities and blocking aisles, which group dispersed when approached by police. A candlelight procession was held through the OU Campus. Jerry/Fetiprin, WRL member, led most of the activities and was accompanied on occasions by Daniel."

One document consisted of two pages and was captioned "Message #3, 12 Aug 71." Under the subcaption "Chapter Reports" there follows reports on various WPP Chapters, including the Bartlesville, Oklahoma Chapter and includes the following: "Bartlesville - they are busy selling Red Books and rapping to the people. They also came to Tulsa for a VVAW rally and to meet some Oklahoma City people."

The WPP is a national white, hippie-oriented revolutionary organization which was founded essentially to afford support to the BPP.

It has advocated the published ten-point program of the BPP and has added a ten-point program of its own, all of which call for the unbridled personal freedom of the individual.

On October 15, 1971
Intelligence Unit, Tulsa, Oklahoma, relice Department, rurnished a copy of a police report consending a rally sponsored by VVAW at the Civic Center, Tulsa, on Angust 7, 1971. The report reflects that various persons spoke for two and one-half nours and a short play enacted a massacre by U. S. servicemen within a Vietnam village. Speakers generally expressed antiwar views. 





Veterans for Peace was first organized in June of 1969 to attract veterans of all ages to the anti-war movement. Due to lack of ability to recruit members, the organization was dissolved in January of 1970. The group was reorganized in October of 1970 and has continued to function as an anti-war organization since that time. From June, 1969, to January, 1970, organization was under partial control and influence of members of the Community Party and the Socialist Workers Party. Since its reorganization in October, 1970, these organizations have had no influence in the group's activities.

The St. Louis Branch of the Socialist Workers, Party (SWP) was organized in 1938 and had functioned continuously since that time as an affiliate of the National SWP. The St. Louis Branch SWP discontinued regular meetings; however, local members have supported anti-war activities and have remained affiliated with the National SWP as "members-at-large". The SWP has been designated pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

Richard Bangert said he had been to Chicago the preceding weekend for a meeting with VVAW representatives from other cities. Bangert apparently stayed in Chicago for activities relating to a fund raising dinner for the Republican Party.

It was also learned that a \$38,000 ad was appearing in the Playboy Magazine sponsored by the VVAW depicting a flag draped coffin. The ad brought a wide increase in interest in the VVAW nationally.

Two St. Louis representatives of the VVAW travel to Pevely, Missouri, on two Sundays in each month, to the Teamsters Union recreational facility located there. These persons brief 50 to 60 Teamsters on what the VVAW is doing. These persons are paid \$50 per visit which is used to defray the costs of operating the Peace Information Center (PIC)



Vietnam Veterans Against the War (VVAW) is an anti-war organization organized in 1967 and headquartered in New York City. Its published objective is "to demand an immediate cessation of fighting and the withdrawal of all American troops from Indochina." VVAW has participated in several demonstrations, including massive demonstrations in Washington, D.C., April 19-23, 1971.

A VVAW group was founded in March, 1971, consisting primarily of veteran students at Arizona State University (ASU), Tempe, Arizona. The group was a member of a Phoenix city-wide coalition consisting of anti-war, anti-draft and minority groups which sponsored the National Peace Action Coalition April, 1971, demonstrations in Phoenix, Arizona.

The National Peace Action Coalition (NPAC) was founded in 1970 by members of the Socialist Workers Party (SWP). Its basic objective is to unite masses of people, including labor unions, GIs and the black community in the struggle to end United States intervention in Southeast Asia through orderly and peaceful tactics.

The SWP has been designated pursuant to Executionder 10450.

VVAW also participated in the demonstration on June 25, 1971, during the speech of Vice President Spiro T. Agnew at the National Young Republican Convention in Phoenix. The demonstration was non-violent and the only incident occurring did not involve the VVAW demonstrators.

random intervals that carried items of local interest concerning anti-war and other "causes" as well as national news from "Earth News" releases, carried an article captioned "V.V.A.W." This article stated the two main functions of the VVAW is "to inform the people of America as to what is really going on in Vietnam" and "to tell what military life is actually like in the United States Armed Forces". "The Vietnam Veterans Against the War will fill in the gaps left by the government and news media".

The September 20, 1971, "Street Press" in an article captioned "V.V.A.W. Objectives" stated the following nine objectives:

- 1) To demand an immediate cessation of fighting and the withdrawal of all American troops from Indochina.
- 2) To demonstrate that military tactics dehumanize soldiers and civilians and to make clear the underlying government policies of the United States military and the Nixon administration in prosecuting an unjust and immoral war in Indochina.
- 3) To bring together a national coalition of veterans and others so that persons with first hand knowledge of the military and Indochina war can effectively voice their opinions.
- 4) To show that opposition to the war does not stem from cowardice or disloyalty.
- 5) To show that Americans allow their society to be pervaded by racism, which lets us view.

- 6) To demand immediate increase in Veterans
 Administration funds to correct the deplorable conditions in VA hospitals and to facilitate the initiation of rehabilitation programs.



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- 7) To make clear the United States has never undertaken an extensive, open investigation of American war crimes in Indochina.
- 8) To demand that all active duty servicemen be afforded the same rights that are guaranteed by the United States Constitution and the Bill of Rights that are presently denied by the Uniform Code of Military Justice.
- 9) To deplore inhumane treatment of all persons imprisoned as a result of the Indochina conflict.

peace centers, the Tempe Peace Center and the Phoenix area peace centers, the Tempe Peace Center and the Phoenix Peace Center. Some of the material which the VVAW members distribute are provided by the centers. The VVAW is in contact with the national organization, which has its regional headquarters for the southwest in New Mexico.

The VVAW in Phoenix has set up a booth in a shopping center mall and distributed their literature. At the present time they have only distributed in one shopping center. They have to expand to the other large shopping centers in the Phoenix area.

The VVAW members in Phoenix are not affiliated with any particular political party or movement but are persons of varying political philosophies that have united as being veterans opposed to the Vietnam war.

The VVAW has obtained some finances through donations at their booth in the shopping center. The VVAW plans to rent a booth at the Arizona State Fair, to be held in November at Phoenix. In order to finance this fair booth they have applied to the regional headquarters of the VVAW for a loan. The local VVAW has approximately 25 active

members and they claim to be able to gather 200 to 300 persons for any particular demonstration. The leadership of the local VVAW changes constantly as persons are available. There is no actual real leadership. Various persons at different times are recognized as spokesmen for the group. There is no organizational structure to the VVAW in Phoenix. The members are predominantly from the Phoenix area and with the exception of their views on the Vietnam war are moderate in their feelings toward the United States and the government. There is no known influence from so-called subversive organizations such as the Young Socialist Alliance or Socialist Workers Party (SWP).

As the youth organization of the Socialist Workers Party (SWP), the Young Socialist Alliance (YSA) serves as the main source of recruitment into that organization. The YSA is described in the masthead of its official publication, "The Young Socialist Organizer", as "A multinational revolutionary socialist youth organization".

The VVAW have added their name to the membership list of the Phoenix Anti-War and Oppression Coalition (AWOC), a coalition of anti-war, anti-draft and minority groups who sponsored the demonstration on April 24, 1971, and are currently formulating plans for a demonstration on November 6, 1971. The VVAW has not as of yet attended any AWOC meetings.

Early in September, the VVAW group went to a Navajo Indian tribal celebration and fair at Window Rock, Arizona, and presented their ideas to Indian veterans. Representatives of Phoenix VVAW also attended a western regional meeting held in New Mexico.

The VVAW has its headquarters at 102 West Almeria Street Phoenix, which is a home rented by five or six

veterans. The current spok sman or leader for the VVAW group appears to be a Tom Haugen. A David van Dyke, who also is a spokesman for the local group, claims to be the state coordinator for VVAW in Arizona. Neither of these persons reside at the above address.

The October 4, 1971, issue of the "Street Press" indicated the Arizona and New Mexico VVAW had a booth at the Navajo Tribal Fair held September 9-12, 1971, in northeastern Arizona. The VVAW handed out anti-war literature to attendees at the fair. It was reported that over 40 Navajo veterans were put on the VVAW membership roster. These included two World War II veterans and one Korean War veteran.

On October 25, 1971
Inspectional Services, Phoenix Police Department, advised the Phoenix VVAW participated in a National Guard sponsored Veterans Day parade in Phoenix on this date. The VVAW was not an invited organization; however, they marched under a separate parade permit and followed the main parade group by two blocks. The VVAW was led by six persons carrying a mock coffin draped with an American flag. There were approximately 50 participants and there were no problems or disturbances.

The VVAW personnel were asked to leave their booth at the fairgrounds during the Arizona State Fair. The Fair Committee told the VVAW they had received 15 complaints against the VVAW booth and some of the complainants stated they would tear the booth down if the Fair Committee did not remove it. On the second day of the fair the booth was dismantled by fair personnel and the VVAW people were evicted from the booth. On the next day VVAW continued to pass out leaflets at the space which they had recently occupied.






