This letter captioned as above is being submitted to the Bureau for indexing purposes. Seattle file was opened on subject as a result of his participation in a peaceful sit-in at the Republican headquarters in Seattle, Washington on 5/12/72. This sit-in was sponsored by the VVAW. Seven persons including subject were arrested at this sit-in by the Seattle Police Department and charged with criminal trespassing. On 8/2/72 the above charges were dismissed on the subjects. Descriptive data on subject was furnished the Bureau in referenced airtels.

Seattle sources familiar with revolutionary activities, including VVAN activities, have been contacted and have reported no information indicating subject has a propensity for violence or in any way poses a realistic, direct and current danger to the national security. Subject is not regarded as dangerous now. No interview of subject is recommended at this time as it is not felt subject would have information of value to FBI investigations.

In view of the above it is not felt subject meets current ADEX criteria and this case is being closed at the Seattle Division to be reonened at such time information is received indicating subject poses a realistic and immediate danger to the national security.

Investigation conducted by the Seattle Division has shown that subject was involved in VVAW activities in the Seattle area during the latter part of 1971 as was indicated in referenced airtel. Seattle sources familiar with revolutionary activities, including VVAW activities, have been contacted since the latter part of 1971 and have reported no information indicating subject is currently involved in VVAW activities or any other revolutionary activities in the Seattle area.

Background investigation on subject has been conducted and the results along with a suitable photograph of the subject are contained in the Seattle file. Investigation conducted has failed to show subject is involved in any revolutionary activities, or has a propensity for violence. It is not felt subject poses a realistic, direct and current danger to the national security and he is not regarded as dangerous now. No interview of subject is recommended at this time as it is not felt subject would have information of value to FBI investigations, and would have no potential in the PSI program.

In view of the above, it is felt subject does not meet current ADEX criteria and this case is being closed at Seattle to be reopened at such time information is received indicating subject is involved in revolutionary activities and poses some immediate danger to the national security.

About 50 people were at the first meeting at about 10:00 a.m. and the meeting was chaired by Buzz (Last Name Unknown), regional coordinators rom Wisconsin. No VVAV business was taken up at this time as there was not enough members present for a quorum, but the agendas were discussed and what subjects would receive priority. The meeting recessed at 12 noon until 2:00 p.m.

The individuals in attendance were irritated because they had come a long distance and felt that a three week notification of a meeting was insufficient to enable everyone to be on time.

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During the afternoon meeting the Wisconsin group advised how they were planning a big parade for sometime in the future in downtown Milwaukee. A representative of the Wisconsin group advised how they were attempting to get an organization started to assist veterans and they were attempting to change the name of the organization in order to qualify for federal funds.

At 2:00 p.m. there still was not enough members for a quorum but the membership decided to have each regional coordinator summarize what each chapter had done during the past months and also who they had uncovered as informants for different law enforcement agencies. STUDENTS FOR A DEMOCRATIC SOCIETY

Students for a Democratic Society
(SDS) was founded during June, 1962, at
Port Huron, Michigan, and in the 1950's
functioned as the leading New Left campusbased Student organization in the United
States. From an initial posture of
"Participatory democracy," SDS moved to
a radical revolutionary position, with
debate centering on how best to create a

The Weatherman and RWA are no longer affiliated with SDS. The WSA continues to use the name SDS and magnitudes its untional headquarters in Chicago, Illinois.

WEATHERMAN

Weathermon, formerly a fection of SDS, controlled the SDS Wational Office from June, 1969, until its closing in February, 1970. Weathermon ther entered on underground status and adopted a tactic of "strategic schotage," with police and military instellations designated as primary targets.

WORKER STUDENT ALLIANOR

Worker Student Alliance (WSA), a faction of SDS, was expelled from SDS in June, 1969, by the then deminant Westherman faction, but continued to use the name SDS and opened an office in Boston, Massachusetts. WSA aligned ideologically with the Progressive Labor Party (PLP) and in February, 1971, moved to Chicago, Illinois, where it opened the SDS National Office at 1225 S. Wabash. Its official publication, "New Left Notes," is published in Chicago.

PROGRESSIVE LABOR FARTY

The Progressive Labor Party (PLP) was founded in 1962, by individuals expelled from the Communist Party, USA, for following the Chinese communist line. Its objective is the establishment of a militant working-class movement based on Marxism-Leninism and MAO Tse-tung thought.

The ment order of business was a report from the members of the National Office (National Swimming Pool) as to the status of VVAM from the position of the national coordinators.

Mike Mc Cein' started with the treasurer's report: Total receipts as of the last conference last April arounted to \$2,625.50. The basic expanses since that time have been for telephone and travel. There is currently \$369.50 in the treasury.

Dell Rosario gave the internal liaison report. He reported that only five regions have kept in touch with the national office at all regularly since the last conference. Rosario said he could not visit different offices around the country due to Al hubbard using all VVAN money flying to different places.

Mike Mahoney advised the VVAW is on the verge of bankrupacy as they have several bills that are unpaid, mainly the telephone bill. He advised that the national VVAW does not pay the excise tax on the telephone bill and are billed with a large delinquency.

The Mational Welfare Rights Organization (NURO) is a national organization which has protected for welfare rights and has also sponsored demonstrations in the past which have led to mass arrests.

Clergy And Laymon Concerned (CALC), headquartered in New York City, is a publicly acclaimed group of clergy and laymon concerned about the war in Vietnam.

VENCERENOS BRIGADE

The Venceremos Brigade was formed in June, 1969, by a coalition of New Left organizations to encourage American youth to travel to Cuba in defiance of a ban on travel to that country by the U.S. Department of State. The ostensible purpose of the travel was to assist the Castro regime in the harvesting of sugar cane and other agricultural products and to give young Americans the experience of living in a revolutionary communist country.

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SID PECK

Sid Pack's name is carried as coordinating committee member of the People's Coalition for Peace and Justice (PCPJ) on the official letterhead stationary of the National PCPJ organization.

It is to provide regional information. It lists VVAN objectives and keeps a current roster of coordinators. It discusses the issue of political prisoners in the U.S., such as Tallahassee, billy Dean Smith and Gary Lawton.

Problems with the newspaper have included, too much concentration on movement heavies; not enough regional news; financing; papers being "lost" in the mail (This is seen as being an attack by the government through the Post Office); not enough involvement with political education, analysis or current action information. In should contain more data on classes and should provide a reading list to the membership. It should provide both a news service and political outlook and should be open to any member to promote his particular outlook rather than try to ram any specific politics down anyone's throat.

The Cairo, Illinois, action was discussed by Bart Savages. He and the Chicago VVAW gathered two tons of food to take down to the United Front in Cairo for its anniversary. He was not met by anyone and after two hours of looking, could not find anyone connected with the front. He felt that the action was a waste of time, money, energy and food, and suggested that Cairo be dropped as a national action for VVAW. His arguments

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were countered by Rich Bangert who stated that his group had good Tapport with the Chiro people and had no intention of dropping support. It was decided that VVAN would continue to support the struggle of the black people in Cairo through actions of the individual regions or collectively by a section of the country asseach region cross to extend its energies. The First Casus ty will update information on Cairo in their next issue.

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VVAN will support and raise funds to build the Nguyen, Van Troi hesovial Children's Hospital. The hospital will be built south of Hanni and the possibility of VVAN labor in construction has been suggested. Matientade, the Harical Student Alliance, La Raza and other groups will participate in the fund raising. Internationally, there are 80 countries participating.

The United States goal in furding will be \$50,000. The campaign to begin funding will begin October 15th and run for one month.

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

Proposal of New York to establish a National Committee to Defend VVAN and a National Defense Fund --

Preamble: In view of the present nature and thrust of the government we see the establishment of these committees as a necessary step in dealing with the repression directed towards VVAN and these committees will be responsible to the Steering Committee to build support and processandize the true nature of the government's actions.

1. To establish a National Committee to Defend VVAV

There will be two marked convey lead and two marked convey rear vehicles which will act as coordinators and organizers for the operation of the Last Patrol. Those vehicles will be equipped with radio equipment to keep in touch with all elements of the convey. There will also be two mechanical parts vans with a basic supply of parts. Mechanics will be available if on-the-sect repairs can be made. As part of our facilities, there will also be medical centers with dectors and medics. Attornies will also be travelling with the convoy as observers or in case of any problems along the route. There will be 20-to-30 convey inspection vehicles to deal with any problems or crises that arise. These vehicles will be throughout the length of the convey and will also be equipped with radio gear.

Each separate organizational or regional contingent must have a marked lead and rear vehicle. VVAM chapters will provide these vehicles in those areas where we have chapters. This will enable vehicles to find and re-enter the convoy with the greatest ease. This will slsc aid in preparing the educational programs which will be organized.

We would like to have educational programs during our stops for lunch and at night. It would really be good if we could have local community participation and attendance if the arrangements could be made thru local and regional contacts. We would also like different organizations to plan internal education programs and theatre for our oun use as we travel.

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All vehicles should be identified with signs, slegans, political thought, carteens, and people's art.

Pick up all trash after stops and in the merning.

No violence among the people will be tolerated. Confidential

While in the convoy travel with your lights on at all times.

If you must stop for repairs or for medical aid or whatever, pull out of line and onto the shoulder. A convey inspection vehicle will stop and arrange for any assistance needed. Do not block freeway access remps when you stop. If you're stopping for gas or the bathroom, the entrance back into the convey will be made as follows; enter at the rear of the convey before the rear convey control vehicles. This procedure should also be followed if you have stopped for emergency aid. The line of the convey should not be slowed by vehicles breaking into the line. Resume your position with your contingent at the noon stop or in the evening.


Only convoy inspection vehicles and emergency aid vehicles should be passing along the line of the convoy. All other vehicles must maintain their position in line unless leaving the convoy line. Convoy inspection and emergency vehicles should resume their designated resitions as seen as possible after stopping.

For those contingents which will be entering the Last Patrol at points other than designated steps, a convoy inspection vehicle will be at your position approximately one (1) hour before the bedy of the convey. The vehicle will be in radic contact with the main body and will coordinate your entrance into the line. You will be entering at the end of the line before the rear convey central vehicles. The convey coordinator who will be working this entrance will be available to aid in any last minute problems that arise.

All entering contingents should coordinate their entrance with both the national and regional coordinators of VVAW. (see enclosed coordinators list) This information will be needed to effectively operate the convoy and avoid as much confusion as possible. We will also need the approximate number of vehicles which will be entering at each point.

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SUPPLIES TO BE CARRI IN EACH VEHICLE: THESE THE REQUIRED

1 gallon water; 2 gallons of gas; 2 quarts of oil; 1 good spare

tire; 1 flashlight; 1 extra set of batteries for flashlight;

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1 basic first aid kit (see attached instructions); salt tablets;

sleeping bags; 1 good jack; food, gas mask or alternative (see

attached instructions); TUKE-UP BEFORE LEAVING.

THE FOLLOWING ITEMS ARE HIGHLY RECOMMENDED: flares; extra water if traveling thru the desert; leather gloves; suntan lotion; and the following space parts for your car: gasket set, fan belt, spark plugs, points, condensor, rotor, and PCP valve.

RECOMMENDED HANDLING OF LOCAL PRESS RELATIONS:

Notify all local media of your group's participation in Operation Last Patrol. Have your local media mebilized to cover your entrance into the convoy. Towns which will not have entering contingents, but are along the convoy route should be notified of Operation Last Patrol. This could best be coordinated at a regional level.

The reasons for your groups participation in the Last Patrol should be stressed as much as possible. Why are we going to Miami? Why is our major focus the republican party? Why is VietNam still an issue with all the troop withdrawals? Why are unemployment, welfare rights, the wage freeze, racism, political repression, political prisoners, and sexism, also major points to focus on in Miami as we confront the imperialists? These conditions exist in all our communities. Local problems can clarify our educational programs to point out the inhuman conditions under which we are forced to live.

to protect from gas burns. Hear hard shoes, not sandals. helmet if you have one.

Do not wear earrings or neck chains, or anything around your neck. Do not wear contact lenses (if gas or mace gets trapped behind lenses eye burns or even blindness could result). Do not weak false teeth (if they are knocked out they can choke you). If you need to wear glasses secure then with a rubber band or strap.

FIRST AID REVIEW FOR TEAR GAS AND MACE VICTIMS

RUMOVE CONTACT LEBERS RESIDIATELY

You shouldn't be wearing them in the first place. If you are treatis someone wearing lenses and they can't remove them for some reason you can get them out by bolding the eye open with one hand and touching the lens gently with a Q-tip or finger.

FLUCH EYES AND ALL AFFECUED SKIN WITH WATER THIS WILL STING SO DE WARRED.

wash all affected skie uith mheelal oil follched mheedlacely by alco-Caution mineral oil will dissolve the gas but the gas will remain active and continue to burn the skin, until removed by the alcoholor by scap and water. Vascline should not be used. Alcohol should never be put into eyes.

FLUSA EYES WITH ECRIC ACID SOLUTION AND/OR COMMERCIAL EYE DROPS This will relieve some of the pain. Be sure that your eye drops are labeled "isotonic" as these are the safest, avoid drops containing & pilocarpine or epinophrine as they may be dangerous to some people. PREVENTION OF BURYING

There is a mixture that will inactivate the gas, it is very useful for anyone with sensitive skin or in general and is safe. 8 to 10 eggs, I cup water, and I tablespoon of baking soda. well and slather all over exposed skin. This can be stored in tightly closed plastic bottles for several days.

OTHER RENTURERS

Remove outer clothing as soon as you are going indoors to prevent contamination of indoor air by gas clinging to clothing. Gas and Macc will wash out of hair and clothing with soap and water. Hair should be washed as soon as possible if it has been exposed. several rare complications that can come of gas and for these it is best to have a trained medic or see one of the medics at the demonstration.

About 80 members of the group's national steering committee, representing 23 of 29 regions across the country, concluded a three day conference at Michael Community School, 1437 N. 24th St.

The six indicted veterans, all from the Southeastern US. were accused of plotting to riot at the Republican Con-Contion in Mismi Beach in August. One man was charged with manufacturing a fire bomn and demonstrating its use.

In a statement issued during a concluding session of the conference Monday, Michael McCain, 25, a national co-ordinator for the VVAW, said, "As war veterans, we are going to confront the warmakers.

"We will not be stopped because we are right. We have seen too many people die needlessly to stop our work now."

Alan Glick of Austin, Tex., another national co-ordinator who is also on the defense committee for the six, said that the indictments were more of a propaganda battle to discredit the VVAW.

"We've always been nonviolent. Anyway, who'd expect experienced veterans to go up against the police and state forces or the (Army) airborne with just alingshots."

A defense fund has been established to aid those indicted, No trail date has been set.

At this time the threat of violence by VVAW in Miami is minimal as most believe it would be counter-productive and is seen as the excuse President Nixon would need to come down hard on Vets. Combat Veterans are not likely to attack an armed 82nd Airborne with sticks and stones. There are rumors that the Zippies would like to join SDS in trashing all of Miamis. The VVAW stand is to prevent them from doing so if at all possible. Following Niami there will be a demonstration in either Cainesville or Tallahassee to protest the indictments and subpoenes.

The Zippies is an off-shoot militant faction of the Youth International Party (YIP).

YOUTH INTERNATIONAL PARTY

The YIP, also known as Yippies, is a loosely knit, anti-establishment, revolutionary youth organization formed in New York City in January, 1968.

At the convention, VVAN members appeared extremely paranoid and very concerned about their security, especially after the proceedings at Tallahassee. Several individuals speculated that if another such Grand Jury action occurred it would well wipe out the VVAN organization.



A source advised that the Revolutionary Youth Royment II (RYMII) faction of Students for a Democratic Society (SDS) held a national conference at Atlanta, Gregatifred November 25 to 30, 1969. At this conference is was decided to form a new organization to be known as Revolutionary Youth Novement (RYM), enaracterized as a mass enti-imperialist youth organization, said organization being proposed as separate and distinct in form and content from SDS. The "Principles of Unity" acopted by the conference included a struggle against white analogy and make suppression of youth; and support of the right of self-determination of all "oppressed nations," also support of the right of all oppressed and exploited peoples to armed self-defense. It was agreed that RYM would not be a Marxist-infinist organization; nowever, source said this was decided in order to indicate an organization broad enough in form to be acceptable to everyone. A remporary National Steering Committee (MSC) made up of eight females and two cales was elected to govern RYM until national officers could be elected during the Spring of 1970.

RYM publications have listed the RYM National Office (RO) at Post Office Box 77012 C, both Atlanta, Georgia, and a second source has advised that the NO has no office space but would probably be considered as located at Apartment 27, 1067 Alta Avenue, Northeast, Atlanta.

Second source advised that women dominated the founding conference and have continued to dominate the NSO meetings to the point that "women's liberation" has apparently become the RYM's principal issue - also the RYM's poor financial condition has resulted in its failure to publish a paper. During early 1970, RYM has decided to cater to the working class rather than youth, since the potential for social revolution lies in the workers.

A third source has stated that it was decided at the March 1970 NSC meeting that the KYM vomen had decided the organization will be molded into a working class. Marxist-Leninist, revolutionary, anti-imperialist, problack nationalist, people's vomen's liberation organization

The October 11, 1972, issue of the "College of Marin Times" newspaper published by students at the College of Marin (COM), Kentfield, California, carried an article on page four "Vietnam Veterans Against the War Organized at COM". This article indicates that a very small group of Vietnam Veterans in attendance at the college had formed a chapter of the national organization Vietnam Veterans Against the War (VVA) and that everyone was welcome to their meetings held every Thursday in the Harlan Center on the campus.

According to the article, the groups present concern is getting student interest and support and its main purpose is to end the war now, helping the P.O.W.s and ending unjustified bombing.

> VVAW is an anti-war organization organized in 1967 with headquarters in New York City. Its first published objective is "to demand an immediate cessation of fighting and the withdrawal of all American troops from Indochina".

This article also indicates that the VVAW is not only protesting the war, but is trying to aid Vietnam veterans in any way possible and last spring took amputee veterans in Letterman General Hospital, San Francisco, out for a days relaxation.

According to a spokesman for the group, the organization cares and wants to do something about it. Their spokesman stated that unfortunately some politicians have labeled the VVAW as "disloyal" but that this is difficult to believe since these men spent months fighting in the jungles. This spokesman

stated that while the veterans were in Vietnam, they were told they were stopping the spread of communism, but that in the U.S. communism is legal and the spokesman stated that it cannot be justified to kill people for something that is legal in ones own country.

This article indicated that on Veterans Day, October 24, 1972, different organizations would be at the Marin County Veterans Memorial Building honoring the dead of past wars with wreaths and the VVAN would be there with a wreath in memoriam for the men who died in the Vietnam War.

On October 19, 1972, a source in a position to know advised that the VVAW is an officially recognized college organization and has been assigned office space by the college on the campus. According to the source, this group was founded in the spring of 1972 and filed an official application for recognition by the college administration. The source advised this application listed the VVAWs purpose at coding the war into ongoing of films, bectures, rallies and generally informing the student body about the war.

The source advised that the only campus activities that the VVAW has participated in was an anti-war rally held on the college campus in May, 1972, at which several groups that are opposed to the war participated. He advised that the rally had been non-violent and that the VVAW had two speakers on the program who protested the war in Vietnam. He stated that the only other activity he could recall was a blood donor drive that the group had organized on the college campus.

The source advised that as far as the administration of the COM is concerned, the VVAW is regarded as a legitimate recognized group that has been furnished campus office space along with other recognized groups. He stated that the VVAW as presently constituted, is a non-violent group of veterans who are pursuing their aim of ending the war in Vietnam through legitimate and non-violent means.

On December 29, 1971, approximately 20 individuals representing the VVAW, the Peoples Coalition for Peace and Justice (PCPJ) and other anti-war oriented groups staged a demonstration in the main lobby of the Federal Building, Buffalo, New York. This demonstration lasted approximately 30 minutes. DAN AMIGONE, who was identified as President of the VVAW at Buffalo, made brief comments concerning the increase in taxes, the rise in unemployment and war casualties under the administration of President NIXON. Five of the participants were allowed to visit the office of Congressman JACK KEMP, which is located in the Federal Building. Following the demonstration, some of the participants distributed leaflets at the entrance to the Federal Building. Veterans clubs from five or six different colleges. Four members of the UBVC attended this meeting.

On April 21, 1972, a meeting of the VVAW and UBVC was held in Room 266, Norton Union, SUNYAB. The purpose of this meeting was to decide what actions should be taken by the VVAW to demonstrate their abhorrence of the war in Vietnam. The immediate topic of discussion was the demonstration which was to be held on April 25, 1972 at Niagara Square in Buffalo, New York, which was to be sponsored by PCPJ. Some discussion concerned actions to be taken after this demonstration. One of the people in attendance proposed a take over of the new Federal Building on West Huron Street with the specific aim of occupying the Selective Service rooms and the Armed Forces Entrance and Examination Center (AFEES). These two offices were targeted because it was felt that a disruption in these offices for even a few hours would seriously hamper the drafting and the induction into the military of young men by the military establishment. A. DONOHUL said that if this were done, it should be done in a military manner to demonstrate that the VVAW was a very organized military type organization.

It was decided by the group that they would take part in the demonstration on April 25, 1972 as an independent unit under the banner of the VVAW and would not make concrete proposals for action after the demonstration, rather to note the temper of the crowd during the demonstration and use this as a guide for their further action. They decided that if any acts of civil disobedience were carried out, all individual members of

the VVAW would take part in the group activities and would be bound by the will of the majority.

Some discussion concerned other future activities and demonstrations, specifically as to what activities should be contemplated for May 4, 1972, which is the anniversary of the Kent State riots and on Armed Forces Day in May, 1972. Certain targets of civil disobedience and demonstrations were selected, these being as follows:

- (1) The Naval Reserve Center on Porter Avenue in Buffalo, New York
- (2) The Niagara Falls Air Force Base, Niagara Falls, New York
- (3) Bell Aerospace, Niagara Falls, New York
- (4) The Sierra Research Plant near the Buffalo Airport

It was also decided that there are five levels of anti-war activity. These levels are as follows:

- (1) To do nothing
- (2) To leaflet
- (3) To march
- (4) Civil disobedience
- (5) Militant activities

The following individuals were observed at the meeting:

CAROL WYDRA, Vice President of the UBVC

She stated that she represented the PCPJ at the meeting and stated that the demonstration by the VVAW on April 25; 1972 should direct its aims to the same goals as those held by the PCPJ.

He said that anti-war activity should go up to the fourth level described above but that there should be no militant activities. It was his idea to occupy AFEES and the Selective Service Boards to disrupt induction.

He spoke out against civil disobedience and stated that they should not pass level three; however, he will be bound by the will of the majority.

Also present at the meeting was belongs to the VVAW and the UBVC, said that the UBVC and the VVAW must do something in Buffalo. He said that there has been criticism that they never do anything in Buffalo and that the VVAW in Buffalo was especially criticized during the time that the Statue of Liberty in New York City was occupied during a VVAW protest in New York. DONOHUE also said that it is very important that the UBVC continues to operate on the SUNYAB campus in the manner that it is presently doing. By this, he stated he meant that they must prevent fascist Veterans from joining the club and they must make sure that the UBVC, which is leftist oriented, must control all Veteran activities on the SUNYAB campus.

At the end of the meeting, a final resolution was made concerning the demonstration on April 25, 1972. This resolution had four parts:

(1) Get as many Veterans as possible to join in the demonstration and make sure that these Veterans all wear their uniforms and bring their discharge papers which they will pin on their uniforms during the demonstration to prove that they are Veterans. This was resolved to prevent non-Veterans from participating in the demonstration as Vietnam Veterans and to proclude charges by the Establishment that the VVAW does not consist of any Veterans.

Size, term, and responsibilities to be decided upon by the general membership in a regular or special meeting. Function of committees: Steering Committee: To insure and maintain communication between members, other organizations, the media, etc. To hold full decision making powers between regularly

- 2. To hold full decision making powers between regularly scheduled meetings and in the advent of situations requiring emergency or immediate action. All action taken, under any circumstances, will remain subject to final approval, amendment, or rejection by the general membership.
- To carry out activities and incurons of the organization in conjunction with other committees. To overses and provide guidance to all other committees.
- 4. Control of the expenditures shall rest solely with the Steering Committee, subject to revie; by the general membership.
- B. Editorial Committee:

To manage, edit, and publish Column Left.

 To manage, edit, and publish any other print media projects developed by the Steering Committee and the general membership.

C. Political Education (P.E.) Committee:

- l. To assist the Steering Committee and the general membership in developing and defining political and social goals for the use of the organization.
- 2. To research and develop mean of political education for use both within the organization and in reaching the community.

Selection and function of committee members:

A. Members of the Editorial and P.E. Committees and the two non-voting treasurers of the Steering Committee shall be elected for set terms by the general membership. Openings shall be filled with the intention of maintaining a balanced representation of all elements of the organization.

B. Rotating voting members of the Steering Committee shall be

replaced at he rate of two every third relaced by two new members elected from and by the general membership.

C. Three voting members of the Steering Committee constitute both a committee meeting quorum and a majority. All decisions must be passed by at least a majority. Any action taken by less than three members or by a 2-1 vote is invalid. Any action is subject to a revote by the general membership.

D. The two senior members will chair all mestings in the interval before their replacement. The next senior member of the Steering & Committee shall act as recording secretary. The last order of business of the last meeting the two senior members chair shall be the election of new Steering Committee members to replace them.

E. Upon the completion of a term on the Steering Committee, no member may be re-elected to it for the space of three methods months.

F. Members may serve a term on the Steering Committee while concurrently serving on another committee or as a treasurer. Members may not serve on the Editorial and P.E. Committees concurrently.

G. Any of the general membership may call for the recall (dismissal) of a member of any standing committee at any general meeting. The vote on such a recall will take place at the next general meeting and must be approved by a 2/3 majority of the members present.

Finances of the organization:

- A. Funds shall be raised by the direct assessment of \$6 monthly dues to be paid as the member pleases. This is a recommended figure and not mandatory. All members are asked to contribute to the extent that they can.
- B. Other means to be researched and developed by the Steerin Committee and the general membership.
- C. The treasurers shall maintain any necessary records and be fiplaced prepared to present a full finitial report to the general membership at any regular or special meeting.

Meetings:

- A. General mescings shall be held every two weeks at a specific time and place to be determined by the Steering Committee.
- B. Special meetings shall be called by the Steering Committee when a situation requires it.
- C. The Steering Committee is always responsible for notifying members of the meetings, whether general or special.

Amendments to the guidelines:

- A. Proposed amendments to these guidelines must be brought up one meeting prior to that in which they shall be voted upon
- B. A 2/3 majority of the members present is required to pass and proposed guideline amendments.

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



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

During the middle of October, 1972, a source advised that the Vietnam Veterans Against the War (VVAW) held a National Steering Committee meeting at Palo Alto, California, from September 29 through October 2, 1972. Approximately 75 people were in Palo Alto for this meeting but most of the working sessions were attended by 30 to 40 individuals. The source advised that the groups were divided into smaller working sessions who were then instructed to report on various problems which were taken up at the general meeting.)

This source stated that the recurrent theme throughout the meeting was an attempt to make VVAW an "anti-imperialist group" and a political organization rather than "just another group of war veterans". The source further stated that most of the speakers expressed themselves in a manner to indicate that VVAW was moving toward a "arxist oriented analysis of world problems. Source stated that there was little disagreement with VVAW leaders over their political stance but rather how VVAW should present itself to the American people. There was no question as to whether VVAW was Marxist oriented but questions did arise whether people outside VVAW should be aware of this fact.

The source stated that no agreement was reached concerning VVAW plans to participate in the inauguration activities at Washington, D.C. in 1973. Some of the regions represented, namely New Mexico and Ohio, had indicated that active plans have been made to participate in the Presidential inauguration festivities. Definite plans were not formulated at this time but there were indications it would be discussed at the next national meeting which would be held sometime in early January at Chicago, Illinois, at the IWW Hall.

There was a brief discussion as to what VVAW would do in the event of President NIXON's re-election and some of those present indicated that their chapter would go underground while others indicated they would become less political and still others indicated that they would disband completely.

Vietnam Veterans Against the War (VVAW) has publicly declared its objective is to demand the immediate cessation of all fighting in, and withdrawal of American troops from, Indo-China. The organization consists of Vietnam war veterans and a large percentage of anti-war activists who are not veterans.

PURPOSE OF WORKSHOP

We began in th worksop a process that has been sorely neglected. by the leadership of VVAW, i.e. a thorough and ongoing analysis of the organization and its problems. Only through a rigorous process of criticism and self-criticism can we expect to learn from our past accomplishments and mistakes and intergrate these lessons into the planning and continued development of the organization. This workshop ran some fifteen hours, yet in fact it only represents the smallest beginning in achieving this goal. An adequate discussion of VVAW's problems and politics obviously can't be completed in fifteen hours, we needed in fact, somewhere in the order of two weeks. The following are the reports of the various subcommittees. We hope these will be used as guidelines for organizational procedures and as a basis for continued analysis.

PURPOSE AND GOALS OF VVAN

we felt that a clarification or re-emphasis of what VVAW should be was a logical place to begin our analysis. To the overall end of struggling to build a new society, we felt VVAW had two primary roles:

L. To do anything and everything possible in helping the three peoples of Indochina to defeat the genocidal aggression of US imperialism. We clearly see a victory for the Indochinese people as being a wajor step in our own liberation.

2. To develop anti-imperialist consciousness among the American People through relevant programs of mass political education. We must correct the view that Vietnam was a mistake or abberation of US policy, but rather it must be seen as part of a conscious system dedicated to exploitation and suppression of all the peoples of the third world.

The organizing rationale of VVAW has three basic suppositions. First, that organizing as veterans we have created a group with a certain degree of political clout due to the image and credibility given to Vietnem veterans by the American public, (for a lot of wrong reasons!). Secondly, veterans as opposed to most of white America have a sense of group identity due to their common oppression by the military experience that lends itself to grouping together. for unified political action. Finally, veterans as one micro-group of American society have the potential for rapidly acheiving a much more developed political consciousness. As opposed to the wajority of "middle America" veterans have through their concrete experiences of war been first hand the criminality of US foreign policy and can more readily accept an understanding of the imerialistic nature of

Essential to any coverents effectiveness and survival is its ability to enlist and retain active membership. Without an increasing membership a tendency to stainate; financially, politically and in tellect-ually may evelop into unmanageable proportions. (must be)

This problem is inherent in the organization, dealt with on an individual, chapter and regional level. V.V.A.W. can only be as effective as its membership, which must continue to increase in order to serve the political and social needs of the organization itself and the society in which it functions.

The state of the s Problem III - Inadequate communication between individual members, chapters, regional, and national levels concerning V.V.E.W. activities, structure, and colicies, past, present and future.

Solution III - Reaffirmation of existing means of communication between chapter, regional, and National offices with funds set aside in the budget of each to insure publications of newsletters, fact sheets etc. between membership.

Problem Iv- Failure to communicate and relate to other political and ethnic groups on a local level.

Solution IV - Rap sessions familiarizing members withother political and ethnic groups within the community.

Problem V - Failure to recognize the need of increasing the membership on an individual level.

Solution V - Each chapter must accept the responsibility of increasing membership on an individual level by having Rap sessions to increase awareness and confidence of individual members to recruit.

Problem VI - Prospective members being turned off by the para-military, 'macho', and sexist attitudes of some individual members. Solution VI - Get rid of above mentioned attitudes through consciousness raising rapp sessions amongst ourselves, (vets) and others, (non- 🕅

Purpose of subcommittee.

We have stated (under the section, "Furpose and Goals of VVAW") that one of the primary roles of VVAW is the development of anti-imperialist consciousness. When dealine with the implementation of this goal the problem of political education and its relation to programs has come to be replized as both the principle problem and main component of that goal.

How do we deal with the establishment of programs? We find that first we must ask how do we conceive of political education in relation to the development of anti-imperialist consciousness. Political education is the first priority. It is the framework in which all our

activities should be structured.

How do we go about the process of political education? What is its

relation to programs?

The first step will have to be to demonstrate to our chapters the importance of conscious raising programs. What follows is, in outline form, a model for dealing with this process:

1) In the community:

- An analysis of the human needs of members of the community. through research.
- Conception of and proposing of specfic programs that respond to each speciic need. We have defined two types of prgrams, called, for lack of a better term: Survival programs : Information programs
- Choice and Selection. This will be MENN done on the basis of the following criteria: 1) Worksbility (eg., no matter how beautiful or how necessary, it has to be possible.)
 - 2) Most important; the determining criterion: Its potential for effective Political Education.
 - 3) (This one would be used to determine be tween two equal programs) Potential for bringing in new members.
- 4) In depth working out of implementation. The mechanics of the program.
- 5) Implementation.

Preamble

One of the major (if not the most important) breakdowns in VVAN has been the lack of communication on all levels, from member to national. In the past at both state meetings and national meetings the problem has been discussed, recommendations have been made, proposals accepted. At both the state level and national level these proposals have been given lip service and have never been

If one would ask what the problem for ineffective programs, lack put into practice. of interest of the membership and lack of organizational direction were, the response would be "lack of direction."

The time has come for us to begin to put into practice an effective communications system. It is the sense of this workshop that we strongly condern ourselves for not having the organizational discipline to accomplish this most vital necessity. The following are recommendations to be (hopefully) put into effect.

I. Regional Communications:

A. From the Regional Office-

- 1. Bi-weekly newsletter to chapters to include regional and national news. ...
- 2. Personal contact by phone at least once a month with chapters
- 3. Physical presence at chapter meetings at least once every six months.

From Chapters

1. Bi-weekly letter to regional office

- 3. Chapter representative present at regional office at lesst once every three months
- 4. Mailings sent to chapter membership and other

III Social Communications and Alienation:

Lonliness is not something to be accepted - it is a problem of our society, just as are sexism, racism, etc. Many vets and others have accustomed themselves to being alone, but we must work away from this. It's hard for some people to co up to others who seem to feel left out. Those who can, should.

Most contact made at all levels of VVAW has been on an organizational basis. It is recommended that social contact be a prime means of building organizational unity and communications

A. Chapter and Regional Level: parties, picnics, after

meeting rap sessions, campouts.

B. National Level: parties, workshops (it is easier to smaller groups at first), living on the same piece of land (spend relaxation time together).

To us, there doesn't seem to be a way to relate to parenoia from the man and the responses to it except by being up-front and honest.

Final Comment:

The key ingredient to effective communication in this organization is discipline. Without discipline the whole idea of communication in a national organization is senseless. Without discipline the whole idea of "the struggle" is rediculous. Without discipline there is no struggle -- without the struggle there is no hope.

FINANCE - Due to the complexity and importance of this problem the IPP committee recommends that this subject be dealt with in its own workshop to allow it to receive the attention it needs and deserves.

Thoughts on the future of VVAW-Brian Adams

VVAW is not to be viewed as an ongoing political organization as, an end in itself. It is not and should not be seen as a vanguard revolutionary party. Rather VVAW is or should be, a "transitional" organization that has the primary role of developing its members political consciousness, while building solidarity with the Indochinese people and with all peoples engaged in the struggle for liberation and self-determination. Secondly, VVAW should continue to be politically oriented as a non-sectarian organization. It must continue to represent a general or basic body of political concensus that would define an anti-imperialist position. This position might normally develop directly from the ten objectives. Membership requirements should allow for a variety of political opinion with the only requirement being that all members must fully accept those basic principles defining the organization. VVAW cannot advocate a hard sectarian line. This would limit its potential for a mass base and would thus make it impossible for it to accomplish its basic objective of political education.

BEST COPY AVAILABLE

A discussion took place concerning the McGovern candidacy and how VVAW would reinte to McGovern. The general consensus was we should not endorse McGovern but rather that VVAW adopt a campaign to attack Nixon, on all the issues for which has responsible; continuation of the war, continuing repression at home, manipulation of the economy to braefit a few, etc. Therefore, we have the following proposals:

1- That VVAW organize an anti-Nixon campaign between now and election day and to explore all possibilities of working as an independent organization with all existing programs to that objective. The focus of VV4W will center around the Seven Points, the war economy, repression of political prisoners and veterans benefits and services.

That all VVAW rehions will implement whatever programs that are appropriate to their respective areas. (The New York proposal is suggested as an excellent guide around which to base an anti-Nixon campaign.)

2- That VVAW organize specific actions in all the regions for Veterans Day, Ocober 23rd. That these actions be keyed to all the points of the anti-Nixon theme as mentioned in point 1, above.

3- That VVAW nationally endorse the efforts and sims of the Indochina peace campaign and encourage individual members, local chapters, and regions to work with them.

4- That VVAW endorse and participate in the October 14 demonstrations that have been scheduled in San Francisco, L.A., Chicago and New York.

5- That VVAW locally regionally and nationally challenge the paper veteran organizations that have endorsed Nixon (Vets for a Just Peace and Concerned Veterans for Nixon), and demand that they materialize and debate with us in whatever form is available.

There are two central themes that run through the IPC campaign, the October 14 anti-imperialist actions, and VVAW's anti-Nixon campaign.

These two central themes are: 1- support for the seven points and 2- evict Nixon. We wish to make it clear that in the event that all the should win the election that it is still VVAW's role to continue to educate not only its own membership but as many people as possible, as to the nature of the Vietnamese steuggle and the tactics and policies of the Wixon admirstration.

In the case of VVAW this must also include the realization that fower and fewer veterans of Victnam will be returning with the US military's continuing shift to technilogical warfare and the use of comprador puppet regimes. When the war in Indochina actually ends much of the rationale for a purely veterans or anization is negated. We do not intend to glorify in anyway the status of being a veteran, justify our participation in the US military or create chauvinistic, elitist notions of veterans being the vanguard of the American revolution. We do realize however, that there will be a continuing need for a veterans organization. Veteran service programs should and will continue. Similarly, the sense of group identity particular to veterans is a valid basis for organizing groups for political action. At the same time we see the need for VVAW of being part of an organization open to all people, whether they are vets or not, who are commonly dedicated to the struggle of building a new society. An organization of Winter Soldies could conceiveably be created that would be open to all people who are in spirit and in action truly consistent with the goals that we are struggling for. VVAW would be but a part of this organization, not the chauvinistic counterpart to a VVAW women's auxiliary or a VVAW non-veterans sxxx auxiliary. This concept of such an all more encompassing organization would permit VVAW to grow and respond to the need of becoming an evermore sophisticated and relevant organization for realizing and accomplishing major social change.

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





Many times two of these six-pound cartons are taped together as in this case because United Parcel Service charges less for one individual 12-pound package than for two individual six-pound packages. United Parcel Service does not put any

markings on the cartons, however, the Saunders Archery Company does put a United Parcel Service (108) identification number. 6=33-969, which is used to bill Saunders Archery Company approximately every two weeks

that the two empty cartons are as nearly as exact as they can recall except neither is sure of whether the printed address label was put on the six-pound package or one of the two 12-pound packages.

Inasmuch as the two 12-pound packages would have been identical, Omaha is only furnishing one empty 12-pound carton.

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Company, Columbus, Mebraska, explained that the Saunders model WR2 Wrist Rocket is sold in a yellow and red card-board carton which measures 7 3/8" in length, 4½" in height and 4 3/8" in depth. The outside of this carton displays a picture of the wrist rocket, advertises its 225 yard range and on one side displays a hunter aiming a wrist rocket at a rabbit.

Twelve of the WR2 Wrist Rocket cartons are packed into a heavier cardboard shipping carton which measures 13 5/4" tall, 15 3/8" long and 9½" deep. Both ends of the carton that open display the name Saunders with the words "Contains 12 Wrist Rockets Catalog-WR2" in red. This carton containing 12 wrist rockets weighs 6 pounds.

Rockets for the wang Dang Doodle, Gainesville, Florida, and according to company records, they were shipped on June 28, 1972. Stated in order to ship 60 WR2s there would be six cartons of 12 rockets each; however, the cartons are shipped by United Parcel Service (UPS) and by taping two 6 pound cartons together the cost was \$2.30 for a 12 pound package which contains 24 rockets, the cost is \$1.40 for a single 6 pound carton containing 12 rockets. By taping two 6 pound cartons together the Saunders Company saves money. Stated that there were actually three packages sent to Wang Dang Doodle, one 6 pound cartons taped together.
