

who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised on February 11, 1972, that Vietnam Veterans Against the War (VVAW) representatives from Denver, Colorado, and Lawrence and Ottawa, Kansas, arrived in Kansas City to continue their trip to Ciaro. Illinois, on the early morning of February 12, 1972. Advised that at approximately 2:45 a.m. on February 12, 1972, the representatives, including Kansas City, departed in a caravan with vans and personal cars loaded with food, clothing and medical supplies. Advised that no weapons were among the supplies taken to Cairo departing from Kansas City.

The VVAW was founded in the spring of 1967, by six young Vietnam vaterans in New York City. At the beginning of 1968, with 600 members, VVAW opened a national office, founded the first GI newspaper, "Vietnam GI," and sent close to 500 vaterans into the McCarthy campaign to beat down the red baiters. After getting gassed at the Democratic convention at Chicago, and caught in the general "down" of the peace movement, VVAW was nearly inactive until the moratoriums in the fall of 1969. Members of VVAW led student strikes on major campuses across the country and battled Veterans Administration Hospital authorities over threats to throw amputed Vietnam veterans cut for signing anti-war patitions. At present, membership of the VVAW, nationally, consists of 8,500 members.

advised that part of the Kansas City caravan arrived in Cairo, Illinois, at approximately 1:30 p.m. on February 12, 1972, and the remainder of the caravan arrived at approximately 4:30 p.m. After arriving, advised that contingencies from Lawrence, Kansas; Denver, Colorado; Chicago, Illinois; Kansas City, Missouri; and Ottawa, Kansas, were represented at the Cairo meeting.

said that at approximately 5:00 p.m., a rally was held at the St. Columbus Church, Cairo, Illinois, and a militant Negro preacher named Koen spoke about the injustices inflicted upon Negroes throughout the United States by police and the Government. Source also noted that Bart Sage, Chicago VYAW chapter head, also spoke. Approximately eighty people attended the rally at the St. Columbus Church.

advised that all of the supplies were unloaded from the different vehicles and no guns or ammunition were seen.

advised that the St. Louis, Missouri, VVAV chapter had one representative in Cairo, a white female, name unknown.





Trespassers on Liberty

Sixteen trespassers, saying they were affiliated with the Vietnam Veterans Against the War, a demonstration cutfit, seized the Statue of Liberty for 20 hours.

They left only after the National Park Service got a court order.

The week between Christmas and New Year's is a peak time for visitors to the Statue of Liberty. As many as 2,000 a day, many taking advantage of school vacations to bring their children, go to this historic spot.

But the 16 trespassers barricaded the doors and for two days nobedy could get in. The island even was closed to sightseeing boats.

The government flew in a squad

of riot police from Washington but didn't use them. Cops and other officials stood by as the park service tried to compromise, effering the demonstrators a camp site on the grounds. Finally, the government went to court.

Another bunch of demonstrators tried the same tactics at the historic Betsy Ross House in Philadelphia. There the cops took about 45 minutes to arrest them.

Philadelphia police evidently believe tourists have some rights, too. But the authorities in charge of the Statue of Liberty had to think it over—for 20 hours — while some sightseers were deprived of a chance to see the statue, perhaps their only chance.

On December 30, 1971, at approximately 10:45 a.m., Special Agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation observed that nine members of the Vietnam Veterans Against the War (VVAW) had occupied the office of Major General E. DONALD WALSH, State Adjutant General, State Armory Building, Hartford, Connecticut. Entry had been made without force and the office was barricaded from the inside by moving furniture against the door.

Connecticut State Police who were called to the scene gave the demonstrators every opportunity to leave the office without being arrested, but spokes man for the group, advised they were staying until a date was set to end the war in Vietnam. At that point, all nine were arrested on charges of first degree criminal trespassing. The nine VVAW members marched out of the building with their hands placed behind their heads in traditional prisoner of war fashion amid the boos and cat calls showered by a group of "hard hats" who had assembled on the scene. The nine individuals arrested





The Vietnam Veterans Against the War was founded in the Spring of 1967, by six young Vietnam veterans in New York City. At the beginning of 1968, with 600 members, Vietnam veterans Against the War opened a national office, founded the first GI newspaper "Vietnam GI ", and sent close to 500 veterans into the Mc Carthy Campaign to beat down the red baiters. After getting gassed at the Democratic Convention at Chicago and caught in the general "down" of the peace movement, Vietnam Veterans Against the War was nearly inactive until the moratoriums in the Fall of 1969. Members of Vietnam Veterans Against the War led student strikes on major campuses across the Country and battled Veterans Administration Hospital authorities over threats to throw amputee Vietnam veterans out for signing anti-war petitions. At present, membership of the Vietnam Veterans Against the War, nationally, consists of 8,500 members.

On February 4, 1972, Confidential Source One, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised that Vietnam Veterans Against the War (VVAW) Chapters in Colorado, Utah, and Wyoming, plan a caravan commencing February 10 grough February 14, 1972, to Cairo, Illinois, to bring food and supplies to the black community.

On February 10, 1972, a second confidential source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised the Kansas City VVAW will leave Kansas City, Missouri, on February 12, 1972, with food and medical supplies en route to Cairo, Illinois. Approximately ten Kansas City VVAW members are expected to make this trip. VVAW members from Denver, Colorado are expected to arrive in Kansas City February 11, 1972, and both VVAW members from Kansas City and Dever will continue to Cairo on February 12, 1972.

A third confidential source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised on February 11, 1972, approximately ten to twelve VVAW members plan to leave Denver, Colorado en route to Cairo, Illinois with food and clothing for minorities in Cairo, Illinois. This same source advised there is no indication that firearms are being carried.

A fourth confidential source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised on February 13, 1972, that approximately 15 to 20 individuals, claiming to be members of the VVAW, arrived in Cairo, Illinois, about Noon, February 12, 1972, in seven vehicles bearing licenses from Michigan, Indiana and Illinois. All these individuals, according to this source, were "hippies" with long hair and beards. Two of these vehicles pulled U-Haul trailers which contained food and clothing. The supplies were taken into the St. Colombo Church, 414 - 14th Street, Cairo.

The United Front of Cairo is a predominantly black organization which has been boycotting white merchants since April, 1969. The United Front of Cairo leader is Charles Enlow Koen, Executive Director.

A fifth Confidential Source who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised on February 13,

1972, that there were no demonstrations and no publicity given to the appearance of VVAW members in Cairo, Illinois. This source advised that approximately 15 to 20 members of the VVAW brought food and clothing to Cairo.

Illinois State Police, advised there were no demonstrations nor confrontations in connection with the appearance of VVAW members in Cairo on February 12 or 13, 1972.

On February 14, 1972, Acting Chief of Police stated that VVAW participants left the Cairo, Illinois area, late P.M. on February 13, 1972.

representatives have not yet been selected. It was agreed that a national action will be planned by VVAW to take place 3/11-25/72 upon President Nixon's return from China. Reportedly, support will be solicited from 500 families of Prisoners of War (POWs) to denounce the President's visit. New England VVAW agreed to hold talks in Montreal with the American Exile Committee and unknown Vietnamese representatives concerning POWs. VVAW also decided to engage in actions planned for Republican National Convention, San Diego, during first day of convention and to cooperate with the San Diego Convention Coalition, basic planning organization for demonstrations during the Republican Convention.

VVAW also voted to support following demonstrations: Harrisburg, Pennsylvania, and San Jose, California, 3-1-72 - demanding release of "political prisoners" such as the Berrigans and Angela Davis; 4-15-72 - uncoordinated actions at various locations protesting income tax; 5/1-6/72 - demonstrations in Europe at North Atlantic Treaty Organization headquarters and at American companies supporting war in Vietnam (including demonstrations at air bases in Europe and in U.S.).

VVAW also voted unanimously to give financial support to Scott Camil, Angela Davis, and other selected 'bolitical prisoners."

AMNESTY - THE THREE-FACED PROPLEM OF SATISFACTORY REDRESS

STATEMENT

Over the period of the last twelve years, the United States has been engaged in war with the people of Indo-china, notably Vietnam, and among the majority of the citizens of our land, there was little or no question of why; and opposition to the presence of American military forces there was in its infancy.

Now, at almost every echelon of our central government, the involvement of the United States in Indo-china has been recognized as a mistake of the highest order, and a stunned nation is faced with the task of correcting that mistake. It is a painful task to count our casualties from a decade of losses, for there is little our people can do to repair those losses. But there exists another kind of casualty, and he is a casualty who can be reclaimed and restored to our nation, for he is yet alive. But today he is, under our laws, an outlaw. He lives in exile outside the borders of his own country or within the confines of a federal prison. He stands convicted only of having been true to his own conscience. It was he who stood in the face of a nation blinded by fear, racism, ignorance, and deceipt, and had the courage to cry "foul." In its blindness, our nation charged him and drove him into exile. As we now struggle to make right a decade of wrongs, as our leaders one by one admit the sacrifices, and as we all strive to learn the truth, let us not forget those who were first to recognize and oppose the brutality witnessed in Indo-china.

The concern for American prisoners of war in Indo-china has received maximum attention in this country, and it stands as a major excuse for the perpetuation of our involvement there. The government of Hanoi is attacked for its refusal to release those men. while our own government holds fellow Americans in bonds for no greater crime than the refusal to participate in the killing of their Asian kin. There has been little concern expressed in our nation and its government toward these victims of the war. This embarrassed silence must now end, and the problem must be addressed in due haste with the appropriate legislation. It is to this end that we, as citizens of our United States of America, do herein seek to enlist the aid of the Mighest offices available to us. We do not seek what men call amnesty, For amnesty implies guilt for which forgiveness is offerred. The gailt belongs not to those who sought exile or sufferred imprisonment, but to a nation which dictated those consequences. The plea contained In this address is, instead, a demand for redress for wrongs done to Amose men and their families. A swallowing of another bit of national gride is in order in the consideration of this redress.

It is further evident that until this redress is officially enacted, until an official commitment is made by both major political factions of this nation toward the execution of satisfactory redress, the concern for social reconstruction expressed by candidates and current government legislators, judges, and executive members must be viewed of the concern to the social reconstruction of the concern to the co



with grave doubt. If we are to end a war and recall our people to their own land, let us recall them all and grant them the freedom of returning to their homes without fear. Until all of our people are restored, the war has not ended; and a contradiction is made, rendering void the credibility of those who would promise only a $oldsymbol{U}$ partial and discriminatory peace.

ARTICLE I. EXILES FROM SELECTIVE SERVICE (THE DRAFT)

In that Selective Service falls under the authority of civil law. the Congress of the United States, with Executive endorsement, has the power to extend an immediate invitation, in the form of a most sincere plea, for those whose only "crime" was the resistence of induction into the Armed Services. They should be afforded the same considerations under the law as are conscientious objectors of a I-O status, with one major exception. Because antiquated Selective Service laws are responsible for their being driven from their native homes, the government should therefore be prepared to offer financial and social aid in the re-establishment of these men and their families in their own country. An organization should be instituted for the administration of this vital assistance, and the access to this aid should be protected by law. Entitlement to this aid should be standardized and allow for financial aid in attending ALL INFORMATION CONTAINED educational facilities. HEREIN IS UNCLASSIFIED RICHT WEEKS SHOWN

ARTICLE II. THE MILITARY DESERTER IN FOREIGN EXILE

Even now, members of the Armed Services whose convictions, moral and religious, will not allow them to participate in action in the Indochina Theater are forced to choose between a moral compromise and service in Vietnam or exile either in a foreign land or in a prison This choice is almost always made either in ignorance or in desperation. Whenever a man in the military service makes legal application for status as a conscientious objector under the provisions of the Uniform Code of Military Justice, he is immediately marked as a target for illegal harrassment and will in due course suffer abuse as illegal under the UCMJ as any under civil law. But all too often, this abuse is done covertly and certainly denied by the service involved. The objective in this abuse is to provoke the individual concerned into action for which he might then be legitimately punished.

Upon attempts to educate the individual serviceman regarding the legal opportunities toward alternatives to desertion, great efforts are made to discredit, discourage, and silence those involved, while the milita; ignores its own responsibilities in this area. It is through this shirking of responsibility that otherwise law-abiding citizen-soldiers find themselves driven to an illegal course of action. These men who have fled their own country to seek peace of mind on formation

upon return to the United States, subject to punishment under military statutes. This makes return to this country less desireable for the military deserter than for the Selective Service resistor, subjects him to a different punishment, even though the motives for the state of exile are most often common among the two. The same principles of injustice brought about the exiles, yet the jeapardy of return is far from equal.

This problem dictates a three-fold solution to serve not only to insure a just, safe return, but to eliminate the situation in which an illegal course of action is the only course available.

- A. Establishment of the intent to return. While still in exile, the individual concerned would establish contact with an appropriately instituted agency and make known his intent to return home. This would allow time for his removal by <u>General</u> discharge from military authority, from theme he would then become subject to the standard authority for redress (reference, ART.I.), and no longer subject to punishment under the UCMJ. This period of contact would allow for the establishment of credentials.
- B. Institution of educational programs within the military, dealing specifically with legal alternatives for the conscientious objector. This should be under qualified civilian authority; and it should be made available, with access to counsel protected under federal law, divorced from the authority of the UCMJ, and violation of the right to access subject to federal district court jurisdiction (as opposite to enforcement under Article 98, of the UCMJ).
- C. Immediate overhaul of the Uniform Code of Hilitary Justice. This would include the elimination of the Inspector General as the prime target of military rights complaints, and the replacement of the same with qualified civilian legal authority, with the power to enforce and correct rights violations involving the UCMJ in the more favorable judicial atmoshere of a federal court. This will serve to eliminate injustice through command influence in what would otherwise be a court-martial channel.

The paragraphs B. and C. assume that the UCMJ, if properly enforced, and with specific changes in regard to that enforcement, does serve to hold the individual soldier's Constitutional rights intact and still serve to maintain adequate military disciplines.

ARTICLE III.
THE CONSCIENTIOUS OBJECTOR IN PRISON

In as much as those in foreign exile are allowed to return home, it will be necessary to facilitate the release of those men in military and federal prisons who drew sentences related to their opposition to the Indo-china war: this can be effected by an executive order, and it may be demanded by the Congress of the United States, if necessary. These persons released would also then become subject to the benefits of the standardized authority for redress.

When the current extention of the Selective Service draft has expired, let the Congress of the United States take appropriate measures to insure that it is not extended further. Let Congress also take action to place the power to levy the draft solely in the hands of the central legislature.



Enclosed is the proposed arbitration system that I offered in a letter in December, after noting the various challenges (internal) to our unity over the past 7 months. What we must realize is that we're getting to be a fairly large organization with alot of different ideas and backgrounds, struggling to effect some very difficust and long range changes.

Before you reject the idea as more bullshit bureaucracy, consider this: Our effectiveness depends upon being well organized and unified. But organization doesn't have to mean dehumanization and our nation-wide executive organization is, so far, an example of that.

If there are challenges to the National Executive Committee (as there have been), or between members (as there have been) or within a Region (as there have been), the Steering Committee is not the place to take care of it and neither are letters to the co-ord-inators appealing to one faction/opinion/argument or another. The only thing that suffers is our unity. And the past "national" operations are a good example.

The questions to be asked are these: If there were full co-operation in and with the arbitration system, would it work? If it worked, would it do anything to help solve some of the day to day, month to month problems we are having with our unity? If it would help our unity, would it be worth doing? If there is a reasonable chance it might work (and I think thereis) we should try it. The work involves only the election of the arbiters, who then do the work of settling disputes that cannot be decided any other way.

Since only state and regional coordinators are invited to this meeting of the steering committee, I would like to ask to be an exception in order to present this proposal personally. If you have objections to this or would like to make suggestions for changes please let me know as soon as possible.

First Amendment to the By-laws of VVAW

Preamble: The goal of this amendment is to provide a means by which we, members of an organization struggling to create an alternative to the racism, exploitation, and war that plague our society, may solve our disagreements without dissolving our unity. In such a struggle unity is our most valuable asset and this amendment is designed to meet this need. It is a means of last resort.

ARTICLE VIII VVAW ARBITRATION SYSTEM

- 1. <u>Jurisdiction</u>. The VVAW Arbitration System (AS) has jurisdiction over all VVAW members, all VVAW Chapter, all VVAW Regional and National bocies, including Regional Co-ordinators. the National Executive Committee, and the Steering Committee, and the Steering Committee.
 - a. The VVAW as may decide disputes between any of the above parties.
 - b. Disputes relating to VVAW and involving parties within the jurisdiction of the VVAW as must submit the dispute to the VVAW as if it cannot otherwise be settled.
 - c. The VVAW as may decide disputes between outside parties upon application to and approval of the National Executive Committee. Such parties shall U bear the full cost of such arbitration.
- 2. Qualifications of Arbiters. A VVAW Arbiter must meet all of the following qualifications:
 - a. Must be a Regular Member of VVAW.
 - b. Must hold no formal position of leadership on a local, regional, or national basis.
 - Must be elected in accordance with Section 3 of this Article.
- 3. Election of Arbiters. Each Chapter of VVAW with more than 40 members will elect one arbiter for each 100 members in that chapter. (E.G., a chapter with 80 members will have one arbiter, as will one with 180; a chapter with between 200-299 will have two arbiters, etc.)
 - a. Arbiters will be elected by the majority vote of the members of the members of a chapter present at a properly announced election.
 - Notice of an election must be given at least two weeks prior to the date of the election.
 - An Arbiter may be recalled by the vote of a 2/3 majority of the members of a Chapter.
 - A VVAW Arbiter will serve as long as he remains qualified under Section 2 of this Article and as long as he desires to so serve.
 - An Arbiter may resign by giving written notice to the highest officer of the VVAW Chapter from which he was elected and to the Regional Co-ordiantor from the Region in which his chapter is located.
 - One National Arbiter will be elected by the majority vote of the Steering Committee and will serve a term of one year.
- 4. <u>Duties of Arbiters</u>. The primary duty of a VVAW Arbiter is to decide, as fairly as possible and within the scope of the VVAW By-laws and Objectives, all disputes submitted for arbitration as provided by Section 1 of this Article 10
 - a. Any Arbiter should always be sensitive to any pressures or conflicts of

interest that would prevent a fair decision from being rendered. and should disqualify himself in the event that he cannot fairly render a judgment.

Arbiters shal make a brief written report to the National Arbiter of any cases decided, including, but not limited to:

- 1) Parties involved
- 2) Facts of the dispute
- 3) Issues to be decided
- 4) Decision rendered
- Reasons for the decision 5)
- Any further action necessary.
- The National Arbiter shall collect the reports of all VVAW arbiters. He shall review such cases as required by Section 9 of this Article and forward any cases requiring further action to the National Executive Committee.
 - 1) He shall report on the VVAW CJ at every regular meeting of the Steering Committee and shall be responsible for making recommendations for changes in the VVAW AS.
 - 2) He shall act as recorder and arbiter at meetings of the Steering Committee and prepare minutes of the meeting for distribution by the National Executive Committee.
- Procedure for Arbitration. The following procedures are guidelines for VVAW Arbitration but may be varied upon agreement of the parties involved:
 - Member(s) v. Member(s): If there is more than one arbiter in a Chapter, one arbiter will be selected by lot by the highest officer of that chapter.
 - Member(s) v. Chapter/Region: One arbiter will be selected at random (by lot) from the arbiters within the region by the regional Co-ordinator will sclect an Arbiter by lot from the region, not including arbiters from either of the Chapters involved.
 - Chapter v. Chapter: The Regional Co-ordinator will select an Arbiter by lot from the region, not including arbiters from either of the Chapters () involved.
 - Region v. Region: The National Arbiter will select a third region from which five arbiters will be chose by lot by that region's co-ordinator.
 - Each of the parties will strike one arbiter and a majority of the three remaining arbiter shall constitute a decision.
 - The Regions party to the dispute will evenly divide the costs of bringing the arbiters to a site agreed upon by the parties, or failing agreement, designated by the National Arbiter.
 - Region v. National Executive Committee/Steering Committee: The National Arbiter stiff choose at random 11 arbiters from either east or west of Kansas City.

 5 1) 320 the Region is from the West of Kansas City, the Arbiter shall

be from the West of Kansas City; if the Region is from the East of Kansas City, the Arbiter shall be from the East of Kansas City.


Each party may strike two names from the list of proposed arbiters.

The cost of bringing arbiters to a city agreed upon by the parties involved, or failing agreement, designated by the National Arbiter, shall be divided as follows: - 11 -

National: 75% Regional: 25%



- 4) If agreed to by both parties, the use of 7 Arbiters may be waived and the dispute submitted to the National for a decision.
- 6. Rights of the Parties. The fundamental rights protecting individuals against self-incrimination and unreasonable search and seisure are applicable. However, while no party may have an attorney represent that party, any Regular Member of VVAW in the same Chapter of Region may represent that Chapter or Region when it so a party to a dispute.
- 7. Sanctions: An Arbiter may order any procedure or action he deems necessary to achieve a just result consistent with the By-laws and Objectives, subject to the Following restrictions:
 - a. No punitive fines will be levied.
 - b. No physical punishment.
- 8. <u>Non-compliance</u>. Non-compliance with a decision of a Arbiter is grounds for expulsion from VVAW in accordance with the appropriate provisions of the By-laws.
- 9. Review. The National Arbiter shall review any case you request and make recommendations to the National Executive Committee. The National Executive Committee may, by majority vote, return the case for another hearing before a different arbiter.
 - a. In any cases involving the National Executive Committee, the National Arbiter may, upon request, review, and if he feels it is appropriate, authorize another hearing before a panel of arbiters.
 - b. Any action revoking a Chapter's authorization or expelling a member upon appeal must be appreved by a 2/3 majority of the National Executive Committee.

AUTOMATED AIR WAR

Nixon says he is winding down the war, but he is only making it less visible. Faced with an American people that wants peace, an army that won't fight, and an enemy that won't lose, the U.S. government has found a way to give the appearance of peace while continuing its war. General Westmoreland has said that the solution to this problem was to "replace, wherever possible, the man with the machine."

Nixon has dropped more bombs on Indochina than the combined total of all bombs dropped during World War II and Korea. This increased use of the automated air war has facilitated the stepped-up withdrawal of allied ground troops from South Vietnam.

The electronic warfare is conducted by machines rather than by men. Electronic sensors, dispersed over the countryside by air, relay movement activity on the ground to unsumed drones which are equipped to transmit the data to a computer center based in Thailand which sorts the data, pinpoints the coordinates on a map and dispatches an attack plane. The pilot does not select his targets—he never sees them.

The planes operated by the computers shower the countryside with thousands of bomblets and camouflaged land mines which are designed and calculated to take their toll in human suffering, being incapable of destroying military material.

Since Nixon took office, over 3,000,000 Indochinese people have been killed, injured, or made refugees by the air war, including 43 of the entire population of Lacr

ILLEGALITIES

The U.S. actions in Indochina of open, outright attacks on civilian villages and hospitals and the extensive use of poison herbicides, including arsenic compounds, and anti-personnel bombs and mines, violates Articles 23 and 25 of the Hague agreements. The indiscriminate bombing of civilians and their forced evacuation through the "area denial" program violates Articles 3 and 49 of the Geneva agreements. The U.S. signed the Hague and Geneva agreements, and these articles are constitutionally binding on the United States.

Brig. Gen. (Ret) Telford Taylor-chief prosecutor for the U.S. at the Nuremberg trials stated in his book, "Nuremberg and Vietnam, An American Tragedy", that "U.S. Chief of Staff General Westmoreland could be convicted and hanged if the standards established after World War II were applied to his conduct of the war in Vietnam.... By the same logic, the top civilian leaders of the U.S. could be convicted of the same offense."

WHY WE'RE STAYING IN INDOCHINA

People should not be deceived into believing Nixon's recent peace proposal will a make any serious steps toward peace. The U.S. has political, economic and military investments throughout Southeast Asia which it is bound to protect. In order to protect these investments, the U.S. will do all in its power to assure a pro-U.S. government in Chigon, for, as Dwight D. Eisenhover has said, "If we lost Vietnam and Malaya, how would we, the free world, hold the rich empire of Indonesia?"

The path of Vietnamization has allowed the practice of blatant racism to take a strong hold in Vietnam. The media emphasizes the lowering of American casualties, while neglecting the disproportionately high rate of Indochinese people dying each day. Vietnamization, which Nixon so recently claimed to be so successful, is, in the words of a government spokesman, merely "changing the color of the corpses."

On February 16, 1972, a second confidential source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised that New York City (NYC) activists have been alerted to the demonstration at McGuire Air Force Base, New Lise, on February 26, 1972. Source stated that a group called Fragging Action/Military Legaf Center, 10 West Main Street, Wrightstown, New Jersey, telephone number 723-4470, is aiding in planning and execution of these actions.

Daily Death Toll Project (DDTP)

On October 18, 1971, the second confidential source advised that the DDTP was a civil disobedience program that would be executed in Washington, D.C. during November 8 through 25, 1972. The DDTP planned to force hundreds of arrests by jamming and blocking the gates to the White House in protest of the continuing war in Southeast Asia. The DDTP was organized by the War Resisters League (WRL), Fellowship of Reconciliation (FOR), a pacifist organization, and Clergy and Laymen Concerned About Vietnam (CALCAV.)

WRL

The WRL, 339 Lafayette Street, New York, New York (NY), is a branch of the War Resisters International, a pacifist organization with affiliates in 20 countries and individuals in more than 80 countries.

CALCAV

CALCAV is a publicly acclaimed group of clergy and laymen concerned about the war in Vietnam.

"Resistance"

"Resistance" is self-described as "an organization opposed to the existing Selective Service System.

Vietnam Veterans Against the War (VVAW)

The WSP is a national womens organization which has in the past participated in demonstrations against nuclear testing, the war in Vietnam and the draft.

On September 13, 1971, a representative of the United States Army, Fort Dix, New Jersey, advised that the Military Legal Center, 10 West Main Street, Wrightstown, New Jersey, was formed in an effort to organize and recruit military personnel in anti-war activities "Fragging Action" is a newsletter printed at Fort Dix, New Jersey, which is closely associated with the Military Legal Center.

Al Hubbard, former U.S. Air and U.S. governments. Force sergeant, who testified earlier this week to the alleged accused by the U.S. Air Force of having lied about his military career.

The accusation was made in the June 1971 issue of "Air Force Magazine," the content of which was disclosed to the press by the Press Linison Office of the U.S. Forces Japan Friday.

Hubbard, an active pacifist, told an antiwar rally in Shizuoka last Wednesday that he had a part in transporting nuclear weapons to Japan and Okinawa between 1960 and 1963.

The authorities also said in the magazine that the highest grade he ever held was a staff sergeant and that he might have been in Vielnam as a flight engineer on the transport







After the speeches, the demonstrators held a 15 minute silent prayer in memory of 300 people being killed daily in Vietnam, Thailand and Laos. No incidents occurred and the group disbanded at approximately 2:00 P.M.

related that recently another individual, who is a member of the Tulsa VVAW and whose reliability is unknown, mentioned that on 4/7 - 10/72, there would be a meeting of the National Steering Committee of the VVAW in Houston, Texas, and that supposedly, at the meeting in Houston, a delegation to visit Hanoi would be chosen and further plans concerning the Republican National Convention would be made. This individual also informed that the two national VVAW leaders, AL HUBBARD and JOHN KERRY, both of New York City, were to be ousted and that more radical leaders would take over.

stated that the above Tulsa VVAW member was of the opinion that the Tulsa VVAW organization had been infiltrated by radicals who would advocate extreme measures, but the Tulsa VVAW member did not elaborate or mention any additional information in this regard. The Tulsa VVAW member told he felt that people going to the Republican National Convention in San Diego would be the more radical elements of the VVAW and that they would cause trouble there.



The VVAW was founded in the spring of 1967 by six young Vietnam veterans in New York City. At the beginning of 1968, with 600 members, VVAW opened a national office, founded the first GI newspaper, "Vietnam GI", and sent close to 500 veterans into the McCarthy campaign to beat down the red baiters. After getting gassed at the Democratic convention at Chicago and caught in the general down of the peace movement, VVAW was nearly inactive until the moratoriums in the fall of 1969. Members of VVAW led student strikes on major campuses across the country and battled Veterans Administration hospital authorities over threats to throw amputee Vietnam veterans out for signing anti-war petitions. At present, membership of the VVAW, nationally, consists of 8,500 members.

Students for a Democratic Society (SDS) was founded during June 1962 at Port Huron, Michigan, and in the 1960s functioned as the leading New Left campusbased organization in the United States. From a stance of "participatory democracy", SDS moved to a radical-revolutional position, with debate centering on how best to create a revolutionary youth movement. Internal factionalism produced a split during the SDS national convention in June 1969, which resulted in the following three factions: Weatherman, Worker Student Alliance (WSA), and Revolutionary Youth Movement (RYM). The Weatherman and RYM no longer affiliate with SDS. The WSA continues to use the name SDS and maintains the SDS national office at 1225 South Wabash, Chicago, Illinois.

Weatherman, formerly a faction of SDS, controlled the SDS mational office from June 1969, until its closing in February 1970. Weatherman then entered an underground status and adopted a tactic of "strategic sabotage", with police and military installations designated as primary targets.

WSA, a faction of SDS, was expelled from SDS in June 1969, by the then dominant Weatherman faction, but it continued to use the name SDS and opened an office in Cambridge, Massachusetts. WSA aligned ideologically with the Progressive Labor Party (PLP) and, in February 1971, moved to Chicago, Illinois, where it opened the SDS National Office at 1225 South Wabash Street.

RYM, a pro-Communist revolutionary youth organization, was organized in 1969, first as a faction within the SDS, then as a separate group with headquarters in Atlanta, Georgia. RYM was unsuccessful in attracting support and by mid-1970, it was practically defunct.

The PLP was founded in 1962 by individuals expelled from the Communist Party, USA, for following the Chinse communist line. Its objective is the establishment of a militant working-class movement based on Marxism-Leninism and MAO Tse-tun

As the youth organization of the Socialist Workers Party (SWP), the YSA serves as the main source of recruitment into that organization. The YSA is described in the masthead of its official publication, "The Young Socialist Organizer", as "A multinational revolutionary socialist youth organization."

The SWP has been designated pursuant to Executive Order 10450.









On February 16, 1072, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised that at approximately 2:45 a.m., on February 12, 1372, a caravan composed of VVAW members from Denver and Kansas City departed Kansas City en route to Cairo, Illinois.

The VVAW was founded in the spring of 1967 by six young Vietnam veterans in New York City. At the beginning of 1968, with 600 members, VVAW opened a national office, founded the first GI newspaper, "Vietnam GI", and sent close to 500 veterans into the McCarthy campaign to beat down the red baiters. After getting gassed at the Democratic convention in Chicago and caught in the general "down" of the peace movement, VVAW was nearly inactive until the moratoriums in the fall of 1969. Members of VVAW led student strikes on major campuses across the country and battled Veterans Administration hospital authorities over threats to throw amputee Vietnam veterans out for signing anti-war petitions. At present, membership of the VVAW, nationally, consists of 8,500 members.





E. The Clearing house may maintain corespondence with individuals and organizations outside of V.V.A.W., provided that such corespondence does not establish policy or commitments for V.V.A.W. without the express consent of the Steering Committee.

VII. The Clearing house will be responsible for the maintainance of records and accounts of the National organization, and for the payment of debts incurred by VietNam Veterans Against the War Inc.

VIII. The National Clearing House will perform no function other than those specified abovo. The National Steering Committee may, however, add or delete any function(s) at any time.







The demonstration was in protest of the Vietnam War and General Motors production of materials which perpetuate the war. Stated that the above demonstration lasted approximately one and one half hours and included some 200 demonstrators of which no more than ten were representing the VVAW.

Stated that the above demonstration was conducted peacefully and ended without incident.

The PPT is a non-membership organization based on seven point peace proposal negotiated by students and citizens from the United States representing the People's Coalition for Peace and Justice (PCPJ), and citizens of north and south Vietnam in December, 1970, which advocates complete withdrawal of troops from Southeast Asia and the signing of a "People's Peace Treaty".

The PCPJ has described itself as being headquartered at 1029 Vermond Avenue, Northwest, Washington, D.C., and has consisting of over 100 organizations which are using massive civil disobedience to combat racism, poverty, repression, and war.

On January 7, 1972, Special Agents of the FBI observed a demonstration protesting the Vietnam war and the Selective Service System staged at the Federal Building, Pontiac, Michigan, sponsored by the PPT and the VVAW. The demonstration consisted of picketing outside of the Federal Building and included a brief Guerrilla Theater against the war and the draft, staged within the Federal Building. The demonstrators numbered 25 of which no more than 10 could be identified as representing the VVAW. The demonstration was conducted in an orderly fashion without incident. \\ \lambda

advised on January 17, 1972, that on that date the VVAW at Detroit, participated in a demonstration sponsored by the PPT at Detroit, at Honeywell

Corporation, Southfield; Michigan. The demonstration was in protest of the Vietnam War and Honeywell's production of devices used to perpetuate that war. stated that approximately 50 individuals participated in the above demonstration of which 10 could be identified as representing the VVAW. advised that the demonstration lasted three hours and ended without incident.

advised on February 15, 1972, that a demonstration sponsored by the PPT and VVAW was held on that date outside of the United States Air Force Recruiting Station, 1200 Sixth Street, Detroit, Michigan. The demonstration was in protest of the Vietnam War and continued United States' bombing of North Vietnam. advised that 100 demonstrators, twelve of which were representing the VVAW, conducted an orderly protest march outside of the United States Air Force Recruiting Station which lasted one and one half hours and ended without incident.

advised on February 11, 1972, that the VVAW held a State-wide meeting on February 5, 1972, at Oakland County Community College, Farmington, Michigan. Stated that the meeting was attended by 54 persons of which 37 were Vietnam veterans. The purpose of the meeting was to stimulate support for the VVAW in Michigan and establish a unified platform for the VVAW within the state. In addition, TERRY K. LUKE

from East Lansing, Michigan, was elected state coordinator, and BILL MAKSHALL of Detroit, was elected regional coordinator for the Detroit area. Advised that it was the general consensus of those present that the National Coordinating Committee of the VVAW not be allowed to rule over State chapters and that each state chapter should be an independent and autonomous unit.

advised that during above meeting it was decided by VVAW to adopt a community action program to aid the needy at Detroit, which they have labeled the "Detroit Veterans Survival Program---Serve the People". The program includes plans to offer free food, clothing, and transportation to needy people in the Detroit ghetto areas. In addition, the VVAW plans to organize ghetto clean-up programs exerting community and political pressure on slum landlords and the Detroit Public Works for the City of Detroit. Further, the intentions of the VVAW are to procure the above goods and services by exerting pressure on Detroit area "War Profiteers" through demonstrations and by bringing the existing conditions to the attention of politicians and influential citizens.

The VVAW is a student registered organization on campus having registered January 24, 1972.

advised on February 15, 1972, that the VVAW is currently attempting to activate a chapter on the campus of Eastern Michigan University, Ypsilanti, Michigan. Stated that the chapter is now represented by less than 10 individuals and does not engage in any structured activity.

advised on February 15, 1972, that the VVAW chapter on campus of University of Michigan, Ann Arbor, Michigan, does not hold regular, structured meetings and has a following of no more than 15 active members at present.

IV. FINANCES

funding for VVAW activity within the State of Michigan, comes from donations and contributions, from individual members and concerned citizens. Stated that the VVAW has received very little support in Michigan, and has no workable capital. Advised that the VVAW is a disorganized unit of individuals, most of whom are not gainfully employed and transient. Their present headquarters consists of two small rooms donated for VVAW use by St. Patrick's Church. The only expense the group incurs is a monthly telephone bill, an obligation which they have trouble meeting.

months previous to February, 1972, the Detroit chapter of the VVAW has been forced out of three buildings which they used for headquarters due to their inability to meet financial obligations.



V. POLITICAL AFFILIATIONS





The VVAW was founded in the spring of 1967, by six young Vietnam veterans in New York City. At the beginning of 1968, with 600 members, VVAW opened a national office, founded the first GI newspaper, "Vietnam GI," and sent close to 500 veterans into the McCarthy campaign to beat down the red baiters. After getting gassed at the Democratic convention in Chicago and caught in the general "down" of the peace movement, VVAW was nearly inactive until the moratoriums in the fall of 1969. Members of the VVAW led student strikes on major campuses across the country and battled Veterans Administration Hospital authorities over threats to throw amputee Vietnam veterans out for signing anti-war petitions. At present, membership of the VVAW, nationally, consists of 8,500 members.

Vietnam Veterans Against the War (VVAW) is an anti-war organization organized in 1967 and headquartered in New York City. Its published objective is "to demand an immediate cessation of fighting and the withdrawal of all American tropps from Indochina." VVAW has participated in several demonstrations, including massive demonstrations in Washington, D.C., April 19-23, 1971.

The following is a summary of VVAW activities in Arizona provided by several sources on numerous dates from May, 1971 - November, 1971.

VVAW was founded March, 1971, primarily by veteran students at Arizona State University (ASU), Tempe, Arizona. The group was a member of a Phoenix city-wide coalition consisting of antiwar; antidraft and minority groups which sponsored demonstrations in Phoenix during April and November, 1971.

VVAW participated in a demonstration in June, 1971, during a speech made in Phoenix by Vice President Spiro T. Agnew.

In the Fall of 1971, the VVAW distributed literature in several shopping centers in the Phoenix area and occupied a booth at the Arizona State Fair in Phoenix.

VIETNAM VETERANS AGAINST THE WAR IN VIETNAM PHOENIX, ARIZONA

The January 21, 1972, issue of the "Arizona Republic," a daily newspaper of general distribution in the Phoenix area, carried a photograph which indicated eight members of the VVAW marched through the State Capitol Rotunda, January 20, 1972, peacefully protesting the continuation of the war in Southeast Asia. They carried a wreath which they placed on a plaque of war dead in the Rotunda.

On January 31, 1972, advised the VVAW have been inactive and the source knew of no planned activities for this group.

On February 3, 1972, advised there had been no meetings and no activities had been planned by the VVAW. The VVAW organization was extremely loose and no current activities were being considered. \ \

On January 31, 1972, and March 1, 1972 advised the VVAW were inactive. However, they still exist as an unorganized group. They are not associated with any subversive organizations and have no plans to engage in any large-scale protest activity.

In February, 1972, advised a person representing New Mexico - Arizona, attended the VVAW National Steering Committee meeting held in Denver, Colorado, February 18 - 21, 1972.

This same source additionally advised on 1/20/72, that it was felt that a favorable image might be established by including the name Veterans For Peace in scheduled protest activities. The Indiana Veterans Movement in Indianapolis is at present.

advised that the IVM maintained a Post Office Box in Camby, Indiana, in order that they might receive letters from persons affiliating themselves with such an organization. Since was unsuccessful in his attempt to obtain a state-wide organization, he has become somewhat less active and has become somewhat less interested in the Veterans Movement. If any positive information is developed, appropriate sources are directed to provide necessary coverage.



On March 13, 1972, advised that a Vietnam Veterans Against the War (VVAW) regional convention was held at the University of Missouri at Kansas City, Missouri (UMKC), on March 12, 1972. Source identified the following as attending:



The VVAW was founded in the spring of 1967, by six young Vietnam veterans in New York City. At the beginning of 1968, with 600 members, VVAW opened a national office, founded the first GI newspaper, "Vietnam GI," and sent close to 500 veterans into the McCarthy campaign to beat down the red baiters. After getting gassed at the Democratic convention in Chicago and caught in the general "down" of the peace movement, VVAW was nearly inactive until the moratoriums in the fall of 1969. Members of VVAW led student strikes on major campuses across the country and battled Veterans Administration Hospital authorities over threats to throw amputee Vietnam veterans out for signing anti-war petitions. At present, membership of the VVAW, nationally, consists of 8,500 members.







We will not telerate further any efforts of co-optation or divisiveness of the VVAW by your organization. including the use of the name of VIETNAM VETERANS AGAINST THE WAR In any action you may hold in the future. Every method we have learned and are capable of shall be used to convince you we want no part of your type of operations.



Changing Conditions:

We have entered a new historic era: one in which the post World War II world domination of the U. S. is being seriously challenged politically, economically, and militarily.

9 . 3 .

Militarily, the U. S. no longer has a nuclear preeminence in delivery systems and arms but finds itself in a position of relative equality with the Soviet Union. At the same time China and other countries are developing independent nuclear arms of their own. In more conventional types of warefare, the people of Indochina have fought U. S. troops and technology to at least a standstill.

Politically, the "revolution" in Chile, the Cuban and Chinese socialisms, the admission of China to the UN are all signs of the decline of U. S. international political control.

Economically; the rebuilt industrial strength of var-torn France, West Germany, and Japan have placed the U. S. in an arena of competition which it cannot deal with well because of large expenditures overseas (chiefly in the Indochina war) and because for the first time since 1893 the total balance of payments show a flow of money outside the U. S.

This new economic crisis is manifested domestically by high inflation, high unemployment, and general contraction of the economy (it is getting harder for all of us to survive on our measer incomes). In attempting to deal with this crisis without lessening U. S. profits, lixon and other administrators of the empire are putting the economic burden onto foreign capitalist and onto the working people of the U. S. The wage freeze and Phase II make this clear.

because of the newly imposed hardshins being placed on them, and because of the general world crisis, working people and other people previously in the mainstream of U. S. life are beginning to question the present system and are looking for an alternative. This means they are now more open to the Left than ever before in port World War II history. At the same time, these people, are also open to a right wing populist (racist, anti-semitic, Uallace) trend.

At a time when we have seen the mass radicalization of Third World People, young people, students, and women, we are entering into a period where the masses of Americans can potentially come to the Left.

The importance of a unified and broadbased Left in this period and in this particular election year cannot be underestimated if we are to take advantage of the opportunities history has brought before us.

Over-All Goals:

If we accept the above analysis, then our over-all goals in the year ahead become clear:

- 1.) We must reach out to new constituencies, and strip the ruling class of their legitimacy as leaders of the U.S.
- 2.) At the same time as we maintain pressure on the covergment to end the war and atter policies, we must or anize people around their basic needs.
- 3.) He must build proping nevenents capable of leading and sustaining the struggles of people hote nationally and locally.
- 4.) We must defeat wixon and not let our efforts be coopted by the Democrats or the electoral process.

Unique Opportunity of Sac Diego: 1.

To accomplish these goals, the movement in the U.S. will have to use a variety of tactice. We feel that massive, proad-based demonstrations in Can Diego are a crucial component of the range of activities our movement should undertake in the next year.

Activities and Actions in August, 1972:

The activities and actions in San Diego around the convention must have maxisum fupact towards fulfilling our over-all goals. We do not ugut the actions in San Diego to be one-shot demonstrations. Rather, we view the three-day Convention period as a time of revolutionary transformation for each of the participants who come and also for the entire country because of the effects of the media. We are proposing a range of carefully-planned events to bring about this transformation

Demonstrations Since the effect of U.S. policy is international in scope, and since there is world-wide opposition to the Lixon Doctrine, we feel that: [] and [] and [] and []

We should call for world-wide demonstrations to occur at the same time as the Republican National Convention.

There should be at least one massive, legal, dignified demonstration past the Sports Arena. Formal publicized authorization would be obtained to carry the flags of other countries and liberation movements that wished to register their protest, against Mixon. This flag bearing contingent would lead the demonstration.

To make sure that images are conveyed to the world audience that symbolize the issues, we will be in San Diego for, we would like to call for the designing and building of a few giant floats that conceptualize the major issues in graphic form. Deyond this, we would like to see the masses of people divided up into contingents carrying their own banners identifying their constituency or interests to signify the diverse array of opposition to dixon and present U. S. policy.

At the Sports Arena itself, the presentation of the People's Platform could be made with the demand that all rules and procedures of the convention immediately cease to take up the adoption of the People's Platform.

At this point, we would like to keep other days of the convention open for specialize and large constituency actions around targets of the constituencies' choosing. At some point it may become appropriate for us to consider other types of actions that would be necessary to take if the massive numbers assembled and the presentation of the platform were to be ignored by the Republicans.

Statement of formal motions and voting were tabled until the business of breaking up the New England area was taken care of. New England asked, because of ideological differences, that their region be divided into E. Mass., W. Mass. and Vermont-New Hampshire-Maine. The motion was seconded, discussion, question called, voting and the motion was defeated 14-9. At this point New England left the meeting (full text of Mike Roache's statement is in the appendix). (For full listings of roll call votes, see appendix. This vote is #1).

Oregon moved that every region be granted an automatic five votes to represent minority and majority opinion within the delegations. Seconded. Question called. Caucus. Passed. (vote #2).

A motion was nade that the items of consensus be considered agenda items and that during supper a committee go through them and reword them for motions so that they could be voted on. Seconded. Question. Caucus. Passed. (vote \$3)

The motions agreed upon and voted on are listed below. For a breakdown on the roll call vote, see the appendix beginning with vote IV.

- 1. Moved that there be no veterans in the National V.V.A.W. Clearing House. Failed.
- 2. Moved that the main responsibility of the National V.V.A.W Clearing House is communication. The two main functions of the office are a monthly edition of First Casualty and a bi-monthly newsletter to the regional coordinators. Passed.

3. Moved that decisions on national actions and financial decisions be

made by the Steering Committee. Passed.

4. Moved that the National Clearing House present to the members of the Steering Committee a quarterly financial report and a monthly statement of account. Unanimously passed.

5. Moved that the Steering Committee meet at least four times yearly. Failed.

 Moved that decisions of national importance be discussed and voted on at two consecutive meetings in order to gain constituency opinion. Failed.
 Moved that regions may assume <u>First Casualty</u> distribution. Passed.

8. Moved that in the spirit of local autonomy each regions may decide on it's own membership and voting requirements. However, all regional and state coordinators must be veterans of the Indochinese War. Passed.

9. Moved that all speakers requests to the national Clearing House be referred to the regions and that no one may travel on national money unless voted on by the Steering Committee. Failed.

10. Moved that the national V.V.A.W. Clearing House staff consist of: 3 members serving staggered I year terms; 4 members serving staggered 6 mos. terms. They shall be chosen from four different regions. North South, East and West from the general membership of those regions by lottery. Defeated.

11. Moved that all i jonal Steering Committee me lings be held

12. Moved that the Washington-Oregon proposal on restructuring be accepted. Defeated.

13. Location of the National Clearing House. Tabled

14. Moved that 5 regional offices be established to serve as information centers for communication between regions. Defeated.



During this clear year it is essential that we can be a liken and he policies on every front. The culminating actions at the Republican Convention will be critically important in exposing the realities of his administration. If we do not act in San Diego we will give Mixon a free rein in his escalation of the war and his increasingly repressive domestic policies, we will give him mandate to victory and virtually insure his re-election. Through massive demonstrations in San Diego we can shatter the illustion of domestic tranquility so essential to Mixon's re-election.

Demonstrations in San Diego also afford us a unique opportunity to confront and expose the air war strategy. San Diego is the chief embarcation point for naval vessels including the giant attack carriers that will continue to rain destruction. from the skies on the people of Indochina long after the last ground troops have left. Its laboratories also perform research and development forthe electronic battlefield.

San Diego County has one of the largest concentrations of Marine and Naval forces in the country. Organizing for massive demonstrations can help to turn this military apparatus into a Trojan horse by consolidating the wide-spread dissatisfaction with the war among the armed forces. Actions at the convention in San Diego can play a major role in acceleration the Instability of the U.S. armed forces, a crucial link in the repressive power of the State.

A final reason for the importance of demonstrations in San Diego is the significance of the Colifornia vote. California has the largest number of state electoral votes, and its vote may well end up determining the outcome of the national election. At present, California (especially Southern California) is a Republican stronghold. Failure to have demonstrations at the convention will virtually assure hixon's re-election in California and thus, a continuation of his policies.

If we see the reasons for demonstrations in San Diego, it follows from our analysis, that these demonstrations must be massive with diverse constituencies rather than relatively small with narrow constituency representation.

If the present crisis in the U.S. is opening up people to alternatives from the left, we must demonstrate the broadening base of the movement in the San Diego actions in order to accelerate the breardown of obedience to the system and win people over the Left. To do this, we must reachiout and involve people who have never participated in the movement. This will have two effects; a direct one, based on the personal experiences of people who come to San Diego, and an indirect one carried through the media and demonstrating to Americans across the country the new broad-based constituencies of our movement.

In addition, if we are able to mobilize a massive array of people to come to San Diego in a dignified non-violent manner utilizing creative tactics that involve a high degree of ceremony, we will provide a startling contrast to the Republican Rubber Stamp Renomination of Richard Mixon. The ignoring of the majority interests of the American people represented by the gathered thousands outside the convention hall would make a mockery of the process going on inside and hasten the defeat of Pichard Mixon and his policies.

The Petition's

While we feel that massive, broad-based demonstrations in San Diego are a crucial component of the range of activities across the country (indeed across the world) that the zovenent should undertake, we thing there are other tactics and tools our movement will have to employ to accomplish our over-all objectives. We think that two of these tools, specifically a lational People's Platform and a massive San Diego Petition against the kepublican Convention presence are useful both in building for massive opposition at the Convention and in accomplishing the movement's overall goals.

The petition is seen as making these basic points:

-- The U.S. government is ruling more by deception than at anytime in its bistory.


-The war is not winding down but is continuing by means of increased naval and air bombardment.

--Wixon is trying to patch up the economy at working meople's expense by wage controls, but is not touching increasing hig business profits.

-- While Hixon talks of peace and law and order, he has dangerously stepped up repression.

-- The Republican to coing to cost williams dollars that coul otherwise be spant solving the problems of San Diego.

-- "" do not want a government that administers such unpopular policies by deception and military might to hold its convention in San Diego. Nor do we want a convention that is by its very nature undemocratic and forced on us from the top to be held in San Diego.

To make the petition work, we must come up with a document that would be able to get the support of all the various "progressive" consituencies and organizations in San Diego. This would mean such things as faking around an initial draft and discussing it with, for example, Virginia Taylor, Community Congress, Council of Urban Ministries, etc. We need to involve all possible groups to get as massive support as possible. Some people (like our parents) would sign in genuine lopes of stopping the convention from coming, others would sign in protest of Mixon's policies and deceptions,

In addition to being broad-based, the petition idea must be, in itself, multi-tactical. We can use it to conferr not only the U.S. government on the convention coming but size the city government. We can use it to do massive education about how the convention came to be in San Diego, who will benefit from it, and why the process of the convention itself is so undemocratic. We can do all this and more.

To accomplish anything though, we must have a massive effort from all of us—we must get the petition curculating at schools, factories, neighborhoods, and military bases.

In a-dition, we would have to elicit high media coverage of the event (locally and nationally). We would dramatize it for example by flying the petitions across the country in a private plane towing a banner bearing a message to the people of America from San Diago. The petitions could then be personally delivered at the Unite House.

There are several benefits seen from utilizing this tool. If the opposition to the convention is as wide-spread as me believe, it would put the Republicans and the City government on the defensive, forcing them to try and explain how the convention will be good for San Diego. Providing people with a change to register their protest now against the convention coming here, will shift the blame for any problems or inconveniences caused during the convention to like and the Republicans rather than us. In addition it will help legitimize our protest at the convention.

A massive number of signatures would also allay peoples' fears about San Diego '72 tactically being another Chicago 68 in that it would illustrate a broad-based opposition to the Republicans here as opposed to a small number of militant fringe radicals, as in Chicago. The petition will help to mobilize abalition members into out-reach work, helping us to white with the people of San Piego. By taking the petition out we will also be able to recruit new people into working with us. Finally, the petition would set a tone for the movement in the U.S. to reach out to new constituencies this year.

People's Platform

The People's Platform is seen as an organizing tool that can be used throughout the country, particularly in primary states. The People's Platform would have five points: 1) A specific plan for total withdrawl from Indochina; 2) A plan for rationalizing the economy; 3) A plank calling for the reversal of the Rixon policies of internal repression and control; 4) A plank on racism; and 5) a Plank on sexism.

A nation-wide Peoples' Platform campaign has the advantage of raising basic issues rather than merely candidates. Candidates of both major parties could be confronted with the platform and forced to take stands on it. The platform could play a major role in exposing Mixon's deceptions and policies. If bread-based enough, it could be used as a means of uniting the efforts of the left to-relate to new constituencies and help to bring about a considerable degree of unity with already committed groups, like youth and women. Finally, it could help mobilize people around the country and point the way to San Diego if the conception included the presentation of the People's Platform to both the Democratic and Expublican Sational conventions.

Possible Preface

A Control of the American (to a pamphles in preparation)

We are a coalition which has formed in San Diego around the consensus that there must be coordinated monviolent opposition and confrontation to the Republican Convention here in August of 1972. We expect that many actions will be taken by groups and individuals from all over the country, and that it is important for the San Diego movement to provide the context in which we believe this apposition will be most effective and most beneficial to the growth of the San Diego and Southern California movement. We welcome our out-of-town sisters and brothers who share our objectives and will come and plan actions in San Diego with regard for local engoing activities. To provide them an understanding of our San Diego communities, essential to our working together, we have put together this pauphlet as an introduction and invitation to San Diego. 🕟

To ensure the building of a strong radical movement that cannot be used or absorbed by the Democratic Party, we in the coalition have agreed to work together according to the following principals:

- 1.) We will form the broadest possible coalition to nonviolently and openly oppose and confront the Republican Party leadership. Special effort will be made to include in the coalition groups representing important sections of the community mobilize: Third World people, GI's and veterans, working people, the unemployed, gay people, women, students, and freaks.
- 2.) In this coalition and in all the work we do we will reject and struggle against all forms of domination based on race and sex and class exploitation. We will try to bring about in ourselves and in our manner of working with one another those human changes which must accompany political and economic changes in order for our revolution to succeed. He will struggle against racism and access. ism in ourselves as well as in all others with whom we work, and will seek continually to isolate and understand the root causes of the tendencies in each of us to dominate, manipulate, and control. Women have been relegated to an inferior status by male Americans and are dominated by men in the home, in factories, and in all the institutions of the U.S., as well as in the movement. Sexism is also manifested in the economic and extreme psychological oppression of gay people by straights. Third World people in the U.S. occupy the status of colonial subjects. They are subjected to conditions of poverty, unemployment and domination by whites both at the institutional and personal level. We understand that mostem and sexism are perpetuated by capitalism but are not maintained solely by the economic structure; we therefore must struggle to understand the other causes in ourselves and to climinate Manager Comments



Skills and extensions of the condition and conscious effort made to provide opportunity for those less experienced to grow stronger in revolutionary skills, understanding, commitment, and confidence.

- 3.) Because much of our strength will depend on massive numbers of people coming to the city, we will make contact and work with groups and individuals throughout the U.S., especially in the western region.
- 4.) The members of the coalition agree to discuss and resulve disagreements internally. No group or individual in the coalition is bound to participate in demonstrations or actions of the whole coalition, but all agree not to publically oppose the decisions of either the coalition or any of the member groups.

The presence of the Republican National Convention in San Diego presents the San Diego movement with a unique opportunity. We can challenge the U.S. empire both in its devastating air war in Indochina and its increasingly oppressive police and economic policies at home.

In the past decade, we have seen an acceleration of the collapse of the U.S. empire. Internationally, the people of the Third World, as exemplified by the Vietnamese people, are gaining the upper hand in fighting against U.S. control of their lives and resources. Domestically, we have seen the growth of a revolutionary movement and increasing dissatisfaction among the people of the U.S. 1972 marks a crucial election year.

Nixon believes that San Diego will be a conservative sanctuary for himself and his republican colleagues. He thinks that the GOP can convene here in relative tranquility, here they will put eachother on the back for escalating the war while scening to end it, for bringing about a police state under the popular banner of law and order, and maintaining an irrational and increasingly troubled economy by stimulating corporate prefits and control while cutting real wages and opportunity.

San Diego is one of the military's major homes. It is the chief embarcation point for naval vessels including the giant attack aircraft carriers that will continue to rain destruction from the shies on the people of Indochina long after the last ground troops have left. Its laboratories perform research and development for the electronic battlefield. And San Diego County has one of the largest concentrations of Marine and Baval forces in the country.

We can, however, turn himon's apparent strengths into weaknesses. Despite its conservative traditions, San Diego now has a growing political consciousness among working people and unemployed, a growing movement among women, a large dissatisfied youth community, and increasingly politicized Native American, Black, Chicano and Asica communities (Third World). Feople in the city are facing new and severe problems of unemployment, frozen wages, inflation, police harrassment, deteriorating environment and unrestricted growth, racist and unresponsive institutions, and a systematic destruction of their cultural traditions. We can unite with these groups to find solutions to these problems which those in power will not provide. We can turn the military apparatus into a Trojan horse by consolidating the massive dissatisfaction with the war amone the armed forces. We can mobilize the largest and most diverse array of people, from throughout the U.S., ever to protest the convention of their rulers, making a moderny of the so-called "representatives of the people"—all this while national and international attention is focused on the unfolding of the Convention.

Our political objectives in confronting the Convention are:

- 1.) To make it clear that we want an immediate end to all aspects of the war in Indochina and that, if this urgent desire of the great majority of the people of the U.S. is not met, the elected government will have no legitimacy and stand no chance of being re-elected.
 - a) We will demand the U.S. government accept the 7-point peace plan of the P.R.C.
 - b) We are committed to exposing and stopping the escalating technological air war in Southeast Asia.
- 2.) To expose and struggle against the move towards a demestic police state and the increasing repression and control over our lives. This control is exemplified by such things as: the use of grand-librium, the murder of George Jackson and the slaughter at Attics, the cutbacks in welfare and the wage freeze. We will fiercely oppose the re-cloction of any President who continues such represeive police and economic policies.



On March 28, 1972, a source, who has provided reliable information in the past, advised that the Vietnam Veterans Against the War (VVAW) would hold their National Steering Committee Meeting in Houston, Texas, from April 7-11, 1972. *J*

Proposed subjects for discussion at this Steering Committee Meeting will include:

(1) Possibility of sending a delegation of VVAW veterans to North Vietnam to effect the release of POWs.

· (2) Proposal to move the National Headquarters from East Coast to somewhere west of the Mississippi.

(3) Possibility of sending a delegation of VVAW veterans to Canada for the purpose of talking to organizations of draft dodgers about repatriation and the support VVAW can give them.

(4) Position VVAW will take in regard to activities at 1972 National Convention.

Source advised that this being a National Steering Committee Meeting, delegates from all VVAW regions throughout the United States will attend.

This source further advised that the Washington, D. C. (WDC) chapter of the VVAW is still in operation, but on a small scale. Membersoip is small.

(The VVAW is a national veterans organization with a National Clearinghouse located at 25 West 25th, New York City. Its published objective is "to demand an immediate cessation of fighting and a withdrawal of all American troops from Indochina.")

The January 7, 1972, issue of "The Retort", a weekly student newspaper published at Eastern Montana College (EMC), Billings, Montana, contained a lengthy article by DON THOMPSON described by the editor as "a Retort reporter-photographer", who traveled with the local VVAW delegation to cover their activities at what was described as a VVAW action at Fort Hood, Texas.

The article described THOMPSON's trip to Austin and Killeen, Texas, with the Hontana representatives of the VVAW, identified as CARL LARSEN, JOHN HAVENER and TERRY HAVENER. LARSOW was identified as the Hontana-Idaho coordinator for the VVAW. The action was called by VVAW to focus attention to the deteriorated living condition for GIs at Fort Hood and to demand an immediate end to the Indochina war.

The above four left Billings on December 26, 1971, in LARSON's converted "police paddy wagon" with a VVAW symbol painted on the rear and arrived at Killeen, Texas, on December 27, 1971. The article described their meeting with approximately forty-five other VVAW members and supporters and their various actions at Fort Hood and Austin, Texas. The group remained in the Killeen-Austin, Texas, area until January 1, 1972, when they returned to Hontana.

According to the article, on the morning of December 31, 1971, THOMPSON and the three Montana delegates attempted to gain entry to Fort Mood, Texas, were arrested by the Provost Marshal's Office, were subsequently photographed and fingerprinted and then released after being banned from the post as "undesirables." The article stated that during the final hours of 1971 sixty VVAN members and supporters sang and danced in the rain at the LBJ Library at Austin, Texas. The article contained seven photographs taken by THOMPSON of the various VVAN members during this activity.

On Marchag, 1972 University of Texas, Austin, Texas (UTAT), Police, furnished the following information: \,

During the VVAW demonstration at the LBJ Library, Austin, Texas, which is located on the UTAT property, a vehicle bearing Hontana license plates was observed. In an effort to ascertain the identity of the owner of the vehicle, the UTAT Police sent a teletype message to Hontana State Police in an effort to identify the owner of the vehicle. The return message contained information that did not correspond with the vehicle to which the plates were affixed. On December 29, 1971, when two individuals who had been given the key to the vehicle entered the vehicle parked on 23rd Street in an area covered by the UTAT Police, they were stopped by UTAT Police and taken to the UTAT Police Station where another attempt was made to ascertain the owner of the vehicle through the Hontana State Police and the Billings, Hontana, Police Department.




