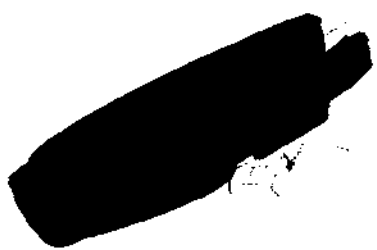

On November 7, 1968, source furnished a xeroxed copy of a letter from G. James Boggio, identified as co-ordinator of Vietnam Veterans Against The War, addressed to one [redacted] (last name unknown), dated October 27, 1968. The letter is set forth verbatim as follows:

"October 27, 1968

67C

"Dear [redacted] USA

"Long overdue, I am hoping that this letter will entice you to join with me in revolution. Having served (or wasted) the past year as co-ordinator for Vietnam Veterans Against The War - and after having participated in the Chicago Uprisings - it occurred to many of us yippiescommiesfaggotspeaceniks that the times they are a-changin'.

When I bellow for revolution I'm merely suggesting that our dear ol' Vietnam Vets group revigorate, degenerate, scramble and mutilate its archaic format of the past (i.e., holding stuffy little meetings in stuffy little rooms)...and that we begin right now to do our thing where it's at!

So, -----, here's my proposition: We're goin' to call a meetin' of all you former mercenaries (and active-duty GI's) to be held on Sunday, November 3rd at Bojave's...a groovy tavern at 8409 Santa Monica Boulevard (near La Cienega).

That's right - Vietnam Veterans Against the War is goin' to have what I call "a caucus of fun." None of them senile World War I vets at this meeting, nosirree!

Now, when I (or one of my associates) calls you on the telly to find out if you're comin' to the meeting, please don't give us any ----. We've got lotsa things to discuss...and we need you.

As you may recall, our Vietnam Vets group has maintained an alliance with the moribund Vets For Peace. They were never our buddies...they're our ancestors! They're well-meaning but rather dry veterans of bow-n-arrow wars...individuals who have impeded the growth and progress of Vietnam Veterans Against The War. Those of you who have attended our meetings will attest, I'm quite sure, to the Churchill-like candor of this flag-waving ----- I call for revolt!

On the afternoon of Sunday, November 3rd, at 2 p.m., amidst the foam of ale, I plan to propose that Vietnam Veterans Against The War, having overgrown its past glories, be remodeled and renamed: GI's And Vietnam Veterans Against The War...that new officers be elected...that new life be selected, and that it sever its relationship with Vets For Peace.

Dammit, I know that you're sick 'n tired of rapping about the war in Vietnam - and so am I! Nevertheless, 30,000 of our buddies have been killed and an estimated 1,000,000 Vietnamese have been killed - and for what!

Let's begin to do something about this ridiculous war. We specifically ask for your help in assisting us to formulate a revolution within the peace movement. Will you come to our meeting?

PROPOSED OFFICERS FOR GI'S AND
VIETNAM VETERANS AGAINST THE WAR

CO-ORDINATORS: Two co-ordinators shall be elected from within the membership of Vietnam Veterans and servicemen... who shall serve jointly for a six month period, subject to re-election. The function of the co-ordinators is to chair all membership meetings and to maintain the responsibility of implementing all decisions of the general membership. The co-ordinators will have no authority to act without consensus.

SECRETARY: The office of the secretary will consist of the secretary and his/her working committee of GI's, Vietnam Veterans and supporters. The position entails the maintaining of records and supplies. The secretary shall serve as a non-voting member of the organization...and shall be elected to this office for a six month period, subject to re-election.

FINANCIAL CHAIRMAN: Working with the Secretary, the financial chairman shall oversee the treasury and shall be responsible for maintaining financial records. This office shall be held for six months by one individual, subject to re-election.

FUND-RAISING CHAIRMAN: The development of ideas for enlisting sufficient working funds for the maintenance of group activities shall be directed by the fund-raising chairman. This position places emphasis on rapport with our supporters. This office shall be held for six months by one individual, subject to re-election.

DIRECTOR OF PUBLIC RELATIONS: Emphasizing organization publicity on both a national and local level, this position should focus attention on the news media and the general public. The Director of Public Relations should function in close association with the elected co-ordinators in developing understanding and recognition by the public of the activities, objectives, and demands of GI's And Vietnam Veterans Against The War. This office shall be held for six months by one individual, subject to re-election.

GI ADVISOR: This individual shall be appointed by the elected co-ordinators for an unspecified period of time...from within the ranks of those members currently serving on active duty in the Armed Forces of the United States. The responsibility of the GI advisor shall be to counsel the co-ordinators on military regulations...and to feed the organization with accurate and up-to-date information and analysis of the fluctuating and arbitrary decisions of military authorities. The vacating of office and reappointment of a succeeding GI Advisor shall occur at (1) the request of the current office-holder, (2) the office-holder's discharge from active duty, (3) the discretion of the elected co-ordinators.

BRIDGE-BUILDER: The office of the Bridge-Builder shall be to link the needs and aspirations of GI's with the resources of our group...so that the common anti-war sentiment of both GI's and civilians can be unified. This position entails close association with the Secretary in correspondence with active-duty servicemen... and the assisting of our buddies who are still in the war-zone. This office shall be held for six months by one individual, subject to re-election.

POLICY PROPOSALS FOR GI's AND VIETNAM VETERANS AGAINST THE WAR

1. that Vietnam Veterans Against The War disassociate itself from Veterans For Peace In Vietnam...and change its name to GI's And Vietnam Veterans Against The War.
2. that the membership of active-duty personnel be considered Confidential...and that neither the names of individual GI's nor the number of GI's in our membership be disclosed outside our body.
3. that full membership shall be limited to all current active-duty servicemen, to personnel within the active reserves, and to veterans of the Armed Forces of the United States who have acquired the Vietnam Service Medal for participation in that war. Limited as aforementioned, the type of discharge received by membership applicants can be of no concern to GI's And Vietnam Veterans Against The War.
4. that open meetings be adhered to in order that we insure a maximum amount of rhetoric on major issues concerning the war in Vietnam. Supporters of GI's And Vietnam Veterans Against The War shall be encouraged to take part in discussion and to assist the membership in formulating decisions...although the presentation of motions and voting shall be limited to the membership.
5. that attendance of ten members at a meeting will constitute a quorum...in which all issues and policy shall be decided by popular vote. In the absence of a legal quorum at any meeting, the co-ordinators shall have the authority to render decisions on the basis of a general consensus of those members in attendance."

Source 2 advised that Boggio attended the Democratic National Convention in Chicago, Illinois, during August, 1968, with representatives of the Dow Action Committee (DAC) where he participated in demonstrations in that city. He returned to Los Angeles, California, and appeared at an open meeting of the Socialist Workers Party (SWP) where he told of his experiences in Chicago.

The SWP has been designated by the Attorney General of the United States pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

The DAC is described in its literature as an organization opposed to the war in Vietnam, with the specific aim of educating the public to the horrors of napalm, herbicides, etc., and to promote a widespread boycott of all Dow Chemical products.

On December 23, 1968, source 1 furnished a copy of a leaflet which advertised a Christmas party sponsored by the above organization. The contents of this leaflet are set forth as follows:

"GI Christmas Freakout

"by GI's and Vietnam Veterans Against the War

"Do not eat your Christmas dinner in a mess hall!

"Celebrating the holidays at the base or on the ship is a real drag - unless you're a real lifer! Christmas at Pendleton, Fort Ord, El Toro, etc. just ain't no Christmas.

"So we're inviting all servicemen to a GI party on Saturday, December 21. Free beer! Free feast! Rockband! Lots of girls!

"Bring a date...or come see what we've got. Coeds from... Los Angeles City College, UCLA, The University of Southern California, Santa Monica City College, Cal State College, Valley State College, etc., etc., etc.

"The vibrating sounds of the Euclid Avenue Express.

GI's and Vietnam Veterans Against the War invites the short-timers of America...to our Christmas party. Will you come?

"GI's and Vietnam Veterans Against the War was founded on November 3, 1968, at a bull-session -- held at Bojave's Tavern in West Hollywood. The organization, comprised of survivors of the Vietnam war, of active duty servicemen and reservists...is designed to assist GIs and to create a basis for an improvement

in GI-civilian relations.

Our Christmas party will be held at a secluded seaside residence...and transportation will be provided from the central LA area. GIs who wish to attend...please muster at 619 South Bonnie Brae (2 blocks east of Alvarado, between Wilshire Blvd. and 6th Street.)"

619 South Bonnie Brae, Los Angeles, California, is the location for the Los Angeles Headquarters of the Peace and Freedom Party (PFP) and other anti-war groups.

The Peace and Freedom Party is a legally constituted political party in the state of California.

"We support our men in Vietnam; not those who send them there"

On December 24, 1968, source 2 advised that he attended a party sponsored by "GI's and Vietnam Veterans Against the War" held on December 21, 1968. This party was held at the residence of [REDACTED] California.

On August 8, 1968, source 3 advised that [REDACTED] is the Los Angeles [REDACTED] for the Peace and Freedom Party. b7c

On January 2, 1968, source 4 advised that [REDACTED] was [REDACTED] a meeting of the Peace and Freedom Party held on December 22, 1967 in Los Angeles, California.

Source 2 further advised that there were approximately fifty to sixty people in attendance at this party, including about twenty-five active duty GI's.

This source also stated that a [REDACTED] (last name unknown) and a [REDACTED] (last name unknown) were in attendance. The source stated that [REDACTED] is from Louisiana and has sixteen more months to serve. [REDACTED] is from Merced, California, and both [REDACTED] were from the Navy vessel U. S. S. Piedmont. b7c

Source 2 also stated that a [REDACTED] (last name unknown) and a [REDACTED] (last name unknown) from the U. S. S. Floyd County also attended. 67c

The source further advised that a [REDACTED] originally from Arizona, but currently stationed at Camp Pendleton, California, attended the party, and was accompanied by five other marines. The source advised that it was assumed that the other five marines were also from Camp Pendleton, but could not further identify them.

Source stated that most of the active duty GI's who attended the party did so for the free liquor and the promise of girls being present. Source advised that out of the active duty GI's present, only about one-third were actually against the war. This source stated that he returned to 619 South Bonnie Brae St., Los Angeles, with some of the active duty GI's, and they expressed dissatisfaction with the party.

Re Los Angeles airtel and LHM to Bureau dated 10/4/68 under VIDEM caption; and Los Angeles teletype to Bureau under VIDEM caption dated 11/10/68, which concerned VIDEM activity in Los Angeles on 11/10/68, sponsored by captioned organizations.

As referenced LHM set forth, captioned organizations are both local in nature, small in size, and are not known to be infiltrated by subversive individuals. The purpose of each organization is as the name implies. Inasmuch as Los Angeles has no information indicating captioned organizations are anything other than legitimate peace organizations, UACB, no additional investigations are being conducted.

Recently Los Angeles received information indicating that a faction of the Vietnam Veterans Against the War in Vietnam has decided that Veterans for Peace in Vietnam, with which it has been closely associated, is too conservative. Plans are to change the name of Vietnam Veterans Against the War in Vietnam to GI's and Vietnam Veterans Against the War; and to sever its relationship with Veterans for Peace in Vietnam.



Speakers and lecturers at the church frequently espouse Communist causes or follow the Communist Party line. Communist front group literature is distributed at the church. The church is used by some Communist Party members for "mass concentration" work.

This same infiltration extends to adjuncts of the church such as the Unitarian Public Forum and the Fellowship for Social Justice, formerly known as the Unitarian-Universalist Fellowship for Social Justice.

STEPHEN H. FRITCHMAN has been minister of the church since 1948.

Reverend STEPHEN H. FRITCHMAN is described in the Fourth Report, Un-American Activities Committee in California, 1948, Page 115, as a very active "Communist fronter" and connected with numerous "Communist front organizations and activities".

Membership in the First Unitarian Church does not, of itself, connote membership in or sympathy with the Communist Party.

GI's and Vietnam Veterans Against the War is described in its literature as having been founded on November 3, 1968 in the Los Angeles area and as being comprised of survivors of the Vietnam War, of active duty servicemen, and reservists. Its initial circular, disseminated in the Los Angeles area, stated "let's begin to do something about this ridiculous war. We specifically ask for your help in assisting us to formulate a revolution within the peace movement."

On February 3, 1969, a Los Angeles source advised that the above organization held a meeting during the afternoon of February 2, 1969 at 743 1/2 South Alvarado Street, Los Angeles, California. This source stated that James Boggio, the founder and leader of captioned organization in the Los Angeles area, made the announcement that leaflets will be distributed at Camp Pendleton, a United States Marine Corps Base located in Southern California. Boggio announced that this leafletting will occur during the evening of February 5, 1969. This source further stated that Boggio requested anyone interested in helping leaflet Camp Pendleton to sign their names on a sheet of paper. Source observed three names on this "sign-up" sheet, but the source was unable to obtain these names or furnish any further descriptive data.

743 1/2 South Alvarado Street, Los Angeles, California is currently the headquarters and meeting place of captioned organization.

YOUNG SOCIALIST ALLIANCE (LAB-YSA)

At a meeting of the LAB-YSA on October 31, 1968, at 1702 East Fourth Street, Los Angeles, California, the main topic of discussion was infiltration of a new organization known as GIVVAW. YSA members were instructed to attend the first meeting of GIVVAW on November 3, 1968, for the purpose of making suggestions and helping build up GIVVAW.

Source stated that the announcement was made that YSA members should instill the GIVVAW with fresh ideas, but that this should be done in a very inconspicuous manner. Instructions were to avoid raising suspicion that the GIVVAW was being taken over by the LAB-YSA.

Source advised that a LAB-YSA letter to its members, dated November 21, 1968, announced that GIVVAW will be leafletting in the vicinity of the Greyhound Bus Terminal, Los Angeles, during the coming weekend. LAB-YSA members were urged to help the GIVVAW.

At a meeting of the LAL-SWP held on December 10, 1968, at 1702 East Fourth Street, Los Angeles, California, the announcement was made that the GIVVAW was planning to set up an office and coffee house in Los Angeles.

[REDACTED] (1/10/69)

At a meeting of the LAL-SWP on January 7, 1969, at 1702 East Fourth Street, Los Angeles, California, the announcement was made that the GIVVAW wants to organize a peace demonstration in Los Angeles on April 6, 1969, to coincide with demonstrations in other cities. Members of both the GIVVAW and the LAL-SWP were to try to persuade the Peace Action Council (PAC) (see appendix) to participate in and help plan a demonstration on that date.

[REDACTED] (1/20/69)

An LAB-YSA letter to its members, dated January 15, 1969, contained an article stating that at the last meeting of the PAC Executive Committee, it was agreed that the PAC would support the April 6, 1969, peace demonstration sponsored by GIVVAW. The article continued by stating that at tonight's LAB-YSA meeting, we will find out exactly what this means. We want PAC to co-sponsor the April 6, 1969, action.

The letter also announced that the LAB-YSA will continue helping GIVVAW by further leafletting at the Greyhound Bus Depot in Los Angeles.

A source advised on May 8, 1968, that the premises of the First Unitarian Church of Los Angeles, 2936 West 8th Street, Los Angeles, California, have been utilized for meetings by Communist Party members and sympathizers over a period of years. Speakers and lecturers at the church frequently espouse Communist causes or follow the Communist Party line. Communist front group literature is distributed at the church. The church is used by some Communist Party members for "mass concentration" work.

This same infiltration extends to adjuncts of the church such as the Unitarian Public Forum and the Fellowship for Social Justice, formerly known as the Unitarian-Universalist Fellowship for Social Justice.

STEPHEN H. FRITCHMAN has been minister of the church since 1948.

Reverend STEPHEN H. FRITCHMAN is described in the Fourth Report, Un-American Activities Committee in California, 1948, Page 115, as a very active "Communist fronter" and connected with numerous "Communist front organizations and activities".

Membership in the First Unitarian Church does not, of itself, connote membership in or sympathy with the Communist Party.

PEACE ACTION COUNCIL

The "People's World", a weekly west coast communist newspaper, in its issue of November 5, 1966, in an article on Page 3, describes the Peace Action Council (PAC) as, "a coordinating agency for peace activists" which conducts emergency mobilizations and demonstrative actions against the war in Vietnam.

On July 22, 1966, a source reported that the PAC, which has also been known as the Greater Los Angeles Peace Action Council (GLAPAC), was formed during the early summer of 1966, for the express purpose of protesting the war in Vietnam during the National Governors' Conference held in Los Angeles, California from July 4 to July 8, 1966. Following the conclusion of that conference, the PAC members decided to continue as a coordinating group to sponsor similar protest demonstrations at later dates.

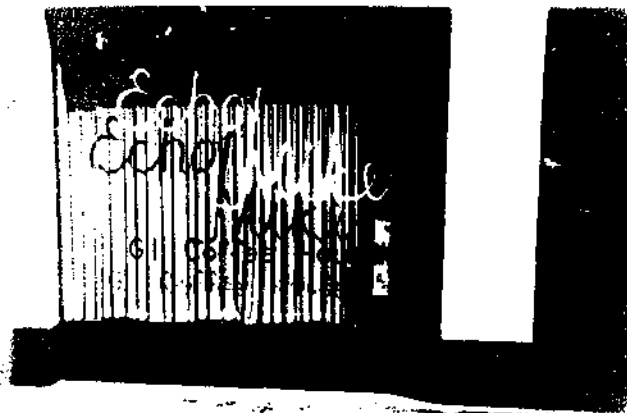

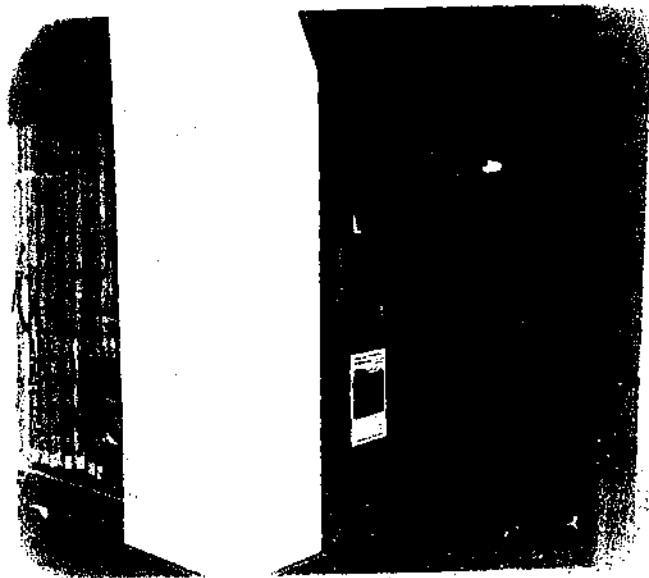

On August 9, 1968, Source Two advised that the Student Mobilization Committee (SMC) is composed of young people, primarily of college students whose interest is protesting United States policy in Vietnam. The committee is an outgrowth of the Spring Mobilization Committee To End the War in Vietnam which sponsored large demonstrations protesting United States policy in Vietnam, in San Francisco, California, and New York City, on April 15, 1967.

The United States House of Representatives Committee on un-American Activities in a report dated March 31, 1967, stated that the SMC and April 15, 1967 anti-war demonstrations were communist inspired and dominated.

"Despite the talks in Paris, the Vietnam war goes on. The bombing pause in the north has not brought peace, but only intensified fighting in the south. The "People's World", a weekly west coast communist newspaper, in its issue of November 5, 1966, in an article on Page 3, describes the Peace Action Council (PAC) as, "a coordinating agency for peace activists" which conducts emergency mobilizations and demonstrative actions against the war in Vietnam.

On July 22, 1966, a source reported that the PAC, which has also been known as the Greater Los Angeles Peace Action Council (GLAPAC), was formed during the early summer of 1966, for the express purpose of protesting the war in Vietnam during the National Governors' Conference held in Los Angeles, California from July 4 to July 8, 1966. 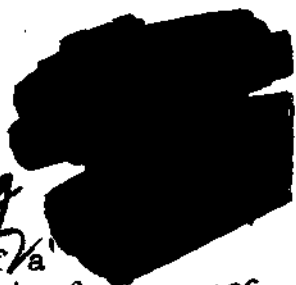

On February 22, 1969, [redacted] advised that from approximately 8:15 p.m. to 11:00 p.m. on February 22, 1969, a Los Angeles organization known as the GIS and Vietnam Veterans Against the War (GIVVAW) sponsored a teach-in at the First Unitarian Church of Los Angeles, 2936 West 8th Street (See Appendix Communist Infiltration of First Unitarian Church of Los Angeles). [redacted] advised that the purpose of the teach-in was to discuss the United States position in Vietnam and also the position of active duty servicemen in connection with that war. This source advised that the GIVVAW is an organization of both active duty servicemen and alleged veterans of the United States military service who are against the war in Vietnam. This organization demands the immediate withdrawal of United States troops from Vietnam. It has been infiltrated and is currently controlled by members of the Los Angeles Branch-Young Socialist Alliance (LAB-YSA) (See Appendix).

[redacted] continued that when the teach-in began approximately 50 of the 75 persons were present. The peak number of attendants was approximately 125 to 150 later in the evening. The first speaker was introduced as Los Angeles Attorney Hugh Manes, who told those present that GIS presently have broader legal rights than did those who were in World War II. He gave as an example that GIS can no longer have their footlockers searched without their permission. He

Stapp said he was formerly a GI and now wants to organize the United States Army for the purpose of having enlisted men elect their own officers and vote on whether they want to participate in the Vietnam war. He described present leaders as "facist pigs". At the conclusion of his talk, Stapp said he would be leaving Los Angeles in the next day or two to travel to San Francisco to attend trials presently underway at the Presidio and also participate in possible demonstrations which are to be held in conjunction with these trials of service personnel.

[redacted] advised the last speaker was G. James Boggio, who is known to [redacted] as the head of the organization sponsoring this teach-in. Boggio claimed to have been in Vietnam with the United States forces and stated that he had an "enlightenment" while there. He related experiences to Vietnam where he participated in burning villages for no apparent purpose. Boggio claimed that on April 6, 1969, large demonstrations against the Vietnam war, staged by veteran groups, are scheduled for New York City, Chicago, Atlanta, Seattle, San Francisco, Los Angeles and Austin, Texas.

[redacted] and [redacted] advised that there were no persons present in military uniform at the teach-in. [redacted] stated that from their appearances, only 10 or 15 persons present might have been with the military due to their types of haircuts.

The teach-in concluded at about 11:00 p.m. with no incidents involved.

COMMUNIST INFILTRATION OF THE
FIRST UNITARIAN CHURCH OF LOS ANGELES

A source advised on May 8, 1968, that the premises of the First Unitarian Church of Los Angeles, 2936 West 8th Street, Los Angeles, California, have been utilized for meetings by Communist Party members and sympathizers over a period of years. Speakers and lecturers at the church frequently espouse Communist causes or follow the Communist Party line. Communist front group literature is distributed at the church. The church is used by some Communist Party members for "mass concentration" work.

This same infiltration extends to adjuncts of the church such as the Unitarian Public Forum and the Fellowship for Social Justice, formerly known as the Unitarian-Universalist Fellowship for Social Justice.

STEPHEN H. FRITCHMAN has been minister of the church since 1948.

Reverend STEPHEN H. FRITCHMAN is described in the Fourth Report, Un-American Activities Committee in California, 1948, Page 115, as a very active "Communist fronter" and connected with numerous "Communist front organizations and activities".

Membership in the First Unitarian Church does not, of itself, connote membership in or sympathy with the Communist Party.

YOUNG SOCIALIST ALLIANCE

The May, 1960 issue of the "Young Socialist" (YS), Page 1, Column 3, disclosed that during April 15-17, 1960, a national organization entitled "The Young Socialist Alliance" (YSA) was established at Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. This issue stated that this organization was formed by the nationwide supporter clubs of the publication YS.

The above issue, Page 6, set forth the Founding Declaration of the YSA. This declaration stated that the YSA recognizes the Socialist Workers Party (SWP) as the only existing political leadership on class struggle principles of revolutionary socialism.

On May 10, 1967, a source advised that the YSA was formed during 1957, by youth of various left socialist tendencies, particularly members and followers of the SWP. The source further advised that the YSA has recently become more open about admitting that it is the youth group of the SWP and that an SWP representative has publicly stated that the YSA is the SWP's youth group.

The National Headquarters of the YSA are located in Rooms 532-536, 41 Union Square West, New York City.

On October 31, 1967, a second source advised that at the 22nd National Convention of the SWP held in New York City from October 26, 1967, to October 29, 1967, it was stated that the YSA remained as the main recruiting ground for new SWP members.

The SWP has been designated pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

A characterization of "Young Socialist" is set out separately.

The GI's and Vietnam Veterans Against the War is controlled by the Young Socialist Alliance, the youth group of the Socialist Workers Party, a basic revolutionary organization. Support is being given march by other organizations including Students for a Democratic Society and Youth Commission of the Southern California District Communist Party. The organizers hope to have about 25 active military participants.

Data will be included in summary to White House, Secret Service and other interested government agencies.





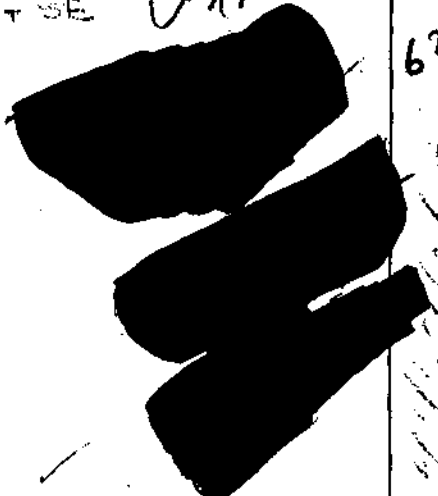

Re April 6, 1969 Peace March and Rally

On February 20, 1969, source one advised that the objective of GIVVAW is the organization of both active duty servicemen and veterans who are against the war in Vietnam. GIVVAW demands the immediate and unconditional withdrawal of all U. S. troops from Vietnam. GIVVAW has been infiltrated and is currently controlled by members of the Los Angeles Branch-Young Socialist Alliance (LAB-YSA) (see Appendix).

On March 24, 1969, source two furnished a throwaway concerning the demonstration and rally scheduled for April 6, 1969, which was being distributed by GIVVAW in the Los Angeles area. This throwaway was captioned, "March With GIs and Civilians for Peace, Support Our GIs - Bring Them Home Now! Self-determination for Vietnam! Free Speech for GIs!" The throwaway lists the sponsors of the rally and demonstration to be GIVVAW, Student Mobilization Committee (SMC), and the Peace Action Council (PAC) (see Appendix).

On August 9, 1968, source three advised that the SMC is composed of young people, primarily college students whose interest is protesting United States policy in Vietnam. The committee is an outgrowth of the Spring Mobilization Committee to End the War in Vietnam, which sponsored large demonstrations protesting U. S. policy in Vietnam, in San Francisco, California and New York on April 15, 1967.

The U. S. House of Representatives Committee on Un-American Activities in a report dated March 31, 1967, stated that the SMC and April 15, 1967 anti-war demonstrations were communist inspired and dominated.

The above throwaway further indicated that the demonstration will assemble at 12:00 noon on April 6, 1969 at Oxford Avenue and Wilshire Boulevard, Los Angeles, and march to Mac Arthur Park in Los Angeles for a rally starting at 3:00 p.m. in the band shell area of that park.

A second throwaway furnished by source one on March 19, 1969 sets forth that this march and rally is being supported by the PAC, Students for a Democratic Society (SDS) (see Appendix), Los Angeles Committee for Defense of the Bill of Rights (LACDBR) (see Appendix), Women Strike for Peace (WSP) (see Appendix), Youth Commission of the Southern California District Communist Party (SCDCP), and others.

On April 1, 1969, source four furnished a copy of the "LA WISP," the monthly news bulletin of Southern California WSP, dated April, 1969, which contained an article captioned, "Easter Sunday, April 6, March With GIS and Civilians for Peace." This article read as follows:

"WSP will have its own section in the parade with our women carrying our WSP shopping bags which say, 'Mothers Say Stop the War in Vietnam.' Be sure to dress up (no slacks, etc.)."

Source five furnished a card which was being distributed on March 23, 1969 at 118 North Larchmont Boulevard, Los Angeles, California, during a "People's World" benefit.

The "People's World" (PW) is a West Coast weekly communist newspaper.

This card urged those in attendance to vote for certain candidates for the junior college Board of Trustees in the Los Angeles primary election, April 1, 1969, and further urged those present to support the April 6, 1969 Easter Sunday march to end the war in Vietnam.

Source six, on March 30, 1969, advised that a meeting of the LAB-YSA was held in Los Angeles on that same date. An anti-war report was given at this meeting. It was reported that all YSA males would act as defense monitors at the peace march and rally in anticipation of trouble from Cubans. It was reported that the LAB-YSA wants to keep this demonstration peaceful since the military code prohibits military personnel from participating in violent demonstrations. The anti-war report further indicated that the Long Beach Chapter of the Peace and Freedom Party will have a car caravan coming to Los Angeles from Long Beach for the purpose of participating in the demonstration.

The Peace and Freedom Party is a legally constituted political party in the State of California.

Source seven advised that the National Socialist White People's Party (NSWPP) (see Appendix) held a meeting in Los Angeles, California on March 29, 1969. [REDACTED] the group leader of the NSWPP, advised that approximately 20 members and supporters have indicated that they would participate in a "counter-demonstration" against the peace march on April 6, 1969. Some members will be in uniform wearing Nazi armbands. At this meeting, [REDACTED] further stated that he would contact the Los Angeles Police Department and advise them of their plans to march approximately 100 feet in front of the vanguard of the peace parade. b2c

Source eight has advised that the GIVVAW filed an application for a parade permit for a peace march scheduled

on April 6, 1969. This application was dated February 4, 1969 and was signed by [redacted]. It requested permission to have 100 units of 50 people in each unit marching in the demonstration. The person shown on the application as being in charge of the parade was James Boggio. Source eight advised that this parade permit was subsequently granted by the Los Angeles Police Department.

On April 1, 1969, source two advised that [redacted] and James Boggio are members of the [redacted], and [redacted] is an organizer for the [redacted].

Source one advised on February 11, 1969 that James Boggio is the Chairman or Coordinator of GIVVAW, and [redacted] is the Secretary of GIVVAW.

On March 20, 1969, source nine advised that GIVVAW held a meeting on March 19, 1969 at 555 North Western Avenue, Los Angeles, California. This source stated that at this meeting, James Boggio made the statement that he hopes to have approximately 25 active duty military personnel present at this peace march and rally. No identities were disclosed.

Source nine also advised that the announcement was made at this meeting that Bishop James Pike and Paul Halvonik have both agreed to be speakers at the rally following the April 6 peace march.

Bishop James A. Pike of the Episcopal Diocese of California, has made several public speeches criticizing U. S. involvement in Vietnam and on one occasion urged young men to refuse to go into the Armed Forces, and further urged they give serious consideration to conscientious objection on a mass basis.

Paul Halvonik is self-described in the above throwaway, furnished by source 2, as a defense lawyer for the Presidio 27. The Presidio 27 were GIS court-martialled for mutiny in March of 1969 at San Francisco, California.

Source nine also advised that at this March 19, 1969 meeting of GIVVAW, Boggio also announced that Sue Schnall, an active duty U. S. Navy nurse in the San Francisco, California area, will speak at the rally. Boggio stated that this is on the provision that she is not assigned to weekend duty in San Francisco.

The "Los Angeles Times", a local newspaper published daily in Los Angeles, reported on February 4, 1969 that Lieutenant jg Susan Schnall was a Navy nurse who participated in anti-war activities in San Francisco, and was sentenced to six months hard labor. The sentence was immediately suspended and she was ordered back to active duty pending review of parts of her sentence by the Judge Advocate General in Washington and the Military Court of Appeals.

Source one advised that a 24-hour vigil in memory of Martin Luther King will take place at the new Federal Building, Los Angeles, California, on April 4, 5, and 6, 1969. This vigil is being sponsored, in part, by the PAC. Present plans call for participants in this vigil to march to Mac Arthur Park on April 6, 1969, at 3:00 p.m., and join the rally there.

A source advised on May 27, 1968, that the Women Strike for Peace (WSP) in the Southern California area began its operations in the late fall of 1961, as an affiliate of the national organization formed that year in Washington, D. C. It is a peace oriented women's organization which is opposed to the present American foreign policy in Vietnam. It has also sought legislation which would bring about the abolition of the House Committee on Un-American Activities. In addition to conducting numerous letter writing campaigns which concern current United States civil rights and foreign policy problems, WSP locally has become quite active in draft counseling and draft leafleting. Counseling, in the form of providing information concerning alternatives to the draft, and distributing leaflets providing this information have taken place on an increasingly consistent pace. Much of the leafleting takes place adjacent to high school campuses and in shopping centers. WSP feels that these methods of opposing United States intervention in Vietnam have been quite effective and more effective than frequent participation in demonstrations protesting the war in Vietnam.

The same source stated that WSP is a non-membership organization and has no officers. The organization is open to women of all political opinions who are interested in world peace. It makes no effort to exclude from its activities members of, or persons sympathetic to, the Communist Party and related groups.

The guiding force behind the Southern California WSP groups is MARY CLARKE. A second source advised in July, 1955, that CLARKE was dropped from the Western Division, Los Angeles County Communist Party (LACCP) in the spring of 1955, for personal reasons and not because of any political differences with the LACCP.

The first source advised that Southern California WSP maintains its office at 5899 West Pico Boulevard, Los Angeles.

LOS ANGELES COMMITTEE FOR DEFENSE OF THE BILL OF RIGHTS,
formerly known as Los Angeles Committee for
Protection of Foreign Born (LACDBR)

A source advised in May, 1968, that the LACDBR has expanded its former scope of interest relating to the foreign born, and has become a militant general defense organization allegedly seeking to safeguard the rights of all individuals, including the Foreign Born, as well as those seeking to avoid military service in the Armed Forces of the United States.

The LACDBR is a non-membership organization which is represented by an Administrative Board of about 125 individuals from loosely organized area committees interested in the work of the LACDBR. These board members are invited by ROSE CHERNIN, Executive Director of the LACDBR, who is the guiding, dominant, and motivating force behind the LACDBR. Its headquarters are maintained at 326 West Third Street, Los Angeles, California.

Another source advised in May, 1968, that ROSE CHERNIN is currently Organizational Secretary of the Moranda Smith Section of the Southern California District Communist Party (SCDCP).

On May 29, 1968, a source who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised that the American Nazi Party - World Union of Free Enterprise National Socialists (ANP - WUFENS) was organized by GEORGE LINCOLN ROCKWELL at Arlington, Virginia, on February 26, 1959. It was based upon the concept of an international "National Socialist" movement, as espoused by the German Nazi Party, which was headed by ADOLF HITLER. The ANP - WUFENS supports and follows the line of hatred against Negroes, Jews and Communists, through speeches, published literature, demonstrations, and publicity-seeking devices for the purpose of seeking a legitimate, dominant political party within the United States and in foreign countries.

"The Richmond News Leader" issue dated April 4, 1963, published daily at Richmond, Virginia, stated that this organization is chartered in the State of Virginia as "The George Lincoln Rockwell Party" and that the Virginia Assembly prohibits the use of "Nazi" or "National Socialism" in a Virginia-chartered organization. As of January 1, 1967, the official name of this organization was changed to "National Socialist White People's Party", according to Commander ROCKWELL.

On August 25, 1967, GEORGE LINCOLN ROCKWELL was assassinated in Arlington, Virginia, near the ANP Headquarters Building. The August 28, 1967 issue of the "Northern Virginia Sun", a daily newspaper published at Arlington, Virginia, stated that MATTHIAS KOEHL, JR., took command of the party after ROCKWELL's assassination.

The "People's World", a weekly west coast communist newspaper, in its issue of November 5, 1966, in an article on Page 3, describes the Peace Action Council (PAC) as, "a coordinating agency for peace activists" which conducts emergency mobilizations and demonstrative actions against the war in Vietnam.

On July 22, 1966, a source reported that the PAC, which has also been known as the Greater Los Angeles Peace Action Council (GLAPAC), was formed during the early summer of 1966, for the express purpose of protesting the war in Vietnam during the National Governors' Conference held in Los Angeles, California from July 4 to July 8, 1966. Following the conclusion of that conference, the PAC members decided to continue as a coordinating group to sponsor similar protest demonstrations at later dates.

This source was recontacted on May 8, 1968, and reported that the PAC continues to operate under the same basic concept.

The Students for a Democratic Society (SDS), as it is known today, came into being at a founding convention held at Port Huron, Michigan, in June, 1962. The SDS is an association of young people on the left and has a current program of protesting the draft, promoting a campaign for youth to develop a conscientious objector status, denouncing United States intervention in the war in Vietnam, and to "radically transform" the university community, and provide for its complete control by students. GUS HALL, General Secretary, Communist Party, USA, when interviewed by a representative of United States International in San Francisco, California, on May 14, 1965, described the SDS as a part of the "responsible left" which the Party has "going for us". At the June, 1965, SDS National Convention, an anti-communist proviso was removed from the SDS constitution. In the October 7, 1966, issue of "New Left Notes", the official publication of SDS, an SDS spokesman stated that there are some communists in SDS and they are welcome. The national headquarters of this organization as of July 24, 1968, was located in Room 206, 1608 West Madison Street, Chicago, Illinois.

The "Young Socialist" is a magazine published five times a year by the Young Socialist Alliance. The October, 1964, edition, the initial edition utilizing the magazine format, relates that this magazine succeeds the "Young Socialist" newspaper in an effort to provide "more facts on more general issues than a small newspaper can."

The "Young Socialist" newspaper was formerly described as the official organ of the Young Socialist Alliance (YSA).

The "Young Socialist" maintains office space at the headquarters of the YSA, Rooms 532-536, 41 Union Square West, New York City, and has a mailing address of Post Office Box 471, Cooper Station, New York, New York 10003.

The May, 1960 issue of the "Young Socialist" (YS), Page 1, Column 3, disclosed that during April 15-17, 1960, a national organization entitled "The Young Socialist Alliance" (YSA) was established at Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. This issue stated that this organization was formed by the nationwide supporter clubs of the publication YS.

The above issue, Page 6, set forth the Founding Declaration of the YSA. This declaration stated that the YSA recognizes the Socialist Workers Party (SWP) as the only existing political leadership on class struggle principles of revolutionary socialism.

On May 10, 1967, a source advised that the YSA was formed during 1957, by youth of various left socialist tendencies, particularly members and followers of the SWP. The source further advised that the YSA has recently become more open about admitting that it is the youth group of the SWP and that an SWP representative has publicly stated that the YSA is the SWP's youth group.

The National Headquarters of the YSA are located in Rooms 532-536, 41 Union Square West, New York City.

On October 31, 1967, a second source advised that at the 22nd National Convention of the SWP held in New York City from October 26, 1967, to October 29, 1967, it was stated that the YSA remained as the main recruiting ground for new SWP members.

The SWP has been designated pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

A characterization of "Young Socialist" is set out separately.

YOUNG SOCIALIST ALLIANCE - LOS ANGELES

On May 13, 1968, a source advised that in February, 1959, an unnamed organization was formed in Los Angeles by youth members of the Socialist Workers Party (SWP) to support the newspaper "Young Socialist" (YS). This organization was formed as a result of the National Conference of Young Socialist Supporters held in Detroit, Michigan, in December, 1958, where a loose national organization was created arounds the YS with headquarters in New York City.

The organization remained unnamed, although commonly referred to as the Los Angeles Committee of Young Socialist Supporters (LACYSS) until February, 1960, when they adopted the name Young Socialist Alliance (YSA).

A second National Conference of YS Supporters was held April 15-17, 1960, at Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, at which the national organization YSA was created. The YSA at Los Angeles is an integral part of the national organization and receives its directives from YSA Headquarters in New York City.

The YSA in Los Angeles is actually the youth organization of the SWP and follows the SWP aims and purposes to the letter.

The SWP has been designated by the Attorney General of the United States pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

On February 20, 1969, source one advised that the objective of GI's and Vietnam Veterans Against the War (GIVVAW) is the organization of both active duty servicemen and veterans who are against the war in Vietnam. GIVVAW demands the immediate and unconditional withdrawal of all United States troops from Vietnam. GIVVAW has been infiltrated and is currently controlled by members of the Los Angeles Branch - Young Socialist Alliance (LAB-YSA) (See Appendix - YSA, Los Angeles and "Young Socialist").

On August 9, 1963, source two advised that the Student Mobilization Committee (SMC) is composed of young people, primarily of college students, whose interest is protesting United States policy in Vietnam. The committee is an outgrowth of the Spring Mobilization Committee to End the War in Vietnam, which sponsored large demonstrations protesting United States policy in Vietnam, in San Francisco, California, and New York City on April 15, 1967.

The U. S. House of Representatives, Committee on UnAmerican Activities, in a report dated March 31, 1963, stated that the SMC and April 15, 1967 anti-war demonstrations were communist inspired and dominated.

On April 6, 1969, Special Agents of the FBI observed peace march demonstrators assembling in the vicinity of Wilshire Boulevard and Oxford Avenue, Los Angeles, California, at approximately 12:00 noon. By 12:45 p.m., it was observed that approximately 500 demonstrators had gathered with the continuous arrival of other demonstrators. Numerous Viet Cong and National Liberation Front (NLF) flags were observed to be on display by these demonstrators.

Banners observed at the above location indicated that representation in the forthcoming peace march would be offered by the following groups:

The Peace and Freedom Party is a legally constituted political party in the State of California.

On January 12, 1969, source three advised that the QFP are a loose-knit group of individuals of the Quaker faith, residing in the Los Angeles area, who publicly display their opposition to United States involvement in Vietnam.

By approximately 2:00 p.m. it was observed that the crowd of demonstrators had grown to approximately 1,500.

At approximately 1:50 p.m., the rumor circulated through the crowd of demonstrators that an American Flag had been burned by these demonstrators. This event was not observed by either of the Los Angeles Police Department present at that time.

On April 7, 1969, source three advised no reports were received at the Los Angeles Police Department substantiating this rumored burning of an American Flag on the day prior. The peace march got under way at approximately 2:00 p.m., proceeding east on Wilshire Boulevard, with the demonstrators marching in the organizations as given above. Source four and five, on April 6, 1969, furnished the following names of LAB-YSA and LAL-SWP members who participated in the demonstration and rally on the same date:

On April 6, 1969, source one advised that Donald Kalish is the Chairman of the Philosophy Department at the University of California at Los Angeles (UCLA), Los Angeles, California, and is an executive of the Peace Action Council (PAC) (see appendix) in Los Angeles, California.

On April 3, 1969, source six advised that Dorothy Healey is the Chairman of the Southern California District Communist Party (SCDCP), [REDACTED] [REDACTED] is also an SCDCP member.

On April 6, 1969, source one advised that [REDACTED] [REDACTED] is currently active in the meetings and functions of both the PAC and the Dow Action Committee (DAC).

The DAC is self-described in its literature as an organization opposed to the war in Vietnam, with the specific aim of educating the public to the horrors of Napalm, herbicides, etc. and to promote a widespread boycott of all Dow Chemical Company products.

Source seven has previously identified [REDACTED] [REDACTED] as being a member of the SCDCP as of November 1967.

Source eight also advised that [REDACTED] attends meetings and functions of the Students for a Democratic Society (SDS) (see appendix) Chapter at Los Angeles City College, Los Angeles, California.

On April 6, 1969, source one advised that [redacted] has participated in numerous anti-war demonstrations in the Los Angeles area. [redacted] is also known as [redacted] and while participating in demonstrations he dresses in an outlandish military costume.

On April 6, 1969, source one advised that [redacted] is currently an active member of the DAC, and participates in numerous peace demonstrations in the Los Angeles area. Source one stated that [redacted] has appeared in the garb of a cardinal of the church in past demonstrations.

It was observed that during this peace march east on Wilshire Boulevard to Mac Arthur Park, a group of approximately 15 to 20 Cubans made an effort to stop the march. The Cubans attempted to do this by coming out onto Wilshire Boulevard while shouting obscenities and throwing golf balls. The location of this confrontation was Lafayette Park Place and Wilshire Boulevard, Los Angeles. At that point, the Cubans were confronted by the demonstrators located at the vanguard of the peace march. Officers of the Los Angeles Police Department quickly moved in and broke up this incident.

The "Los Angeles Times", a daily newspaper published locally in Los Angeles, California, on April 7, 1969, reported that five arrests were made on April 6, 1969, as a result of the above described confrontation between Cubans and peace demonstrators. This newspaper reported that those arrested were identified as Milton Sori, 24, 209 South Rampart, Los Angeles; Andres Campillo, Jr., 21, 328 1/2 East Connell Drive, Burbank; Estenique Rodriguez, 33, 3000 West Second Street, Los Angeles; Jose Martinez - Alegria, 20, 1435 Mc Collum Street, Los Angeles; and Richard Wolf, 20, 10131 Babbitt Avenue, Northridge, California.

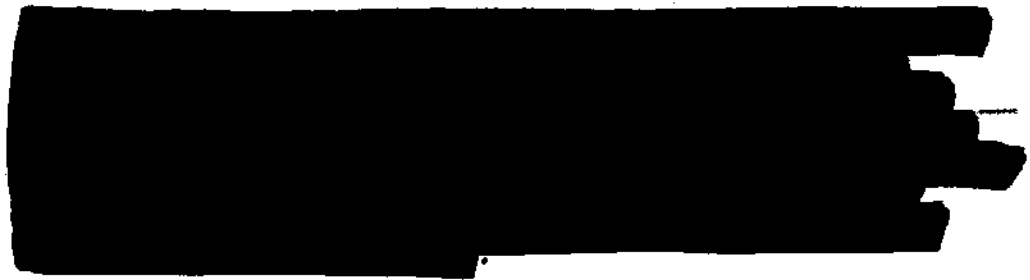
It was observed that approximately two blocks further east on Wilshire Boulevard, at the intersection of Coronado Street, Cubans began throwing rocks at the demonstrators. The Los Angeles Police Department again quickly moved in and prevented further violence.

This peace march then proceeded peacefully to Mac Arthur Park, Los Angeles, with no further incidents. The peace marchers began arriving at this park at approximately 2:50 p.m. It was noted that during the course of the march, "VIVA", a group of patriotic Americans of college age at Los Angeles City College, and the "Thomas Jefferson Club", a group of patriotic college age students at UCLA, distributed the leaflets which depicted the alleged atrocities of the North Vietnamese and Viet Cong, and reputed Napalm burnings by United States troops in Vietnam as being fabrications and falsehoods.

It was observed that during the course of this peace march, the demonstrators participating carried signs which read, "Bring the Troops Home Now; Stop Saving Face - Start Saving Lives; Get Out of Vietnam Now". The peace marchers also chanted, "Hell No - We Won't Go; What Do We Want - Peace; When Do We Want It - Now".

The first group of peace marchers arrived at Mac Arthur Park at approximately 2:50 p.m. and a rally started in the band shell area of that park at approximately 3:00 p.m. Floyd Hof served as Master of Ceremonies for this rally.

At this peace rally, Hof introduced the first speaker as Paul Halvonik.

Paul Halvonik has been described in a throw-away distributed by GIVVAW in Los Angeles, California, as a defense lawyer for the "Presidio 27". The Presidio 27 were GI's court-martialled for mutiny in March 1969, at San Francisco, California.

At the rally Halvonik described the protest of the above mentioned 27 GI's at the Presidio Stockade in the vicinity of San Francisco, California. Halvonik criticized the military for their failure to listen to the complaints about the physical conditions of this stockade, as voiced by these 27 GI's. He made the statement that this led to the protest and eventual charges of mutiny against the 27 GI's. Halvonik also criticized the sentences of 15 years originally handed out against those court-martialled, and told of the subsequent reductions in these sentences to two years.

While Halvonik was speaking it was observed that four Cuban men, and one middle-aged Cuban woman, began blowing whistles in an effort to disrupt the rally. An altercation between Cubans and peace demonstrators then erupted at the rally with [REDACTED] an LAL-SWP member, and two other unknown individuals, falling into a nearby lake.

Sarnoff made announcements concerning future activities of the PAC in the Los Angeles area, and thanked those present for their participation in the day's events.

The third speaker at the rally was an unidentified white male who read a letter reportedly sent from an active duty serviceman in Vietnam. This letter criticized United States involvement in Vietnam. The speaker made the statement that this letter was signed "[REDACTED] Private First Class, United States Marine Corps". This speaker then solicited contributions for GIVVAW from the audience and a collection was then taken up. 67C

The next speaker at the rally was introduced as Bishop James A. Pike.

Pike is the former Bishop of the Episcopal Diocese of California. He has made several public speeches criticizing United States involvement in Vietnam, and on one occasion urged young men to refuse to go into the Armed Forces, and give serious consideration to conscientious objection on a mass basis.

Pike's speech included statements that we are on the side of decency and our Government is not on the side of decency. It is on the side of murder. General Ky is a killer, he is killing people for hire. Under Mr. Nixon we are escalating the killing in the south of Vietnam. Mr. Nixon will not defeat these people. The position of the United States is not only evil, but is very embarrassing. We are throwing money down a rat hole in Vietnam.

Bishop Pike also stated that he believes in civil disobedience and said that he cheated on his eye test to enlist during World War II. He stated that today he would commit civil disobedience to keep from going to Vietnam.

The next speaker was an unidentified member of the Black Panther Party (BPP) (see appendix). This speaker was introduced by Donald Freed.

On March 27, 1969, source one advised that although Donald Freed is not a member of any specific peace oriented organization, he is widely known and accepted as a leading peace advocate in the Los Angeles, California, area.

The BPP member spoke on the BPP's support for the peace movement, and closed with the comment, "All the Power to the People".

The program at the rally then continued with an "open mike" for active duty servicemen who wished to speak out against United States involvement in Vietnam. Four white males were introduced separately and were phonetically identified as follows:

Mark Bolden, Corpsman from the United States Navy; Bill Raymond, Airman First Class, Norton Air Force Base; D. B. Mays, Norton Air Force Base; and Randy White, Castle Air Force Base.

Other speakers during this "open mike" session were introduced as Skip Hoyt, formerly of 101st Airborne Division; Rita Bevil, a white female who stated that she had a son currently of draft age; and an unidentified white male who stated that he was a graduate of Annapolis in 1964. These speakers also commented unfavorably on United States involvement in Vietnam.

James Boggio, further identified by source one as the coordinator or chairman of GIVVAW, also spoke during this "open mike" session. Boggio told of his experiences in Vietnam while he was on active duty.

The rally was brought to a close by Floyd Hof following this "open mike" session, and the demonstrators then disbanded.

BLACK PANTHER PARTY
Also Known As
Black Panther Party for Self Defense

According to its official newspaper, the Black Panther Party (BPP) was started during December, 1966, in Oakland, California, to organize black people so they can take control of the life, politics, and the destiny of the black community. It was organized by BOBBY GEORGE SEALE, BPP Chairman, and HUEY P. NEWTON, BPP Minister of Defense. NEWTON is presently serving a sentence of 2 to 15 years on a conviction of manslaughter in connection with the killing of an Oakland police officer.

The official newspaper, "The Black Panther" which further describes itself as the "Black Community News Service", states that the BPP advocates the use of guns and guerrilla tactics in its revolutionary program to end oppression of the black people. Residents of the black community are urged to arm themselves against the police who are consistently referred to in the publication as "pigs" who should be killed.

"The Black Panther" issue of September 7, 1968, contains an editorial by BPP Minister of Education, GEORGE MASON MURRAY, which ends with the following:

"Black men. Black people, colored persons of America, revolt everywhere! Arm yourselves. The only culture worth keeping is a revolutionary culture. Change. Freedom everywhere. Dynamite! Black Power. Use the gun. Kill the pigs everywhere."

Included in the introduction to an article appearing in the October 5, 1968, edition of "The Black Panther" is the statement "...we will not dissent from American Government. We will overthrow it".

Issues of "The Black Panther" regularly contain quotations from the writings of Chairman MAO Tse-tung of the People's Republic of China and feature MAO's statement that "political power grows out of the barrel of a gun."

The national headquarters of the BPP is located at 3106 Shattuck Avenue, Berkeley, California. Branches have been established at various locations throughout the United States.

A source advised on May 8, 1968, that the premises of the First Unitarian Church of Los Angeles, 2936 West 8th Street, Los Angeles, California, have been utilized for meetings by Communist Party members and sympathizers over a period of years. Speakers and lecturers at the church frequently espouse Communist causes or follow the Communist Party line. Communist front group literature is distributed at the church. The church is used by some Communist Party members for "mass concentration" work.

This same infiltration extends to adjuncts of the church such as the Unitarian Public Forum and the Fellowship for Social Justice, formerly known as the Unitarian-Universalist Fellowship for Social Justice.

STEPHEN H. FRITCHMAN has been minister of the church since 1948.

Reverend STEPHEN H. FRITCHMAN is described in the Fourth Report, Un-American Activities Committee in California, 1948, Page 115, as a very active "Communist fronter" and connected with numerous "Communist front organizations and activities".

Membership in the First Unitarian Church does not, of itself, connote membership in or sympathy with the Communist Party.

Women's International Strike for Peace

A source advised on May 27, 1968, that the Women Strike for Peace (WSP) in the Southern California area began its operations in the late fall of 1961, as an affiliate of the national organization formed that year in Washington, D. C. It is a peace oriented women's organization which is opposed to the present American foreign policy in Vietnam. It has also sought legislation which would bring about the abolition of the House Committee on Un-American Activities. In addition to conducting numerous letter writing campaigns which concern current United States civil rights and foreign policy problems, WSP locally has become quite active in draft counseling and draft leafleting. Counseling, in the form of providing information concerning alternatives to the draft, and distributing leaflets providing this information have taken place on an increasingly consistent pace. Much of the leafleting takes place adjacent to high school campuses and in shopping centers. WSP feels that these methods of opposing United States intervention in Vietnam have been quite effective and more effective than frequent participation in demonstrations protesting the war in Vietnam.

The same source stated that WSP is a non-membership organization and has no officers. The organization is open to women of all political opinions who are interested in world peace. It makes no effort to exclude from its activities members of, or persons sympathetic to, the Communist Party and related groups.

The guiding force behind the Southern California WSP groups is MARY CLARKE. A second source advised in July, 1955, that CLARKE was dropped from the Western Division, Los Angeles County Communist Party (LACCP) in the spring of 1955, for personal reasons and not because of any political differences with the LACCP.

The first source advised that Southern California WSP maintains its office at 5899 West Pico Boulevard, Los Angeles.

LOS ANGELES LOCAL - SOCIALIST WORKERS PARTY (LAL-SWP)

On May 10, 1968, a confidential source advised that the LAL-SWP has been in existence since the 1930's and continues to exist. The source further advised that the LAL-SWP is a local branch of the National SWP with aims and purposes identical to those of the National SWP.

The SWP has been designated by the Attorney General of the United States pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

PEACE ACTION COUNCIL

The "People's World", a weekly west coast communist newspaper, in its issue of November 5, 1966, in an article on Page 3, describes the Peace Action Council (PAC) as, "a coordinating agency for peace activists" which conducts emergency mobilizations and demonstrative actions against the war in Vietnam.

On July 22, 1966, a source reported that the PAC, which has also been known as the Greater Los Angeles Peace Action Council (GLAPAC), was formed during the early summer of 1966, for the express purpose of protesting the war in Vietnam during the National Governors' Conference held in Los Angeles, California from July 4 to July 8, 1966. Following the conclusion of that conference, the PAC members decided to continue as a coordinating group to sponsor similar protest demonstrations at later dates.

This source was recontacted on May 8, 1968, and reported that the PAC continues to operate under the same basic concept.

STUDENTS FOR A DEMOCRATIC SOCIETY

The Students for a Democratic Society (SDS), as it is known today, came into being at a founding convention held at Port Huron, Michigan, in June, 1962. The SDS is an association of young people on the left and has a current program of protesting the draft, promoting a campaign for youth to develop a conscientious objector status, denouncing United States intervention in the war in Vietnam, and to "radically transform" the university community, and provide for its complete control by students. GUS HALL, General Secretary, Communist Party, USA, when interviewed by a representative of United States International in San Francisco, California, on May 14, 1965, described the SDS as a part of the "responsible left" which the Party has "going for us". At the June, 1965, SDS National Convention, an anti-communist proviso was removed from the SDS constitution. In the October 7, 1966, issue of "New Left Notes", the official publication of SDS, an SDS spokesman stated that there are some communists in SDS and they are welcome. The national headquarters of this organization as of July 24, 1968, was located in Room 206, 1608 West Madison Street, Chicago, Illinois.

YOUNG SOCIALIST ALLIANCE

The May, 1960 issue of the "Young Socialist" (YS), Page 1, Column 3, disclosed that during April 15-17, 1960, a national organization entitled "The Young Socialist Alliance" (YSA) was established at Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. This issue stated that this organization was formed by the nationwide supporter clubs of the publication YS.

The above issue, Page 6, set forth the Founding Declaration of the YSA. This declaration stated that the YSA recognizes the Socialist Workers Party (SWP) as the only existing political leadership on class struggle principles of revolutionary socialism.

On May 10, 1967, a source advised that the YSA was formed during 1957, by youth of various left socialist tendencies, particularly members and followers of the SWP. The source further advised that the YSA has recently become more open about admitting that it is the youth group of the SWP and that an SWP representative has publicly stated that the YSA is the SWP's youth group.

The National Headquarters of the YSA are located in Rooms 532-536, 41 Union Square West, New York City.

On October 31, 1967, a second source advised that at the 22nd National Convention of the SWP held in New York City from October 26, 1967, to October 29, 1967, it was stated that the YSA remained as the main recruiting ground for new SWP members.

The SWP has been designated pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

A characterization of "Young Socialist" is set out separately.

Attached relates to anti-Vietnam War demonstration held Los Angeles, California 4/6/69. Various protest groups were represented along with Student Mobilization Committee which is controlled by the Socialist Workers Party. Members of the Socialist Workers Party and its youth group Young Socialist Alliance also participated. During march by demonstrators 15 to 20 Cubans attempted to disrupt the procession. Subsequent to march a rally was held in Macarthur Park where several speeches were given protesting Vietnam War. During one of these speeches altercation between Cubans and demonstrators erupted necessitating police to remove Cubans from the area.

A source advised on May 27, 1968, that the Women Strike for Peace (WSP) in the Southern California area began its operations in the late fall of 1961, as an affiliate of the national organization formed that year in Washington, D. C. It is a peace oriented women's organization which is opposed to the present American foreign policy in Vietnam. It has also sought legislation which would bring about the abolition of the House Committee on Un-American Activities. In addition to conducting numerous letter writing campaigns which concern current United States civil rights and foreign policy problems, WSP locally has become quite active in draft counseling and draft leafleting. Counseling, in the form of providing information concerning alternatives to the draft, and distributing leaflets providing this information have taken place on an increasingly consistent pace. Much of the leafleting takes place adjacent to high school campuses and in shopping centers. WSP feels that these methods of opposing United States intervention in Vietnam have been quite effective and more effective than frequent participation in demonstrations protesting the war in Vietnam.

The same source stated that WSP is a non-membership organization and has no officers. The organization is open to women of all political opinions who are interested in world peace. It makes no effort to exclude from its activities members of, or persons sympathetic to, the Communist Party and related groups.

The guiding force behind the Southern California WSP groups is MARY CLARKE. A second source advised in July, 1955, that CLARKE was dropped from the Western Division, Los Angeles County Communist Party (LACCP) in the spring of 1955, for personal reasons and not because of any political differences with the LACCP.

The first source advised that Southern California WSP maintains its office at 5899 West Pico Boulevard, Los Angeles.

This organization was formed as a result of the National Conference of Young Socialist Supporters held in Detroit, Michigan, in December, 1958, where a loose national organization was created around the YS with headquarters in New York City.

The organization remained unnamed, although commonly referred to as the Los Angeles Committee of Young Socialist Supporters (LACYSS) until February, 1960, when they adopted the name Young Socialist Alliance (YSA).

A second National Conference of YS Supporters was held April 15-17, 1960, at Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, at which the national organization YSA was created. The YSA at Los Angeles is an integral part of the national organization and receives its directives from YSA Headquarters in New York City.

The YSA in Los Angeles is actually the youth organization of the SWP and follows the SWP aims and purposes to the letter.

The SWP has been designated by the Attorney General of the United States pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

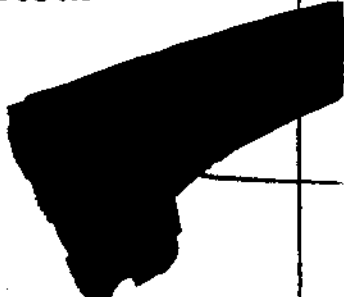

GI's and Vietnam Veterans Against the War has, in recent months, sponsored an Easter Sunday GI-led demonstration, a GI teach-in, a number of GI parties, a GI picnic; we have created the Echo Lake Coffeehouse to provide free weekend entertainment for servicemen; we do GI leaflet counseling and organizing; we provide experienced speakers for other groups or organizations;

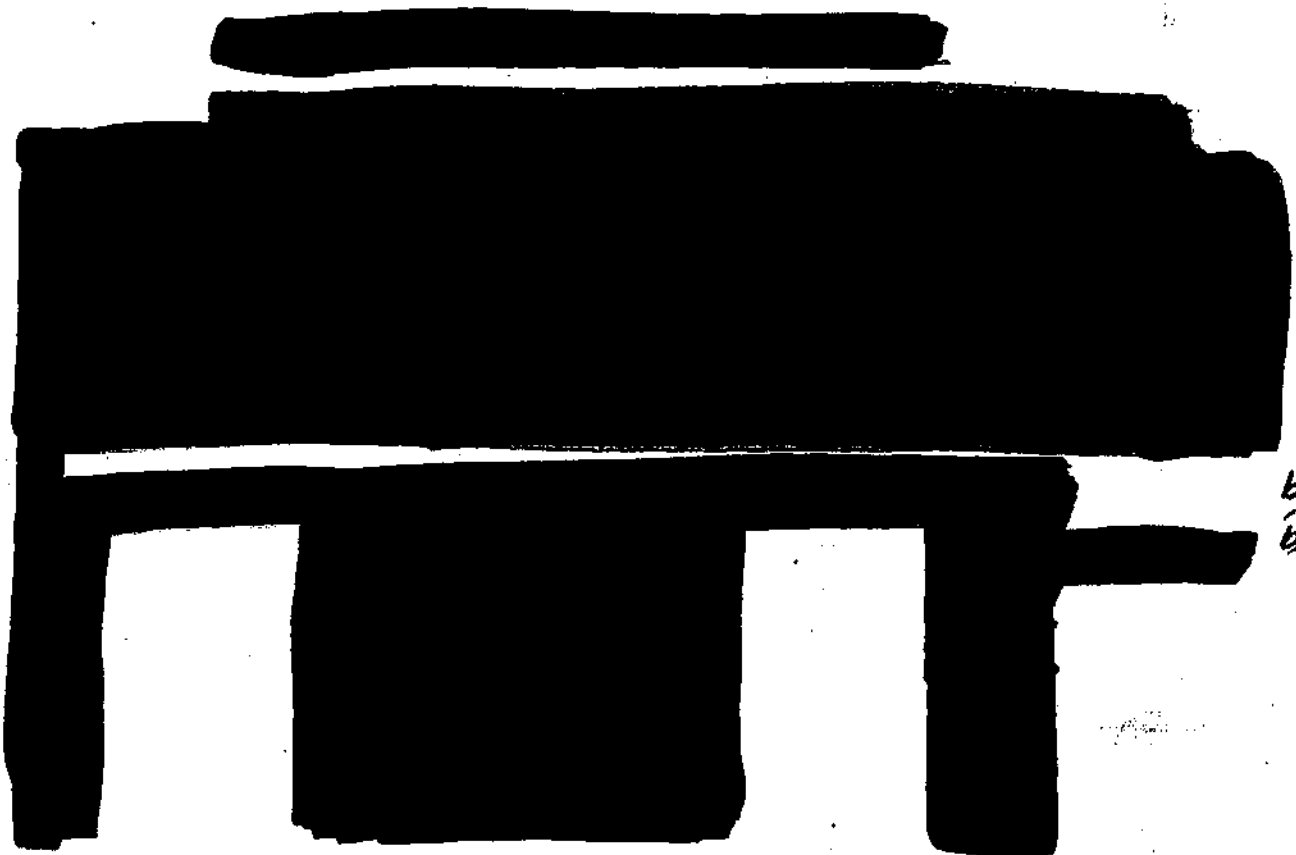

we publish "About Face," a bi-weekly newspaper for enlisted men. All this at no expense to our buddies in the Armed Forces.

"As of this date, "About Face" has published four editions, reaching nearly 6,000 servicemen in Southern California and in Vietnam. All this has cost us \$123. The money came from contributions and further editions will be payed for through contributions.

"We now owe our landlord \$75 for rent; we owe the Bell Telephone Company \$100; we need approximately \$35 to publish 2,000 copies of our next edition of About Face.

"Without your assistance, GI's and Vietnam Veterans Against the War cannot continue. Please, at this time, help us."

Sources advised on the above dates that a GIVVAW sponsored GI Teach-In was held on February 22, 1969, at 2936 West 8th Street with approximately 50 to 75 people in attendance. Sources related that approximately one half of those in attendance were current members of either the IAL-SWP or LAB-YSA. Sources related that no military personnel were at the teach-in in military uniform but possibly 10 to 15 of those in attendance could possibly have been active duty servicemen.

On February 27, 1969, source made available a YSA regional letter dated February 6, 1969, which read in part as follows:

"Leafleting for the GI Teach-In has had a good response from the GIs. A good speaker's list is being formed up. Long Beach City College Students for a Democratic Society (SDS) (See Appendix) is distributing at the Long Beach Naval Base and a team leaves for Pendleton every Wednesday between 5:00 and 5:30 P.M. from the GI coffeehouse."

On the above date, source made available a throwaway captioned, "GI - Civilian March and Rally Against the War in Vietnam! - 4/6, Easter," indicating the march and rally was sponsored by the GIVVAW and the Student Mobilization Committee (SMC).

Source advised on the above date that the SMC is composed of young people, primarily of college students, whose interest is protesting United States policy in Vietnam. The committee is an outgrowth of the Spring Mobilization Committee to End the War in Vietnam which sponsored large demonstrations protesting United States policy in Vietnam, in San Francisco, California, and New York City, on April 15, 1967.

The United States House of Representatives Committee on Un-American Activities in a report dated March 31, 1967, stated that the SMC, and April 15, 1967, anti-war demonstrations were communist inspired and dominated.

On March 1, 1969, the GI/VAN held a meeting on the campus of Los Angeles City College, Franklin Hall, Room 101. The meeting consisted of establishing study groups to plan for the April 6, 1969, demonstration. A few active duty GIs, who were in attendance at the meeting, were asked to help and bring more friends to Los Angeles in the future.

On April 6, 1969, the GI/VAN co-sponsored a demonstration with the SMC in Los Angeles, California. A march began on the corner of Wilshire and Oxford Avenue and marched down Wilshire to Mac Arthur Park, Los Angeles, California. At the rally, JIM BOGGIO spoke concerning his experiences in Vietnam and how he was brain-washed by the military. BOGGIO related that when he saw the light and began spreading the truth about the war to fellow GIs, he was persecuted by the military brass.

On April 21, 1969, a IAL-SHP meeting was held at 1702 East 4th Street, Los Angeles, California. [REDACTED] gave a report on the April 6, 1969 demonstration. She said that of the 5,000 to 6,000 participants in the demonstration, approximately 50 were active duty GIs.

* On the above date, source made available a YSA regional newsletter dated April 30, 1969, which read in part as follows:

"The anti-war movement won a partial victory in the defense of [REDACTED] at Norton Air Force Base on April 29, 1969. The SMC and GIVVAW were able to put so much pressure on the Air Force, that instead of being sentenced to 30 days at hard labor in the stockade, [REDACTED] received a much less severe punishment. We must be prepared to defend other local GIs who are harassed for anti-war activities in an even bigger and better way.

"The SMC GI-Civilian Teach-In - Picnic will be the next big opportunity to meet anti-war GIs and help them organize against the war on their bases."

On May 2, 1969, a GIVVAW meeting was held at 743½ South Alvarado Street, Los Angeles. JIM BOGGIO chaired this meeting. BOGGIO discussed the GI Teach-In and picnic to be held at Fairmont Park, Riverside, California. BOGGIO said he was leafletting all the bases in the Los Angeles area for this occasion. He further related that he is trying to set up draft counseling and legal defense classes at the coffeehouse as soon as he can get enough counselors together for such activity.

On May 9, 1969, a MLF meeting was held at 1702 East 4th Street, Los Angeles, California. The topic of this forum was "GIs Fight for Their Rights." The speaker was [REDACTED], Horton Air Force Base, Riverside, California, who had recently been disciplined by the Air Force for his participation in the April 6, 1969, peace march and rally which occurred in Los Angeles. [REDACTED] stated that following his participation in the April 6, 1969, demonstration, he was harassed by the military base staff in two or three days. [REDACTED] stated he

was given a 4-hour notice that he was being court-martialed. [REDACTED] stated that when informed of this, he immediately got in touch with JIM BOUGHIO of the GIVVAV, who arranged to have Attorney PETER YOUNG represent [REDACTED]. [REDACTED] said that only through YOUNG's efforts was his court-martial postponed. [REDACTED] praised the work of GIVVAV and SMC in coming to his defense.

On May 13, 1969, a LAL-SNP meeting was held at 1702 East 4th Street, Los Angeles. At this meeting, [REDACTED] gave the anti-war report. She said the SMC and GIVVAV were building the May 24, 1969, picnic and teach-in at Fairmont Park, Riverside, California.

[REDACTED] (5/20/69)

On May 20, 1969, source made available a throwaway leaflet announcing a GI - Civilian anti-war picnic to be held at Fairmont Park, Riverside, California, on May 24, 1969, sponsored by GIVVAV and SMC.

On May 27, 1969, a LAL-SNP meeting was held at 1702 East 4th Street, Los Angeles, California. In part, the meeting consisted of an anti-war report by [REDACTED] a LAB-YSA and LAL-SNP member. She said approximately 150 people attended the GI - Civilian anti-war picnic on May 24, 1969, in Riverside, California, with approximately 25 to 30 of those in attendance being active duty GIs.

[REDACTED] reported that the significant task to be done in building a campus base for April 6, 1969, was leafleting and getting the word out about April 6, 1969, to the general population. He further added that a directive had been received from the National Office and one of the main points was to use April 5 and 6, 1969, as steps toward building the anti-war coalition.

COMMUNIST INFILTRATION OF THE
FIRST UNITARIAN CHURCH OF LOS ANGELES

A source advised on May 8, 1968, that the premises of the First Unitarian Church of Los Angeles, 2936 West 8th Street, Los Angeles, California, have been utilized for meetings by Communist Party members and sympathizers over a period of years. Speakers and lecturers at the church frequently espouse Communist causes or follow the Communist Party line. Communist front group literature is distributed at the church. The church is used by some Communist Party members for "mass concentration" work.

This same infiltration extends to adjuncts of the church such as the Unitarian Public Forum and the Fellowship for Social Justice, formerly known as the Unitarian-Universalist Fellowship for Social Justice.

STEPHEN H. FRITCHMAN has been minister of the church since 1948.

Reverend STEPHEN H. FRITCHMAN is described in the Fourth Report, Un-American Activities Committee in California, 1948, Page 115, as a very active "Communist fronter" and connected with numerous "Communist front organizations and activities".

Membership in the First Unitarian Church does not, of itself, connote membership in or sympathy with the Communist Party.

LOS ANGELES LOCAL - SOCIALIST WORKERS PARTY (LAL-SWP)

On May 10, 1968, a confidential source advised that the LAL-SWP has been in existence since the 1930's and continues to exist. The source further advised that the LAL-SWP is a local branch of the National SWP with aims and purposes identical to those of the National SWP.

The SWP has been designated by the Attorney General of the United States pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

PEACE ACTION COUNCIL

The "People's World", a weekly west coast communist newspaper, in its issue of November 5, 1966, in an article on Page 3, describes the Peace Action Council (PAC) as, "a coordinating agency for peace activists" which conducts emergency mobilizations and demonstrative actions against the war in Vietnam.

On July 22, 1966, a source reported that the PAC, which has also been known as the Greater Los Angeles Peace Action Council (GLAPAC), was formed during the early summer of 1966, for the express purpose of protesting the war in Vietnam during the National Governors' Conference held in Los Angeles, California from July 4 to July 8, 1966. Following the conclusion of that conference, the PAC members decided to continue as a coordinating group to sponsor similar protest demonstrations at later dates.

This source was recontacted on May 8, 1968, and reported that the PAC continues to operate under the same basic concept.

STUDENTS FOR A DEMOCRATIC SOCIETY

A source has advised that the Students for a Democratic Society (SDS), as it is known today, came into being at a founding convention held at Port Huron, Michigan, in June, 1962. From an initial ideological posture of "participatory democracy", the current line of the national leadership reveals an adherence to Marxism-Leninism. Michael Klonsky, National Secretary, in March, 1969, called for the building of a revolutionary Marxist-Leninist movement. The program of SDS has moved from involvement in civil rights struggles to an anti-Vietnam war position and finally to its present advocacy of an anti-imperialist line, linking up the oppressed peoples of Asia, Africa and Latin America with the black liberation movement in the United States. China, Vietnam and Cuba are regarded as countries which are leading the world-wide struggles against United States imperialism. On the other hand, SDS regards the Soviet Union as an imperialist power and does not support the policies of that country.

SDS maintains a National Office in Room 206, 1608 West Madison Street, Chicago, Illinois. Its official paper "New Left Notes" reflects the line of the national leadership and program adopted at meetings of the National Council and National Interim Committee (NIC). Three national officers and a NIC of eleven members are elected each year during a June National Convention.

SDS Regional Offices and university and college chapters elect delegates to National Council meetings wherein program and ideology are debated, but each Region and chapter is autonomous in nature and is free to carry out independent policy and programs reflective of local conditions.

The "Young Socialist" newspaper was formerly described as the official organ of the Young Socialist Alliance (YSA).

The "Young Socialist" maintains office space at the headquarters of the YSA, Rooms 532-536, 41 Union Square West, New York City, and has a mailing address of Post Office Box 471, Cooper Station, New York, New York 10003.

YOUNG SOCIALIST ALLIANCE

The May, 1960 issue of the "Young Socialist" (YS), Page 1, Column 3, disclosed that during April 15-17, 1960, a national organization entitled "The Young Socialist Alliance" (YSA) was established at Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. This issue stated that this organization was formed by the nationwide supporter clubs of the publication YS.

The above issue, Page 6, set forth the Founding Declaration of the YSA. This declaration stated that the YSA recognizes the Socialist Workers Party (SWP) as the only existing political leadership on class struggle principles of revolutionary socialism.

On May 10, 1967, a source advised that the YSA was formed during 1957, by youth of various left socialist tendencies, particularly members and followers of the SWP. The source further advised that the YSA has recently become more open about admitting that it is the youth group of the SWP and that an SWP representative has publicly stated that the YSA is the SWP's youth group.

The National Headquarters of the YSA are located in Rooms 532-536, 41 Union Square West, New York City.

On October 31, 1967, a second source advised that at the 22nd National Convention of the SWP held in New York City from October 26, 1967, to October 29, 1967, it was stated that the YSA remained as the main recruiting ground for new SWP members.

The SWP has been designated pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

A characterization of "Young Socialist" is set out separately.

YOUNG SOCIALIST ALLIANCE - LOS ANGELES

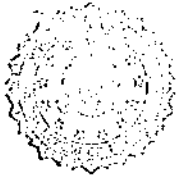
On May 13, 1968, a source advised that in February, 1959, an unnamed organization was formed in Los Angeles by youth members of the Socialist Workers Party (SWP) to support the newspaper "Young Socialist" (YS). This organization was formed as a result of the National Conference of Young Socialist Supporters held in Detroit, Michigan, in December, 1958, where a loose national organization was created around the YS with headquarters in New York City.

The organization remained unnamed, although commonly referred to as the Los Angeles Committee of Young Socialist Supporters (LACYSS) until February, 1960, when they adopted the name Young Socialist Alliance (YSA).

A second National Conference of YS Supporters was held April 15-17, 1960, at Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, at which the national organization YSA was created. The YSA at Los Angeles is an integral part of the national organization and receives its directives from YSA Headquarters in New York City.

The YSA in Los Angeles is actually the youth organization of the SWP and follows the SWP aims and purposes to the letter.

The SWP has been designated by the Attorney General of the United States pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

Source advised on various dates during May 1969 that [REDACTED] was in personal contact with the WSP Office at 5899 West Pico Boulevard, Los Angeles, California. He identified himself as an [REDACTED]

[REDACTED] California. He indicated that he is in the process of starting a newspaper [REDACTED]

The purpose of the newspaper was not stated by him, but it was assumed that it would be anti-Vietnam and anti-military. The purpose of [REDACTED] contacting the WSP Office was to obtain aid from the WSP in order to cut down the expenses of putting out the newspaper. When contacting the WSP Office, he mentioned that an organization in Los Angeles known as GI's and Vietnam Veterans Against the War (GIVVAW) (infra) had donated money to his newspaper in order that the newspaper could obtain a post office box.

Source advised that the GIVVAW is an organization of both active duty servicemen and veterans who are against the War in Vietnam. This organization demands the immediate and unconditional withdrawal of all United States troops from Vietnam. It is infiltrated and controlled by members of the Los Angeles Branch - Young Socialist Alliance (LAB - YSA) (see appendix).

WOMEN STRIKE FOR PEACE,
Also Known As
Women's International Strike for Peace

A source advised on May 12, 1969, that the Women Strike for Peace (WSP) in the Southern California area began its operations in the late fall of 1961, as an affiliate of the national organization formed that year in Washington, D.C.

WSP is a peace oriented women's organization which is opposed to the present United States foreign policy in Vietnam. It has also sought legislation which would bring about the abolition of the House Committee on Un-American Activities. In addition to conducting numerous letter writing campaigns on subjects which concern current United States civil rights and foreign policy problems, WSP locally has become quite active in draft counseling. This counseling, in the form of providing information concerning alternatives to the draft, has taken place at an increasingly consistent pace. WSP feels that these forms of opposing United States intervention in Vietnam have been quite effective and more effective than frequent participation in demonstrations protesting the war in Vietnam.

The same source stated that WSP is a non-membership organization and has no officers. The organization is open to women of all political persuasions who are interested in world peace. No effort is made to exclude from its activities members of, or persons sympathetic to, the Communist Party and related groups.

The guiding force behind the Southern California WSP is MARY CLARKE. A second source advised in July 1955, that CLARKE was dropped from the Western Division, Los Angeles County Communist Party (LACCP) in the spring of 1955, for personal reasons and not because of any political differences with the LACCP.

The first source advised that Southern California WSP maintains its office at 5899 West Pico Boulevard, Los Angeles.

"YOUNG SOCIALIST"

The "Young Socialist" is a magazine published five times a year by the Young Socialist Alliance. The October, 1964, edition, the initial edition utilizing the magazine format, relates that this magazine succeeds the "Young Socialist" newspaper in an effort to provide "more facts on more general issues than a small newspaper can."

The "Young Socialist" newspaper was formerly described as the official organ of the Young Socialist Alliance (YSA).

The "Young Socialist" maintains office space at the headquarters of the YSA, Rooms 532-536, 41 Union Square West, New York City, and has a mailing address of Post Office Box 471, Cooper Station, New York, New York 10003.

YOUNG SOCIALIST ALLIANCE

A source advised on May 15, 1969, that the Young Socialist Alliance (YSA) maintains its national headquarters at 41 Union Square West, New York, New York, and has as its official publication the "Young Socialist". The YSA is the youth organization of the Socialist Workers Party (SWP) and has been described by the SWP as the main recruiting ground for the SWP.

The SWP has been designated pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

On May 12, 1969, a source advised that in February 1959, an unnamed organization was formed in Los Angeles by youth members of the Socialist Workers Party (SWP) to support the newspaper "Young Socialist" (YS). This organization was formed as a result of the National Conference of Young Socialist Supporters held in Detroit, Michigan, in December 1958, where a loose national organization was created around the YS with headquarters in New York City.

The organization remained unnamed, although commonly referred to as the Los Angeles Committee of Young Socialist Supporters (LACYSS) until February 1960, when they adopted the name Young Socialist Alliance (YSA).

A second National Conference of YS Supporters was held April 15-17, 1960, at Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, at which the national organization YSA was created. The YSA at Los Angeles is an integral part of the national organization and receives its directives from YSA Headquarters in New York City.

The YSA in Los Angeles is actually the youth organization of the SWP and follows the SWP aims and purposes to the letter.

The SWP has been designated pursuant to Executive Order 10450.
