

SUBJECT: VIETNAM VETERANS AGAINST THE WAR INTERNAL SECURITY - REVOLUTIONARY ACTIVITIES

PURPOSE:

This is to advise you of current status regarding, Grand Jury proceedings against Vietnam Veterans Against the War (VVAW) militants.

DETAILS:

Previous memoranda have set forth details concerning proposed plans for violence on part of VVAW militants aimed at disrupting the Democratic and Republican Conventions in Miami Beach, Florida, and against law enforcement agencies in that area

This serious matter was brought to the attention of the Internal Security Division (ISD) of the Department which authorized the convening of a Grand Jury in Tallahassee, Florida, on Friday, 7/7/72 to hear this case. This will serve two important functions in addition to prosecution. First, the principal VVAW leaders and troublemakers will be physically away from Miami Beach and unable to personally precipitate disruptive actions. Secondly, publicity which will probably follow the service of subpoenas will hopefully serve as a deterrent for disruption in Miami Beach by the remainder of the VVAW and other militant groups.

Departmental attorney Guy L. Goodwin intends to handle the Grand Jury proceedings and has indicated







On June 30, 1972, a confidential source, who has furnished reliable information in the bast, advised that the Florida VVAW. Post Office Box 13179, Gainesville, Fla., has disseminated an undated letter, presumably to all VVAW chapters in the United States, regarding activities at the forthcoming political conventions in Miami, Fla. A reproduction of this communication is set forth below:

There seems to be a small misunderstanding concerning the lost News letter about the conventions.

First let me say the we are planning for a <u>peaceful</u> onvention; any trouble will only help Nixon. After talking with leaders from SCLC, MadO, YIP, ZIP, MCC, the Gay organizations and other groups, they all plan for a peaceful Democratic Convention. Some of them plan a lot of Civil Disobedience for the Republican Convention.

Those brothers that are interested in peaceful protest should attend the Democratic Convention; the Democrats offer the best chance for peace. Our emphasis at the Democratic Convention will be one of educating the Dem. delagates, using WSI, lobbying with the delegates, showing slides and films, setting up workshops and possibly doing guerrill theater. It will be our job to see that the Democrats come out with the strongest possible anti war, anti military, and pro repatriation platform. This means that we have a lot of constructive issues and work for the Dem. Convention.

At the Republican Convention we must confront the Republicans with their past record A lot of organizations plan C.D. and the chances for trouble will be a lot higher at the Republican Convention; also most of the groups will be putting their main emphasis in the Rep. Convention and that means a lot more people will be there and they will be harder to control than the smaller numbers at the Dem. Convention.

This is a report on our gaines during meetings with the authorities in Miami and Miami Beach. 1. In the event of areas being called illeagal assembly area's, our corpmen, Medics, and Marshalls will not be arrested. 2. In case of any trouble our marshalls will have an opportunity to take care of the trouble first. Our marshalls will only be responsible for VVAW personnel. 3. The police will evict any people who hassle us on our campsite, at our request. 4. There will be a ramor control board set up with vets and police. 5. The police will not hassle people for minor infractions such as smoking dope. We have agreed to stop anyone selling heroin and to dispose of the heroin: 6. VVAW emergency vehicles will have access to and from the convention site. Feople who OD or for any reason must be taken to a hospital or off the beach can be removed with a VVAW vehicle and a police escent, if requested. 7. In the event of C.D. the police will go over arrest procedures with us before hand, in order to keep peace; this is similar to the arrangements we worked out in D.C. at Dewey Canyon III. 8. We have requested a campsite and sanatation facilities, explaning that without sanatation facilities we would have to use hotel and restaurant bathrooms.

As far as our needs of the membership: 1. each chapter should pick their own marshalls so that they can stay with their chapter and help keep peace with the people they know. 2. We will have to supply our own food and sleeping gear. 3. In case of a hurricane we have private homes available to send people to.

That's about all for now, we will send out more information as we get it. VVAW office in Hialeah FL is the convention headquarters for us. Alton Foss is coordinator. His phone number is 305-681-7982.

Reference is made to memorandum dated June 22, 1972, at Jacksonville, Florida, captioned "Vietnam Veterans Against the War (VVAW)".

VVAW is an anti-war organization organized in 1967 and headquartered in New York City. Its published objective is "to demand an immediate cessation of fighting and the withurawal of all American troops from Indochina". VVAW has participated in several demonstrations, including massive demonstration in Washington, D. C., April 19-23, 1971.

On June 21, 1972, Saunders Archery Company, Box 476 Industrial Site, Columbus, Nebraska, advised that Saunders Archery Company is primarily engaged in the manufacturing of archery products but also marcas Three models of a "wrist rocket" slingshot. He

remarked his company's sales in the Southeastern portion of the United States are small. Very few dealers buy directly from Saunders Archery Company in the Southeast, as most buy through jobbers. Saunders Archery Company products are only retailed through established sporting goods stores, sporting goods departments in departmental stores, or through archery pro shops. The added that direct orders from retail outlets for the wrist rocket usually do not exceed one dozen.

identified the three Southeastern jobbers as Peeler Hardware Company, Macon, Georgia; Walthour and Hood Company, 206-260 Rogers Street, Northeast, Atlanta, Georgia; and Halifax Sporting Goods, Post Office Box 7-Beck-Lindsey, Daytona Beach; Florida.

Peeler Hardware Company is the only Southeastern jobber to whom Saunders Archery Company has sold to since January, 1972, and they have only purchased archery equipment.

The only Woolco Department Store Saunders Archery Company has sold to in the Southeast is one located at Sunshine Shopping Center, 2649 Northwest 13th Street, Gainesville, Florida. On October 4, 1971, this store ordered twenty-four wrist rockets and on January 18, 1972, they ordered an additional ninety-six.

Other stores in the area handling Saunders Archery Company products are Jimmie Hughes, Incorporated, 1113 West University Avenue, Gainesville, Florida, and Zip Sporting Goods, Incorporated, 7230 Red Road, South Miami, Florida. Neither of these stores has purchased wrist rockets this year.

added it would take about three weeks to deliver an order of 500 to 1000 wrist rockets. While this number would not be out of line for a jobber to order, it would be highly unusual for a retail outlet to order that many.

stated he would alert the FBI to any sizable order received during the coming weeks. He said he was willing, if desired by the FBI, to request his dealers in the Southeast not to sell any wrist rockets until after the National conventions are oven in Miami, Florida.

Sporting Goods Department, Woolco Department Store, Sunshine Shopping Center, 2649 Northwest 13th Street, Gainesville, Florida, advised he currently does not have in stock any "wrist rocket" slingshots which are manufactured by the Saunders Archery Company, Columbus, Nebraska. He currently has in stock approximately sixty "Allison shot shooters" slingshots which is similar to the "wrist rocket" slingshot but has a wooden handle and does not have a metal base for the wrist such as the wrist rocket has. He advised that the Allison shot shooter is not as good of value as the wrist rocket slingshot.

advised that during the student anti-war disturbance in Gainesville from May 9-11, 1972, he had approximately four dozen wrist rocket slingshots displayed for sale but removed them from the display counter with instructions for them not to be sold during the anti-war disturbance. He advised that after the disturbance was over, he sold out of the wrist rocket slingshots within about a three or four week period. He stated during this period he had no unusual large orders for this slingshot and very seldom sold more than two at a time.

approximately 48 dozen of the wrist rocket slingshots within a week because these slingshots are a popular item particularly during hunting season.

advised that no one has contacted him personally requesting him to fulfill a personal specific order for the wrist rocket lingshot. He advised he has alerted his salesmen to such a request as well as to any significant large sales of these slingshots and has requested the salesmen to try to obtain the name of the

person buying the slingshots or to obtain a license number if possible of Vehicle person may be traveling in.

has every bit of power of a thirty pound bow in shooting an arrow and would have the same effectiveness. He advised that this slingshot will sling a marble or a ball bearing 200 yards and would be very accurate at this distance with sufficient practice. He advised that with sufficient practice, someone could become extremely accurate at 30 to 40 yards and he bases this comment upon his own practice with this type of slingshot.

On June 22, 1972, Eugene Whitworth, Assistant State Attorney, Gainesville, Florida, advised that Scott Camil is scheduled for trial on June 14, 1972, before Circuit Judge John Crews, Gainesville, Florida, on one count of delivery of marijuana and one count of possession of marijuana and that Camil's kidnaping charge for which he was arrested on January 23, 1972, is also scheduled for trial on the same date: however, he does not expect the kidnaping trial to get underway until a few days after the drug charges are heard. Mr. whitworth advised that the charges against Camil for delivery and possession of "PCP", an hallucinogenic drug, would not be tried as the question of whether or not this drug falls under the " Florida Drug Abuse statute is currently before the First District Court of Appeals at Tallahassee, Florida. Whitworth advised that he plans to prove that Camil delivered the "PCP" drug during the marijuana trial even though this specific charge is not on the docket. Mr. Whitworth advised that direct informations were filed against Camil on the drug charges.



ON THE HANDLING OF PRESS RELEASES

The enclosed press releases are for dissemination to local news media. In order to insure maximum coverage, internationally, nationally, and local, several types of press releases have been printed up for release at specific times and places.

The Mational Office will handle the national and international press releases from New York and Paris. The releases which will come out of this office will be the announcement of the arrival of the delegation in Paris at 5 AT EST (10 AT Paris Time) at Orly International. This edition will be in English and French.

The coordinator of the delegation is responsible for insuring that press releases are disseminated in Paris to the French and international news agencies. Any releases from Paris will also be coordinated with New York, to insure national coverage.

Local news should be handled by the regional coordinators of the delegation. The press release to send to the local broadcasters and printers are about the persons involved and the announcement of the arrival of the delegation. It should be hand carried to the news agencies, or otherwise insured that the media will not release the news until the specified time of release. This is to insure that the delegates will not be interfered with by the United States and/or French Governments.

Upon the return of the delegates to their home regions, it would be highly beneficial, from the standpoint of publicity, to call for a press conference of the local delegate. It is also recommended that as much exposure as possible of the delegates be given in the press and radio-video agencies.

Any questions which regional coordinators cannot answer may be directed to del Rosario, who will be in constant touch with the delegation to keep current the flow of information. As information is received at this office, press releases will be sent out to the regions for local dissemination.

A note: One or two of the delegation will proceed to Stockholm, Sweden for another conference, if there is money available. Those two, or one, will have special press releases published on their mission at a later time.

WAR VETERANS FROM UNITED STATES AND INDOCHINA TO HOLD PARIS MERTING

Sixteen members of Vietnam Veterans Against the War arrived at Orly International Airport in Paris, France this morning, June 26, 1972, for a three day meeting with veterans from the South Vietnamese National Liberation Front, Worth Vietnamese Army, Pathet Lao, and Cambodian Liberation Government. The meeting will mark the first time veterans from opposing armies have met in peaceful discussion while the conflict is in progress. This will be a profound human encounter between former "enemies" to seek a mutual understanding about what can be done to end the war and how each can work toward peace.

The delegation from Indechina will include veterans and war victims from the South Vietnamese National Liberation Front, the Morth Vietnamese Army, and Cambodian Liberation Government. Also to attend are civilian military experts, a number of the South Vietnamese National Liberation Front Commission of Inquiry on the Consequences of the War, and a member of the North Vietnamese Army Commission of Inquiry from the Mar Crimes Commission. The delegates from the Cambodian Liberation Government will be headed by their Minister of Special Missions. The Pathet Lao is also sending a delegation.

There seems to be a see misunderstanding concerning to last News letter about the conventions.

First lot me say that we are planning for a reaceful Convention; any trouble will only help Nixon. After talkeds with leaders from SCLC, NARO, VIR ZIP, MCC, the Gay organizations and other grows, they all plan for a peaceful Desceratio Convention.

Some of them plan a lot of Civil Disobedience for the Republican Convention.

Those brothers that are interested in peaceful protest should attend the Democratic Convention; the Democrats offer the best chance for peace. Our emphasis at the Democratic Convention will be one of educating the Dem. delagates, using WSI, lobbying with the delegates, showing slides and films, setting up workshops and possibly doing guerrilla theater. It will be our job to see that the Democrats come out with the strongest possible anti-war, anti-military, and pro repatriation platform. This means that we have a lot of constructive issues and work for the Dem. Convention.

At the Republican Convention we must confront the Republicans with their past record. A lot of of organizations plan C.D. and the chances for trouble will be a lot higher at the Republican Convention; also most of the groups will be putting their main emphasis in the Rep. Convention and that means a lot more people will be there and they will be harder to control than the smaller numbers at the Dem. Convention.

This is a report on our gaines during meetings with the authorities in Miami and Miami Beach. 1. In the event of areas being called illeagal assembly area's, our corpmen, Medics, and Marshalls will not be arrested. 2. In case of any trouble our marshalls will have an opportunity to take care of the trouble first. Our marshalls will only be responsible for VVAW personnel. 3. The police will evict any people who hassle us on our campsite, at our request. 4. There will be a rumor control board set up with vets and police. 5. The police will not hassle people for minor infractions such as speking dope. We have agreed to stop anyone selling heroin and to dispose of the heroin:

6. VVAW emergency vehicles will have access to and from the convention site. People who OD or for any reason must be taken to a hospital or off the beach can be removed with a VVAW vehicle and a police escert, if requested. 7. In the event of C.D. the police will go over arrest procedures with us before hand, in order to keep peace; this is similar to the arrangements we worked out in D.C. at Dewey Canyon III. 8. We have requested a campsite and sanatation facilities, explaning that without sanatation facilities we would have to use hotel and restaurant bathrooms.

As far as our needs of the membership: 1. each chapter should pick their own marshalls so that they can stay with their chapter and help keep peace with the people they know. 2. We will have to supply our own food and sleeping gear. 3. In case of a hurricane we have private homes available to send people to.

That's about all for now, we will send out more information as we get it. VVAW office in Hialeah FL is the convention headquarters for us. Alton Foss is coordinator. His phone number is 305-681-7982.


SESSIONS OF NSC CONFERENCE

Friday, April 7, 1972

Texas as early as April 6, 1972 and upon arrival, attempted to locate places to sleep; to stow bedrolls and other equipment. On Friday, April 7, 1972, early arrivals met at Hermann Park near the Miller Open Air Theater. People drifted in and out and there was no organized meeting. There was no control or security of these proceedings and the agenda was not followed. It was decided that everyone should locate their living quarters and then reconvene at the "Dove's Nest", a Community Action Center at about 8 P.M.



There was no quorum present at either the morning or early afternoon portions of this gathering and no meeting was called to order. Conversation was had among the individuals there regarding activities in the individual VVAW regions.



On the night of April 7, 1972, approximately 75 individuals met at the "Dove's Nest" where they drank beer and some few used Marijuana. Many remained throughout the night at this location, but no business was conducted.

At this "rap session" at the "Dove's Nest", source observed considerable "dope" spoking and drinking. The group agreed that the afternoon session had been a waste of time. JOE URGO, ED DAMATO, and JON BIRCH, commented that the NSC meeting held in Denver, Colorado in February, 1972 had not legally given authority to the formation of the National Clearing House that had been operating in the old national office of the VVAW in New York City during March, 1972. The three pointed

out that the only function of the Clearing House was to publish the VVAW paper, "First Casualty" and that its publication was to be a communal affair, not merely the work of DIANE WOLFE, a non-veteran and its editor. DAVE ROSEN, Treasurer of the VVAW, commented that DEL ROSARIO of the National Clearing House had said he had been assigned to the National Clearing House, but did not believe in it. DEL ROSARIO reportedly wanted the National Executive Committee re-established and had come to New York City to make sure that the National Clearing House did not work.

Saturday, April 8, 1972

The NSC conference officially came to order on the morning of April 8, 1972 in the Houston Room of the University of Houston, University Center. JOHN KNIFFIN, Texas VVAW Regional Coordinator (RC), and MIKE MC CUSKER, Oregon VVAW RC, shared the Chairman-ship of this meeting. Approximately 60 - 70 persons attended this session and of the 28 VVAW regional areas, there were two boycotts and three "no shows"



Strong security measures were taken at this and subsequent sessions of this NSC and no one was admitted who was not identified and vouched for by his RC. Guards were stationed at the doors of the meeting room.

The National Executive Committee began with a report from each member. There was some difficulty—and hard feelings present because at the past NSC conference in Denver, Colorado, the Executive Committee was officially disbanned and new members chosen. Apparently when this group arrived in New York City, at the site of the national office, those who were in office and power would not relinquish their duties. The rationale for this action was that the organization was based on many intangibles, such as connections with members of other movements, with members of the media, and with international organization, and also a legal question regarding matters such as powers of attorney relating to the checking account and formal titles in the national charter. Although at first

ill disposed toward this explanation, most members eventually agreed this was the only practical manner in which to keep the organization functional.



Another source reported that following a discussion on the status of the National Clearing House and the National Executive Committee, a motion was passed to abolish both the National Clearing House and the Executive Committee and to start anew.

DAVID ROSEN, Treasurer, gave a detailed financial report which included information that the publication of "The New Soldier" had cost the VVAW \$9,600 to produce and had brought in receipts totalling \$16,862.80, thus resulting in a profit of \$7,260.80. ROSEN also reported a second book on the Winter Soldier Investigations had brought in a \$2,000 advance and was expected to generate a fair profit in the future. Regarding salaries, ROSEN reported that as of January 1, 1972, salaries had been as follows:








Following this report, AL HUBBARD of the VVAW national office was questioned concerning the identities of some of the contributors to the VVAW, but stated he would not divulge this information at this time.

Another source reported the new treasurer of the national VVAW organization reportedly had not received any books from the former officers, with no explanation concerning individual expenditures. When questions were put, asking for explanations regarding these expenses, they were answered by comment that Executive Committee members should not be questioned in detail about expenses incurred.



Following this financial report, AL HUBBARD of the VVAW national office, described by source as possibly the key person in the entire VVAW, spoke about the national office as such and about his dealings with other organizations. HUBBARD had recently returned from a trip which took him to Paris, Moscow, Hanoi, and Japan. He described the trip in terms of what it meant to himself and its significance for the VVAW. In Japan, he related he met with leaders of an organization known as Gonsiekio (PH), the militant wing of the Liberation Front which had recently been in the news concerning purges within its own ranks. Source received the impression this Gonsiekio had financed HUBBARD'S trip to Hanoi in conjunction with a Paris Peace Committee and a Moscow Peace Committee.

HUBBARD related that in Hanoi, he had spokenwith PHAN VAN DONG and LE DUC TO and to others concerning the nature of the war in Indo-China and what could be done to end imperialist aggression. HUBBARD spoke of both the U.S. and Russia as having imperialist roles in the civil war in Vietnam. not distinguishing between North and South Vietnam. He stated he had visited provinces which had not been visited before and his primary role was to evaluate the air war, study Quang Binh Province, talk with prisoners of war, and firmly establish a relationship with the National Liberation Front. One result of this trip was that a request had been made that members of the VVAW accompany any delegation from the U.S. which visits Hanoi in the future. An open invitation had been extended to all members of the VVAW as welcome friends of the people of Vietnam and Indo-China.

CIA activity was reputed to be "bad" and it was mentioned an attempt would be made to prevent Americans from visiting Hanoi. Inasmuch as visas are not made to North Vietnam, North Korea, Cuba, etc., those making trips in the future most likely will travel first to France and then on to Moscow. In France, they will arrange to fly to Moscow, where the Soviet Peace Committee will issue visas and "pick up the tab" for their expenses while in Moscow and their flight to Hanoi. HUBBARD mentioned that he had spoken while in Hanoi with one SEYMOUR HERSH and PETE SEEGER, the folk singer. reportedly had prepared a show for the Liberation Radio and suggested to American servicemen that they lay down their arms and come home. Arrangements reportedly had been made so that the VVAW can send tapes and literature to Hanoi for use on Liberation Radio. At some date in the near future. Vietnam Veterans reportedly are going to meet in Paris with Vietnam veterans and Laotian veterans. the meeting apparently having been set up through the American Friends Service Committee.

HUBBARD continued that the cost for those who are selected to visit Hanoi in the near future would be a minimum of about \$2,000. An individual named STUART MOTT was named as a potential backer who might finance such a trip.

HUBBARD had brought back tape recordings and movies of conversations with several American prisoners of war. There reportedly is a group in North Vietnam who call themselves "Captured U.S. Servicemen Against The War", who had compiled a book of poems relating to the war and their experiences as prisoners of war.

Source noted that in a movie shown by HUBBARD, were the following prisoners of war:



A conversation had been recorded on February 17, 1972 with one Captain JAMES DICKINSON CUTTER from Oklahoma who had been captured in Quang Binh Province. According to the films and statements made by HUBBARD, the American prisoners of war are receiving adequate medical care and are living in pleasant surroundings under decent conditions.

HUBBARD reported on interviews he reportedly had with a number of doctors near Hanoi, questioning them about statements that the United States had been using fiberglass pellets as anti-personnel weapons which could not be x-rayed. He reported that none of the Vietnamese doctors to whom he spoke had seen these pellets or treated anyone hit by them. All reportedly had read reports from other doctors that these pellets were being used extensively in Laos and on the Ho Chi Minh Trail. They also allegedly reported chemical warfare was being waged against the troups in Laos, but not in North Vietnam.



HUBBARD claimed he had brought six films back with him, but that U.S. Customs had seized fourof them. He stated the North Vietnamese Peace delegation in Paris had invited members of VVAW Steering
Committee to travel to Paris on rotating basis
for one and two week trips for consultation. In addition, the VVAW had been invited to send a delegation
to Japan, to the USSR, the People's Republic of China,
and Thailand. He stated that he was at the present
time negotiating for this trip. Regarding the trip
to Hanoi, HUBBARD stated that Hanoi wanted some Third
World representatives within the VVAW delegation.



Following this address, by HUBBARD, the session broke for lunch.

The first order of business at the afternoon session was to vote out the former National
Executive Committee and Steering Committee, which
vote was unanimous.

Another source reported as a result of this vote, the offices of the National Clearing House, were abolished, together with the office of the Executive Committee.

The nine basic objectives of the VVAN as prepared in the Denver NSC meeting were left as they were in order to utilize the time to discuss the structure and actions of the VVAW. Although these objectives were not considered either complete or reflective of the actual VVAW views, they were considered workable and therefore were to be left alone until the next quarterly conference. It was decided also, the former Executive Committee will be replaced by a new slave or delegates. To preclude a great deal of "hastle", and for workability, this slate of delegates was designated the "National Swimming Pool"? This was not official name, but merely considered neutral and workable in that it avoided argument over whether or not it would be called a National Office, National Staff, or by some other name.

Source noted a great deal of time was wasted at the conference due to mistrust of the national body. The National office on many occasions had to take the initiative on activities without waiting for the entire group to voice their collective opinion. This sometimes involved traveling to foreign countries or the expenditure of large amounts of money. This left the collective groups with the feeling that they were left "holding the bag for the whims and desires of an elete few".

At this time, and throughout the conference, AL HUBBARD and nearly all others working with the organization on the national level, and international level, urged the body at large to accept the national organization as working sincerely in the best interests of the group as a whole.

HUBBARD commented "It is a question of confidence and whether you as members have confidence in the decision making ability of the national leaders". He discussed the legal structure of the VVAW, noting it was a legal corporation required to fulfill certain requirements of the State of New York. For example, there must be a President, a Vice President, a Secretary, a Tressurer, etc. He noted that a corporation is managed by a Board of Directors and that a governing body is the Executive Committee, whatever the name bestowed upon them.

At this point in the meeting, there was an interruption of the proceedings by an announcement that military forces throughout the country were being mobilized towards a war shooting. It was reported, for example, that Marines in Okinawa were being placed on alert, that all F-104's stationed on the East Coast had disappeared, that twenty-one B-52 crews with equipment were on alert and mobilizing, that all ground personnel at Westover Air Force Base(AFB) were on alert, the 101st airborne had been on alert for a week, the 7th Marine Division was on full alert, the aircraft carrier "Midway" was on alert, that 4,000 men at Ft. Hood were "at the ready", etc. Several persons in attendance were designated to make telephone calls back to their various regions to learn about military activities and make later reports. Meanwhile, it was decided the primary and most important function the assembled body could accomplish was to proceed withthe business at hand, at least until confirmation of the various reports were received.

Next was a discussion of the laws governing the VVAW with the following points being discussed or made policy:

I. RC's shall constitute the governing body of the VVAW. (There are 28 regions designed to cover the U.S. Members in Vietnam and in Canada). It shall be the duties of the RC's to define policy, activities, and the philosophy of the national organization.

- 2. The books of the VVAW may be audited independently by any member of the governing body at any time.
- 3. RC's shall be full voting members of the governing body, with each region having a block of five votes which may be split.
- 4. Members of the Swimming Pool (Executive Committee) shall sit in as members of the Steering Committee.
- 5. The editor of the "First Casualty" shall be a member of the Steering Committee and have access to all meetings, opened or closed in order to insure that the wishes of the constituency at large are not abridged and that they may know of any decisions which may effect policy or philosophy.
- 6. The governing body shall convene quarterly for the purpose of conducting national business and discussion regional affairs. The time and places of these sessions are to be decided by the Steering Committee and two coordinators will be designated to arrange same.
- 7. Emergency sessions may be called by the Swimming Pool as necessary or by regional members should the need arise. The Swimming Pool will convene an emergency session at the request of any one member if two-thirds simple majority of RC's contacted should agree.

Next was a discussion of the duties of the RC, which were defined as follows:

- 1. RC is the official VVAW member in charge of the affairs of a geographic area.
- 2. RC had the responsibility and full authority to make policy and plans in his area as determined by his constituency as long as it is consistent with national policy and philosophy.

- 3. RC shall be supported by the national body and Steering Committee, however, all decisions made at the national level shall be binding on all chapters.
- 4. RC is responsible for establishing media and political contacts in his area.
- 5. RC is expected to support all national events, actions, and fund raising drives initiated by the Steering Committee.
- 6. RC is responsible for distributing press releases to the media at the request of the Swimming Pool.
- 7. RC must establish and insure the delivery of all communications within his region.
- 8. RC must be available to attend all regional, national, and emergency meetings, or delegate such responsibility to a proxy with written authorization.
- 9. RC must call regional meetings at least quarterly in order to disseminate all information received at national meetings and to elect a delegate to the next national assembly or establish in writing his proxy from another region with the consent of regional membership.
- 10. RC will asign a representative to fulfill his duties in case of absence or shall issue his written proxy in case of national business.
- ll. Each regional chapter shall be chartered according to the national certificate. of incorporation and may not otherwise use the name VVAW.
- 12. RC will serve a fixed geographic region for a period of one year, unless removed by a two-thirds vote of the regional Steering Committee membership.

13. The national Swimming Pool shall establish staff and Credentials Committee, recognizing regional chapters, delegates to meetings, etc.

These rules were established and duties constructed in order to create stability and continuity within the organization. The entire membership is expected to understand and act in accordance with them. In the past, national organization has been an illusion rather than a fact because only eight of twenty-six regional could actually be depended upon.



Again, this session was interrupted by announcements of information received concerning activities of military and naval units of the United States irresponse to the current escalation of the war in Vietnam. Among information furnished in these announcements were reports that the carrier "Midway" had left for Vietnam, the "Kearney" was on station in Vietnam, Lowry AFB in Colorado, and Hanscomb Field in Massachusetts were on alert.

Additional information concerning military activities furnished during this interruption were reports of the following:

All cargo planes had pulled out of Travis AFB. The Third Marine Division in Okinawa was on full alert.

All F-104's on the West Coast had disappeared.
1,000 people in Travis AFB were on full alert.
Westover AFB Massachusetts, area at SAC headquarters, had 310 Air Force people-on full
alert, including 21 B-52 crews. (B-52
crews later departed for Vietnam).

Aircraft carrier "Midway" being refitted, left San Diego one month early, headed for Oakland, where it boarded personnel and left for Vietnam.

Peeze (PH) AFB, New Hampshire, SAC Command all ground personnel on alert.

7th Marines, Camp Pendleton on full alert. USS Constellation due to rotate being kept on station.

Loring AFB, Maine (nuclear) is on "Fullalert for 30 days or the duration thereof".

This information reportedly had been secured from one JOHN TROVADO of Boston who had called MIKE ROACH in New York. MIKE WADE in Tulsa had confirmed some of this information and other data through the Chicago Military Project and members on active duty across the nation.

There next followed considerable discussion concerning the confliction and nature of the national office with some members wanting to do away with the New York Office and with any formal national body. Others prevailed that some sort of office had to be maintained beyond the idea of a Clearing House to disseminate information.

AL HUBBARD took the floor to talk about the day to day affairs of the national office, describing them in terms of the functions, responsibilities, and drudgery of this office. He explained there had to be a party to answer inquiries of the press, curious individuals, and other groups. The staff ran the thankless job of coordinating day to day contacts and trying to keep communications flowing between chapters as well as between groups. He explained it was necessary to maintain friends in the media and required coordination to keep "us as an organization from being out on a limb". He continued that someone had to check out other groups and make appraisals regarding areas of affiliation. A national staff was needed to keep the editor of the paper abreast of the world situation. Concerning fund raising, HUBBARD explained the VVAW did not sell pencils on street corners and as one of its most important functions, had to have contacts who could raise money.

HUBBARD argued that they must always think "in totalities" and need people who know the factions of the various political groups within "the movement".

He explained the VVAW could not operate within a vacuum and must know, be aware of, and be involved with all of "the movement". He explained that those in the national office had always done it in terms of the national prospective, keeping everything relevant to the organization as a whole, never as regional coordinators had to think of their regions.

BARRY ROMO of California, commented that there needed to be input from the regionals to the national level as well as from the national to the regional levels. He stated communications had been the greatest breakdown in the past and they must put an end to that breakdown. ROMO commented "We have to build this organization on a serve-your-neighbor program, but at the same time, consider and create the national image."

Source commented the session ended following additional information of military activities around the country, which included a report from the Chicago area military project that not just a few isolated bases, but the entire military was on the alert, including all foreign stations.

Sunday-April 9, 1972

The April 9, 1972 session of the NSC began at about 10 A.M. in the Houston Room of the University Center, University of Houston. The first order of business was a "Round Robin" discussion regarding the activities of the VVAW in various parts of the country.

AL HUBBARD led off the discussion with a brief synopsis of the VVAW, commenting that the VVAW was not a radical group and should not be confused as such. He described it rather as a political anti-imperialist and anti-war organization which was an expression of intent Humanism. He claimed the organization cut across all lines, Left, Right, Active, and Passive. He stated that at this conference, they must decide where the organization was and where it wanted to go, adding most people in America had accepted the general outlook of the VVAW. HUBBARD stated his

life is oriented against Man's inhumanity to Man and asked that the group "get it together", and try to feshion a means to end the "brutal, barbaric slaughter of our brothers in Indo-China".

The first regional report was given by MIKE DEDRICK from the Washington-Alaska region. DEDRICK reported that they had "begun our set up" in August of 1968, beginning as the Veterans Against the War. This group was started by the Socialist Workers Party (SWP) and later split because of the Young Socialist Alliance (YSA). DELL ROSARIO became the RC and things began to move. The group got into guerrilla theater and they decided that they would consider conscientious objectors as veterans. They were considered veterans of a different kind of campaign, one which demanded more moral integrity than "most of us" had when our turn came. DEDRICK noted there were 96,000 veterans in Washington, but only 400 were on their mailing list.

ADRIN VAALNER from Oregon then spoke, asking if the regional delegates were in fact rejections of their constituency. He stated that in Oregon, they were moving away from mass and street demonstrations into a quieter variety of actions. He noted that one matter which his group intended to bring up at the conference was the concept of Undesirable Discharges. He said his group felt there should be only one type of discharge and a man should not bear a burden around his neck forever because of inability to cope with the military machine for whatever reason. He stated his group was filing a class action suit against the Department of Defense and hoped for the support of the veterans across the nation.

BARRY ROMO spoke for the California region regarding work engaged in with the Veteran Administration Hospitals in Los Angeles. He stated his group is attempting to let the veterans know where they stand, insuring they get all the treatment due them and at the same time let them know there were people who cared and were willing to assist. He stated that his group felt in order to build a movement, it would be necessary to provide services for the people, especially

62 670 the veteran. He stated his group had established a program to secure loans for veterans to enable them to get by in the event the Veterans Administration screws up" their monthly checks. In addition, they were encouraging veterans to make use of the GI Bill, and felt it was necessary to support other strikes and people being trod upon by the "great American dream machine". He concluded his group supported the BILLY DEAN SMITH case and the ANGELA DAVIS group.


TOM BRATLIN, Acting State Coordinator for Colorado, stated his group had been arranging concerts for disabled veterans, trying to bring a little more light into their world. They had been speaking in high schools about the facts of war, combating the JOHN WAYNE delusion of gory and guns. His group works closely with the "Concerned Clergy and Laity for Peace". BRATLIN stated that General WEST-MOREIAND would be coming to visit Colorado in the near future and added "We're planning to come and see him", which source stated implied a verbal confrontation.

STEVE HAWKINS spoke for the Idaho group, stating they operated from the Covered Wagon House, which he stated had been in the news recently because it was burned down to the ground twice by local law enforcement and Air Force personnel. HAWKINS stated his group had been considering the generation of a great deal of controversy by putting out publicity that they intended to napalm a puppy on the Capitol steps. They felt there would be a lot of humanitarin concern over the rights of this puppy, which they hoped to use to discuss concern for the Vietnamese being napalmed daily in the name of America. He explained that his group was actually going to fake this and did not actually plan to ignite the puppy. It was expected this would be on local television and would focus people's minds on atrocity, with the hope they would begin to see the magnitude of the atrocities they were allowing daily in their names and the name of Democracy. HAWKINS continued his group had rather good communications throughout the group, were involved in arts and crafts, and had VVAW wares being sold in local stores to bring in some revenue. He stated the

group had initiated food buying groups and cooperatives, were involved in local drama, theater, and concerts, sponsored weekly meetings at the coffee house, and planned a big WESTMORELAND demonstration. One of the members of this group (TRAVIS) from Boise, Idaho is currently running for Sheriff with a good chance of winning. They recently held a concert with DICK GREGORY, "Country JOE", and JANE FONDA, and the group was well-known to the communitee. They were trying to buy their own printing press for their own use and to bring in income from other groups in the area. A future march was being planned in Salt Lake City where the group would march to the prison walls and wing to the prisoners inside to show solidarity. They were writing a Liberation Movement Directory to gather information regarding all other radical, lertist, peace, or anti-war movements. They planned to gather documented statistics on the electronic battlefield and war crimes. His group planned to "off" emotion and "put them with . HAWKINS continued he, JIM SCHAFFER, and TOM SPAULDING had been put off limits and could no longer enter the base at Mount Home because of their antiwar sentiments. He concluded that the telephone at the coffee house was "bugged" and others should keep this in mind if calling this number.

JOHN KNIFFIN spoke for the Texas Delegation, stating "we consider ourselves the forefront of what we call the Peoples Liberation Army', dedicated to a return to Constitutional liberty and the ideals of early America. " He explained they encountered a great deal of difficulty and opposition from the establishment in Texas and suffered from a complete news blackout. He stated the community heard of them only as "long haired youths in hippy attire" and they could not get recognition in the press as Vietnam veterans. He stated the recruiting of this group had primarily been on the campus, that they had both logistics and communications problems and had in the past, a great deal of mistrust for the national organization. He quoted one DAVE CORTRIGHT as saying AL HUBBARD was the number one Military Intelligence Agent in the country. KNIFFIN said most (W)

of this doubt had been dispelled at this conference. Regarding the goals of his group, KNIFFIN said they hoped to recreate past triumphs, such as the day they tossed their medals at the "LBJ" Library. His group, he stated, felt it was necessary to restructure and reorgnize society so that men is considered at least as important as the wealth of nations. KNIFFIN philosophied that they could no longer accept "Daddy Bird politics", hate all "Trots". (Trotskyites), and feel that institutions push us into role playing and so we are against institutional In Texas, out of necessity for survival, behavior. they had aligned themselves with the Palastine Solidarity Committee, the People's Justice Committee, the Panthers, who were being openly murdered in the streets, the Venceremos Brigade (VB), which had been gathering information regarding the success of the Cuban revolution, which information was "verbotten" in the American press, the ANGELA DAVIS Defense Committee, and others. KNIFFIN continued that "our politics dictate are tactics", noting the concern of his group for other veterans in the Veterans Administration Hospital.. He stated his group was pushing the drug amnesty program, noting there were only 20 beds for addicts in the entire Texas, Arkansas, and Louisiana territory. KNIFFIN said his group had begun a limited program of services to the community, such as "Meddaps" in the ghettos, when they have both men and materials. He said TERRY DEVOOS, a former RC, was attempting to put together a veterans VB to Cuba and was considering the possibility of sending one to Vietnam also.

BILL LEEMER, spoke for the Oklahoma-Arkansas region, noting he could do illustrations and political cartoons and would be glad to do so for any region.

Donations thus received would go to the Arkansas medical service, provided by the VVAW to veterans and poor people. LEEMER said he came to this meeting because he

P2 P2 was concerned about the development of national policy, stating he felt that the strength of this group lay, not so much in the national organization, but in the contacts of the individual members. He reported that throughout Arkansas, people were forming liaisons for alternate societies which would depend on natural materials found and stolen from foreign countries.

In his report, LEEMER spoke in general of possible actions at Ft. Sill, Oklahoma, the beginning of a GI underground newspaper, and the holding of more actions to aid SCOTT CAMIL, RC for the State of Florida. He also stated that the VVAW as pushing voter registrations in Arkansas in an attempt to influence the national election of 1972.

PETER MAHONEY, spoke for the Louisiana area, commenting he had been an officer in the Army and had decided he wanted no more responsibility after he got out. He continued that the VVAW is alive and well in Louisiana and he finds himself again in a position of responsibility. Louisiana group, he stated have pushed for benefits for veterans at Veterans Administration Hospitals. The biggest problem has been the "national party" which he described as the new name for the Nazi Party, under one DAVID DUKE. The Louisiana VVAW had to try to combat the "white supremacy" marches in the streets and presentations in high schools. MAHONEY commented he could not honestly say the VVAW counter demonstrations were very effective. He added his group had to combat one FREDDY O'SULLIVAN in charge of the New Orleans "Red Squad", commenting he and CARL BECKER had had their cars "trashed" prior to the last demonstration, but added that they were beginning to organize and "productive reactions"were now under way. He added his group had people who wereworking at getting into the Democratic National Convention and he thought personally it was the system itself, not just the top leaders. MAHONEY continued his group had aided the Mardi Gras Free Clinic with its own medics. He concluded that he would like to see the VVAW offer services to veterans, do constructive things to actually end the war, and organize a Southern regional conference to discuss problems peculiar to the South. He stated the specific problems of his group were a small membership not broadly based and in need of knowledgeable people

b2 570 In his report from Louisiana, MAHONEY commented the VVAW should attempt to broaden its base and not concentrate solely on hard core leftists. He commented the Louisiana region was small in number and was associated with the Southern Regional Conference of the VVAW.

JOHN MUSGRAVE, a former Marine, spoke for the Kansas and Western Missouri region, saying his group had only a small corp of people who were really willing to work and they found fundraising especially difficult. Income was received from speaking engagements and the showing of Narmic slides on the air war, with churches and high schools the basic audiences. His group hopes to establish a non-violence seminar and wanted to "rap" two people from a position of intelligence. -They wanted to improve so that in the long run, every VVAW member would be a knowledgeable speaker. Plans were being considered for an Easter action against organized religion and the holding of a service of their own to commemorate the war dead, both American and Indo-Chinese. He felt it was necessary that every chapter make an active attempt to reach every return veteran to relate to him and help him with the "re-adjustment plus". His group was working on an Emergency Employment Act to help secure jobs and through a Committee of Responsibility, was trying to bring at least one child from Vietnam for rehabilitation. MUSGRAVE stated apathy was the biggest enemy and they had found people were !not afraid of them after they spoke with them because they could see that they were trying to work within the system. He concluded there had been considerable rumor that there will be major "political bust" in his area in the near future. (6


MUSGRAVE commented that his VVAW region had a contact in military intelligence who had proof of Government survellance of VVAW and stated this information soon will be brought out by the VVAW.



RICH BANGERT, speaking for the Illinois and Eastern Missouri region, commented that military intelligence files on political dissenters, which supposedly had been destroyed, were still active and were kept active on all VVAW dossiers. He named St. Louis and Chicago as the two main chapters in his area and stated his group had been shooting for the high school groups because they seemed to have boundless energy. They also were preparing a class action suit against President NIXON and Secretary of Defense LAIRD, demanding the war and all complicity in the war be stopped immediately. The class action suit against undesirable discharges also was being prepared. BANGERT commented that anyone wishing to, could send his group a Federal Records Release form and his group could photostat all information in their records which would be mailed back to the individual. Anyone wishing to do this should write a note in care of the St. Louis Office. BANGERT contined his group had begun a service which includes a errand service for the elderly and low income groups which they will handle through area high schools, ehlping people to get their groceries, medications, other deliveries, and even providing a basic tutoring of basic skills. He reported that in Crane, Indiana, his group had a large protest at the plant which produces 40% of all bombs used in Vietnam.

BANGERT also reported that one MIKE KING, a former RC had "ripped off" \$300 from the region and \$300 from the national office of the VVAW. He added the VVAW can have desks in Veterans Administration Hospitals which can be used to help the veteran patients and to recruit members.

BART SAVAGE, Chicago, added that the McDonald Douglas Corporation in St. Louis is the largest single Department of Defense contractor and his group works with the McDonald Project which he described as an anti-corporate group of citizens and stock holders who have decided to sit in counsel on distribution of profits of this war machine. He stated in Chicago, his group had used the "Trots" (Trotskyites) and veterans for peace to get organized, but have since dropped them as liabilities. His group maintains close liaison with the Chicago area Military Project which he stated has military contact with bases all over the world. Other groups with which his group works are the Draft Resistors League, Chicago Seminarians, Concerned Asian Scholars, and the "Rising Up Aggry" group. He stated his group also works with the Chicago Peace Foundation and alternately was under the wing of/or all war with the reported 5,000 to 10,000 man army of the Black P Stone Nation in Chicago. His group has started a free clinic which requires a great deal of assistance in this project. They plan another major action at Great Takes on Armed Forces Day. He related that the Commanding Officer at Glenview Naval Air Station last year had been passed over two times for another promotion and was up for his third time. As a result of a "ruckus", caused by the VVAW, a two hour ceremony was cut to ten minutes and the General was passed over for a third time. SAVAGE said his group feels it is time to forget the elderly and stop catering to their expectations and system. They all will be dead in ten to twenty years anyway and it is time to side up with the youth. His group has 450 members listed in Chicago, but he plans to slice down on the deadwood which only costs postage. His group has had trouble with a "Legion of Justice" which he described as a group of appointed vigilantes that "come down on and trash anything suggesting a leftist group." They have destroyed the WVAW Headquarters and made life ragged with continual telephone threats. He referred to one EDWARD B. HANRAHAN as one who sees election as a mandate from the people to raid at will. After November, he predicted, each organization in Chicago will be concerned with survival and there is fear of an actual blood bath. (%))

BUZZ NOYES spoke for the Wisconsin region saying they had organized a veterans referral switchboard through which any veterans could call to discuss any problem. If they did not have the answer, they would find a way to get it. His group plans some undefined action at the Great Lakes Naval Station for Armed Forces Day. His group, he stated, was beginning to orient towards "serve the people politics" adding they had a food buying cooperative and were operating truck garden farms so members could learn to grow food to feed the troups if they ever had to have the cities. They also were planning an action for the first week in May at the University of Wisconsin in Milwaukee which will be a teach-in for which they had wide community support. They hoped to stage an "Operation Production Reaction" in which they would came a veteran and drag him through the streets around the University. They also planned a "Bombing Run" and planned to camp out at a place they had staked out as Firebase BILLY SMITH. He added if they could get permission and supplies, they planned a C-ration cookout and a Ripple Raffle.

In his comments, NOYES stated the Wisconsin region is small and recruitment was difficult because the people in Milwaukee or Madison were not "hastled" by the authorities. He stated the Wisconsin VVAW has a front group called the Wisconsin Veterans Union which has obtained State Funds.

BILL MARSHALL, a black militant leader from Detroit, spoke as the RO for Michigan. He stated his group had been carrying out the tenets of the survival program which had been outlined at the Denver VVAW conference. A food program had been instituted, through which people could get a full bag of groceries in the inner cities for only \$3.00. Also, a meat cooperative had been organized and free health care, both physical and mental, for veterans and poor people. The American Ortho-Psychiatric Association, reportedly had agreed to cooperate in building a program to help Vietnam veterans overcome "PVS" (Post Vietnam Syndrome). They were negotiating for a Federally funded and supervised health maintenance program with the cooperation of the National Lawyers Guild. They were hoping to induce former medics and corpsmen to come into

the program to serve their own. Free clinics, however, have had insurance problems when medics function in the role of doctors. One CRAIG WOODSTOCK, a former medic, is handling the program in Detroit. One University reportedly had organized a Positions Assistant Program. CRAIG WOODSTOCK represented Detroit when 3,000 former medics met in Washington, D.C. last February at a convention of Free Clinics. MARSHALL claimed the General Motors World Headquarters had been shut down by his group during the previous February for three hours. His group was conducting a program of shadowing all political candidates who speak in Michigan and "backing them up against the wall" on any issue relating to Vietnam. The Michigan State Republican Convention will be held at Cobo Hall in Detroit June 9 and 10, 1972 and his group plans to be there in force. He claimed the media coverage in his area was always distorted. Politically, he claimed through massive pressure on Senator HART, his group was responsible for the Senior Citizen Housing Development cooperative. His group backs the people in everythingthey can against the Government. They have arranged for karate lessons for all their members in Detroit with a black belt instructor giving lessons each Monday and Wednesday. They are with the people against the STRESS Forces in Detroit which he described as an organized program to "waste" black people. He alleged the most prejudiced "pigs" from the Detroit Police force had been selected to set up traps for blacks, shoot them first, and ask questions later. He claimed that beginning now, the "black folk" are going to be on the street and there would likely be considerable trouble in the forthcoming Summer.

MARSHALL stated at least 70% of the people living in the Detroit geographic area were unemployed and there were no jobs for veterans. They were working closely with the United National Caucus and the AFL-CIO. The Local 2 Caucus of United National Caucus is going to get with the VVAW in the near future to see if they could "get our heads together". MARSHALL said a lot of veterans were truly concerned about being buried in a box, especially at Arlington or some similar place. His group, he reported, had begun their own legal corporation to "recycle a veteran corporation". When one of their members die, he claimed, his body was legally theirs, and they donate organs wherever they could. They planned to build a veteran compost heap and when it gets big enough, they plan to plant "grass" on top. MARSHALL related the

Detroit Office had been broken into twice and although nothing was taken, everything was photographed. He claimed their telephone was tapped. When the local Salvation Army had a purge, and kicked out some Senior Citizens to make room for a drug rehabilitation center, the VVAW protested and were firebombed.

This source commented BILL MARSHALL formerly was with the Black Panthers and reportedly traveled—all over the country counselling blacks against military service. MARSHALL claims to have been an Army Green Beret in Vietnam in 1965 as a Staff Sergeant and says he stepped on a mine. He is missing his left arm and leg and has shrapnel scars throughout his body. He is militant and advocates violent approaches to solving domestic conflict and claims to be ready to "trash" the Democratic and Republican conventions in Detroit. (1)

In his comments, MARSHALL related the VVAW should upgrade its contact with "third World organizations", including the Black Panther Party and advocated the establishment of a "shadow cabinet" in the revolutionary faction. By shadow cabinet, he explained he meant alternate executives, capable of assuming the duties of the prominent leaders, should they be detained.

Black Panther Party (BPP) is a black extremist organization started in Oakland, California, in December, 1966. It advocates the use of guns and guerrilla tactics to bring about the overthrow of the U.S. Government.

BILL PATTERSON spoke for the New Mexico-Arizona area, saying that all he had to say was the VVAW in his region has "scrambled into a half-dozen heads" and that "we are into self-preparation for whatever".

SCOTT CAMIL then spoke for the VVAW in Florida. He stated they had been preparing for the Democratic Convention in Miami and for weeks had been holding "sensitivity sessions" with the "pigs". The police had asked them to marshal and provide medics for the demonstrators, but they were afraid to accept, because it could very easily spring into a trap. If there is any difficulty, they would be blamed and they would be interspersed . throughout the group. The Democrats , he pointed out, are staging a rock festival in another county to draw off from the numbers they would have at the convention. His group had decided to try to keep themselves and other groups as peaceful as possible for fear they would simply get their heads busted. They were very cautious about giving names because "agents seem to come out of the woodwork". They would like to arrange to have fifteen minutes at the convention to show the Narmic slide show. The only civil disobedience they have considered is the possibility of digging craters all around the convention site and filling them with bodies.

Source commented CAMIL is a very frustrated person and once out of the Marine Corps, was very ambittered against the society and system which sent him to war. He runs the VVAW in Florida as though it were a military operation,

The group has decided to offer as much support as possible to CAMIL and one of the secondary aspects of attending the Miami conference for VVAW will be to voice support for SCOTT CAMIL.

Speaking for the Ohio, Indiana region, GARY STAIGER stated Ohio is of special interest to the anti-war movement with WRIGHT PATTERSON, an eight billion dollar a year defense subsidy with over 40% of Air Force Research and Development done in Ohio. He related there are over 150 research laboratories at WRIGHT PATTERSON alone. He suggested that active duty military personnel, including reserve personnel, could cause considerable administrative difficulty by using Article 138 of the Unified Code of Military Justice and demanding "IG" complaints be "IG" investigation. His group on May 4, 1972, plan an action marching to the hill where the Kent State students were shot down. They plan to build a monument, a VVAW memorial, and fill the entire base of it with purple hearts. STAIGER claimed the VVAW is in control at Kent State, Indiana University, Indiana State, and Ohio State University.

In his suggestion for tying up the Administrative Offices of all the Armed Services, STAIGER claimed that after filing their requests for redress and demands for a formal investigation, under Article 138 of the USMJ, the veteran could then file an Article 98, a civil rights charge, if no action were taken on his original request.

WAYNE VERLINDEN spoke for the Western Virginia-Pennsylvania region, noting that BOBBY CLARK of Pittsburgh had built their organization from nothing. He added that that is just about where the group stands today, that is, nowhere. In Meadville, Pennsylvania, he commented, they have two veterans, three high school students, and a Go Go dancer. He related the group treasurer was "knocked off" by the Black P Stone Nation. The only other affiliation his group has is with the local SWP. (2) v



AL DONAHUE, Buffalo, New York, stated his group was working for a Humane Food Society and were trying to get a program to increase GI benefits. He related a study in New York had shown that nearly all veterans receiving aid under the GI Bill, were living below the poverty level. They hoped to implement a bill which would at least raise this some to the proportionate amount veterans received following World War II. They were working 22

to this end with the National Intercollegiate
Veterans Association. He commented that in
World War II, Congress authorized \$10,000,000
for World War II veterans to learn to hula and
they felt they could be more productive with
Federal money. He also added that his group had
been working with cable T.V. which they found would
run anything his group put together. He suggested
other regions would do well to check into this.

ED DAMATO, from New York, reported a recent conservative estimate in the New York Times indicated there were at least 10,000 addicted veterans in New York City alone and only 417 beds allotted to treat these victims. His group was working for better medical care for their brothers and were promoting rap sessions to discover if the JOHN WAYNE image still haunted them. He related it is time for us to delve into services such as the GT Bill and drug education and care.

DAVE UPMAN from upstate New York, stated the needed more action to bring on creditability with the smaller chapters to let them know this was a national organization. On Apri 27 through 29, 1972, they planned a major Texas seminar and a major militant action at an AFB. He pointed out that Senator BINGHAM of New York, ownes stock in nearly all the major war corporations and suggested other areas might check their own men.

Speaking for New England region, DELL ROSARIO, reported his group has a member who once was with the New Jersey Telephone Company and has developed an "Agnew Box". This device can be attached to any telephone to discover if the phone is being tapped and this member will come to any region having trouble to locate these taps. All he needs is transportation and a place to stay for a few days. ROSARIO stated the exiles in Canada (

have invited his group to talk to them, claiming there are 100,000 exiles of the Vietnam war in 50,000 are deserters and 20,000 are women who went with their men. There are more deserters than draft dodgers in Canada and they tend to be political. lonce they are "landed", most become more interested in Canadian politics than in U.S. political matters. Their biggest problem is that they are going broke. What most of them needed, was military counselling prior to leaving and most believe they made a mistake leaving the country, although they then saw that as the only viable expression against the war. Now they believe they would have done better to remain and work within the system to change it. The VVAW is the only group they trust and they question the feasibility of U.S. sanctuaries. Many feel the need for lawyers, doctors, and "shrinks" and most feel now is the time to go back. If nothing else, they would flood the court dockets with their cases and force the American public to recognize them one way or another. They have asked for a possible joint action this Summer, possibly July 4th. There is no leadership in Canada and they beg the VVAW for guidance. According to ROSARIO, 80% of all deserters are in the United States, 70% are from rural areas and have an average ll years in school. Draft dodgers generally have had two or three years of college background. Once again, the cards are stacked against the low income group who were meant to be fed to the slaughter.

BILL LEEMER from Arkansas commented that since the passage of the National Security Act, provisions had been made for "our" round-up and detainment. He stated they must organize a structure that would stand up even if the top leadership were "ripped off" and this day is not as far away as a lot of people think. LEEMER stated President NIXON had a Rand study prepared of the implications if there were no Presidential elections in the United States in 1972. He continued that they had heard

brothers speak about CIA complicity in bringing drugs to the ghettos and asked what would happen if that flow were stopped. Referring to the economy, he asked what would happen when it reaches peak high and is so unstable that everyone was scared. Referring to the environment, he asked what will happen when people become convinced we have reached the point of no return. He predicted chaos would develop and if it did not, President NIXON would declare it and then declare martial law. After this, all "long-haired youths in hippy attire" would be rounded up as dissidents and a structure was necessary that would stand if this comes about. LEEMER stated the group needed a counter culture that can feed, clothe, and care medically for its own ranks. If it comes to hiding in the hills, he stated we need to be prepared to defend ourselves. LEMER related that since the first of this year, although production has been maintained, and distribution kept up, not one M-16 has left the country. He claimed M-16's, light anti-personnel field artillery, and riot gases had been distributed to National Guard units and local law enforcement units. He asked who is expecting, anticipating, or planning what. He concluded we've got to be ready. for whatever comes. The man is a madman and I'm scared. (4)

Following this report, AL HUBBARD once again spoke in part commenting that a number of people had a great deal of fear concerning the affiliation of the VVAW with other groups. He stated their heads were not as far apart as some felt, but there was somewhat of a crisis of communication. Concerning the international friends of the VVAW, he related the Gensuiko is the major anti-imperialist coalition in the Far East and HUBBARD stated this group had sponsored his stay in Japan. They were the first group to testify on the U.S. transport of nuclear weapons to Japan in 1963 and 1964. In their meeting, they reportedly informed HUBBARD the VVAW was "tops" internationally. The relationship with them is a communications channel and fraternal opening only and there is no conspiracy behind our backs and no secret political affiliation.

HUBBARD stated he had been invited to join the Stockholm Council Against War, the World Peace Council had asked him to join their endeavors, and the Soviet Peace Council had asked the VVAW to communicate and exchange information. They have extended assistance in the matter of securing visas to Hanoi and will pick up the tab for the flight and our stay in Moscow. HUBBARD stated they were useful to the VVAW and through them, the VVAW could receive "stuff" into this country from Hanoi.

HUBBARD related the VVAN has been asked to cooperate on the international level with many groups. This includes the French 48 which hosts the World Peace Concil and includes some Communist groups and some Maoist groups. He claimed it is not dominated by the Communist Farty. The Swedish Embassy in Hanoi has expressed concern for exiles and wishes to exchange information with the VVAW regarding the possibility of setting up a neutral site somewhere for exiles. HUBBARD stated he was a member of the executive board of the People's Coalition for Peace and Justice (PCPJ). He will be going before the Stockholm Council in September as a guest and an individual, not as a representative of the VVAW. Most of the exiles in Sweden, he stated, strongly protest the war and others are anarchists or just plain "happy-go-lucky".

HUBBARD related that while in Hanoi, where he was relating the words of some of the black revolutionaries, he spoke to the widow of JOSE VENONS (PH), a most remarkable woman, at a party in the Algerian Embassy. Algiers, he stated, would like to establish communications with the VVAW. In Moscow, the Finnsfrom Helsinki informed him they wished to open lines of communication. In France, he was approached at the Australian Embassy and the Australians wish to form their own VVAW and establish communications. In Denmark, the FLN antiwar organization wishes to form a communications link.

HUBBARD related they all were interested in the VVAW and the VVAW could benefit a great deal from them. He suggested they should establish strong lines of brotherhood.

HUBBARD stated they were also in contact with the World Federation of Ethiopian Students who asked for help when 1500 students were down for protesting against their government, which incident was not reported in the press. The biggest drawback lies with the national, regional, and state individuals who still maintain their obsession with Communism. HUBBARD stated it is not a monolithic monster which spews seeds from Russia. He claimed wherever you find Communism, you generally find a mandate from the people for it and many of the groups the VVAW is in contact with are Communist or have Communist affiliations. He described them nevertheless, as "our friends". He added the VVAW views Russia as being just as much an imperialist country as the U.S. and stated all we have is an international movement of ideas. Whenever there is a movement towards peace, the VVAW is in favor of coordinating internationally on specific actions, but he stated there is not and never will be a blind blank check endorsement of anyone.

On a national level, HUBBARD continued, we have had a two year association with the PCPJ and will maintain this association. In fact, LARRY ROTTMAN, is on the Steering Committee and he is on the Executive Committee. HUBBARD continued that member organization included the Committee for Medical Aid to Hanoi, Another Mother For Peace, Committee of Liaison, the Catholic Left, the Entertainment Media For Peace And Freedom, the SCLC, the Black Workers Congress, the Black Economic Development, the WLL, the Welfare Rights Organization, and nearly all of the progressive peace groups in the countries. The leadership of the PCPJ consists of DAVE DILLINGER, RENE DAVIS, GEORGE VICKERS, SUE MILLER, PAUL MAYER, AL HUBBARD, and SID PECK.

PCPJ, in a press release dated March 1, 1971, described itself as being head-quartered in Washington, D.C., and consisting of over 100 organizations employing massive civil disobedience to bombat the issues of war, racism, poverty, and repression.

HUBBARD continued we have strong ties with nearly all of the revolutionary organization and with nearly 2.8 million veterans we have to expect some of our members will be into nearly everything. We are in contact with the National Student Alliance which should be exploited more than it has been. The American Friends Service Committee is going to help co-sponsor the meeting between our own veterans and Vietnamese veterans in Paris. The SCLC is especially important to us in Louisiana and they have called for a Third World Congress. He continued that the VVAW is "into the heads" at the Black Panther Party (BPP) and the Young Lords, both of whom could be of incredible help to the VVAW. All of these are mostly loose affiliations should anything be needed.

HUBBARD continued that overall, there is a general tight of all the world's progressive groups who favor peace and humanity over depravity and the machine world. The only two who are not welcome are the American Trots Association, that is, the National Peace Action Coalition (NPAC), and the PSI, which are the "Trots" in Paris. Internationally, HUBBARD argued the VVAW can not act in a vacuum which does not mean they would not question some of these groups, but any change or association which would effect VVAW policy or philosophy, most definitely must be decided by the group at large. He concluded that people relate to progress and activity and not to organization.


NPAC was founded in 1970 by members of the SWP. Its basic objective is to unite masses of people, including labor unions, GI's, and the black community in the struggle to end U.S. intervention to Southeast Asia through orderly and peaceful tactics.

In this discussion regarding international relations, HUBBARD related the Gensuiko in Japan had financed most of his trips to Japan and the Far East. He stated the Stockholm Peace Conference had invited the VVAW to become a member of its ruling board and he has been asked to join the Executive Committee of the Paris Peace Conference.

In Hanoi, N. Vietnam, the VVAW has communications with an organization called the Algerian Correspondents Association. The VVAW, Australia, a new organization, has requested the VVAW to send people to Australia to help organize the VVAW. HUBBARD stated all international anti-imperialist organizations consider the VVAW as the most potent anti-imperialist group in the U.S. and most want to set up better means of communications with the VVAW.


During this speech by HUBBARD regarding contact with international movements, HUBBARD related he had been contacted by Senator MIKE GRAVEL who had asked HUBBARD to arrange a trip for the Senator to Hanoi, but HUBBARD stated he had refused to do so. It was argued at this conference that HUBBARD introduce some of the other VVAW members to his friends in foreign countries, so that he would not be the only one having access to this information.

This session ended at approximately 10:30 P.M. and there was no party as had originally been scheduled.

The Southern Alliance was determined to be an organization within an organization which has no structure, but which could operate separately, independently, and autonomously if the national VVAW office failed.




This session of the NSC was held in the Unitarian Church, 5200 Fannin, Houston, Texas, beginning at about 9 A.M. Early in this session, BILL MARSHALL suggested the VVAW contact Third World People and others regarding the necessity for a consensus of evaluation of an alternative Government. AL HUBBARD responded that the movement coalition, all peace groups will be invited to Paris as guests of DRV where such things will be discussed and added it had been suggested that the VVAW possibly sit in on the Paris Peace talks, (A)

BILL MARSHALL suggested the VVAW call for a general press conference to summarize the current situation and depict the NIXON administration as the murders of Vietnam veterans, rather than the North Vietnamese. MARSHALL, argued it was time to mobilize and stop the American offensive now as has been requested by the people of North Vietnam. He insisted they reveal the barbarism and genocide taking place at that time. He pointed out that Secretary of Defense LAIRD had said 80% of the NVA are in South Vietnam and they should point out that since most of our troups are gone, the NIXON administration has decided to push them back to the Stone Age. All that is left for NIXON to do, he stated, was to bomb the women, children, and all men, which was not war, but murder and genecide and should be dealt with as such. This, he described, was a punitive war, not one of outright conquest. He suggested they challenge the Government and see if NIXON would bomb Hanoi if Vietnamese veterans were scattered across the cities and the entire country.

In his comments at this time, BILL MARSHALL insisted the VVAW must take up the matter of an "alternate government" to take over the running of the government in the event of its collapse and stated the VVAW must be in a position to assume this responsibility. He claimed that such discussions have been heard throughout the "movement" by various groups. He further suggested that the Hanoi 6, that is, the six VVAW members to be selected to visit Hanoi in the near future, should act as forerunners for better relations between the people in the U.S. and the people in Vietnam. He suggested the VVAW set up a group of people in Saignn to represent the U.S. in the expectation that a "revolution" in South Vietnam will succeed.

The biggest hastle of the day concerned the structure of the national headquarters or national staff, which for the purpose of avoiding argument, was designated the national "Swimming Pool". It was decided the Steering Committee shall appoint individuals for staggered terms of one year to perform and be responsible to the Steering Committee for specific functions of the organization. The appointed individuals shall constitute a collective and function in a collective fashion, although final responsibility for each function shall be born by a single person. Titles to satisfy the corporate requirements shall be designated by the Steering Committee, which may at any time remove any of all members of the collective. All ordicers of the corporation must have local regions and be Vietnam veterans. These decisions passed with a vote of 76 for; 6 against; and 3 obstaining in protest.

The functions of the national Swimming Pool were decided to be:

- Internal Liaison (to insure the flow of communications between the national office, regional coordinators when and where pertinent.)
- 2. Treasurer (to keep the books and handle all legal matters)
- 3. Communications (to secure and produce films, books, literature, press releases, handle public relations...)
- 4. Projects (concerned with any special operations)
- 5. Membership (maintain computer accuracy and up to date list)
- 6. External Liaison (maintain relation to the movement.)
- a) Catchall actions to include intelligence, legal, legislative
- 7. Fund Raising (special promotions and target projects./

The international political scope of the VVAW is to be expanded so that everyone in VVAW can be aware of what is going on internationally. People in the national Swimming Pool thus far have had knowledge of where to and how to contact anyone in the movement. This must be maintained by the newer members selected to assume their duties, according to AL HUBBARD. HUBBARD related there has not been a national organization that has not had liaison with the VVAW and some of the key contacts, such as those for fund raising, or people who prefer to remain behind the scenes. Some are key people who do not have a constituency. They are leaders of the movement, but remain independents, not affiliated with any organization or any particular movement group.

HUBBARD maintained New York is still the best location for the national office. He explained they have, in New York, media contacts, full contact with the rest of the movement, and fund raising capability. The only other feasible place for national media and fund raising, is in Los Angeles. HUBBARD insisted that many fund raisers have to be protected and do not want their names to be given out. He stated national leaders have to be people who know whom to hit, when to hit them up, and how much they can be hit up for. He added we all have got to learn the revolution and develop political consciousness. Having leadership, he claimed, did not negate democracy, and pointed out there are more forms of democracy than those defined in political science studies.


Another source reported this session began with more announcements by AL HUBBARD and

JOE URGO regarding additional U.S. military and naval bases that have been alerted due to the escalation of military operations in Vietnam.

HUBBARD and URGO urged that everyone stay in touch with New York because there may be actions that would need VVAW support.

BILL MARSHALL from Detroit stated the VVAW must take up the matter of an "alternate government" to atke over the running of the government in the event of its collapse. He did not specify what would cause it to collapse, but said the VVAW must be in a position to assume this responsibility. He said such discussions have been held throughout the "move-ment" by various groups. He also said the "movement" can send some people to sit in with the DRV representatives to the Paris peace talks concerning this matter. MARSHALL suggested that the "Hanoi 6" that is, the six VVAW members to be selected to visit Hanoi in the near future, should act as a forerunner of better relations between the people in the U.S. and the people in Vietnam. He suggested the VVAW set up a group of people in Saigon, South Vietnam to represent the people of the U.S. in the expectation that the revolution in South Vietnam will succeed. HUBBARD mentioned there is a TDA (The Day After) located in New York City which is prepared to act in the event of an offensive by the U.S. Government in Vietnam. This organization, he reported, will take part in anti-war demonstrations in Washington, D.C. on April 15, 1972.



This meeting of the VVAW was suspended shortly after 7 P.M. with the arrival of several members from several Houston based revolutionary groups. The BPP was the first to arrive and caused some consternation as they made their own security check. They searched the building and the room fairly efficiently and seated several Panthers around the room before calling in their leader, Brother JAMES (LNU). Others who arrived were representatives of the Venceremos Brigade, a group representing Arab Solidarity, and the Workers World Party Against War and Fascism.

The Workers World Party (WWP) was founded in 1959 by individuals who disagreed with policies of the SWP. The WWP dissidents advocated unconditional support of the Soviet Union and the building of a revolutionary party geared to the overthrow of capitalism. More recently, the WWP has called for peaceful solutions to Sino-Soviet border disputes; however, the WWP generally supports the People's Republic of China in its ideological differences with the Soviet Union.

Approximately 70 to 75 people attended this session of the NSC and among those from Houston were CAM and SUE DUNCAN of the Venceremos Brigade, GREGORY SALAZAR of the Venceremos Brigade, BARTEE HAILE, and JERRY PRESNALL of Workers World, JAMES AARON, and CHARLES FREEMAN of the Houston BPP, an unknown woman from the Organization of Arab Students at the University of Texas, Austin, who was accompanied by an unknown female from Austin, and another individual visiting Houston from Clarks-ville, Tennessee.

The female speaker representing the Palestine Liberation Front was a woman in her 20's who spoke ably and knowledgeably concerning the Arab world. She said the nature of the unrest in the Middle East is due to the fact that this is the area where imperialist and progressive factions clash. There is an unholy alliance between imperialism, that is, Russian and American national interests, and the Arab reactionaries and Zionism. The American Government can not tolerate any sign of progressive elements who may want some of the so called rights to Middle East oil to rest with the people. Whenever a sign of impending unrest appears, you can count on the 6th fleet to be in the Mediterranean in force. She stated what the listeners did not know is that Americans were and have been in action in Jordan out of uniform. Should the Arab people unite for peace, American intervention is more than likely. As the advertisement on television says, "the country that runs on oil can't afford to run short" This is true and American "advisors" will be present to see thatthe Arab people will never benefit from the limited supply of oil left in the Mid-East. HUSSEIN represents reaction and reactionary forces in the Mid-East. It is the Arab ruling class and the Israeli Zionist who are the true enemy of the people. The speaker stated listeners could not understand the fear that chills the spines of every Arab when news comes out that the U.S. Government has sold HUSSEIN six more jets or the Israeli another squadron of fighters. It is his blood that will be shed. Those of the Palestine Solidarity Committee pray that soon American journalists might put forth correct analysis of all the incidents of American Imperialism so that the average American can read and understand for himself what crimes are going on in the name of freedom and democracy. The American brand has been only for the select few American

capitalists to be free to exploit the masses on foreign soil.

This speaker gave a general run down on the Middle East situation and accused some Arab leaders of being in alliance with fascist regimes in the Middle East who are in collusion with the U.S. and Great Britain. This group, she alleged, was interested mainly in keeping down the common Arab people and working with monopolies to control the Suez Canal and various oil and mineral interests. She stated that long with the Jews, they were trying to control the Middle East and she supported the Arab guerrilla freedom fighters. She informed President NIXON recently gave Jordan some airplanes and she was disturbed that she had heard no loud objections to this. She alleged these planes had been given to fight other countries and not the Jews.

GREGORY SALAZAR of the Venceremos Brigade, stated the Venceremos Brigade was organized to educate the revolutionary people as to the real meaning of revolution. The Venceremos Brigade people who travel to Cuba could see all functions of a revolutionary Government, such as housing, educational programs, and overall revolutionary organization. He stated the Cuban Venceremos Brigade visitors were being told by the Cuban people who their real enemies were, that is, the U.S. power structure. The moderator asked SALAZAR why the New York-New Jersey Venceremos Brigade chapter broke away from the main body of the Venceremos Brigade. SALAZAR was very evasive, stating he would rather not go into internal problems of the Venceremos Brigade. When the moderator insisted he answer the question, saying the VVAM people were meeting for educational purposes, SAIAZAR consented to explain. He stated the split involved an unnamed black individual who had gone to Cuba with the Vencermos Brigade, planning that he and a white Venceremos Brigade women were to write a paper for the Venceremos Brigade concerning the internal situation in Cuba. While in Cuba, this black interviewed one Cuban on the street who was anti-CASTRO and then wrote he had found racism still exists in Cuba. Venceremos Brigade officials on the trip did not want this included in the report

hecause they wanted the report to make everything appear in "peaches and cream" condition. As a result of this disagreement, SALAZAR explained, the black man returned to the U.S. and began to organize his own Venceremos Brigade chapter, composed mainly of Third World people, thus causing friction with the international Venceremos Brigade group. SALAZAR maintained racism was not condoned by Cuban revolutionary forces and any racism there was caused by remnants of the Old Batista.

This representative of the Venceremos Brigade stated the picture most Americans have of Cuba is distorted and wrong due to the efforts of the State Department and Department of Defense. The Cuban revolution was successful and has led to direct betterment of living conditions for all residents. Cuba is fully open. It is not a repressive society, such as the U.S. in many areas. Throughout Cuba, travel is legal and open for any who wish to voyage. The Venceremos Brigade people feel it their responsibility to educate people regarding U.S. imperialism in Latin America. In Cuba, as in Vietnam, the people know that the people of the U.S. are not their enemy, but the Government. This is the same Government that lies about Cuba. Americans are forbidden to travel to or bring back honest information concerning the Cuban reople and the Cuban revolution. The impression is given that poverty is everywhere as a result of the revolution. This is not true. Everywhere, everyone is better off since the revolution. It has been one of the first major successes of Socialism. There is a big difference between underdevelopment and umdeveloped. Revolutions are taking place all over South American and these are revolutions in thinking. People for the first time are realizing their human worth. They ho longer allow themselves to fall prey to the exploitation of a few capitalists in their country or representatives from the "belly of the monster Cuba supports revolution only in the sense that it heightens the enthusiasm and revolutionary spirit of free people. We are hoping soon for a conference of journalists to be taken through Cuba to view its successes for themselves. (1)

JAMES AARON of the Houston BPP gave a run down on the Survival Program being conducted by the Panthers and explained what the Panthers were all about. He said that they are working in the black community to raise the level of consciousness among the blacks to fight the power structure and were conducting programs to help the neighborhood communities, such as the Breakfast Program for children and free food, free clothing, better housing, and more jobs for the poor. He said the Panthers also were conducting a pest control program.

HUBBARD told AARON he had read in a French newspaper, an article reporting the Illinois chapter of the BPP was engaged in a fund raising project of making golf bags. These golf bags are used only by the upper middle class structure and he asked AARON why this group of Panthers did not make something essential and necessary to the black community. AARON replied he was not familiar with this particular incident and was not familiar with the Illinois dapter of the BPP referred to. He said he could not comment on this situation, therefore, and said each BPP chapter used different methods to raise money.

In his speech regarding the Houston BPP, AARON said "what it's all about is making revolution and we need people. We got to change the corrupt society that's killing us off. We doing it by unifying around the survival program. The basic needs and desires of the people; that's where it's at. We got a good education program to get brothers and sisters hep to the idea that we can control our own lives. We got a breakfast program for kids. We go around the community and ask the man for contributions. He gonna contribute or he ain't gonna have cur business or his own. We got brothers and sisters get shot in the street just cause they black. We gonna unite and protect ourselves. We got to or we be dead".

An unknown black, believed to be from Houston and not a member of the VVAW, made a short speech indicating the Houston VVAW chapter did not relate to the black community. An unknown white female from someplace in Minnesota, said their VVAW in Minnesota consisted of an all white chapter. She

pointed out, however, there was an all black VVAW chapter in the same community where this white chapter is located and the two groups at many times work together. A number of people in the audience were quite critical of these remarks as it appeared this demonstrated a racist attitude.

The WWP group refused to be seated with the Panthers for some ideological reason which was not clearly explained. Basically, it appeared they did not want to appear with the Panthers as a matter of policy because they did not want to be cast into the same lot and "attacked by the pigs" in the same way.

During the question and answer period during this session, comments were made that our revolutionary responsibility is to make the attempt to relate to all other progressive revolutionary groups. In order to relate to blacks, whites, and chicanos, you must become active and participate in the problems each of the other faces. There is a need for a more united front and the situation has put us all in the same revolutionary boat. The black level of consciousness is on a very high level. There is a great deal of awareness of the different levels all across the U.S. as a result of the Vietnam war. People are beginning to understand what is meant by racism, sexism, and imperialism. It was suggested they perhaps all should unite around the BPP slogan "Serve the people"

After this session with the various groups, it was necessary to vacate the church and the VVAW NSC moved to the empty quarters of the "Space City Collective", a building about six blocks from the church, owned and run by a collective of people who put out an underground newspaper. The primary purpose of this meeting, which began after midnight,



was to select the delegates who would comprise the national Swimming Pool. After considerable name calling, and hastling about personalities, it was decided not to choose among the candidates for particular offices, but rather to select the people and let them decide among themselves which function they would remain responsible for. Those chosen were BARRY ROMO, MIKE MC CAIN, JACK MC CLOUSKY, PETER MAHONEY, DELL ROSARIO, and RUSTY BRONAUGH. It was suggested to them that each consider as the primary responsibility and first ethic, that they be and remain honest.

According to another source, after discussions on the structure of the VVAW, it was decided as follows:

- 1. The National Clearing House was to be abolished.
- 2. The national office would be re-established in New York City.
- 3. Six officers would be appointed to the national office who will be part of the National Steering Committee. Their names will appear on a new charter of incorporation in New York State.
- 4. The offices to be created will be a liaison office to be in charge of intercommunications in the VVAW; a treasurer; a communications officer, who will be in charge of films, publications, and press releases; a projects director; a membership director; and a legislative officer. "Trouble Shooters" who will travel around the country handling regional problems were elected. They were AL HUBBARD and JOE URGO who will operate out of the national office in New York City and JON EIRCH who will operate out of Colorado.

AL HUBBARD continued to create a feeling of paranoia regarding the matter of security. He spoke in favor of an elaborate "security check" to seek out infiltrators. This was voted down and instead, two persons will be in charge of security matters, one for the East Coast and one for the West Coast. JOE URGO will be in charge of the East Coast and MIKE OLIVER, currently of the California region, who had formerly worked out of the nationao office, will be in charge for the West · Coast. These two will choose people to aid them in their investigation of specific persons and groups. One (FNU) TRAVIS will be in charge of intelligence matters. This person, a white male, age in his mid-20's, clean-cut, about 5'10", slender build with light brown hair, possibly is from Texas. He will be working on intelligence matters with unidentified persons and groups in Canada. He reported has contacts inside the military.

Another source reported that AL HUBBARD, JOE URGO, MIKE OLIVER, and LARRY ROTTMAN were selected to form a task foce of trouble shooters to assist and not control regions experiencing difficulties with membership, area "rednecks", etc. This source reported they were selected as "Field Secretaries" which were to work as an appendage of the national "Swimming Pool" in an advisory capacity. They also were to be available for speaking and fund raising.

Tuesday - April 11, 1972

The session of the NSC on this date was held in an area of the University of Houston campus beginning at about 10 A.M. It dealt principally with the question of the journey of VVAW members to Hanoi and future actions. Some suggested that these VVAW travelers discussed the prisoner of war problems with the North Vietnamese. The Southern Regional group were particularly in favor of this, but AL HUBBARD stated the North Vietnamese will decide what is to be discussed. It was agreed the VVAW visitors to Hanoi would attempt to bring back to the U.S. one or two North Vietnamese children who have been severely injured by U.S. bombing of the North Vietnamese and are in need of medical attention. This would result in considerable publicity in the media in the United States, unfavorable to the (\mathcal{U}) \mathcal{U}

bombing policies of the U.S. The trip to Hanoi is to take place sometime between the first and third weeks of May, 1972 and the travelers will return before mid-July. Those chosen to travel to Hanoi were instructed to immediately obtain passports and to have them indicate the traveler is to visit France. The travelers will reach Hanoi by way of Paris and Moscow. According to HUBBARD, a part of the cost of the transportation will be paid by the Soviet Peace Committee. HUBBARD also stated the North Vietnamese desire that the VVAW delegation include members of minority groups.

Seven VVAW members were selected to comprise the forthcoming delegation to Hanoi with six alternates selected, in the event some of the first seven were unable to make the trip. The seven selected to comprise this delegation were named as follows:

The last business conducted by the conference was devoted to future actions to be held by/or supported by the VVAW. The following actions were discussed and decided upon:

April 15th

Income Tax Day was set aside to educate people across the country regarding where tax dollars were being spent, for example in Vietnam. This would be in conjunction with other groups who have already planned actions of this nature.

April 22nd

"Trot along with the Trots". It was decided the VVAW would not endorse the NPAC action in New York and San Francisco, but members who wish to go as individuals should do so in order to increase the numbers which would assist in penetrating much anti-war sympathy across the country. The San Francisco VVAW had planned an action separate from that of the Trotskyists.

May 4th

Kent State Action. One TOM BRACE, was going to accept a memorial to the four students shot down at Kent State being built by the Ohio VVAW with a base full of purple hearts. Members were requested to send purple hearts with messages to be read at this memony.

May 13th

Mount Home, Idaho AFB. Local VVAW is considering an action at this base in support of GI rights.

July 9th through 14th at Miami Beach

The VVAW will approach the democratic national convention and send the VVAW platform to the hopeful candidates. They will be prepared to debate the candidates as to politics and issues related to the war in Indo-China. It will be billed as "Operation Snowplow (to clear away the snow job)".

August 17th through 24th at an Diego

"Come to sunny San Diego". The republican national convention, scheduled to be held here, is seen as the primary site to "expose and confront" the NIXON administration. "Veterans will bring the reality of imperialism home to Mom and Dad." The schedule of events is as follows:

Thursday, August 17th Assemble at base camp being prepared in North San Diego.

August 18th

Demonstration at San Clemente in front of NIXON'S home and march through/or car convoy through Camp Pendleton.

August 19 and 20th

Rest and relax, consciousness raising, VVAW to build permanent child care center as agreed and approved by the people of San Diego.

August 21st

United front of all groups and their constituencies. VVAW to march together in an orderly manner as an expose of war crimes at Miramar, to demonstrate for higher GI benefits and job opportunities, and to constrate in solidarity with






