To whom it should concern:

On Monday night, 8 April, we were informed by [redacted] that the members of [redacted] were not welcome at the national meeting. Among the charges that were made were that "immature" letters had been sent by our chapter members and that [redacted] had told the members what to write. These charges are obviously contradictory, for [redacted] surely is not immature, and even those who might have a personal vendetta against him would not make such a ridiculous charge. Furthermore, I resent the implication that I am incapable of thinking or writing for myself. [redacted]

[redacted] writing memos and letters to stupid people who are unable to see the egg on their faces, I definitely am able to compose my own thoughts into a letter. Perhaps you found the language used by some of our sisters and brothers insulting--I am surprised to learn that there are still some words that can shock the virgin ears of Viet Nam veterans--for if words can shock you, why not the acts which were described by the words?

The problems still exist; not hearing them will not make them disappear. Florida region is falling apart, due primarily to the ego-tripping Miami chapter. Members from that chapter insult their comrades, they remove articles that do not belong to them from offices not their own, and they will not work together with others. [redacted] chapter works hard on all sorts of projects, from prison reform to fund-raising concerts, from demonstrations to lobbying for passage of legislative bills for veterans benefits; yet no other chapters are informed about our efforts, although we always send you a newsletter describing what we are doing. Apparently the national VVAW does not have any representatives to whom it is a concern--but it still should concern you. Rather than paying attention to the facts and charges in the letters which you received from [redacted] chapter, rather than facing these charges on the floor of the national meeting, you prefer to hide behind a false façade of shock at some words and refuse to allow us to be heard.

I assure you, that as dynamic and competent a leader [redacted] is, he cannot make me write anything I do not want to, he cannot make me write anything I do not believe--indeed, he cannot make me write anything--and he wouldn't try! I don't know how my brothers and sisters in Tampa feel about what you have said, but for myself, I know you owe both me and [redacted] an apology. If you really do give a damn, I expect to get one from you.

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REPORT for MARCH, 1974, FROM the TAMPA CHAPTER, VVAW

SPECIAL ACTIONS

- 1.. Demonstration against Vice-President Ford at Plant Park, Tampa, on 3/8/74.

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About 200 people, including representatives from the United Farmworkers, Red Star, BACON, Tampa Women's Center, [redacted] and his group, ISG, and VVAW marched from 7PM to 10PM. All demonstrators were thrown out of Plant Park, and had to take to the sidewalks, where the signs we carried urging "Honk, if you want to impeach Nixon" got a good response from the spectators. At least 40% of the demonstrators were members of Tampa Chapter of VVAW.

News coverage was favorable, as the sample article enclosed with this report indicates.

2. Veterans' Rally in Tallahassee

Representatives from 22 Veterans' organisations in Florida gathered in Tallahassee on March 29 and 30, and were disappointed that the delegations of State Representatives who promised to meet with them failed to show.

The Veterans' representatives voted that if our letters and petitions alone are not effective in causing our bills to be passed, then a Mass Demonstration will occur in the latter part of April, when from 500 to 10000 people will take over the steps of the State Capitol, stage a sit-down, and remain there until we get favorable action.

We had a talk with Milwaukee, Wisconsin, and demand the right to be heard at the National Assembly of VVAW in order to discuss the Florida problem. At National's request, a copy of this report will be sent to Wisconsin. We are also enclosing handwritten letters from some members of the Tampa Chapter who want to express their opinions to the National VVAW. Pictures taken at our demonstrations are also included.

PRISON REFORM BILLS

1. We are still working on the Prison Project, corresponding with, and visiting inmates.

As for the bills on Prison Reform in Tallahassee, part of our proposed bill has been approved, and we are now working for passage of the other portions. Continued pressure on the legislators must be kept up, because if the bills aren't passed this session, they may be thrown out. Therefore we are calling for massive demonstrations to improve the probability of passing the Prison Reform Bills during this session.

2. We received your newsletter, and once again we found no word at all about Tampa Chapter in the letter. This blackout of news about our events is unfair to the members of Tampa Chapter who consider it an indication that the National Organisation doesn't want to work with Tampa VVAM. If their impression is correct, don't be a "two-faced politician"--Tell us so, and we'll take it from there.

Taking and printing the photos we send you are expensive. Making reports take time, and we believe it is unfair that our activities are not publicized among other regions. Our members are still loyal to National, but they're growing tired of being ignored and treated like unwelcome relatives.


That's laying it on the line like it is. It's not only unfair to Tampa members, but it's unfair to other regions and chapters who might support our efforts if they were aware of what we're doing here.

No matter what you decide about working with us, Tampa Chapter is alive and well, and growing--and won't play dead if you don't support us.

Since we opened our new headquarters, at each of the four monthly meetings we sign up at least 1 or 2 new members. We have more than 70 active members in the Tampa Chapter now.

As you know the 1974 Florida Legislative Session is upon us. During the past week (March 18-22) of legislative committee meetings at the capital, [redacted] and I were in attendance and testified for several student-related bills. After the many meetings and conversations, it is quite apparent that the people at the capital are receptive towards our ideas, problems, and plans.

If we let our voices be heard on "Capital Hill" and develop the right strategy, we will definitely affect the direction of various student-related legislation. I mention "student-related", because this will be the key to effective lobbying. It will be this focus of attention and devotion to detail that will win us the respect of the legislators. It is this type of lobbying clout that enabled the University of California Student Lobby to have influenced the appropriation of over \$8,000,000 for students, i.e. obtaining a \$1,000,000 fund to evaluate and up-grade undergraduate courses and teachers, and securing \$1.6 million in additional student financial aid for the 1972-73 year and \$2.5 million for 1973-74.

Therefore, in order to more efficiently carry-out our goals of lobbying, there will be a FSU Lobbying Workshop held April 4, Thursday, at 10:30 a.m., and at 3:30 p.m. of the same day. It was decided to have two workshops, so hopefully everyone could attend. If anyone has any problems please call me.

Dear Brothers:

It had been our intention and desire for a delegation of members from Tampa Chapter of VVAW to attend the NSCM at Milwaukee, Wisconsin on April 15, 1974, in order to bring to the floor the problems existing between the chapters and regions in the State of Florida, and to explain to the entire membership of VVAW why Tampa Chapter will not work with the regions of Florida.

The right to bring this question into the open before all the members was denied to us because we are not a part of the regional. I feel certain that our problems are not restricted to Florida alone. The same problems exist throughout the United States.

These problems, I am certain, are hurting VVAW on a national as well as chapter level. These problems will have to be resolved if we intend to continue as a viable and growing organization. The only way to resolve them is to bring them before the entire membership for open discussion and resolution in a democratic way.

Even in the crooked society in which we live, and even in our crooked courts, a person is permitted to present his side of the story and to defend himself in an open forum before he is found guilty. If VVAW doesn't allow us to do this, they are no better than the government which serves and benefits not the majority of the people, but rather a handful of chosen individuals.

We, as brothers and sisters, must always keep our minds open for mutual understanding. That IS what makes us brothers and sisters!

We are, therefore, sending you a copy of the packet we mailed to Milwaukee and to National. We intended to present this information at the meeting, but since we were not permitted to attend as a delegation, we are mailing the material to you, instead.

If any further information is desired, or if you have any questions, please feel free to contact us by mail, and we'll answer all your questions. We are guilty of nothing. We have nothing to hide. Only one who has something to hide refuses to hear both sides of the story lest his own guilt be uncovered. We're ready to tell our side as soon as we are given the chance. Therefore, from now on, we shall send our monthly Newsletter not only to National, but to you as well.

ROUND ROBIN REPORT TAMPA CHAPTER VVAW
In January 1974, we had the official opening of the VVAW headquarters.

Bluegrass Festival at USF 2/22/74, about 1800 attended. sold tickets at \$1 and \$1.50 to pay expenses. Put together so well, and went off so smoothly, that school requested another, which will be held 5/12/74.

In Feb. began working with several other groups to help organize BACON, a group to impeach Nixon.

3/8/74, VP Ford spoke at University of Tampa. We had about 200 people picketing his appearance--40% of those were VVAW members. Others demonstrating included United Farmworkers, BACON, [redacted] and the Socialist African party, and Red Star.

Mid-March we distributed leaflets on all Tampa campuses to bring Veterans to a gripe session at USF. Hearing complaints were representatives from Congressman Sam Gibbons, [redacted]

Senator Lawton Chiles asked Congressman Gibbons to send him a report about the outcome of the meeting. As a result of the meeting, we were able to prevent USF from cancelling registration of 7 Veterans who hadn't received checks from the government. Now, if a Veteran's check is delayed, we have the means to get him the check in from 5 to 7 days. Sam Gibbons' office will receive and investigate all complaints, and solve their problems. This session was in preparation for the big meeting in Tallahassee with State Representatives.

3/29 and 3/30/74 a group of VVAW joined with 22 other Florida delegations. We had a meeting scheduled with State representatives who didn't show up. Two Bills benefitting veterans, for which we are lobbying, will entitle a Vietnam veteran to four years free schooling in the state of Florida.

We are now gathering signatures on a petition which we'll present to the House of Representatives in Tallahassee on 4/26/74. On that day, we'll march from FSU to the Capitol steps. This demonstration will be put on by Tampa Chapter VVAW supported by other groups. Committee for Veterans' Benefits working on this project now.

We've been working on a prison reform project for 8 or 9 months. We have been visiting inmates, putting out press releases in newspapers and other media, describing bad conditions in prisons. We had a Bill on the floor of the House of Representatives, supported by Don Tuckey. 70% of the Bill was passed. We are continuing to work for prison reform.

On 5/12/74 there will be another Bluegrass concert. We expect about 4000 people to attend.

On 5/4/74 we're scheduled to go to Washington, DC for May Day. On July 1 or 4 we'll go to Washington again with VVAW.

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
